LAMESA WINS 3RD DISTRICT BASKETBALL TITLE

Displaying their true basketball temperaments and goal shooting talents for the first time in the tournament, the Lamesa High School Golden Tornadoes chalked up a 15-2 lead in the first quarter which served them well through a boisterous game and a 37 to 35 victory over Lubbock High School in the final game of the District 3 interscholastic joust Saturday night at the Texas Tech gym.

Thus the Tornado school added to its rapidly growing trophy case, already crowded with the 1934 and two preceding football championships, the third consecutive district cage title.

The championship battle, jammed with thrills in the last half, was a fitting climax to two days of bitterly waged wars between schoolboy champions of 14 South Plains counties.

Given five more seconds, the Westerners probably would have looped another field goal to tie the score at 37 all, for they were going strong in that last half minute. Trailing 29 to 37 with seconds to go, Murray Venable, Clayton Wasson, and Dayton McWhorter took tipoffs and scurried to the basket for six points. Was was somed had the ball in his hand, dribbling under the basket for a strip shot when the game ended.

Lubbock made a fine recovery in the second quarter to cut Lamesa's lead to five points at half-time. The score was 21 to 16 and Lubbock kept moving in the last half, although missing numerous shots. The Westerners outscored Lamesa 19 points to 16 in the last half, but were never able to tie the score or get ahead.

The game was slowed by the commission of 41 personal fouls. Two Westerners and four Tornadoes were banished by the foul route as Referee Ed Hambricht, calling a close game was obliged to go heavy on the whistle against the hustling, scrapping school boys.

A demonstrative crowd of about 700, "all of them referees", kept up a ceaseless chatter. Approximately half the fans in on the closing chapter of the tournament were Lamesa supporters.

The Tornadoes wheeled through Plainview's Bulldogs, 35 to 19, in a semi-final game Saturday morning. Previously they had beaten Olton 31 to 25 and Lorenzo 30 to 26 in games they were "lucky to win" owing to Coach Lester.

\$204,000 RECEIVED HERE FOR COTTON BALE TAGS

Two hundred and four thousand dollars were received by the agents office since the last issue of this paper representing 2323 checks, to tenants and landlords of the county. There is yet to come over forty thousand dollars more on the certificates or bale tags for the entire county, making an average of over eighty seven dollars per check.

One check every seventy seconds for nine straight hours was the record for those who received them when they were signing for them the first of the week.

Business men of course have felt the effects of the checks by the sudden up turn of sales. These benefit payments will enable many men to operate farms during the coming year without any outside assistance.

New Cotton Contracts

Producers who are not satisfied with their contracts as signed up last year may apply to their local committees in the next few days and try and see if satisfactory adjustment can be made at a later date. Elections in the local communities will be held all the same night for the purpose of electing at least four additional men to serve as committee on adjustment for cotton contracts. The local cotton committees will have a list of all contract signers for last year with the average number of acres of each man in the community for any one to see, then after the local committee of five or more has a meeting and the adjustments are made the list will be available for any one to see in his particular district. If any producer is raised he will of course have to furnish proof as to why he should be raised. While at the same time every time any one man is raised some other contract in the community will have to be lowered an amount equal to the raise. Keep in communication with your local committee about the date that the election will be held in your school district. The election date will be announced in your school and also in this paper.

Dawson County Farm Association

At a meeting on February 16 directors for the association for Dawson county were elected to serve for one year by representatives from every community in the county. The directors are: C. A. Barron, Chairman; Clay Randolph, vice chairman; T. E. Temple, secretary; Precinct No. 1, H. L. Jeter; Precinct No. 2, H. L. Hohn; Precinct No. 3, Jess McWhirter; Precinct No. 4, W. W. Beeman, who will represent the Commissioner's Court also. A meeting of the directors is called for Saturday, March 2nd.

At this meeting the program for the county will be made out and the work of the county agent and the association for the year.

In case you want any service of the agent get in communication with the local association committeeman and he will arrange for what ever demonstration is desired.

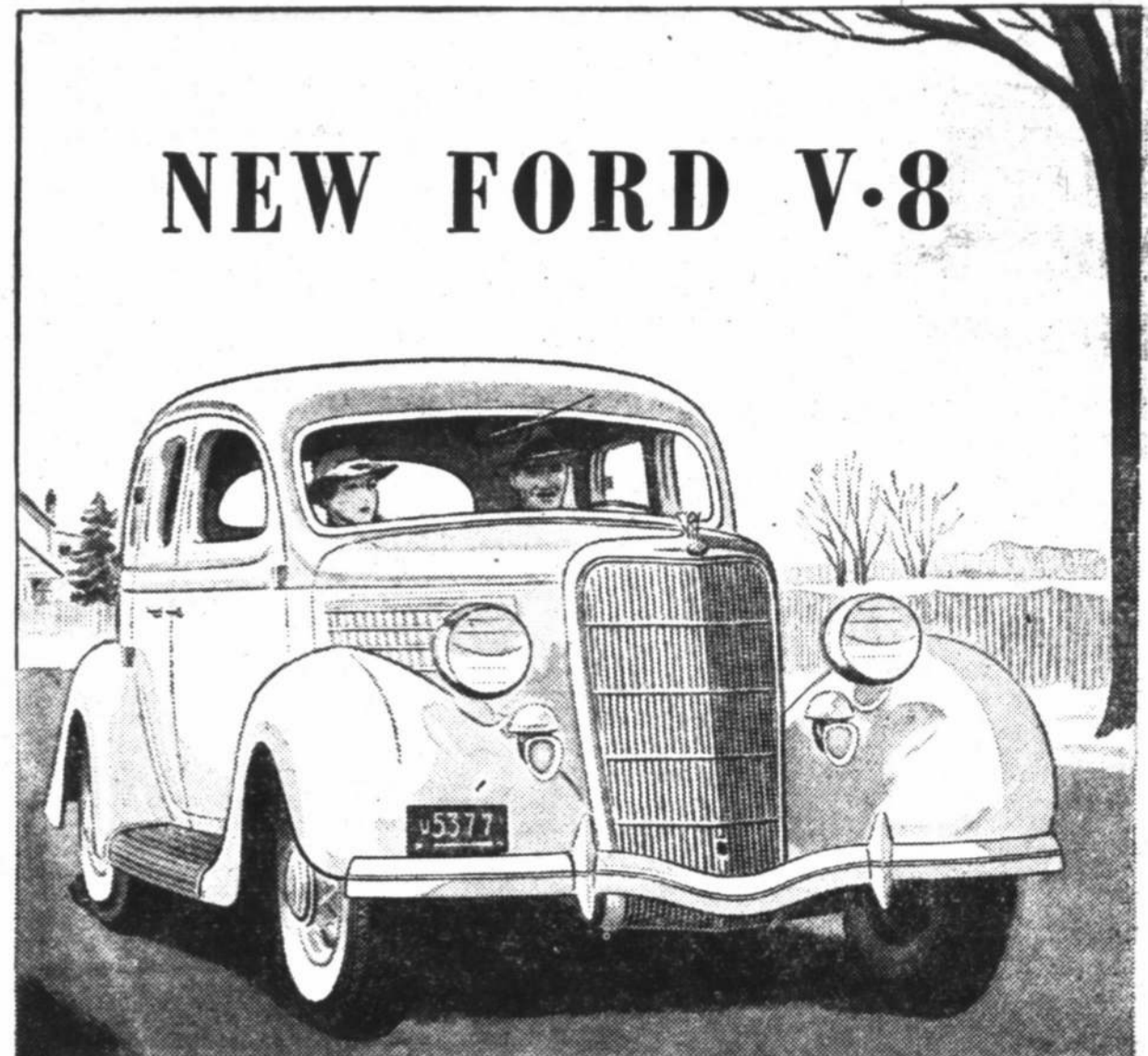

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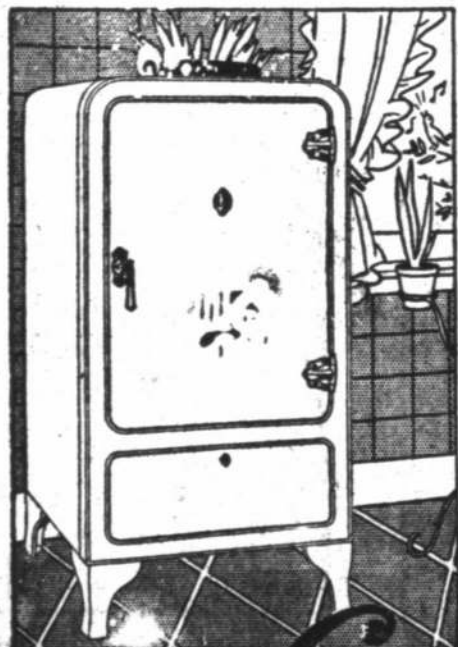
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
