President Coolidge's recent proposal for curtailment of armaments seems doomed to defeat, Associated Press dispatches to the Journal from Paris today. The French government will await the meeting of the League of Nations and Japan has postponed its answer to the chief executive of America. In the meantime, however, the Japanese will continue their naval improvements and expansions.

Coolidge Believes in Plan

WASHINGTON, Feb. 15 (AP)—President Coolidge believes the plan for a supplemental naval arms limitation conference which he has proposed to the powers is the only method by which practical results toward armament reduction, particularly naval armaments, can be sought.

It was emphasized today at the White House that he regarded it as a matter of the highest importance that the League of Nations should take action.

France Completes Answer

PARIS, Feb. 15 (AP)—France's reply to the naval disarmament proposals of President Coolidge, as drafted by Foreign Minister Briand, was unanimously approved at a cabinet meeting today. It will be forwarded to Washington immediately and will be made public tomorrow morning.

Japan Postpones Decision

TOKYO, Feb. 15 (AP)—Premier Takatsuki, replying to interpretations day in the house of peers said that a government's decision to purchase the proposed Coolidge arms limitation conference does not warrant postponement of the naval construction bill, because it is impossible to retell the result of the conference.

TWELVE YEAR OLD
LAD IS KILLER

NEW YORK, Feb. 15 (AP)—Michael Ponkarsow, 12, was in the custody of the children's society today—a killer after a three day runaway adventure.

Hungry and afraid to go home, he said, the boy last night held up and shot Marcus Gold, 42, in his leather goods shop in Richmond Hill, Queens.

"I didn't mean to shoot the man," he told police after he was found in the wash room in the rear of the store.

"I was awful hungry and only wanted to get enough money to buy something to eat."

Police said the boy admitted he took the revolver from a bureau in his home more than a year ago.

The boy asked Gold to show him a leather belt from a box on a shelf. Gold got the box and when he came back to the counter he faced the revolver in the boy's shaking hand.

Gold laughed and turned back to the shelf. While his back was turned the boy shot and Gold was hit in the back near the heart.

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CHAMBERS WILL
TEST FERGUSON
PARDON POWERSBELIEVES 'MA' PARDONED
MAN WITHOUT RIGHT IN
EYES OF LAW

(By The Associated Press)

SAN ANTONIO, Feb. 15.—The pardon power of Miriam A. Ferguson, while governor, will be attacked in a test case by District Attorney C. M. Chambers of Bexar county starting March 4 in thirty seventh district court before Judge W. S. Anderson.

The point in the test case is:

"Has the governor of Texas the power to pardon a man while his case is still pending before the appellate court?"

Personal invitations to attend the hearing have been mailed by Chambers to the district attorneys of Galveston, Houston, Dallas, Fort Worth, and other Texas cities. He requested that the newspapers extend invitations to all other district and county attorneys of the state to attend the hearing.

Schulz Is Out Of Jail

Herman J. Schulz, principal in the test case, was convicted on a charge of being a bailor, to which he pleaded not guilty. While his case was on appeal, and one day before Governor Ferguson went out of office she granted him a pardon. Two days after the governor went out of office the appellate court affirmed the conviction and issued a mandate on which Schulz has been rearrested. He has been released on his own recognizance until date of the hearing.

The test case, Chambers said, may have a far reaching effect.

Army Flier Killed

In Fall Into Gulf

GALVESTON, Feb. 15 (AP)—Lieutenant P. F. Cabell, 29, of New Orleans, was killed this morning when the wings of a Jenny training plane in which he was flying with Private Carl G. Ashley buckled, allowing the plane to drop into the Gulf about three miles off shore at 10:22 o'clock.

Private Ashley was sitting in the rear cockpit, succeeded in clearing the tumbling plane with his parachute and landed in the water. He was practically exhausted when rescuers reached him in the Red Cross life boat.

Lieut. Cabell was in all probability have escaped with his life, too, had the folding wings not caught his body between them and crushed and held it.

Rescuers were forced to use knives to cut his body loose from the floating wreckage. His back, arms and legs were broken, his head badly bruised and his face burned black.

A man known as Brown, living in a tent 300 yards from where the magazine house stood, emerged from his tent uninjured a few moments after the blast he saw a man walking slowly from the direction of the magazine. No one else lives within half a mile of Brown's place. Parts of a car were found near his tent.

The cause of the explosion is unknown by Thompson Brothers, owners of the magazine.

BOSTON, Feb. 15 (AP)—The sentence of seven to nine years imprisonment as a common and notorious thief from which Charles Ponzi sought to escape by fleeing to the south was reaffirmed in the superior court today. Ponzi was brought back from Texas yesterday.

HUNDREDS BELIEVED DEAD AFTER EARTHQUAKE DEMOLISHES RAIL AND TELEGRAPHIC CONNECTIONS IN BALKAN NATIONS

BELGRADE, Yugo-Slavia, Feb. 15.—Earthquake shocks in the Herzegovina, Dalmatia and Bosnia sections of the Balkans, have caused enormous damage.

While the number of lives lost was uncertain today owing to a break in the telegraphic and telephonic service, it was believed there had been hundreds of deaths.

Twelve persons are known to have lost their lives in Sarajevo when tons of snow and ice, loosened by the earth tremors, crashed into ten buildings. Sarajevo, about 120 miles southwest of Belgrade, was the scene June 28, 1914, of the assassination of the Archduke Franz Ferdinand of Austria, and his consort, the Duchess of Hohenberg. The assassin was a Serbian and his deed led to Austria-Hungary's declaration of war on Serbia and the conflict that developed into the world war.

Lubbock Highway
Hearing Is Held

(By The Associated Press)

AUSTIN, Feb. 15.—Residents of Lubbock county today locked horns before the highway commission in the proposed designation of a highway there.

Each faction proposed a different route. The commission will take no action on the recommendations for the time being, it was announced.

The designation under controversy applies to the hard surface road between this city and Idalou. Representatives of both routes, the one planned over East Broadway and the other over North Avenue H, are on hand at the state capital.

Construction Still In Offing

It is not known here how long it will be before actual construction operations will be started, but officials have constantly reiterated their statement that the line will be completed under terms of the contract.

Considerable discussion is now under way as to whether or not the line will touch Idalou, about 12 miles east of here. All surveys made to date miss this town by a short distance, and officials of the company will not commit themselves as to the probability of serving Idalou. It is known that efforts are under way by the chamber of commerce there, assisted by the Lubbock organization to have the line serve Idalou, and it is known that officials of the road have given much consideration to the proposal. But a definite statement in this connection has not yet been made.

Dallas Jurymen Go On With Discipline

DALLAS, Feb. 15 (AP)—A 15 year sentence for stealing 14 cents following a five year sentence yesterday for stealing fifty cents, Tuesday indicated the temper of Dallas jurymen which have given eight 99 year sentences since January 1.

Joe Shelley, negro, was sentenced today to 15 years in the state penitentiary for robbing John Morrison, another negro, and taking from him, at the point of a gun one dime and four pennies. The robbery occurred December 30. Albert Coin, negro, was given five years yesterday for stealing fifty cents from a woman last Christmas eve.

MONKEY BILL KILLED

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Feb. 15 (AP)—The death blow was believed to have been administered to the Rottenberg anti-evolution bill today when the Arkansas senate refused to recall it from the house, where it was sent after it had been tabled last week. The vote was 14 for and 17 against recalling it.

DEBATE CUT SHORT

WASHINGTON, Feb. 15 (AP)—The senate today invoked its drastic closure rule to cut short debate on the McFadden branch banking bill conference report. This forecasts final legislative action on the bill not later than tomorrow. Insurgents had planned a filibuster on the measure in the hope of deferring action until President Coolidge had appeared or vetoed the McFadden-Haughen farm bill.

BONUS BILL APPROVED

WASHINGTON, Feb. 15 (AP)—The house bill for government loans on bonus certificates was approved today by the senate finance committee.

Mother And Baby Are Murdered By Clubber

CONNEAUT, Ohio, Feb. 15 (AP)—Authorities today were puzzled by the slaying of Mrs. Fred Brown and her four year old son. They were found clubbed to death in their home by Brown when he returned from work last night.

Money and other valuables in the house were untouched. Brown said that he had no enemies who might seek revenge. The woman's body, with her clothing torn to shreds, was in a sleeping porch. The boy's body was found in the basement. Walls of the house were spattered with blood and a blood stained baseball bat was in a wast paper basket.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 15 (AP)—Without a record vote the house today passed and sent to the senate a bill to appropriate \$10,000,000 for control and eradication of the European corn borer.

CANYON, Feb. 15.—The Texas State Teachers College Buffalo quintet romped to victory here last evening on their own floor and defeated the Texas Tech Matadors by the heavy margin of 43 to 19. The game was one of much interest with plenty of action and speed—occasionally becoming rough.

Dick Roche, who was backing me, came up to see me and saw I was about 15 pounds over weight.

"My God, Jack," he says, "you'll never be able to make the weight and this Myers will kill you if you do."

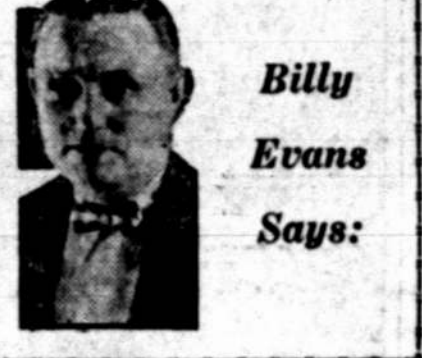
First Big Win

Billy Evans Says:

Evils in Sports
Every sport has certain phases of play that are unpopular, yet are regarded as more or less necessary to the scheme of the game.

Without a doubt the intentional pass is the most discussed and most hated play in baseball. The baseball fans of the country have gone on record against it. I have never heard one defend it.

The managers and most pitchers contend it is a strategic maneuver, a special privilege, that would take much from the game if barred.

On the other hand the fans simply regard it as a display of fear on the part of the pitcher, a preference to pitch to some other player whom he regards as a weaker batter.

The point after touchdown is in the intentional pass class.

Much Discussed Play
However, it is possible to get certain grid followers to approve the point after touchdown, while no baseball fan ever did as much for the intentional pass.

Those who defend the point after touchdown say that it is a play that keeps many a football game from ending in a tie and that drawn games are always unsatisfactory.

Admitting that the games are far from popular, still a game that is decided by the margin of one point, as the result of one team scoring a point after a touchdown while the other fails, leaves a rather bad taste in the mouth.

Name 'Edison' Means Work As Well As Science, His Own Record Shows

BROOKFIELD CENTER, Conn., Feb. 15.—This man Edison—coming, centuries will estimate him, where the 20th century only adores.

And they will place him, not among scientists at all, but among the great pragmatic inventors of history, says George S. Bryan, author of the latest Edison biography.

No man has been more misrepresented to the public, or more blindly worshipped, Bryan believes. No man has been the victim of so many wild, fantastic tales and misconceptions.

Once the mists of superstition have been dispelled, the world will see its hero as he is—a man of marvelous inventive genius, who never gave a moment's thought or work to pure science in his life.

No Scientist

"The ways of the scientist are not Edison's ways," says Bryan. "He would never follow trails into truth unless he could see a goal of practical utility ahead. He has spent no great amounts of money on abstract investigation, developed no great scientists in his incomparable laboratory.

"He cared nothing about truths that cannot be made to earn their own living in a common sense world. He places invention above science and says so.

"I am a god workman, he has often said. I turn out perfect products. I don't fool around abstractions.

"And there lies his secret of his present standing. When he thought the Edison storage battery imperfect, he withdrew it from the market and shut down his new until he could locate the trouble and make a new design.

On the other hand, Edison has dropped many a successful product because he could not see no commercial value in it. He has made mistakes in choosing some of them, notably the motion picture camera, which seemed so useless to him that he never bothered to invent a projecting machine.

"Then there was the radio, which he dropped after his first successful experiments, because he had no faith in its commercial value. And the X-ray machine, which he gave up, because of its limited market.

Edison has never been good at mathematics. His own university-trained partner, Francis Upton, now dead, supplied all mathematics for the work.

The famous sixth sense, with which Edison is credited is another fragment of the imagination, Bryan believes.

Painstaking

"Mr. Edison is a keenly intelligent man with inexhaustible energy, whom no obstacles can stop. He arrives at results by indefatigable pains. In his work on storage battery, he made and recorded 50,000 experiments, before succeeding.

"If the world has given Edison

credit for more genius than he has, it has also given him credit for less honesty. Many rumors have been in circulation that he used the ideas of his assistants without proper payment.

Inventions, His

"This," says Bryan, "is indefensible solomony. Every man who has worked with Edison admits that he, and he alone, is responsible for 99 per cent of all inventions the factories produce.

"There can never be another Edison. He came, with all his energy and brilliance, at a time when America was ready for him, when the new wealth after the Civil War demanded industrial output.

"His name on a product is like sterling on silver.

"If he does not stand with Kelvin and Newton, he stands alone—the ideal workman of the ages."

ENGLAND WAITING WORD IN CHINA

LONDON, Feb. 15 (AP)—With no official dispatches from China in the last thirty hours, the British government today was anxiously awaiting news of the fate of the critical negotiations at Hankow.

There was a tense moment in the House of Commons this afternoon when Philip Snowden, asked foreign secretary Sir Austen Chamberlain whether the negotiations between the Cantonese foreign minister, Eugene Chen and British charge d'affaires Owen O'Malley had broken down as stated in the press.

"It's to the present moment, I have received no information," answered the foreign secretary gravely.

CONCUR ON NEW COURT

AUSTIN, Feb. 15 (AP)—The house voted today to concur in a senate amendment to Representative Satterwhite's bill providing a new judicial district, the 84th, in the Panhandle. The new district will coincide with or "blanket," as Satterwhite explained it, the present 21st district composed of the counties of Carson, Hutchinson, Hamford, Ochiltree, Lipscomb, Hemp-hill, Roberts Gray and Wheeler. Representative Gray of Lipscomb county, opposed the new court, declaring it was not needed, while Satterwhite contended that all development and other growth in the Panhandle makes additional judicial machinery imperative.

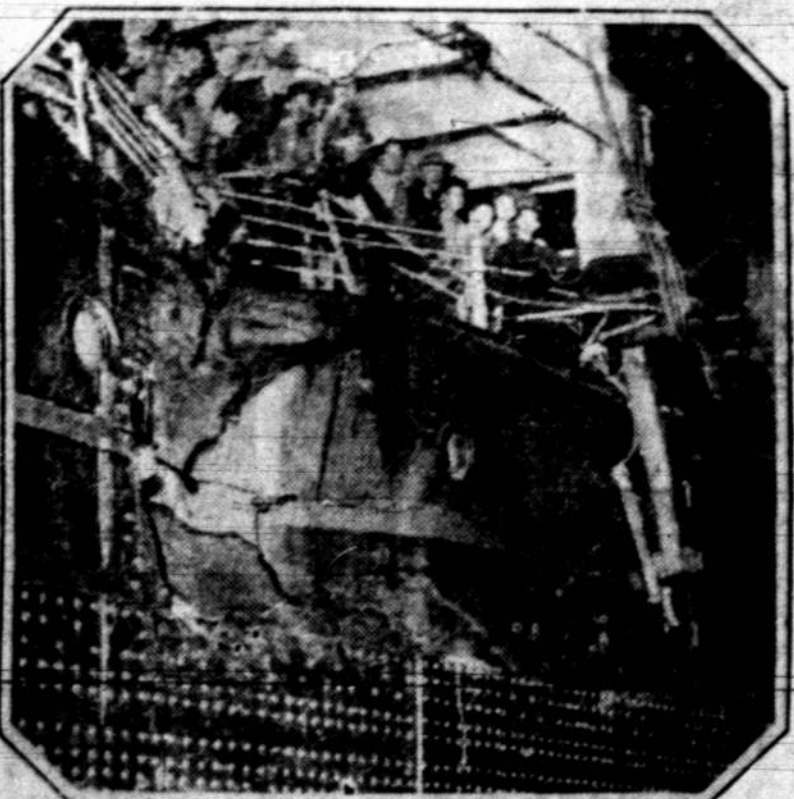

THINK ACCIDENT CAUSED SUICIDE

New York Police Believe Boy
Worker Killed Self After
Shooting Of Youth

(By Associated Press)
SODUS, N. Y., Feb. 15.—Officials said today that they were convinced that the fatal shooting of William Smith, 15 year old school boy, was accidental and that J. Roscoe Duffloo, 25 years old, committed suicide rather than face the stigma of having killed a human being.

The bodies of the two were discovered in the wreckage of their overturned touring car two miles north of this village last night. Smith, the driver had died instantly from a bullet that entered the back of his neck. Duffloo had shot away a large portion of his scalp, probably dying almost instantly.

Was Boy Worker
Duffloo, a leader in boy's work, church member and generally admitted by the youth of the town, so far as could be determined, was on friendly terms with the boy.

Investigators believe Duffloo, driving his car, met the Smith boy as he was leaving the Sodus high school. He apparently permitted the lad to take the wheel, while he got into the back seat. Indications were that Smith lost control of the car and that Duffloo's rifle was discharged when the machine overturned in the ditch. It is believed that Duffloo became

temporarily insane when he saw that he had killed his friend and that he placed the rifle to his head and sent a bullet into his brain.

Tom Blanton, Abilene, And Sol Bloom, New York, Come To Blows At Capital

CONGRESSMEN MIX AFTER BRISK ARGUMENT OVER BLANTON'S PLANS

(By Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, Feb. 15.—Fighting words were exchanged again today at the capital, but again there were no very serious physical consequences.

This time it was Representative Sol Bloom of New York and Representative Thomas Blanton of Texas who got into a milling match, and although some blows actually landed the scuffle was short and indecisive.

They fell out at a meeting of the District of Columbia committee, during a hearing on a bill favored by Blanton, to compel kindley show charging in the Capital. Blanton rushed Bloom after the latter had accused him of making untrue statements, and in the confusion a table was overturned and papers strewn over the floor. While most of the spectators scrambled to safety, one woman, Miss H. Pitts of Washington, found refuge by mounting a chair, and from that vantage point offered up prayer that the strife might cease.

Fighters Separated

Others intervened with physical force between the combatants, and they soon were separated.

It was the third time within as many days that one-round encounters had developed between members of congress. Today's match was conceded first honors so far as action was concerned, the encounters between

Senators Glass and Wheeler and Representatives Tinscher and Strong last week having ended short of material violence.

Blanton is a member of the committee holding the hearing today, but Bloom is not. The former was examining a witness when Bloom, who is interested in several Broadway theaters, rose and said as a member of congress he objected to certain questions. Blanton immediately took issue and said Bloom's attitude showed that New York city motion picture interests were blocking the bill.

Bloom replied that Blanton was making statements that were "not true," and the Texan rushed him.

FAITH had been in Chicago only twice before in her life, and she knew almost nothing of the huge, clamorous city through whose business district she found herself wandering rather forlornly one Monday morning early in December. Smoking 'Relatively Harmless' To Adults, Says Science

THE opponents of the use of tobacco, even in moderation, are inclined to list it with morphine, cocaine, alcohol and other habit-forming drugs.

There are indeed some who constantly oppose the use of coffee, believing that such artificial stimulation of the brain as is aroused is undesirable even in adults. Professor W. E. Dixon of the department of pharmacology of the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge asserts that the irritation of the throat which occurs following the use of tobacco in some instances is due to pyridine, a poison especially irritant to the tissues lining the mouth and throat.

Sensitive Persons Harmed
The smoking of tobacco also produces a certain amount of carbon monoxide which produces symptoms in sensitive persons, but it is doubtful whether the amount of this gas taken in an ordinary smoking is sufficient to cause serious effects.

The most important constituent of tobacco from the standpoint of poisoning is nicotine, which varies of course in all types of tobacco and in the manner in which the material may be smoked. Immediately behind the lighted end of a cigar is a moist area. The hot gases pass over this, volatilize the nicotine—the larger and hotter this area the larger the amount of nicotine in the smoke. The fatter the cigar, the hotter the moist area and the greater the amount of nicotine in the smoke.

The cigarette has very little moist area, so a much larger percentage of nicotine is destroyed. Damp tobacco yields more nicotine than that which is dry.

Tests of tobacco smoking on mental power are contradictory. One group of observers shows that smoking lowers mental efficiency, especially in perception and in the association of ideas in from 10 to 23 per cent of persons studied. Another investigator, however, found that the person who studied when smoking was able to do more rapidly and correct problems in arithmetic.

An extensive study made of smoking as it affected the workers in the bottle making industry indicated that it had, but little, if any, effect on the output of work, whereas chewing tobacco markedly diminished the output of work.

Prof. Dixon is convinced that smoking does not lead to addiction comparable with that for some of the narcotic drugs that have been mentioned. The addict to morphine or cocaine is constantly in fear of the withdrawal of his drug and the symptoms that are associated with withdrawal. The person who smokes does not have such symptoms. The loss of tobacco will be an annoyance to him but certainly not a tragedy.

Like Sir Robert Armstrong-Jones, Prof. Dixon is convinced that the ordinary man under the strain of conditions in modern existence finds tobacco smoking a soothing, beneficial and relatively harmless habit.

Take Your Choice

Whether or not the prohibition law
is a success depends largely upon the
personal point of view.

Those fostering the dry side of the
question point to a number of figures
to bolster their contentions while those
favoring the wet branch point to an
other set.

Both the wet and dry elements have
another talking point in Lubbock as a
result of the present term of court.
The drys can show that the anti-liquor
laws are being enforced diligently and
the wets can show that the existence of
the 12th judicial district are spending
more for the upholding of those laws
than for all other violations combined.

District Attorney Durwood Bradley,
an ardent dry, reports that in the first
37 indictments returned by the grand
jury this term of court 36 of them
dealt with prohibition law violations.
He also points out that three trials of
a total of between 18 and 21 during
the present term, were for other than
prohibition law violations while the
balance dealt directly with that form
of law-breaking. Of the three other-
cases one carried with it a plea of
guilty.

Prohibition may be as great a thing
for the nation as its backers say it is,
on the other hand it may be as big a
failure to its opponents' claim. The
Journal is making no effort to decide
the question which today is reaching
out and claiming on one side or the
other, the best brains within the coun-
try's borders. It merely presents the
above facts in Lubbock county to show
that both wet and dry thunder can be
made from them. Just take your
choice.

If Advertising Should Cease

William Allen White, the Kansas

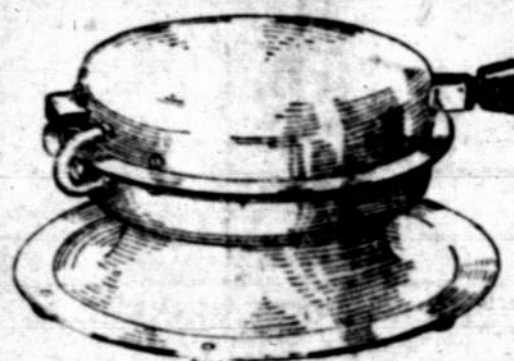

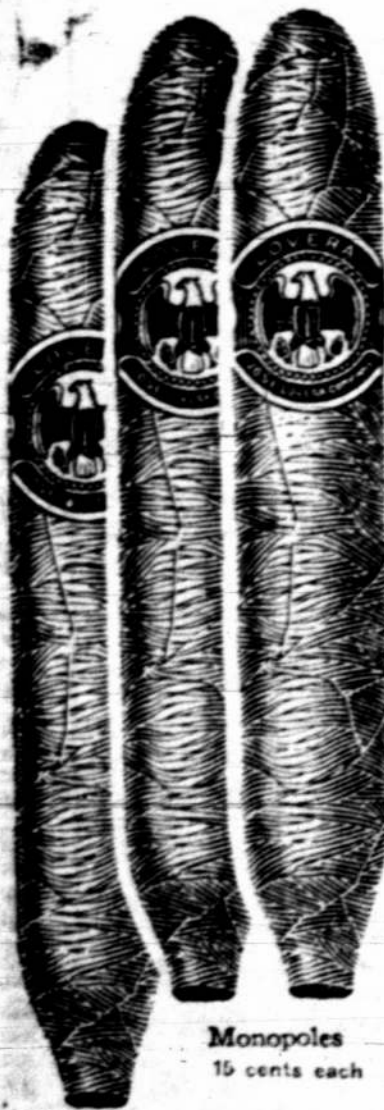
