

## Record Attendance At Opening Lamesa Schools Last Monday

Enrollment in the Lamesa Public Schools on Monday was heavier than on the opening date in 1935 by fifty-nine pupils. The 1935 enrollment record was 690 for the elementary and 410 high school pupils for a total of 1100. The elementary school received 751 pupils on opening day this year and 412 applied at high school making the total first day white pupils at 1163.

Additional pupils have been received since but the report on them is not yet available. Some thirty high school pupils were away from home at the Centennial or elsewhere and these are expected to request their subject programs soon.

School activities got underway on Tuesday following the regular schedule. New innovations in the high school for this year include the organization of 'home rooms' for clubs. Each pupil has been placed in a club of his choice and there is a qualified faculty sponsor for each student organization. A portion of each school day is set aside for these pupil activities. The assembly time has been changed from the forenoon to afternoon, now meeting at 2:30 P. M. The first program was given by the high school orchestra directed by Mr. King.

The first football team will be played next week on Friday night when the runners-up in the district championship race last year, the Olton High School team, will meet the Golden Tornadoes on McCollum Field. The Pep Squad and Band are practicing for the opening encounter.

Bargain rate tickets to the first three football games to be played here are now on sale. Full season tickets are not offered this season because of the nature of the contracts with teams. The rules provide that schools may demand a division of receipts and most schools are demanding that type of agreement which makes a division of season tickets receipts too big a problem.

## Well Shut In After Showing Of Oil Is Found At 4,964 Feet

Swabbing the Ray Albaugh No. 1 Robinson oil test in the northwest quarter of section 46, block M. E. L. & R. R. survey, about 18 miles northwest of Lamesa, operators got 45 barrels of oil in two hours, last Sunday morning, 2,500 feet of oil was standing in the hole which is bottomed at 4,964 feet.

The test was shut down temporarily, but it was planned to go into the hole Thursday and clean it out to see if production was in sufficient quantity to justify further tests.

This well is a test well on a block of about 15,000 acres assembled by Ray Albaugh. Two years ago the well was drilled to 4,900 but abandoned as that was the driller's contract to drill to. Recently work was resumed on the test and a show of oil was logged at 4,940-45 feet.

There has been quite a bit of dealing in leases and royalty in and around the test the past week.

## Last Warning To Traffic Violators!

Warnings concerning traffic violations have been issued a number of times by the City Officials, but seemingly to little avail. Below is a list of the traffic regulations you must abide by:

1. Must come to a dead stop at stop signs.
2. Must not park at fire hydrants.
3. Must not double park.
4. Must not drive over 20 miles per hour inside of city limits.
5. Must not turn in middle of block.
6. Must not cut corners.
7. Must not park outside of white lines in center of streets.
8. Must not indulge in any form of reckless driving.

The above regulations also apply to bicycle riders as well as automobile drivers.

## The Rank And File Are For Roosevelt

"When we speak of the rank and file we include the home owners and the farm owners, because the wisdom of Franklin D. Roosevelt's policies has protected the home and farm owner against unfair foreclosure.

"When we speak of the rank and file we include the small banker, because he is no longer at the mercy of the powerful banking institutions and the same insurance which protects his depositors protects him against raids on his bank.

"When we speak of the rank and file we include the business man, who again sees his business paying him a profit and who no longer faces commercial destitution, because a reasonable monetary policy has given the people once more a chance to get a dollar to spend.

"When we speak of the rank and file we include the laborer, who again faces a period of steady employment, because of Roosevelt policies which started up again the wheels of industry, providing jobs for the multitudes.

"When we speak of the rank and file we include honest people generally of all political parties, who are willing to give credit where credit is due; to the man, whose wisdom, determination and patriotic endeavors have ended the greatest depression in the nation's history."

## Crop Reporters Say Dawson County Will Harvest 40,000 Bales

The past week, two prominent cotton buyers of Lubbock have given out their estimate of the crop prospects in the South Plains counties and in both instances Dawson County yield was placed at 40,000 bales.

Harry Blocker, who has made cotton estimates for many years, is rated as an authority on conditions and yields. He placed Lamb county first on the South Plains with an estimated yield of 55,000; Lubbock second with 50,000; Dawson, third, with 40,000 and Hockley a close fourth with about 40,000; Lynn fifth with 38,000.

V. O. Jennings, another Lubbock cotton man, made a slightly higher estimate for the entire Plains area, and placed Dawson fourth, but with the same 40,000 estimate for this county.

The first five counties, according to Jennings will be: Lamb, with 70,000; Lubbock, 55,000; Lynn, 45,000; Dawson, 40,000; and Hockley, 32,000 bales.

The first five counties last year, with their production, were Lubbock, 49,180; Lynn, 46,649; Lamb, 30,626; Dawson, 28,685; and Hockley, 28,280.

Dawson county ginning figures for the past five years have been: 1931—54,398; 1932—51,986; 1933—8,538; 1934—5,775; 1935—26,384.

## WORK STARTED ON TOPPING HIGHWAY 15

The Adams Construction company, successful bidders on road projects in Dawson county, began work Monday, September 7, on the topping of the west end of Highway 15 through Dawson county.

The caliche base was put on this part of the road some time ago. The present contract is for the smoothing and rounding off of the caliche base and application of an asphalt topping. The contract calls for a thinner coat of topping than will be on highway Nine, as traffic is not so heavy on this road, although it is our prediction that when 15 is finished it will be one of the heaviest traffic arteries in the state.

The work on Highway 15 each to the Borden county line, which is a WPA project is progressing nicely and it is hoped that soon we will have an all-weather road east and west through the county.

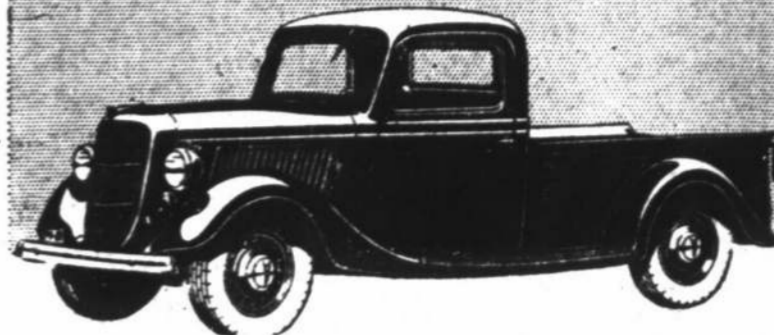

**FARM NOTES**

By Joe C. Williams, County Agent

**News on Soil Conservation Program:**  
Work sheets can be accepted up to September 15th which is the absolute final date any work sheet will be accepted regardless of the conditions.

Those who desire to make out and submit work sheets should do so at once.

**Failure of Soil Conserving Crops:**  
Assuming that no soil-depleting crops is harvested on the same acreage, that acreage seeded in conformity with good farming practice to an approved soil-conserving crop should be regarded as having been devoted to such crop, even if unusual weather

conditions resulted in failure of the seed to germinate or in the death of the crop after germination, provided it is impracticable for the producer to plant additional soil-conserving crops.

**Summer Legumes Following Harvested Small Grains**

Oats or wheat that have been harvested, according to the state committee must be followed by an actual crop of Legumes grown on the land from which a crop of grain has been harvested, before such land can be considered as used for production of soil-conserving crops.

**Grain Sorghums and Sweet Sorghums As Soil-Building Practices:**

The state committee is receiving numerous requests that producers be allowed to harvest grain sorghums and sweet sorghums planted for soil-conserving crops. The state committee does not have the authority to change the rulings pertaining to the classification of grain sorghums and sweet sorghums. These crops are soil-depleting crops if headed or harvested in any manner, or pastured at any time even after the land has been measured and the checks have been delivered. They are soil conserving crops only when seeded between January 1 and July 31 and all the crop left on the land or plowed under.

In plain words, the meaning of the above is that any one who heads or cuts, or pastures the above mentioned crops of cane, hegrira, milo, kaffir, feterita or any crop coming under the above classification forfeits all rental benefits that may come to that farm for the year.

**"My Wardrobe" — Mrs. Oscar McClendon**

I was elected wardrobe demonstrator just after the 1935 year's work was completed.

I have kept the family clothing expense. I first took an inventory of things on hand and put in the best condition. I made a list of things not in use that might be used by making over.

I have enjoyed the work. It has been a great help to me in several ways. It has made me see and value each article as being important other than just something to wear.

All clothing should be properly cared for to hold their quality. I have learned cheap and useful ways of cleaning clothes. A good storage space is essential to good care of clothes, clothes closets, and dresser drawers equipped with boxes to store out of season clothing, also to keep things grouped in dressers so it will be easier to find things, especially handkerchiefs, cosmetics and small articles.

I built my closet last year. It is arranged to take care of the entire family's clothes. It is 5 feet wide, 26 inches deep, built to the ceiling, has 4 shelves, has 3 on one side, the top for bedding, the center one for hats. The hat shelf has 3 hat racks. The bottom shelf is for the linens. Under the linen shelf is the rod for children's clothes. The fourth shelf is on the other side of the closet in the top for out of season clothing. The rod for mine and my husband's clothing extends from the shelf to the opposite side of the closet. The door has a tie rack at the top and a shoe rack at the bottom. I also have a shoe rack on the floor.

I have built 2 clothes closets for non-club members. There have been eight closets built or improved with very little cost.

I set \$75 as my goal for clothing expense this year. With the making over and making of most of the clothing, I have spent only \$73.59. I find it hard to have money sometimes for the things that are necessary, with crop failures for four years, with only \$2.00 a week produce to sell. The expense of the car must also come from this. I wanted to help things out a bit, with my \$5 Christmas money. I bought me a sow pig to raise a pig family from to use as my clothing money. With the waste from the table and plenty of milk I can raise several. With very little expense I can make a good profit and use for my clothes next year.

I like record keeping for the family. Sometimes we women feel like we just work and work without any show, but if we keep a record, when we feel we will come one, just look at the record book and begin to figure and we see we have done something. The things that looked so small are not so small.

Sometimes the record book will keep some of the family from feeling that they never get anything, also settle little arguments.

I have not had the time for pattern work this year that I needed. I have done very little work on patterns, checked several, made one and started two. Most of the members had patterns last year. I find most of the patterns are generally satisfactory.

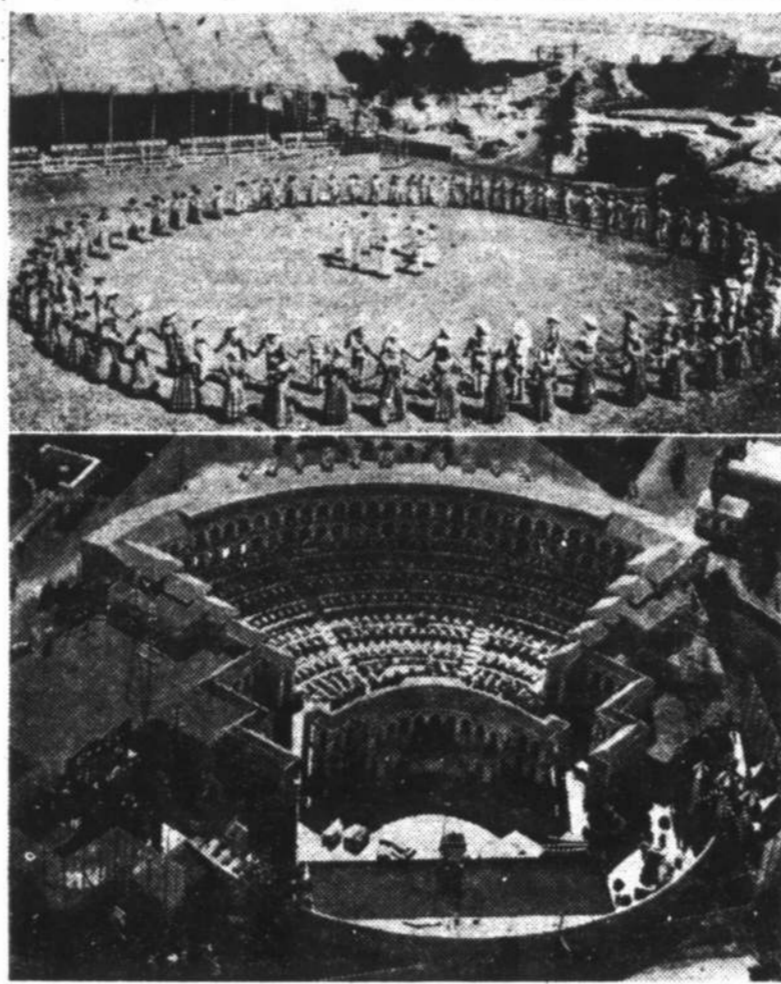

### AMENDMENTS TO BE SETTLED BY VOTE

We are this week publishing a concise summary of the content of four of the constitutional amendments which voters are to decide upon this fall.

They are numbered as follows, and their general purpose is worded as briefly and as plainly as possible:

H. J. R. No. 9 proposing an amendment to Section 26 of Article 3 of the Constitution, providing that no county shall be entitled to more than 7 representatives, regardless of its population until it shall have reached a population of 700,000.

H. J. R. No. 23, proposing an amendment to the constitution authorizing the Legislature to provide for Workmen's Compensation Insurance for employees of the state, and authorizing the Legislature to provide for the payment of premiums on such policies of insurance.

S. J. R. No. 14, proposing an amendment to the constitution fixing the salary of Governor at \$12,000; Attorney General at \$10,000; Comptroller, Treasurer and Commissioner of the General

Land Office at \$6,000, and Secretary of State at \$6,000.

S. J. R. No. 26, proposing an amendment to the constitution, to provide for a board of Pardons and Paroles, composed of three members, whose terms of office shall be for a period of six years. One to be appointed by the Governor, one by the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of the State of Texas, and one by the presiding Justice of the Court of Criminal Appeals, such appointments to be made with the advice and consent of two-thirds of the Senate present; and so as to provide that the governor of the state shall have the power on the recommendation and advice of the majority of the Board of Pardons and Paroles to grant reprieves, commutations of punishment and pardons and to remit fines and forfeitures; and with the advice and consent of the Legislature, to grant reprieves, commutations of punishment and pardons in cases of treason. The Governor to be able to

grant one reprieve in any capital case not to exceed 30 days. And have the power to revoke paroles and conditional pardons.

And provide the Legislature shall have authority to regulate procedure before the board and to enact parole laws.
