

# Candidates Begin Democratic Primary Announcement Process

Candidates began filing for positions on the Fisher County Democratic primary ballot to decide eight elected offices last Monday morning. Candidates have until 6 p.m., January 2 to complete filing with Fisher County Democratic Chairman Foy Mitchell of Roby.

Before candidates pay their respective filing fees to the Fisher County Democratic Chairman, they must first designate a campaign treasurer with the Fisher County Clerk's office, according to Clerk Bettie Rivers.

The offices up for election include county judge, currently held by Marshal Bennett; county commissioner precinct 2 currently held by Billy Henderson; county commissioner precinct 4, currently held by Jimmy Wright; district clerk, currently held by Betty Hargrove; county treasurer, currently held by Ilene Hale; county clerk, currently held by Bettie

Rivers; Justice of the Peace currently held by Geneva Chandler and Justice of the Peace currently held by Marie VanLoon.

The filing fees for the four-year offices are \$600 for county judge, county commissioner, county clerk, district clerk and county treasurer. Filing fee for the justice of the peace positions is \$300.

Bettie Rivers said that in lieu of a filing fee, candidates for commissioner and justice of the peace can collect 50 signatures from registered voters on a petition and candidates for county judge, county clerk, county treasurer and district clerk can collect 60 signatures on a petition.

However, Bettie Rivers cautioned those signing a petition in support of a candidate that it may hamper their voting privileges during the primaries.

Once signing a petition (in

lieu of a filing fee), the signer becomes ineligible to vote in a primary election or participate in a convention of another party during the election year," the Texas Election Code states.

"The filing fees are used to

pay for the elections," Bettie Rivers said.

To be eligible for public office, a candidate must:

Be a United States citizen.

Be 18 years of age or older on the first day of the term to be fill-

ed.

Have not been determined mentally incompetent by a court.

Have not been finally convicted of a felony from which they have not been pardoned.

Have resided continually in

the state for 12 months, and in the county or district for six months immediately preceding the filing deadline date, and;

Satisfy other eligibility requirements prescribed by law for the respective office.

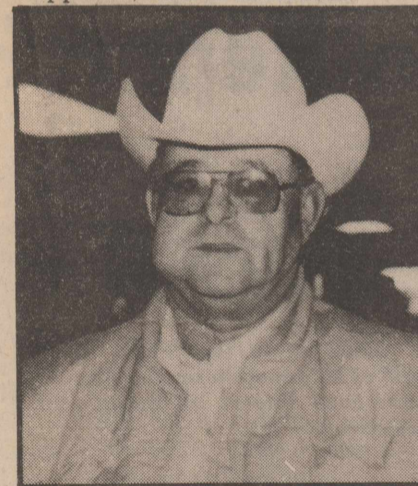

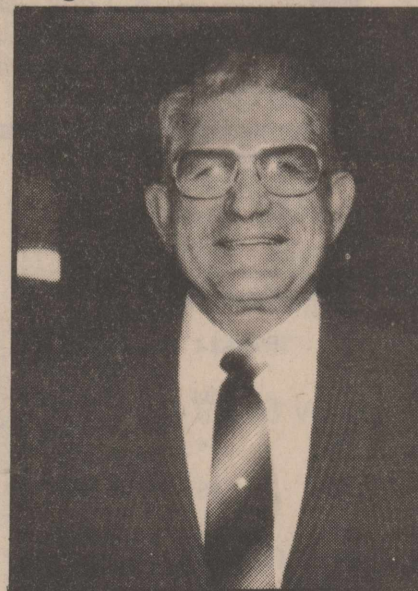

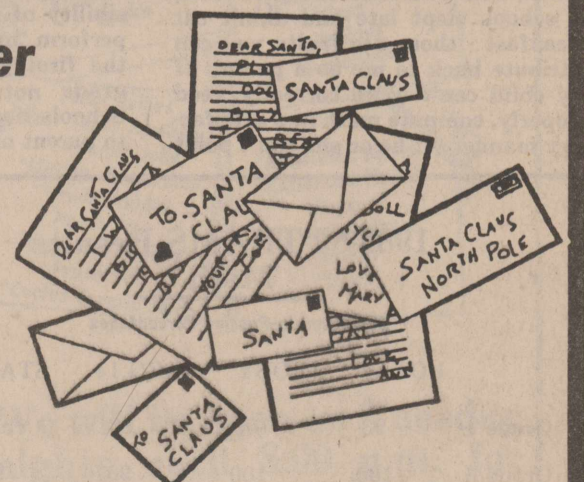
The Friday night performance is closed, the Saturday night performance is sold-out, however, a limited number of tickets still remain for the Sunday afternoon performance.

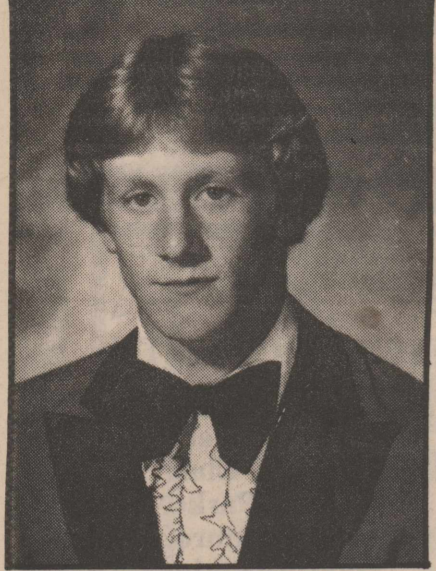
organized in August of 1987 and staged its first production, a Harley Sadler Tent show entitled

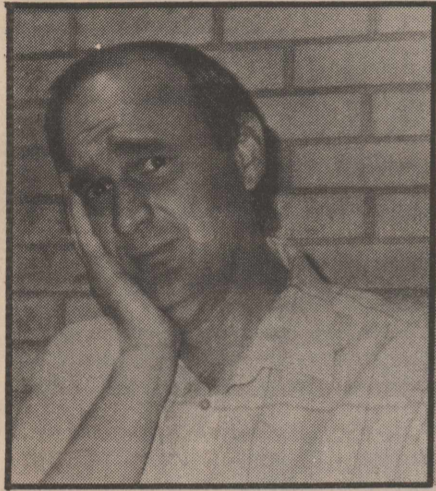
In January of 1989, Theatre on the Brazos members voted to establish a goal of presenting a minimum of three productions yearly.

In January of 1989, Theatre on the Brazos members voted to establish a goal of presenting a minimum of three productions yearly. "The Nerd" makes that goal a reality.



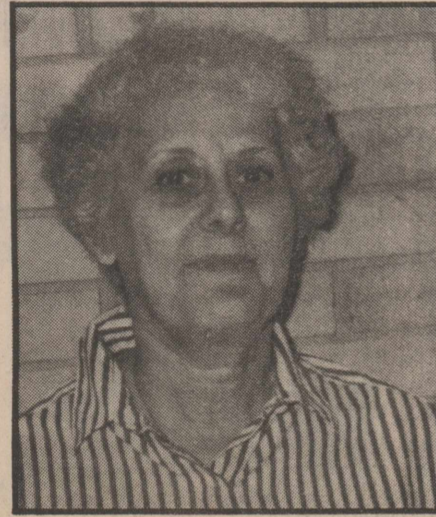

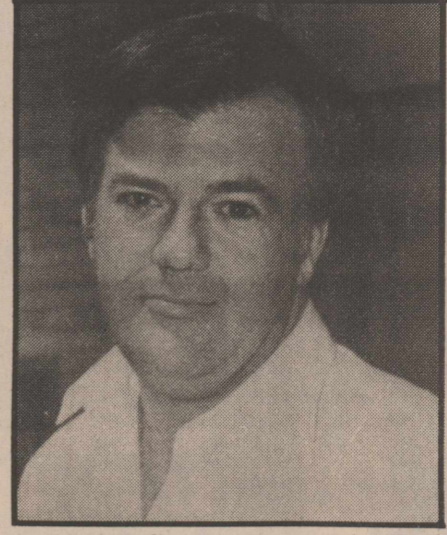

# 'Annual Performance Report' Of Rotan And Roby Schools

**EDITOR'S NOTE:** I disagree. In a book put out by the National School Boards Association, Alexandria, Virginia, published - November 1988, and titled "First Teachers: Parental Involvement In The Public Schools", page 23 - "Basic Responsibilities Of Parents - The most basic responsibility of parents, of course, is 'providing for their children's food, clothing, shelter, health, safety, and general well-being.' said Joyce Epstein. When parents could not or would not meet those basic responsibilities, schools have had to intervene, either by direct assistance or by notifying social service agencies in the community. Parents need to understand clearly that the time school staff must spend on performing these parental responsibilities will necessarily take away from the time the school can spend on instruction". I disagree. I think the school is woefully overstepping its bounds by attempting to act as 'mother' and teacher to students. Schools, in my opinion, need to leave the parenting to parents and the instruction in reading, writing and arithmetic to teachers. If my children talk with their mouths full, pick their noses in public, wear two different color socks to school, slept late and didn't eat breakfast - those are faults you can attribute back to me as a parent. If my child can't write correctly, read properly, compute math in a satisfactory manner - if he or she can't point

to Louisiana on a map, balance a checkbook, fill out a job application or has the foggiest idea of the difference between north and south - that's the fault of the school - assigned to educate that child. It is true that parents are ultimately responsible - but parents entrusted the formal education to trained, qualified professionals. So, I disagree that schools should take away from instruction time, in reading, writing and arithmetic to do the tasks I should be doing as a parent.

Today's parents need to be involved in the education of their children. They need to attend parent-teacher conferences, volunteer to assist in school or school related activities and let children know how very important a good solid education will be in their future. Parents need to ask questions and understand what events are transpiring at school that have an effect on the education of their children. Parents don't need to expect or assume, by any stretch of the imagination, that children are owed or due any formal study in anything but the basic, traditional school courses. It is not the responsibility of the school or teacher to perform 'motherly' functions. Not in the first grade, not in the twelfth grade nor anywhere in between. Schools need to teach, parents need to parent or suffer the consequences.

Next week we will close this education series down. We'll look at ACT scores, agency developed statistics, TEAMS test scores, personnel information, financial information and have some closing comments.

Now, on to the 'Third In A Series' of information on the Annual Performance Report of Rotan and Roby schools.

**Goal Five: Finance:**  
The tax rate was \$3.89 on a twenty-five million dollar tax base. Values are low and stable after a large oil and gas drop. The

instructional cost per student was approximately \$1,978.

**Goal Six: Parent And Community Involvement:**

The district offers parent awareness sessions each semester and provides the opportunity for three college teacher education majors to observe teachers two days per week for course requirements. The district provides the community with the opportunity to use the facilities for the following:

- Lions Club District Convention;
- Lions Club; -Athletic Club;
- Extension Agents Meetings;
- Roby Parent Club; -4-H Club Meetings;
- Scouts; -Midwest Electric Meetings;
- Adult and Young Farmers Meetings;
- Parent/Student Fund Raisers for the American Heart Association and Muscular Dystrophy;
- Volunteer Fire Department Din-

ner Meeting and Training Sessions; -Homecoming Activities.

**Goal Seven: Innovation:**  
The district has incorporated the following innovations within in the district:

- Western Texas College, Snyder, offers early admission courses in Sweetwater; -Two (2) Green Thumb persons work on the Roby ISD campus in the libraries and are paid for and sponsored by the U. S. Department of Agriculture;
- Annual review of achievement test scores with parents; -Use of VCR and video tapes to enhance instruction.

**Goal Eight: Communication:**  
District communications include:

- School Newspaper; -Local Newspaper - school section (test results, budget, activities);
- Letters to parents concerning TEAMS, Discipline Management Plan, Tutorials, Failing Notices and Test Results; -Periodic notes, letters, and memos; -Student, parent and teacher handbook; -L.P.A.C. Meetings for Chapter I and Migrant; -Vocational Advisory Counsel;
- Parents/Community participation for District/Campus Plann-

ing sessions.

### Rotan

**Goal Five: Finance:**  
Rotan Independent School District gained \$1,880,590 in property valuation. The maximum effective tax rate was .92355, but the adopted rate was \$0.94 (\$0.87 for maintenance and operation and \$0.07 for interest and sinking). This was the same tax rate as the last two years. The district was able to collect 96.9% of the tax levy.

The 1988-89 budget was \$2,018,052 with \$1,096,281 being spent on instruction and \$281,800 spent on Capital Outlay. Of the \$281,800 in Capital Outlay, \$127,000 was spent to complete the Learning Resource Center and \$90,855 was spent on building improvement.

The new LRC consolidated the three libraries presently in use

tained 15 students, 14 students correctly answered 28 or more of the 44 questions and one student failed to answer correctly at least 28 of the 44 questions asked. In the case of Roby's 1st grade score of 100 - all the students in the class correctly answered 28 or more of the 44 questions on the test correctly. The rules are a little different on the EXIT level test - 11th grade. In this test, students must correctly answer 50 of 72 questions or roughly 70-percent.

classes out of 100 across the United States would score higher, while 66 classes out of 100 would score lower. Seriously studying CAT scores helps educators pin-point problems that can be addressed and corrected.

## Jorge Montoya Doing Well At McMurry

It might be hard to see how a boy breaking his leg while playing third-grade soccer in Spain might lead to his playing basketball at McMurry College ten years later.

But that's exactly what happened to Jorge Montoya. The 18-year-old from Victoria, Spain, broke his leg while playing a soccer match in the third grade. By the time he recovered four months later, he found out it was too late to rejoin his soccer team, so he switched his allegiance to basketball.

Montoya came to the United States via the Youth for Understanding program, in which exchange students live with families overseas for a year while attending high school. He learned of the program through a cousin who had participated the year before and went to school at Leuders-Avoca.

Montoya almost ended up in Ohio, but his cousin said he probably would like Texas even more. Two days before he left, Montoya found out he was going to Rotan, Texas.

Montoya's sponsor family was Mr. and Mrs. Weldon Nelms. Nelms, head football coach at Rotan, gave Montoya his first chance to participate in American football with the Yellowhammers.

He happened to get on a team that was one of the better Class A teams in the state last season. The Yellowhammers went 10-3 and advanced to the Class A quarterfinals before being beaten. "It was a great experience," said Montoya, who kicked extra points and field goals for Rotan.

After football, Montoya joined the Yellowhammer basketball team and returned to playing at his favorite sport.

Rotan posted a good season in basketball last year, turning around a team that won only three games the year before to a 15-13 squad that advanced to the area playoffs.

Although he failed to qualify for the state meet, Montoya also ran the 800-meter dash for the Yellowhammers, who won the Texas Class A Track and Field Championship last spring.

After graduation, Montoya was undecided what he might do. The Nelms encouraged him to

stay in Texas and go to college. "I got along with my sponsor family very well," Montoya said. "I told them, 'If you want me to stay here and go to school, then O.K.'"

He discussed staying in the United States to attend college with his father, Jose Ramon Montoya, who is a commercial manager with a factory near Victoria, and his father agreed. But, he said, "I wasn't sure where I wanted to go."

Montoya looked at several different colleges, including Stephen F. Austin, but his father felt he should find a college nearer his sponsor family and the Nelms "told me that McMurry College was a very good college."

"I like it here (at McMurry) very much," Montoya said. "I

really enjoy the way everyone cares about each other."

He finds Texans as friendly as he had always heard they would be.

"The people in Texas are very friendly," Montoya said. "People in Spain are friendly, but there are so many tourists that they are not always as friendly to strangers."

"Here, I've found that all the people are interested in me," he said. "They try to keep me from being homesick."

"And, so far, they have succeeded," Montoya said.

"I thought I would be really homesick," he said. "But my friends here have been great. They kept me from being homesick."

After graduation from Rotan

High School in June, 1988, Montoya and all the other exchange students from across Texas took a tour of the East Coast before returning to their homes.

He was amazed at the diversity of the United States.

"I couldn't believe the difference between Florida or New York," he said. "I don't know how one country can be so different."

McMurry head basketball coach Hershel Kimbrell says Montoya is a talented freshman basketball player whose strong suit is running the court and quick hands on defense.

Montoya said he really enjoys all phases of basketball, but his favorite part is defense.

"I really enjoy stealing the ball

away from the other guy," he said.

Montoya said basketball has grown in popularity in Spain almost enough to rival soccer.

There are high school districts and an organization similar to the University Interscholastic League, he said.

"The only difference is that we are able to play for a national high school title. Here, there are too many teams to do that."

Montoya is looking forward to playing for the McMurry Indians during his collegiate career and wants to earn a degree in physical

education and Spanish.

After graduation, he would like to teach and coach, but is not sure yet just where.

And, he says, another Montoya may be coming to the United States because of his experiences here.

"My sister, Blanca, wasn't really interested in coming here," Montoya said. "But I told her about how much I've learned and how much fun it was and now she wants to come."

Perhaps her brother's broken leg might lead her to McMurry also.

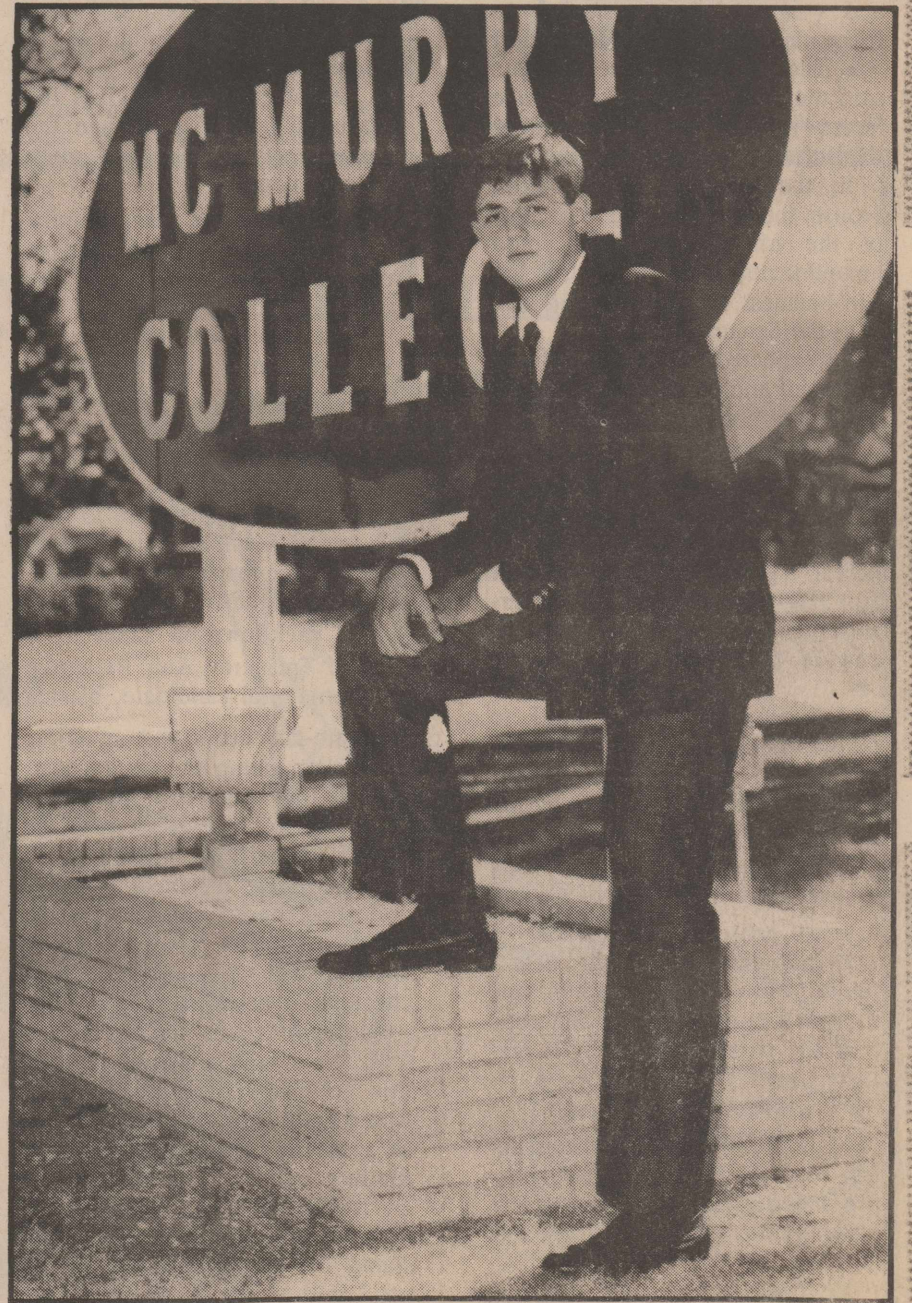
"Leaves tend to overload the dumpster and don't pack down like we would like," said Vann.

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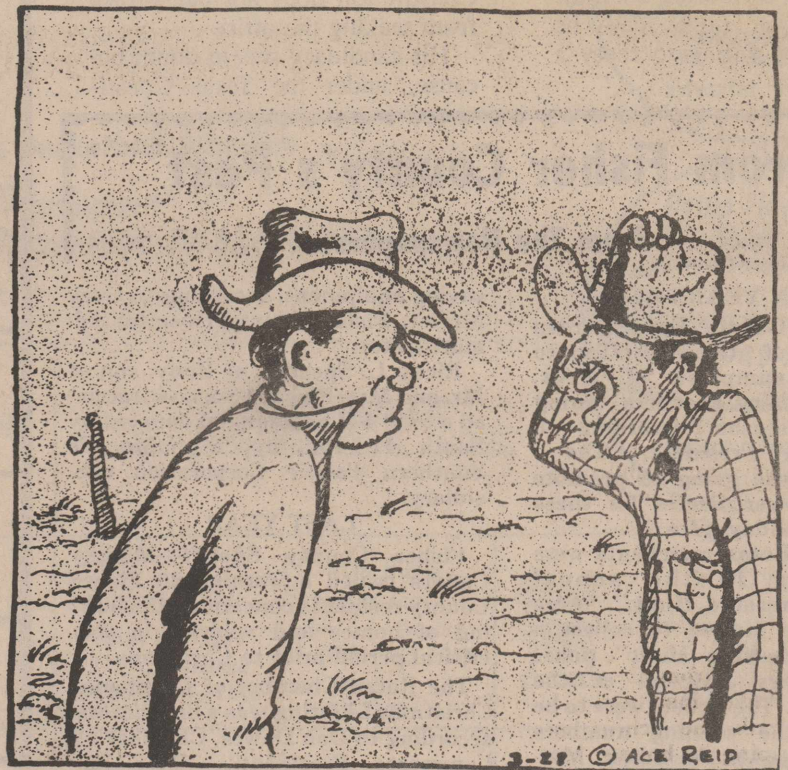

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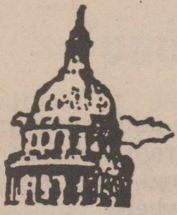
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## State Capital Highlights

AUSTIN—While state legislators hotly debated workers' compensation reform last week, the official filing date for state elections opened and several players upped the political ante.

■ The state's largest agricultural group formally declared war on agriculture commissioner Jim Hightower;

■ Former Gov. Mark White announced a comeback candidacy and was immediately sued by a former contributor-appointee; and

■ The top three state officials said they want lawmakers to make Texas judges appointive, rather than elective.

In the workers' comp battle, House members wiped out most of the trial lawyer/labor union amendments, restored much of the pro-business Hobby plan and sent it to the Senate.

As expected, the Senate refused to concur and prepared to wage the battle in conference committee. The vote was 17-14.

### Farm Bureau's Enemy

At its convention, the Texas Farm Bureau vowed all-out war to defeat Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower, whom its leadership regards as the number one enemy of Texas farmers and ranchers.

The Bureau worked hard to recruit Texas Rangers' pitching ace Nolan Ryan, who ranches near Alvin, to run as a Republican against Hightower.

But Ryan said he would stick to one more year of professional baseball before trying politics.

Disappointed but still determined, Farm Bureau leaders said they will quit recruiting and support the winner of the GOP primary.

### Mark White Returns

Mark White officially threw his hat into the gubernatorial ring, promising to pick up where he left off on public education reform and no-pass, no-play.

He immediately drew political flak.

Democratic opponent Attorney General Jim Mattox reminded voters that, as governor, White raised taxes, tuitions and fees higher than any Democrat in Texas history.

White, now a Houston attorney, was sued the same day he announced for failing to repay a

\$75,000 campaign loan made in 1986.

White said the lawsuit filed by Lubbock physician Ray Santos, whom White once appointed to the Texas Parks & Wildlife Commission, was politically motivated.

### Appoint State Judges

The Big Three in state government — Gov. Bill Clements, Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby and Speaker Gib Lewis — said Texas should change to a method of appointing state judges selected by a committee and approved later by voters.

A recent court order gives the state until Jan. 3 to change the election method to allow more minority judges.

The trio favors a plan whereby the governor will appoint judges from a list screened by a state judicial committee.

Those appointees will serve a specified term, and then face a "retention election," when voters can re-elect or oust them.

Many see the plan as a compromise to minimize election politics in the judicial system and to protect voters from insulated judges who order expensive reforms resulting in higher taxes.

### Crackdown on Taxes

State Treasurer Ann Richards, a gubernatorial candidate, blasted cigarette-tax cheats, and unveiled a plan for catching the tax evaders, noting that cigarette smugglers and tobacco-tax evaders cost the state \$100 million annually.

Last year, responsibility for collecting the tax shifted from the state comptroller to the treasurer, and Richards said she was warning cheaters a crackdown was coming.

Meanwhile, her press secretary took issue with a recent item in this column indicating Richards would embrace a state income tax, as a means of equalizing school funding.

"Ann Richards opposes a state income tax and has repeatedly stated her opposition to such a tax," said Monte Williams.

### Brown AG Race Okayed

A state district judge ruled that state Sen. Buster Brown, R-Lake Jackson, is eligible to run for attorney general.

Judge J. Ray Gayle III, of Brazoria County, said the Texas Constitution does not bar Brown from seeking the office.

His candidacy was in doubt because, under the Texas Consti-

tion, mid-term legislators cannot advance to higher offices that have recently received increases in salary or other "emoluments" from the Legislature.

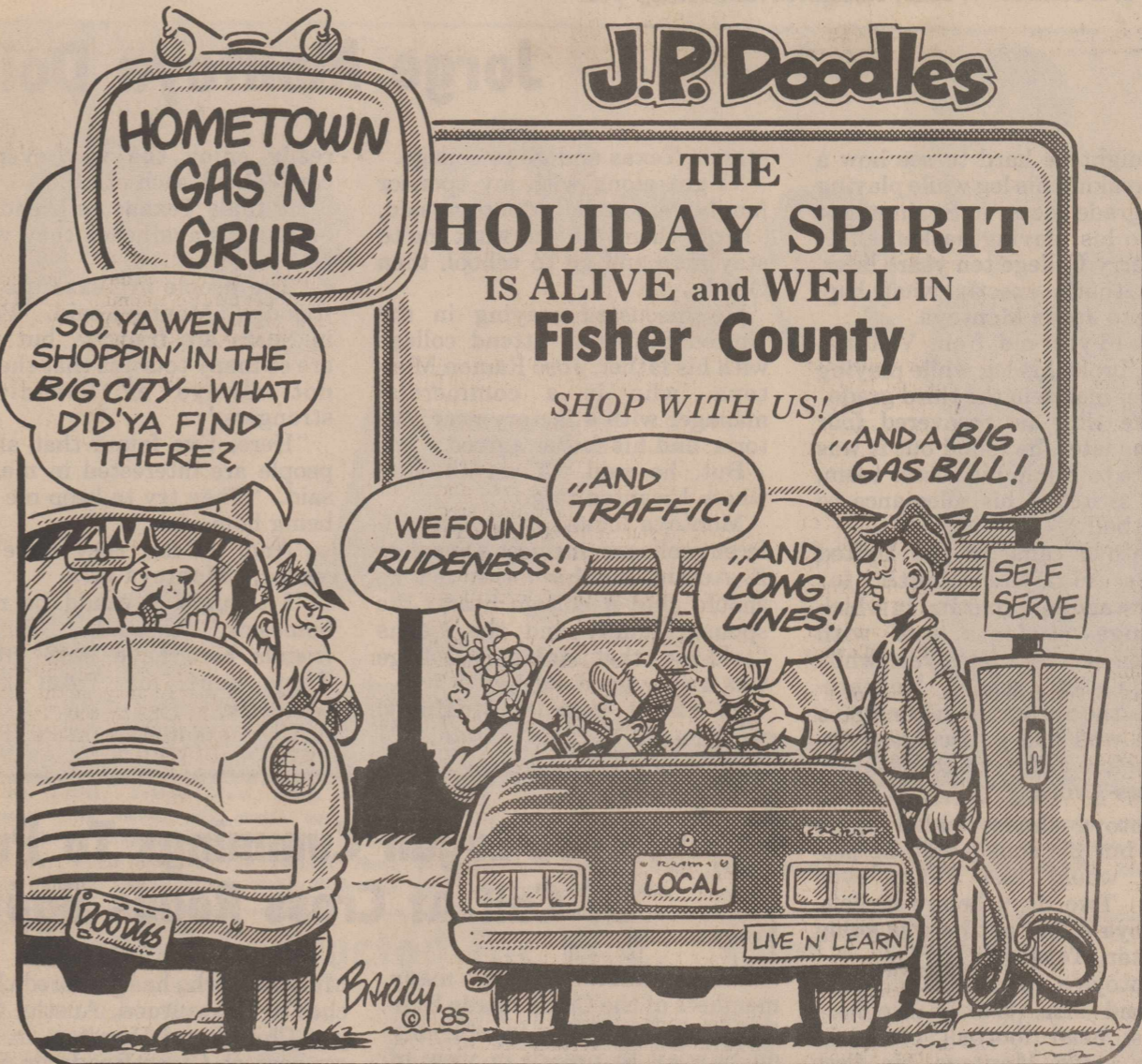
The Legislature this year raised retirement benefits for the attorney general and other statewide office-holders. Judge Gayle ruled that retirement benefits are not considered emoluments.

### Other Highlights

■ As the workers' comp showdown continues, some observers speculated that Gov. Clements will keep lawmakers in Austin for the full 30-day term by opening the agenda to more issues, including selection of judges.

■ Paul D. Meek, a Dallas oil executive, was elected chairman of the Public Utility Commission, replacing Marta Greytok who remains on the three-member board.

■ The State Board of Insurance has appointed a panel to develop a plan for an insurance pool to cover Texans otherwise medically uninsurable.

and allowed the use of the old facilities for a total of six classrooms. These classrooms were needed to comply with the 22-1 ratio in the early grades.

Goal Six: Parent And Community Involvement:

Parents and other patrons were actively involved in numerous school activities. There was an active Parent-Teacher organization which furnished volunteers for the book fair, the carnival, the cafeteria, and in the primary classroom as teachers' assistants. The primary school annual evening track meet was coordinated by the primary parents. The junior class and the Rotan Fire Department sponsored the annual turkey shoot to raise funds for school projects.

The Advisory Council for the development of the Campus and District Goals was organized and developed the goals for each campus and the district. The elementary advisory council was composed of one administrator, three teachers, and three parents. The junior high advisory council was composed of one administrator, three teachers, three parents, and two students. The high school advisory council was the same composite. A needs assessment was administered to all administrators, all board members, all teachers, twenty-five junior high students, all high school students, and every tenth person on the tax roll. From this assessment, campus goals were developed. The District Advisory Council was comprised of two administrators, three teachers, three parents, and two students.

Citizens served on the advisory committee for the vocational department and for Chapter I. Young Farmers and Young Homemakers were active in the community. Young Farmers activities included awarding a \$250.00 scholarship to a Rotan senior who planned to major in Agriculture.

Free adult education classes were offered four nights a week with an average enrollment of sixteen. Rotan served as a GED Test Center and eighty adults from the area passed their GED exams and received a GED in 1988.

Rotan is a test site for four of the American College Test dates. Students from area schools also register for this test center.

Teachers, administrators, and school board members received required and enrichment training on the TI-IN. Other adults and students have utilized the TI-IN facilities in the LRC.

Primary parents presented \$500.00 to the elementary section of the new LRC to purchase new books. Another \$500.00 was used for other projects at the elementary building.

Free dental check-up was provided for all elementary students by the local dentist.

In tribute to Mr. H. Govan, numerous memorial books were presented to the LRC. This lasting tribute is used by many Rotan residents. In 1988-89, twenty-seven (27) memorial books were presented to the LRC.

Four local scholarships are given each year by individuals or organizations for seniors planning to seek post-secondary training.

West Central Texas Council of Governments coordinates JTPA training for our students at various job sites.

Parents attended two workshops on financial aid to assist their seniors with financial planning for post-secondary training. A majority of these seniors received financial assistance in the form of scholarships, grants, and/or work/study.

Orientation to high school graduation requirements and offerings was attended by most parents of eighth grade students at an evening meeting.

Numerous parents were actively involved with the Spanish Club activities this year.

Goal Seven: Innovations: The Rotan Academic Excellence awards was initiated by the superintendent. Thirty-six (36) elementary students received tee shirts, thirty-three (33) junior high students received windbreakers, and two (2) high school students received jackets. To receive this award a student must have obtained a 93 overall average in every subject for the entire previous year.

An exchange student from Spain provided an international learning experience for students, parents, and faculty.

The junior high newspaper provided a creative outlet for the gifted/talented students.

TEAMWORK computer software was purchased and extensively used by grades 5, 7, and 9.

EXCEL Math was introduced in grades 1 through 4.

TI-IN, an interactive television system, continued to provide teacher inservice, board training, and enrichment programs for students of grades K-12.

An open house held in the new LRC brought most community members to the new facility.

A summer remediation program for students needing additional instruction before retaking the TEAMS Exit Level in the fall of 1989 was offered.

Goal Eight: Communication Newsletters were sent to each home as needed, the Rotan Advance, the local newspaper, and United Cable TV of Rotan informed the public of upcoming events. Numerous school articles were published weekly including a column written by a high school journalism student.

The high school journalism class wrote and published a newspaper. GT students in junior high also wrote and published a paper.

The Chamber of Commerce announcement board was utilized for school notices. Additionally, a monthly calendar of school cafeteria menu and school events was sent home with each student.

The honor roll was published in the newspaper each six weeks. Each six weeks elementary honor roll students were recognized and presented a pencil by the elementary principal.

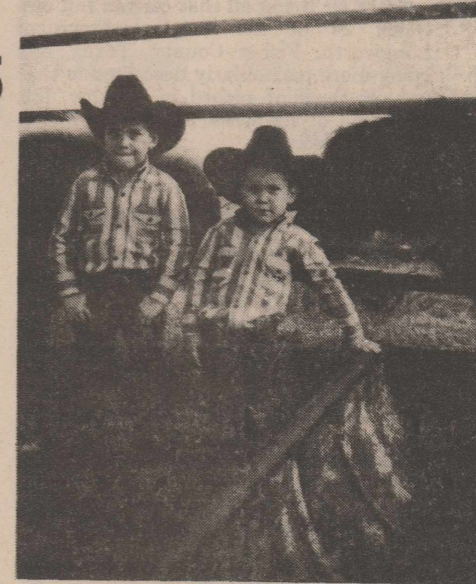

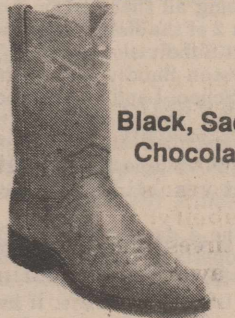

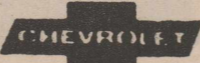

### TAX ESTIMATES

Tax estimates are quarterly payments of the total tax you expect to owe for the year. These payments are due April 15, June 15, September 15, and the following January 15. Tax estimates are generally required if you expect to owe at least \$500 when you file your return.

Most individuals pay their taxes via wage withholdings. Because they generally have the flexibility to adjust the amount withheld during the year, these people do not usually need to concern themselves with tax estimates.

Estimated payments primarily apply to you if you have significant income from sources not subject to withholding; i.e., interest, dividends, capital gains, pensions and annuities, self-employment earnings, prizes and awards, unemployment compensation, and some Social Security benefits. Self-employed individuals must consider the self-employment tax as well as the income tax when calculating their estimate payments.

Ignorance is not bliss if you fail to make required estimate payments. The IRS will assess both penalties and interest on delinquent or insufficient estimate payments. These calculations are done separately for each quarter. Thus, overpaying for one quarter will not avoid the penalty for underpaying a previous quarter.

There are two ways to avoid the penalty on underpayment of tax. You can either pay in (through withholding and/or estimates) 90% of your current year's income tax liability or 100% of your prior year's income tax liability.

Recent retirees who have had withholding throughout their lives are usually not aware of the estimate requirements. If you are recently retired or receive significant income which is not subject to withholding, contact our office to determine if estimates are necessary.

Reminder: The final quarterly estimate for 1989 taxes is due January 15, 1991.

Rotan Yellowhammers (11-1-1) played a total of 13 games before registering their only loss of the season, to the Munday Moguls 16-7 Friday night.

Unfortunately, that single loss came during the wrong week of the season. Rotan's season ending loss came at the hands of the probable State-Champs, of which time will tell.

Yellowhammers had a tremendous season that surpassed everyone's early expectations. Who would have believed, a team comprised of many first year players, few returning starters, position changes of returning lettermen, and several sophomore players in the lineup — could post an undefeated season after 12 weeks; win the 1989 District Championship, Bi-District Championship and an Area Championship.

To summarize the Munday game, Rotan came ready to play and were successful in stopping Munday's first possession with a fumble recovery by Renee Silva.

Yellowhammers gained possession 6 inches from the end zone and advanced the ball to the 36 yard line before being forced to punt.

Munday proceeded to drive 67 yards, capped by a 5 yard touchdown run by QB Andrade.

The extra point conversion posted a 7-0 Mogul lead with 9:03 remaining in the first half.

Rotan had only 2 offensive possessions the first half, and were able to drive the ball within 3 yards of the end zone just seconds before intermission. The potential tying drive came to a painful halt as the Hammers were intercepted in the end zone.

Yellowhammers led in first downs 8-7 and in penetrations 2-1 but trailed in total offensive yardage 123-142 at the midway point.

A motivated Hammer team got off to a rough start the second half, being intercepted after marching to the Moguls 43.

Munday committed another turnover by fumbling into the hands of Chris Kennedy.

Joe Huit (22 carries for 89 yards) and Brandon Alls (11 carries for 31 yards) made by runs enroute to a 3rd quarter drive that was sealed with a 5 yard QB sneak play for a touchdown by Kevin Smith. Danny Warren kicked the extra point try, posting a 7-7 deadlock.

Yellowhammers were on a roll after the touchdown, followed by a crushing defensive stand that forced Munday to punt.

Rotan fumbled on the punt return attempt and proved to be a key turn around in the contest. Momentum swung in the Mogul direction, as Munday turned the fumble recovery into 3 points with a 31-yard field goal with 9:30 remaining in the game.

Trailing 10-7, Rotan recovered another fumble on the Mogul 32 but were unable to capitalize on the turnover.

With 2 minutes in the game, Munday marched downfield before RB Collier broke for a 21 yard touchdown. Scoreboard displayed a 16-7 Mogul advantage.

Rotan went to the air, needing two scores to win the game. Yellowhammer passing statistics

(3 completions in 15 attempts - 2 interceptions) proved ineffective and accounted for 2 of the 3 turnovers.

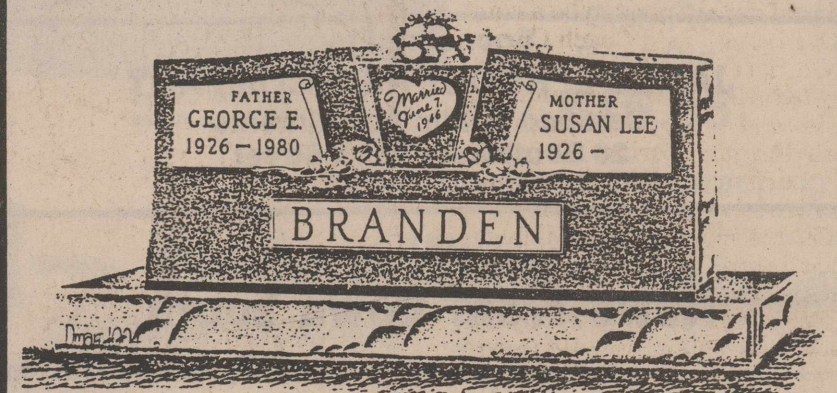
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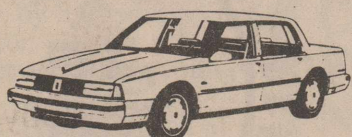
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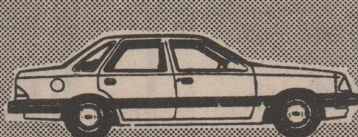


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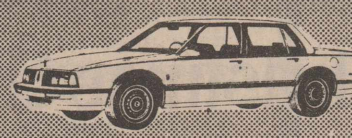


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## Roby Varsity Girls Doing Well With Feagan And Hohon Leading Total Points Scored

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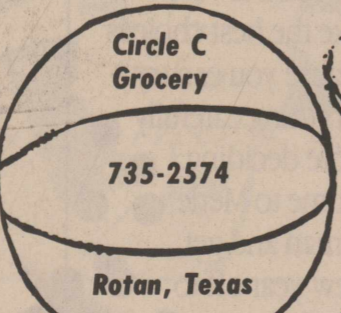
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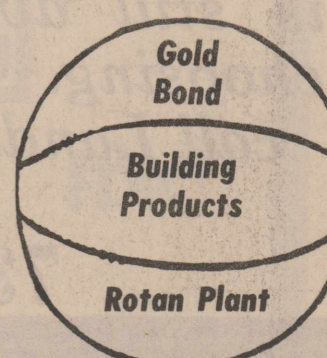
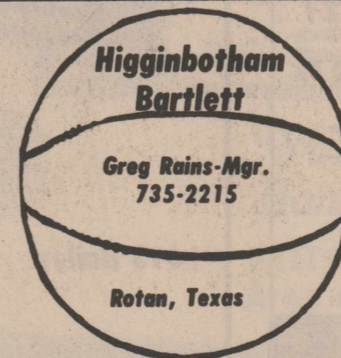
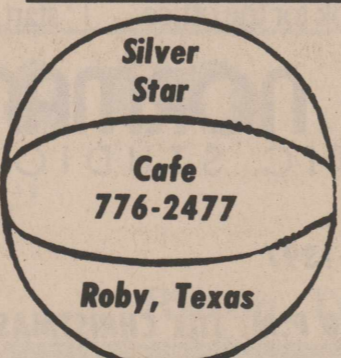
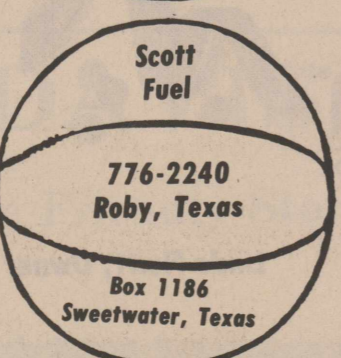
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## Funeral Services For Bennie Reaid, Jr.

## County Agent's Report

by Richard Spencer

The Fisher County Quail Hunting Coop has received a \$9,500 grant from Texas Rural Communities to write a "How to" manual for developing a hunting coop. This booklet will be distributed to every county in Texas.

This is a nice honor to be selected for this endeavor.

Water is the chief limiting factor in Texas' agricultural production. Water has been a problem in the state throughout history, interfering first with exploration and settlement, then later sometimes impeding the growth of agriculture, cities and industry.

With average annual rainfall ranging from more than 54 inches in the east to less than 8 inches in the west, Texas is subject to periodic drought, torrential rainfall and floods.

Even in those areas where average annual rainfall is "about right," it may be right for agriculture from one year to the next. Some high rainfall areas of the state have extensive wetlands, drainage problems, high temperatures and high humidity. Other parts of the state have low rainfall, low humidity and hot drying winds.

Erosion of the soil from wind and water are persistent problems, carrying off vital topsoil from farms and ranches, depositing a lot of it in waterways and silting up water impoundments.

Water research, a major concern of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station since 1888, continues as a high priority effort. In the first year of Station operation, water management was identified and adopted as one of seven areas most in need of research. Today, despite major efforts that have greatly improved efficiency of water usage, water remains the state's single most important constraint for agricultural production.

Presently, Texas does not have adequate water to supply its municipal, industrial and agricultural needs; much of its supply shortfall is provided from overdrafting groundwater supplies. Agricultural water supplies

are expected to decline as groundwater reserves are depleted and competition among water users becomes more acute.

The state's surface water resources have been developed to about 70 percent of their potential. However, continued growth of the industrial and residential sectors will eventually put pressure on water supplies for agriculture because the value-in-use of water for agriculture is lower than for municipal and industrial projects.

If the state is to continue to grow and realize its full potential, it must develop technology that will fully use limited water supplies.

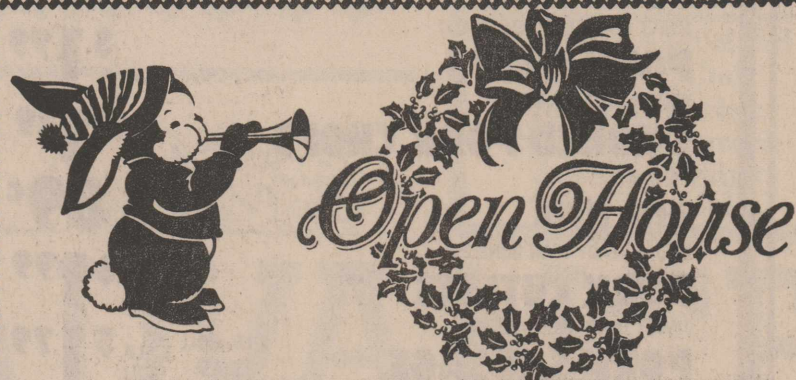
The performance of all classes of cattle can be drastically lowered by extreme weather. The animal's hair coat, body condition (fat cover or lack of) determines the animal's ability to withstand the stress of cold weather. Research from South Dakota

showed the critical temperature (that temperature that causes stress on cattle) can vary from 45 degrees F. on thin conditioned, thin hair coat cattle to 15 degrees F. on cattle with heavy hair coat and average body condition. This readily shows why high percentage Brahman cattle are more susceptible to cold stress than English or Continental breeds, body condition being the same. Kansas State University research shows maintenance requirements of cattle increase up to 4% for each one degree of temperature stress below the animal's critical temperature.

You can readily see that the guidelines we use to supplement our cattle in the winter can increase 100% during extreme cold weather.

This stress can be offset by having cattle in pastures that have windbreaks and by increasing the amounts of supplemental hay and feed the cattle are normally given.

As more cattlemen use various forms of controlled pasture rotation, the more important it becomes to make sure cattle are located in a pasture that offers a natural windbreak. This is for protection of the cattle when extreme weather is in the forecast.

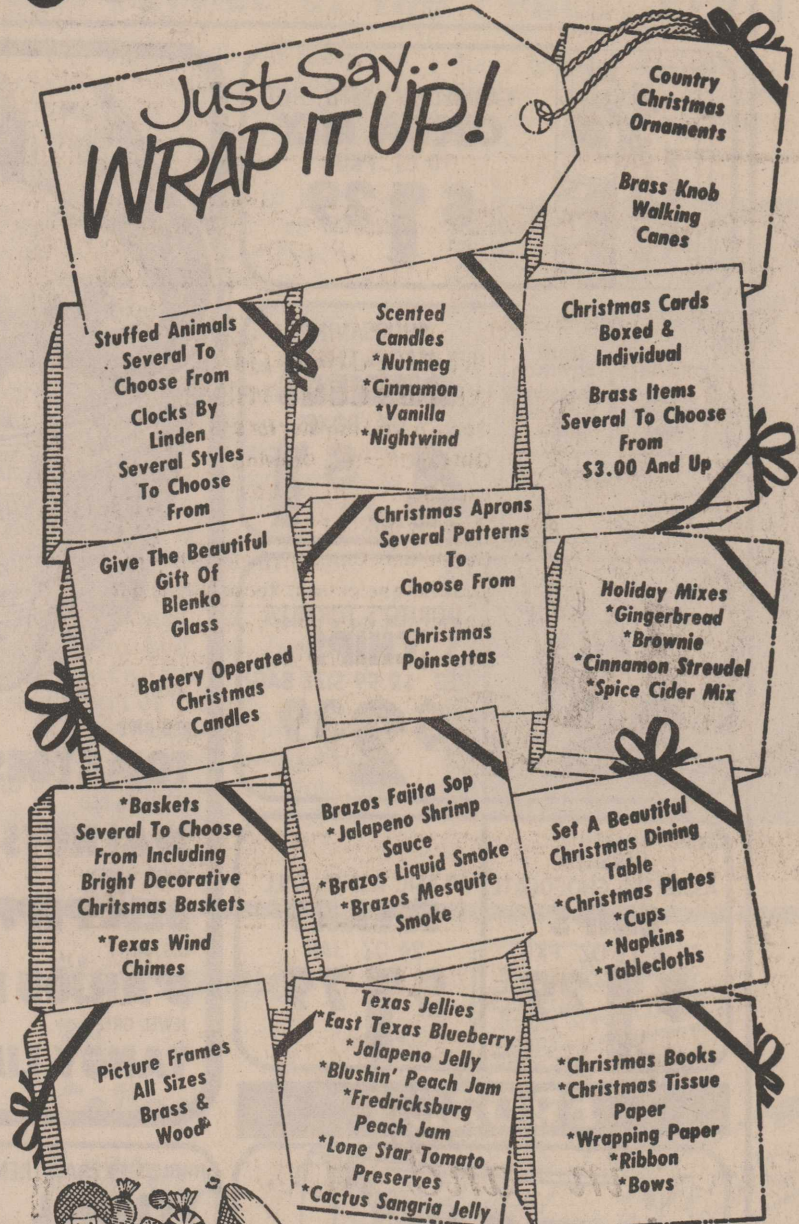

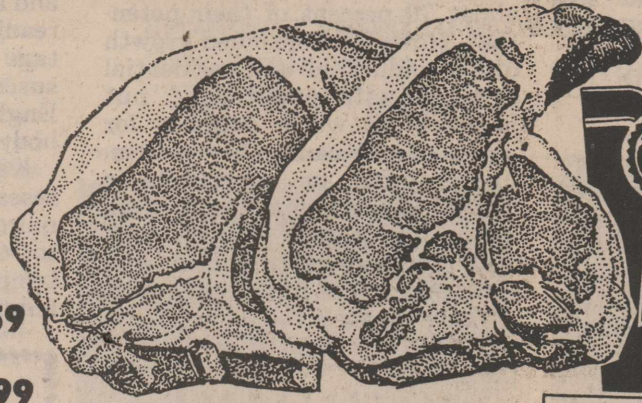
