TWO OHIOANS WITHIN DAY OF NEW MARK

CITY OF CLEVELAND IS STILL ALOFT; PAIR UP IN CALIFORNIA

CLEVELAND, O., July 4.—Disregarding hazards that for a time seemed to threaten the Blue Monoplane, City of Cleveland, pilots Roy L. Mitchell and Byron K. Newcomb wheeled about Cleveland airport today in a trying battle against hope and fatigue as they approached by little better than one day the world's record for refueled endurance flights.

Tonight they come within 24 hours of the world's record of 172 hours 32 minutes and one second, established recently in Fort Worth by Reginald Robbins and James Kelly.

Newcomb and Mitchell have flown above the airport here since 6:33:51 Friday night—six days at the same hour this evening. They cruised in their monoplane circle today, aiming at a record exceeding by at least one hour the mark which faced them when they took off almost a week ago.

STAINED KNIFE, AXE AND SHOES BELIEVED CLUES TO CRIME

DETROIT, July 4.—Discovery of a stained knife, a short ax and a pair of freshly washed shoes in the barn of Angelo Depoli, 34, led to his arrest late last night in connection with the slaying yesterday of Benny Evangelista, "divine prophet" of a religious cult, his wife and four children.

The body of Evangelista with the head severed and lying on the floor beside the chair on which it was slumped, was found in his home yesterday by Vincent Elias, real estate dealer.

Bodies mutilated

Police, summoned by Elias, discovered the bodies of Mrs. Evangelista and her children, all in bed, horribly mutilated. Arms of one of the children were amputated, and the heads of all were almost severed.

MADRID GOES WILD AS MEN RETURN HOME

MADRID, Spain, July 4.—The Spanish trans-Atlantic fliers and five British officers of R. M. S. Eagle who saved them after being seven days lost in mid-Atlantic near the Azores came to Madrid together on a special train from Algeciras today to be greeted with an ovation such as this capital rarely has seen.

Madrid sleeps late ordinarily, but today at dawn thousands were crowded around the railway station waiting to see Major Ramon Franco, his three companions and their British rescuers. When finally the train arrived from Algeciras, a small city opposite Gibraltar, they broke through the police lines and crowded onto the station platform.

Noise deafening

The human avalanche swept aside the train porters, employees and passengers attempting to alight, and kicked luggage from the platforms. Their roars drowned every other sound, even the engine whistles and the brass bands. The large official representation which had planned a dignified greeting and welcome was lost in the shuffle.

Outside the station the crush was just as bad, with the crowds extending back almost solidly for half a mile.

YOUTH ADMITS SHOOTING HIS AGED FATHER

FIFTEEN-YEAR-OLD SAYS HIS LIFE WAS IN DANGER

PIGGOTT, Ark., July 4.—George Parker, 15, has confessed he shot and killed his father, Whit Parker, 50, and then fired their farm home to cover up the crime.

Although he gave two versions of the actual shooting, it was the belief of Sheriff George A. McNeill the elder Parker came home drunk Tuesday night and threatened to kill his son. The slayer was ordered held on a murder charge.

Father Had Gun

George told Dr. George Coss, in the presence of the sheriff, he killed his father as the elder Parker approached him cursing, with a shotgun in his hands. Later the boy told the sheriff his father chased him out of the house and he returned and shot him through a window.

The boy then said he went to a hiding place and got \$20 of his father's money. He next poured kerosene "all over everything in the house."

The lad was arrested when he bought new clothes "to go away."

'UNTIN' OFF ON 2ND LEG OF HOP

CHICAGO, July 4 (AP)—Two radio messages told the Chicago Tribune today its amphibian plane, the "Untin" Bowler, had taken off from Remi Lake, Ont., which it reached yesterday, for Great Whale river, about 400 miles north, on the second leg of its projected flight to Berlin.

The first message, signed "Wood," stated the takeoff was at 5:58 a. m. Robert Wood, aviation editor of the Tribune, is a passenger on the flight. The second message, timed 6:48 a. m. and signed "Cramer," said the flying conditions were ideal. Parker D. Cramer is co-pilot and navigator.

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BARRELS TAMPERED WITH IN CHICAGO WAREHOUSE

CHICAGO, July 4.—The Tribune said today that 50,000 gallons of bonded whiskey, estimated at bootleg prices to be worth \$2,000,000, has been stolen from the Sibley Avenue warehouse, government concentration depot for the middle west.

The theft, said the paper, have been going on for a year, and an investigation has been under way in Washington for a month. The Tribune's information was to the effect that an 84 page typewritten report was in the hands of Dr. James Doran, prohibition commissioner.

Barrels Tampered With

The report was said to have stated that 738 barrels of whiskey had been found to contain colored water instead of whiskey.

Dr. Doran was quoted by the Tribune as saying in Washington that investigation was "about completed."

"I don't know just how many barrels are affected," the newspaper reported him as saying. "It is possible that the barrels were tampered with, but I do not think that many were removed. There are 3,000 to 4,000 barrels in the warehouse."

FORFEIT TO BE MADE ON 421 BARRELS

WASHINGTON, July 4 (AP)—Prohibition Commissioner Doran announced today that action to forfeit 421 barrels of whiskey, which had been tampered with in the bonded warehouse of the Sibley Warehouse company in Chicago, would be started at once by the prohibition bureau.

The action is the result of an investigation into the disappearance of whiskey which had been stored in the warehouse.

FIRE DEMON HOVERS OVER MORE FORESTS

ARIZONA IS HIT BY CONFLAGRATION; MAY BE GREAT

SAN FRANCISCO, Calif., July 4.—The fire demon continued to feast today upon the choice scenery and pretty homes of Mill Valley and upon ranches, forests, and grain fields elsewhere in California and Arizona.

In two places—in the canyons and ridges above Mill Valley and in the Apache Indian reservation of eastern Arizona—the demon still ate greedily. The Mill Valley fire was believed to have been diverted from the town and surrounding residential district but was crawling up to the wooded slopes of Mount Tamalpais to die.

Pine Forests Burning

Telephone operators reported a fierce conflagration in the area, the center of one of the largest pine forests in Arizona. A wall of smoke rolled through the White Mountain region. It was so thick in Springerville breathing was difficult. Springerville is north and well outside the reservation. Little information about the blaze was available because telephone lines to White River, near the center of the reservation, were down.

A fire at O'Neal's, Madona county, Calif., swept 30,000 acres, destroying ranch homes, cattle, grain and dry feed before it was brought under control yesterday.

TWO ARE KILLED IN FIREWORKS EXPLOSION

OMAHA, July 4 (AP)—Two persons were killed in a fireworks explosion and fire which wrecked the four story building of the Brinn and Jensen wholesale paper and notions company late yesterday.

The dead are Myron Jensen, 18, son of J. P. Jensen, president of the company, and Harry Jones, vice president of the concern.

Jones and Jensen were trapped on the top floor of the building along with three other workers who escaped with their lives. One of the three, William Poll, 10, was burned slightly before firemen could reach him.

Threatens Other Buildings

For an hour, the fire threatened nearby buildings in the wholesale district before brought under control by practically the entire Omaha fire department. Skyrockets and set pieces shot in all directions while police struggled to hold back a crowd of several thousand.

SECRET OF UNKNOWN TO BE SOUGHT

NATIONAL MUSEUM MAN TO STUDY OF ALASKAN AREAS

WASHINGTON, July 4 (P)—Locked in the banks of the historic Yukon, in the northernmost reaches of Alaska, lies the secret of a strange people, unknown to science, which may be uncovered this summer by Dr. Alex Hrdlicka, curator of anthropology of the National Museum.

Revealed by remains found in mounds—bones made of burned-out trees, a form of burial wholly unknown in Alaska, there is no other knowledge on which to base an understanding of "the lost race."

Found in River Basin The mounds, first reported last year by a former missionary, were found from five to seven feet in a bank of the river.

Their occurrence at such unusual points indicates, according to the anthropologist, that Alaska once had a much warmer climate. In the present time, the earth is perpetually frozen beneath the two in one-half foot mark.

Historic even before the days of the gold rush, the Yukon may have been the devious avenue traveled by ancient Asiatic people into North America.

Remains Found A second object will be the excavation, as far as the river may permit, of the old site in the bank at Anaktuvuk. Human remains, unlike those of the present Yukon Indians, have been found, accompanied by semi-frozen bones of animals, a good many of which no longer live in the region.

Another object will be to explore briefly the sites of six or seven dead villages on the Shageluk slough. They were according to early Russian accounts, of considerable importance.

More than 2,000 miles of the journey will have to be made in small boats.

MODERN VALJEAN'S CASE BROUGHT TO LIGHT; SHOCKING JUSTICE REVEALED

PARIS, July 4 (P)—A 14-year-old French boy, without money, tried to go to America. How that adventure started him on a fight with justice that has cost him the best days of his life has reached the front page of the Paris papers, and has shocked the French conscience almost as much as the mythical case of Jean Valjean.

The victim's name is Edouard Ponto. Deserted by his mother during the war while his father was at the front, Ponto was made the ward of a farmer. Badly treated, the boy ran away, hoping to reach America.

Boarded Train He boarded a train at Paris for Havre without a ticket. He was arrested at Havre and sentenced to

six years in prison for swindling the railroad company. Educated in prison, Ponto was released and sent to the army to do his military service.

Gets Sympathy "Six years in prison," comments a Paris columnist, in a savage attack on the courts. Then the barracks society did not refuse this lost child the right to die for his country.

"But the barracks are almost a paradise for Ponto. One cat, has a bad makes friends. He is released in 1927 with a certificate of good conduct. Then justice slips again; the army clerk thought it was necessary to write on Ponto's precious discharge papers the fact that he was an ex-convict.

"There Ponto was condemned to die of hunger. After leaving his

regiment, he can find work nowhere. Why should anyone hire a youth who had been in prison? Ponto can not find work, but he does find men with whom he served in prison."

Ponto has just been arrested again and condemned to five years more in prison.

TWO STATE AMENDMENTS UP JULY 16

RAISE OF GOVERNOR'S SALARY AND COURT CHANGE ASKED

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, July 4.—Texans, nearly always adverse to amending the state constitution under which they have lived so peacefully and happily throughout many years, are now asked to make changes in two portions which have been unaltered since the document was first penned.

On July 16 the voters will pass on the propositions of raising the salary of the governor from \$4,000 to \$10,000 annually and increasing the membership of the supreme court from three to nine.

Previous Effort Downed
A previous effort to amend the constitution in order to pay the governor more money was defeated. In fact, until lately, Texans had an aversion to amending the constitution, and it was a difficult task to get authorized an alteration.

"If the old document was good enough for my father and grandfather it is good enough for me," is an expression frequently heard when the matter of amending the constitution is broached.

But, the fact that the "old document" provides for a \$4,000 salary for the governor indicates that times have changed considerably since it was adopted, advocates of alterations argue.

Effective in 1931
In the event the amendment increasing the governor's salary is adopted it will not become effective until January, 1931, at the end of Gov. Moody's term.

The present occupant of the executive mansion has repeatedly declared that he would not approve any resolution calling for advancing the amount of remuneration received by the governor unless it was provided it would not take effect until the term for which he had been elected had expired.

Lawyers Advocate Move
Many lawyers are advocating the amendment increasing the membership of the supreme court to nine. The present court consists of three members, a supreme justice and two associates. But, in addition there are two commissions of appeals, consisting of three judges each. These commissions were created in recent years to take from the overworked court a part of the official load. To the commissions are referred cases by the court and after the commission works out a case and files its findings the court reviews the opinion and either approves or disapproves.

Five members of the court would constitute a quorum and it would

So we may take note of the extremes and steer our course thereby, accepting their toned-down or modified versions like the princess lines, the better waistline, and so on, if we would be up to the moment in style without being extreme.

Extreme Models Shown
Two of the extreme models, showing the trend toward fall, are sketched. It is interesting to note that the tennis frock advances this fashion idea of normal waist and fitted lines. The frock at the left was worn by Madame Mathieu, one of the French tennis stars during recent matches played for the championship of France. It is of wash silk in a one-piece effect, tucked into a yoke at the shoulders to give looseness to the blouse and fullness to the skirt. A very narrow belt confines the normal waistline. The frock is, of course, sleeveless.

The frock at the right is from a model worn by Senorita de Alvarez, famous Spanish star. This also is fashioned of wash silk in a princess frock fitting the figure snugly, sleeveless, with a yoke from which drop vertical seams released into pleats below the hips, to give the necessary fullness to the skirt. This frock created quite a sensation, it is said.

The center model represents the type of tennis frock worn by our own Helen Wills. It is in decided contrast to the other two frocks, for it has still clinging to the two-piece model of linen or cotton, with the midriff fashioned on straight lines and dropped rather low over a pleated skirt. She has, however, abandoned the sailor collar. In its place she adopts a collarless neckline with small turned back revers at the front, not quite in keeping with the normal waist and fitted lines, but the type of sports frock our American women are wearing.

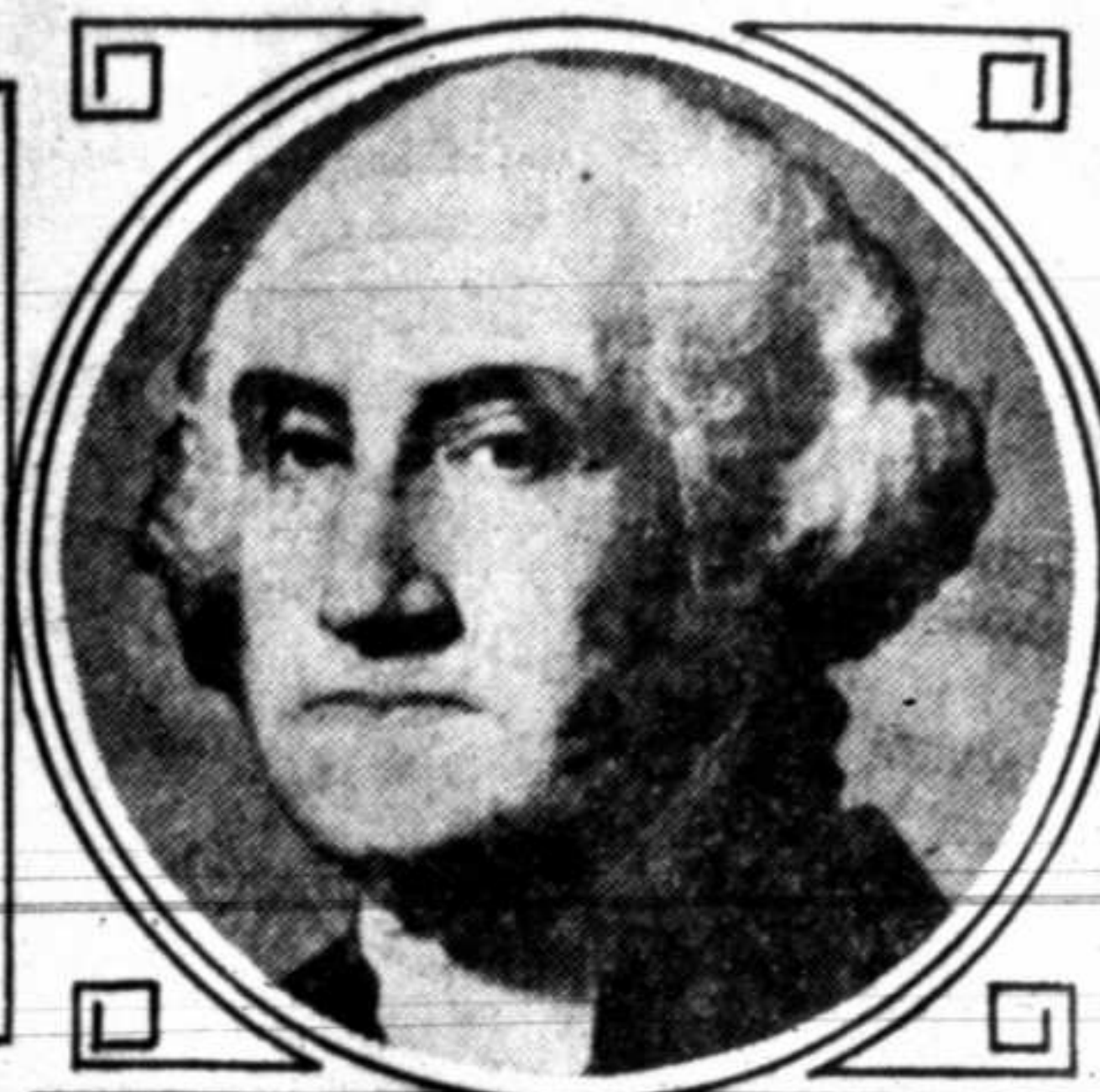

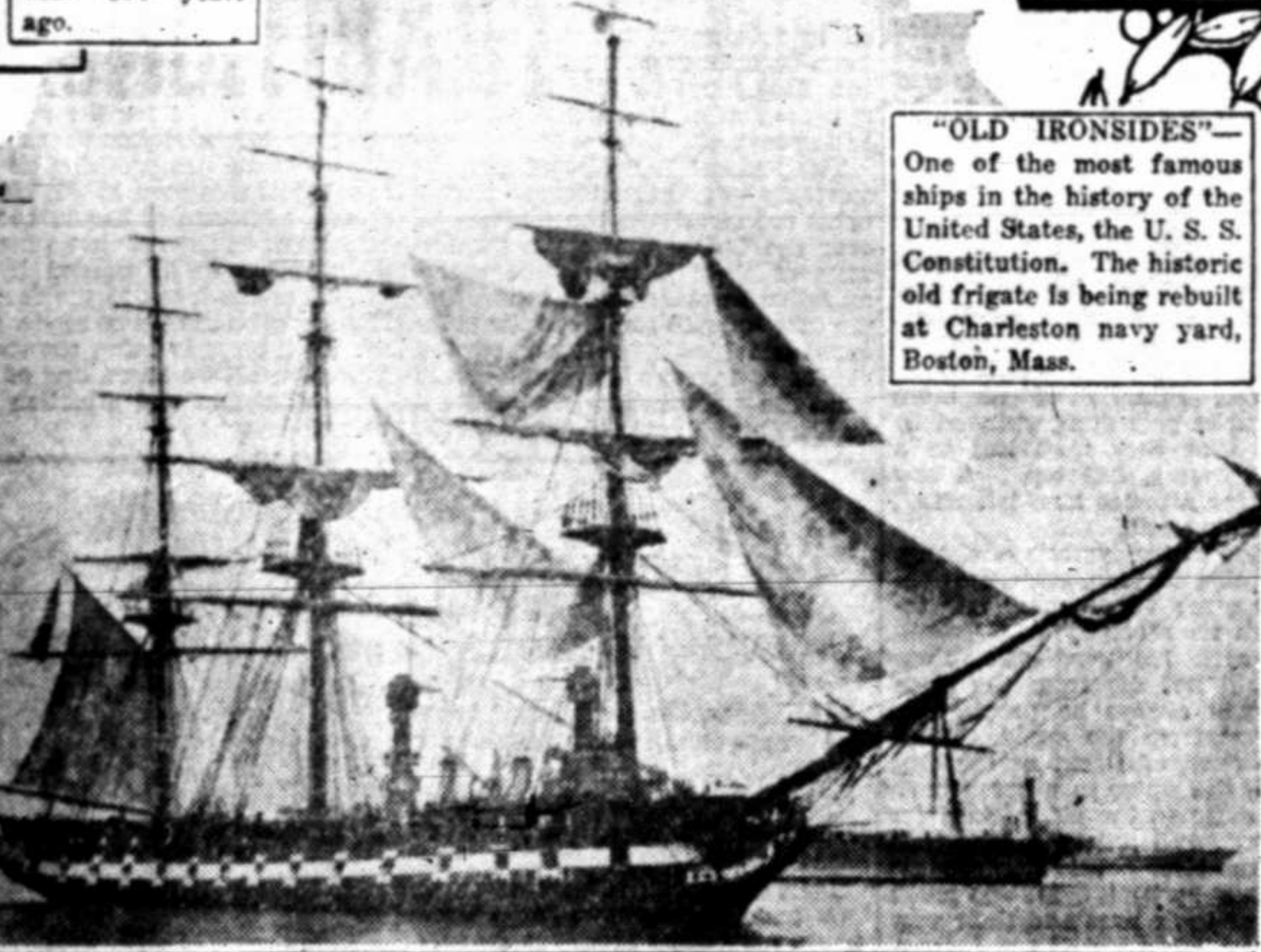
