West Texas Crude Gain is Very Large

TULSA, Okla., Nov. 29.—The
Bemole (Oklahoma) pool and
the West Texas area are respon-

AMERICAN BUSINESS DROPS OFF IN CHINA SINCE CONSULS LEFT

(By International News Service)
PEKING, Nov. 29.—The Amer-
ican Legation has just been ap-
prised of the sorry state into
which American business is left
with the withdrawal of American
consuls from interior points of
China. At Chungking on the
upper Yangtze River an Amer-
ican shipping concern, the Yang-
tze Rapids Shipping Company,
was the victim.

A demand was made on the
company for a loan of \$6,000 by
the local Chinese military com-
mander. It was refused when
suddenly a party of armed troops
entered the company office and
refused to leave until the money
had been handed over.

A Chinese employee of the
American firm slipped away and
succeeded in securing an inter-
mediation of the Chungking
Chinese Chamber of Commerce.
The armed troops were with-
drawn when the American com-
pany paid over \$1,000 and agreed
to confer with the military lead-
ers over the balance. While it
was politely termed a loan, the
money demanded and partially
paid over is nothing but an ex-
tortion which will never be
repaid.

Curves and Dimples Health Sign; Folks Beginning to Study Weight

(By International News Service)

ROCHESTER, Minn., Nov. 29.—The importance of keeping the weight within reasonable bounds and preventing either excessive weight or underweight was stressed by Dr. C. C. Lochead in a Mayo Clinic paper read at the weekly health session attended by specialists, general practitioners and laymen at the Mayo clinic here. Dr. Lochead pointed out that either lack of weight, or the result of "dieting" among women to acquire the modern stylishly svelte figure, or the "excess baggage" resulting too often from overeating could be extremely harmful to normal health and diseases resulting from either might shorten life materially.

"More attention is being paid to a person's weight today than at any other period in the world's history so far as we know," declared Dr. Lochead. People are individually becoming much concerned about their weight, and rightly so. Official and voluntary health agencies now generally have as one of their chief activities concern about individuals being of proper weight.

The Proper Weight

"What is the proper weight of an individual? Weight for age is not the only consideration. Height of the individual must also be considered as, of course, should girth. Many experts have endeavored to fix a standard of weight for height and age and it is remarkable how much they have differed as to the normal.

"While such standards apply to the average of thousands, they cannot always apply to the individual. Family, racial and other considerations operate to cause an individual to vary from the standard of the average and still be normal, so it is not always true that 10 per cent underweight or 20 per cent overweight as figured by such standards means something radically wrong with an individual's internal body economy. But dealing with a group of individuals in a majority of cases such a variation from the standard normal indicates the necessity for change or correction of the individual's habits or mode of life or is a sign of disease.

"In children, generally speaking, we are more concerned with underweight than overweight and usually underweight means undernourishment. One out of every four children nowadays is undernourished. Usually it means, not that they are not receiving a sufficient volume of food, but that they are not getting a properly balanced diet. Usually they are getting a diet deficient in the mysterious vitamins so essential to proper growth and development and always present in milk, fresh fruit, green vegetables, whole grain breads, cereals, eggs, etc.

"Unfortunately for our children, many of them do not like milk, green vegetables, whole grain breads and cereals and in many families fresh fruit and eggs are still looked upon as luxuries rather than necessities. The wise parent will insist on children eating the necessary foods first before supplying them with the food material they like, which usually means sweets and the more palatable but less nourishing dishes.

"Among adults we are more concerned about overweight, generally, although underweight

may be significant or suspicious of several dangerous disease conditions. After 40 the most of us are overweight and too many of us so much overweight that the life insurance companies look upon us as poor risks and send forth the edict that we must reduce or we will not live out the allotted span of the prophet or even the ordinary expectancy of life.

Too Good Appetites

"Unfortunately for most of us adults, we suffer from too good appetites and we have both the ability and the opportunity to gratify our palates, while we lack the self-restraint necessary to give thought to the morrow. It is only recently that much attention has been paid to the overweight adult, although there is the age old saying that 'nobody loves a fat man.' Perhaps that is why there has been little concerted effort in the direction of giving control for those of use carrying excess baggage.

"It is true that of late years the fashionable type of beauty has been the willowy type. It is only in Turkey that they like them fat; and many people, especially women, many of them not really overweight, have endeavored to attain svelte figures by reducing. Many of them have seriously injured their body condition in trying to reduce by not eating nourishing food for fear it will fatten them by cutting down their total intake of food to perilously dangerous limits.

Some, even including celebrated cinema stars, have certainly died of undernourishment. Even worse are those who think they can reduce without the inconvenience of denying their palates by buying some widely advertised medicine. If any such medicines operate to reduce weight, they do so by powerfully potent drug substances, which should only be used on the advice of a physician because of their injurious effects on the body when not used judiciously.

Curves and Dimples

"I read in the press that the fashionable type of beauty is changing and that curves and dimples are coming back again. This is good news, not only from the artistic standpoint, but also from the standpoint of satisfactory nutrition.

"While little organized attention has been paid to the overweight, for many years there had been a definite concerted effort with the undernourished. It started in connection with the fight against tuberculosis 25 years ago when it was realized that one of the chief things for the consumptive to do was to keep up his body weight. Then it became known that, while practically everybody during childhood received tuberculosis infection, those who suffer from it are those who allow the body to become undernourished. So the campaign became general to search out the undernourished children to prevent them from becoming victims of the Great White Plague and today tuberculosis is prevented by bringing the underweight children up to par and it is generally recognized that a child ten per cent under

the standard normal weight for height and age has an unbalanced diet or else has some definite defect, deficiency or disease which results in undernourishment."

NEW VOLCANO PEAK STICKS OUT OF SEA SINCE EARTHQUAKE

(By International News Service)

SEATTLE, Wash., Nov. 29.—A volcanic crater emerging out of the waters to a height of 175 feet above sea level is the remarkable phenomenon reported by Commander James F. Hottel upon his return from the Far North on the United States Coast Guard cutter Northland.

This geological event, according to Commander Hottel's account, occurred on Bogosloff

Island as a result of recent earth disturbances which radically changed the topography of adjacent areas. The formation of the new peak had its precursor in modern times with the appearance in 1907 of McCullough Peak, also in Alaska.

"The new crater has risen from about 1,000 fathoms in water to 175 feet above the surface," Commander Hottel stated. "We circled Bogosloff Island carefully and astronomical observation and bearings showed the new island to be four miles south and one mile east of its charted position."

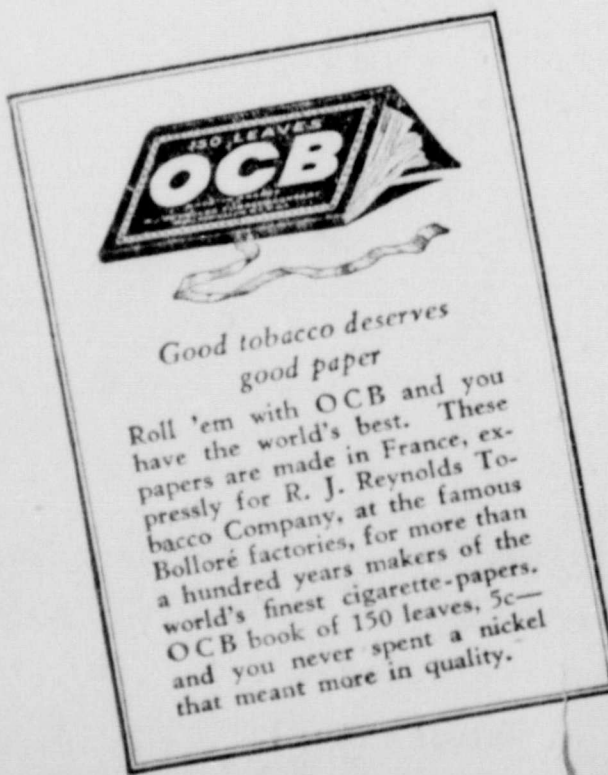

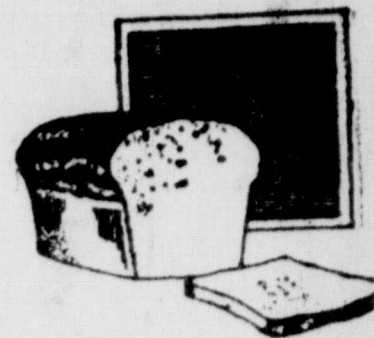
