School Trustees Act Monday

Teachers, Budget OK'd

Thirteen new teachers were employed by the Littlefield School Board of Trustees at their meeting Monday night. At the same time, four resignations were accepted.

The trustees set the tax rate for the 1962 - 63 school year at \$1.40 or the same as last year. They approved a \$771,104

budget for the year.

At the meeting a tentative building and remodeling program for next summer was discussed. It was decided to remodel the present Junior High building and add physical education dressing rooms in that school. The remodeling was the result of a study made by the

building advisory committee composed of several local building men.

First thing that will be done to the present Junior High will be the installation of new windows. Other items will be a new ceiling for all the classrooms in that building. Funds for doing the remodeling and con-

struction were set up in the budget adopted Monday.

Next summer's work is part of a three-year construction and remodeling project outlined by the trustees. Eventually all the buildings will be remodeled on a planned schedule.

Milk and bread contracts for this fall were let at Monday's meeting. Mrs. Baird's bread and local representative, Ollie Robbins, received that contract and Foremost Dairies and Paul Jensen, local representative, were awarded the milk contract.

of Lamb County Grain, said he expected the harvest to get rolling in a couple of weeks. He continued that there is a lot of grain almost ready to cut.

Lamb County's grain harvest is estimated to be almost the same as last year with an expected production of approximately \$16 million.

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Potato Preference Makes Difference

What is your potato preference? How you answer this may depend on whether you consider your time or your money to be more important. Lady Clair Phillips, Home Demonstration Agent points out.

When a homemaker uses fresh potatoes, she saves money but needs more time for preparation. It was pointed out by the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Economic Research Service.

From the standpoint of both time and cost, frozen French fries are the most economical of the processed potato products. A serving costs 5.6 cents or only a third of a cent more than the price of French fries made from fresh potatoes. Use of the frozen product saves about 5 minutes per serving.

Mashed potatoes made from fresh potatoes cost 2.3 cents a serving, compared with 3.4 cents a serving for dehydrated potatoes. The potatoes out of a box save 2 1/2 minutes per serving, however.

Use of dehydrated potatoes for scalloped potato servings costs 7 cents for each person, but you save 2.6 minutes of time. Fresh potatoes cost 3.6 cents when served this way.

Boiled whole potatoes cost 4.6 cents a serving in a can, and if you do the work yourself,

they are half that much. It requires 1.2 minutes more to prepare each serving if you peel them yourself, the research people said.

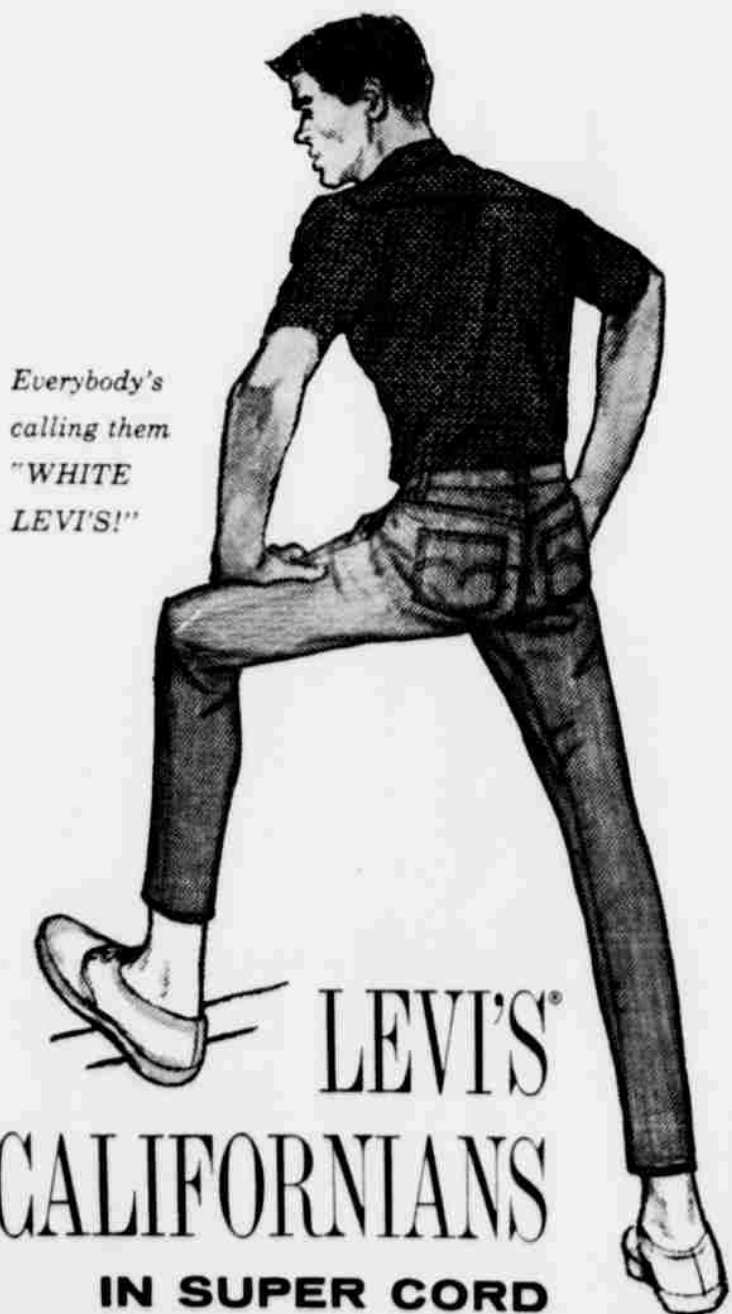
Intermediate GA's Meet In Amherst

She was the first member of YWA to ever receive a Citation in the West Plains Association (now Llano Alto Association). This is the highest honor that could be bestowed upon a young person in the Southern Baptist Convention at that time. In the past an Honor Citation has been made available. Only two others have received Citations from this association to date, and the Honor Citation has not been bestowed upon anyone.

The opening prayer was offered with the song "God Give Christian Homes," sung by Miss Janell Jensen, accompanied at the piano by Miss Melva Lynn Ross. Miss Janey Blackmon, President, asked the

honored couple to stand before the altar in front of a table on which was a large white candle lighting an open Bible. Miss Blackmon gave the history of the hearth as the symbol of the home, after which she lighted a long white taper from the large candle. In turn she lighted tapers held by the members of the YWA as they formed a circle around the honorees. Miss Judy Dale offered the prayer of the group for the young couple with the song, "Bless This House."

Explaining the symbolism of the lighted candle as representative of the Word of God, Miss Janice Burks, Vice-President exhorted Miss Russell and Mr. Hoover that the Word might serve to light their home. Miss Burks also referred to the YWA colors of green and white, concluding with the words, "May the purity of your love, symbolized by the white, continue in growth, symbolized by the green, as you advance more and more in the furtherance of the Gospel."

The song, "Thy Word Is a Lamp Unto My Feet," sung by Misses Judy and Linda Dale, served to introduce the text of the presentation address, brought by Rev. Robert D. Longshore, pastor. Following the closing prayer, Miss Linda Dale sang, "O Perfect Love," thus concluding the program.

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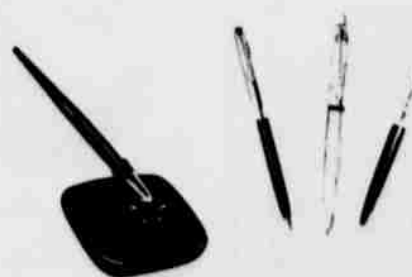

Leaves Off Is Aid To Machine Cotton

Last year 64 per cent of the Texas cotton crop was machine harvested -- 13 percent by mechanical pickers and 51 percent by strippers. The trend is upward for this type of harvesting, says Fred C. Elliott, cotton specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

An important consideration in the machine harvesting of cotton, he says, is the use of either defoliants or desiccants for preparing the cotton plants for the harvesting process.

Defoliants are used to prepare the cotton plants for spindle picking and two groups of material are available -- dusts

and sprays. Dust defoliants require leaf moisture to activate them and therefore give best results when applied late in the afternoon or early in the morning, says Elliott. Spray defoliants are available as chlorate and organic phosphorus materials. They may be used in the absence of moisture and at lower humidity levels. Thorough coverage of the plant is essential.

With ground sprayers, 10 to 20 gallons of water is recommended as the carrier for the material used, depending upon the type of sprayer and the extent of plant growth, explains the specialist. Applications of

loss of grade and quality and this in turn can cost the grower \$10 or more per bale, points out Reeves.

The grower must increase the heat in the dryers to try to get desirable grades from high moisture cotton. Using more heat increases the danger of fiber quality damage on the bale being ginned and the bale following, explains Reeves. Over drying can result and this makes for the kind of cotton the mills don't want.

How can you know when to start your mechanical pickers? Delay harvesting, advises Reeves, until the relative humidity in the field at boll height is 60 per cent or less. Normally, 60 per cent relative humidity is correlated with 8 per cent lint moisture, he adds.

If you don't have a hygrometer or cotton moisture meter, Reeves says to pick a handful of cotton, squeeze it tightly in your hand and release it quickly. If the cotton fluffs out when released, it is dry enough for mechanical picking. Otherwise wait and make the test again later. And make the test at several different spots in the field, advises Reeves.

Dry Cotton Adds To Per Bale Income

Drink an extra cup of coffee and make money. Does this sound reasonable? It makes a lot of sense to Texans who use mechanical pickers to harvest their cotton and explain why they are in no great rush to start their pickers early in the morning.

The wise farmers wait so that cotton moisture can drop to a reasonable picking level, says B. G. Reeves, extension cotton ginning and mechanization specialist. This waiting can get them a full grade or more when they go to the gin, adds Reeves.

Regardless of how dry the weather, cotton should never be harvested at night nor in the early morning or late evening, explains the specialist. Even on the driest day, he adds, cotton will probably never be dry enough for machine harvest until 8 a.m. or later.

Moisture in seed cotton from humidity may not be seen or felt, but it is there. And, it limits the kind of a job the ginner can do. Excess moisture in cotton usually results in the

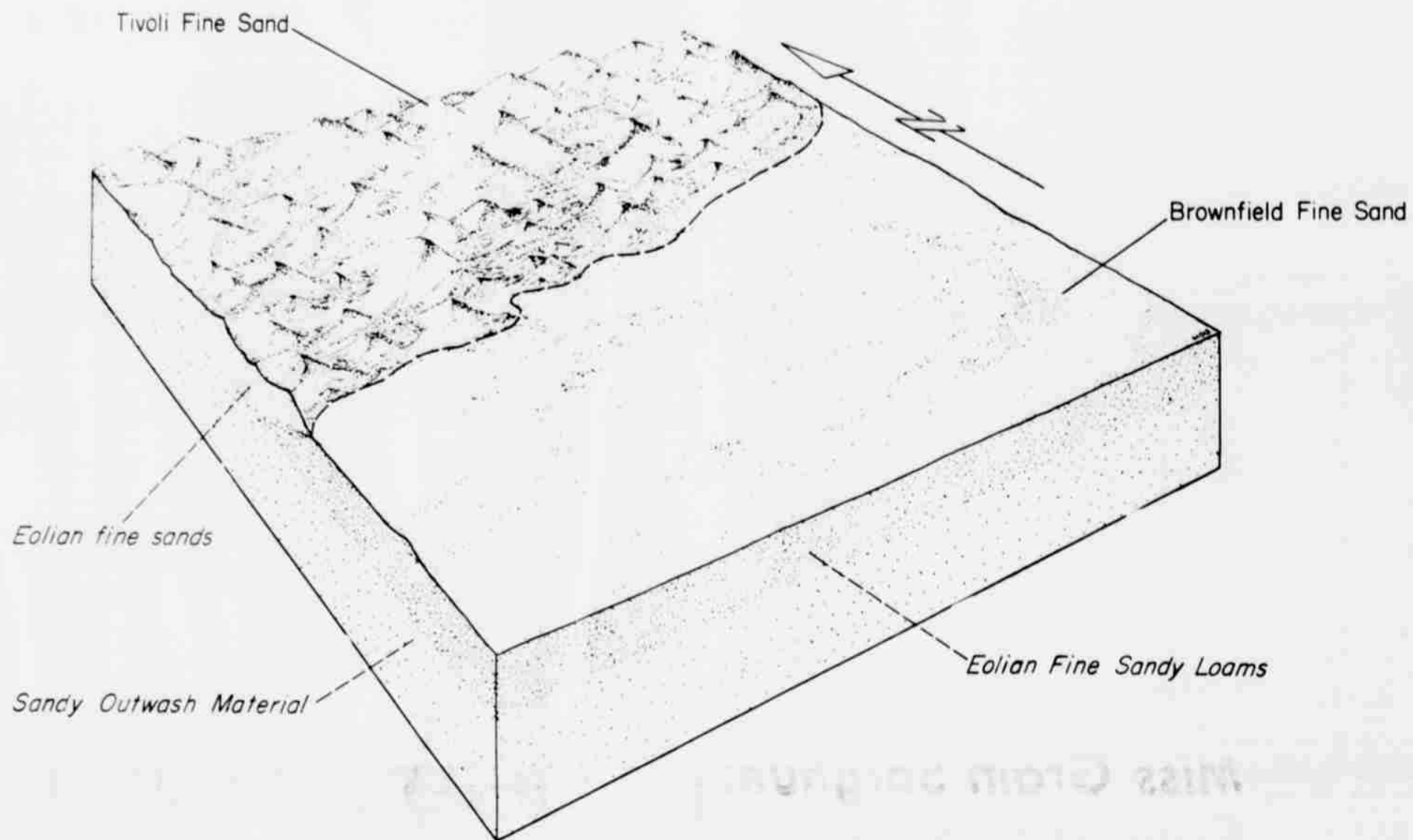

Soil Scientists of the Soil conservation Service Have Completed the Soil Inventory of Lamb County Farms

TIVOLI - BROWNFIELD SOIL ASSOCIATION IN LAMB COUNTY, TEXAS



Tivoli - Brownfield Soil Association
Included in the completed soil survey report are descriptions of broad soil associations. The Tivoli - Brownfield soil association occurs mainly in the north central part of the county as a narrow band. These broad soil associations give newcomers or other interested people a broad knowledge or concept of the soils in Lamb County.

SOIL SCIENTISTS OF THE SOIL CONSERVATION SERVICE HAVE COMPLETED THE SOIL INVENTORY ON ALL OF LAMB COUNTY FARMS

Lamb County which was selected as one of the first counties in Texas to have a complete soil inventory made on all the county is now completed. The field work was completed in 1959, and now the soil survey report has just been released by the United States Department of Agriculture through the local Lamb County Soil Conservation District.

The Soil Survey reports contains a complete soil map of Lamb County. This map shows all the different kinds of types of soils that occurs in the county. The map also shows the drainage patterns of the landscape, irrigation wells, houses and other prominent features.

The soil survey report describes all the many kinds of soils. There are other sections of the report which have interpreted these kinds of soils into various uses. For example, there is a section in the report which gives suggested management practices for each kind of soils. These management practices are based on the limitations of the soil for sustained production, and to the risk of soil damage if they are mismanaged. The recommended treatment for these soils was obtained from farmers, experiment station records and other interested people.

The report also contains information on the rangeland, engineering data for construction purposes, geology of the county, climate, history, and much other data.

Uses of such a valuable docket are many. Although most people dealing with land may use the soil survey, the primary use of soil surveys is to help farmers plan their operations, such as recommending various crops, suggested fertilizers, pond construction, the design of irrigation systems, crop rotations, installation of pipelines, and others.

Land appraisers use soil surveys as a source of information on which to base land values. Investors, bankers, insurance companies and loan companies find soil surveys helpful in determining the soundness of proposed investments in land. Tax assessors are using the surveys for tax purposes.

Certainly, you will want to get your copy of the survey report to check the soils in places of interest to you.



Examination Of The Soils
A hydraulic core sampling machine mounted on a pickup truck was used to examine many of the soils in Lamb County.



Reading Soil Colors
Soil Scientists determine the soil colors of each layer of soil in the many different soil types. Soil color often indicates the fertility of a soil. A light colored soil generally is lower in organic matter and plant nutrients than a dark colored soil.



Collection Of Soil Samples
Soil Samples collected for analysis is very important. Samples should be taken from different types of soil on your farm when analyzed for fertilizer application. Each kind of soil may have a different fertility level.



Plotting Soil Boundaries
After examination of the soil by augers, hydraulic machine or space, the soil scientist classifies the soil. He then plots the soil boundaries on an aerial photograph which is found in the published soil survey report.

Philosopher Tries To Relieve Expert's Worry Over What He'd Do With A Tax Cut

Editor's note: The Sandhills Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm tries to reassure a Washington expert this week, his letter reveals.

Dear editor:

The difference between an expert and an ordinary man sometimes can be found in the kind of problems that bother them.

For example, I was reading in a newspaper last night during a television re-run which I wasn't interested in the first time that an economics expert in Washington was debating whether a tax cut should be made this year.

Now the phase of the question that was bothering him was not whether the government could afford it but what would the people do with a tax cut. I mean, he said that if the people took the tax cut and spent it, that'd be fine, it would stimulate the national economy, which he claimed was the purpose of the proposed cut. But, he contended, if the people took the cut and put it in the bank, this wouldn't stimulate the economy and would defeat the whole purpose, and this was causing him some grave concern.

This is what I'm talking about.

It's hard for me to understand how a man can become so expert in his field that he can't know automatically what I'd do, along with 99 per cent of the rest of the people, if the government gave us a \$100 tax cut. It's a situation about which

it's hard to keep a straight face.

But to ease his worries, I'd like to assure him that if the government will give me a tax cut, I will recognize my duty to my country and do my best to stimulate the national economy.

I will not uneconomically, not to say unpatriotically, hide it in a mattress, bury it in a bank vault, or even hoard it in a savings bond. No sir, The minute I get it, I'll head for Littlefield and stimulate the economy.

If that economics expert is seriously worried about me and most others taking our tax cuts and holding on to them and drying up the springs of business, I'd say he is approaching the point where he has run out of something to worry about, except maybe his own knowledge of people. I have a notion that if he'll look around, even just among his fellow economics experts, he'll find they're about as over-drawn as the rest of us.

Farm Sales Are Up, But Net Income Down

Farmers, like other businessmen, in recent years have increased their gross sales but have received less net income, reports C. H. Bates, extension farm management specialist.

The nation's farmers have increased gross sales since 1945 by 46 per cent but their net income has declined more than 9 percent, Bates adds. Gross income in 1945 was \$25.7 billion and production expenses were \$12.9 billion. Net income equalled \$12.8 billion. By 1960, gross income was up to \$37.9 billion but expenses had jumped to \$26.3 billion, leaving a net of only \$11.6 billion.

Farmers have sought to improve their situation, says Bates, by shifting the inputs or "mix" of production resources. They have substituted machinery for labor. In 1940, U. S. farmers spent \$1.75 on machinery and buildings for each dollar spent on hired help. By 1960, they were spending \$2.77 on these items for each dollar spent for hired labor.

Another effort to boost efficiency is reflected in the amounts spent for fertilizer and lime. By 1960, U. S. farmers were spending 4.8 times more for these items than was spent in 1940. This means a great increase in quantity since prices for fertilizer and lime have increased only 50 percent.

Although comparable figures are not available on farmer expenditures for pesticides and herbicides, the trend has been sharply upward, says the specialist. These inputs have tended to keep down the cost of food to consumers, he adds.

The question is often raised, points out Bates, why do farm units continue to increase in size? A major factor behind the pressure for larger units is the use of machinery and the narrower margin received on products marketed, explains the specialist. Today's farmer must invest three to four times as much capital in fixed assets as was needed in 1940 to obtain net returns on a comparable level and the price-cost squeeze is continuing, he adds.

will be a \$500.00 college scholarship.

Soil Survey Ready, Meetings Scheduled

The Lamb County Soil Conservation District is happy to announce that a complete soil survey has been made in Lamb County.

This survey has been completed by the Soil Conservation Service in cooperation with Texas Agriculture Experiment Station, Texas Extension Service. The report has been published and is available for use by land owners, bankers, real estate agencies, land appraisers, tax people, fertilizer dealers, and other businesses who have a need for it in Lamb County.

There will be meetings held to explain the contents and how to use this book. The first meeting will be held August 21, 7:45 p.m., in Littlefield at the Lamb County Community Center. August 23, 7:45 p.m., at Earth - Springlake High School Lunch Room; August 24, 7:45 p.m., at Amherst in the first High School; August 27, 7:45 p.m., at Olton, in the High School Lunch Room; September 10, 7:45 p.m., at n. in the Sudan High School Lunch Room.

In making this survey, soil scientists checked the fields, native grasslands in all parts of the county. They dug up and examined surface and subsoils, measured them with a hand level, noted differences in growth of crops, brush, weeds, and grasses, and recorded observations about the soils that they observed might affect their suitability for farming, engineering, and other uses. The soil scientists plotted the boundaries on aerial photographs. Then cartographers prepared from the photographs the detailed soil

maps in this book with fields, roads, pipelines, and other landmarks.

The Soil Survey Report has special sections for different groups of readers, as well as sections that may be of value to all. Farmers and ranchers can use it to good advantage by studying the soils of their farm or ranch. When they learn about their soils and how to treat them a better job of planning and management can be done which will result in a better job of farming and ranching.

Engineers will want to refer to the section "Engineering Applications" Tables. In this section is shown characteristics of the soils that affect engineering.

This book will be very useful to other people such as students, teachers, contractors, those interested in new industries, newcomers to Lamb County, and to others who may be interested in the classification and morphology of the soils.

Vacation's Over! It's Back-to-School Time Again

Emphasis On Education Continues As Major Force In American Heritage

School bells will soon be calling an estimated 50-million students back to school. Over a million youngsters will be enrolling into classes for the first time, and the balance of this number will go to primary, intermediate and high school classes around the nation.

Again school reopening focuses attention on increased enrollments, shortage of properly trained faculty and lack of proper school housing.

Although these problems have been rectified in many communities, others are still facing them.

Since our nation's beginnings education has been an important facet of the American way of life.

The foundations of the modern American educational system were laid by the Calvinist Puritans of New England. In 1642 the legislature of the Massachusetts Bay Colony, faithful to the Protestant principle that everyone should be able to read the Bible — passed a law requiring all parents, in towns within its jurisdiction, to give their children an elementary education.

And so throughout our early history, more and more schools were established by local law. As the frontiers moved westward, settlers created their own schools for their children.

Although early schools were set up by church groups, which also controlled them — by the end of the American Revolution these schools were made independent of the churches. By the 19th century, a system of decentralized control, compulsory, popular education was set up.

Several attempts to establish a national system of education over the years were unsuccessful since the decentralized control of schools was well-established throughout

the country.

When the Tenth Amendment to the U. S. Constitution was adopted giving the individual States all powers not reserved by the Federal Government, the foundation was laid to establish State-controlled school systems.

In turn, the State systems evolved into units of State, county and later, city school systems.

The free public school system as we know it now, actually evolved in the twentieth century.

In most states up to the Civil War and for several decades thereafter: parents paid for their children's schooling. Children of paupers were given free education, but wholly on a charity basis.

This concept too was changed by the end of the nineteenth century when States required local administrations to tax themselves for the full support of public schools and all children within the school area.

The system we know now came into being in the twentieth century. A far cry from its humble beginnings in the early days of the Colonies, support for our free public school systems came from local property taxes (two thirds) with the balance being made up of monies contributed by the State (from taxes) from permanent State school funds and some Federal aid.

As enrollments continue to grow in all types of schools round the country, the problem facing school systems is not all economic.

Never in the history of the nation has there been so much awareness of the importance of learning, not only for the individual but also with relation to the immediate future of our civilization.

Today the curriculum of

schools faces scrutiny and inventory as science education, humanities, languages as new frontiers opened up by the space age are creating far greater demands for knowledge and skill than ever before.

The average citizen has found that there are many channels open for intelligent discussion and activities concerning the betterment of the school systems and their curricula.

Children as well as adults are imbued with this revitalization of serious interest in education. A growing pride in scholastic standing appears to be developing even among the children in elementary schools.

Adult Classes Beckon Big Enrollments

Formal educational opportunities for adults have been provided in the U. S. since the middle of the 18th century.

From citizenship classes for the foreign-born to courses in vocational training, adult education courses are offered in everything from ART to ZOOLOGY.

As many as 50 million adults enroll themselves in adult education courses in the public school systems around the nation.

In recent years, public school facilities have been made available for both vocational and non-vocational courses by citizen groups not under the control of the school authorities.

Plaids and pleats are taking classroom honors with school belles this fall. Smart team-mates are abbreviated tops and matching skirts in easy care fabrics.

Annual Safety Campaign Alerts Drivers

This year, as in previous years, the American Automobile Association's annual "School's Open — Drive Carefully" campaign to alert motorists that they must once again be on the lookout for children crossing streets on the way to school) has begun.

The campaign gets in full

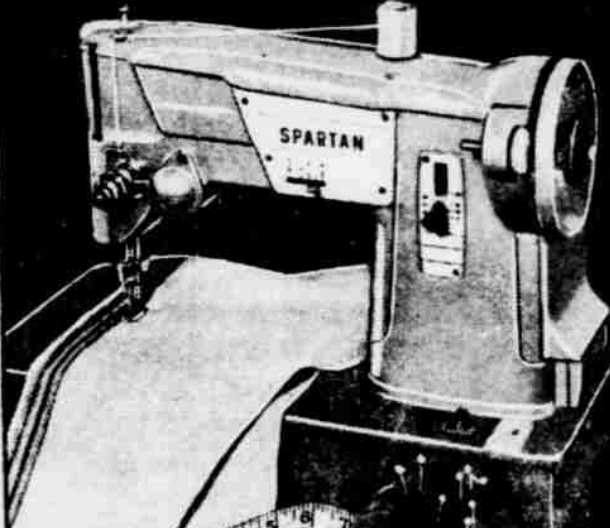
swing just before schools open in local communities so that motorists will have a short "conditioning period" to readjust their driving habits.

The two principal things that motorists are being asked to do in connection with the campaign are to "scrupulously obey special speed limits around schools" and to be especially alert for the younger children — who are not yet safety-wise.

Remember, it's the motorist's responsibility to watch out for children — even if the youngsters are at fault.

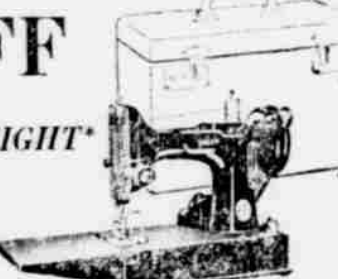

Composition Writing is Valuable Scholastic Aid

According to many educators one of the most neglected areas in many modern-day school curricula is that of the familiar "composition writing."

Instruction in written composition has long been considered an important tool in helping students express themselves and encouraging clear thinking.

In studies made at various campuses round the country, it was discovered that a large percentage of college students were not adequately prepared by earlier studies to present their thoughts clearly and intelligently in writing.

What then has happened to composition and theme writing in the modern school?

The heavy work and student load in recent years has forced many English teachers to bypass theme assignments for lack of time to thoroughly read and grade the papers.

Many schools have been forced to assign teachers to instruct English classes even though they hold their majors in other fields.

Students in colleges and universities enrolled as education majors are just not receiving adequate training in grammar or composition. The teacher is forced then to work from drills

Pleats Stay For Keeps In Smart Wool Clothes

A new bonus which will keep campus cuties looking extra sharp has been announced by the Wool Bureau. This feature is in a permanently pleated all-wool skirt which will retain crisp knife-like pleats through storms, coke-spilling or classroom sitting, as well as to the hard wear all campus clothes are exposed.

Permanently pleated skirts represent still another forward step in the development of easy care qualities of wool by textile scientists around the world.

Easy care qualities for 100% wool, now achieved, include the permanent creasing of men's trousers and women's slacks and machine-washable and machine-dryable all-wool blankets and sweaters.

As with so many scientific advances, the permanent pleat process for all-wool skirts is a relatively simple one. As with permanent creasing in trousers, the process for permanent pleating is essentially a chemical one, but unlike the former, the chemical is applied to the fabric at the mill before being sent to the pleaters. This process is called presensitization.

When the skirt panels, made of "presensitized" wool fabrics, are delivered to the pleating firm, they are moistened with plain water to activate the chemical in the fabric. The panels are then pleated in the

and other simplified exercises.

Check These Recipes for After-School Snacks

"What's to eat?" is the greeting when children come in from school or play. Their quick-growing bodies need pick-up with lasting food values — and it's a good idea for mother to pause at this point, too.

A light snack, providing good food values gives a lift to make the rest of the day go more smoothly, and more efficiently.

Nutritionists tell us that snacks taken between meals help keep the blood sugar at a more even level, help you feel better, and prevent over-eating later on.

You can take a tip from good Swedish cooks, who provide snacks that taste wonderful and bolster good health. They spread crisp bread rectangles such as Ry-King, with cheese and a variety of tangy toppings, from anchovy paste to pickles, for open-faced sandwiches that are satisfying yet low in calories.

There are extra B-vitamins important to mother and child, in snacks like these. For example, light Ry-King at 30 calories per slice, and the nuttier brown variety, at 45 calories per slice, are Swedish crisp bread wafers made from 100% whole rye flour.

New Sandwich Fillers with Zesty Flavor

"School's open" means one thing to the youngster, but to Mom it means packing nourishing lunches for the back-to-schooler.

The home economists of the R. T. French Company, internationally known condiment firm, have discovered that interesting food combinations plus the zip and tang of mustard give sandwiches a special interest. Made in advance, sandwiches can be packed frozen in the lunch box. These will thaw in about two hours.

To keep fillings from soaking into the bread, French's home economists suggest buttering both slices. But rather than just plain butter, use mustard butter for added interest. Just blend together one half pound butter or margarine and two tablespoons prepared mustard.

Omit tomatoes, lettuce, and celery from sandwiches that are to be frozen. Tuck these into the lunch box to be eaten with the sandwiches.

Here are several unusual ideas that children of any age will like. Some are zippy, some sweet.

LUNCH BOX IDEAS

Cheese and chipped Beef — Blend together 1 package (3-oz.) softened cream cheese, ¼ cup chili sauce, ½ cup dried chipped beef, and 1 teaspoon French's Prepared Mustard.

Health Check-up Is Essential Before School

Good health is an important adjunct to good scholarship. Eyesight, hearing and teeth should be carefully checked before any student starts off to school after the vacation period.

A complete physical check-up to see that a child is healthy is a pre-school requisite. A child with any acute or chronic disorder can not be expected to adjust to normal school conditions. A child who can not see the blackboard or hear his teacher or fellow students, may develop poor habits which will make him a poor student.

Don't forget the child's teeth. Plan an early visit to the dentist; have needed dental work done well ahead of school opening.

Be sure that the youngster has all essential preventative vaccine shots.

Check with the doctor on what's new and necessary.

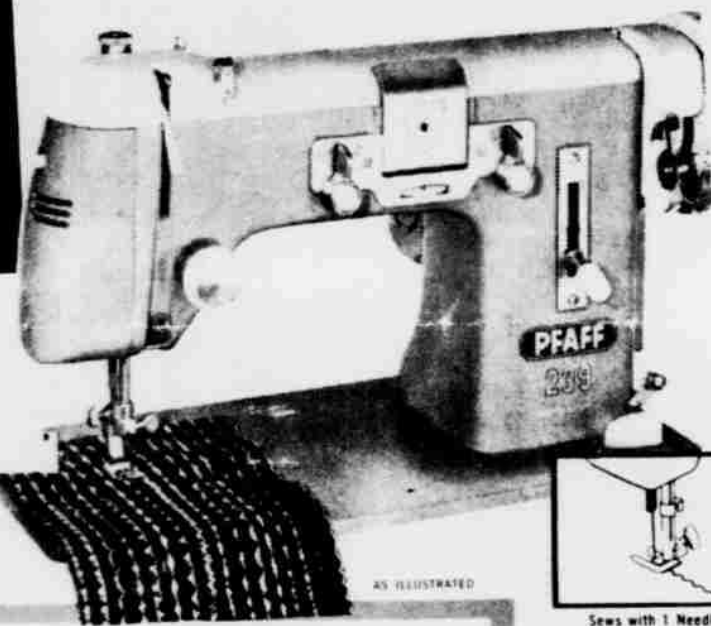
Plan appointments for each of the children in the family well in advance of school opening. Be sure ample time is available for proper care and treatment of physical and emotional problems.

Don't overlook securing professional help for the child who lacks his thumb, wets his bed, or dawdles over food and chores. Some of these problems are emotional, others have a physical origin.

A thorough examination will check how normal are the child's eyes, ears, throat, sinuses, tonsils, heart and other organs. Healthy teeth and good posture are important, too — for all of these are important to a child's well-being.

The latter is important to cost-conscious school officials who remember early attempts at installing luminous ceilings using PVC (polyvinyl chloride) material and the resulting dissatisfaction they experienced.

PVC was subject to mortal wounding from the inevitable missiles hurled by frisky students. The early substitute also was very difficult, if not impossible to clean, sagged and was generally unsuitable as a luminous ceiling material.

Today's translucent fiberglass reinforced plastic panels are a far cry from those early attempts.

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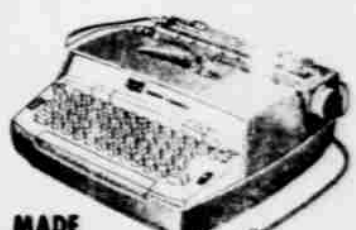
