Screw Worm Warning Issued Cattlemen

Warning to livestock owners in Mitchell County was issued Tuesday by Bobby Lemons, county agent, that they should be on the alert for screw worm infestation in their herds.

"We have had one confirmed case as close as Tom Green County," Lemons said, adding that the case at San Angelo was confirmed Wednesday.

"The county agent urges all Mitchell cattlemen to take precaution in preventing an outbreak in this county.

"All cattle should be examined for wounds," he said, "all wounds treated promptly, and samples from any

worm-infested wound should be sent in for tests at once," Lemons said.

Vials, with address affixed and postage paid by the United States Department of Agriculture, are available at the Mitchell County Extension Service offices, court house annex building.

In Tom Green County 160,000 screws are being released this week in an effort to control spread of the screw worm there, he concluded.

Some will replant in some spots if weather stays clear enough to get into the fields to plow," Hill said.

Lemons, who also toured the washed out areas in the county, said "It looks pretty bad—mostly because of washed out terraces especially at the Hoyle place and east of there. But it will be several days before we can really tell."

"The county agent believes it will be hard to replant cotton because some fields still look like lakes and some farmers can't get back into their fields for two weeks. Even then, a very light tractor will be needed. And a hard wind could blow a

man out because of damage to terraces, sill, and outside water."

Some feed crops were damaged, Lemons said. In the event cotton can not be replanted, some farmers may plant soy beans or guar, he said.

China Grove store, operated by John and Betty Bills, had three to four inches of water on the floor of the store as result of the down-pour.

Floyd W. Merket yard was knee deep in water. The high front porch was inundated by use of electric power to pump the water out of the yard. Mr. and Mrs. Merket were able to keep the water out of their house. A small amount seeped under the front door.

The Merketts, who have lived in China Grove for 40 years, reported the highest water since they moved to the community. Their storm cellar was flooded and their field terraces extensively damaged.

"The family busy with brooms and barbeques, were hampered by an electrical power outage between 10 p.m. and 2 a.m. when the storm hit," Mrs. Merket said.

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At Lake Colorado City a matter of 25 of rain fell and the precipitation there did not raise the level of the lake. Lake Champlain showed a rise of just 2.

Total rainfall for Colorado City in June, through Monday is 2.26 with the total for 1968 at 10.55 inches through June 16.

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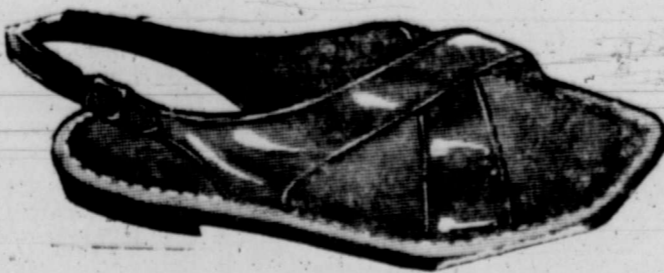

Private Clubs Need Special Tax Stamp

Many private clubs in Texas are violating revenue laws according to a recent survey by investigators of the IRS alcohol and tobacco division.

Private clubs which sell liquor are required by law to purchase a \$54 retail occupational tax stamp, said Carl R. Booth, chief federal liquor enforcement officer for the state of Texas. He called on club operators to voluntarily comply with this requirement, stating IRS investigators will be giving increasing attention to private club operations.

Anyone selling liquor for consumption is a retail liquor dealer and must purchase a federal tax stamp, Booth said. Clubs operating under a bona fide

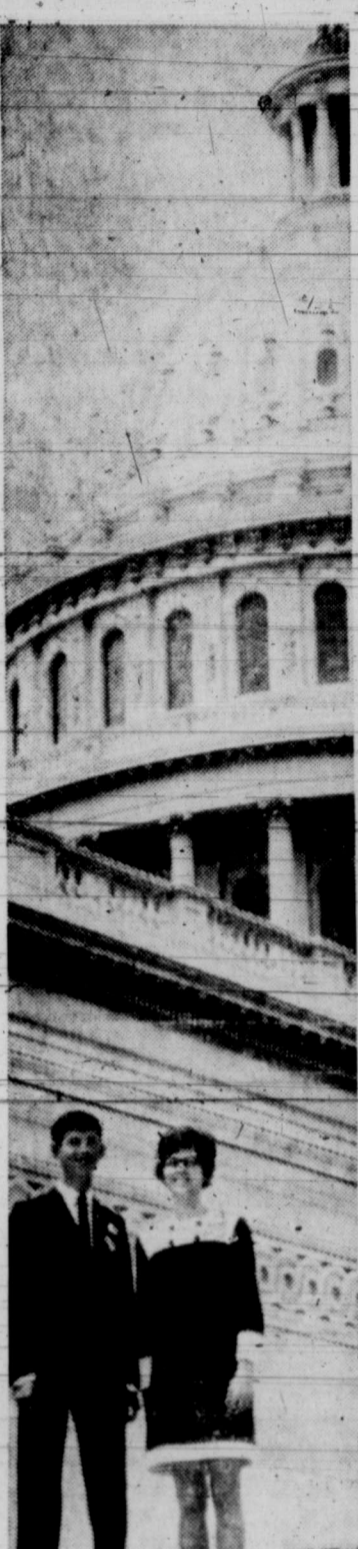

CONVERSATION CORNER

YOU CAN live a long time and still not be able to figure out any number of puzzling things about people—including your most dearly beloved, your family, and yourself.

Take the fears with which most people live. Why is it most women fear mice, bugs, snakes and lowly crawling things?

What makes a big strapping man quake at the anger of some particular little woman?

Why do some people fear clouds and weather watches, while other people are inclined to ignore them or to accept them as a particularly brilliant display of fireworks in the sky?

FEAR, of course, is nearly always the outgrowth of conditioning, of parental influence, or human experience. Nobody is completely without fear—except, maybe, a congenital idiot.

No matter how brave or strong or intelligent or self-reliant an adult may pride himself on being there's a measure of fear, a list, long or short, of "afraid of's."

Longer the list of admitted or secret fears, the less time there is to feel free, to be happy, and to appreciate the wonders of this surrounding world.

WHAT are you afraid of? Germs, money, problems, loss of employment, spiders, plane rides, deep water, the dark? Do crowds frighten you? Domestic animals?

Do you suffer from claustrophobia, fear of being enclosed? Okay, everybody is entitled to one phobia, no matter what its origin or how ridiculous it may seem to others.

To have a phobia or two is pretty normal. Know one brilliant executive secretary who drives through absolutely

mad city traffic daily and flies abroad for vacations. She's just terrified of dogs and cats—even kittens and puppies!

ONE FRIEND, a ranch wife, kept a gun in the pantry she often used without a qualm to decapitate wandering rattlesnakes in her yard. She never did learn to bait or unload a mousetrap.

One vicious football tackle fainted dead away at his own church wedding.

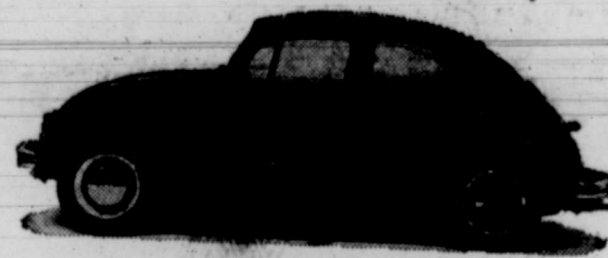

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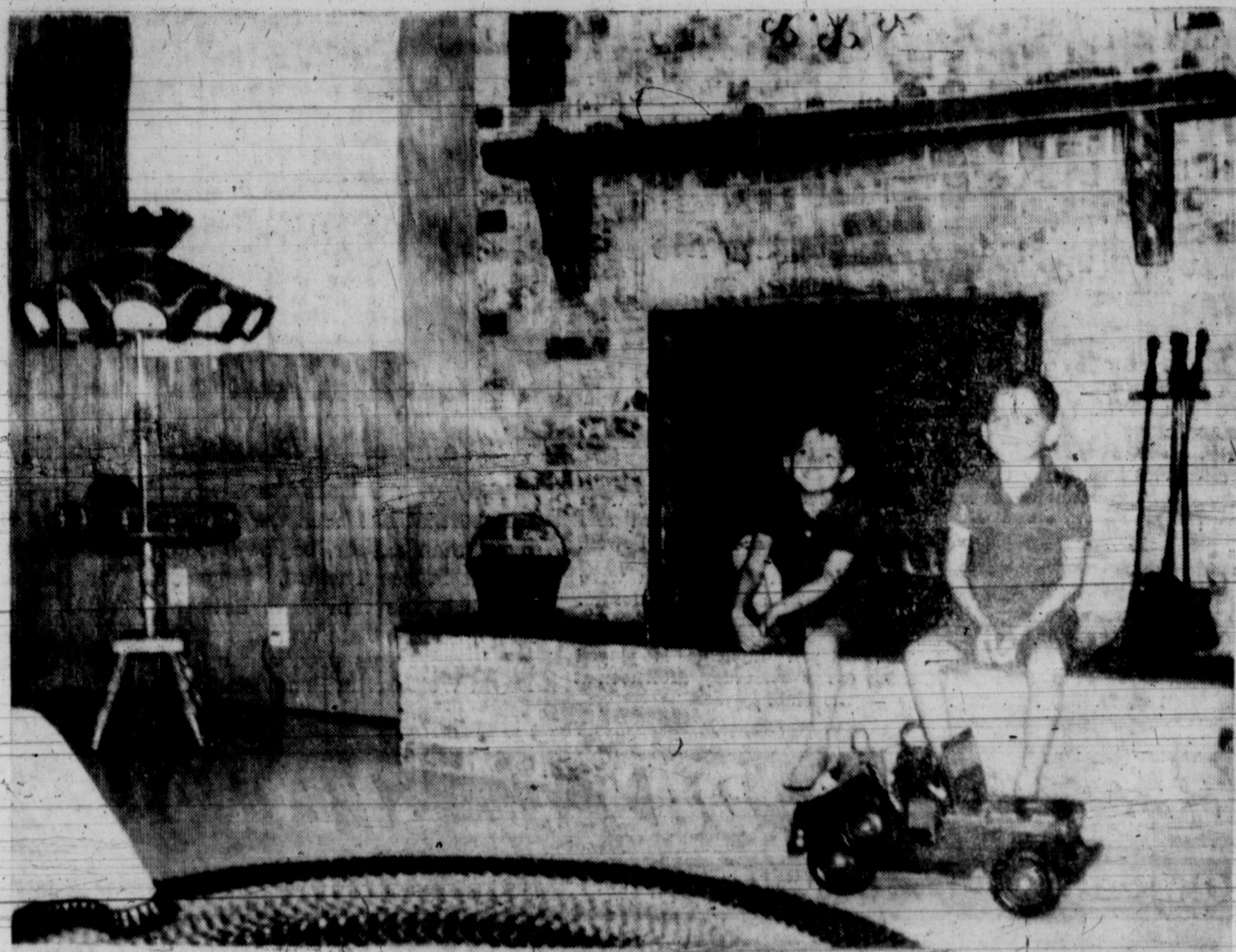
