DEATH LIST FROM STORM NOW 822

LANGHORN GETS DEATH PENALTY

(By Associated Press)

LaGRANGE, Tex., March 21.—William Langhorn Jr. was found guilty of murdering Valeria Zapalac, and the jury returned a verdict this morning, fixing the penalty at death. The case went to the jury last night.

Langhorn also stands charged with criminal assault and assault to murder Miss Zapalac's sister. It is alleged that he carried the two girls driving in an automobile and shot the older one and then attacked the younger one. The crime was committed near this city about one month ago.

The defense plea in the trial was insanity, and the father took the stand in his son's behalf and related incidents in his life to show that the young man was not of sound mind. Doctors were also used by the defense to prove insanity.

Attorneys for the defense gave notice that a motion for a new trial would be filed and that if that failed the case would be appealed.

Langhorn is twenty-five years of age, the son of Dr. W. H. Langhorn, of Chappell Hill, and the family is one of the most prominent in Central South Texas.

The crime for which young Langhorn was convicted took place near here on the night of February 3rd.

MAN SAVED BY WOODEN LEG

CHICAGO, March 21.—A wooden leg may be a handicap to a person but it saved the life of Joseph Inguet, age 32, when an automobile in which he and two companions were driving overturned.

Frank Bauer and Robert Barrick, the two companions of the wooden-legged man were killed in the wreck. Inguet's wooden leg served as a prop for the overturned car which crushed the other two men, and only injured Inguet.

NEW COURTS WERE ESTABLISHED BY LEGISLATURE

(By Associated Press)

AUSTIN, March 21.—The Thirty-Ninth Legislature, not only established three additional trial courts, reorganized several judicial districts, but came to the relief of the Court of Criminal Appeals to expedite cases. The establishment of a Commission of Appeals to aid the Court of Criminal Appeals is expected to relieve a docket which has been crowded, resulting in delay in distribution of numerous cases.

Governor Miriam A. Ferguson requested the organization of such a body and final enactment of this legislation awaits only the governor's signature.

The Commission of Appeals of Texas, acting in an auxiliary capacity to the Supreme Court, and after which the criminal appeals commission was patterned, was also extended until 1931.

The new commission is to be composed of two lawyers who will review cases, act upon them and submit their decisions to the regular court for final approval.

A new court of civil appeals was created and the court located at Eastland. The Parnell bill providing for the reorganization of the supreme judicial districts of the state was defeated. This measure would not have increased the number of civil appeals courts.

The 101st District Court was created for Dallas county. The 102nd District Court was created for Red River and Bowie counties. A new court, known as the 106th District Court, was provided for the counties of Garza, Lynn, Dawson, Gaines, Yoakum and Terry.

The Dallas court and 102nd District Court bills have already been signed by the governor.

Representative Parish Not in Favor of Special Session

Judge O. L. Parish returned home at noon Friday from Austin, where he had been since early in January attending the Thirty-Ninth Legislature as Representative from this district. He reports that it was a quiet closing of the legislature Thursday, and most of the members shipped out at once for their homes.

Judge Parish said that he did not see any special necessity for the Governor calling a special session when asked if he thought a special session of the lawmakers would be called. "I do not think she will call an extra session," said Judge Parish, "unless the Governor decides that a supplemental appropriation should be made for the schools."

The legislature which just adjourned remained within the income of the state in making appropriations, according to Representative Parish, and an estimate made by the chairman of the finance committee showed that at the end of the two years the state would have a cash balance of four million dollars, unless additional appropriations were made.

Judge Parish stated that the school appropriation is not understood by the average citizen. The law making the four million appropriation for schools is based on the condition that only one million is to be apportioned for the first year, and the other three million for the second year, provided that the apportionment does not exceed \$15 per capita.

Grant's Tomb in New York

ONE OF A SERIES OF TRAVEL TALKS

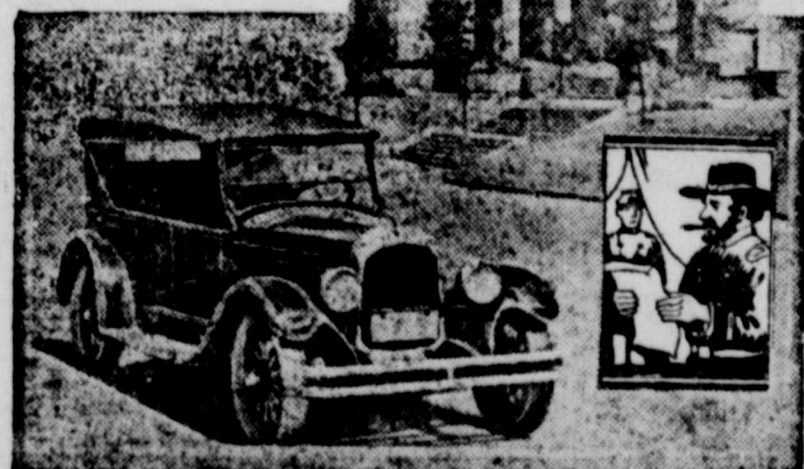

Tomb of Ulysses Simpson Grant, Eighteenth President

IN this age of motor cars the advice, "See America First," has unusual significance. One of the interesting and historical places which attracts the motorist in New York is the tomb of President Grant on Riverside Drive, overlooking the Hudson River. This tomb is of white granite and white marble and is 150 feet high with a circular cupola topping a square building 90

feet on the side and 72 feet high. The sarcophagus, in the center of the building, is of red Wisconsin polypory.

The cornerstone was laid by President Harrison in 1892 and the tomb was dedicated April 27, 1898, by President McKinley.

Money to build the tomb was raised by the Grant Monument Association, which received subscriptions from 90,000 persons.

THE known dead from Wednesday's tornado, which dipped into sections of five states, stood at 822 at noon Saturday. Total casualties included five additional deaths reported from Griffith, Indiana; one from Princetown, Indiana; and seven from Murphysboro, Illinois.

The number of injured remains around 3,000, and with the homeless running into thousands. Burial of the dead is proceeding rapidly in all sections, the funeral ceremonies being brief on account of the chaotic condition of the communities devastated by the awful storm.

There are still more bodies missing which run the total death list higher, and some of those found have not been identified.

CAN'T REMEMBER KILLING YOUTH

(By Associated Press)

WICHITA FALLS, March 21.—Frank Collier, on trial here for the slaying of his son-in-law, Elzie Robertson, continued his testimony today in his own behalf.

Collier, who was until recently mayor of Wichita Falls, began his testimony yesterday afternoon. He told the jury that he did not even know whether the gun was loaded or not, and that he did not remember getting out of his car and did not know how many shots were fired.

"I lost my mind and self control," Collier told the jury, and he stated that this happened after he learned of the relations of the deceased with his daughter prior to their marriage.

FORMER BALLINGER MAN IS KILLED IN A FALL

News received in Ballinger reports the death of Doyle Knight, at Trent, Texas. According to the report Mr. Knight was injured in a fall from a house, and died while being rushed to an Abilene sanitarium.

Mr. Knight formerly lived in Ballinger, and was engaged in the second-hand furniture business, his store being located where the Harber grocery store is now located, and next to the Walker-Smith Co.

11 BODIES TAKEN FROM COAL MINE

(By Associated Press)

FAIRMONT, West Virginia, March 21.—Eleven bodies have been recovered up to today from the Bethlehem Mine Corporation mine No. 41, at Barrackville near here, when an explosion Tuesday entombed thirty-three coal miners.

Mine officials today said that a re-check revealed that only thirty-three miners were caught in the blast, and not thirty-four as was at first reported. It is not expected that any of the number will be found alive.

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., March 21.—The immediate need of surgeons who will donate their services and time until all the wounded in the tornado zone have received attention today prompted Dr. L. D. Rawlings to make an appeal to the county medical societies of Illinois for help.

At the same time Dr. Rawlings sent a telegram to the public laboratories at Washington asking for supplies and anti-toxin gas for treating gangrene which has appeared among the wounded.

Reports received today from the destroyed districts said that relief work was well organized and that a flood of material aid continued to pour in for the storm sufferers.

A final check-up on the loss of life and property, it is said, will show that the tornado was the worst in the history of the United States. More than eight hundred lives were snuffed out, 3,000 persons injured and entire communities left homeless.

CHICAGO, March 21.—The storm swept territory of the Ohio valley continued the tragic task of burying its dead, while relief workers continued work of bringing order out of chaos. Plans are being made for the rehabilitation of the towns destroyed by the worst storm in many years.

Funerals of some of the storm victims were held yesterday, but most of the burials have been arranged for today and Sunday, with plans for memorial services to be held later. In the towns where the loss of life was the heaviest community funerals have been planned with burials in one long grave.

SHIP NEGRO'S REMAINS

Jim Terrell, colored, died at a house owned by Alice Burnham in the Southern part of the city Friday night. The remains were shipped by King-Holt undertakers Saturday to Kendleton, Texas.

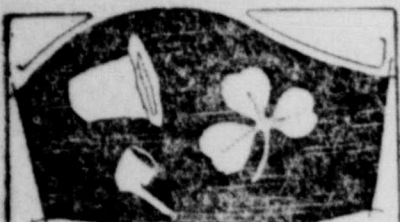

SCHAWWE FUNERAL
SET FOR SUNDAY

The remains of A. Schawe will be laid to rest in Evergreen Cemetery Sunday afternoon, following funeral services to be held at the Schawe family home on Ninth Street at 4:00 o'clock. Rev. E. W. McLaurin, pastor of the First Presbyterian church, will conduct the services at the residence, following which the Sons of Herman will take charge and bury the body with the honors of that order.

Accompanied by two sons, Ed and Arno and Mrs. Arno Schawe, the remains arrived at Ballinger from Eagle Pass at 11:31 over the Santa Fe Saturday. The remains were carried from the train to the home on Ninth Street.

Mr. Schawe died suddenly Thursday while visiting his son Ed at Eagle Pass. Mrs. Schawe was visiting their daughter, Miss Louise, in Dallas, and the mother and daughter arrived at Ballinger late Friday, and the two other daughters, Miss Olga, of Chicago, and Miss Williedell, of Denver, Colorado, are due to arrive here at noon Sunday.

The deceased is also survived by two brothers and two sisters. One brother, O. Schawe, and one sister, Mrs. Edward Knoop, of Brenham, will be here to attend the funeral.

Mr. Schawe was seventy-three years of age. He was born in Germany and came to this country with his parents when he was but six months of age. The family came to Texas in the early days, settling in Washington county. Mr. Schawe came to Ballinger in 1891. For thirty-four years he was identified with the business interests of Ballinger. While he had been in feeble health, the news of his death came as a surprise and brought sorrow to friends.

CITY TO PASS
MOTOR BUS LAW

An ordinance has been drafted, and will be passed, it was said Saturday, regulating service cars operating in this city and motor buses operating in and through Ballinger. City Attorney Doss has prepared the ordinance, and it is ready for the city commission to enact into a law.

While the provisions of the ordinance have not been made public, pending its final passage, it was said that the new law will fix a fee on jitneys operating in the city of \$5 per year, and on motor buses operating through the city a fee of \$25 will be assessed.

The ordinance will also require the service cars and motor buses to establish a station, and maintain a depot for taking on and off passengers, instead of stopping, loading and unloading promiscuously on the streets.

FROCKS STRAIGHTER AND NARROWER THAN EVER AS THE SEASON ADVANCES



FROCKS continue to be straight and narrow. The only difference from past seasons is that they are still straighter—and narrower—certainly shorter.

They are shorter than they have been since nineteen-twenty, with every indication of again reaching the high mark of four years ago.

The sketch at the right of the photo above shows two of the new frocks, types that are being made for Palm Beach and the South, and for early spring.

The dress at the left is a kasha model of green. It has no waistline, and not a gather. It is as

straight as a coat. It is trimmed in many-colored braid, and has a collar of dull pompeian red silk (a dull red that is found among the threads that make up the silk braid). The sleeves are tight-fitting, and plain, with red, narrow cuffs.

These were designed for wear in the southlands, but they are mod-

els that can easily be made up in serge for the spring.

POSTAL RATES GO UP APR. 15

Yes, Uncle Sam wants more money for delivering your mail. Practically all rates have been advanced, and the new schedules will go into effect April 15th. Postmaster Reese has received instructions to educate the patrons of his office, and acquaint them with the new rates.

The rate of postage on all post cards will be 2c each, whether they bear written or printed matter. There will be no change in the rate of postage on government postal cards nor on any other mail of the first class.

Mail of the third class will embrace all matter now included in the third and fourth classes up to and including 8 ounces in weight, while the new fourth class (parcel post) will include all matter formerly in the third and fourth classes over 8 ounces in weight and not exceeding 70 pounds in the first, second and third zones, and not exceeding 50 pounds when mailed for delivery in any of the other zones.

The rate of postage on all matter embraced in the new third class will be 1 1/2 cents for each 2 ounces or fraction of 2 ounces up to and including 8 ounces in weight, except that the rate on books, catalogues, seeds, cuttings, bulbs, roots, scions and plants shall continue to be 1 cent per each 2 ounces on parcels not exceeding 8 ounces in weight.

The present parcel post pound rates according to zone will apply to parcel post matter and in addition thereto there will be a service charge of 2 cents for each parcel, except on parcels mailed on rural routes. If, in addition to the regular postage and 2 cent service charge, there is affixed the value of 25 cents in postage with the words "Special Handling" written or printed upon the wrapper, such parcel shall receive the same expeditious handling, transportation, and delivery accorded to first class mail.

The fee on registered articles

will be 15 cents where indemnified for \$50.00 or less, for articles indemnified for over \$50.00 and not in excess of \$100.00 the fee will be 20 cents. If a return receipt is desired a charge of 3 cents will be made for same.

The fee for insurance on parcel post matter will be 5 cents for indemnification not to exceed \$5.00, 8 cents not to exceed \$25.00, 10 cents not to exceed \$50.00, and 25 cents for indemnification not to exceed \$100.00. The fees for insurance are in addition to the postage, and both fees and postage must be prepaid with stamps affixed. A charge of 3 cents will be made for a return receipt, if such receipt is requested.

The fee for c. o. d. service will be 12 cents for collections not to exceed \$10.00, 15 cents for collections not to exceed \$50.00, and 25 cents for collections not to exceed \$100.00.

The fees for domestic money orders will be as follows: For orders not exceeding \$2.50, 5 cents; for orders exceeding \$2.50 and not exceeding \$5.00, 7 cents; for orders exceeding \$5.00 and not exceeding \$10.00, 10 cents; for orders exceeding \$10.00 and not exceeding \$20.00, 12 cents; for

orders exceeding \$20.00 and not exceeding \$40.00, 15 cents; for orders exceeding \$40.00 and not exceeding \$60.00, 18 cents; for orders exceeding \$60.00 and not exceeding \$80.00, 20 cents; for orders exceeding \$80.00 and not exceeding \$100.00, 22 cents. A money order will not be issued for more than \$100.00.

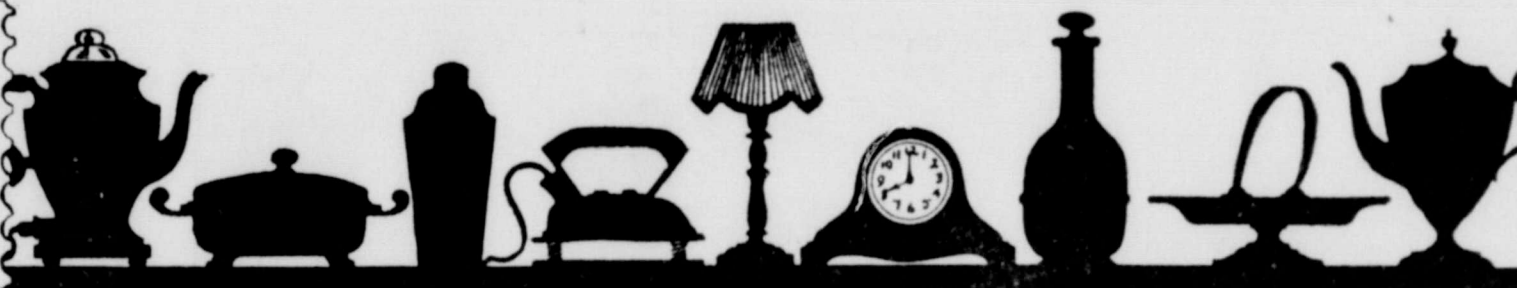

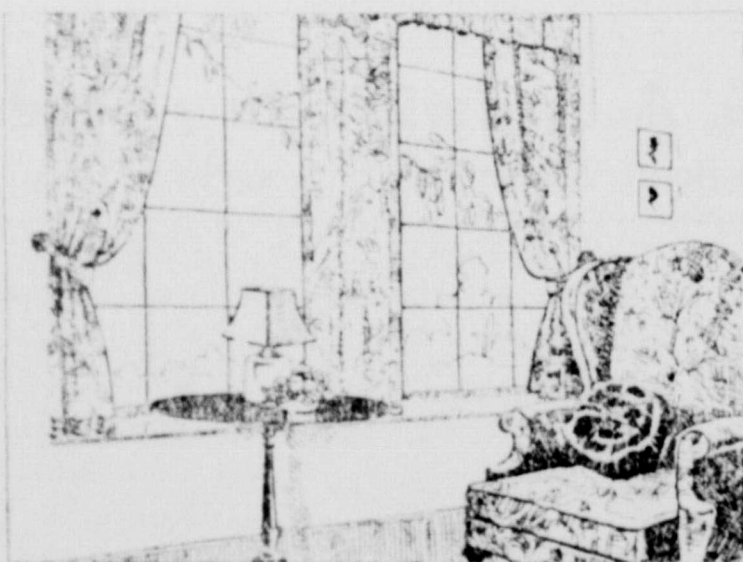
The "battle royal" was a real slug fest and one by one went down until one lone warrior was

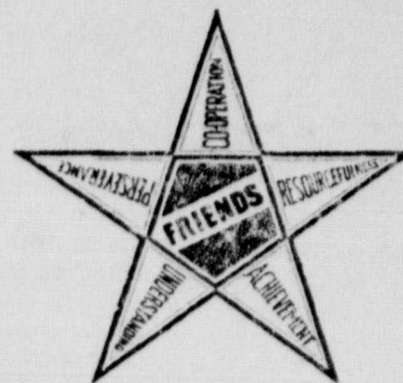

Traced to Stone Age Artist
(By Associated Press)

ROTHERHAM, England, March 21.—That there is little new under the sun, even with regard to women's fashions, was pointed out by Ethert Brand, curator of the museum here in the course of a recent lecture. 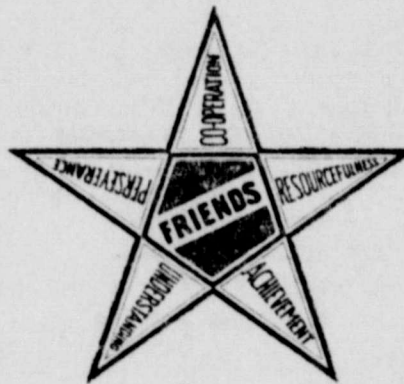

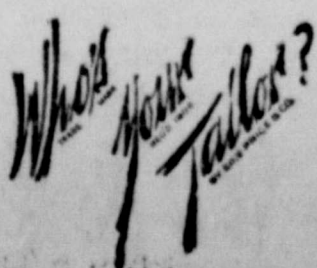
