QUESTS MADE FOR THIS AREA

COMMITTEE IS ASKED TO TAKE SPECIAL MESSAGE TO PRESIDENT OF UNITED STATES

Recommendations pertaining to this area were made Wednesday at the President's Drought Committee in Dallas. The committee members were W. G. Yeary, J. H. Caldwell, Fred Tarbox representing the county. County Agent J. Stovall also attended the meeting. Representatives of Lipscomb, Wheeler and Roberson were present.

At the requests made at the meeting was that soil erosion work or wind erosion be coordinated so that controlling on a state line would be effected by lack of control. It was also suggested that a complete soil and water survey be made in this area. It was pointed out that surveys have been made in this area and have been found of much value and in some cases resulted in setting up irrigation plots. The requests will be carried direct to President Roosevelt.

Referring to the meeting Mr. Stovall said he considered it successful and that members of the drought committee were very complimentary on the cooperation received from farmers in this area.

WHEAT CHECKS EXPECTED HERE

ACCEPTANCES RECEIVED COVERING 758 CONTRACTS TOTALING CASH PAYMENTS OF \$282,320 FRIDAY

Wheat checks covering cash payments totaling \$282,320 on 758 contracts have been expected to arrive in Perryton for the past few days. The acceptances covering these payments were received by the local AAA officials last Friday. Checks usually follow within two or three days and there is no question but that the large sum will be available to the wheat growers of Ochiltree county not later than Friday.

County Agent Stovall states that there are 900 contracts from the county and that all but five are in Washington for issuance of checks. The five that are held up are awaiting signature of landlord. The acceptance sheet is an official notice from the AAA at Washington that the contracts have been given final approval and that checks are being written.

In the absence of District Judge E. J. Pickens, H. E. Hoover was selected special judge, on the opening day of court last week. During the past week, Judge Hoover disposed of several court cases. This week and next he is hearing non-jury civil cases.

Named by Judge Hoover as Jury Commissioners for the next term of District Court were L. R. Conner, Clyde B. Rogers and Val McLanahan. With Thankful Hearts

Thou hast led us into the wilderness, O Lord, and blest it and made it fruitful. And for this and all Thy blessings we thank Thee. We thank Thee for the gentle rain and for the sun that shineth after the rain; for the good earth and the fruitful bough and the rich harvest. For Freedom and for Hope we thank Thee, O Lord, and for stout hearts and sturdy backs and willing hands.

It was a vast land, frightening in its immensity to men whose fathers had lived and died in the tight little shires of England, the fields and duchies of feudal France, the castellated towns of the Old World. It was a land of extremes, of raging flood and searing drought, of gentle warmth, blazing heat and bitter numbing cold. Screaming winds tore over its raw prairies; its great central valley was fifteen hundred miles across and down its middle a monstrous swollen river rolled its silt-laden current to the sea. If there were regions so thickly forested that a squirrel might travel a thousand miles jumping from tree to tree, there were also regions, equally vast, where cactus, greasewood and sagebrush were the only living things and naked cliffs showed their crazy nightmare colors to an empty sky.

Here was Nature at her best and worst; here she had worked and sported in her every mood, piling wonder on magnificent wonder without let or stint; forest, mountain, canyon, meadow; desert, swampland, plateau, jungle. There were storm-tossed inland oceans—Great Lakes, the Indians called them. There were other oceans, too... limitless seas of waving grass where buffalo moved by the millions. There were hundreds of millions of acres of rich black loam, fallow since time began. There was iron, coal, sulphur, copper, phosphate, oil. There was silver. There was gold.

Into this amazing land, awful in its splendor, mercurial, quixotic, lavish and cruel, came the white man. He came to escape the tax-gather's staff and the jailer's lash. He came rich in servants and kingly grants or with nothing but his heart and his two hands. He came for devilment and he came to worship his God. Nature fought him, silently, terribly, retreating inch by inch before his tiny tools. Raging rivers, howling blizzards, fever, swamp, the fearful rattlesnake all took their toll. He saw his wife and children dragged away to die horribly at the hands of screaming savages. But always the lodestar of destiny drew him on; westward he followed the setting sun.

His axe blade rang in the Pennsylvania clearing, and a thick black ribbon of Illinois soil rolled back from his plow; the ruts of his wagon wheels channeled the mud of the North Platte and the Republican; he dipped his arms in the waters of the Sacramento. Behind him raw sprawling towns arose and the railroads webbed across the land. And still he came, Englishman, Frenchman, Scotchman, Swede; Greek and Irishman, Italian and Pole; German and Jew and Spaniard and Hollander. He worked on the railroads, he tunneled in the mines, he sent the trees crashing to earth. He built his home upon the stark prairie, sowed his wheat, nursed his cattle and his swine, toiled and sweat and labored and saw all swept away by flood, fire, wind and drought. He labored and built anew and Nature laughed again and destroyed a second time, but still he pressed on. The hot winds burned him and the Arctic gale. He grew lean, hard, mercurial as the land; quick and keen, thrifty and profligate by turns, terrible in anger, quick to forgive.

And so, slowly, he became an American.

On the last Thursday in November in the midst of her huge black cities and on her tiny farms America turns to celebrate her own great national holiday. But the skyscrapers and the silos are no longer there; back across the miles and centuries the American is sitting with his Pilgrim comrades in the dark New England wilderness. The turkey and the mince pie are but symbols; beneath the jollity of Thanksgiving the heart beats high with a love of country not to be expressed in words. It is a very real thing.

We thank Thee, O Lord for this, our own America, and for the glorious heritage which we are privileged to build into her shining future. Ever mindful of Thy Presence, O Lord, we ask, with grateful hearts, Thy Blessing.

FARMERS WILL BEGIN SURVEY

PLAN SHEET FOR EVERY FARM IN COUNTY WILL BE MADE COUNTY REPORT WILL BE COMPILED

At a call meeting of county agents and home demonstration agents of District 1, in Panhandle Friday a plan was presented whereby farmers will work out a long-time program. County Agent J. T. Stovall and Miss Wertha Tarter attended the session.

Under the plan members of the county agricultural councils will make surveys, or appoint individuals to make surveys, which will include recommendations of the farmers to the extension service. A farm plan sheet will be filled out for each farm, showing present acreage in cultivation, production, etc., the objective for 1938 and the long-time objective. The information from all sheets will be compiled in one report from this county.

Mr. Stovall and Miss Tarter will meet with the agricultural councils and work out a plan for making the survey. They will participate in the project, however, only to the extent that presentation of all pertinent facts will be made to farmers and farm women who are themselves to determine any recommendations or proposals that come as a result of the work. They will lend such assistance and advice as may be requested by the farmers, and will assist the county planning committee in preparation and transmittal of county data.

HIGHWAY WORK BEGINS FRIDAY

INFORMATION RECEIVED THAT CONSTRUCTION ON THE SIX MILE STRIP STARTS AT ONCE

Information has been received that work will begin Friday on the six mile strip of paving on State Highway No. 4. The work will be under the direct supervision of the state highway department with J. E. West, resident engineer and W. A. Crosson and Virgil McGee, assistants in charge. It is a WPA project and will furnish work to 100 men over a period of four months it is estimated.

WPA workers employed on the highway project will be paid thirty cents an hour for common labor and may work a maximum of ninety-eight hours per month.

The paving will begin at the south city limits of Perryton and extend to one-half mile beyond where the old and new roads fork. A ten-inch compacted caliche base will be laid.

YOUTH KILLED WHILE PLAYING

HUTCHINSON COUNTY BOY DIES AS ROPE CATCHES RAFTER IN FALL; FORMERLY OF THIS COUNTY

Borger, Nov. 22.—The body of 14-year-old Albert Elwood Coffee was found hanging from rafters of a shed near the youth's home in North Hutchinson County today.

Investigators said the youth apparently was playing in the loft of the building with a rope around his neck when he fell, the rope snagging on a projection and strangling the victim to death.

Young Coffee was the son of Mr. and Mrs. A. M. Coffee, residents of the Gulf Dial Pipe Line camp near Stinnett. The body was discovered by the victim's four-year-old brother, Kenneth, who released the body and summoned his parents.

Funeral services for young Coffee will be conducted at 2 o'clock Monday afternoon at the Borger American Legion Hall. Burial will be at Lieb under the direction of the Carver-Powell Funeral Home of Borger.

The victim was a member of the Pi Kappa football squad and the Sons of the American Legion.

Surviving are his parents; three brothers, Wade, Teddie Carter and Kenneth Coffee; a sister, Effie Coffee, and his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. H. C. Coffee, Pampa, and Mr. and Mrs. Searce, of Morris—Amarillo News.

Mr. and Mrs. A. M. (Bud) Coffee lived in Perryton and vicinity for several years, and Albert Elwood spent the first years of his life here. The Coffees lived here just prior to moving to Hutchinson county. Their many friends in this community regret to learn of their sorrow.

CAN REPUBLICANS COME BACK?

A major political party can survive a long period of defeat of its Presidential candidates—as the Democratic Party, which didn't even get close to control of the White House in 1920, 1924 and 1928, so vividly demonstrates today.

But can a major party survive an election in which its officeholders—who are the sole source of the patronage that is so vital to any political machine—are reduced to the lowest number in history?

That question is now being considered privately by Republican leaders—and publicly by practically all of the country's publicists and political columnists.

Under the American elective system, a party can receive a respectable popular vote and still be out in the cold when the time comes for calling the roll in Congress, State legislatures and municipal councils. That is what happened to Republicans in the debacle of 1936. Governor Landon polled around 37 per cent of the popular vote—yet received only 1 1/2 per cent of the Electoral College vote. Republican candidates throughout the country polled about 17,000,000 votes as against about 27,000,000 for the Democrats—yet they were victorious in only a microscopic proportion of the contests.

Best example of this is the House of Representatives. It was universal conceded, before November 3, that the Republicans would make gains, irrespective of who won the Presidency. Democratic spokesmen said hopefully that these gains would not amount to more than 20 or 30 seats, while Republicans claimed they would gain well over 100 seats. Non-partisan commentators placed Republican gains at 40 to 50 seats.

Actual result was startling. Instead of gaining seats, the Republicans lost 15. Instead of losing seats, the Democrats gained 13. Farmer-labor candidates gained 2.

In the Senate, it was mathematically impossible for the Republicans to achieve control, but everyone thought they would have a better showing next Congress than last. Result: The GOP lost 6 seats. The Democrats gained 5. The discrepancy of one is explained by the reelection of Senator Norris on an independent ticket.

Worst of all, a number of the remaining Republican senators belong to the "Progressive Bloc" which is bitterly opposed to Hoover, Landon, Hamilton and other leaders.

The next Congress, then, will answer the roll as follows: Democrats in the House, 334; Republicans, 89; Democrats in the Senate, 75; Republicans, 17.

Also vitally important to any party are Governorships—a great deal of the patronage that keeps political machines well oiled and members contented flows from statehouses. Here again Republicans made the worst showing in their long history. There were 33 gubernatorial chairs to be filled—and Democrats won 27 of them. This gives the Democratic party 39 State Chief Executives.

So the party that received the

largest vote ever accorded a losing ticket, got almost nowhere in attaining representation in high offices. (Complete figures for county and municipal elections are not obtainable, but the Democratic sweep was overwhelming.) Leaders of the party thus say, with some justice, that our elective system is unfair to minorities. On the other hand, Democratic spokesmen say the Roosevelt victory is important not only because of the majorities attained, but because it extended to every section of the country and broke down long-established lines of partisan sympathy.

To get back to the original question, can the Republicans come back? Their party heads say they will. Among non-partisan commentators opinion is that the party has a good chance to come back—but that considerable reorganization must take place, a new and aggressive program must be adopted, and new faces must replace some familiar ones in party councils. One leading Republican, Representative Fish of New York, has already demanded that present party heads resign.

What will happen remains to be seen. The hard fact is that no major party ever was at so low a state as the GOP is at present—the Democrats in their hungriest days always had a large representation in Congress, governorships, state legislatures, municipal councils, etc. But politics is a surprising game—and the unprecedented can always occur. One guess as to what will happen to the two-party system in the next four years is as good as another.

Father Coughlin of the Union for Social Justice promised before election that if his candidate, William Lemke, did not poll 9,000,000 votes, he would go off the air. Father Coughlin is now off the air, Mr. Lemke having polled only about 500,000 votes.

Never did minor candidates—Prohibitionist, Socialist, Communist, etc.—make a worse showing. In post-war history, only third-party leader to make a strong showing was Senator LaFollette, who polled more than 4,500,000 votes in 1924.

III. Onesimus and Philemon

Onesimus had run away from Philemon (as the world might view it), but as God must have had some part in it, Paul speaks of it as parting. Though formerly an unprofitable servant, and no doubt the occasion of much concern to Philemon, matters would be different from now on. For this servant had come to Rome and had met the apostle. Through Paul's instrumentality he became a Christian. Now he is being returned by Paul to Philemon "no longer a servant, but more than a servant," a brother beloved. What changes had been wrought by the power of Christ! Instead of slave and master Philemon and Onesimus were partners, brothers in the Lord, co-workers in the greatest business in the world—that of saving the lost. How the gospel levels the hills and exalts the valleys! How it seizes with irresistible hands the chasms of caste—social, financial, racial barriers! When we are Christians, we are brothers and sisters in the Lord. The gospel melting pot makes one family and one kindred of all the teeming masses of earth who will obey the gospel and become members of the kingdom of Christ.

So Onesimus would return to Philemon to be partners for life.

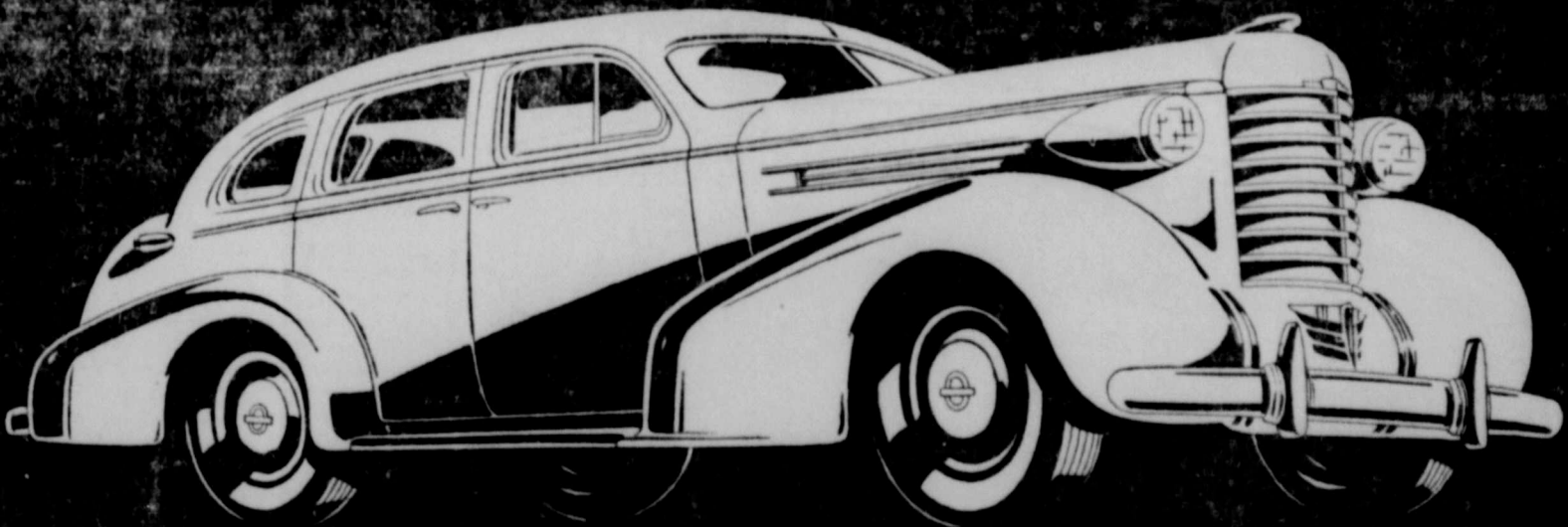

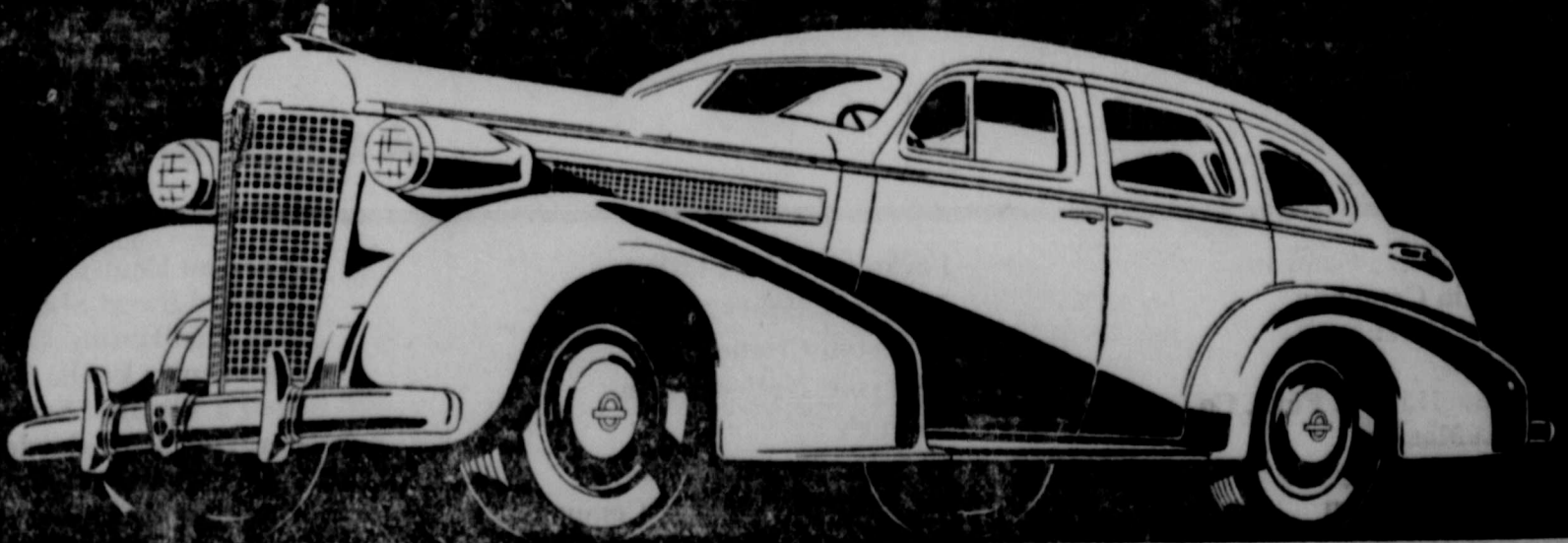

RANGERS LOSE TO PANHANDLE

OUTPLAY OPPONENTS IN CONFERENCE PLAY-OFF BUT THE BREAKS CAUSE 13 TO 12 DEFEAT

The Perryton Rangers upset the Panhandle Panthers considerably Saturday evening though the Rangers trailed them by one point, the final score being Panhandle 13, Perryton 12. The game was all for Panhandle, the home town was betting 2 to 1 and giving as many as 24 points, and the Panhandle boys were expecting somewhat of a cinch. During the first half the Perryton Rangers received several penalties, but they outgained the Panthers even with the penalties subtracted. Lilly added about the biggest thrill of the game when he broke off of left tackle for 59 yards to the Panther 12 yard stripe one play after the Panthers had made their second touchdown. McWilliams repaid the worth of several tickets when he broke down the field for 35 yards and made a touchdown. McWilliams played a splendid game and he led the Ranger attack like a true Ranger. Schroeder had to rush his punts and C. Sparks out punted him; however, Schroeder knocked down a pass deep in Ranger territory, and probably saved another Panther touchdown. Jones smashed center in the third quarter for a touchdown, and also intercepted a "Sparks to Sparks" attack on the Ranger 5 yard line, which completed could have resulted in a Panther touchdown.

The Rangers played a "heads-up" game and many a poor Perryton "Gambler" wished he had not given so many points. Both teams are the best class "B" football teams in the whole Panhandle of Texas, and Perryton High School hope the Panthers take all the honors they can by as wide margin as possible. Between the two teams it is hard to say that one is the better; they both are class "A-1" class "B" football teams.

McWilliams passes to Pittman for 16 yards. Schroeder goes over left tackle for 1 yard and the first 20 yard penetration of the game is made. Perryton is penalized 25 yards. Perryton fails to make the necessary yardage and Panhandle gets the ball on downs. After a series of long gains around both ends featured by a 29 yard gain the Panthers get the ball in scoring position. C. Sparks kicks the winning point. Panhandle then kicks back to Perryton. Jones receives the ball, laterals to Pittman, who laterals again to Lilly who fumbles on about the thirty yard line. Panhandle recovers after failing to gain through center, one of these celebrated Sparks to Sparks circuit was broken by Schroeder who knocks down a pass that might have easily spelled another touchdown for the Rangers; and the first quarter ends.

The Perryton Rangers walked all over the Panthers in the first half as far as yardage gained, and 1st downs are concerned, but the breaks were against them. It seemed that every time the Rangers put the ball in scoring position, they were penalized for something or other.

The third quarter begun with Perryton receiving. C. Sparks boots the ball over the goal line and playing starts on the Perryton 20. Lilly and McWilliams run the ball to the 35 yard line and McWilliams fumbles. Jones, Perryton, recovers. Lilly loses 2 yards; and Schroeder was rushed and only punts to the 41 yard line, where the Panther fumbles and the Ranger recovers. McWilliams galloped 35 yards for the first Ranger touch down. Jones attempts to kick but the whole Panther line was on him before McWilliams hardly got the ball placed. Ferguson, Perryton, kicks to Panhandles 30 yard line. C. Sparks runs the ball about 18 yards and the Panthers receive their first 15 yard penalty. C. Sparks then punts to the 30 yard line, where McWilliams gathers it up and carries it back to the 50. Then follows an exchange of punts, Perryton to Panhandle, then Panhandle to Perryton, then Schroeder, Perryton, received a bad pass from center and is rushed considerably and fails to punt but 15 yards. Crawford gains about five yards when another "Sparks to Sparks" circuit is broken up by Johnson on the 5 yard line and runs it back to the 17 yard line, and the ball game is saved again. RANGERS LOSE TO PANHANDLE BY 13-12 SCORE

BURKMAN PLAY INSPIRED BALL
SATURDAY AFTERNOON IN
HARVESTER STADIUM
IN PAMPA

Cosch Burk's Perryton Rangers topped off the 1936 season in rare form, even though they were defeated at Pampa last Saturday afternoon by the Panhandle Panthers for the championship of district 2B. The score was Perryton 12, Panhandle 13.

Before a crowd of 3,000 cheering fans from all parts of the northeast panhandle, the Rangers excelled in every department of the game with the exception of punting in which C. Sparks, quarterback for the Panthers outdistanced Schroeder, right halfback for the Rangers.

The much feared, and expected aerial attack of the Panthers wasn't exhibited except on three occasions, one of these being the first touchdown of the game when C. Sparks passed to Paul, left end, from the Rangers 23-yard marker, and Paul stepped across the goal line. C. Sparks converted for the extra point. This was during the last minutes of the first quarter.

Had it not been for the heavy penalties which the Rangers were given during that first quarter there might have been a different story. But due to the anxiousness of the Burkmen they were penalized time after time, twice cutting off sustained drives.

Within a few plays after the kick-off to start the second half, McWilliams thrilled the crowd with a scintillating dash around his left end to cross the pay line 32 yards away. The extra point was blocked when Howe, a most consistent penetrating guard for the Panthers broke through the Ranger line.

Trailing by only one point inspired the Rangers beyond anything that has been seen from them this season, threatening the much touted Panhandle boys on more than one occasion.

During the early stages of the fourth quarter, after a march down the field by the Panthers with one completed pass and end runs and line plunges netting good yardage, Smith, Panther fullback, plunged over the Ranger line from the 3-yard marker to score Panhandle's last touchdown. C. Sparks' attempt at conversion was no good.

With a determination which would not give, the Rangers bowed their necks and once more started for the promised land.

With a climaxing thrill of the day, Lilly, left halfback for the Rangers, slid around his right end, and behind perfect blocking sped 59 yards down the sideline, for what looked like a sure score. N. Sparks overlooked Lilly on the 12 yard stripe to temporarily stem the Ranger offensive onslaught.

After two unsuccessful attempts to advance the ball, McWilliams slipped over his left tackle for 10 yards, placing the ball a few yards from the goal from which point Jones pushed it over for the touchdown. But again Jones' try for extra point was no good, ending the scoring for the game, 13 to 12.

This game was really a heart-breaker to lose, after the Rangers had piled up such an extensive lead in yards gained both on the ground and through the air over the Panthers.

To the STOCKHOLDERS of the OCHILTREE COUNTY FARM LOAN ASSOCIATION

In the last four issues of the OCHILTREE COUNTY HERALD, we have had the Code of Ethics printed (as adopted by your Board of Directors) in order to correct a taken idea some of our members have as to what the Association's relation to the Federal Land Bank is, and what responsibility each member has, and also the responsibility placed on your Board of Directors.

In 1917, the Congress of the United States passed an Act, establishing a CO-OPERATIVE system by which the Farmer and Ranchman could get credit at a lower rate of interest, and on longer time payments, by establishing 12 Federal Land Banks, those Land Banks in turn organized the local Farm Loan Associations over their respective territories. The Federal Government does not loan the money; they only endorse the bonds of the Land Banks and guarantee their payment in order to make them saleable on the market at a low rate of interest. Your notes and mortgage goes into the Land Bank and are put up to secure these bonds, and the stock that you are required to take is held by the Bank to pay the delinquencies in case there are some that fail to meet their payments. If all of us would keep our payments up we would get a dividend on our stock, but if some fail to pay it falls back on the ones that do pay, therefore if you fail to keep your loan in good standing it not only hurts you but it also hurts your neighbor, as your Association has to guarantee all notes accepted, and all delinquencies are charged back to the Association making the loan.

For several years prior to 1929 this Association had kept its payments up and we paid a dividend on our stock, and the Land Bank had paid the Federal Government back for the stock the Government had bought to start with, but since that time there has been so many that have failed to keep their payments in good standing that the Government has set up other agencies in order to carry over through the depression; it has set up what is called the Commissioners Loan, which permits the borrower to get twenty-five per cent more on his land by giving a second lien on his land, and it has authorized the taking of a crop mortgage for carrying over delinquencies where it is impossible for the borrower to pay it otherwise. But as the Government has set up still other agencies such as Wheat Loans and Soil Conservation, etc., the Bank requires the directors of the Association to investigate and make a full report on each borrower, as to whether he is doing his best, or if he is using the money so acquired to pay other debts; as the Land Bank holds first mortgage on the farm, and it is through that farm you get the money, it should receive first consideration.

Now as to the Association and its duties. The local Association is composed of the borrowers who hold stock in the Association, and under the rules and regulations they hold an annual meeting in January of each year for the purpose of hearing the report of the preceding year, and the election of a board of directors for the following year. The board of directors are composed of five members elected at each annual meeting, who serve for one year without compensation, except they are allowed to draw their actual expenses, and they in turn elect a Secretary-Treasurer whose duty is to attend to all matters pertaining to the Association, and to keep a record of same, and report to the directors and to the Bank when called on, and to collect all money due the Bank or the Association; he is under a heavy bond for the faithful discharge of his duties.

As a member of the Association it is very important that you attend the annual meeting and elect a board of directors that will give of their time and thought. This Association has about \$100,000 in stock at this time, and the board of directors are under a heavy obligation as it is required to investigate each loan and guarantee it to the Land Bank before they will make a loan, the same rule also applies to extensions, as they must also be approved by the directors before they will be accepted by the Bank.

We find there are some people who think that the Federal Government is furnishing the money on our loans, but they are not. It is strictly a cooperative organization and must stand on its own merits, the Government only guarantees your notes in order that the Land Bank can go on the market and sell its bonds with a low rate of interest to get the money to let you have at less than half the interest you had to pay before it was organized.

In other words, if you fail to keep your loan in good standing by either paying your installments as they come due, or making application for extension in case it is impossible to pay it, and to remember that the Bank holds first claim on your farm and for them to carry on with you it will be necessary for you to show your good faith by putting them first, by giving additional security on any other proceeds from the farm.

Col. J. M. North Dead

Pioneer Ochiltree County Business Man Dies Suddenly in Amarillo, Monday

The entire community was shocked Monday evening when word came in from Amarillo that Col. J. M. North, pioneer Ochiltree county business man, had passed away at 6:15 p. m. Col. North was visiting in the home of his daughter, Mrs. J. F. Claybrook, when the end came. Shortly before his death, he had complained of not feeling well but no concern was felt over his condition.

The deceased was born on June 10, 1867 at Junction City, Kansas. Shortly after his birth, his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. L. North, returned to their home at St. Joseph, Mo. Here on December 23, 1890, he was married to Miss Ida Cavey. In 1901, the Norths moved to Blackwell, Oklahoma where they resided until 1905, when Col. North homesteaded in Beaver county, Oklahoma near Clear Lake, where they lived until 1910, when they moved to old Ochiltree. Here they made their home until Perryton was started in 1919.

Surviving relatives are the widow; a daughter, Mrs. J. F. Claybrook, Amarillo; a daughter, Mrs. Clyde Cofer, Perryton; and a son, J. L. North, Oklahoma City. In addition there are a number of grandchildren and four brothers: Will North, Butte, Mont.; Arthur North, Canada; Fred North, St. Joseph, Mo.; and John North, Blackwell, Okla.

Funeral services were held at the Baptist church in this city on Wednesday afternoon at two-thirty o'clock with Rev. J. M. Sibley, Tulsa, Oklahoma, officiating, after which the body was laid in its final resting place in the Ochiltree cemetery.

Col. North had played an important part in the development of Ochiltree county. Coming to old Ochiltree in 1910, he engaged in the hotel business, later erecting a building in which he operated a furniture and undertaking business. He was a leader in the various movements to secure the railroad for this county and was one of the

prime movers in the negotiations that resulted in the Santa Fe building across the North Panhandle. Prior to the building of the Santa Fe and for a number of years afterwards, he was actively engaged in the real estate business. When Perryton started in 1919, Col. North was one of the first to move and the North was Perryton's first hotel. This old hotel building, wrecked within the past year, used to stand just north of the Ellis Theatre.

For a number of years Col. North retired from active business life and devoted his time to the operation of his wheat farms, however, several years ago, he returned to the commercial field and erected a large grain elevator on West Brilliant. He was operating this business at the time of his death.

In the sudden passing of Col. North, Perryton and Ochiltree county has lost a true friend and builder, a man who has devoted much time to the betterment of every phase of life in this community. Ever a friend of his fellow man, he heeded every call when he could be of assistance to his neighbors. A good man has passed on to his reward.

Drought Rate Dead Line

December 31 is Expiration Between States, February 12 Within States, Is Report

Expiration dates on special drought shipping rates to farmers have been announced by Washington officials. Between states the expiration date is December 31 while within the state is February 12.

Twelve cars of feed have been shipped to Ochiltree farmers to date, according to the county agent. Cottonseed cake, corn and milo are the main feeds shipped in and weights have varied from 40,000 to 70,000 pounds per car. The saving to farmers has amounted to about one-third of the freight cost.
