City Sets \$300,000 Revenue Bond Election Sept. 26; Would Pay For Bringing Water From Airport Site

On Sept. 4, the City Council passed a resolution authorizing the holding of an election Saturday, Sept. 26, 1964, for the purpose of voting whether or not to issue bonds to finance bringing water into town from the A. Port section east of town.

Estimates on the cost of drilling four wells on the section and piping into town and connecting up with the city lines have been made by Parkhill, Smith & Cooper Inc., Consulting Engineers of Lubbock and El Paso.

The City Council has been advised that there should be an adequate supply of water available from this source for approximately the next ten years, this estimate being based on the present rate of consumption in the city, and the apparent supply on the section.

Present plans call for voting bonds in the amount of \$300,000.00, repayable in a maximum of 30 years. These bonds are not to be paid out of taxes of any kind, but paid for by the use of water alone. Taxes therefore would not be raised to pay off the bonds, but the water rate is to be raised shortly.

So far the city has had a maximum water consumption of 1,300,000 gallons per day. Plans call for a 14 inch line into town which would give us a reserve capacity of 467,000 gallons per day. Some members of the council think this is too small a reserve and would not handle the water far enough in the future and that we should put in a larger line now, as it would cost less than putting down additional lines later.

The above estimates include an addition to the wells, lines, valves etc., a 500,000 gallon reservoir and booster pump.

The legal notice of the coming water bond election is on another page of this issue of the Review.

The City presently is buying a small amount of water and selling it at exactly what is paid for it.

All persons living within the city limits who are paying property taxes are eligible to vote, if poll taxes are paid even if they do not own any real estate.

Baptist New Life Crusade Slated Here

The Latin American Baptist New Life Crusade will open in Abernathy Sept. 13 with a revival in the Nu-Vue Theatre building located east of the Post Office according to Rev. Boyce Evans, co-chairman.

Services will begin at 7:30 p. m. Sunday, Sept. 13 through Saturday Sept. 19 with Rev. Roberto Garcia, pastor of the Temple Mission in Lubbock, preaching.

Rev. Sidney E. Pistone, pastor of the Abernathy Baptist Mission, will preside during the Crusade in Abernathy.

Rev. Epifanio Salazar, pastor of the First Mexican Baptist Church in Lubbock, will direct the music. Features of the revival will include a film in Spanish each evening; a painting in colored chalks Friday; and a fellowship after services Saturday.

Area churches and missions co-operating in the revival are from Abernathy, New Deal, Shallowater, County Line and Lubbock. The services will be conducted in Spanish with comments in English.

The Rev. Garcia assumed duties as the pastor of the Tempe Mission in June. A building is being completed at 40th Street and Avenue B in Lubbock. He was pastor of the First Mexican Baptist Church in Dallas and pastor of a mission in Mart, Texas before moving to Lubbock. He is a graduate of the University of Corpus Christi and the Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary in Fort Worth. He was born in Laredo, Texas. He and his wife, Evangelina, have four children.

The Abernathy revival is one of more than 500 revivals being conducted as a part of the Latin American Crusade sponsored by the Baptist General Convention of Texas. The campaign will continue through Oct. 11.

Committee chairmen include W. T. Settle, prayer; Joe Thompson, finances; Earl Jones of Lubbock, publicity; J. B. Westbrook of Lubbock, transportation; and Jerry Adams, place.

Rev. Salazar is co-chairman with Rev. Evans.

Transportation will be provided to Abernathy from New Deal, County Line, Shallowater and Lubbock.

Nurseries will be provided for babies and children through six years of age.

The Latin American Baptist Crusade will be held in New Deal in a tent Sept. 20 through Sept. 26.

Rev. Garcia will preach at New Deal, and Rev. Sidney E. Pistone of the Abernathy Mission will lead the singing.

Antelopes Break Losing Streak With 20-0 Win at Frenship; Will Meet The State's "A" Champs Friday Night

The 1964 Abernathy varsity football team opened its season with a fine win over Frenship at Wolfthorpe Friday night. The victory was the first for the Antelopes in twelve games. The final score of the contest was 20-0 and the Tigers of Frenship only threatened to score once during the entire game.

In first quarter action, the Antelopes organized a drive that resulted in the first score of the evening. The final play for the touchdown was set up by Nathan Knight as he ran around the right end to put the ball on the 22 yard line. On the very next play, Lane Wade started a roll-out to

the right side, then stopped and threw a perfect spiral to split end Boyce Paxton who was in the end zone. Pat Hale's try for the extra point failed.

The Antelopes struck again in the second quarter as Wade ran 27 yards around the right end for a touchdown. On the play, Wade faked a dive play to the fullback, Nathan Knight, and then bootlegged the ball as he ran around the right end. Knight faked well and two key blocks by split end Boyce Paxton and tight end Ronnie Murray let Wade get into the open.

The third quarter was scoreless as both teams were unable to materialize a drive.

Both the offensive and defensive squads gave the Abernathy fans a fine exhibition in the fourth quarter. Early in the quarter the Tigers formed a drive that carried them to our 2-yard line. The defense held through and Frenship was forced to relinquish the ball. Abernathy then started a drive that gave them their first touchdown of the game. The drive stalled at one point, but the "Lopers" got the ball back after Frenship was charged with a roughing the kicker penalty. Nathan Knight scored the touchdown with a two-yard plunge after a fine run by Pat Hale on an option ploy from quarterback Mike Tannehill. Pat Hale kicked the extra point and the game ended with Abernathy in front 20-0.

Lane Wade and Nathan Knight were the leading ground gainers as the "Lopers" totaled 184 yards on the ground and 65 in the air. Frenship was held to 177 total yards.

The Abernathy coaches picked the following boys as offensive standouts in the game: John Reagan, Ronnie Murray, Sandy Downs, Wade and Knight. On defense, the coaches picked the following players as standouts: Mike Tannehill, Terry Turner, John Reagan, Terry Barton, Charlie Thomas, Ronnie Murray and Lane Wade.

Coaches for the Antelope team are Richard Eddleman, Jack Weldon, Wayne Preston, Wendell Jones and Mitch LeMoine. They commended the individual and gang tackling of the team and stated that the pass defense was very good.

In comparing this game with past games, this is the first time the Antelopes have held a team scoreless since 1962. The Antelopes also scored more points in this game than in any since the Tulsa ball game two years ago. The "Lopers" lost that one by a score of 26-22.

Petersburg Is Strong

Coach Eddleman's AHS Antelopes will host the 1963 Texas Class "A" Football Championship team, the Petersburg Buffaloes, at 8 p. m. Friday, Sept. 11, on Antelope Field in Abernathy. It will be the second football game of the new season for both teams. Last Friday night, both teams won, the Antelopes over Frenship, 20-0, the Buffaloes over Slaton 15-0.

Last year, the Buffs dined the Antelopes, 32-6, in a game at Petersburg. Although Petersburg lost several of the "big gun" players from the state championship 1963 team, the Buffalo team for 1964 will be a strong, tough competitor.

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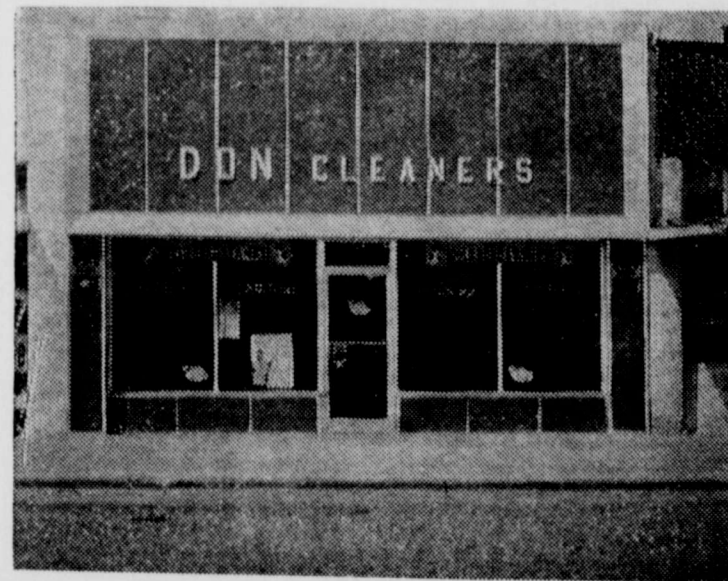

RESOLUTION AND ORDER FOR CITY BOND ELECTION.

THE STATE OF TEXAS, CITY OF ABERNATHY, COUNTIES OF HALE AND LUBBOCK.

ON THIS, the 4th day of September, 1964, the City Council of the City of Abernathy, Texas, convened in special session at the regular meeting place thereof in the City Hall, there being present and in attendance the following members, to-wit: ROY E. JONES, MAYOR; JAMES R. SMITH, BILLY F. SKIPPER, ROYCE HENSON, W. T. SETTLE, ALDERMEN, and with the following absent: DAN Z. WARD, constituting a quorum; and among other proceedings had were the following:

Mayor Jones introduced a resolution and order. Alderman Settle moved its adoption. The motion was seconded by Alderman Skipper. The motion carrying with it the adoption of the resolution and order, prevailed by the following vote:

AYES: Aldermen Smith, Skipper, Henson, Settle.

NOES: None.

THE RESOLUTION AND ORDER is as follows:

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Abernathy, Texas, deems it advisable to issue the bonds of said City for the purpose hereinafter mentioned, therefore BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDERED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ABERNATHY, TEXAS:

SECTION 1: That an election be held on the 26th day of September, 1964, which date is not less than fifteen (15) nor more than thirty (30) days from the date of the adoption of this resolution and order, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted to the resident qualified electors of said City, who own taxable property therein, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation:

"SHALL the City Council of the City of Abernathy, Texas, be authorized to issue the bonds of said City in the amount of THREE HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$300,000), maturing serially in such installments as may be fixed by the City Council, the maximum maturity being not more than THIRTY (30) years from their date, bearing interest at a rate not to exceed FIVE PER CENTUM (5%) per annum, for the purpose of constructing improvements and extensions to the City's Waterworks System, to be issued in accordance with and secured in the manner provided in Articles 1111-1118, both inclusive, of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925, as amended, each bond to be conditioned that the holder thereof shall never have the right to demand payment of said obligation out of funds raised or to be raised by taxation, and secured by a pledge of the net revenues from the operation of the City's combined Waterworks and Sanitary Sewer System."

SECTION 2: That said election shall be held at the CLUB ROOM, CITY HALL, in the City of Abernathy, Texas, and the entire City shall constitute one election precinct.

SECTION 3: That the following named persons are hereby appointed officers of the election, to-wit:

GEORGE W. RAGLAND, Presiding Judge

MRS. LAMAR MCKENZIE, Alternate Presiding Judge

If the regularly appointed Presiding Judge is unable to serve at the election, the Alternate Presiding Judge shall serve as Presiding Judge. The Presiding Judge shall appoint at least two (2) Clerks (one of whom shall be the Alternate Presiding Judge if the election is conducted by the regularly appointed Presiding Judge) and not more than two (2) additional Clerks, as he deems necessary for the proper conduct of the election.

ABSENTEE VOTING shall be conducted at the City Secretary's Office in the City Hall, in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 424, Acts of the 58th Legislature, Regular Session, 1963.

SECTION 4: That said election shall be held under the provisions of and in accordance with

the laws governing the issuance of municipal bonds in cities, as provided in the General Laws of the State of Texas, and only resident qualified electors who own taxable property in the City and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be qualified to vote.

SECTION 5: That the ballots for said election shall be prepared in sufficient number and in conformity with Chapter 6, V. A. T. C. S., Election Code, as amended, and that printed on such ballots shall appear the following:

"FOR THE ISSUANCE OF \$300,000 REVENUE BONDS FOR CONSTRUCTING IMPROVEMENTS AND EXTENSIONS TO THE CITY'S WATERWORKS SYSTEM AND PLEDGING THE NET REVENUES OF THE CITY'S COMBINED WATERWORKS AND SANITARY SEWER SYSTEM TO THE PAYMENT THEREOF."

"AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF \$300,000 REVENUE BONDS FOR CONSTRUCTING IMPROVEMENTS AND EXTENSIONS TO THE CITY'S WATERWORKS SYSTEM AND PLEDGING THE NET REVENUES OF THE CITY'S COMBINED WATERWORKS AND SANITARY SEWER SYSTEM TO THE PAYMENT THEREOF."

EACH VOTER shall mark out the statement FOR the proposition or the statement AGAINST the proposition, so that the remaining shall indicate the way he wishes to vote.

SECTION 6: That a copy of this resolution and order, signed by the Mayor of the City and attested by the City Secretary, at the top of which shall appear the words "NOTICE OF ELEC-

TION FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS", shall serve as proper notice of said election. Said notice shall be posted at the City Hall and at two other public places in said City, not less than fourteen (14) full days prior to the date on which said election is to be held, and be published on the same day in each of two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation in the City of Abernathy, and published in said City, the first of said publications to be made not less than fourteen (14) full days prior to the date set for said election.

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Registration Set At LCC

LUBBOCK, Texas (Special)—Lubbock Christian College will begin registration for the fall semester September 16. Sophomores will register Wednesday from 1-5 p. m. Freshmen will register Thursday 8 a. m. to 5 p. m. The enrollment is expected to reach a record 550 students—a 25% increase over the previous record of 468 set in the fall of 1963 according to Dr. F. W. Mattox, LCC president.

The size of the student body has increased steadily since the college began in 1957. The college began in converted Army barracks with 110 students and 13 full-time employees. This year the college faculty and staff members number approximately 100.

The physical plant has grown from five barracks to a plant worth \$3.3 million. The permanent buildings now include a \$600,000 administration building, a \$600,000 women's dormitory, a \$300,000 men's dormitory and a giant \$300,000 fieldhouse.

The college is now fully accredited with the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools.

Faculty members will conduct counseling sessions Monday through Wednesday September 14-16.

Classes will begin Friday, September 18 at 8 a. m. Late registration will continue through Sept. 28.

Field Day Set At Ag Station For Sept. 15

The annual Field Day at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at Lubbock has been scheduled for Tuesday, September 15 with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service acting as co-host. Field tours from 1:00 to 5:00 p. m. will be conducted by County Agricultural Agents for observation of the research plots and the tours should not last over one and one-half hours.

County Agent, Ollie Liner, states that an outstanding tour and discussion of what is going on at the Station, has been planned. New developments in chemical weed control in cotton and grain sorghum will be observed and discussed. Herbicidal chemicals when properly used offer great possibilities for the reduction and elimination of hand hoeing.

At the Field Day farmers will see sub-irrigation being evaluated under 5 different crops. Preliminary results in 1963 indicated that the same yield of cotton was produced with 42 percent less irrigation water with sub-irrigation when compared with furrow irrigation.

Liner said other features of interest to farmers of Hale County will include broadcast planting of cotton, Verticillium wilt, tolerant lines of cotton, how to obtain maximum efficiency from rain fall and irrigation water and many other new developments in the production of cotton, sorghum, soybeans, castor beans, sesame and vegetables.

Farmers will have an opportunity to come in contact with specialists in practically every field of agricultural research. He will have an opportunity to ask questions pertaining to his specific problem.

Visitors are also invited to tour the modern laboratories in the headquarter building, to observe equipment and operational procedures involved in soil testing, plant disease studies and plant physiology research. Any farmer who wishes to have their soil tested may take his samples down the day of the field day and leave it for testing the following week.

The Station is located 7 1/2 miles north of Lubbock on U. S. Highway 87 or just south of New Deal, east of the overpass one mile.

County Agent, Ollie Liner, is hoping that a large representation of farmers and businessmen from Hale County will attend this field day.
