Insull, President Of Company, Avers Program To Go On

Middle West Utilities Co. Had Formerly Cancelled Contract For Work Along Colorado River.

MADE DECISION WHEN WATER FIGHT RAGED

With Amicable Settlement Of Difficulty, Progress In Development Of Power Will Be Made.

(By Associated Press) ABILENE, March 22.—A statement telegraphed Thursday night to the news from the Middle West Utilities company of Chicago, announced that company's intention of proceeding with its projected waterpower development on the Colorado river in Texas as an evidence of the faith that company places in Texas.

Martin J. Insull, president of the company, stated that "if no additional agitation is raised in the state against the development of the Colorado river by his company, he is disposed to reconsideration of the project, in spite of the fact that he does not now and never has regarded the project as particularly attractive."

The reconsideration alluded to, Mr. Insull indicated, was his formal withdrawal from the project, after objections had been interposed by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce to power permits on the Colorado granted to the Middle West Utilities company. Acceptance of a modified proposition to the West Texas Chamber from the syndicate, in which the latter agreed to scale down its water permits from 1,250,000 to 500,000 acre feet annually, led the Middle West Utilities company to reconsider its cancellation.

Gallows Yawns For George McDonald

Slayer of Taxi Driver Jokes With Jailers and Expresses Desire to Have Execution Soon As Possible.

VALLEYFIELD, Que., March 22.—George McDonald, who was hanged in his cell today while in the prison yard the truck-coated hangedman tested the gallows on which McDonald is to die in the morning for murder. The condemned man announced during the day that he had "forgotten" the police officers who brought him to justice. Until his arrival here this morning McDonald had not been told that the death sentence imposed on his young wife, had been commuted to life imprisonment. As he entered the prison through the warden's quarters he scanned the room of cells.

"Is there any?" he asked. "The chaplain of Bordeaux jail, who had accompanied McDonald here from Montreal, admonished him to be courageous and then told him that governmental intervention had saved Mrs. McDonald from the gallows."

"Well, I'm glad of that," McDonald responded and then turned the talk to other matters. The hanging was set for 4:45 o'clock tomorrow morning. As final arrangements were being made, McDonald refused apparently peacefully. Repeatedly, he expressed a desire that the hanging take place with as little delay as possible.

McDonald and his wife were convicted in December of the murder of Adelaide Boachard, a Lachine taxi driver, last July.

Execution Will Be Veiled In Secrecy

VALLEYFIELD, Que., March 22.—The execution tomorrow of George McDonald for the murder of a Lachine taxi driver will be veiled in a secrecy more complete than that attending any hanging in the history of the Dominion. No newspaperman will be permitted to witness the execution, and the only witnesses in addition to the officials will be a doctor and a priest.

Sinclair Must Face Trial Alone, Judge Rules; Delay Vote On Ouster Movement

WASHINGTON, March 22.—(AP)—Without the support of his co-defendant, the aged and ailing Albert B. Fall, Harry F. Sinclair must face trial alone here on April 4 on a charge of conspiracy to defraud the government out of the Teapot Dome naval oil reserve.

Justice Jennings Bailey so decided today in the District of Columbia supreme court, indefinitely postponing the trial of the former interior secretary, severing the two cases and granting the lessee of Teapot Dome a two-days' delay.

Sinclair Horses May Yet Race In New York

NEW YORK, March 22.—(AP)—The colors of Harry F. Sinclair and his Rancocas stable, although barred in Maryland, will be carried this year on New York tracks.

After considering the action of the Maryland racing authorities, the stewards of the Jockey club, controlling turf body in New York, adopted a resolution today stating that it "in no way affected the entries of the Rancocas stable on race courses under the jurisdiction of the Jockey club."

AVIATOR KILLED

Fair Meet Death When Plane Nose Dives

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, March 22.—(AP)—Two aviators were instantly killed at Woodward field here late this afternoon when their plane went into a nose dive and crashed. The plane was piloted by Don Gayer, 22, of Cleveland, Ohio, who was demonstrating it to Marion Merrill, 22, of Provo, Utah. The plane was circling the field at an altitude of 350 feet when it was seen to plunge downward. Field employees rushed from the hangars as the plane hit, and extricated the bodies from the wreckage. Merrill was considering purchase of the plane from Gayer and was a passenger on a test flight when the machine crashed.

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Gang Cycle Ends Chicago "Boss" Is Murdered

CHICAGO, March 22.—(AP)—Gangland's mysterious cycle of charity, rise of power, wealth and political pull and finally violent death was complete today for "Diamond Joe" Esposito, and the police groped unsuccessfully in the dark of Little Italy's usual reliance for one of a dozen reasons they said enemies had for the assassination.

A few doors from his home in the old "Bloody Nineteenth" Ward, now the Twenty-fifth, in which "Diamond Joe" was a candidate for Ward Committee, he was shot down last night by three men who leaped from an automobile and fired fifty-eight slugs into his body.

"It's a wonder he lived so long," remarked Michael Grady, chief of police. "By all the laws of gangland he should have been dead at least ten years ago."

HEARING ON DISASTER

Wide Stream of Water Seen At Dam

LOS ANGELES, March 22.—(AP)—The testimony was given this afternoon at the Los Angeles county coroner's inquest into the St. Francis dam disaster that nine days before the dam collapsed, a stream of water three to four feet wide, was washing down the hill on the west side of the dam.

Richard Bennett of San Francisco, who operated a concrete mixing machine when the dam was being built, testified that he visited the dam site three days before it went out, seeing a dead dealing flood into the Santa Clara river valley, and saw the stream of water. When he was questioned concerning rumors about the danger of the dam breaking, Bennett said he "had often heard them but never had heard any reason advanced for the gossip."

INDUSTRY STABILIZED

Declare Wide Fluctuations In Oil Trade Stopped

NEW YORK, March 22.—(AP)—Stabilization of crude oil prices has brought an end to wide fluctuations which have been common in the past, the Lamp, official organ of the Standard Oil company of New Jersey asserts in its current issue, circulated today. Important price movements in the oil market more slowly, the publication says, and it may be that spectacular changes in prices will no longer be experienced.

JURY DISCHARGED

Unable To Agree In Banditry Case

SAN ANTONIO, March 22.—(AP)—A jury which heard the trial of Claude Brasher, charged with murder in connection with a filling station holdup, was discharged here today after 24 hours of deliberation had failed to obtain a verdict.

Brasher was charged with having driven the car in which Victor Turner, a bandit, rode to a filling station in Turner and was killed. Brasher admitted driving the car but said he had no idea the robbery was contemplated.

TULSA, Okla., March 22.—(AP)—A \$1,000,000 oil lease in Hardin county, Texas, which has been in the courts since November 20, 1922, has been terminated with the McMan Oil and Gas company the Victor and the Gilliland oil company. Both are Tulsa companies.

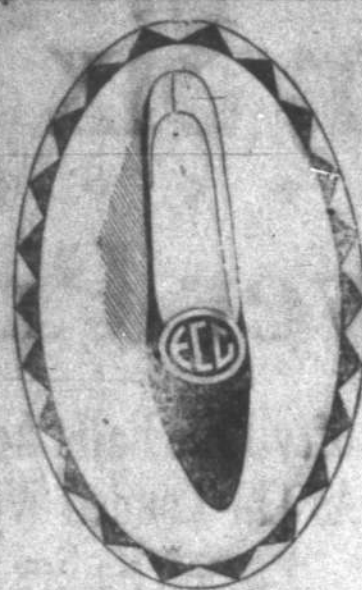

Chocolate Ice-Box Cake

Thirty lady fingers, 2 squares (2 cups) butter chocolate, 1-2 cup granulated sugar, 4 tablespoons water, 3-4 cup butter, 13-4 cup sugar, 4 eggs, 1 cup whipping cream, 1-2 teaspoon vanilla.

Cut chocolate in small pieces and cut in top of double boiler. Add water and granulated sugar and cook over hot water until perfectly blended and melted. Add heavy cream, the well beaten yolks of eggs. Cook, stirring constantly, until thick and smooth. Remove from heat and cool. Cream butter and beat in 11-4 cups confectioner's sugar. When creamy add cooled mixture and stir well. Fold in whites of eggs beaten until stiff with halves of lady fingers, rounded side down. Place them close together, filling open spaces with pieces of lady fingers. Pour in the chocolate mixture with remaining lady fingers and let stand in ice box for 24 hours. When ready to serve, remove side of form and place cake with bottom of form on a large plate. Whip cream until firm, sweeten with remaining confectioner's sugar and 1-2 cups vanilla. Cover top of cake with whipped cream and sprinkle with chopped nuts and minced candied cherries. (Copyright 1928, NEA Service, Inc.)

There's No Chance of Bobby Jones Becoming a Professional But Star Georgian May Shine As Counsellor

Henry Farrell Says Robert May Make \$100,000 Every Year As An Attorney But Not As A Golfer.

By HENRY L. FARRELL, N.E.A. Service Sports Writer

NEW YORK, March 22.—Several years ago a number of prominent professional golfers were one of the point of asking Bobby Jones to be a good sport and either turn professional or confine his activities in championship contests to the amateur events only.

It was their contention that Jones in the pursuit of a game as an amateur was making them look bad in a business upon which many of them depended for a living and if he didn't want to capitalize his skill he should not keep others from getting the best price for their services.

Two years ago, in Scotland, when Jones was knocking the spectators pop-eyed with a series of astounding performances in the British Open championship, a number of pros were discussing in the clubhouse the effect of Jones' golf upon the American professional game.

The American pros pointed out to their British brethren that if Jones continued for a number of years to toy around with the professionals in the big British and American Open events that the pay for their profession would be reduced until they would be almost in the class with laborers.

"We can't get the fee for instruction that we could at one time because we are not as good as Jones," the Americans pointed out. "We can't get the pay for exhibition matches that we did at one time because the public feels that no match in which Jones does not appear is an outstanding golf match."

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"Yes," one of them suggested, "he may retire from everything but the American Open championship and then he will go out and win that with some kind of a sensational score that will make us look foolish."

Practically all of the professionals, most of whom have not had the opportunity for a career that was afforded to Jones, think he is foolish in not turning professional before he passes the peak of his game. But he may not pass the peak for years, even if he does seem to have reached it now.

Gene Sarazen, who ought to know something about the business end of the game, estimates that Jones could make \$100,000 a year as a professional in the next three years, and if his game had left him by that time he would have enough money to keep him from want.

Sarazen and some of the prominent American pros make from \$15,000 to \$25,000 a year, and their life certainly is not a hard one. Despite all the temptations and suggestions that may be offered to him, there isn't a chance that Jones ever will turn professional.

His golf will help him in his legal business and there are more lawyers making from \$25,000 to \$100,000 a year, year in and year out, than there are professional golfers at that pay.

SENATOR REED

Without intending to advance the fortunes of any man for the presidency, or even considering the political side of it, and discussing the "come back" of Senator Reed from the standpoint of personality, one is bound to concede that no man of this century has overcome and had so much to overcome as Reed of Missouri.

He may not now or ever be president, but he is a remarkable man—loyally loved by his friends and as cordially hated by his enemies.

He doesn't know any half-way ground and never has, yet he does not fight with venom or hatred. He concedes other men the right to their opinions. His creed is "to differ in opinion is nothing, to be honest is everything."

He does not shape his creed to fit the times, but says what he thinks expresses his opinion on a public question without equivocation, even if he knows it means to face a hostile demonstration by his auditors—the rotten eggs at Ardmore a few years back meant no more than roses would have meant—he neither fears the eggs or is flattered by the roses.

He is a wet, yet in the sense that he believes it to be a question of local nature, but he is a lawyer and a thorough American who would fight to the last ditch to preserve inviolate every paragraph of the National Constitution and enforce the laws of the land, and instead of any attempt to placate those who differ with him, he does all he knows how to get them mad and keep them mad. He invites the opposition of his enemies far more than he courts the support of friends.

He fought the principles set forth by Woodrow Wilson when it seemed to mean his eternal doom politically, because he stood condemned by the leaders of his party in the nation, and then his own state party leaders took it up and disowned and discredited him, until he must have felt like a man without a country or party, but he stood pat and the same men who scorned him then cheered him yesterday.

Few such characters have ever lived in this country before—there have been men fearless and outspoken, but they sometimes remained silent rather than create disturbance—they have been diplomats, who seemed to know when and where to talk and sometimes say what they desired in language that did not always challenge debate or dissension.

Not so with Reed.

He says what he says in the most emphatic manner. He could no more handle the prohibition question as Herbert Hoover handled it than he could fly.

Whether these characteristics ever will or ever should make him president or not, we do not know—whether he is to be a fighter like Blaine and Conkling and Tilden and never wear the insignia of the highest office, we do not know, but we do know when history is written his name will appear on the fresh pages as one of the outstanding characters of the 20th century.

SAVED FROM THE NOOSE

Doris McDonald, the American girl who became infatuated with McDonald, who afterward proved to be a bandit, has been saved from the noose in Canada, "by the King's mercy." She forsook her husband and two babies in New York, and went on a wild chase with this outlaw, and it was first claimed that the two with another companion held up, murdered and robbed a driver of a taxicab. The other companion has never been apprehended, but officers are looking for him. The date for the execution had been set for Friday when the stay of execution was issued for the woman; no stay has yet been issued for McDonald and he may die Friday. Both had been convicted and both had confessed, and McDonald, after his conviction refused to talk. The woman repudiated her confession and claimed it was made to save this man she loved, but he said never a word until Monday,

when he made a complete confession, exonerating the woman from any part in the crime. It was then the minister of justice acted, staying the execution, and asking the King for a commutation of sentence to that the woman will be granted a new trial, and with the additional evidence may be set free entirely. The case simply emphasizes how careful girls and young women should be in making friends. This fellow McDonald had made a good appearance. He drove a fine automobile—wore expensive clothes and had plenty of money to spend. He met the woman at a dance and she became infatuated with him; clandestine meetings followed. He urged her to leave her home and go away with him, he offered her wealth and splendor and compared the life he could give her to that of living a drab life as the wife of a mechanic with two children to look after and care for—yellow gold for children, husband and home and the woman left them all. Her end is the end of every woman who listens to a man when he seeks to lure her away from honor and duty—it has been ever thus—it leads to nothing in the end except broken hearts, ruined firesides, disgrace, dishonor and death. Sometimes these clandestine escapades go on happily for a time, while the wealth and glamour last, but when the drab days come, when the merry dance is over and life's realities are faced, then comes the end, but it is always the same. The woman who sells her soul, her honor and her home for glittering jewels, fine raiment and a gay jocular time never gets value received—she always suffers, there is no exception and no escape from it. It is the primrose path of dalliance that leads to the eternal bon-fire. Doris McDonald may escape the noose and the prison. She may even come back to her home and her children; but the memory of her dishonor and disgrace will always follow her. It is the law of compensation as fixed as that of the Medes and Persians.

DID HARDING PARTICIPATE?

A great many people have believed that President Warren Harding's death from pneumonia was really brought about by worry and fear over the disgraceful acts of some of his most trusted lieutenants. It was the fear of disclosure of his being linked up with doubtful transactions that hastened the end. Very few people have ever believed the dead president was willfully corrupt, but was weak and easily led into transactions made by his associates, and that he was the unsolicited recipient of some of the tainted Sinclair oil money. It was pointed out that his paper, the Marion Star, brought \$380,000, a sum far greater than any paper of that size and importance ever sold for before, and it was bought by his former employees, men who had never been possessed of any great wealth. So, now comes an investigation of the estate of the former president by the United States Senate to find out how many of the oil bonds or liberty bonds, representing Sinclair bonds were used in the transactions. It looks like there is no end to which this oil scandal may not reach, it has touched some of the highest ranking men in public life today, and the fact that Senator Borah is raising a fund to pay back what was used in the republican campaign, shows that even the best republicans of the country have repudiated the acts of their fellow republicans in accepting this tainted money for campaign purposes. This disgrace is not merely a political disgrace while it may have been inaugurated to discredit republican leaders, it is sure to do more than that, because republicans are joining whole heartedly in the efforts to bring out all the facts. And when all the facts are brought out and bared to public view, it is going to be a national disgrace because it will ultimately reflect discredit and dishonor upon this nation.

SOME MORE POLITICS

It is reasonably certain that the Congressional Agricultural Committee will report favorably on the revised McNary-Haugen farm relief bill, and that inside of two weeks both the House and the Senate will pass the bill.

But will it ever be a law? Whether Mr. Coolidge will sign it or veto it or let it become a law by neither signing it or vetoing it no one on this earth knows except Mr. Coolidge; it is not like him to say what he is going to do, and he may "choose" to sign it.

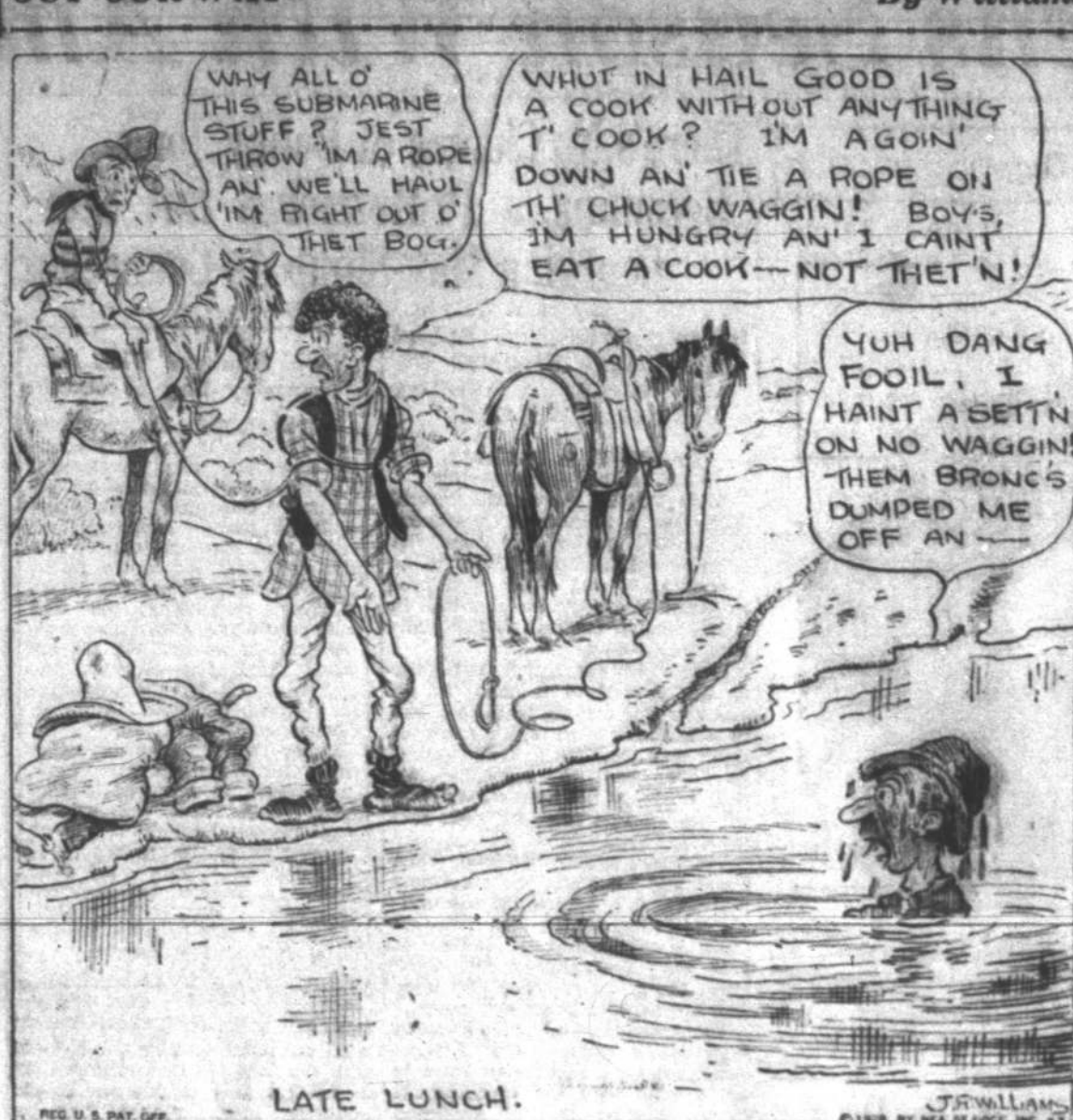
But it is going to make political history. If it does not become a law the only hope the republicans will have to redeem the party with the farmers is by nominating Frank O. Lowden for president and reconsecrating the republican party to a new birth in the matter of federal aid for agriculture.

This brings about a peculiar condition. Lowden favors the McNary-Haugen bill and is going to do what he can to get it passed, although if it becomes a law and his chances for the presidency are very much diminished.

Hoover opposes the bill, it is said, bitterly, but may have done what he could to prevent it becoming a law, although as a law it would greatly enhance his chances for the presidency.

So no man knows what is to be the fate of farm aid legislation at this session of Congress, but everybody who knows anything about the situation at Washington knows that upon its defeat or success depends much, and that some tremendous political history is going to follow whatever is the fate of the McNary-Haugen bill.

OPINIONS

FIRST LINE OF DEFENSE.

The moral to be drawn from the reports of the National Crime Commission is that crime-prevention is a local problem. There is need, of course, of exchange of information between States and of co-operation in capturing criminals who cross state lines, but the first line of defense is the police department. Baltimore makes an excellent showing the statistics published by the commission, in which comparison is made between number of arrests to crimes committed in certain cities in this country and in England, Wales and Canada. It is to the discredit of American cities that so few of them collect data on the

subject from which comparison can be made. Baltimore is relieved with Cleveland as the only two American cities that approach the record made in England in apprehending criminals.

The Crime Commission is doing a good work in driving home to this country its deplorable inefficiency in bringing lawbreakers to justice. There are defects in our court procedure, it points out, and laxity in the work of many prosecuting officials, but in the final analysis the most important agency in the war against crime is the policeman. There is nothing new or startling in this finding. We knew before that the hare must be caught before it can be cooked. The importance of the Crime Commission's reports is in the emphasis on where responsibility rests for undetected and unpunished lawlessness.—Baltimore Sun.

BACK-HANDED

When the lower house of the Wisconsin legislature, some weeks ago, went on record as endorsing Governor Alfred E. Smith's candidacy for the presidency it occasioned a good deal of surprise all over the country. The Wisconsin senate promptly killed the resolution, but the wonder still grows that an assembly rated as overwhelmingly Republican should go to the trouble of endorsing a man in another party. Smith's wetness might be supposed to have something to do with it, and yet that could not have been the whole reason. Just what that main reason was no one seemed able to answer. But now the Journal-News, of Racine, Wis., comes forward with this suggestion: "Probably the real reason why the assembly gave a vote for Smith was because enough of its members are hostile to the present administration and saw a good opportunity to give Coolidge a whiff." It may be that the answer is there.—Philadelphia Record.

YOUR HEALTH

BY DR. MORRIS FISHER

It is now generally recognized that vitamins A and D, found principally in cod liver oil, are essential for the growth of the human body and of the greatest importance in sustaining resistance to disease.

Vitamin D has been traced to its source and can now be produced artificially.

Of vitamin A not so much is known. It is a British Medical Research Council in its report (1926-1927) points out that the proportion of vitamin A in the liver fats of the salmon and the halibut are more than one hundred times as rich as cod liver oil.

Use of Liver Fat
The liver fats of the sheep, calf and ox contain ten times as much vitamin A as cod cod liver oil, and from 200 to 1000 times more vitamin A than a good average sample of butter. Vitamin A can therefore be supplied to the diet by the use of liver fat either with butter or oleomargarine, or in some other way. The fats extracted from the liver of animals are entirely free from the unpleasant flavor of fish oil.

Herbivorous animals do not, however, store vitamin D in the liver as do the fish, but vitamin D can now be obtained by irradiating ergosterol.

Loss Through Deficiency
The British Medical Research Council says that there can be no reasonable doubt from all the evidence now available that the great majority of the British public suffers from a deficiency of these essential parts of food.

It says, furthermore, that the cost of this deficiency in human suffering and in economic loss is incalculable but certainly vast. No doubt, the application of the knowledge now available regarding the places in which vitamins A and D are to be had soon will be applied practically to the great benefit of the human race.

COUNTY SCHOOL LAND

WAS LEASED MONDAY

The Hale County Commissioners at their regular court session Monday entered into a contract with Rex Stegall wherein the county leased to him five labors of land some cultivated at \$250 per acre and the rest grass land at ten cents an acre.

The labors are the south tier of league 168 of the Hale County school lands located in Bailey County. The contract is to terminate January 1, 1929, and is subject to cancellation at expiration of sixty days from the date of the contract. One-half of the lease price is to be paid when the land is surveyed and the remainder August 1, 1929.

The constitution of Texas set aside 17,712 acres for each of the counties of the State for the establishment of county permanent funds. This land could be disposed of at the will of the counties, the proceeds going into a permanent fund for the maintenance of the schools only the interest being available for use.

The total value of such funds is now approximately twelve million dollars yielding an annual revenue of about \$750,000. There is a great variation in the value of the county permanent funds at present. Some of the counties sold their lands early at low prices or invested in poor securities, in other counties the revenue from these funds is very appreciable in a few instances approaching the state appropriation.

The Hale County school land was located in what is now Bailey County. Four leagues or approximately 190 labors was in the original grant of which there remains 10 labors in league 168.

From the school land that has been sold the county receives an income of approximately \$9,000 a year \$14,000 of the principal derived has been invested in Municipal bonds bearing five and one-half and six percent interest. There is \$1,690 of the school money deposited in banks and the county holds \$140,000 worth of notes against the property which brings an average of about six percent interest.—Hale County Herald.

The counties that had commissioners with foresight enough to hold on to the land, are the counties that today are in good shape financially. Their schools are among the best and there is not a continual cry for funds with which to operate the schools. Lubbock county had the same amount of land as Hale which was located by one of the counties of the North Plains and was sold for a very small sum, \$130 an acre or possibly less, and the money was soon spent, and thousands upon thousands of dollars in addition to that.

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Misinformation From Garages To Tourists Is Charged Against Local Concerns; C. C. Has Road Bureau

Facilities of Department Placed At Disposal Of Tourists As Well As All Local People.

Complaints have come back to the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce on a number of occasions in the past several months from both tourists and tourist bureaus charging Lubbock filling stations and garages with giving out misinformation as to highway connections out of Lubbock.

Chamber of Commerce officials are anxious to assist in cutting these complaints to a minimum. Officials of the organization have declared. These mistakes make them and knockers out of the tourist. Mistakes of this character do not tend to cause displeasure among tourists and tourist bureaus and other tourists in the South Plains section that have worked shoulder to shoulder with Lubbock in so many projects of mutual interest.

C. C. of Tourist Bureau. In order to be of assistance to local filling stations, garages and other concerns who direct tourists as well as to the tourist themselves, the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce maintains a tourist information bureau. Road information is received in regular weekly bulletins from the leading tourist bureaus over the Southwest and an accurate check up on the condition of the highways in the South Plains and in the Southwest section is kept.

The officials of the Union Bus Terminal have been cooperating with the Chamber of Commerce in assisting the bureau to keep in close touch with conditions on the highways in this section. Any concern of individual who is not sure about the best route from Lubbock to some distant city should call the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce or refer the tourist to the city hall.

Senate Calls On Power of Arrest

Treasurer of Republican State Committee In Pennsylvania Will Be Forced To Give Testimony

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, March 22.—For a second time at this session the senate will be asked tomorrow to issue its warrant for the arrest of a witness, before one of its committees. He is Thomas W. Cunningham of Philadelphia, treasurer of the Pennsylvania republican state committee, who refused to answer certain questions put to him by the Reed slush fund committee in 1926.

In reporting Cunningham's refusal to the senate today Senator King, democrat, Utah, introduced a resolution for Cunningham's arrest and will ask tomorrow for its immediate consideration. Adoption was regarded as a foregone conclusion in view of the speedy manner in which the senate voted to arrest Robert W. Stewart, chairman of the board of the Standard Oil Company, of Indiana, after he had refused to answer questions in the Teapot Dome inquiry in January.

Cunningham, who is clerk of a court in Philadelphia, and one of those prominent in supporting William S. Vare, republican, in his fight for a senate seat, refused today to tell the Reed committee the source of \$60,000 in cash, which he contributed to Vare's primary campaign in 1926. His salary as clerk is \$8,000 a year and members of the committee expressed curiosity as to how he could have accumulated such a sum by savings and be able to give it to a political campaign committee.

Intelligent effort to improve its conditions. The governor paid his respects to "the sturdy men who set the pace in Texas development, and who are setting the pace for other industries in solving their own problems. The governor avoided political references in his address. Unalterable opposition to the

Hoch-Capper bill and any bills of similar nature was voiced in a resolution which stated that it was believed that such legislation would be detrimental to the live stock industry and would unnecessarily restrict the right to sell live stock.

Oppose Box Bill

Opposition to the Box Bill, which would extend the quota restrictions of the present immigration act to the Western Hemisphere also was expressed in a resolution. Establishment of a \$25,000 re-

volving fund by the state to be used by Texas A. and M. college in testing the efficiency of Texas rations in the finishing or fattening of live stock was proposed in another resolution.

Ask Tariff Revision

The association also asked that the tariff be revised to afford protection to the producer of hides and that further revision be made to enable the president to advance the tariff on beef products and particularly canned beef, so as to ef-

fectually diminish the volume of such imports.

The marketing agency known as the Cattle Raisers and Producers' Commission company of Fort Worth was endorsed by the association.

The request of Secretary of Agriculture W. M. Jardine for congressional appropriation in order that the best available talent may be obtained to protect the live stock of America from the menace of foreign and domestic diseases was approved by the cattlemen.

Laud Jardine Order
The cattlemen also voted to collect 20 cents on every car of live stock shipped, to be used by the National Live Stock and Meat Board in promoting the consumption of meat and counteracting the propaganda of competing interests. Secretary Jardine's order against the importation of fresh meat from countries where foot and mouth disease is known to exist was lauded in the resolutions.

The work of the biological survey, bureau of entomology and other government agencies was commended by the cattlemen.

Resolutions were also unanimously adopted thanking every citizen of Amarillo and the members of the Panhandle Live Stock Association for the entertainment provided and the hospitality shown to the visitors.

D. B. Carlton, convention manager of the Fort Worth Association of Commerce, presented an invitation to the cattlemen to meet in that city in 1930 and C. C. Slaughter of Dallas invited the cattlemen to come to Dallas at that time.

Committee To Discuss Problems of Marketing

AMARILLO, March 22. (AP)—Marketing problems of the cattle raiser will be thoroughly discussed by a special committee of 100 from the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers association at a meeting in San Antonio within the next two weeks.

At a meeting of the new executive committee here this afternoon the president and secretary were instructed to make all necessary arrangements for the meeting, which is a direct result of the discussion of cooperative marketing at the convention which closed today.

COUSINS RESOLUTION
WASHINGTON, March 22. (AP)—Supporters of Secretary Mellon in the Senate today forced temporary sidetracking of the resolution of Senator Cousins, Republican of Michigan, declaring for the resignation of the secretary after the Michigan senator had launched an attack on the cabinet member.

The resolution was moved to the calendar, where a separate motion and majority vote for consideration is necessary to get it up again, when Senate rules automatically ended discussion after two hours and an effort to gain unanimous consent for an immediate vote failed.

The two-hour debate brought a renewal by the secretary of his charges against the secretary contained in the preamble of his resolution presented Tuesday, and a sturdy defense by Senator Reed, Republican, Pennsylvania a close personal friend of Mr. Mellon.

Moses Makes Protest
Senator Moses, Republican, New Hampshire, got into the arena long enough to protest that the Cousins move was a continuation of a "personal feud with the secretary." This went unanswered by Cousins who has fought the treasury on tax matters during much of Mr. Mellon's seven years' administration.

Before the close of the Senate's so-called "morning hour" at 2 o'clock today an end to the discussion in favor of unfinished business, Senator Reed moved to refer the resolution to the finance committee and announced he was ready for an immediate vote.

Senator Morris, Republican, Nebraska, sought unanimous consent finally that the resolution go over until tomorrow without prejudice, but that proposal and another effort to go ahead with it today met with objection, and Senator Odell, Republican, Nevada, presiding officer at the time, sent the resolution to the calendar of business.

Blake was taken to a hospital where physicians said he was in a "very grave" condition. He was weakened from loss of blood, and physicians said that even if he recovers from the wound he may lose the use of his left arm.

Women Arrested.
The two women and A. H. Tubbs, their brother and uncle of Miss Montebello, were arrested on charges of assault with intent of murder and taken to the Jefferson county jail at Birmingham "because of crowded jail conditions at Columbia."

Both women are widely known in Shelby and Dallas counties. Citizens of Selma, where they reside, said the attack evidently was the outcome of the intense grief under which they had labored and offered to meet any bond that might be set for them.

Police and county officials refused to allow the women to be seen.

Taking note of the general excitement at Columbia, Governor

Graves in Montgomery, offered to dispatch national guardsmen to forestall any possible disturbance. Outside aid, however, was declined by acting Sheriff J. J. Faulkner.

Special Grand Jury.
Attorney General McCall said he had asked Judge E. E. Lyman who presided at Blake's trial to call a special session of the Shelby county grand jury to investigate the attack.

The charge of which Blake was acquitted was that he fired the shot that killed Miss Montebello as she rode alone in her automobile along the Montgomery highway last November 14.

The state introduced testimony to show that Blake and Officer W. D. Farmer of Calera police department "made improper remarks" about the girl and suspected her of having whiskey in her possession. Relatives and friends of the girl testified she had not been drinking on the day she was killed. The defense contended the girl committed suicide after Blake and Farmer had arrested her for reckless driving.

Late tonight Blake's condition was reported slightly improved. The hospital was under police guard.

visited the subcommittee proceedings on the strength of his membership on the senate agriculture committee, of which it is an offshoot. Caraway turned the Marsh cross-examination into his own cross questioning of Miller once or twice as the challenge being made in behalf of Clayton to almost every charge of implication Marsh has made against him did not get over a great deal of ground.

It did serve, however, to put Marsh on record as admitting that he was wrong in alleging that Clayton cornered the New York market in cotton futures in the Marsh position of 1923, and also as saying that he had no definite knowledge to back his charge that the Houston firm had borrowed \$70,000,000 from the War Finance corporation prior to 1925 in putting through overseas cotton shipments of many thousands of bales.

As to his admission of error on the March 1923 futures transactions, the witness insisted that he merely had been mistaken as to the month involved and that inspection of market records for other months of that year would sustain his charges in substance. The committee plans to make such an inspection.

Miller gave tentative figures on Clayton's borrowings from the Finance Corporation, saying that the Houston firm's transactions represented about half of an \$8,000,000 cotton shipping loan in 1923 and a similar share of a loan of \$4,750,000 the following year.

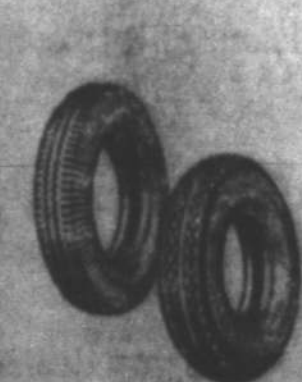

Lindbergh Stars As Solons' Pilot

More Than Hundred Members of Congress, and Government Officials Taken For Flights Over Capital.

(By the Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, March 22.—Col. Charles A. Lindbergh today stayed on the ground just about long enough to jump from one plane to another, spending the rest of the time showing the sights of Washington to more than a hundred congressmen, members of their families and government officials.

The army's Fokker and the navy's Ford ship, both triple motored cabin models, together made nearly a score of trips with Lindbergh at the controls, carrying the legislators over the capitol, Arlington cemetery and the Washington monument.

Several thousand persons swarmed over the field, seeking by fair means or foul to be included in the list prepared by Assistant Secretary of Commerce MacCracken. He craved the spirit of the crowd was enhanced by the arrival of five bombing planes from Langley field, Virginia, and man-of-war of other army and navy planes.

The flights went off without a hitch, except that at one time Lindbergh's plane stuck in the mud while taking off. The passengers, among whom were Representative Taber, New York, and Shallenber-

Successor to Spirit of St. Louis Has Self-Starter, and All the 'Trimmings'

NEW YORK, March 22.—(AP)—A luxurious new airplane, with nickel plated motor, self starter and other conveniences lacking in the Spirit of St. Louis, will be ready for Colonel Chas. A. Lindbergh by April 1.

William Mankey, chief engineer for the Mahoney Aircraft company, builders of the Spirit of St. Louis, has divulged the details of the new plane, which was designed by the flying colonel himself.

It will have the same wing-spread of his famous transatlantic plane and something of the same appearance, but will differ in other details.

It will have accommodations for three passengers in addition to the pilot and will have a speed of 120 miles an hour. The pilot will have a clear view

ahead in contrast to the Spirit of St. Louis. The interior finish will be the last word in airplane luxury. The seats will be deep-cushioned leather chairs and the instrument board will be of mahogany.

The nickel plated motor is probably the most beautiful of its kind ever built. It is a Wright Whirlwind of 220 horsepower and was the gift of its builders. Other parts of the plane were also gifts from their builders to Lindbergh.

DAILY MARKETS

WALL STREET

NEW YORK, March 22. (AP)—The stock market today was a little more active than it has been for some time. The market was a little more active than it has been for some time. The market was a little more active than it has been for some time.

Total sales reached 4,007,300 shares, or nearly 90,000 above the previous high record established on March 12.

Net declines in the active issues ran from 1 to 8 points although final quotations also disclosed a sprinkling of gains, a few of which ranged from 3 to 4 1/4 points.

Trading, which originated with bear traders, presumably was based on the speculative belief that stocks had passed from strong to weak hands in the recent violent upswing and that the rapidity of the rise had weakened the market's technical position.

There was a slight weakness in the Federal Reserve brokers' loans also were an important factor in the liquidating movement.

The actual figures, published after the close of the market, showed an increase of \$22,500,000 bringing the total to \$2,772,714,000. In view of the wild speculation last week, the gain was much smaller than was generally expected.

PORT WORTH LIVESTOCK

PORT WORTH, March 22. (AP)—A moderate supply of livestock was on the market here today with values holding about steady on all classes except steers which showed a slight weakness. Steers ranged from 10.25 to 11.25, cows, 7.75 to 8.75, canners 4.50 to 5.00, cutters 5.00 to 5.50, bulls 5.50 to 7.00, yearlings 12.00 to 13.50 and calves up to 12.75.

Trading in sheep was steady with fat lambs making 12.50 and wethers 8.10.

Hogs were steady to 10c higher. The top was 8.10 with the bulk ranging from 7.00 to 7.95. Sows sold from 6.75 to 7.00 and pigs 5.50 to 6.00.

Wool. BOSTON, March 22. (AP)—Spotted trading in fine domestic wools is being done. Graded territory French combed 94's and fiber wools are moving at an estimated scoured basis of 1.07 to 1.12. The clothing class is bringing around 1.55, scoured basis. Sales of contracted fine wool for future delivery are being reported.

NEW YORK COTTON. NEW YORK, March 22. (AP)—Early advances of a few points were followed by reactions in the cotton market today under selling attributed to the influence of better weather reports and talk of an easier technical position after recent advances. May contracts sold off from 19.45 to 19.25 but recovered most of the loss, closing at 19.36 or net unchanged. The general market closed steady, net 3 points lower to 5 points higher, except for August and September, which showed net losses of 7 to 8 points.

The opening was steady at a decline of 1 to 3 points under selling by recent buyers and local or southern selling which may have been promoted by the rather indifferent showing of early Liverpool cables. These comparatively small initial offerings were soon absorbed by trade buying or covering, and the market steadied up on reports that further shipments were pending from the local stock, and of a high-

er market for Egyptian cotton at Liverpool and Alexandria.

March advanced to 19.35, or 3 points net higher. Later month showed net gains of 4 to 9 points, October selling at 18.95.

There may have been some selling for a reaction based on the extent of the advance which had carried prices up about 2 to 2 1/2 cents a pound from the low levels touched at the beginning of last month, or on the reports of clear and warmer weather in the south. March eased off to 19.20 or 12 points net lower and October sold down to 18.25, net losses of about 8 to 12 points on the general list, but there appeared to be a little more trade buying at these figures, and rallies followed, new crop months showing net advances at the close.

KANSAS CITY LIVESTOCK

KANSAS CITY, March 22. (AP)—(United States Department of Agriculture)—Cattle: receipts of cattle at the midwestern markets Thursday, estimated at 22,800, was slightly larger than a week ago, but around 1,000 less than the same day last year. Killing classes around the circuit found a moderately good outlet at steady to strong prices.

Hogs: aggregate receipts of hogs at the 11 markets today, totaled 104,000, which was 31,000 less than a week ago, and around 10,000 in excess of a year ago. Trading was featured with a stronger undertone as a rule and prices ranged from steady to 15c higher.

Sheep: receipts totaled 48,900 against 33,472 last Thursday and 37,066 the corresponding day last year. Buyers lost control of lamb prices and strong to higher markets were experienced at all points.

CHICAGO GRAIN. CHICAGO, March 22. (AP)—Buying of wheat against selling of corn did much to send the wheat market up at the last today and to pull corn values down.

Closing quotations on wheat were unsettled, 1-8c to 7-8c net higher, corn 3-8c to 3-4c down, oats at 3-8c decline to 1-4c advance, and provisions 5c to 10 to 12c off.

Despite some upturn in hog values the provision market was responsive to feed grain declines.

COTTONSEED OIL. NEW YORK, March 22. (AP)—The cottonseed oil market was quiet today with narrow price changes and a slightly easier undertone. One crack appeared on the wall of the bedroom of Dwight W. Morrow, the American ambassador, who at the time of the shock was in the drawing room conversing with his guest, Dr. John C. Merriam of the Carnegie Institute. Both men paused in their talk only long enough to note what had happened.

Later when Mr. Morrow went to his bedroom to retire he found a crack half an inch wide from the floor to the ceiling City at 10:20 o'clock last morning. This morning embassy attaches found another crack on one of the outside walls of the residence, half an inch to an inch wide, from the ground to the second story.

VIENNA, March 22. (AP)—Bucharest dispatches to the Vienna newspapers report that the Rumanian government has warned all foreign correspondents that any attempt by them to depict the situation in Rumania as revolutionary would cause their expulsion forthwith.

The demonstrations had as their object the withdrawal of Vintila Bratinaru from the premiership and the installation of John Maniu, the peasant leader, in his place.
