## About 60 Percent Of Area Peanuts Have Pest Damage

AUSTIN — About 60 percent of the peanut fields in Comanche, Eastland, Erath and Callahan counties have infestations of the lesser cornstalk borer, according to a recent survey by Texas Department of Agriculture personnel at the De Leon Research Laboratory, Commissioner John C. White has announced.

"Development of the destructive pest is not uniform in all the counties nor even from field to field," Commissioner White said.

He urged farmers to check their fields at least every week for presence of the corn borer.

The best time for checking fields for moths is early in the morning or late in the afternoon. During the middle of the day, the moths hide under peanut plants and are inactive.

Entomologists at the De Leon lab have found that control by insecticides is much easier when the larvae are small. After the larvae have begun to mature in their silken cocoons they become difficult to kill.

Commissioner White urges farmers to check with their county agents on the correct insecticide to apply to control the borer. He emphasizes that the correct insecticide for a specific pest is very important.

"Just because your neighbor is spraying doesn't mean you should also be applying chemicals," Commissioner White said. "Find out if you have an infestation, then try to determine what stage of development most of the pests have reached."

"Work for maximum effect with the least expense," he urged.

Personnel at the Texas Department of Agriculture lab at De Leon can positively identify the moths, pupae, and larvae for persons not familiar with the pest.

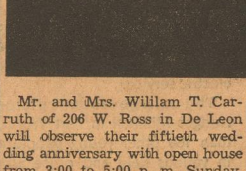

## Statement From Lake Proctor Water Mang'ment

Many questions have been asked concerning the reasons for our water being discolored and having objectional taste and odors at times.

To begin with, until near July 1 our water was coming from the lake surface since it was above the 1162 foot level and could be released through the main gates. When it got down to the 1162 foot level, there was no other point of release other than the draw down tubes which are at the 1128 foot level or 34 feet lower and well below the point where oxygen was plentiful. At the surface the oxidation process kept down the tastes and odors. It also kept the iron and manganese, normally found in the water, in solution and caused the treatment processes to produce water of good quality. The water from the lower level had very little oxygen and has caused treatment methods to be changed so that the water could be cleared up. Since there is at all times some 6,000,000 gallons of water already in the lines and reservoirs, any changes take several days to show. We have been working closely with the State Health Department and the Extension Engineering Department and have obtained some valuable pointers from them.

At the present time the water leaving the treatment plant is of good quality. There has never been any question as to purity of the water leaving the plant. Tests for bacteriological purposes are made at least three times weekly at the plant and more often when needed.

The trouble encountered came at a time when usage almost doubled, which caused increased velocity, thus picking up any sediment in the lines of the cities. We feel that with the experience gained this time that in the future we will be able to control these conditions more easily and quickly.

## County FB Group Attend Workshop In Brownwood

The half-day session is one of 18 such training meetings scheduled across the state by the Texas Farm Bureau in July and August. County information chairmen from county Farm Bureaus in this area are expected to attend.

Purpose of the meeting is to provide training in news writing techniques and preparation of county Farm Bureau newsletters, Mr. Cozart said. Other subjects to be covered include: how to serve the different types of news media; how to enter the Farm Bureau public relations award contest; and how to recognize what's news in Farm Bureau.

"Farm Bureau is a service organization designed to serve its members and agriculture in general," Mr. Cozart said. "The purpose of a publicity program is to provide support for the total Farm Bureau Program as set forth in policies."

County newsletters and informational meeting should keep the members informed on what their organization is doing to carry out policies, he said. This type of information program should lead to the development of sound policies and generate support for these policies, he added.

"Publicity programs carried out through news media should always be factual, should seek to secure widespread support for aims of the organization, and should seek to build a favorable image for agriculture," the county farm leader said.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 51, Article XVII, Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows: "Section 51. The homestead, not in a town or city, shall consist of not more than two hundred acres of land, which may be in one or more parcels, with the improvements thereon; the homestead in a city, town or village, shall consist of lot, or lots, not to exceed in value Ten Thousand Dollars, at the time of their designation as the homestead, without reference to the value of any improvements thereon; provided, that the same shall be used for the purposes of a

home, or as a place to exercise the calling or business of the head of a family; provided also, that any temporary renting of the homestead shall not change the character of the same, when no other homestead has been acquired." Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment increasing the value of the homestead which is exempt from forced sale."

WASHINGTON, D. C. — JOHN NANCE GARNER ADVISED NEW MEMBERS of Congress, "You don't have to explain that which you never said."

NOWADAYS IT SEEMS EVERYONE IN PUBLIC life thinks he has a few words of wisdom which the Country is entitled to hear. It is called our "open society" - - and thank goodness we have it.

ON THE OTHER HAND, OUR ENEMIES must get comfort and, doubtless, a great benefit, from information we give them in public statements.

WE HAVE GOTTEN TO THE POINT that it is demanded of the President, in televised news conference, that he discuss matters we once thought of as being classified in the interest of National security. Now, if he does not do so, he is accused of not informing us. In Committees of the Congress, demands are made of military officials and others in sensitive positions to reveal highly secret information. A few years ago members of Congress on certain Committees were privileged to high confidence but something has happened. The "something" is that a few - - a very few, which is too many - - could hard-

ly wait to see a newspaper reporter. What was supposed to be highly confidential statements were available in the press in the night edition.

THIS IS OUR "OPEN SOCIETY" but how open should it be. While trying to let our own people know what is going on, the question of revealing so much to those who would destroy us, is the dilemma.

JUST HAVING SEEN PEARL HARBOR after having been there during World War II, 27 years ago, is a reminder that the Japanese didn't send us a postal card advising they were going to attack our ships tied up at that port, the masts of some still showing above the water.

SHOULD THE COMMANDER-IN-CHIEF of the United States be required, either by the demands of some member of Congress or the news media, to tell our enemies what we will do or not do on the battlefield?

WE ARE IN A "LIMITED" WAR in Southeast Asia. We are faced with a festering war in the Middle East. We are threatened with the possibility of a war of global proportions by Nations who have made clear their aim to dominate the World.

IN THE NAME OF "TELL ALL" HANOI is more comfortable to know exactly our intents.

WOULD THEIR RULERS BE LESS COMFORTABLE if we had not ruled out air attacks on their vital installations? Would they not be less comfortable if we had not ruled out the destruction of

the harbor of Haiphong and the bombing of the dikes holding back their mighty Red River?

BIT BY BIT, PIECE BY PIECE, in official statements, in hearings before Congressional Committees, and particularly Senate inquiries, the enemy has been told the exact details of our plans.

WHETHER THEY ARE EVER USED OR NOT, our options should be left open. The enemy has revealed none of his and we know little about them.

HE ACTS WITHOUT NEWS CONFERENCES, interviews or global discussions.

HE ACTS WITH A CONFIDENCE THAT SLOWLY but surely the United States will not use its power and that he can eventually be certain of victory.

IN A DECLARED WAR OUR FREE AND OPEN society has no hesitancy in invoking voluntary restraint on sources of information which might aid the enemy. In today's explosive World situation such voluntary restraints are no less desirable. It should be practiced by all who come into possession of sensitive information.

THE BEST KEPT SECRET IN OUR HISTORY was the development of the atomic bomb. More than \$2 billion dollars was laid out for its production. Only about a half dozen people really knew what it was all about.

WE ARE LIVING IN A WORLD OF DICTATORS and totalitarian governments who can part their hair on the other side tomorrow morning. We compete in literally a life and death at-
