Lions Club Hear Frank Hergert

Frank Hergert, one of two foreign exchange students from Hereford spoke to Lions Club, Tuesday on "What Is Freedom."

Hergert is from Nurnberg, Germany which is located in Bavaria. He plans to be a doctor and then specialize in psychology.

Hergert prefaced his speech with a few remarks concerning information about Germany, the Berlin wall and his people.

He told the Lions about the spirit of youth in Germany. He pointed out the fact that Europe has lost some confidence in America since the U. S. failed to help in the 1953 uprising in East Germany. "The East Germans tried to rise against Communism but stopped when they found no one was willing to help them," said Hergert. People from there are still for the free enterprise system, according to the speaker.

He said, "Freedom is not what we can do, but freedom means what we may become and shall do." He also pointed out, freedom has to be worked toward.

Hergert said a large percent of East Germans would like to see East Germany under democratic rule.

The featured speaker for the evening is Dr. Lowell H Harrison, professor of history, head of the department, and chairman of the Division of Social Sciences at West Texas State College.

Dr. Harrison is a native of Kentucky, and holds the A B degree from Western Kentucky State College, the M A and Ph D from New York University.

He was a Fulbright Scholar in 1951-52 and studied at the London School of Economics and Political Science at the University of London.

He was an instructor in history and assistant to the dean at Washington Square College, N.Y.U. 1947-50. He was assistant director of the Foreign Students Center, N.Y. 1950-51.

Dr. Harrison became associate professor of history and government at West Texas State College in 1952 and became associate professor of history in 1955-57. He became professor and head of the history department in 1957, and is now chairman of the Division of Social Sciences.

He is a member of the Mississippi Valley Historical Association, Southern Historical Association, Phi Alpha Theta, American Association of University Professors, Panhandle-Plains Historical Society, Filson Club (Kentucky Historical Society) He is an editor of the Panhandle-Plains Historical Review.

He is the author of numerous historical articles in such historical journals as "Journal of Politics," "Essex Historical Collections," "Filson Club History Quarterly," "Journal of Southern History," "Virginia Magazine of History and Biography," "Pennsylvania Magazine of History and Biography," "Register of Kentucky Historical Society," and "William and Mary Quarterly."

Hart Defeats School Bond Issue

School Trustees, Hospital Board Members, Elected

Castro County citizens turned out to the polls, Saturday as they voted on school trustees, county trustees, Hospital Board and bond election.

Hart citizens defeated the \$75,000 bond election with the following vote: Proposition No. 1 had For-151 and Against-144; Proposition No. 2 had For-142 and Against-156; and Proposition No. 3 had For 114 and Against-183.

Hart cast 307 total votes according to the final tally. Incumbent R. G. Henderson, a farmer and now secretary of the board, was re-elected trustee with 221 votes. Challenger Deryl Cleavenger was elected with 136 votes. Runner-up was Verle Crick with 128 votes. Nazareth voters gave Francis Wilhelm 81 votes for trustee reelection. Paul D. Warren received 66 votes and R. E. Steffens garnered 51 votes. All three trustees were re-elected. There were several write-in votes.

Dimmitt citizens re-elected two incumbents in Saturday's school trustee election.

M. E. Cleavenger, Jr., an implement dealer was re-elected with 224 votes. H. W. Golden, a hardware and lumber dealer was re-elected with 255 votes. The lone

challenger, Woodrow Killingsworth received 50 votes. There were two write-in votes. Ray Bearden served as election presiding officer.

County trustees received the following votes from the Dimmitt box: Lester Dowell garnered 250 votes for trustee at large, Morgan Dennis received 63 votes for Precinct No. 3 and Ed Drerup had 8 votes for Precinct No. 4. Nazareth box tallied 72 votes for Lester Dowell and 60 votes for Ed Drerup. A total of 86 votes were cast. Hart box showed 92 votes for Lester Dowell, County trustee at large.

Also held in connection with the school board election was the hospital board election. The appointed board was elected. Voting in the Dimmitt box tallied: N. F. Cleavenger, 246; Jim Elder, 253; Anthony Acker, 241; George Ed Bennett, 249; and Russell Moran, 252. Nazareth showed N. F. Cleavenger, 78; Jim Elder, 75; Anthony Acker, 76; George Ed Bennett, 78; and Russell Moran, 72. Hart tallied 112 votes for N. F. Cleavenger, 114 for Jim Elder, 114 for Anthony Acker, 116 for Ed Bennett and 113 for Russell Moran. There were a few write-ins at Hart.

Thomas gave a talk concerning the basic facts of the '64 Wheat Referendum. Through the use of charts, Thomas explained the '64 program.

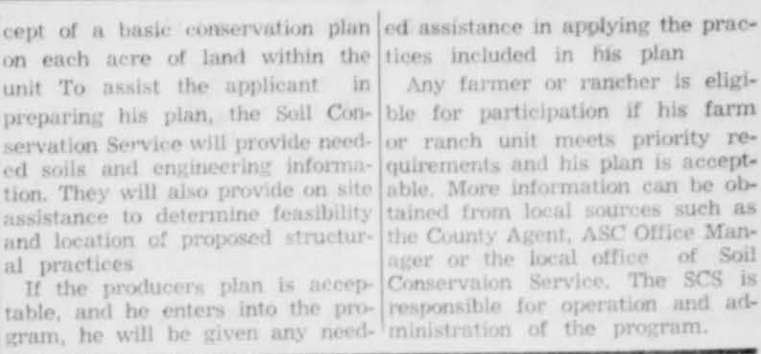
The ASCS field representative pointed out if the '64 program fails there will be about 75 million acres of wheat planted. The United States needs only 65 million acres. A surplus of four or five million bushels will be left floating around, according to Thomas.

Wheat growers have two programs to choose: (1) marketing quotas with price support at \$2 a bushel on 80 percent of the normal production of acreage allotments and with diversion payments for acreage taken out of production, (2) unlimited acreage with market prices of around \$1 a bushel.

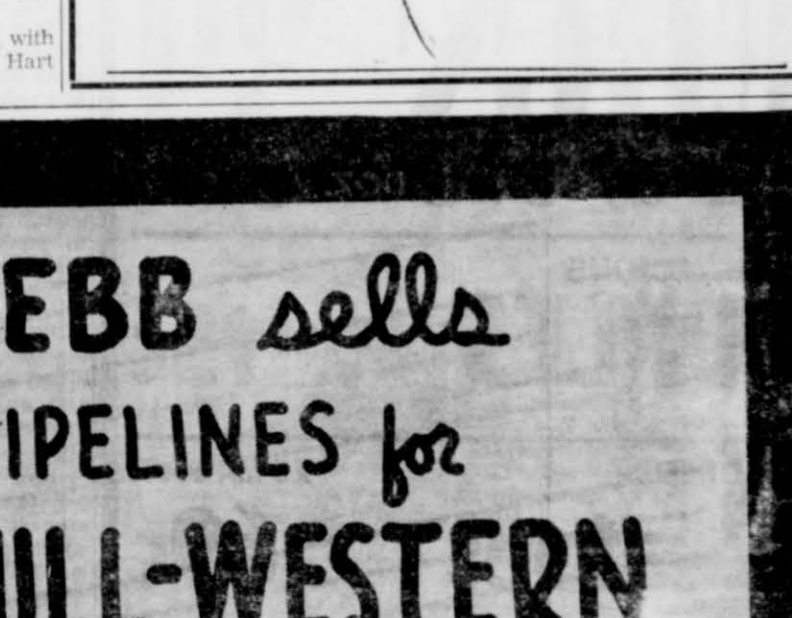

Drakeford Will Speak At Heritage Awards Banquet

Author and seminary professor, Dr. John W. Drakeford, Fort Worth, will be speaker for the annual Plains American Heritage Awards Banquet at 6:30 p.m., Tuesday, April 23 at Estacado Junior High School in Plainview, according to Lyle Brown, director of the program and assistant professor of history and political science at Wayland Baptist College.

Students from Dimmitt and Hart Public schools will be among those receiving awards for entries in poster essay and project contest sponsored annually by the American Heritage program. Students from Hart receiving awards for Posters are Rene Brooks, first place; Becky Burres, second place; and Carol Nivens, third place. Receiving recognition for projects are Charlotte Murray, first place; Rosemary Lee and Robbie Rice, second place and a tie between Susan Constant and Martha Sharp and Susie Diaz and Janie Flippo. Receiving awards for essays are Carol Futrell, first; Jo Sanders, second; and Harvey Sullivan, third.

Students from Dimmitt receiving awards in the High School Division for essays are Mike Burkett, Georgene Blanton and Pat Moran. Awards for posters go to Georgene Blanton, Donnie Stokes and Linda Davis. Project award winners are Paralya Render, Connie McKinney and Carolyn Dunn. Several hundred public school students and teachers from 11 cities in a five-county area participate in the program which is coordinated by Wayland.

Latest book by Dr. Drakeford, a native of Sidney, Australia, now serving as professor of psychology and counseling at Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, Fort Worth, is "Red Blueprint for the World." Last year he was invited to Wayland to speak for special flag raising ceremonies on Veterans' Day, when he shared with students and faculty some of his knowledge about Communism. For his doctoral dissertation he wrote on "Implications of Communism for Religious Education."

A speaker as well as a writer, Dr. Drakeford regularly has part on the Southern Baptist Convention radio program "Master Control," and appears on a weekly television panel, "Planning for Tomorrow," on station WBAP, Ft. Worth. He also serves as director of the Baptist Marriage and Family Counseling Center at Southwestern.

For three years Dr. Drakeford was chaplain in the Australian army, serving in the Pacific Islands. During this time he was a chaplain for a year in the largest army psychiatric hospital in Australia.

Dr. Drakeford, who came to the United States with his family in 1954, has served as pastor of the University Heights Baptist Church, Stillwater, Okla., and also served as pastor in Australian churches. He, his wife and oldest son received their United States citizenship this year.

The professor earned the B. A. degree from the University of Sydney and later received a graduate diploma in education at Sydney Teachers' College. He was also graduated from the New South Wales Baptist Theological Seminary. After coming to the United States, Dr. Drakeford received the M.A. degree in psychology from Texas Christian University, the Th.M. degree in pastoral psychology from Brite College of the Bible and the Doctor of Religious Education degree with honors from Southwestern Seminary.

Participating in the program are schools from Abilene, Cotton Center, Dimmitt, Hale Center, Hart Kress, Lockney, Olton, Petersburg, Plainview and Tulia.

About Your Health

Ask the first 100 people you meet to name their favorite sport and chances are good that at least 70 will say swimming. Even golf and fishing have taken a back seat as sport choices.

There are some great days ahead for Texas' swimming enthusiasts. They have 13,000 pools to choose from, and the season is right at hand.

And things stand to break even better for the wet set in days to come. According to the National Swimming Pool Institute, Texas will have some 70,000 pools in 1970. All this is good, because swimming lends itself to social adjustment. It teaches coordination and builds stamina. A child who overcomes fear of water has learned courage.

But play for the plungers means work for someone else—namely State Health Department engineers and local health department sanitarians who sponsor and conduct training courses for pool managers and personnel from border to border.

"Short schools" for pool operators are concentrated during April, May and June, the intention being to enroll as many operators as possible before hot weather and overflow crowds make it hard for them to get away from their work.

Cosponsored by the Texas Beach and Pool Association, courses consist of eight hours of intense technical and practical instruction. It covers such things as how to disinfect the water, and how to control water acidity—the factor, incidentally, which causes swimmers' eyes to burn, rather than chlorine as is popularly supposed. The course also covers pool safety, bathroom sanitation, and the various filtering systems used in modern pools.

How important are swimming pools as links in the chain of disease transmission? Eye, ear, nose, throat, skin and intestinal infections are among the most common conditions spread in swimming pools.

Most prevalent, however, is ringworm of the feet—commonly called "athlete's foot." It is not contracted in pool water, but by walking on wet walks and floors on which spores flourish.

In well-operated pools there is little chance of contracting any of these conditions. That's the reason the State Health Department puts Department puts such emphasis on swimming pool sanitation.

Swimmers, too, have a responsibility toward pool cleanliness. Like most public places, a pool quickly assumes the character of its least desirable patron.

Screwworms

Spring weather over most of Texas means livestockmen are facing a busy season when culving, farrowing, shearing, dehoring and the many other animal husbandry activities are occurring. It could also mean screwworm activity may

be too far in the future, especially if producers are not careful in handling animals and treating wounds, eradication officials state.

The many open wounds, so attractive to the screwworm fly, that now exist because of the normal spring livestock activities make many areas of the state a "veritable tinderbox" for infestation, eradicators warn. They urge producers to carefully treat every wound, whether a small nick or scratch or a large open cut, making certain that the insecticide used gets down in the center of the wound and is not drained away by blood. Spraying livestock with a solution of 0.25 percent Co-ral or 0.5 percent ronnel (Korla) every

two or three weeks, is also recommended. Officials warn of the danger of moving screwworm-infested animals, a practice which could help the pest spread quickly into non-infested areas. State regulations prohibit the transportation of livestock before they have been checked for infestation and certified. This applies to livestock being moved from areas south of the screwworm control line into other areas of Texas or the nation.

Every case now being detected is treated as an emergency in an attempt to quickly overwhelm the insect before it can infest other areas. This makes prompt reporting by producers imperative, officials said.

C. G. Scruggs, president of the Southwest Animal Health Foundation, has stated anything he thinks is a case. A few cases that could ruin and waste that has been done up said.
