References Are Adjusted On Bill On Texas System

Agreement Is Reached Late Last Night On Amendment To Loy-Turner Bill; Goes On State Lands

Passage Assured

Centralization To Come On Land Already Owned By State; Agreement Said To Assure Passage

(By Associated Press) LUBBOCK, May 1.—House factions in the proposed concentration of the penitentiary system adjusted their differences tonight. It was said that the prison properties would be centralized on properties owned by the state, to be operated by the state prison board. The Young-Turner-Loy bill, originally called for concentration on either the Darrington or any farms or both, was amended to make centralization possible on any lands now owned that the board might select.

Comes After Lengthy Meet. The agreement came after a six committee meeting, which was a second conference with the Young-Turner-Loy committee members, leaving the state of Texas bill, the other two by Representatives Tillotson and Graves of Georgetown, executive session in an effort to get together. The agreement was reached, however, until the committee reconvened and it was said that the agreement would be reached. Suddenly, the Young-Turner-Loy got together and agreed to amend the bill to make it broad enough to permit concentration on any land now owned. Tillotson and Graves acquiesced.

How to Achieve Beauty

We have talked about types and we have talked about beauty—oh, dusky orange tinge, or a golden, creamy glow—and a bright, orange coral rouge is the color you should wear.

Consider all these things in planning your ensemble of good looks. Always try to be as different as you can, but remember to stay within the confines of good taste and beauty.

I was reminded of it reading again just today some words of Harrison Fisher, the well-known artist. He says: "I am frequently asked 'What are some of the things that improve the general attractiveness of woman?' They are, first, individuality; second, proper use of cosmetics; third, harmony of color."

fourth, emphasizing one's good points; fifth, avoiding extremes. Although a beautiful face is the first thing I look for in a woman who would pose for me, still, beauty in features is not so important. It is rather the general effect of beauty—the ensemble that counts. A woman can have a clear skin, beautiful hair, a nice figure and the right clothes, and yet not seem to be beautiful.

Because I agree quite heartily with Mr. Fisher I am taking his words as my text, and I shall talk about one point that he emphasizes each day. Individuality, first.

I wish I could impress strongly enough upon every woman how much she needs to achieve individuality in her good looks. I consider a woman more of a success in beauty the more she looks like herself—her most attractive self—and the less she looks like any other charming or attractive woman.

Think how monotonous it would be if all women looked alike—or even somewhat alike! If every woman were an exact counterpart of the Venus de Milo or of Cleopatra or of Helen of Troy—how bored and weary men would become with looking at the creatures!

In a world like that, one homely woman, if she could be imported, would make such a conquest of hearts that every known standard of beauty would seem to be turned upside down. Just because she'd be "different."

Long ago in France there was a case very much like this. A famous courtier was returning from the court where he had been mingling with countless beautiful women. His wife was plain—but he greeted her cordially: "My dear, you don't know how good it is to look at a homely face."

Personally I hold no brief for homeliness—I think beauty is much more to be desired. But I think, also, that individuality is the spice of beauty's life—just as variety is said to be the spice of life in general.

Don't try to look like someone else! In these days of somewhat standardized fashions it may seem a little difficult not to dress like other women. But within the styles you can find enough variation to suit your individuality. And you can always adapt a style to please yourself.

But beyond clothes—go in for individuality in hair dressing and in make-up. Don't choose a certain mode of hair dressing because it looks well on your neighbor, or because your favorite cinema star is wearing it. Choose it—if you do—because it is a style which suits your face and profile, and personality, better than any other.

And in make-up use the same good sense. Don't pick out a rosy shade of rouge because your best friend wears it—or because some famous actress has endorsed it with her testimonial. It may not suit you

"I didn't ask to be born!" is the glib answer on the lips of youth whenever it is confronted with certain responsibilities to parents, which it insists upon dodging.

"I want to live my own life!" is the average offspring's war cry as it walks out from situations which its mothers and fathers could no more have thought of avoiding in their own relationships with their own parents than cutting off a sure arm or leg.

And just because parents are so constituted that they almost invariably believe that their offspring have the right idea, they had for the most part, only turned the other cheek and grimly endured all the wrongs imposed upon them while their children insist on "living their own lives," because they "didn't ask to be born."

It is refreshing, therefore, to find a parent who doesn't have "one slipped over on her" quite so easily; who gets up and dusts her feathers, and speaks out in meeting ancient this popular parental, and especially maternal, conviction that it is only meet and just that their own lives should be bleak and lonely and bereft, but that the offspring must have complete freedom from responsibility to parents.

It is Faith Baldwin, author of "Alimony" and other popular novels, who takes her pen in hand to say, "I Have My Rights. Too I Believe Mothers Should Live, as Well as Children." She writes in part—

"In the last decade we have heard about the rights of children from all sides. Even the children have expressed themselves all over the place. The age-old cry 'I didn't ask to be born' has been hurled, like a battle cry, into the shrinking ears of allegedly old-fashioned parents."

"It has been set forth that it is not easy to be a child, hampered and hindered on every hand by parental notions of behavior. From loud talk of complexes and inhibitions we have worried through to wrong conditioning and behavior patterns. We are requested to spend most of our time anxiously studying the psychology of important reactions of our children to everything from dry cereals to the motion pictures."

OTHER CONCERNS
"This is all very well, but most of us are too busy earning a living for our children, or making a home for them, to go about chasing these shadows, labeling and pigeon-holing them, writing books about them, and dispelling them. We are too concerned with the problems of roof and bread, certified milk and education, shoes once a month, clothes all year round and life insurance."

"And when we say this, the great cry is heard, 'Remember the Rights of the Children.'"

"Therefore in a great voice I cry back, 'Remember the Rights of the Parents!'"

"Grant, for the sake of indisputable argument, that children do not ask to be born. They do not. But having been born, they have received from their parents the gift of life. It is a good gift."

"The child who whimpers at it should be reminded how savagely he would fight if threatened with its loss."

"This brings us to the rights of parents. It is impossible for the average adult to be wholly content with the society and conversation of a small, growing or adolescent child for 24 hours a day. The mature mind craves stronger and more congenial food."

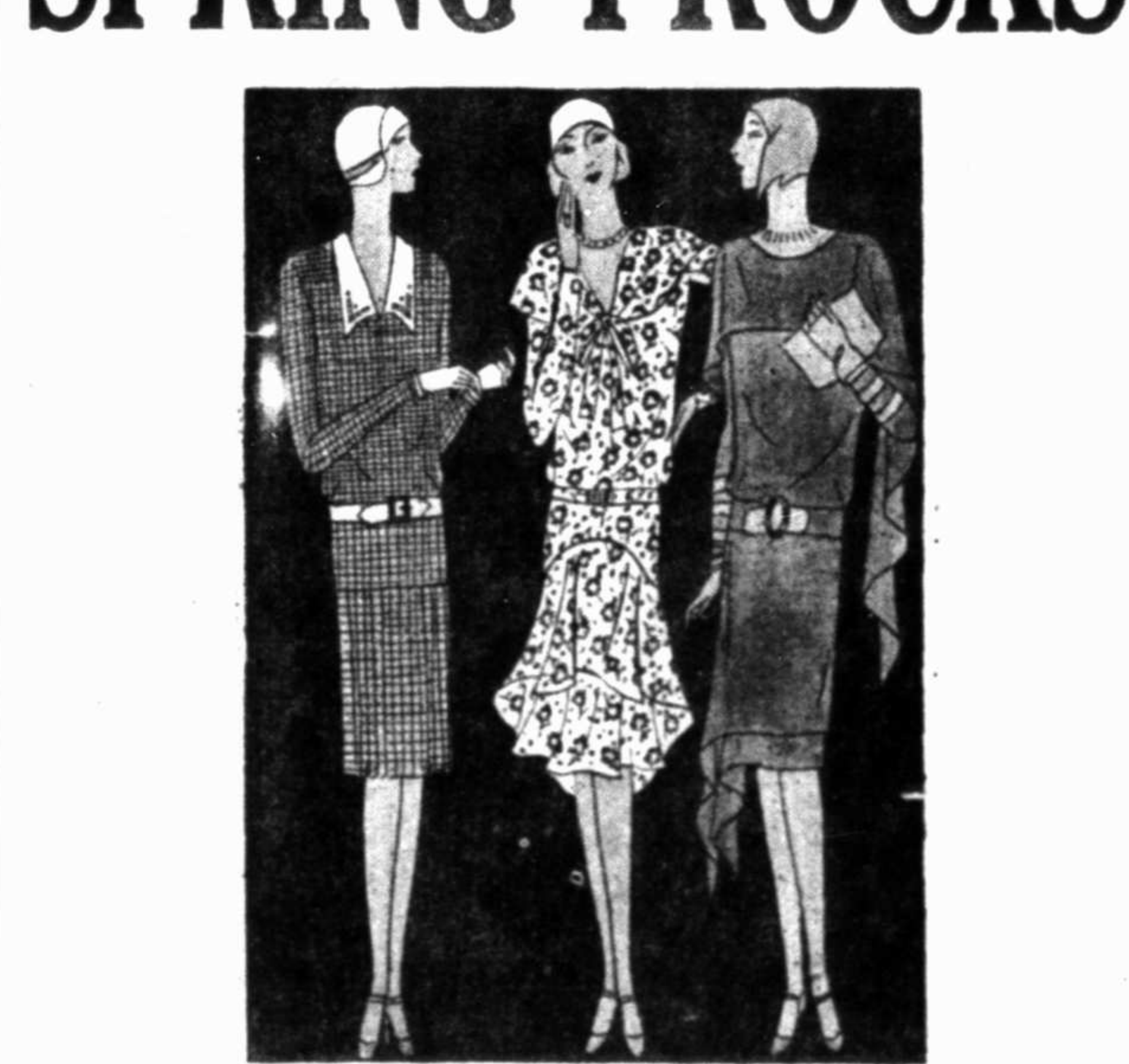

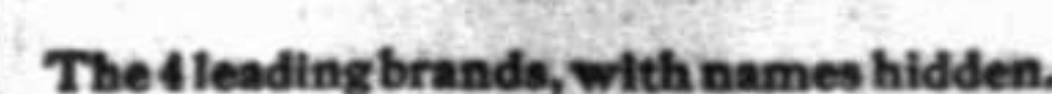

Managing Theatre "Housekeeping On Large Scale"

HOBOKEN, N. J., May 1.—Emilie Murray holds down a man's job by being utterly feminine. She is one of the very few women managers of metropolitan theaters. Her stamping ground is America's new Bohemia. She manages the Old Rialto here, where the world journeys in holiday spirit—a theater where, one might feel, a Dempsey would be needed to keep order.

But quite the contrary. Young, slight, and extremely chic looking, Miss Murray finds that a soft Southern voice is effective in turning away complaints and that a gentle request usually will halt the occasional obstreperous members of the audience.

She Just Cries a Little
"Sometimes, I just cry a little if they won't be quiet after I've asked them," Miss Murray looked very appealingly out of big brown eyes, and all of a sudden seemed like a girl in need of protection. "Just a few tears do the trick, usually. Only twice I've had to resort to calling a policeman."

Perhaps it was Miss Murray's early training that gives her this understanding. She was convent educated, entering before she was old enough to remember. Or maybe it is because she has several brothers and has kept house for two of them for years—sweet potato pie and lemon meringue pie being her specialties.

Most likely, however, it is her own stage experience that makes her so efficient. She left the convent to take the part of one of the children in "Blue Bird," later graduated into grown-up chorus work, made a hit in "Nothing But the Truth," and had a couple of other leads. In between engagements she broke into box office work and liked the regularity of ticket selling better than seasonal hard strain and then nothing to do. She sold tickets in many New York theaters, finally being the only woman seller in one of the large agencies.

Now she hires, fires, and manages the staff of 20 or so ushers, doorman, ticket sellers, porters and so on, has charge of the payroll for the whole theater and is active house manager and on occasion housekeeper. She has three assistants.

Managing a theater logically is a woman's job, according to Miss Murray, who refuses to think she is unusual just because she saw it could be done.

Still the Housekeeper
"It is just housekeeping on a large scale," she said. "There is the house cleaning to be attended, and everything kept in order. There are many personalities to keep in mind."

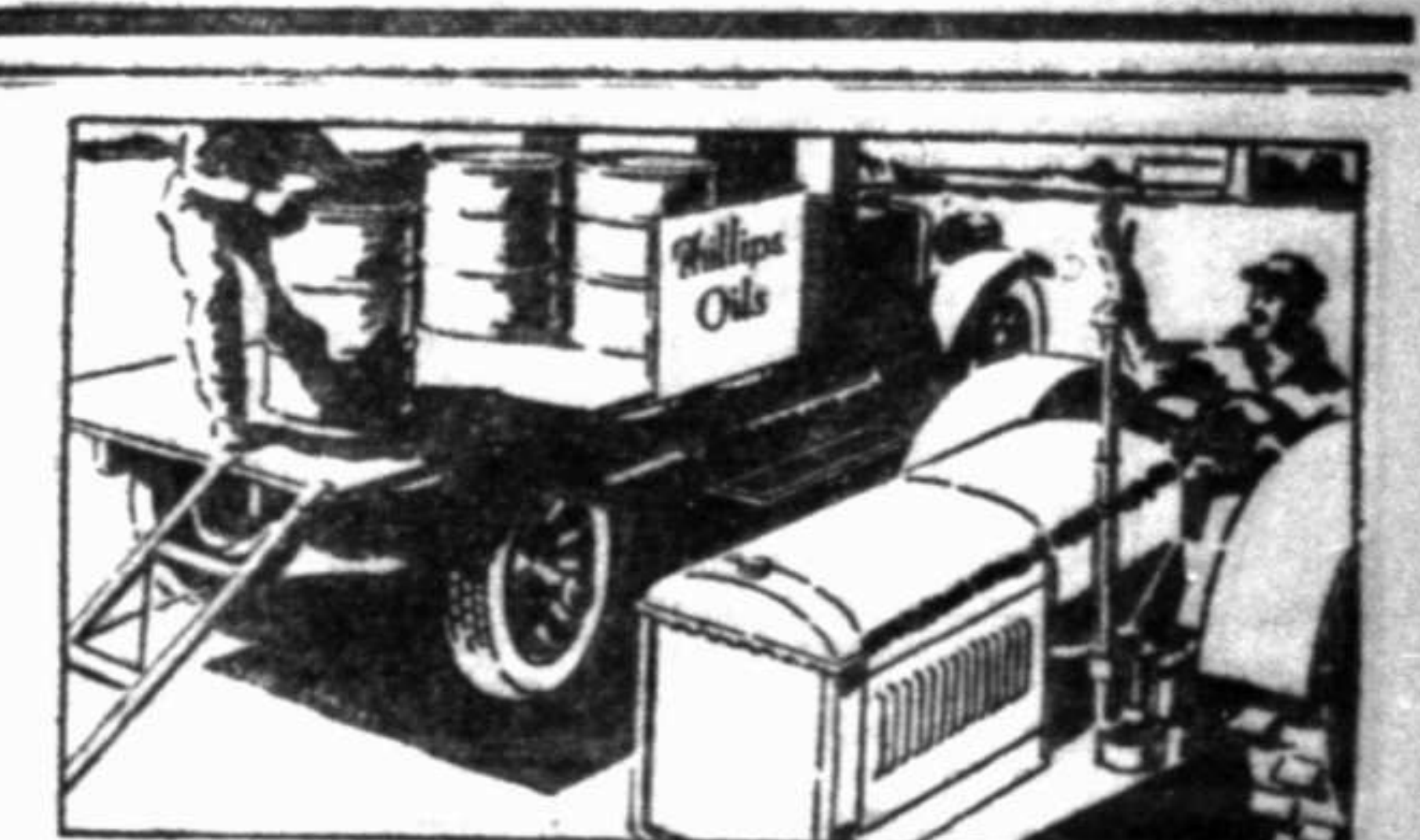

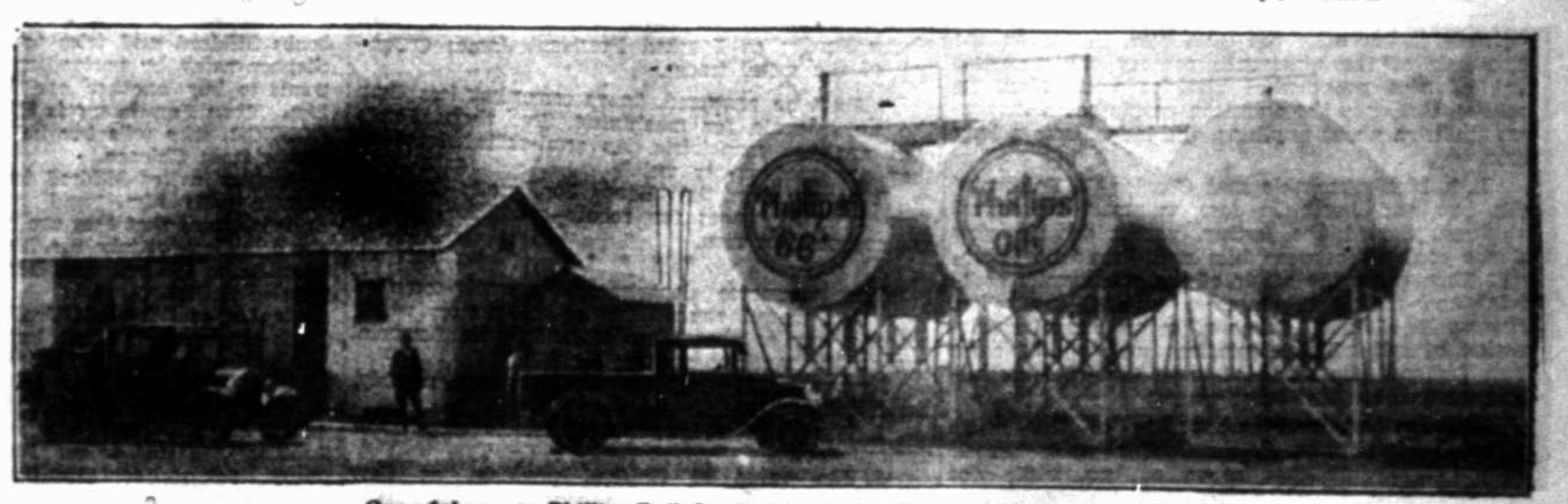

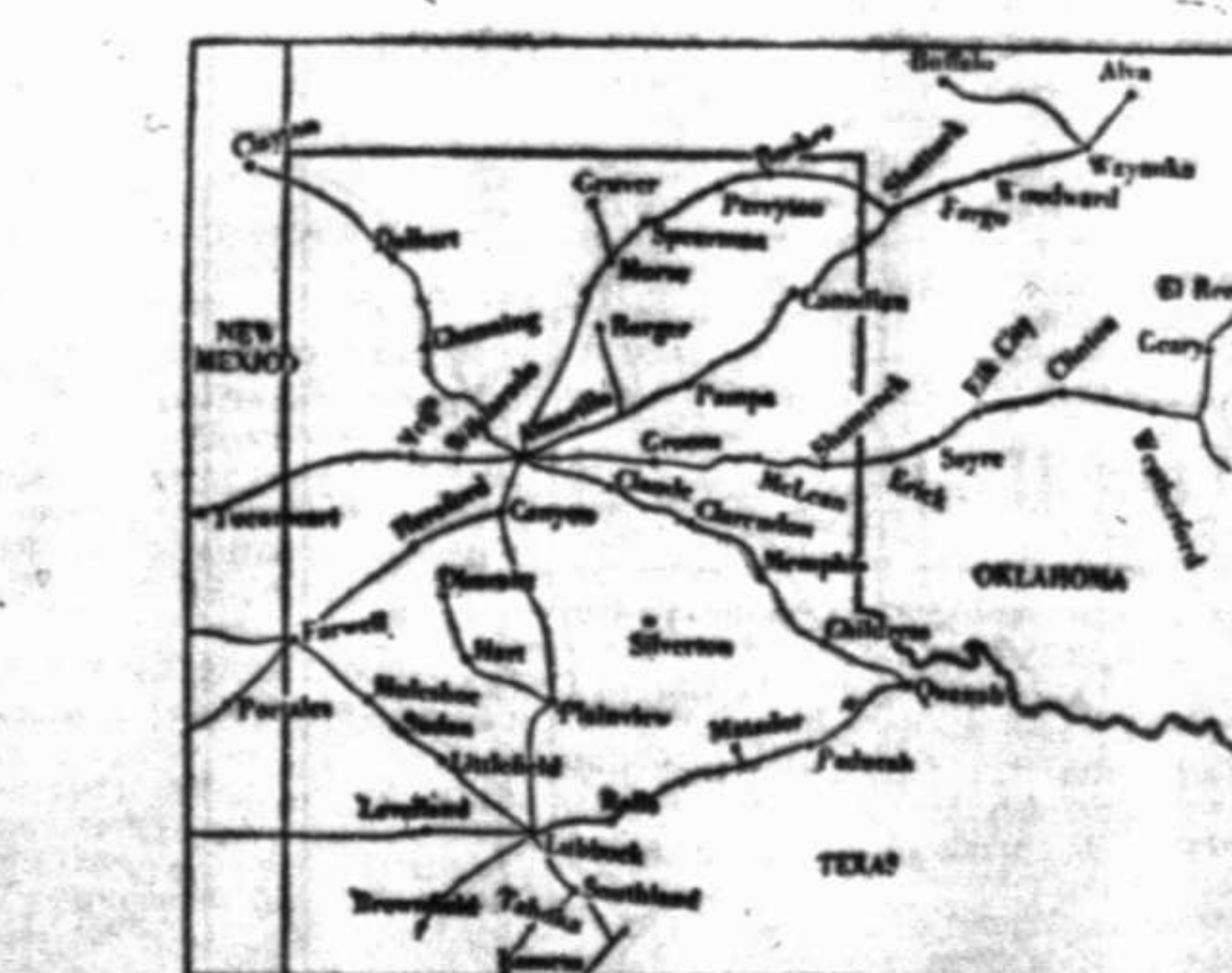

THE MAGIC OF LUBBOCK

What is the magic of Lubbock, the secret of its growth, the source of its economic stability, its excuse for surviving among the fittest?

Why does Lubbock act as a magnet, ever attracting new citizens, seldom relinquishing old residents and frequently drawing to itself again those few lost lambs?

There must be reasons for the high esteem in which this community is held by even the casual visitor, the passing tourist, the occasional envoy of business men and by its own citizens? Patriotism, community loyalty and civic pride may prejudice many but they can not blind the seeing eye to the superiorities and peculiar advantages of other communities. Even the booster can not give vent to his praises unless he has something to eulogize.

It is not that Lubbock is the perfect city. The real secret of its success as a community is and has been that it has never forgotten its own imperfections. Because Lubbock has recognized its own failings it has been successful in overcoming many of them and is assured further self-improvement in the future.

Given its share of natural beauties, a delightful climate, more than ordinary industrial and commercial advantages, an enterprising citizenship, this community has compounded them all into a city that ranks high among American municipalities, and that promises as the years pass to stand even higher among its sister communities of this great state.

TAKING IT SERIOUSLY

Although the vice presidency is the greatest potential office in the republic and in reality carries with it the important duty of presiding over the senate, it is rare that any public man will admit that it represents even the qualified goal of his ambition. Yet in this century alone two vice presidents have gone to the White House and for a period during the illness of Woodrow Wilson it seemed that a third might be called there.

Curious research does not reveal just when the joking about the vice presidential office began, but certainly it was after the Civil War. Indeed, in the first half of the nineteenth century the strongest sort of vice presidential rivalry were fought in politics. But once the American people get a humorous tradition about anything, the laugh lasts a long time.

It is highly probable that Charles W. Fairbanks' silk hat and immobile face trimmed by formal whiskers, started the jesting, particularly in view of the contrast between him and President Roosevelt. Then came the affair of the "butterfly cock-tails" and the joke became a national institution. Thomas R. Marshall delighted in an unending succession of self-inflicted epigrams such as: "I came from Indiana, the home of more first-rate second-class men than any other state."

That a new tradition relating to this office is growing is obvious. Calvin Coolidge took himself more seriously, at least he smiled less, while vice president than after he inherited the presidency. Vice President Dawes was aggressive and belligerent at times but never facetious nor comic. And Vice President Curtis is promoting the new tradition of vice presidential dignity by standing up for the rights of his relatives in Washington society. This being a vice presidency is becoming serious business.

CHANGING "FOLK-WAYS"

A complaint often heard is that labor and capital can and should decide before a strike is called, exactly what they will do after it has dragged out its slow and terribly expensive length for weeks, months and even years. Of course they could and should, but the same is true of every war and every quarrel in which human beings have engaged since the beginnings of time. The unfortunate fact, however, is that human beings are not built that way—that in innumerable instances they have preferred to have a fight before a settlement.

The folly of this always has been recognized by the wise but their exhortations have fallen on deaf ears. In every controversy one side or the other must give up everything or something before peace can be restored and giving up is hard except under the compulsion of defeat.

Now, it is hoped by many and believed by not a few that a better day is dawning—a day when reason instead of force shall prevail and wars, big and little, shall be no more. It is a noble ideal, whether attainable or unattainable. There are many indications that it can be approached more nearly than in the past.

ROMANCE SEEKERS

They say romance is dead, that Americans have lost their love of adventure and the dreams and visions of their pioneering ancestors. Confirmation does not come from the Travelers' Aid Society.

More persons ran away from home last year than at any time of which this society, which so often plays the role of the Good Samaritan for stranded travelers, has record. And a runaway is the very essence of romance, adventure, and castle-building dreams.

In the old days it was not uncommon to hear of boys quitting their homes without leave of their parents. But those were supposed to be the days when discipline was administered most sternly and when young folks were given no liberty whatever. Now, strange as it may seem, in this era of easy-going fathers and mothers the record for runaways is greater than ever.

Boys still run away to go to sea. Girls leave home for the big city or the movies. How narrow is the margin of difference between youth of the model of 1929 and of the model of 1829!

These runaways are not, however, all youngsters. Fathers and mothers, old and bent, steal away from the homes of their children because they don't want to be in the way or want to be alone or want to go back to the old homestead. Romance, like hope, springs eternal.

On the Firing Line at the Nation's Capital

TWO GRAVE PROBLEMS SEEN AHEAD IN THE ECONOMIC SITUATION OF THE U. S.

(The second of a series of three articles reviewing the economic situation in the United States.)

WASHINGTON, May 1.—Gearing up to their present speed, American industries are manufacturing more goods than the country needs. Our farms also yield crops in excess of national requirements. True, agriculture has not attained the factories' astonishing rate of revolutions per minute; but congress is trying now to accelerate it.

With a surplus of everything already—with the industries hitting a hotter clip daily—with agriculture hard on their heels—with the necessary number of workers dwindling—about in proportion to the increase in their output—

1. Over-production on an enormous scale.
2. An acute unemployment situation.

Obviously nobody ought to starve because of too much to eat; nobody ought to be forced to go in rags because of too much to wear; nobody ought to have to sleep on a park bench because of too many houses.

Nevertheless, that is just what happens under the economic system which prevails in America, as well as elsewhere throughout most of the world.

To avoid it, evidently there must be a fairer division of everything.

Radicals say it can be accomplished only by the overthrow of capitalism—a revolution—a soviet form of government, or some such thing—a new civilization, in short.

This remedy, even supposing it would work, is too desperate for the great majority of us. It is now, anyway. If unemployment grew bad enough, who knows.

The American Federation of Labor urges a far more moderate program—

A five-day week, followed, if needful, by a shorter working day, continually trimmed down and down, until a given piece of work requires a sufficient number of men to employ everybody.

However, fewer working hours for the same money, is one way of saying—

Higher wages.

With man-power so plentiful that hours must be cut to a minimum, can labor enforce such a demand?

Besides, intelligence in a worker is no longer an asset. It used to take brains to turn out a finished article. It hardly takes any today, to feed raw material into a hopper.

Can a man hope for the pay, as an automaton, that he received as a human being?

"Yes," Secretary of Labor James J. Davis assured me recently. "Employers are pretty well sold on the idea that they profit by good wages, because their own workmen furnish a market for their products."

All right, in theory. But in practice?

Henry Ford was the original exponent of the doctrine that high pay benefits the employer. Some time ago I had a curiosity to know how organized labor's definition of high wages compares with Henry Ford's; so I asked President James O'Connell of the metal trades.

"For," he answered, "pays somewhat less than the union scale for machinists. But then, Ford's men are not machinists. As semi-skilled laborers, they are paid pretty well."

It seems, then, that Henry Ford really does believe in good wages for robots—good, for robots; not so good, for men.

The commerce department's recently-compiled "costs of manufactures" likewise tells a story which scarcely implies that labor is holding its financial own in the machine age.

Among much else, the figures show, notably, three things:

1. The value of raw materials, as they enter factory doors.
2. The value of finished products, as they emerge.
3. The difference between these two values—known as "the value added by manufacture"—to be divided between boss and worker.

In 1921 the boss' share was 55.3 per cent; the worker's share 44.7. Thenceforward the worker's share steadily declined. In 1927, the last period covered, boss received 61; the worker 39. It was only a 5.7 per cent reduction for the worker in six years, but it meant the transfer of \$1,572,345,000 from his pay envelope to the boss' bank account.

Your Health

CUTTING THE HAIR WON'T IMPAIR ONE'S STRENGTH

It is remarkable that the superstition that cutting the hair will diminish the strength and the growth of a child has persisted among mankind from the earliest times.

Everyone knows the legend of Samson and Delilah and how the giant Hebrew warrior was finally overcome by the Philistines after the young woman to whose blandishments he had succumbed arranged to cut away the big curly locks. That story in one form or another is to be found among the fables of many aboriginal tribes today. The truth of the matter is that such a conception arises only in ignorance.

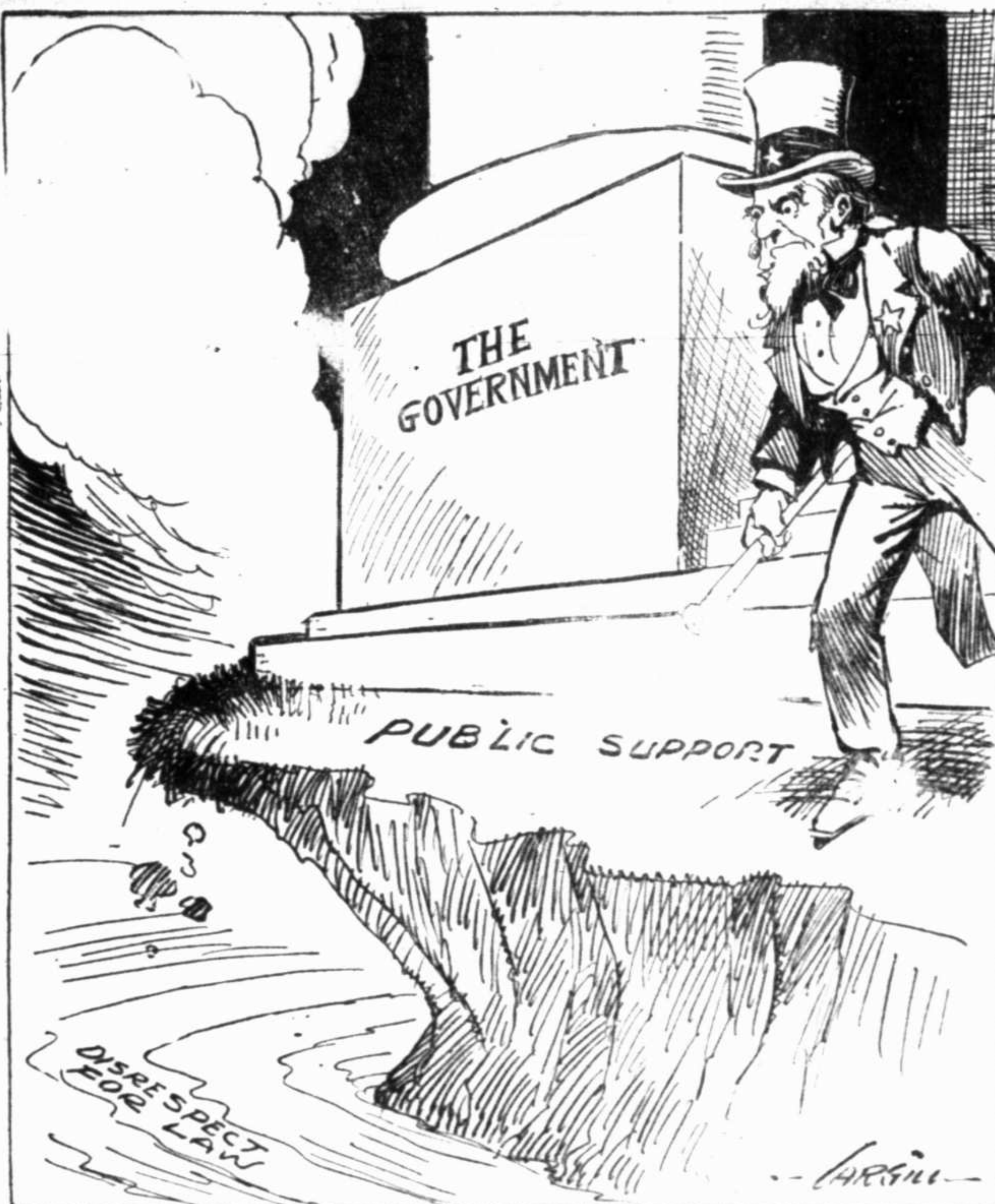
The hair is merely a hornified growth of tissue, the same as the skin. Hair cells lie within the skin and project this growth to the exterior. Obviously, removal of the hair can have little, if anything, to do with the general strength of the body.

The most simple and direct evidence of this is the fact that pugilists usually have their hair cut before engaging in a major contest and that their leisurely occupation of breaking stone. The development of insects and vermin not infrequently associated with the criminal class.

Other curious old superstitions, also dating back to the infancy of the race, have to do with children wetting the bed. They are, in almost every instance, symbolical magic. Thus they have to do with dreams of running water, of Niagara Falls, of flowing streams and similar conceptions.

The notion that playing with matches or fire will lead inevitably to an involuntary action of the child's bladder during sleep is, no doubt, related to the idea that dreams go by opposites. This idea is not without scientific foundation since the Freudian interpretation of dreams provides that one obtains in dreams the things that he wishes for in the waking state.

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Bulls Again Take Control Of Stock Mart Wednesday

Prices Move Substantially Higher In Spots; Sales Total 4,688,990 Shares; Call Renewed At Eleven

NEW YORK, May 1. (AP)—Bulls began the new month today with an outburst of activity such as the stock market has not experienced since March, but handicapped by continued uncertainty over credit, were unable to move prices substantially higher in spots.

Total sales were 4,688,990. The Associated Press index of 50 leading industrial stocks recorded a gain of less than a point for the day.

Motors were rather heavy, save for Marmon, which jumped more than 8 points to a new high for the year, and Willys Overland, which was bought on large current sales reports. General Motors made a moderate gain in response to April sales reports, but lost it before the close.

And American Radiator and Standard Sanitary touched a new high at 50 rumors of an association of interest with John H. Manville. Adams Express regained 25 of the 34 points lost yesterday. Ludlum Steel, Mathieson Alkali, Symington A. and Texas and Pacific broke into new high territory.

American Telephone lost about 8 points in selling on the good news of the granting of rights to the steel trust about a point indicating that the quarterly earnings report had already been discounted.

In the commodity markets, cotton gained about \$1 a bale on favorable weather reports. Wheat sagged on larger than expected May deliveries, but regained most of its loss.

Foreign exchanges were quiet and generally steady, save for the Spanish Peseta, which dropped to a new 1929 low at 14.32 cents.

The opening was steady at a decline of 8 to 16 points. Active months sold 7 to 21 points net lower during the first few minutes under reselling or liquidation by recent buyers. May sold off to 19.01 and December to 18.61, but the decline represented only a partial response to the weakness abroad and the market turned steadier on covering combined with some trade and commission house buying. The failure of the Liverpool weakness to stimulate heavier offerings and the market's failure to break below last Monday's low prices, seemed to promote confidence in the technical position and doubtless accounted for some of the buying.

A private report pointing to an increase of only 1 per cent in acreage may have been a contributing factor. Early losses were recovered rapidly, with the market selling up to 19.40 for May and 19.00 for December during the early afternoon, or about 20 to 25 points net higher. 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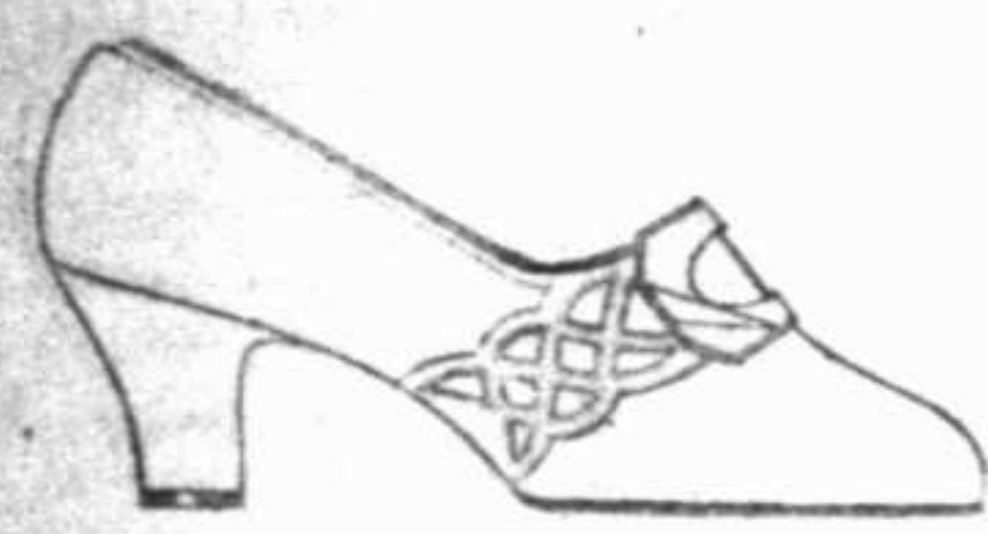

Lieutenant Eaton said the nearest water to the place where the plane landed was five miles distant. Because of atmospheric conditions and the fact that his horses had been without water for fifty hours, he was unable to bring out the bodies. His party therefore buried them near the plane and hastened back to civilization.
