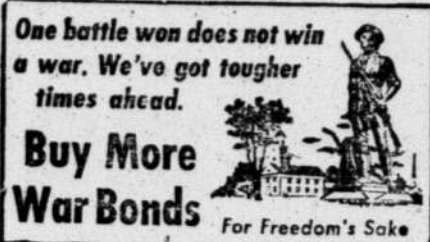

Lamesa made only one first down on passes by Horton.

In the first quarter San Angelo scored 19, followed by 20 points in the second round of play, and 31 and 13 in the third and fourth quarters.

Lamesa gained 28 yards through rushing plays to San Angelo's 555; and gained 20 yards through passing, to the Bobcats 31 yards gained through passing. The Tornadoes completed 4 out of 15 passes, while San Angelo completed 1 out of 6.

The article printed below was handed to this office by over-all chairman, Dutch Leuenberger. It is entitled "What Can We Give?"

"I bragged about the money and work I gave to the war, until I met a man who gave a leg."

That remark by a recent visitor to the war chest office is an editorial in itself.

The truth is that all we can give is very little when compared with the sacrifices made by the men on the battlefronts. Our money—our time—is as nothing when other men are giving their lives.

And yet it means so much. Without our help, those men aboard would be left alone, like castaways on desert islands. Without our work and the aids that our funds provide, their already hard task would be impossible.

They rely on us for support. They know, where they are, that they are not forgotten, that we will not let them down. Our Texas boys in France, in Italy and in the Pacific know that as they are fighting with guns and tanks and planes, so are we fighting in our own humble way.

The pity is not that we must give so much, but that we are able to give so little.

We can't fight beside our boys "over there." We can't face danger with them, suffer for them, even be with them when death draws near. We can't lift from their shoulders the burden they carry so bravely.

No, we can't do any of those things for them. The danger, the suffering—even death—they must face alone.

But we can do something. We can give out time, our efforts, and our money to the greatest of all war programs—to the annual campaign of the National War Fund.

Those things we should give freely and humbly, and we should be grateful that they are ours to give.

Remember the words of the visitor: "I bragged about the money and work I gave to the war, until I met a man who gave a leg."

New Shoe Stamp To Become Good Nov. 1

Airplane Stamp 3 in War Ration Book Three may be used for buying one pair of rationed shoes beginning November 1, 1944, the Office of Price Administration has announced.

The new stamp, like Airplane Stamps 1 and 2 now in use, will be valid indefinitely.

Announcement was made September 28 that another shoe ration stamp would become valid on November 1, but the number of the stamp was not made known.

As explained previously, validation of the new shoe stamp November 1 continue the rationing rate established a year ago when Airplane Stamp 1 came into use. Since November 1, 1943, shoe stamps have been validated at six-month intervals.

An article in Sunday's issue of the Ft. Worth Star-Telegram stated that Richmond Drilling Company No. 1 Nelson, section 34, block M, EL&R survey, northwest Dawson County, wildcat, found a hole full of sulphur water at 5,003 feet, and will be plugged back.

Your Personal War Problems

Your questions on allotments, insurance, legal problems or other matters as they relate to Army personnel and their dependents will be answered in this column or by letter. Write Headquarters, Eighth Service Comman, Dallas 2, Texas.

Q. My husband is a corporal in the Army overseas. Our first child has just been born. Would it be possible for me to get the family allowance increased without bothering him?

A. Yes. From a nearby military installation secure a War Department AGO Form Number 641 and send it to the War Department Office of Dependency Benefits, Newark 2, New Jersey, with a certified copy of the child's birth certificate. If you are not located near a military post, you may write the Office of Dependency Benefits for an application.

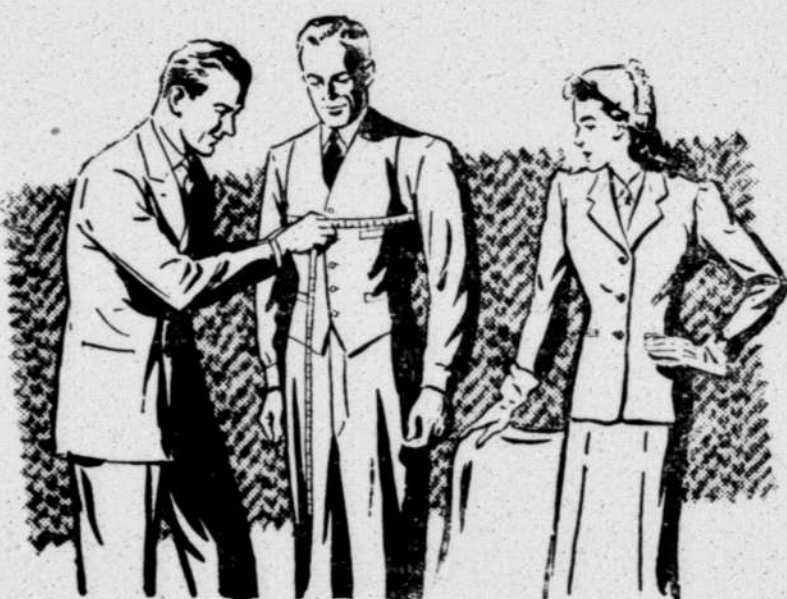

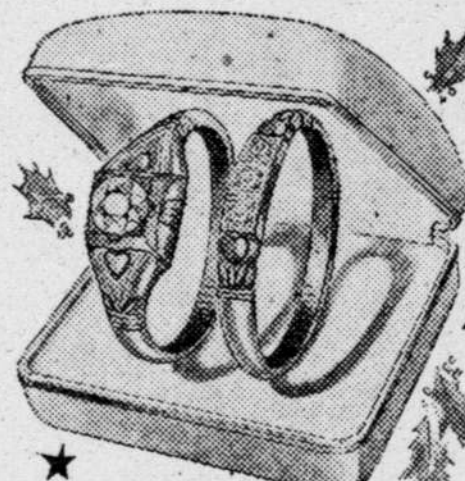

The exhibit will be held over a period of three consecutive week ends and will feature 4-H club girls and home demonstration women's work. This achievement exhibit will start October 27 and 28 and will be placed in store windows in this city. It will be divided in three sections, with fresh vegetables and flowers being displayed in one unit, and canned foods and vegetables in another, and clothing and home improvement projects in another division. You are asked to watch this paper for further announcements about the display.

Women in charge of the exhibit are Mrs. C. W. Shafer, chairman, Mrs. J. H. Adkins, and Mrs. Lillard Thomas.

It was announced at the Saturday meeting that Mrs. C. F. Gowen will accept orders from persons in the county desiring to get tomatoes, as a truck load of these will be ordered. She asks that persons turn in their orders as soon as possible so that an estimate of how many should be ordered can be reached. Prices will be about \$2.00 per bushel for tomatoes and orders should be turned in by the bushel basket to either Mrs. Gowen or Mrs. Hyrtle Negy, home demonstration agent.

A nominating committee was appointed for the selection of council officers for the new year. Those included on the committee are Mrs. J. B. Speck, Mrs. P. V. Ryan, and Mrs. B. E. Miller. The group will report at a later meeting.

Cotton And Sheep Experiment Are Studied By Group

Lee Pool, county agent, and Loyal Schooler visited Texas Technological College, Lubbock, Wednesday,

October 18, for the purpose of observing some sheep which the college had on feed.

They watched the sheep graze on Plainsman milo, and were told that the herds were being given a supplemental ration of 1-3 ground bundles, 1-3 cottonseed meal, and 1-3 alfalfa hay which was not ground, plus 3 pounds of ground limestone and 3 pounds of salt. Pool reports

that the sheep were making fine gains and stated that this appeared to be a profitable and economical method to use surplus grain on any farm.

Schoolers and Pool also visited Lubbock Experiment Station, and observed their method of defoliating cotton by the use of dusting cyanamid on the crop, which causes leaves to fall within a week, and permits the use of cotton pickers, sleds, and other mechanical harvesting methods. It was estimated that the cost of using this would not exceed \$1.00 per acre for dusting, and 50c to \$1.00 for harvesting.

Guy Ranson Enrolls In Yale University

AAA OFFICIALS COMPLETE SIX SUDAN LOANS IN COUNTY

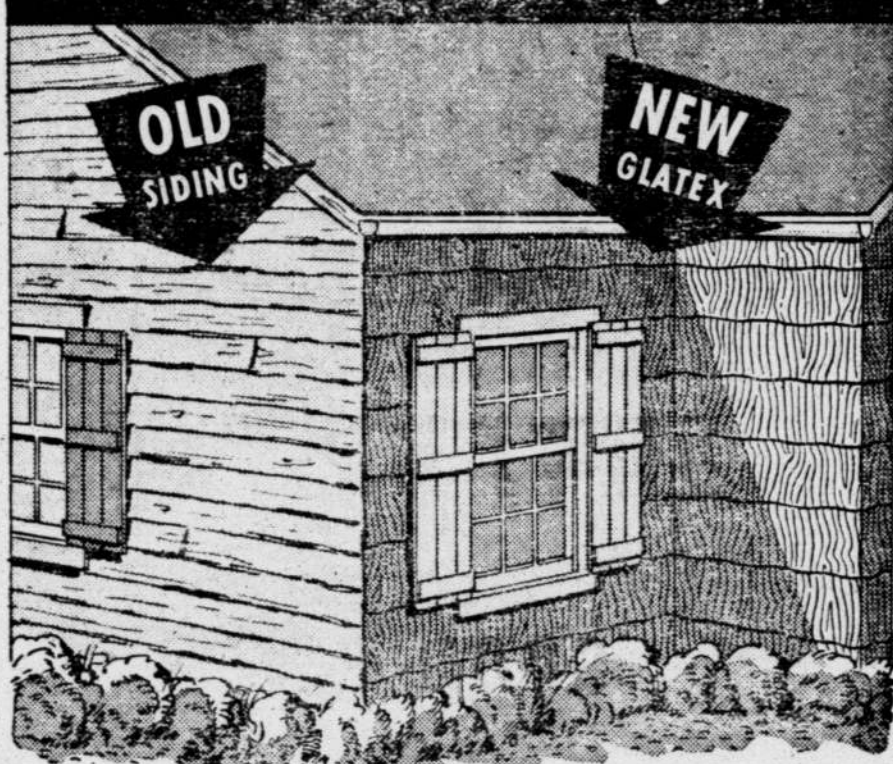
C. E. Tarter, administrative officer at the local AAA office, reports that his office has completed six sudan loans and has made their first inspections for grain sorghum loans in the county.

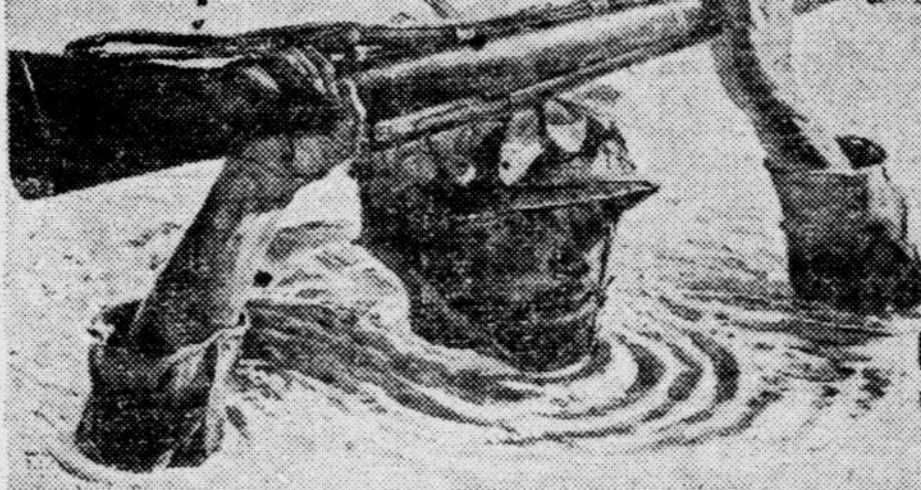
