Six hundred feet of new fire hose just arrived which will enable the department to reach greater distances within the city and to have some stand-by hose, according to Frank Barnes, fire chief.

Some new fire clothing such as fire boots, bunker coats, gloves and hats have been purchased to add to existing equipment which was inadequate for the number of members now in the Volunteer Department.

School Board Approves

Assessment Ratio Change

School trustees approved a change in assessment ratio of all property in the Hart Independent School District from 65 to 90 percent of market value. In so doing, the tax rate was dropped from \$1.85 to \$1.50 which will result in an actual increase in taxes of approximately 12 and a half percent for the 1974-75 school year.

Board members cited the rising costs of providing quality education. Spiraling inflation is evident in such instances as the increase cost of gasoline from 21.05 to 41.50 cents per gallon. Duplicator paper, they pointed out, has increased from 67 cents per ream to \$1.80.

Another notable factor has been the failure of the State and Federal governments to provide additional funds for

Texas schools in the past two years to help combat inflation.

Joe Bailey, J.D. Myrick and R.G. Henderson were appointed to the tax equalization board with Wade Mills and Charles Black as alternates. July 24-25 were set for equalization board sessions.

In other action, the board approved Insurnational's student accident insurance program for the 1974-75 school term.

Twelve bids were received on the 1965 Dodge 54-passenger bus and a high bid of \$1,989 by Northline bus Sales of Houston was accepted.

Board members employed Debbie Matthews, spring graduate of Abilene Christian College, to teach in elementary school for the 1974-75 school year.

THUMBPRINT COOKIES

- 1/2 c. soft shortening
- 1/4 c. brown sugar
- 1 egg
- 1/2 t. vanilla
- 1 c. sifted flour
- 1/4 t. salt
- 3/4 c. finely chopped nuts

Mix thoroughly shortening, brown sugar, eggs, and vanilla and nuts. Sift together flour and salt and add to first mixture. Roll into 1" balls. Place one inch apart on ungreased baking sheet and press thumb into center of each. Bake 10-12 minutes at 375° until set. Cool. Place in thumbprint, jelly or tinted confectioners sugar icing. Makes 2 dozen.

BRAISED STEAK IN COKE

- 3 Club or T-bone steaks
- 1 small onion (chopped)
- oil
- 1 qt. Coke

Brown steaks in oil, add onions and pour Coke over steaks. Simmer for two hours or until tender.

BROCCOLI AND RICE CASEROLE

- 2 c. chopped broccoli
- 2 c. rice
- 1 c. cheese sauce
- 1 can cream of mushroom soup (optional)

Cook broccoli and rice, then mix together. Pour in cheese sauce and soup. Mix thoroughly. Bake in 350° oven until warm. (about 20 minutes)

Two leading contenders for 1974 world championships plan to be among top pro cowboys returning to Plainview June 13-15 for the Bar None rodeo, the Rodeo Cowboys Association said.

Oklahomans Marvin Shoulders of Henryetta and Barry Burk of Duncan have indicated early that they plan to compete at Plainview. Shoulders, with more than \$11,500 in winnings, is in the midst of an extremely close race for the current bull riding title. He won the bull riding and \$353 at Plainview last year. Burk, six-times runnerup for the world calf roping championship, is back in his customary second place position in the latest standings with more than \$11,400.

Thursday, Friday and Saturday night performances at the Bar None Rodeo Arena will feature saddle and bareback bronc riding, bull riding, calf roping and steer wrestling, said local rodeo chairman Charlie Cypert.

Contestants will add their entry fees to a \$1,890 purse. Last year at the rodeo, with 171 entries, prize money topped \$5,600.

Entries for the rodeo, which is being produced by Beutler Brothers and Cervi of Sterling, Colo., will close by 5 p.m. June 12.

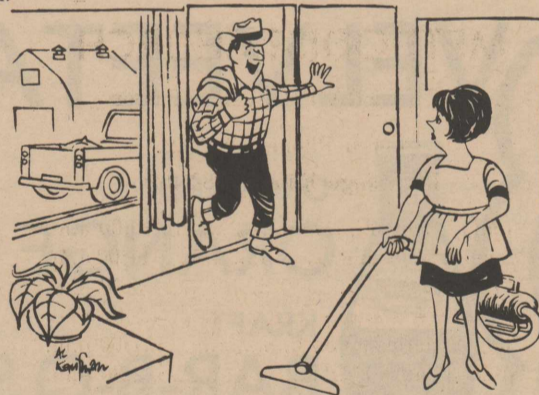

enhance radio communications in fire protection and tornado watches.

Attempting to secure some type of water tanker that will provide adequate amounts of water for rural fires, several possibilities are being considered at the present time.

The Hart Department operates on a low budget with some aid from the city and county. The Farm Bureau Insurance makes a donation to the department for calls made outside the city. The only other finances received comes from donations and money-making activities by the department.

The city of Hart at the present has a very high fire insurance rate," Barnes said. "The high key rate assigned to Hart by the State Board of Insurance is due mainly to the low credits given to the Hart water system and the low credits given to the Fire Department. The city and the fire department both are attempting to correct some of the deficiencies that will allow Hart better insurance credits."

This is a slow and expensive undertaking with the finances available, according to Barnes who said, "At the present the Fire Department is selling fire extinguishers, the proceeds are to be used to defray the cost recently purchased fire equipment. It is felt that adequate clothing is very necessary to the department in order to protect the lives and clothing of the firemen, especially since the firemen receive no compensation for services and time."

The fire extinguishers being sold by the Hart Fire Department are not only a means of making money by the department, but they are also a means of serving the farm and home with some fire prevention equipment. These extinguishers are available from any member of the fire department.
