Midland, April 13.—Representative 4-H Club Girls from counties of District 6, meeting in Sterling City, April 1, planned for the 1939 District 4-H Club Show to be held in Lamesa August 4th and 5th.
Committees on program, menus, exhibits, and score cards for judging planned details for the club show. The event will be in the form of an encampment, and will open at 10:30 Friday morning, August 4th, and close at 5:00 Saturday afternoon, August 5th.
Recreation will include group singing, ball games, swimming, if possible, and stunts from each county represented. Attendance and exhibiting are open to any regularly enrolled 4-H club girl in district 6.
Lunch on August 4th will be a picnic lunch brought from home by those attending. Camp cooking for the rest of the meals will feature red beans, bacon, eggs, fresh raw vegetables and lemonade.
Exhibits will include materials typical of 1939 4-H club programs in the different counties. Judging of exhibits will be done by committees of club girls. Sponsors and home demonstration agents will chaperon the campers.
Officers elected at Sterling City are Miss Loy Dunn, Dawson County, chairman; Miss Ouida Johnson, Fisher County, vice-chairman; Miss Odessa Weems, Fisher County; and Miss Lodell Vest, Midland County, reporter. Counties represented in total attendance of approximately fifty people were Dawson, Fisher, Tom Green, Nolan Taylor, Menard, Gaines, Schleicher, Martin Howard, Mitchell, and Midland. Home demonstration agents and sponsors of girls' clubs from the respective counties were visitors in the meeting.

A TRIP TO QUANAH last Saturday to spend Easter Sunday with the grand children revealed along the route a very dry country, except in spots, and the spots were very few and far between. The first sight of water standing alongside the road was the other side of Big Spring and at Colorado. To Sweetwater and through Fisher, Jones and Knox counties, it was very dry. But entering the south line of Foard county we found wheat fields as pretty as a picture, as far as the eye could reach. This sort of scenery prevailed up to the very door of Quanah, Harde man county. Wheat fields that were thought dead last winter, and many farmers figured on plowing under as dead, are now waving acres of green. Rains and light snows came in the nick of time. Hereford cattle browsing on these wheat fields were lying down munching their quids, full as ticks and contented.

With some time to spare on the trip up to Quanah, Saturday we visited some of the printing office. At Rule we met our old friend E. B. Harris of the Review. He reported his son was now associated with the state health department following his graduation from Vanderbilt, and was aspiring to enter Harvard. He is only 21 years old. Harris is ex-president of the West Texas Press Association, and with Mrs. Harris by his side, he is publishing a fine paper, and while business is a little slow at this season, he says he has no room to grumble. The Harris' are situated like the writer and his wife—they do all the work required to publish their paper.

On up the road from Rule we visited the office of the Rochester Reporter, with Mrs. W. R. Greer, owner, and James A. Greer, editor. Mr. Greer was distributing type back in the cases as this is a hand-set paper, and we dare say, better for it, as he has no linotype to fuss when out of fix—only cursing—when and if the printer gets out of fix. Mr. Greer said he had been at Rochester 12 years, and the country was about as dry as he had ever seen it at the time of year. Rochester, like Rule, is in Haskell county, the home of the beau brummel newspaper man who resides at the county seat and publishes the Haskell Free Press—Sam Roberts.

Knox City, in the Herald office, we found Mrs. W. L. Garner at her post of duty, but Mr. Garner, editor and owner, was out on the street mingling with a good-sized Saturday afternoon crowd. Mr. and Mrs. Garner, published a paper at Strawn, during the palmy mining day of that town. About a year ago the Garners purchased the Knox County Herald. They publish a six-column quarto, all home print, and declare Knox City the metropolis of Knox county, despite the fact that Grady Roberts with his News, stoutly denies the allegation and says Munday is the principal and only city in the county. Grady Roberts represents that district in the state legislature. Benjamin is the county seat of Knox county, supporting a very modern and handsome court house built the past year. One thing Benjamin can safely boast as superior over the other towns in the county—is the many beautiful young ladies, both married and single. To us, the aristocracy of the female specie, live in and around Benjamin. And the time of their personal appearance, is late evening at the town's modern and cleanly kept drug store.

Crowell, the county seat of Foard county, in the heart of the wheat belt, was the last town reached before arriving at our destination. T. B. Klepper is owner and editor of the Foard County News, not only boasting but has one of the most complete newspaper offices in that section. It was while talking to

TEACHERS MUST ATTEND COLLEGE OR UNIVERSITY DURING SUMMER

At a recent meeting of the Stanton school board it was unanimously decided to make the following regulations concerning all teachers elected for the term of 1939-40:

1. All teachers having a degree but not having attended college within the past three years must, as a condition of their employment, attend a standard college or university at least six weeks during the summer of 1939 and earn credit in at least six semester hours of resident work.
2. All teachers not having a degree must, as a condition of their employment, attend a standard college or university twelve weeks during the summer of 1939 and earn credit in at least 12 semester hours of resident work.
