Tentative Okay For Bilingual's Expansion

Tentative approval has been given for \$70,000 in federal funds which will expand Colorado City's 5-year bilingual school program into the first grade.

Bilingual education was initiated here last fall in kindergarten with federal allocations as a pilot program for this region's public schools.

Now, Colorado Independent School District is preparing to step-up the program for 2 grades and a total of approximately 225 pupils--100 in kindergarten and 125 in first grade.

Supt. Lloyd McKee and Mrs. Nell Price, the school district's bilingual project director, were in Dallas last week to discuss

1971-72 bilingual plans with state and federal education officials.

In the parley, which stamped tentative okay to the expanded two-grade program beginning next September, were Richard Goulet of Office of Education in Washington, D. C., and Dr. Severe Gomez of Texas Education Agency.

Joining with Supt. McKee and Mrs. Price were Dr. Len Ainsworth, the district's elementary and bilingual consultant from Texas Tech University, and Ray Simmons, migrant and bilingual education specialist with Region 14 Education Service Center in Abilene.

Expansion of the bilingual program--viewed as a success in its just completed first year at the kindergarten level--comes at a time in Colorado City--public school education when for the first time in history more than half of the incoming first grade is expected to be Mexican-American.

Kindergarten--Total of 3 self-contained bilingual rooms each with a teacher, teacher aide and approximately 27 children in each.

First Grade--Total of 5 rooms with approximately 25 pupils. Three of the rooms will be self-contained with one having a bilingual teacher and a bilingual aide, and two with English speaking teachers and a bilingual aide dividing time between both rooms. The other 2 rooms will utilize bilingual team teaching with monolingual teachers and a single bilingual teacher for the two rooms.

However, bilingual education is not just for the purpose of assisting the Mexican-American child to attain his or her full educational capability.

At the same time, it is geared to acquaint other pupils with the Southwest's secondary language and to create a better learning atmosphere for the classroom and all students.

During the 1970-71 school year the bilingual program operated with approximately \$60,000 in federal funding.

With an increase to about \$70,000 for 1971-72 (if approved as tentatively okayed), the program is planned in this manner:

Federal funds will finance the project director, a secretary, 4 teacher aides and a community liaison representative who works in the community with families of the students.

School officials anticipate that more than half of the children entering kindergarten next September will be Mexican-American, almost all of which will come from homes where Spanish is the dominant language.

Under the plan in which the region's pilot program was started here in Colorado City, English-Spanish speaking dual See BILINGUAL Page 5

Probated Driver Named In Suit

A \$50,000 civil suit has been filed against a Colorado City woman who recently received a 3-year probated sentence in connection with a fatal accident here.

Plaintiffs in the legal action in 32nd District Court are Mr. and Mrs. Roy Iglehart, whose daughter was killed and son was seriously injured in the accident here last Aug. 8.

Defendant is Madeline L. McIntosh, driver of the auto which struck the two children in their backyard at 404 East Seventh St.

The suit claims negligence on the part of the defendant in "one or more" particulars by

failing to maintain proper control of the car, failing to bring her vehicle to a stop before it hit the 2 children, operating her car at a rate of speed in excess of that by a person of ordinary prudence and ordinary care, and driving and operating her auto while intoxicated and under influence of intoxicating liquor.

In addition to claiming each allegation was approximate cause of the collision, the suit also alleges the defendant was guilty of gross negligence in driving and operating her auto while intoxicated and under influence of intoxicating beverages.

The suit asks \$35,000 in dam-

age in the death of LaWayne Dee Iglehart, \$15,000 damages as next of friend for the injured son, DaWayne Iglehart plus exemplary damages in an amount to be set by the court.

Filing the suit for Mr. and Mrs. Iglehart was Richard M. Price, representing attorneys George D. Street of Dallas, Quinn & Price of Abilene.

Mrs. McIntosh received the 3-year probated sentence April 15 after a jury trial in 32nd District Court and was formally sentenced three weeks ago.

from the business June 7, 1965.

He was a past master of Mitchell Lodge #563, a 32nd Degree Mason and belonged to Dallas Scottish Rite Bodies.

He was a Shriner and a member of Suez Shrine Temple.

A veteran of World War I, Doss was a member of First United Methodist Church and a long time member of Noon Lions Club.

He was married to Nettie Martin Sept. 14, 1926, in Lampasas.

Survivors are his wife, Nettie; a daughter, Mrs. Bob Shelton of Tyler; a sister, Mrs. Etta Motley of 521 Elm Street, and four grandchildren.

Science Delegate

Wright To Nuclear Meeting

President of Colorado High's Honor Society will participate in 11th Texas Nuclear Science Symposium opening Monday in Austin.

He is Randy Wright, son of Mr. and Mrs. Paul D. Wright, who begins his senior year in the fall.

Accompanying Wright to the symposium on University of Texas campus will be Assistant Principal C.C. (Mike) Burt.

The Colorado High honor student is one of approximately 500 outstanding science students and their teachers selected from throughout Texas to attend the 4-day meeting. Selection is based upon scholastic standing and interest in science.

Texas Electric Service Company is sponsoring Wright and Burt to the symposium, which is staged annually by Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation and the university. The foundation is composed of Texas Electric and 9 other investor-owned electric power companies of Texas.

Scientists and engineers from industry and education will discuss nuclear physics and related topics during the symposium. Two afternoons will be for touring science laboratories at the university, including those where foundation-sponsored experiments are being conducted in thermonuclear (fusion) research.

"This is a single opportunity

for students interested in careers in engineering and science to see and hear about some of the latest achievements in nuclear science and other related fields," said Don Benson, TESCO manager here. "We are pleased that we can make this opportunity available to them."

Dr. Earnest F. Gloyne, dean of engineering at University of Texas in Austin, is chairman of symposium.

Opening address will be by

Dr. Edward Teller, professor of physics at University of California and associate director of that university's Lawrence Radiation Laboratory in Livermore, Calif. Dr. Teller, who helped develop both the atomic and hydrogen bombs, is now involved with applications of nuclear energy, astro-physics and molecular physics, along with his science teaching.

Felony Cases Here Monday

Four criminal cases in 32nd District Court Monday has resulted in a 60-person jury call.

Included in the cases are charges of attempted murder, possession of marijuana and subsequent offense driving while intoxicated.

Virgil Green of Colorado City is defendant in the attempt to murder case. He is accused of shooting Kenneth Royal here the night of Sept. 14, 1970.

Three local defendants are named in the narcotics case--Frank Diaz, Francisco Molina Jr. and Claudio Chavez Lujan. They were arrested last Sept.

26 when officers investigated a group in a car.

Ben Barrera and Rudolph Luera, both of Colorado City, are charged in separate cases of DWI subsequent offense. Barrera was arrested last Dec. 21 and is accused of an earlier DWI conviction here in 1968. Luera was arrested last Dec. 7 and is accused of an earlier conviction here in 1967.

Presiding in 32nd District Court will be Judge Wayland Holt of Snyder's 132nd District Court. Holt will be sitting on the bench for Judge Weldon Kirk, who was district attorney when the felony charges were filed.

Sports, Crafts, Bridge In Summer Rec Program

Colorado City's municipal recreation program is being revamped this summer to include instruction in swimming, tennis, ceramics, leathercraft, and duplicate bridge.

It is an effort to broaden the participation in the program, according to City Manager J. A. Sadler Jr.

Some of the inside recreation events for children are being eliminated as the new features are added.

And, the program is for teens and adults as well as children.

The summer program will

be organized through Colorado City Community Center with Mrs. Dick Wistrand in charge.

Actually, the program began last week with the opening of Ruddick Park swimming pool for the summer.

Next to start will be the tennis instruction program organized by the city with cooperation of Colorado Independent School District.

Beginners session for tennis will begin June 14 and will continue June 18, 21 and 25th at Colorado High courts. Second session for beginners will

begin June 28, followed by July 2, 5 and 9.

Registration at the Community Center, according to Mrs. Wistrand, will be on a "first come" basis, with boys and girls and adults invited to participate.

However, the tennis sessions will be scheduled for compatible age grouping--4 to 6 grades from 9 a.m. until 10 a.m.; 7 to 9 grades from 10 to 11 a.m.; 10 to 12 grades and adults from 11 a.m. to 12 noon.

Participants must furnish their own racket and tennis balls, but the instruction will

be free with Martha Kinard, University of Texas student as instructor.

Tennis instruction for intermediates will be scheduled in third and fourth session, July 12-16-19 and 23, and July 26-30, Aug. 2-6.

Concluding the tennis program will be a tournament for all participants Aug. 9-13.

Instruction in ceramics will begin June 16 at Community Center and will continue each Wednesday from 1:15 p.m. until 4:15 p.m. through Aug. 25.

Instruction will be by Mrs. Wistrand and the program will

require a \$5 charge for use of molds the first month, \$1 each following month. Participants must furnish their tools and supplies.

Registration at Community Center also will be on a "first come" basis and open to all age groups.

Participants will receive instruction in casting molds, clean-up, glass glazing, matt and satin glazing, detail and art glazes.

John Morgan, local Texas Electric Service Company employee, will be instructor for the leather craft program which

will be at night, beginning June 16.

Morgan will donate his service for the program which will start at 8 p.m. Participants will furnish their own materials and registration will be on "first come" basis.

Tuesday, June 22, is starting date for novice duplicate bridge sessions with Mrs. Wistrand instructing.

The novice bridge will start at 1 p.m. and continue June 22 through July 27 in Community Center. Participants must attend with a partner, but the director may be able

to arrange partners for individuals.

Instruction will include mechanics, scoring, match pointing and recapping.

Regular duplicate bridge is continuing through summer every Monday at 7 p.m. with a 50-cent fee for each session.

Swimming instruction with a \$2 registration fee for each participant will begin June 28, followed by 2 additional sessions starting July 19 and Aug. 9.

Only requirement for age is that a person must be 5 years or older.

Each session will include a series of 10 lessons. Instruction will be adjusted to individual and group needs with Brenda Henderson, Kathy Henderson and Pat Reilly as instructors.

Advanced classes will be from 10 a.m. until 11 a.m. and Beginner Classes will be from 10 a.m. to 12 noon on these dates: 1st session-June 28, July 2, 5, 9; 2nd session-July 19, 23, 26, 30; 3rd session-Aug. 9, 13, 16, 20.

Registration for any of the summer programs can be accomplished by phoning the Community Center.

Ruth COFFEY'S CONVERSATION CORNER

CONSERVE with only slight consternation that the Harvard Lampoon has gone and named "Love Story" as the worst movie of the year.

Furthermore, the Lampoon, edited by young and callow cynics in the process of trying to change from students into a butterfly-calls Professor Erich Segal "a disgrace". Segal, Harvard grad who dared teach at Yale, authored the simple and touching little novel "Love Story" which millions of readers loved.

Not content with that, the satirical Lampoon named Ali McGraw as worst actress of the

year and had the affrontery to choose Helen Hayes, first lady of the American theatre, for the "Curse of the Living Corpse Award."

Declaring that "Worst movies are no laughing matter," the Harvard critical offering accused "Love Story" of opening up the tear ducts of the American public.

HAVE NOT seen the "Love Story" movie but fully intend to buy a large-size box of tissues and see it at first opportunity.

Did see "Airport", called by the Lampoon the second

worst movie, with Dean Martin as the worst example of miscasting in the role of the sober captain-pilot.

Well, well, well. This is America and there's nothing wrong with opening tear ducts all over the country, sometimes. To each his own opinion and to each her own good cry once in a while.

This Baylor University student wished all the Harvard Lampooners well. May they all grow up to be writers on some soap opera staff!

SOAP OPERAS are just expanded versions of "Love Story". Only they go on and on and on, . . . and on.

People get married, get unmarried, have babies, lose babies, go to the hospital or to jail, as the case may be, get killed, have family feuds, talk every problem to death, and consult psychiatrists about it all.

Even so, there are certain good things to be said for the everyday soap opera. Not that any of 'em need defending, you understand. Too many people who don't read the Harvard Lampoon do watch soap operas.

Again, to each his own opinion and to each her own good cry.

FINEST thing about the continued day time dramas of life and love and tears and laughter, is that you can watch 'em just once a month and still not miss much. The cast will review the situation for you any day you have time and inclination to tune in.

If you don't find time or desire for listening once in a while, your friends will fill you in when you meet at the drug store or beauty shop or at the post office.

ANOTHER intriguing facet is the consoling knowledge that no matter who gets killed off (written out, they call it) all their soap opera and there the dearly departed is alive and well, playing a different part.

That is nice, even when occasionally confusing. But the really confusing angle comes when some character goes on a trip and comes home eventually as a perfect stranger.

Now there is where soap operas lose touch with reality. Suppose your husband goes on an important trip, kissing you goodbye at the airport. Suppose he leaves town wearing a nice double breasted dark suit, his graying hair curling over his ears.

What then when he flies back and is three inches taller, 30 pounds heavier, wearing new "mod" clothes and straight blond hair?

IT SIMPLY would not work out in real life. The average wife would run like crazy to the nearest police station, yelling "Imposter!"

Still and all, it does add a bit of variety, you've got to admit. All you have to do is flip the dial and the missing husband who was a smart lawyer on one show is now a prominent surgeon on another show.

That works out just fine on soap operas. It isn't a thing that would work out in the average family. Moral here, maybe, is that married couples should either stay home or travel together. . . in real life.

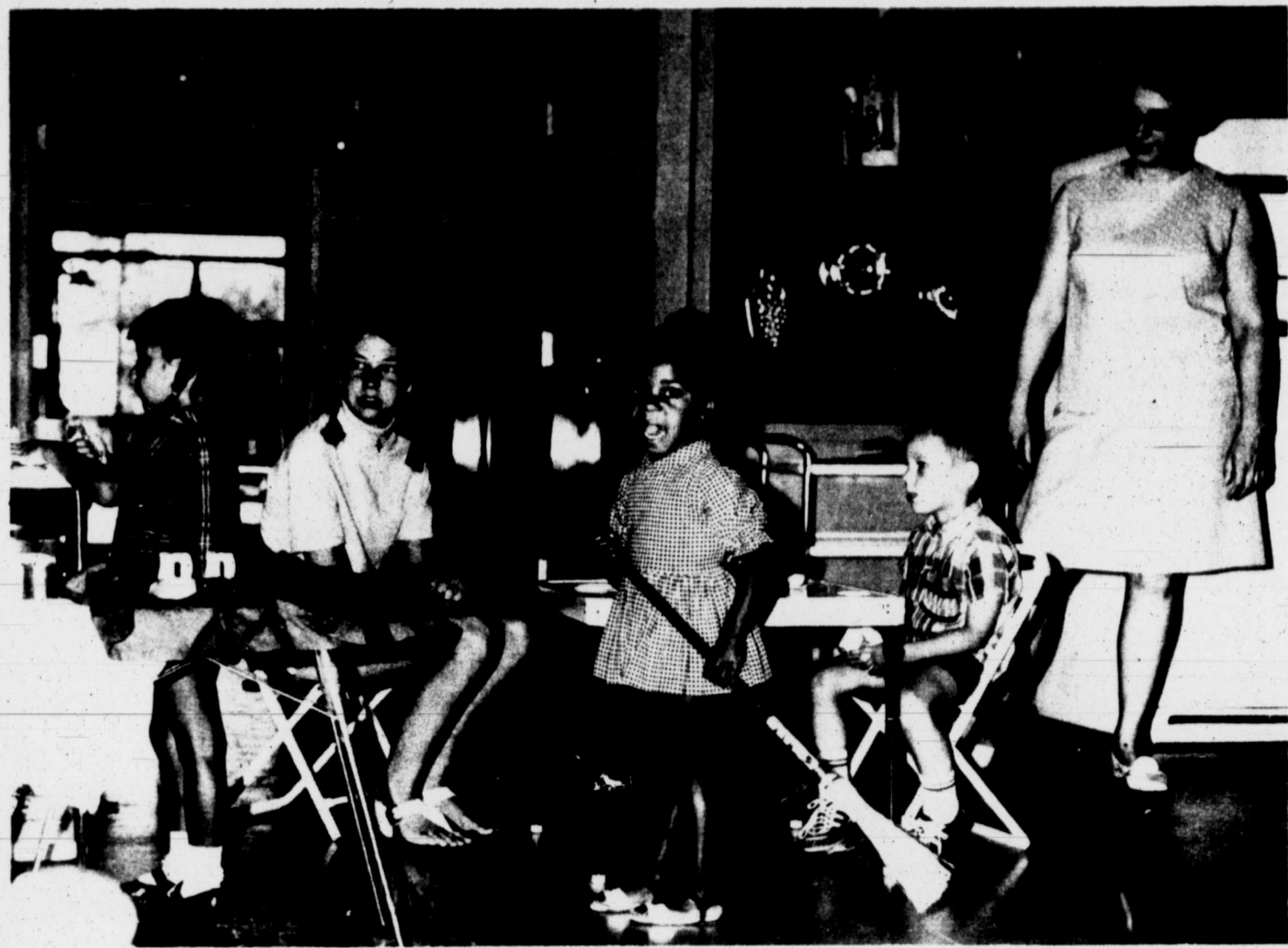


