Funeral services were held Monday at Flomot for Samuel Alvin Ross, 75, former resident of that community, who died Sunday morning at Ray's Hospitality Home in Lubbock.

The Rev. Jimmy Williams, pastor, officiated the service, held at 2:30 p.m. in the First Methodist Church of Flomot. Assisting was the Rev. Mrs. Ruth Cooper of Lubbock, a former pastor of the church. Burial was in Flomot Cemetery under direction of Resthaven Funeral Home of Lubbock.

A native of DeLeon, Mr. Ross had lived in Lubbock about seven months, going there from Flomot. A retired cowboy and rancher, he had lived in Motley County in 1907. He worked as a cowboy for the Lewis Ranch, located near Clarendon, and lived in Flomot from 1953 to 1967.

He was married in 1915 to Miss Lou Turner at Flomot. She died in 1920.

Survivors include a daughter, Mrs. C. T. Boyd (the former Marie Ross) of Slaton, and two grandchildren.

Pallbearers were nephews, including Richard Turner of Matador and Malcolm Turner of Flomot.

Attend Funeral At Decatur for Jimmie Brandon

Mrs. A. A. Harp and Mrs. Louis Poteet attended funeral services Sunday in Decatur for Jimmie C. Brandon, 34, brother of Mrs. Paul Patton, the former Ora Faye Brandon, and former resident of Matador.

Mr. Brandon, associated with Christian Funeral Home in Decatur, died in a highway accident about 2 p.m. Friday when the hearse he was driving struck a truck loaded with animal carcasses parked about 7 miles north of Saginaw on U. S. 81.

Investigating officers said the truck was legally parked on the paved shoulder portion of the highway. It was also established that a tire blew out on the hearse and that it skidded some 30 feet before striking the rear of the truck.

Brandon, who was alone in the hearse, was dead on arrival at All Saints Hospital, Fort Worth. He was en route to Greenwood Funeral Home in Fort Worth with an empty casket.

Funeral services were held at 2 p.m. Sunday in the First Baptist Church of Decatur.

Survivors include his wife and two children all of the home; his mother, Mrs. Edna Brandon of Decatur, three brothers and four sisters.

Saturday Hours Are Unchanged At Post Office

Business resumed the usual Saturday hours at the Matador post office despite earlier notice that the office would be closed except for one hour to deliver packages and general delivery mail. Postmaster Charlie Scaff received orders to keep the regular hours.

Following item is from Tuesday's daily newspapers.

The house passed Monday a Senate-approved bill to exempt the Post Office Department from a government manpower cutback imposed by Congress, while the Senate was busy adding still more exemptions.

Having voted last week to exempt air traffic controllers, as well as postal employees from the rollback, the Senate voted Monday to exempt FBI agents and assistant U. S. attorneys.

Sen. John J. Williams (R-DeL.), opposing these additions, said it looked as if congress were going to exempt government agencies one by one.

Blackmail Charges

The House voice vote sending the postal exemption into conference came amid charges by some Republicans that Congress was being blackmailed by threats of a reduction in local postal services if the manpower rollback went through.

Postmaster General W. Marvin Watson estimating that his department would lose 83,238 of its 726,400 employees in a rollback, had said this would force curtailment of services beginning with the closing of post office window service last Saturday.

He postponed the curtailment for one week, after the Senate approved the exemption last Friday.

A recent patient in Methodist Hospital, Dallas, G. L. Dunn, 90, father of Mrs. Herman Stanfield has been dismissed and is recuperating at Cliff Manor in Oak Cliff. Mr. Dunn underwent amputation of one limb on July 6, three days before his 90th birthday on the 9th, then ten days later again had surgery, for the amputation of his other limb. Mrs. Stanfield went to Dallas to be with her parents and other relatives during the surgery. Mrs. Dunn has been crippled since being struck by a motorist several years ago.

Watson will report at Fort Huachuca, Calif., for a 5-day training period before going to Saigon. His next assignment will be as Construction Director, Military Assistance Command Vietnam, under General Abrams, successor to General Westmoreland.

Many Entries in Junior 4-H Rodeo

CHILDRESS, (Special) —Fifth annual Childress Junior 4-H Rodeo August 2nd and 3rd has drawn entries from a wide area of Texas and Oklahoma.

Some 200 boys and girls, 18 years of age and under will be spurring high for the highly prized sterling belt buckles to be awarded to winners in the 8 events. All-round buckles will be awarded to the top boy and girl of the show.

With over 10,000 4-H'ers in Texas mounted and active in the horse program the junior rodeo scene has taken on a professional look. Spectators can expect to see youngsters that in a few years will be in the top of the RCA rodeo standings.

An electric timer is used in the Childress Junior Rodeo that registers the timed events down to one hundredth of a second which virtually eliminates any ties between contestants.

A fast moving thrilling show will be produced by Childress 4-H'ers headed by adult leader, Freddy Cordell. Cordell, a rodeo producer in his own right, will be mounted and as arena director will keep the show moving at a fast pace.

Boys and girls 14 years of age and under will compete in the calf dobbing, barrel race, pole bending, flag race, and steer riding, while the 15-18 year olds will try their hand on bare-backs, calf roping, bulls, barrels and poles.

The show will get underway each night at 8:00 p.m. in the Old Settlers Arena in the Childress City Park.

Bruce Oliver's Visit Friends

A former pastor of the First Baptist Church, Rev. Bruce Oliver spoke Wednesday night of last week, in mid-week prayer services at the church, and told of his and his wife's work in Brazil.

Rev. and Mrs. Oliver and their children have been on furlough the past year from Corrente, Northern Brazil, where he is Field Evangelist and mission pilot, and also operates a plane ambulance service. Mrs. Oliver is head of the primary school in Corrente and teaches high school math. The language there is Portuguese, and at night Mrs. Oliver teaches English to her own children, Ben, 15, Paul 14, Edie, 12 and Matt, 9.

There are three mission homes housing missionary families, and one mission school with over 400 children enrolled, Oliver said. Population of Corrente is something over 4,000.

Rev. Oliver, in addition to his mission work, is pastor of the First Baptist Church there. The structure is about 64 years old. About six months out of the year the town is isolated due to the rains, the Oliver's said, and the only transportation out is by plane.

Regarding living conditions, Rev. Oliver said that the town has electricity three hours at night, from 6 until 9 o'clock. Water is provided by ox cart and is stored in a tank, then pumped by electricity for use in the homes.

Following prayer meeting, the Oliver's were joined by former friends for a short visit in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Bob Stanley and James.

They have been on a vacation trip to the West Coast and in Colorado, and came here from Floydada, where they visited relatives. The children remained there while Rev. and Mrs. Oliver came here.

After leaving Floydada, the Oliver's visited her father in Stanton en route to Houston, where they have been in residence. They will leave the states August 18, to fly back to their work in Corrente.

COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:

Scientists have made considerable progress during the past few years in controlling bloat in cattle. It can be successfully controlled by the use of products now available provided they are used in accordance with the manufacturer's recommendation.

Although present day knowledge pertaining to bloat is important, some facts remain unknown. Clinical cases of bloat may vary in severity. Treatment is not always satisfactory and surgery may be required for severe cases.

Frothy bloat which is usually present in cattle pastured on legumes is more difficult to treat than the dry bloat more commonly seen in cattle on dry feed.

Present day products are effective but good management and commonsense prevention are always in order.

1. Start bloat prevention medication several days in advance. Follow the manufacturer's directions and make sure that each animal has a daily intake of the medication equal to the recommended dose.

2. Check all cattle at frequent intervals and be prepared for treatment.

3. Call a veterinarian at the first sign of trouble.

4. Keep a supply of bloat preparations on hand at all times and know how to use them.

Bloat is a known killer. Rapid death loss is one of the distinguishing characteristics of bloat. During an emergency every minute counts; therefore, have the needed equipment and materials handy and ready for use.

Like most spiders, the black widow is shy and retiring; however, they will bite when their web is disturbed or squeezed when accidentally picked up.

Learn to recognize this spider because their bite can cause a lot of trouble. They frequent many places around and in the home, including garages, cellars, furniture, ventilators, rainpouts, and

electric, gas and water meter boxes as well as other spots where it is not likely to be disturbed.

The female is usually jet black, although some apparently mature females may have light streaks on the abdomen, a characteristic of the immature forms. The lower side of the abdomen almost always exhibits two reddish triangles, resembling an hour glass in shape. The reddish mark may be irregular in shape and may even be spotted in appearance. The overall length of the female is approximately one and one-half inches.

The male is characterized by having light streaks on the abdomen and is about one and one-eighth inches long.

The bite of the black widow feels like a pin prick. In some instances it may not be felt. Usually, a slight local swelling and two red spots with local redness indicate where the bite occurred. The symptoms consist of abdominal pains, rise in blood pressure, nausea, profuse perspiration, leg cramps, tremors, loss of muscle tone and vomiting. When the toxin reaches the respiratory center, difficulty in breathing and prostration may occur. In case of bite, the victim

should immediately consult a physician and, if possible, take along the spider responsible for the bite for positive identification.

Frequent cleaning in closets and cellars and other hiding places will decrease the number of spiders in these areas. Spraying or dusting outside the home with lindane, dieldrin, dichlorvos (DDVP) or chlordane is recommended. Follow the directions on the manufacturer's label for mixing sprays.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (SJR32)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 1-e to read as follows:

"Section 1-e. '1. From and after December 31, 1978, no State ad valorem taxes shall be levied upon any property within this State for State purposes except the tax levied by Article VII, Section 17, for certain institutions of higher learning.'

"2. The State ad valorem tax authorized by Article VII, Section 3, of this Constitution shall be imposed at the following rates on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation for the years 1968 through 1974:

On January 1, 1968, Thirty-five Cents (35c); on January 1, 1969, Thirty Cents (30c); on January 1, 1970, Twenty-five Cents (25c); on January 1, 1971, Twenty Cents (20c); on January 1, 1972, Fifteen Cents (15c); on January 1, 1973, Ten Cents (10c); on January 1, 1974, Five Cents (5c); and thereafter no such tax for school purposes shall be levied and collected. An amount sufficient to provide free text books for the use of children attending the public free schools of this State shall be set aside from any revenues deposited in the Available School Fund, provided, however, that should such funds be insufficient, the deficit may be met by appropriation from the general funds of the State.

"3. The State ad valorem tax of Two Cents (2c) on the One Hundred Dollars valuation levied by Article VII, Section 17, of this Constitution shall not be levied after December 31, 1976. At any time prior to December 31, 1976, the Legislature may establish a trust fund solely for the benefit of the widows of Confederate veterans and such Texas Rangers and their widows as are eligible for retirement or disability pensions under the provisions of Article XVI, Section 66, of this Constitution, and after such fund is established the ad valorem tax levied by Article VII, Section 17, shall not thereafter be levied.

"4. Unless otherwise provided by the Legislature, after December 31, 1976 all delinquent State ad valorem taxes together with penalties and interest thereon, less lawful costs of collection, shall be used to secure bonds issued for permanent improvements at institutions of higher learning, as authorized by Article VII, Section 17, of this Constitution.

"5. The fees paid by the State for both assessing and collecting State ad valorem taxes shall not exceed two per cent (2%) of the State taxes collected. This subsection shall be self-executing."

Sec. 2. That Article III, Section 51, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Section 51. The Legislature shall have no power to make any grant or authorize the making of any grant of public moneys to any individual, association of individuals, municipal or other corporations whatsoever; provided, however, the Legislature may grant aid to indigent and disabled Confederate soldiers and sailors under such regulations and limitations as may be deemed by the Legislature as expedient, and to their widows in indigent circumstances under such regulations and limitations as may be deemed by the Legislature as expedient; provided that the provisions of this Section shall not be construed so as to prevent the grant of aid in cases of public calamity."

Sec. 3. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment continuously reducing State ad valorem property taxes and abolishing all State ad valorem property taxes after December 31, 1978, except the tax levied by Article VII, Section 17, for certain institutions of higher learning." Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER TEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR50)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding Section 1-j to read as follows:

"Section 1-j. Notwithstanding the provisions of Section 1 of this article, the Legislature may provide for the refund of the tax paid on the first sale of cigars and tobacco products in this state which are subsequently sold at retail within the corporate limits of Texarkana, Texas, or any incorporated city or town in Texas as contiguous to Texarkana."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on

the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (HJR20)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 11a, Article VII, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 11a. In addition to the bonds enumerated in Section 11 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, the Board of Regents of the University of Texas may invest the Permanent University Fund in securities, bonds or other obligations issued, insured, or guaranteed in any manner by the United States Government, or any of its agencies, and in such bonds, debentures, or obligations, and preferred and common stocks issued by corporations, associations, or other institutions as the Board of Regents of the University of Texas System may deem to be proper investments for said funds; provided, however, that not more than one per cent (1%) of said fund shall be invested in the securities of any one (1) corporation, nor shall more than five per cent (5%) of the voting stock of any one (1) corporation be owned; provided, further, that stocks eligible for purchase shall be restricted to stocks of companies incorporated within the United States which have paid dividends for five (5) consecutive years or longer immediately prior to the date of purchase and which, except for bank stocks and insurance stocks, are listed upon an exchange registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission or its successors.

"In making each and all of such investments said Board of Regents shall exercise the judgment and care under the circumstances then prevailing which men of ordinary prudence, discretion, and intelligence exercise in the management of their own affairs, not

in regard to speculation but in regard to the permanent disposition of their funds, considering the probable income therefrom as well as the probable safety of their capital.

"The interest, dividends and other income accruing from the investments of the Permanent University Fund, except the portion thereof which is appropriated by the operation of Section 18 of Article VII for the payment of principal and interest on bonds or notes issued thereunder, shall be subject to appropriation by the Legislature to accomplish the purposes declared in Section 10 of Article VII of this Constitution.

"This amendment shall be self-enacting, and shall become effective upon its adoption, provided, however, that the Legislature shall provide by law for full disclosure of all details concerning the investments in corporate stocks and bonds and other investments authorized herein."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment providing for investment of the Permanent University Fund by the Board of Regents of the University of Texas in certain types of securities within the prudent man rule."
