# Increased Gas Price Sought By Area Utility

A request for an increase in the price of natural gas for customers in Stratford was tabled pending further investigation by members of the City Council at their last Thursday night's meeting.

The request was made by Southern Union Gas Company who is seeking an increase of 23 percent in local rates. The request was tabled until the Council's July 10 meeting when City Attorney Bill Minkley can do a thorough job of investigating the request.

In other action, the Council accepted the low bid of Cooper-Woodruff of Amarillo in the amount of \$18,444 for sealcoating about 34 blocks of the city this summer.

### There were three bidders for Lions Hear Report On Gas Hearing

Orville Allen, field man for the North Plains Underground Water District in Dumas, spoke to members of the Stratford Lions Club about the recent natural gas hearing held in Lubbock in an effort to get priorities for fuel changed by the Federal Power Commission (FPC).

Allen said the Lubbock hearing, one of three held across the Southwest by the FPC, was the largest attended of the three and was unanimous in pointing out the importance of natural gas to the irrigated farmer.

The FPC changed the priority of natural gas for farming from a Number 2 to Number 3 last fall due to the pressures put on the FPC by interests in California. The two largest interests included the San Diego and Los Angeles Power Companies.

The Number 3 priority resulted in natural gas to be supplied to the farmer "at the convenience of the supplier" and although little interruption to farmers resulted in this area there had been instances when supplies were cut off to send the natural gas elsewhere.

The implications that natural gas supplies could be interrupted at the whim of the gas companies to the irrigation farmer could send the entire area's economy into a tailspin.

"The FPC did not realize the implications but now we do not know whether they will change the priorities back or not," Allen stated.

"The only course of action left to the residents of this area is to keep pressure on congressmen and senators from this area to get the FPC to change the priority again," he added.

About 22 members and guests were present at Monday's noon meeting held at the Headquarters Restaurant. The next meeting will be held on June 30 at noon.

The telephone representative had previously met with the Council back on March 13 concerning the rates for mobile phones and requested a rate hike of from \$42.50 to \$69.60 per month of mobile phone users. The Council instructed Attorney Minkley to draw up an ordinance concerning this item to be reviewed for approval at the next meeting.

Buddy Messer, local manager for Southwestern Public Service Company, met with the Council concerning the city's Streetlight contract with his company. This contract is to be up for renewal in August and action on the contract was delayed pending further study.

The item which took most of the Council's time in discussion Thursday night concerned new rates for charges for the Stratford Ambulance.

The Council adopted new rates for the services which will be as follows:

- \* pickup inside city limits of Stratford, \$25;
- \* Stratford to Dumas, \$50;
- \* Stratford to Dalhart, \$50;
- \* Stratford to Amarillo, \$90;
- \* out in county pickups will be charged at a rate of 50 cents per mile with a \$5 minimum;

### First Wheat In County Cut Monday

Paul Chesmer delivered the first load of dry wheat to a local elevator for the 1975 wheat harvest Monday afternoon.

The load was delivered to Stratford Grain Company's Lantz Elevator and had been cut off the Bridgeman land located about 15 miles southwest of town.

The wheat tested 11.5 percent moisture, had a test weight of 62 pounds and was cutting about 15 bushels per acre off dryland.

Mike Mercer delivered the first load to Stratford Grain Company's elevator in town early Tuesday morning. It was also dryland wheat and went 13.40 percent moisture and tested 61 pounds per bushel.

Mercer cut the wheat off the Taylor land located about five miles northwest of town.

There is little dryland wheat left in the area due to drought conditions and elevator operators expect combining to get into high gear on irrigated crops later this week or early next week if present weather conditions continue.

This year the West Texas A.A.U. Junior Olympic Track and Field Championships will be held at Bulldog Stadium, Borger, Texas on June 28.

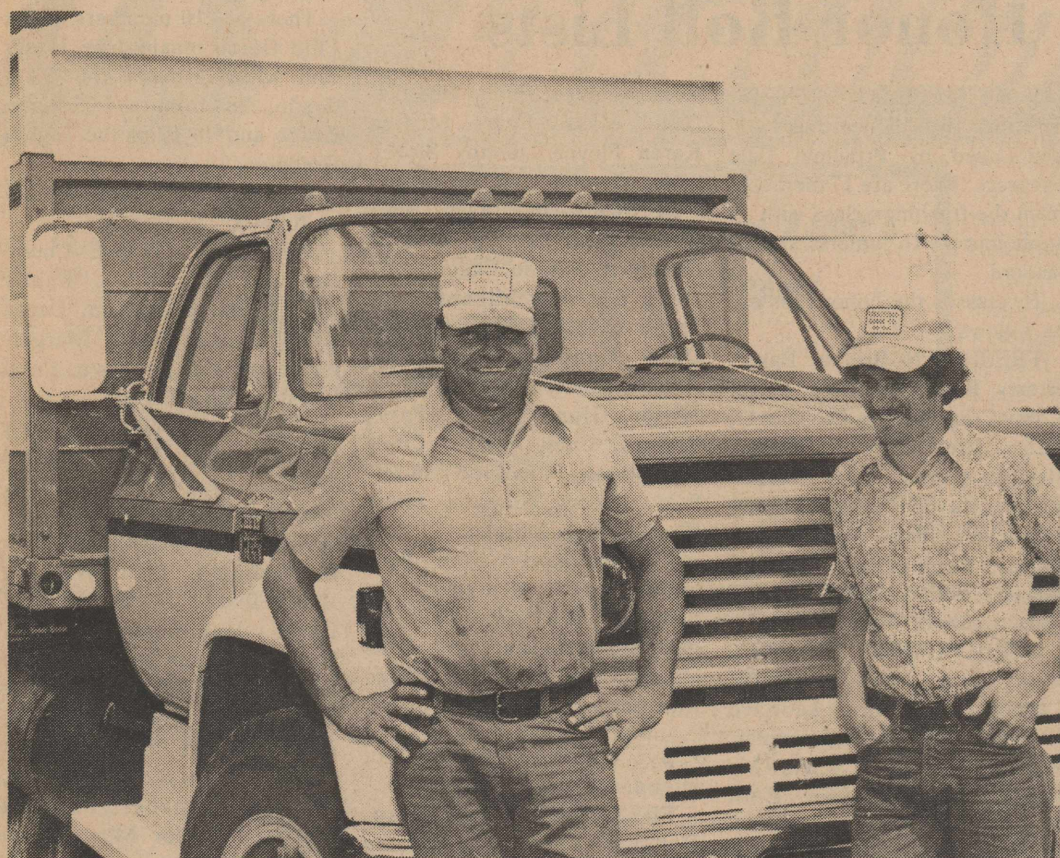
Preliminaries for the running events and the finals for the field events will begin at 9 a.m.

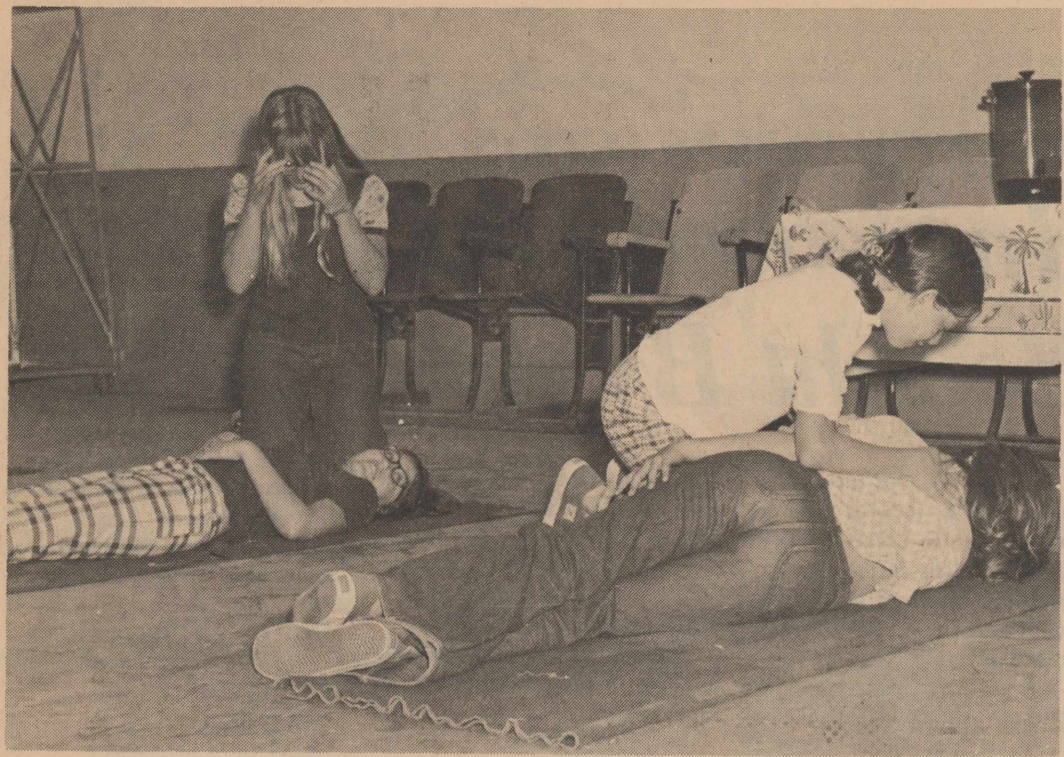

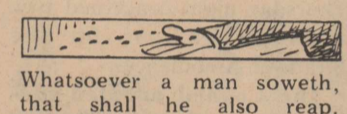
Net scores were obtained by applying established handicaps of players on each hole to get a net low ball for each team. The five flights were grouped

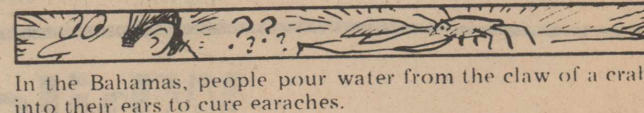

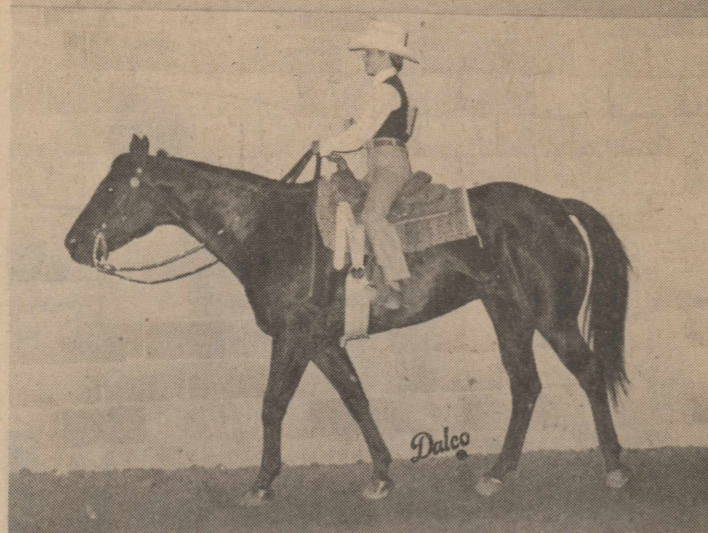
We sold approximately 550 cows total.

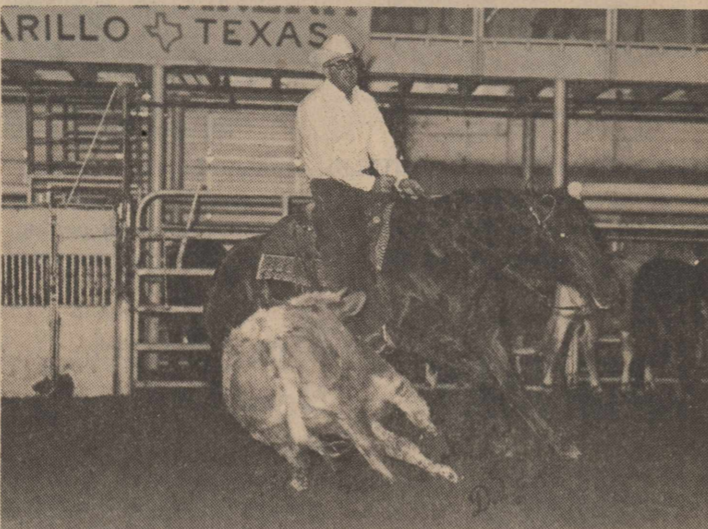
REMEMBER--no auction during the week of Friday, July 4.

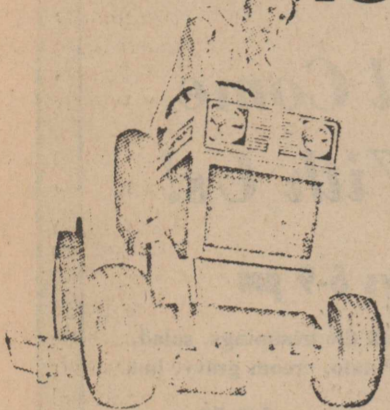

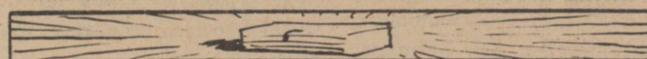

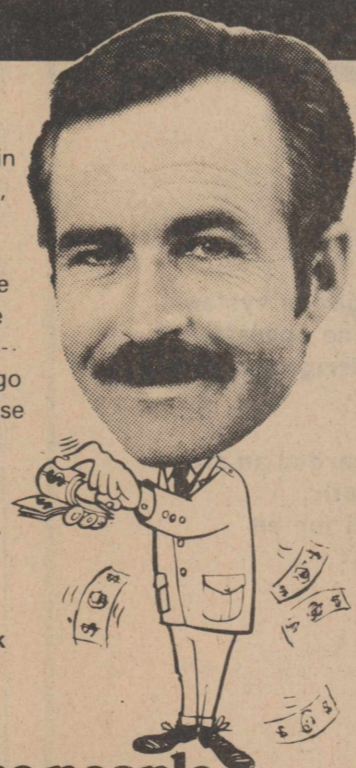

Texas 4-H youth will learn more about wise management and utilization of natural resources at the upcoming ninth annual Texas 4-H Ecology Conference.

The four-day event begins June 24 at the Texas 4-H Center here, announces Tom Davison, 4-H and youth specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the parent organization of 4-H.

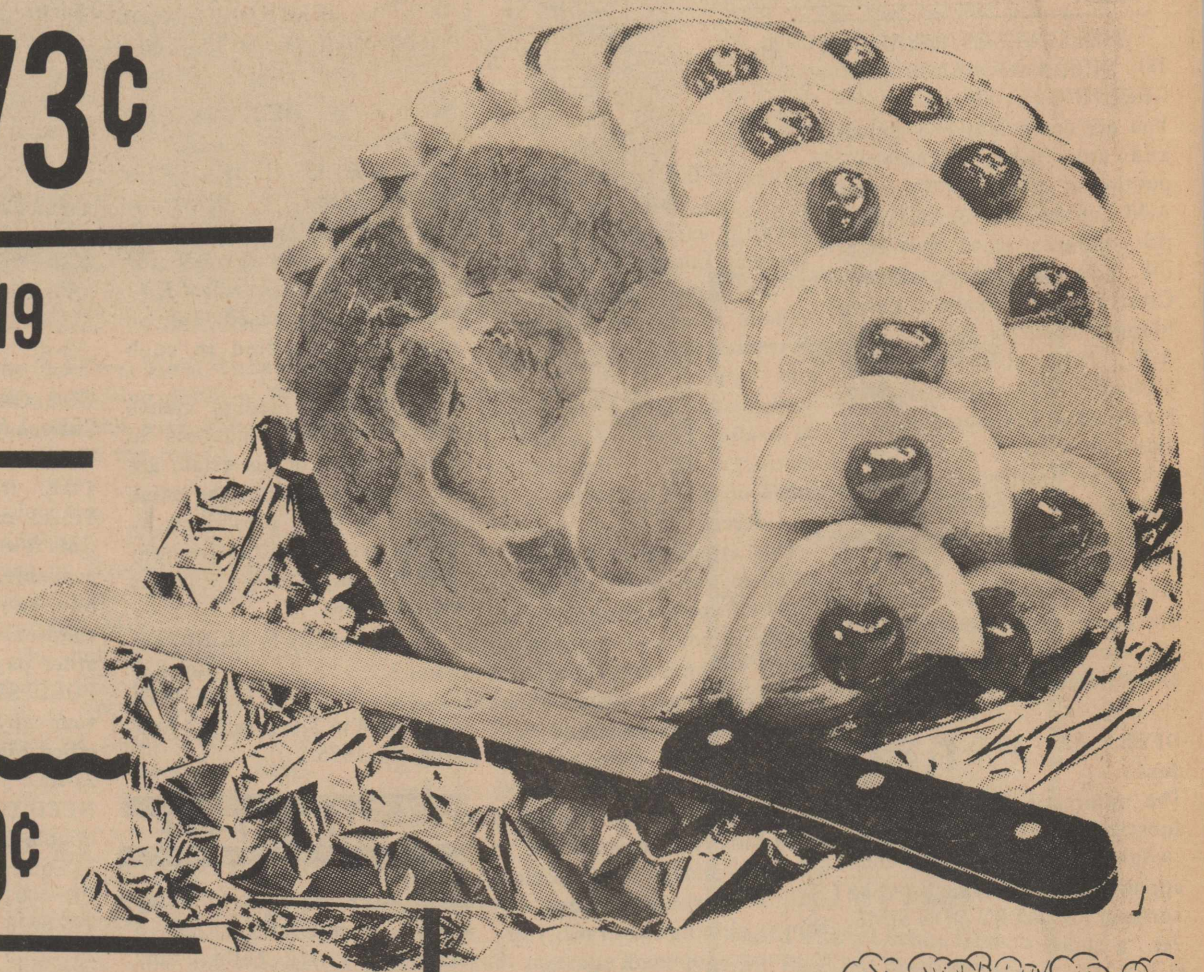

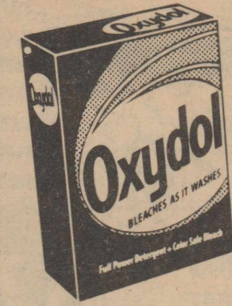
