Main Event At Arena Excites Hundreds

Wrestling Monday night at the Sportarena in Eastland attracted approximately 1,100 spectators. In the preliminary event of the evening between Big Humphrey, a 320 pound heavyweight from St. Louis, Missouri, and Larry Hamilton, 228 pounds from Kansas City, the time limit was set at 20 minutes.

In the early part of this event Hamilton tried several means and ways to tie up Big Humphrey, but with very little success. In the last minutes of the event Humphrey pinned Hamilton to take the match.

In the semi-final event between Sugi Sito and Joe Scarpello it proved to be very close. Both men in the same weight division and only six pounds difference going in the favor of Sugi.

The first fall went to Sugi. The second fall to Scarpello and the final fall a draw. Thus the match proved to be a draw.

In the main event of the evening between Duke Keomuka, 215 pound judo expert from Honolulu, Hawaii, and Cowboy Carson a 215 pound Ekakal, Montana cowhand, it was a dog eat dog all the way from start to finish.

In the first few minutes of the first fall Keomuka used judo slashes and body slams, putting Carson on the mat holding his throat on many occasions. The first fall went to Keomuka as he had Carson in his power all the way. In the second fall, Carson came back at full strength, and with the help of screaming crowd behind him he went all the way to take the second fall.

In the third and final fall it turned into a rough and tumble event with spectators screaming and standing in their seats backing Carson. Keomuka, using judo punches, knocked Carson out of the ring and when he made it back on to the mat he tossed Keomuka out on the hard concrete. Larry Hamilton, a wrestler in the first event of the evening, rushed to the ring and started beating Carson to give Keomuka an opportunity to get back on the mat, and this turned the event into a madhouse! When Keomuka gained the ring again Hamilton left and Keomuka at once sent Carson out of the ring. On demands from the referee to let Carson return, Keomuka would have no part of this, but a sleeper hold on Carson and he slid to the canvas. The referee at once raised the Cowboys hand and gave the match to him on an referees decision.

It was a great evening of entertainment for the people of Eastland county.

Henry Pullman, owner of the Sportarena stated that if the public showed the interest that was displayed the first night that famous wrestlers from all over the country would be booked for the Arena. He also stated that women wrestlers would be on the card in a few weeks.

The schedule for Monday night, April 12, is as follows: Cowboy Carson will face Col. Stu Gibson in a two out of three falls, sixty minute time limit for the main event.

In the semi-final event, Henry Lenz will meet the famous Sugi Sito in a two out of three event with a 45-minute time limit.

In the opener, a one fall, 20-minute event, Big Humphrey will face Roy Graham.

Tuesday morning the voters began going to the polls again to vote for two city commissioners. There are only two candidates seeking the two posts. The uncontested candidates are Dr. M. A. Treadwell and Cyrus Frost.

Commissioners Vote To Abandon Section of Road

Eastland County Commissioners unanimously voted Monday to recommend that the state abandon a portion of old Highway 89 between Eastland and Olden.

The section of road involved is bordered by the O. A. Tindall property. The court asked that the state deed the property back to the original owner.

The recommendation was the only action taken by the court. All commissioners were present and County Judge John Hart presided.

Mr. Davenport was born September 17, 1869 in Coryell County, Texas. He was married to Lucy De Leach in Waco on Dec. 23, 1890 and moved to Ranger in 1901. He was a member of the First Methodist Church in Ranger. He was a retired farmer and postal department employee.

He is survived by his wife, of Ranger, two sons, Boyd E. of San Antonio and Grady of Ft. Worth; three daughters, Lessie Davenport of Ranger; Mrs. T. O. Gracey of Breckenridge, and Mrs. Lucille Barber of Ft. Worth; three brothers, F. E. of San Angelo, A. S. of Gainesville and Judge G. L. of Eastland; six grandchildren and seven great grandchildren.

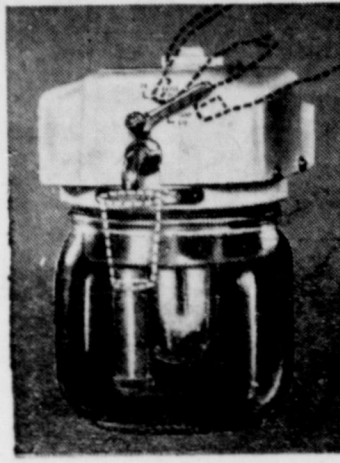

Tapestry of Our Heritage Is Theme Of Thursday Afternoon Art Program

The Thursday Afternoon Club met at the Woman's Club, April 1, at 3 p.m. for a fine arts program which centered on tapestry, music, poetry and pictures related to Indian culture.

Mrs. Frank Castleberry, the president, heard Mrs. James Horp-top's report which will be presented during the Sixth District convention. The club voted to present a silver thimble annually to the girl who makes the most progress in the homemaking courses in the Eastland High School.

Mrs. K. E. Sikes, chairman of the fine art program, read an Indian poem "A Dance of Rain" by Witter Bynner. Mrs. Frank Sparks sang beautifully "Minnetonka" and "Pale Moon", both with Indian themes.

Mrs. Grady Pipkin spoke of art in its various phases. First, she discussed the cathedral of Mexico which she saw when she and her husband were in Mexico recently. It was begun in 1556 and finished in 1813. It has many gorgeous paintings, many altars and chapels, but the Altar of Pardon is one of the most beautiful. The original altar was removed in 1654, and on this site was placed another one. In the center of it is Zuma-la's "Our Lady" with a frame of wood adorned with silver plates. Beneath this is a smaller one of Herera's "Our Lord" on copper plate valued at 200 pesos.

Above "Our Lady" is a picture of "St. Sebastian" by Echave which is valued at 10,000 pesos. In the chapel of the Immaculate Conception is Jose Ibarra's "The Assumption" valued at 15,000 pesos. The Chapel of Our Lady of Guadalupe is dedicated to the Queen of the Mexicans who appeared at Tepeyac in 1531. In the central altar is a good painting of "Our Lady of Guadalupe" by Labastida.

In the chapel Our Lady of La Antigua hangs a painting of Mary with the Child in her arms. It is crowned by two angels who hold a ribbon bearing the words "Ave Maria." This painting took its name from that of the Cathedral of Seville. The Crucifixion by Cabrera, Mexico's best artist, is at the right side of the altar. In the central nave above the choir is "Our Lady of Sorrows" by the great Valesquez. Upon entering the Sacristy, which is a museum in itself, one sees Correa's "The Entrance of Our Lord into Jerusalem", which is valued at 30,000 pesos.

The Chapel of the Relics which gets its name from the many relics kept in precious cases has a Crucifix in a glass niche in the central altar which was a gift of Emperor Charles V to the Cathedral called "The Christ of the Conquerors." At the left is an altar dedicated to Our Lady of Guadalupe bearing the inscription "Sworn Patroness of the New Spain, the 27th of April 1737." On the reverse side is painted Juan Diego, the Indian to whom the Virgin appeared, unfolding his blanket with roses on it and showing the painting of "Our Lady" with the inscription "The 12th of December 1531."

In Taxco, Mr. and Mrs. Pipkin saw the House of Tears. It received its name because Count Cadeva who was a magistrate forced the Indians to pry their fines by working on his house. It now belongs to Senor Figueroa who bought the house in 1943 to use as an art studio. Oils and larger works are shown in the main studio. In the rear is the working studio in the patio and an exhibit of small oils and water colors.

Mrs. Pipkin also discussed the works of Earl Hammock, a former resident of Sweetwater and a native Texan who was born at Stamford, Texas. He now lives in Gunnison, Colo., and is known as the western slope's authority on Indian art and life. He has recent-

ly two of his series of 12 paintings of his most popular and lucrative works, groupings of rare Indian rugs and artifacts in a representation of Southwestern Indian symbolism which they will copy. One of these is the fire dance ceremonial rug grouped with Acona pottery and a sun-symbol gourd rattle of San Domingo. The second picture was the bluebird dance, the dance of happiness, with a live gray ruck background. The Yois are featured dancing with bluebird in hand. The pottery is Hopi and the gourd is San Domingan.

One rich and rare rug in Earl Hammock's collection is the whirling log pattern which is scarcely ever put into permanent form by the Indians. It represents the Indian's conception of the Creation and possesses healing qualities. The Indian medicine men make this design in the sand when one of their tribe is ill, but when the sun goes down it is quickly brushed away, for it is an evil omen to have it in permanent form. Earl Hammock persuaded a woman who either needed the money or who was a non-believer to make the rug.

Another valuable painting is sketched from a Navajo blanket, a Bayeta, which was originally made from the uniforms of Spanish soldiers and dyed, white, and black in color. These pictures sell for \$1,000 to \$5,000 and are great in demand. Earl Hammock planned an exhibit of these Indian paintings at Western State College, Gunnison, but they sold so fast that he was unable to keep them long enough to develop a permanent college exhibit.

Mrs. Grady Pipkin exhibited two of his paintings which decorate their home. "The Weaver" is a picture of the woman with the rug. Sheep, a baby, balls of wool, carding, a man and woman cooling in their Hogan are all pictured. As one looks at the posture of the weaver and the strings on the frame, he is likely to miss the picture of the rug from which the weaver is copying. The other pictures Mrs. Pipkin displayed were shipped the Ford Motor Com-

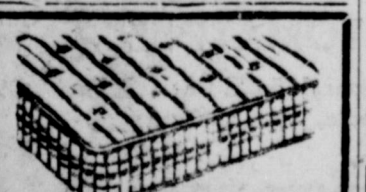
