Fire Department To Solicit Funds For Fire Truck

Talco Volunteer Fire Department held its semi-monthly meeting on Monday night when forty were present. This is the largest number of men ever to attend these meetings.

With the realization of a real need for a new fire truck for Talco, the organization voted to make a house-to-house canvas of the community and solicit funds with which to purchase one.

The amount of \$1360 has either been paid or pledged, according to Mayor Jerry Jones, and from \$2,500 to \$3,000 is required.

"At the recent fire on the hill water pressure was not great enough to properly fight the fire because the engine's water pump was not set up for use," said Mayor Jones.

"Water pressure is not as great on Gieger hill as it is in the lower parts of Talco, and I want to assure our people there is nothing wrong with the water system and that there are no 'dead' fire plugs in Talco," he added.

Quitman Topples Talco Trojans in Grid Opener 19-6

Quitman Bulldogs overran the Talco Trojans in the second half of a non-conference tilt for a 19 to 6 victory here Friday night. The Trojans held Quitman scoreless in the first half, but the Bulldogs erupted for two lightning fast touchdowns in the third period.

Fullback Edward Rainwater scored the first one, bursting thru the left side of the Trojan line, and going 39 yards virtually untouched. Halfback James Shaw scored the second one from 11 yards out after a beautiful 35 yard pass play from Quarterback Jones to End Hibbs. Junior Turner converted for the only extra point of the night.

Trojan fumbles preceded both third quarter touchdowns and their third marker was made on a pass interception from the arm of Bud Hanks. Turner made the interception and returned it all the way from the Trojan 15 yard line.

Led by Guard Darrell Morris and Halfback Jerry Russell, the Trojans really mixed it with them for two quarters and thwarted every Bulldog drive. Talco couldn't generate a sustained march themselves though, and only picked up one first down in the first half. They finally collected themselves in the last quarter and scored after a drive of 55 yards. Fullback Jimmy Williams climaxed the drive, scoring from 8 yards out. Bobby Broughton provided the big gain by blasting over left tackle for 25 yards.

The Trojans' line play proved to be the big problem as Quitman repeatedly opened big holes in the line. There was only a minimum of sharp tackles made in contrast to the good showing made at Wimborsboro a week earlier.

The blocking also was ineffective as only one good gain was made by the Trojans through the line. Quarterback Bud Hanks was dropped for two big losses because they couldn't hold the opposing linemen long enough for him to get rid of the ball.

Tonight at 8:00 the Trojans will battle another Bulldog eleven from Cooper, a team they defeated last year 13 to 6. They are heavy favorites to win the District 13-A championship with practically the same team as the 1954 eleven. Talco also has a veteran team and is capable of defeating Cooper if they can improve their line play a little. Coaches Cannaday and Willis have been working hard all week with the boys, and if they apply what they have been taught, they will come out on top in this, the second non-conference game of the year.

Plan Fire Control Program For All Titus County

Mt. Pleasant city and Titus County officials met together Monday to discuss a program where the two governments will work together on a fire control program throughout the whole county.

The plan calls for the city truck to answer calls to rural areas, with the county sharing in the cost of the program.

Mt. Pleasant officials asked that the county pay a fee of \$50 per call outside the city limits of Mt. Pleasant, plus \$1.00 per mile and \$3.00 for each fireman making the trip.

County officials countered with a proposal of a flat \$25 per call, without extra fees. Under this plan Mt. Pleasant would send only the truck and driver, with residents in the neighborhood assisting in fighting the blazes.

Contracts were being drawn on the latter plan Tuesday, and both the city and county have agreed to enter into them on a six-months trial basis.

Under the plan, the city would not answer calls to Talco except in cases of dire emergency, as Talco has its own fire-fighting equipment.

County Will Issue \$100,000 Road, Bridge Warrants

Titus County Commissioners Court Monday approved the issuance of \$100,000 in road and bridge warrants to begin a permanent road program in all four precincts in the county.

Warrants will bear an interest rate not to exceed 4½ per cent per year and will mature at such times as the court may fix, with maximum maturity not later than 35 years.

In explaining the proposal, members of the court said the \$100,000 would be divided equally among the four precincts, and that the money would be used to purchase oil for surfacing the major, well traveled roads in the county that are not likely to be designated as farm to market highways in the near future.

To go into every section of the county, the commissioners said, would require an expenditure far greater than the county can afford at this time. Estimates show that to put the roads in the shape that is being planned under the program, the cost will figure about \$1,000 per mile.

This means, the commissioners continued, that only about 100 miles will be given consideration, out of the more than 1,300 miles of rural roads in the county. Only the most widely traveled roads, especially rural mail routes, will come under the program.

Mrs. B. J. Vickers Suffers Burns, Home Destroyed

Mrs. Billie Joe Vickers, Talco school secretary, suffered third degree burns Friday when fire practically destroyed the school-owned duplex where she and her husband lived, on Gieger Hill. Joe Kirl, overcome by smoke, also was treated at a hospital.

The fire was believed to have started from the kitchen stove in the Vickers apartment, where the couple had finished lunch a short time earlier. Mr. Vickers had returned to the service station where he works, when he heard the alarm, and locating the fire, sped home to find that his wife had been burned on the hands, arm and leg. She was taken to Memorial Hospital in Mount Pleasant.

The house was aflame before the fire engine reached the place, and, due to a high wind, the men had their hands full, in saving other houses nearby.

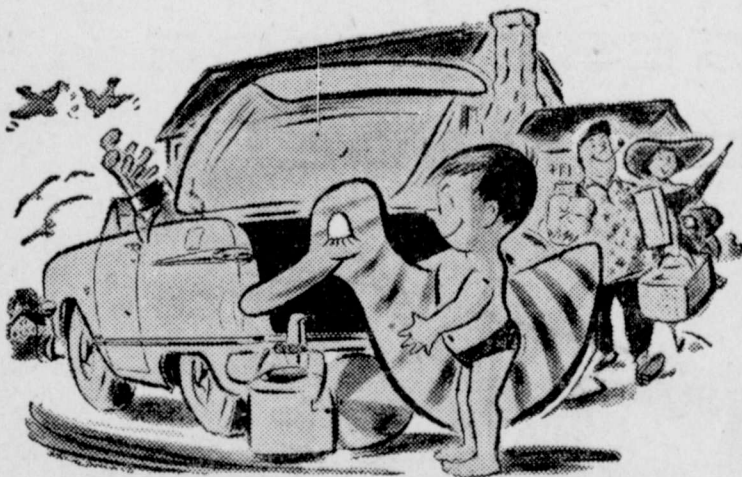
The Mount Pleasant department was called but the blaze was pretty well under control by the time the apparatus arrived. This was the newly-organized department's first major fire.

The Vickers apartment was on the west side of the duplex, where the fire started, and they lost all their furnishings, but most of those in the other apartment, occupied by Mr. and Mrs. A. C. Newsome, teachers here, were saved.

Mr. Kirl collapsed when he was overcome by the fumes billowing out when he jerked off a ladder of the burning house.

S. O. Loving, school superintendent, said that the school's loss and that of the Vickers' furnishings were partly covered by insurance.

Deep Pay Try Is Spotted In West Red River County

Machinery will be moved in a few days to the drilling site of a deep wildcat venture to be located 1,640 feet east of the west line and 330 south of the north line of the 1,600-acre Troy H. Selby tract. This is approximately four miles southeast of Detroit and about the same distance southwest of Bagwell.

Leases have been assembled by J. L. Benningfield, who is associated with C. W. Whitehead of Oklahoma City. Drilling contractors are Bob Willingham and others of Sherman.

Contract calls for a 3,500-foot hole or commercial production, or Travis Peak formation, according to Whitehead.

He states that good geological reports have been compiled on the area to be tested, with subsurface and other indications checking favorably.

Mr. Whitehead has been interested in oil possibilities in Red River County several years. Location of the well on the Selby tract marks a point where the prospects are regarded as particularly promising, he states.

Individuals backing this project are prepared to thoroughly explore all producing possibilities, Mr. Whitehead said.

Doubts Machinery People Will Be Able to Take Fatigue Out of Farming

Editor's note: Achin Alcorn, philosopher, discusses tiredness this week, another subject on which he has only a theoretical knowledge.

Dear Editor: I read in a farm magazine the other night, one of these magazines edited mostly by city people whose aim is to convince a farmer he can ride a tractor all day and never lose the crease in his trousers, where equipment manufacturers are working on ideas to take the fatigue out of farming.

I think this is fine, and my only regret is that they haven't been able to hit on any yet.

Now I know that farming isn't as tiring as it was 50 years ago, or at least that's what they say, but just from observation I've noticed that a man doesn't fall asleep any faster at night after he's plowed four acres with a walking plow than he does after he's plowed 40 acres with a tractor.

When equipment makers say they're taking the fatigue out of farming, they mean actually they're increasing the amount of work a man can do in a day, with the amount of fatigue remaining constant. I ain't never seen a farm yet that couldn't take all the energy out of a man he has.

I'll admit it takes more energy to chop 40 acres by hand than it does to plow 40 acres with a tractor, but I'm not sure chopping 40 hours takes up any more en-

ergy than plowing that long, although I'm like most farmers and the very time any crop needs any hand labor is the same time it needs the more experienced care of a tractor, with me on the tractor, umbrella up.

As a matter of fact, I think there is a lot of misunderstanding over the place of the machine in life today. A machine enables a man to do a lot more work, but if machinery has cut down on the amount of fatigue, I haven't seen it. Leastwise, everybody seems about as tired as he ever was.

The only way I know how to take the fatigue out of farming is to rent your land out and move to town. However you take town jobs. Machines have taken over a lot of the work load in all kinds of white-collar jobs, from banking to jerking soda to making change with an automatic cash register, but nearly every worker I know in town almost invariably comes home dog-tired every day.

Machines may be simply outsmarting us, getting us to turn out more work with the same amount of fatigue. That is, they may be outsmarting you, but not me. When I find myself working harder for a machine than it works for me, I drain its radiator and let it stand where it stalled. Yours faithfully, A. A.

Cigaret Smokers Bear the Burden Of Tax Bills

Of \$50,000,000 a year in new taxes which the Legislature levied, cigarette smokers will pay \$9,000,000. The remainder will come from gasoline, beer and corporation franchises.

There are, according to Jack Lewallen, 2,800,000 cigarette smokers in Texas. The one-pack-a-day customer now pays \$44.50 a year in direct state and federal taxes. The new levy will add \$3.70 a year to his bill.

This adds up to \$45,000,000 a year state and \$72,000,000 federal taxes under the new rate. This is \$5 a package for the state and 8c for Uncle Sam.

Estimate Cotton Crop Issued

Washington.—A 1955 Texas cotton crop of 3,850,000 bales is predicted by the Agriculture Department, based on the Sept. 1 condition.

Texas produced a crop of 3,940,000 bales in 1954.

Indicated lint yield for the state as of Sept. 1 was placed at 278 pounds per acre.

The national cotton crop was estimated at 12,873,000 bales, 145,000 above the previous report.

The Agriculture Department also reported that Texas had ginned 894,945 bales of the 1955 crop up to Sept. 1, as against 1,019,408 bales the same date in 1954.

Revolutionary War Casualties Low

Since records are not complete, there is no accurate estimation of the number of casualties during the Revolutionary War.

Available Washington statistics indicate that slightly over 4,000 dead were accounted for, while 6,000 men were wounded and a similar number captured by the enemy. Over 2,000 were reported missing in action and unaccounted for.

Total American casualties have been estimated at nearly 19,000, a figure not including the battle casualties of American sailors, which were comparatively few.

American Liberty Buying Leases

Lease buying on the part of American Liberty Oil Company southwest of Hagansport about four miles has promoted reports of a possible Rodessa test. The firm is said to have paid \$5 an acre for tracts out of the L. Rogers, H. S. Deen, M. W. Denny and R. L. McCullers surveys.

KIDS UPHAPPY, PICTURE SHOWS DAVY WAS DUDE

Chicago.—The Chicago Public Library reveals that Davy Crockett really was a dude.

A display of Crockett literature included a lithographed print of Davy in the outfit he wore to Congress—swallow-tail coat and all.

To make matters worse for the juvenile set, Crockett wrote on the print that it was the "only correct likeness that has been made of me."

Federal Reserve Tightens Credit

The stock market continued its upward spiral last week. Meanwhile, the Federal Reserve Board, in an anti-inflation move, raised its discount rate, which tightens credit by making loans harder or more costly to get.

The move was expected to have a good deal to do with whether there will be a tax cut next year. Tax cuts are more likely in the absence of a real menace of inflation.

Work was expected to start Sept. 20 and the contractor has 1,400 days in which to complete the project.

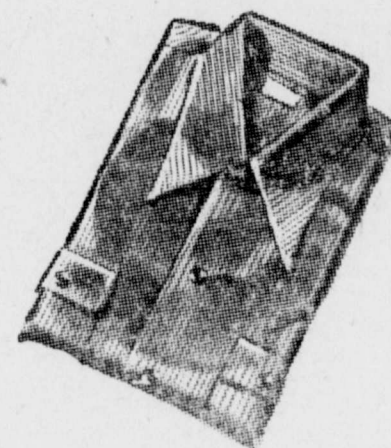
