WITH the distribution yesterday of election supplies over all precincts of Lubbock county, every citizen is in readiness for the battle of ballots today when citizens of the state of Texas will go to the polls and cast their decision on the proposed constitutional amendments to increase the salary of the members of the supreme court to \$9,000 annually and to increase membership in the supreme court to 9.

### Bar Wants Increase

Members of the Lubbock County Association, in the signing of petitions approving the proposed amendments in membership of the supreme court, have expressed a marked interest in the election.

### Polish Flier Recovering

From Injuries Received In Plane Crash After Companion Meets Death

(By Associated Press) HORTA, Azores, July 15.—Major Casimir Kubala tonight was said to be making rapid recovery from the injuries he received when the airplane Marshal Pilsudski crashed on the island of Graciosa, there was talk today of exhuming the body of his companion Major Ludwik Idzikowski to take it back to Poland.

Kubala had gained sufficient strength to describe how they circled over Graciosa on Saturday evening after a long struggle with a strong adverse wind and with a defective motor rapidly becoming useless. He said that flames from the engine at times enveloped the plane and seriously hindered visibility in landing.

They attempted to come down in a wheat field but the sharp slope caught one wing. Kubala jumped clear just in time. The airplane was almost completely wrecked and Idzikowski died within a few minutes.

Residents searched through the wheat until they found Kubala lying with a deep cut in his head. He was taken to the hospital where he remained unconscious until Sunday morning.

(By Associated Press) NEW YORK, July 15.—Brief hope came today that Major Ludwik Idzikowski, Polish ocean flier, had not been killed in the crash of his plane in the Azores, but that hope quickly was dashed except in the hearts of a few staunch supporters who refused to accept the overwhelming evidence.

New dispatches had told of the crash of the plane Marshal Pilsudski with the death of Idzikowski.

### Two Likely To Die

City Authorities Launch Final Check Up To Find If Anyone Is Still Pinned Beneath Debris

(By Associated Press) MONTGOMERY, La., July 15.—City authorities tonight started a final check up in an endeavor to determine whether any of the 75 employees of two Montgomery mercantile establishments which collapsed today, or any laborers working in an excavation adjoining the structures, were yet pinned under the debris.

Employees of the city engineering department worked desperately at nightfall to clear away the mingled masonry and timbers. Leaders of the rescue work said so far as they knew, only three persons were injured. They were George Degruchy, manager of the Platts department store, and two of his negro employees, who were not expected to live.

Collapsing with little warning, the two upper stories of the three-story Platts building crumbled into the excavation on one side and onto the roof of a one-story shoe store, on the other. Employees of the stores made their way through the falling materials after a first crash trapped some of them in the rear of the buildings and on the department store.

Police, firemen and pedestrians freed practical every employee before the second crash occurred.

### King George Pulls Through Operation

Public Pleased At Progress Of English Ruler; Members Of Royal Family Gather At Buckingham

(By Associated Press) LONDON, July 15.—King George today successfully came through an operation which was of a more serious nature than the public had been led to expect. Tonight his majesty officially was stated to have made "entirely satisfactory progress."

The members of the royal family called again at Buckingham Palace this evening and were delighted to learn that the king's condition was so satisfactory. The Prince of Wales, the Duke of York and the Duke of Connaught, all visited the palace to inquire for him.

The public was pleased that the king was in such general health that no complications were feared from the operation.

This attitude of confidence was brought about by the complete frankness of the surgeons who issued a bulletin after the operation reading as follows:

"An operation has been performed on his majesty the king. Portions of two ribs were removed in order that the circumscripted abscess, one and a half inches across, should be quickly drained and treated. The condition of his majesty is satisfactory."

### Fire Causes Heavy Loss At Covington

COVINGTON, July 15.—This little Hill county town today took stock of damage done by a fire before daylight in which three buildings, including the First State bank, were destroyed. First loss estimates were \$75,000.

The flames, originated in the J. D. Jones general mercantile establishment and burned the building, The Wiseman building, occupied by the L. E. Fuller drug store and the Wiseman and Pascal grocery also burned. The building and stock of the S. C. Thames Drug company were damaged.

### Discover Body Of Man Under Bridge

A. I. Rice Of Houston Is Found With Bullet Hole In Head; Bundle Bloody Clothes Left In Car

(By Associated Press) ITASCAR, July 15.—The body of A. I. Rice, 36, Houston, was found under a bridge near here today. Physicians said he had been dead only a few hours.

The body, found by a man mowing grass along a highway, had a bullet wound in the head. Police worked on the theory that Rice had been slain and his body placed under the structure in an effort to conceal the crime.

Shortly after the body was discovered a bundle of bloody clothes was found at Island Creek, near Grandview. Rice's automobile, blood-stained, was recovered by police in a ditch near the same place. A hand bag and some papers belonging to Rice were in the car.

### Former Policemen Are Charged With Slaying Mexican

Frameup Of Drug Store Holdup Charged Five At Phoenix, Following Investigation Activities

(By Associated Press) PHOENIX, Ariz., July 15.—First degree murder charges were filed against five following an investigation of charges that they had slain a Mexican, a Nicaraguan and wounded another Mexican in a frameup of a drug store holdup here last January.

The charges grew out of a request of the Mexican government to investigate the shooting.

The men, E. L. Guernsey, W. A. Walker, M. S. Frasier, Ray Shockey and Stanley Shockey, were arraigned immediately. Charges against Guernsey were dismissed on the statement of the county attorney.

### FIVE HUNDRED PERISH

Serious Floods Sweep Section Near Black Sea

CONSTANTINOPLE, July 15.—Five hundred persons were estimated today to have perished in serious floods in the vicinity of the Black Sea, complicated by landslides due to heavy rainfall.

Thirty villages have been destroyed and the Red Crescent authorities at Constantinople have organized relief for the stricken area.

### Lubbock Building Total Increased

### Library Building For Tech College Thought Assured

Support Of Colleges And Schools For Next Biennium Included In Reduced Measure After Veto

### Parrish Aids Bill

Only Veto Of Moody Now Stands Between Institution Here And Proposed \$150,000 Structure

A NEW library building for Texas Tech college was thought assured Monday with the announcement that the education appropriation bill, carrying \$16,451,282 for support of the college and schools for the next biennium, had been accepted by both houses of the legislature. The measure now stands at \$45,203 less than the \$16,496,545 vetoed by the governor when he discarded all appropriations and called a special session, according to an Associated Press dispatch.

Approved by Committee. The \$150,000 proposal for a new building at Tech was approved by the free conference committee in their report Saturday. Pink L. Parrish, of Lubbock, a member of one of the committees, was largely instrumental in the success of the measure, reports from Austin state.

With the assurance now of the structure building plans will go forward at an early date and, according to officials of the college, construction should start with the opening of the new school term.

Dr. Paul W. Horn, president of the college, and H. T. Kimbro, director, have been in Austin for some time in the interest of the appropriation. The veto of Moody would prevent the new structure for Tech.

### Texans Seek New Endurance Mark

Joe Glass And Glenn Loomis Take Off Monday To Re-gain Record For State In Monoplane At Houston

(By Associated Press) HOUSTON, July 15.—A monoplane with orange-red wings and a black body, the "Houston—Billion Dollar City" dived over this city tonight as its pilots, Joe Glass and Glenn L. Loomis, began their attempt to bring the endurance refueling flight record back to Texas.

The plane, which left the ground this afternoon, must remain in the air until the night of July 25 to establish a new mark.

Have Light Load. Loomis and Glass went up with a light load of gasoline in order to have less difficulty on the takeoff. The first refueling was expected to be made tonight.

Loomis, 24, is president of a school of aviation here and Glass, 28, whose home is in Fort Worth, is an air mail pilot.

The refueling ship is piloted by Lieut. Earl T. Showalter.

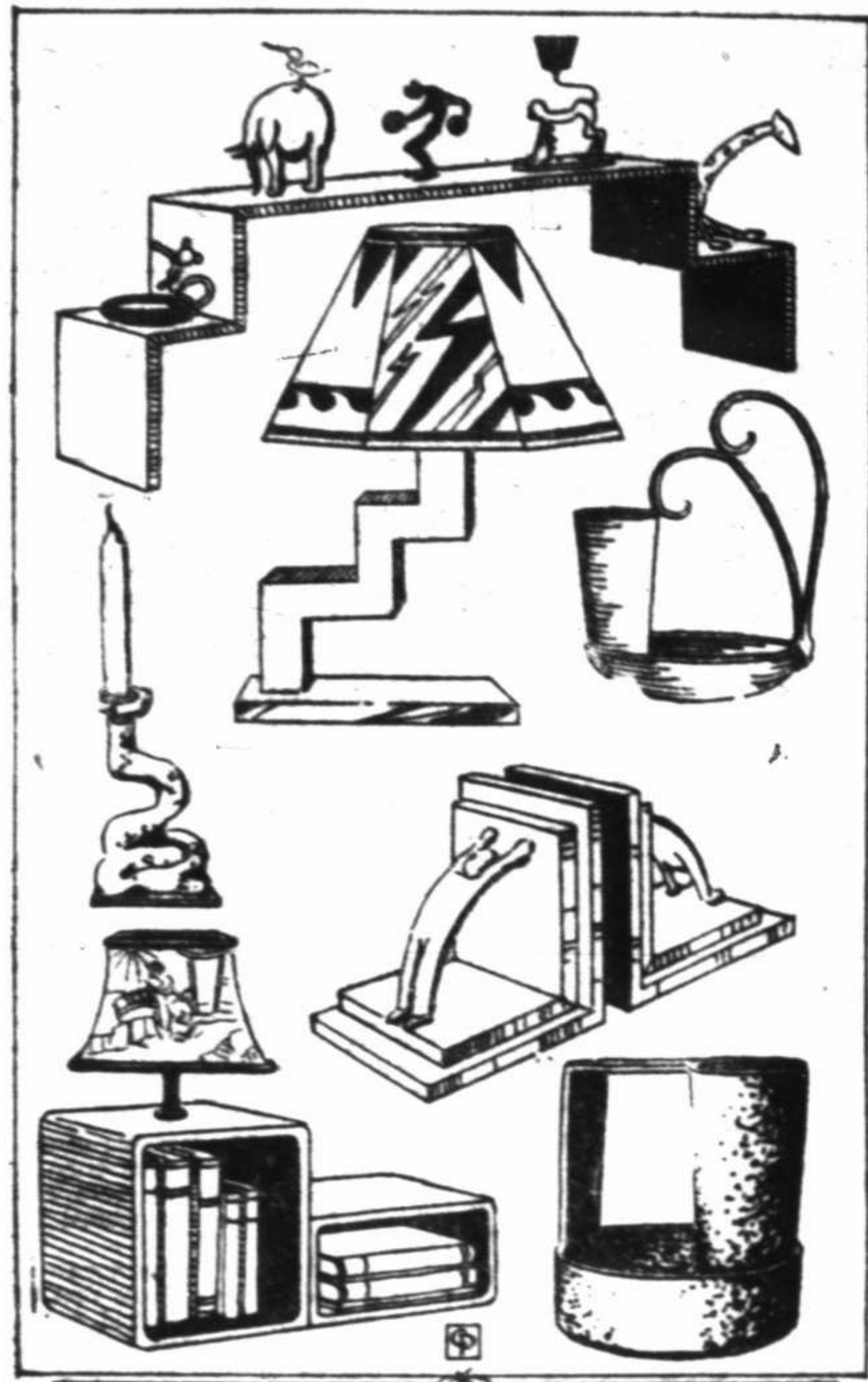

### Ceramic Art Has Modernistic Trend In Articles



modern piece of furniture on which they rest. They are amusing, too, which in itself is a source of entertainment. Now that they are le designer art, there is much to be said in their favor.

The potter's art is shown in the combination bowls or vases and flat trays at the upper right of the sketch. These are in bright glazed red, which is a specialty of several of the Viennese artists, and is very useful for a color spot in the added interest of these odd shaped receptacles.

Belgian Art  
The modernistic lamp that looks as though it were climbing to greater heights is a contribution of Belgian ceramic art. The Belgium potter shows a greater trend toward cubism than does the Viennese. The colors are quite as attractive and even more brilliant, if anything. The book-ends at the lower right are also of Belgian design. Even here the action is introduced by the two modernistic men, one bracing himself from his feet, the other from his head, in an attempt to hold the book-ends in place. The coiled snake candlestick holder is done in antique green and gold.

At the lower left of the sketch is shown an English piece in a bed-side table and book shelf of lacquer work on mahogany. The lamp shade is of lacquered vellum. The lamp is attached to, and rises from, the center of the table so that there is no danger of knocking it over.

These are just a few more recent odds and ends of modern production indicating the trend of modernism in the lesser contributions.

Are women 'monsters of cruelty?' Arnold Bennett says so. He says in toto—'Even the finest and most agreeable women, such as those with whom I have been careful to surround myself in my domestic existence, are monsters of cruelty.'

While a great wave of protest will arise from most of our sex, I have often marveled at the cruelty of women—especially mothers. Nothing so seems to make a woman oblivious of the rights and needs of everyone else in the world as to have children of her own.

Not long ago I saw and heard two women wrangling in fury at a public drinking fountain. It was Sunday and hot. Every family in that city, it seemed, had gone to the park for a picnic. Hordes of children hovered about the fountain with pails and drinking cups.

"JUST AS GOOD"  
Suddenly one woman scuttled up like an avenging spirit, swept a half dozen children away from the fountain, thrust forward her own brood, and turned to glare at the mothers of those swept aside.

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War Against Weeds. OCHILTREE, July 15.—Farmers of Ochiltree county are being assisted by County Agent Guy R. Sheets in the eradication of bind weeds. The county has established a revolving fund, which enables Mr. Sheets to purchase sodium chlorate in quantities and put it out to farmers at cost. They are using a solution containing one pound of sodium chlorate to each gallon of water, and one hundred gallons of the solution is used per acre, in the form of a spray. For best results, according to Sheets, the spray should be used either early in the morning or late in the afternoon, and it is very essential that the ground is thoroughly covered. The application is repeated if more weeds come up. Local farmers are getting good results with this method of eradicating the bind weeds, and it is only a temporary injury to the soil.

### Detective Sentenced On Contempt Of Court Charge Denies He Was In Court

CHICAGO, July 15. (AP)—Whether Lieutenant William L. McCarthy, acting chief of detectives, had one, both or any feet outside Judge John H. Lyle's courtroom last Friday when Judge Lyle said "thirty days" has become a matter of importance.

Judge Lyle sentenced the detective chief to 30 days in jail for contempt and he maintained today the case was closed. Lieut. McCarthy, however, denied having been sentenced, denied having run out of the courtroom and denied having threatened to shoot Judge Lyle's personal bailiff.

Both Judge Lyle and Lieut. McCarthy agreed McCarthy was close to the door when the contempt sentence was pronounced.

**Hearing Is Perfect**

"As nearly as I can figure out," the detective said, "I must have been about 20 feet down the corridor when the sentence was pronounced. My hearing is perfect, and I heard no sentence."

Judge Lyle said:

"I warned him several times I would give him ten days. Then he started from the courtroom and I caught him with the sentence just before he left. He was at the doorway when I said 'thirty days.'"

Judge Lyle sent his personal bailiff after McCarthy had threatened him with a revolver.

The contempt sentence resulted from conduct by the detective chief during the trial of another police officer charged with making false arrests.

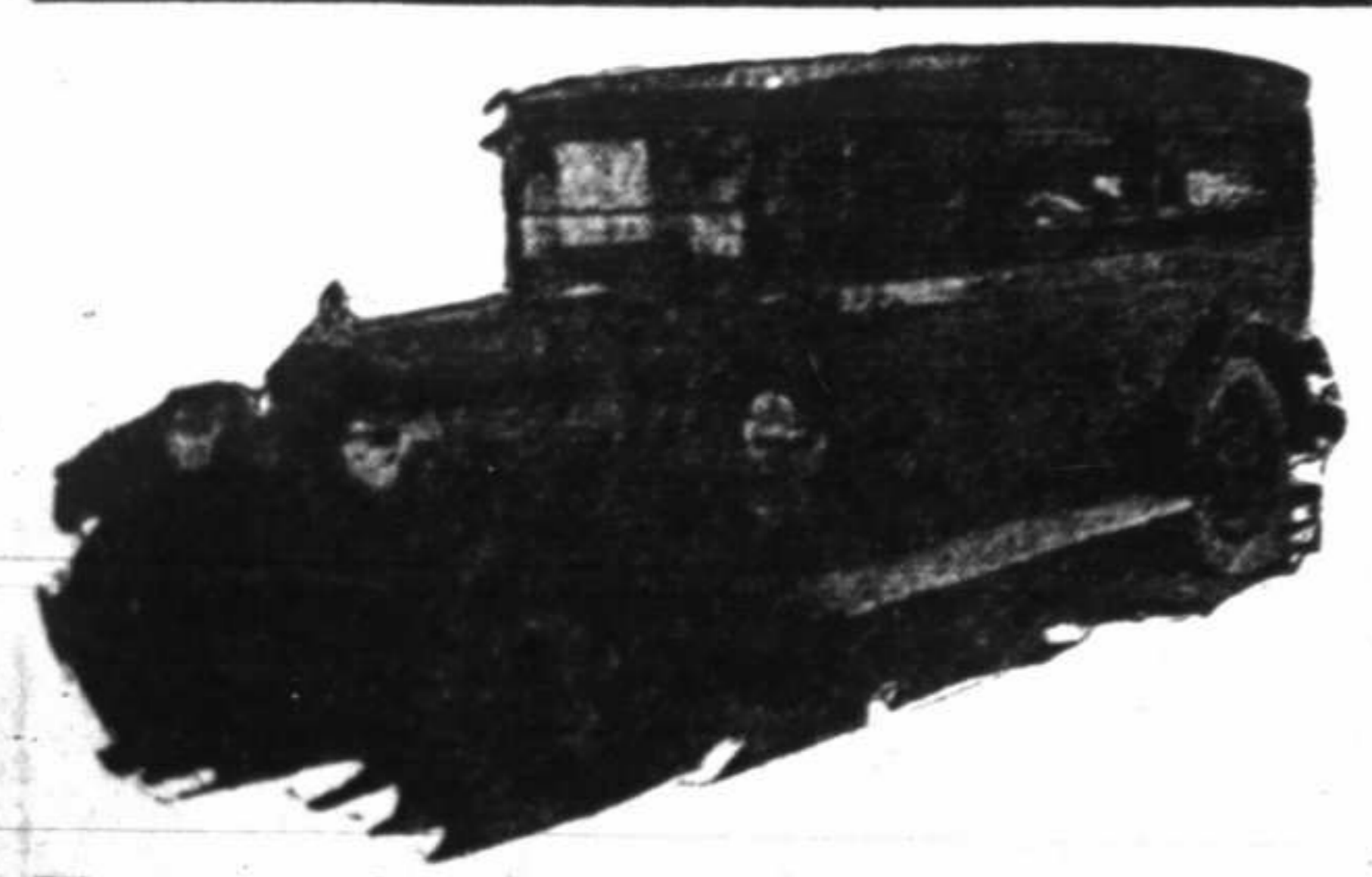

Scotland Yard Assists The Post Office Authorities In Mysterious Robbery On Boat At Liverpool

LONDON, July 15. (AP)—Scotland yard was assisting postoffice authorities today in investigating the mysterious rifling of a registered mail consignment aboard the White Star liner *Laurentic*, arriving at Liverpool yesterday from Montreal.

The yard communicated with New York and Montreal in connection with the case said to involve a considerable loss. Investigations were known to have been struck with the remarkable similarity of the case to the robbery of the *Leviathan's* registered mail a year ago.

### Legislators Are Back For Action

Passage Of Appropriation Measures Agreed On By Free Conference Committee Expected Soon

AUSTIN, July 15. (AP)—Back at their desks today, members of the legislature were ready to finish the appropriation bills agreed to by conferees from the two houses and to pass on suggestions advanced by Governor Moody for protection of excess school lands having potential oil possibilities.

After three days deliberation committees reached agreement on the amounts to be appropriated for state schools and departments of government when it seemed a deadlock could not be averted. A cut of approximately \$30,000 was made in the former bill by eliminating buildings proposed for A. and M. college and John Tarleton Agricultural college of Stephenville, bringing the bill to a total slightly under \$16,500,000.

### Amount Not Determined

Exact amount cut from the departmental bill could not be determined immediately, chairman of the finance committee said. The measure it was believed, was reduced between \$300,000 and \$500,000. One of the largest items cut from senate departmental bill was \$125,000 for each of the two years of the biennium for purchase of property near the Alamo in San Antonio.

### Body Hurlled From Auto Is Unsolved

Officers Mystified Over Death Of Twenty-Eight Year Old Woman; Theories Differ

HATBORO, Pa., July 15. (AP)—The death of Mrs. Ethel Scott, 28, whose body came hurtling out of an automobile as it sped past a garage here Saturday night, mystified the authorities today.

Theories of the investigators differed. Some held she had been slain before being hurled out of the car, others that she had represented the attentions of a man in the car and leaped to escape, fracturing her skull in the fall. Physicians said death had been caused by a blow from a blunt instrument, and the woman probably was unconscious when she left the automobile.
