Justice No.3 Gives Promise Of Becoming County's Best Well

Garza County oil activity climbed to a new high last week-end when the No. 3 Justice heirs well in the Tobe-Strawn field offered possibility of developing into the County's best producer and brought about speculation that considerable activity may be expected from the Justiceburg area.

A drillstem test was taken from 7,473 feet. Gas surfaced in 8 minutes and oil came to the top in 25 minutes. The well flowed an estimated 60 barrels an hour during the five minutes the tool was open. Sunday night operators completed running pipe and cementing. The well is scheduled to be tested today.

Location of the well is 660 feet from the north and east lines of the southwest quarter of Section 19, Block 6, H&GN survey, 1 1/2 miles southwest of Justiceburg.

Tobe Foster of Lubbock has the drilling contract. The well is an offset to the No. 1 Justice which is producing 107 barrels daily.

A completion and a new pro-ducer were announced the first of the week for Garza field.

Alamo Corp. 2 W. A. Gray, located 1,263 feet from south and 1,376 feet from east lines of Section 1215, TTRR Survey, is pumping 68.76 barrels of 37.3-gravity oil plus 3 per cent water daily. Open hole from 3,205-3,233 feet was acidized with 5,000 gallons. Union Oil Company of California has staked its 1-B M. K. Bingham in the Garza field. Location is 330 feet from south and west lines of Section 1231, J. V.

Massey Survey, 1/2 mile west of Post. The well will be drilled to 3,100 feet with rotary. It is slated to begin operations immediately.

March Of Dimes Total Is Expected To Reach \$1800

Garza County's March of Dimes drive late Tuesday afternoon had reached a total of \$1,652 and sponsors of the movement hope-fully eye an \$1,800 total as do-nations continue to come in daily.

Drive Treasurer O. L. Weakley said that a number of substan-tial contributions are expected from local oil firms when they receive their donation checks from their out-of-town "head" offices.

Pat Henderson, MOD chairman, pointed out that "Any additional amount will be just that much better." He reminded Garzans that "Half of the amount will stay in this County for use ex-clusively here." The other half goes to the National Foundation of Infantile Paralysis for re-search and a reserve fund for epidemic areas.

Henderson said that he had delivered "certificates of ap-preciation" to thirty-five indi-viduals and business firms who have given of their time and money to making the 1953 drive a suc-cess. The five by eight inch cer-tificate, suitable for framing

and hanging in homes and busi-ness firms carries the following message:

"Certificate of Appreciation"—In acknowledgement of out-standing cooperation during the March of Dimes this testimonial is gratefully awarded (busi-ness or individual). Your unselfish service in the fight against infantile paralysis has brought all of us closer to the day when dread disease will be unknown to America's children. Chamber Of Commerce Begins New Year With Peppy Meet Monday Night

Monday night's Post Chamber of Commerce annual meeting, which attracted approximately 50 local businessmen, farmers and ranchers, turned out to be the liveliest session held by the organization since its reorganization some three years ago.

During the two and one-half hour gathering, at least half of those present rose to express their views concerning civic projects.

Following the open meeting the directors held a brief ses-

sion at which time they elevated W. S. Duckworth from vice-pres-ident to president, named O. G. Murphy, manager of the Postex-Cotton Mills, Inc., as vice-pres-ident and reelected Mrs. Mable Lawrence as secretary.

Three new directors, Ira Green-field, Victor Hudman and Tom Power, along with retiring presi-dent, George Samson, who was retained as a director, took their places on the ten panel direc-torate. The four directors were elected early in January by bal-lots which were distributed to members. Samson's name was added to the 12-candidate list after he had been petitioned by members to appear on the bal-lot for reelection.

Other directors, whose terms continue for another year, are

Ralph Kirkpatrick, Si Thaxton, Powell Shyries and Buster More-land.

Duckworth presided over the meeting at which coffee and pie were served. O. L. Weakley gave a resume of the year's work and emphasized 14 projects which the chamber sponsored, or otherwise assisted in promoting. His list-ing included the Christmas pro-ject, which was one of the major events, and included not only the lighting of the entire busi-ness district and the home light-ing, but the cash and merchan-dise drawing events; the Garza County exhibit at the South Plains Fair; the sponsoring of prizes for the first baby born in Garza Memorial Hospital which opened in the early fall of last year; and prizes for the

first bales of cotton ginned in the County. Weakley pointed out that the organization assisted in promoting Post High School pro-jects; the Post Stampede Cow-boys; cowgirl sponsors; Boy Scouts; the district firemen's con-vention, which was held here during the summer; the two ro-deos, the Quarterhorse show; and the Edgar Bergen show.

Weakley said that he was pri-ileged to speak in behalf of both members of the organiza-tion and directors, having form-erly served on the directorate for a number of years. He pointed out that several members of the chamber had requested him to offer their thanks to the direc-torate for its splendid work. He emphasized the importance of a strong chamber of commerce during trying times, such as we now face due to the prolong-ed drought, and gave weight to the great statement, "united we stand, divided we fall."

A. B. Hayes, Post retail mer-chant, brought up the proposi-tion of providing a Latin Ameri-can Labor Center for Post. His project was discussed at length and he was joined in its pro-mo-tion by three area farmers, Glen Davis, Buck Gossett and See C of C MEET Page 8

Election Of Trustees Will Be Held Soon

Terms expire this year for two members of the Post Independent School district and 12 rural dis-trict trustees. County Superinten-dent Dean A. Robinson said Wed-nesday. Elections will also be conducted in Precincts 2 and 3 to elect trustees to the County Board of Education. The new trustees will be elected over the County Saturday, April 4.

Post Independent School dis-trict trustees whose terms ex-pire are Paul Jones, president of the board, and Monta Moore.

County trustees whose terms expire are E. E. Peel, Precinct 2 and Julius Fumagalli, Precinct 3.

Southland Independent district will elect two trustees to replace D. I. Dunn and C. C. Lee, whose terms expire.

Close City Independent district has three trustees whose terms expire. They are D. C. Morris, Jim Barrow and Ted Shults.

An election will be held at Graham to elect two trustees to fill the expiring terms of Delmer Cowdrey and A. O. Parrish. Justiceburg will elect three trustees to fill vacancies made by Lee Reed, Raymond Key and Henry Key, whose terms expire.

Two trustees are to be named to the board at Garfield to re-place J. E. Thomas and Bryan J. Williams.

Grasshopper will elect one trustee. The term of Russell Wilks, Jr., expires.

Post teenagers are sponsoring a talent show in the Grade school auditorium tonight at 7:30 o'clock to raise funds for the opening of their "Teen-town". Tonight's show will be composed of all local talent and is open to the public to enter.

Velta Carpenter, treasurer of "Teen-town", said that the con-stantants have been divided into three groups to make the com-petition fair. The first group is the primary division and con-sists of pre-school age children and children in the lower grades of Grade School. The second di- vision is the intermediate group, contestants just under high school age and over primary age, and the last group is all stu-dents of high school.

The program will include songs, dance routines, musical selections on instruments and comedy acts. W. O. Fluitt, Jr., and Topper Bilberry will act as masters of ceremonies and jesters.

Miss Carpenter said that the proceeds are going toward com-pleting the decoration of "Teen-town". The building has to be re-wired and the painting complet-ed.

Prizes for tonight's talent con- test will be \$5 for the top per-former of the evening; \$3, sec-ond prize, and \$2, third place winner.

City's Water Supply To Get Lift From Dalby Farm

Post residents are now assured an amply supply of water to meet all needs during the com-ing summer months by the recent purchase of water rights from the L. W. Dalby farm, eight miles west of Post. It was announced the first of the week by Mayor T. L. Jones.

The City Commission last Thursday night contacted with Mr. Dalby to purchase water at 3c per 1,000 gallons. The con-tract covers a 10-year period with another 10-year option coverage. The water will be measured through a meter and the City has enough pipe to connect the Dalby property with its present system.

The one well on the Dalby farm is now pumping approxi-mately 300 gallons per minute. The contract stipulates that as many as four wells may be over-laid on the 157-acre tract. The City now owns and operates 17 wells. The pumping is alternat-ed among the wells, with seldom ever over more than eight wells being used at a time.

The additional water was need-ed to supplement the present supply to take care of the Postex-Cotton Mills' expansion pro-gram and to assure Post resi-dents of sufficient water to meet their summer irrigation needs. Last summer during a number of days the peak consumption totaled close to 1,000,000 gallons.

Last month's water require-ment totaled 12,029,576 gallons, of which 4,571,300 gallons were used by the textile mill. The mill's gallonage will be increased by at least one-third more when it reaches its peak operation, Mayor Jones explained.

In August of last year, the peak month, the city consumed 22,243,849 gallons.

City Dads File For Places On Ballo

Mayor T. L. Jones, Commis-sioners E. S. (Buddy) Sawart and E. J. (Doc) Baker have filed their names as candidates for reelection to the offices they now hold and will have their names on the ballot in the city election to be held Tuesday, April 7.

Candidates have up until 30 days before the election to file their names for places on the ballot. Individuals may file their names or may be petitioned as candidates.

Absentee balloting in the city election will begin 30 days before the election.

The one polling place for the election will be in the city hall office now occupied by the Post school tax assessor-collector.

\$208,000 Damage Suit Is Settled

A \$208,000 damage suit which grew out of an automobile ac-cident, which occurred near the outer city limits of Post on the Lubbock highway last July 12, was settled out-of-court Monday when the parties involved agreed on a \$6,600 compromise.

The suit was filed in 106th Dis-trict Court, October 28 by M. H. Hutto, Jr., of this city, against O. G. Hamilton, his wife and daughter.

The accident occurred at an intersection of the old Ralls highway and Highway 84 one half mile north of Post. The Hamilton car, driven by Beth Hamilton, a minor, came into collision with a car driven by Hutto.

The original petition set forth that the plaintiff sustained in-juries and charged the Hamil-tons with negligence. Hutto ask-ed \$200,000 personal injuries, \$7,000 medical and hospital costs and \$1,000 damages to his auto-mobile.

For centuries, civilization has fought to gain and preserve the basic human rights of religious freedom, tolerance and the brotherhood of mankind.

Our nation was founded upon just such principles. Devotion to them has helped build the spiritual strength without which America could never have achieved lasting greatness.

Texans In WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON, APs—Congressman John E. Lyle of Corpus Christi says the President's veto power should be curtailed.

Mindful of former President Truman's successful vetoes of legislation to give the states clear title to the submerged coastal lands, Lyle proposes that the two-thirds vote now required to override a veto be reduced to a bare majority . . . 218 in the House and 49 in the Senate.

Congressional proponents of state ownership of the so-called tidelands would have had little trouble mustering that kind of strength to override the Truman vetoes.

"The two-thirds requirements," said Lyle, "represents a compromise among those drafting the constitution, between those wanting a monarchy and those advocating a pure democracy."

Enactment of laws is basically the responsibility of Congress rather than the Executive branch, Lyle pointed out, adding that Congress now is more representative of the people than it was when the two-thirds requirement was adopted. At that time the senators were elected by the state legislatures, not by popular vote as today.

Around the Capital:

They include passing on requests of various other committees for funds to conduct special investigations, handling measures affecting federal election laws and serving as a court of last resort in congressional election contests.

Burleson also is a member of the House Foreign Affairs Committee.

Business Cycles Are Inevitable And Ninety Percent Of Readers Are Tied Up With Five

Babson Park, Florida—I don't believe in A Universal Business Cycle. I do believe in many Business Cycles. Under Newton's Law of Action and Reaction, Business Cycles are inevitable with human nature as it is.

Many Business Cycles

When someone tells you he does not believe in the Business Cycle it is because he pinned his faith on one Business Cycle and tried to make the same Cycle apply to the stock market, interest rates, real estate, labor strikes, building, retailing, manufacturing, etc.

Not only do all the above have their own Cycles, but different industries may have different Cycles. For instance: Wheat has a 96-year Cycle; Iron and Steel a 6-year Cycle; Automobiles a 13-year Cycle, etc.

The Main Cycles

Although there may be a score of different Cycles, all working at the same time, 90% of the readers of this column are tied up with five main Cycles. These are: (1) THE 35-YEAR CYCLE, which applies to agriculture, weather, insect pests, etc. Every other 35 years the Cycle is very severe. Hence, some talk also about a 70-year Cycle; and others about a 50-year Cycle.

The Cycle which affects us all is (2) the approximate 9-10 YEAR CYCLE. Every other ten years this Cycle is especially pronounced. Hence, some talk about (3) THE 20-YEAR CYCLE. This particularly applies to real estate, new building, wholesale prices and general business—although, as above stated, different lines of business vary as to when their special 20-year Cycle starts and ends. Edward R. Dewey, who is perhaps the best living authority on Cycles, shows that a 9-10 YEAR CYCLE applies to forestry, fish life, ozone supply, atmospheric electricity and psychological changes in our desires and ambitions.

Stock Market Cycles

Two other common Cycles are the 42-MONTH CYCLE and the related 8-YEAR CY-

CLE This last is the Cycle used in the Address of the Autobiography recently published by Harper & Brothers of New York City. There it shows how \$2,000 invested in 1901 in the Dow Jones stock, approximately according to the cycle, could have subsequently advanced to include latest date: amount to over \$1,000,000 today without borrowing a penny. This is known as the Chapin Hoskins Cycle and appears in records of barometric pressure, sun spots, tree rings, certain commodity prices and the sales of some 25 leading U. S. corporations.

Of course, all bankers ridicule this Cycle Theory. If too many of their customers bought stocks only once in six years, they would starve to death. Even the Mutual Investment Funds, which last year did a business of \$4,000,000, cannot afford to go without dividends for three years while waiting for the market to drop. Besides, their sponsors could not support a sales force under such conditions.

Self-Control And Patience

Operating under any Cycle Theory requires great self-control and patience. It requires selling when the Government, brokers and magazines are bullish; likewise, it requires buying when everyone is discouraged and sees no hope for stocks at any price. On the other hand, those who do so operate on this Cycle Theory perform a great public service in helping to level out business and employment conditions.

Some conservative bankers do not believe in any Cycle Theory because it misses once in a while when different cycles conflict. Furthermore, although they admit it might have worked under a Gold Standard, it cannot be depended upon—they claim—with a Planned Economy and Paper Money. My answer to them is that they can operate on an Actuarial Basis the same as insurance companies do. Stock losses can be averaged the same as can fires, accidents and deaths.

Highlights and Sidelights FROM Your State CAPITOL

AUSTIN, Tex.—One step in the direction of solving the state's difficult highway problem was taken when the Legislature passed a resolution asking the federal government to abandon its two cents per gallon gasoline tax.

States now levying an income tax have agreed to give up that revenue source if the federal government will stop taxing gasoline. Texas has no state income tax, so Texas has everything to gain and nothing to lose.

The resolution was introduced in the House by Representative Will Lee Smith of Beaumont and in the Senate by Senator Johnnie B. Rogers of Austin.

A campaign to bring about retirement of the federal government from the field of motor fuel taxation was initiated by Governor Allan Shivers and the National Conference of Governors.

Farm and highway user groups are supporting the campaign. The resolution urges the governor to send suitable representatives from Texas to Washington to appear before congressional committees and urge repeal.

If the federal government abandons its two-cent tax, the state could impose that additional amount and thus, without actually increasing the gasoline tax as paid by the consumer, boost Texas' revenues by about \$60 million a year.

That amount has been going to the federal government annually from Texas highway users. But Texas has been receiving only about \$29 million per year in federal aid to highways.

Senator George Parkhouse of Dallas introduced a bill that would set up a district (similar to a water conservation district) for the purpose of building a Fort Worth-Dallas toll road.

In his message to the Legislature, Governor Shivers suggested that a commission be appointed to study whether or not a toll road is an answer to the vexing traffic problem.

Meanwhile, E. H. Thornton, Jr., chairman of the state highway commission says, that in his opinion toll roads are not the solution, except possibly in isolated cases such as that of the Dallas-Fort Worth route.

"Toll roads," said Thornton, "are not the panacea unless we want to embark on a program of unjustifiable deficit financing and project to the next genera-

tion the problem of paying for the road needs of our day.

"I won't subscribe to such a program, and I feel sure, neither will the people of Texas."

One way to build up highway finances would be to stop diverting road user taxes.

Representative Charles Murphy of Houston has offered a constitutional amendment to require that all taxes on motor fuel and lubricants must be spent on roads.

One-fourth of the gasoline tax now goes to the public schools of Texas. If the schools should lose this revenue, they would have to find other funds.

What's the right way to finance roads, and what's the right way to finance schools? Members of the Legislature would give you a rousing vote of thanks for an acceptable answer to that one.

If you want to see that the road situation is one source of information would be the 1953 Texas official highway map, now released by the state highway department.

The map is a 100 per cent Texas product. Wood pulp for the paper was grown in East Texas. The paper was made near Houston. The plates were made and the printing done in Austin.

When you buy your 1953 car license you can get a special pre-addressed card that you can use to send for the map. Or you can get one at any highway department district office or by wiring direct to the department in Austin.

The maps are free. Officials of the department are asking people to purchase their new automobile license plates early. The deadline is March 31. Not many county tax assessors will ask for automobile inspection certificates this year.

Members of the House of Representatives have voted for a proposed constitutional amendment which, if approved by the citizens, would raise the pay of legislators from \$10 per day to \$25 per day for the first 120 days of the legislative sessions.

If approved, the amendment would become effective January 1, 1955.

The proposal, introduced in the House by Representative Murphy of Houston, now goes to the Senate. It provides that after the first 120 days, the pay of lawmakers would drop to \$5 per day, the present rate.

In the House is a bill by Representative Robert Patten of Jasper, who advocates the creation of a public utilities commis-

sion. According to the terms of the bill, the governor would appoint members of the three-man commission for six-year terms.

The commission would be empowered to set telephone, gas, and electricity rates, except those of consumers' co-operatives or those owned by cities.

Patten said the commission is "necessary to assure just and reasonable rates for services and utilities products and thus protect the legitimate interests of the consumer and of such utility and assure adequate and non-discriminatory services."

Authority for fixing utility rates now rests with the cities, and it is felt by proponents of Patten's bill that a state commission would tend to bring about more uniformity in the pricing of utility services.

Approved by a House committee is a bill authorizing the state to issue \$6 million in revenue bonds and use the money to build a state office building and a courts building in Austin on property which is publicly owned.

Author of the measure is Representative Bill Daniel of Liberty, who says that construction of the new buildings would save Texas \$441,520 per year in rents now paid for office space in privately-owned buildings around the capitol.

Speaking for the bill at the committee's hearings were Supreme Court Justices St. John Garwood, Meade Griffin, and Robert Calvert, who said working conditions in their offices in the capitol are crowded and uncomfortable.

Should banks close on Saturday?

That question is stirring up interest and causing letter-writers to address members of the Legislature.

The present regulation is that banks must stay open five and a half days a week, except for 13 legal holidays. But a number of big city banks are supporting the five-day banking week, as proposed in a bill introduced in

the House by Representatives W. H. Abington of Fort Worth and Garth Bates of Houston and by Senator Parkhouse in the Senate.

Some big banks are supporting the measure because they feel it will help them to institute a five day, eight hour work week. Country banks are inclined to oppose the proposition because they do a lot of business with farmers and ranchers on Saturday.

The bill is merely permissive—each bank would do as it pleased about opening on Saturday morning.

Representative Jack Bryan of Buffalo has introduced a "fair trade" bill effecting cigarettes only.

The bill would prohibit below-costs of cigarettes by requiring all retailers to add at least 10 percent to the wholesale cost.

New chairman of the state board of pardons and paroles is Thomas B. White, who has been a member of the board for the last two years. He succeeds Lynn C. Harris, who continues as a member of the board. A new member is Jack Ross of Edinburg, who succeeds R. A. (Smoot) Schmid of Dallas.

TIPS FROM YOUR COUNTY AGENT

By JESSIE PEARCE

Safety is something all of us hear a great deal about, but most of us go along and do nothing about it.

How well prepared are you for an accident in your family? When have you checked your list of first aid supplies or do you have any at all?

For families living on the farm, several miles from a doctor or telephone, it is essential that they have a good first aid station and know how to use it. If you have an opportunity to take a first aid course, do so. If not get a first aid book and study it so that you will be prepared when an accident occurs. The Red Cross First Aid Text Book is a good reliable source of information.

Here is a check list of supplies for a first aid station in a farm home suggested by a country doctor.

Two dozen sterile gauze pads, two inches square.

Two dozen sterile gauze pads, four inches square.

Two boxes of sterile cotton swabs.

One roll of sterile cotton, 1/2 inch adhesive tape in cans.

One box of gauze and adhesive bandages, assorted sizes.

One package tissues.

One triangle shape sling.

Twelve rolls one inch bandage.

Twelve rolls two inch bandage.

One (one ounce bottle) of tincture of metaphen or merthiolate to use as an antiseptic. (Replace this when the supply runs low and before you need it. Keep it away from children as antiseptics are always poison.)

One bottle aromatic spirits of ammonia.

Six ounces of tincture of green soap.

One bottle rubbing alcohol (for sterilizing instruments.)

One bottle household disinfectant, such as Lysol.

Other items: medicine droppers, an eye cup, a basin, two clean towels, scissors, tweezers, and some pieces of light wood or heavy cardboard for splints.

Assemble your first aid supplies and keep them all together in a place that is easy to reach.

I don't anticipate accidents around your farm, but statistics show farming to be the third most hazardous occupation in the nation.

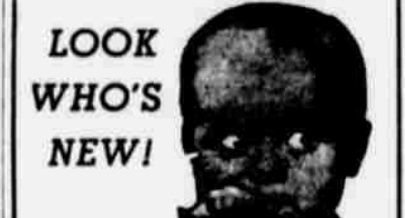

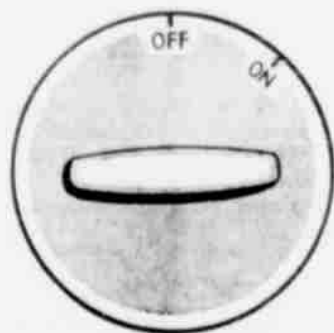

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SIDELIGHTS FROM WASHINGTON

By George Mahon

Editor's Note: The Post Dispatch is pleased to publish the following news release from Congressman George Mahon and hope that he finds time to write a Washington release each week to be used as a regular feature in this publication.

I had my first visit a few days ago with the new Secretary of Agriculture, Mr. Ezra Taft Benson, of Utah. The two Texas Senators, Congressman Poage of Waco, and I went to his office to invite him to address the American Cotton Congress in Lubbock on June 27. In addition to extending the invitation we talked about problems of agriculture in general, including such matters as farm labor difficulties, problems arising out of the continued drought, the possibility of cotton acreage controls at a future time, and other matters. Mr. Benson was easy to talk with and seemed to be well-informed and sympathetic toward agricultural problems. I was favorably impressed with him.

The Executive Branch of the government has been in the spotlight, but the Legislative Branch is about to get moving again. The new Congress convened on January 3, but not until February did we have our first roll call vote on legislation. The issue was whether to give President Eisenhower broad authority to reorganize the government in the interest of economy and better management. I joined with a majority of the Members in voting for the bill. As the vote was progressing one of

my colleagues asked me if I knew that during the last session of Congress I had made the best record of any Texas Member in answering roll calls. I had not known this, but he said that according to a recent publication I had answered 97 percent of all roll calls, the average for Members of Congress generally being 82 percent.

Almost inevitably a Member misses a few calls each year because of illness or temporary absence from Washington. Of course, merely answering the roll call is just part of it; voting wisely is the more difficult part.

President Eisenhower's inaugural speech was good, but it was made in the open air and under very difficult circumstances. Last week the setting was perfect when he addressed the joint session of Congress. The Members were in their seats and the galleries were packed. He was thunderously applauded. Every Member was, no doubt, in disagreement with him on some issues, but all were with him on many of his proposals.

For the benefit of the television audience the President was made up for the occasion with a little face powder. Rather than the customary white shirt and dark suit, he wore a pale blue shirt and gray suit. This did not mar his appearance for those personally in attendance, and it greatly improved his television appearance.

My assignment on the Appropriations Committee in the new Congress is the same as in the previous Congress except that all committee chairmanships are now held by Republican Members. Hearings on money bills are already under way, and there is little doubt but that material reductions in spending requests will be made. Last year we succeeded in reducing budget requests submitted by the President in the sum of eight and one-half billion dollars.

Plans To Ease Classroom Shortages Tend To Cripple Post School System

Charles H. Tennyson, executive secretary of the Texas State Teachers Association, said Tuesday that plans for easing the critical classroom shortage will be seriously handicapped if local school districts are required to pay a bigger share of the minimum foundation program.

"Local schools already are paying more than 40 per cent of the cost of public education in Texas," Tennyson said, "although those who want to rearrange the school financing pattern cite only the figures showing the local schools pay about 20 per cent of the minimum foundation program cost. They fail to cite the cost of current and payment of bonded indebtedness."

D. C. Arthur, superintendent of Post schools, said "forty per cent is the average paid by the majority of schools, but Post schools are now paying 70 per cent of the cost of public education." Arthur continued to say that this minimum foundation cost is supposed to be on a 40-60 per cent basis, with the state paying 60 per cent of the foundation cost and the local schools furnishing 40 per cent of the cost.

The big differences in percentage lies in the fact that the minimum foundation program does not represent total school costs. Local school districts must pay many additional expenses themselves, including the cost of new buildings and facilities.

Figures compiled by the Texas Education Agency show that the total cost of public education in Texas during the 1951-52 school year was \$318,963,078. Tennyson said. Local school districts paid \$132,832,708 of that amount, or 41.6 per cent. The state paid \$186,130,370, or 58.4 per cent. The federal government contributed 1.7 per cent, or \$5,211,713, mostly for the school lunch program.

"The above figures are for the state as a whole and do not include Post," Arthur said. "During 1951-52, Post school district paid \$180,000 or 70 per cent of the public education cost, while the state paid \$65,000 or 30 per cent."

F. F. A. grass judging team and one member of the poultry judging team from Post high school attended and competed in the contests held at the Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show in Fort Worth, last Friday and Saturday. The contestants then had to give the grazing value of the grasses, the values are good, fair or poor.

Schmiedt said that the boys gained a great deal of confidence by attending these contests. The poultry team member was disqualified because other members of the team were unable to attend because of illness.

Members of the grass judging group from Post are: Auda V. Teaff, James Barron, Moody Graham and Franklin Maxey. Novis Furr is the poultry team member who attended.

Schmiedt said that the Chamber of Commerce contributed \$15 to the boys to help pay their expenses on the trip.
