Livestock show judging Saturday

The 49th Annual Mitchell County 4-H and FFA Livestock Show is scheduled Thursday, Friday and Saturday this week with all judging to take place on Saturday.

Mitchell County Extension Agent Mike Mauldin said there are 32 steers, 75 lambs and about 100 hogs entered in this year's show.

John Kearney, a vocational agriculture teacher from Sterling City, will judge the steer

and lamb shows while Randy Gillam, vocational agriculture teacher from Snyder, will judge the swine show.

Judging of swine will be at 8 a.m. Saturday followed by judging of lambs at 1 p.m. and judging of steers, also at 1 p.m.

A premium auction of the six grand champion and reserve champion animals will be held at the conclusion of judging on Saturday, said George Walker, president of the show.

Forbes announces for Pct. 2 JP post

Mitchell County Precinct 3 Justice of the Peace Billie M. Forbes has announced her candidacy for election to Precinct 2 Justice of the Peace.

Justice of the Peace Precincts 2 and 3 will be combined to Precinct 2 beginning in 1987.

Mrs. Forbes was first elected to office in 1984 to fill an unexpired term.

"I have enjoyed the past two years and would like to continue as long as the people of Mitchell County will allow me to," said Mrs. Forbes.

Since becoming a justice, she has completed a 40-hour course at Southwest Texas State University, Justice of the Peace Training Center; a 20-hour continuing education course from Southwest Texas State; a 40-hour school from the West Central Texas Council of Governments in Basic Crime Prevention; and an 8-hour school on selected new legislation from the West Central Center Texas Law Enforcement Academy.

"I would like to thank the people of Mitchell County for their support and ask for their vote in the May primary," she said.

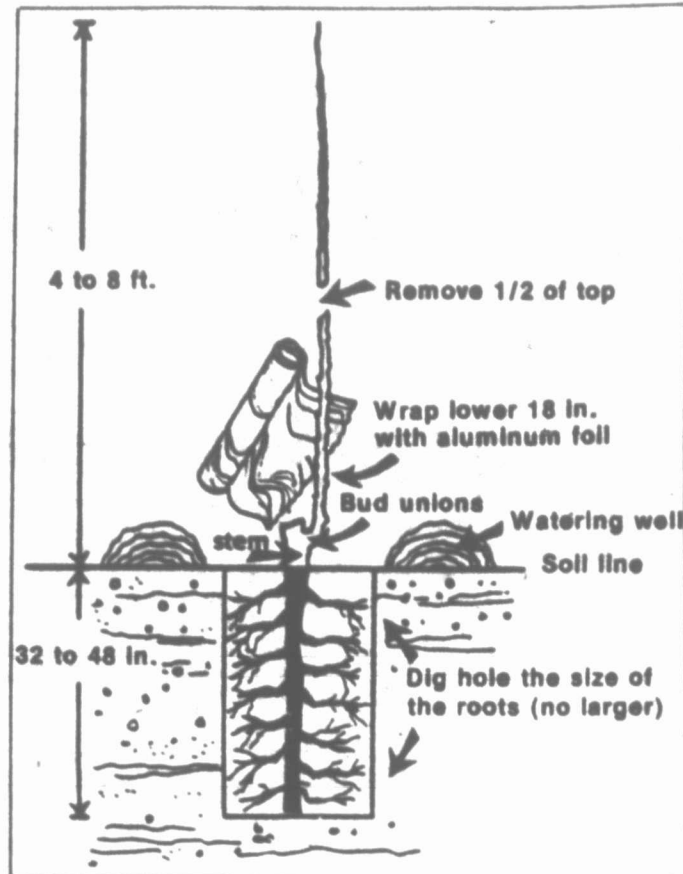

Plant pecan trees properly



How to properly plant a pecan tree

COLLEGE STATION—After a good pecan crop such as the one in Texas this year, a lot of backyard gardeners turn their thoughts to growing their own tasty morsels. Also, many commercial growers are continuing to expand operations.

One of the keys to growing pecans, whether in the backyard or in a commercial orchard, is to plant the trees properly so that they get off to a good start, points out Dr. George Ray McEachern, horticulturist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

Tree planting time is at hand—January and early February are the best times—and McEachern offers a few guidelines.

To begin, select a tree 4 to 8 feet tall as soon as nurseries get supplies. Plant as soon as possible, using care not to let roots dry out or freeze.

Dig the hole only as large as the tree's root system. If the hole is too deep, the tree will settle and this can cause poor growth or death.

The taproot should sit in the bottom of the hole. If the hole cannot be as deep as the length of the roots, cut back the taproot to fit the hole.

Pack original soil around roots as tightly as possible. Packing the soil in 2 to 3-inch layers is better than watering to pack the soil. Use adjacent soil to complete filling the hole, not light soil, sand or potting soil. The tree can drown in rainy weather if light fill soil is used on clay land.

Plant the tree at the same depth it grew in the nursery row. Look at the colors to determine the soil line: the bark is gray and the root is dark brown.

Cut off the top half of the tree at planting to balance the stem and roots and to force growth close to the soil line.

Wrap the lower 18 inches of the trunk with aluminum foil to prevent side shoots, sun scald and rabbit damage. On large plantings, use a mixture of white latex paint and water (one part paint to three parts water).

Build a basin around the tree to hold water and give each tree five gallons of water immediately after planting. Make sure trees do not go longer than 14 days without water.

These are some basic steps in planting pecan trees that can lead the way in getting them into production in a few years, says McEachern.

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Drip irrigation to be focal at meeting

COLLEGE STATION—Some of the "pros and cons" of growing cotton under drip irrigation will be explored at a program February 18-19 at Midland.

The Drip Irrigated Cotton Symposium and Trade Show will be at the Holiday Inn-Country Villa and will open at 1:30 p.m. the first day. The event is being hosted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service of The Texas A&M University System.

Information will be presented to cotton farmers on the potential and risks of growing cotton under drip irrigation," points out Joe Henggeler of Fort Stockton, Extension Service agricultural engineer. "In two years of demonstration work, we have witnessed successes as well as disasters on drip irrigated cotton, and speakers at the symposium will discuss factors that led to these mixed results.

"Drip irrigated cotton is still experimental in Texas, with about 200 acres grown last year," notes Henggeler. "However, more than 25,000 acres of cotton are now being grown under drip irrigation in Arizona, where yields have been increased 25 to 40 percent."

The symposium will cover topics ranging from installation to the economics of a drip irrigation system, Henggeler points out. Key discussions will deal with farming changes under drip irrigation and the effects of drip irrigation on cotton insect control, growth regulators and varieties.

Speakers from Arizona and California as well as Texas will be on hand to talk about drip irrigation in cotton production, including a panel of Texas farmers.


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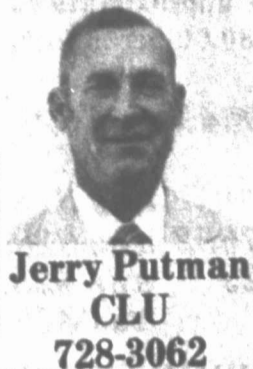

Old Drug, New Use

Adenosine monophosphate (AMP) is a drug that has been used for years in treating multiple sclerosis and Hodgkin's Disease. A recent study has shown a potentially new use for the drug. It can be used as a treatment for shingles (herpes zoster). Shingles is caused by the varicella (chicken pox) virus. The disease gets its name from an old word for "belt" or "girdle." It starts with a painful rash that follows a belt or girdle-like pattern. The virus traces nerve cell pathways, usually on one side of the body. Eventually, the skin dries out and sheds. However, the pain gets worse and may last months. In tests, 88 percent of AMP-treated patients were pain-free after four weeks. The U.S. F.D.A. is waiting to improve the new use of AMP.

The loss by the girls dropped them to 0-4 in the first half of district 7-AAA, which they were to have concluded against 4-0 Coahoma Tuesday night.

The boys stand at 1-1, but things look much worse than that where the first half is concerned. With Crane and Kenny Walker doing nothing to sidetrack from an expected district championship, the Wolves had hoped to finish in second place. The loss to Ozona has opened the door not only to the Lions, but also to Ballinger, who entertains Colorado City Tuesday.

The Wolves can ill afford another loss in first half play to anyone, but Crane can still hope for a three way tie for second in the first half between Ozona, Ballinger and the Wolves. Anything less than an outright second place in the second half would almost surely leave the Wolves at home during the playoffs. Of course, all that is

based on the assumption that Crane will not be upset at anytime down the road.

The heart-breaking four point loss by the girls to Ozona was the third straight contest which the Lady Wolves have played well early, only to fall behind in the second half.

A small offensive output in the third quarter was the biggest thorn for the boys in their loss, said coach Mike Hart.

The search for the fabulous

In 1528, the ill-fated Spanish expedition to "La Florida," consisting of five homemade boats, was shipwrecked on the coast of Texas. This landing on the "Isle of Malhado," (most likely Galveston Island), marked the first recorded European intrusion into the present state of Texas. Of about 300 Spaniards who survived, historian William Griggs recounts, only four men eventually lived through sickness and encounters with hostile coastal Indians. These four, Alvar Nuñez Cabeza de Vaca, Andres Dorantes de Carranca, Alonso del Castillo Maldonado, and Estevancio, a black slave of Dorantes', lived among the Texas Indians for nearly eight years, acting as healers and medicine men. Traveling from tribe to tribe, the four eventually made their way through Texas back to Spanish settlements on the east coast of New Spain, or what is now Mexico.

continued the search for gold, moving into present-day Kansas. They did find Quivira. But it was only a modest Wichita Indian village and did not hold treasures of gold. Disheartened, the expedition turned south and headed back to Mexico, torturing and executing "The Turk" for his trickery along the way. Coronado reported to the King of Spain, "I have done all that I could possibly do to serve Your Majesty and to discover a country where God our Lord might be served and the royal patrimony of Your Majesty increased."

It was Cabeza de Vaca who perpetuated rumors of seven cities of gold on the frontier. New Spain Viceroy Antonio de Mendoza purchased Estevancio from Dorantes and sent him as a guide for Friar Marcos de Niza, who was to make a preliminary search for the seven cities. Estevancio was killed by Pueblo Indians, but Friar Marcos returned to Mexico more convinced than ever that the legendary riches did indeed exist.

To locate and claim the wealth that he was sure could be found, Mendoza appointed Francisco Vasquez de Coronado, Governor of New Galicia, to lead an expedition into the unknown country in the North. The small army of 1,000 men began their journey at the small Mexican town of Compostela in February, 1540. Traveling north with 1,500 horses and mules, the largest European expedition ever to penetrate the region conquered pueblo after pueblo, devastating the Indians with more powerful military tactics.

Historian David Weber notes that Coronado called upon the Pueblo Indians to "acknowledge the Catholic Church as the ruler and superior of the whole world, and the high priest called the Pope, and in his name the king and queen of Spain." He promised kind treatment to those who acquiesced and war and slavery to those who resisted. Coronado lived up to his promise with the hundreds of Pueblos who resisted.

Some historians believe that the Pueblos conspired with the Plains Indians whom the Spanish called "The Turk" to lead the expedition east out of Pueblo country in search of a land called Quivira. "El Turco" convinced the Spanish that they would find great wealth there. After a Mass of Thanks-giving in Palo Duro Canyon, they
