NORRIS IN FOR COMMISSIONER

FRIENDS PUT COMMISSIONER FROM PRECINCT NO. 4 OUT AS CANDIDATE ANOTHER TERM

The Herald is authorized by friends and supporters of W. R. Norris, now serving his second term as County Commissioner from Precinct No. 4, as a candidate to succeed himself, subject to the action of the voters of the southeast precinct at the Democratic primary to be held Saturday, July 28.

These friends have asked the Herald to make the following statements regarding Mr. Norris's candidacy. That Mr. Norris is not personally announcing but that he would accept the office if the voters of his precinct indicate by their vote that they want him to serve a third term. That at one time during the campaign of 1932, Mr. Norris promised Mr. Callihan that he would not be a candidate in 1934 and that he would permit Mr. Callihan to make the race without opposing him for the office. That these friends have recently called on Mr. Callihan asking him to release Mr. Norris from his promise but that Mr. Callihan would not accede and that as a consequence, Mr. Norris would not announce himself as a candidate. Hence these many friends have taken it upon themselves to make this announcement as they feel that Mr. Norris has made good as a Commissioner and can do much more good for his precinct if continued in office. These friends feel that under the existing conditions, it is not a proper time for a change of this office.

Mr. Norris is now serving his fourth year in this important position. During his time, many important matters relative to highways in the county have come up for consideration and action and he has been fair and impartial in his judgment and vote.

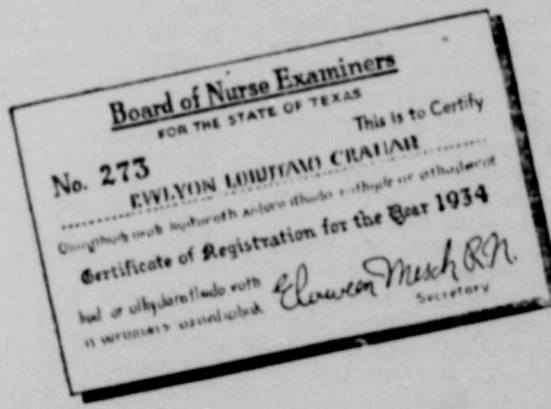
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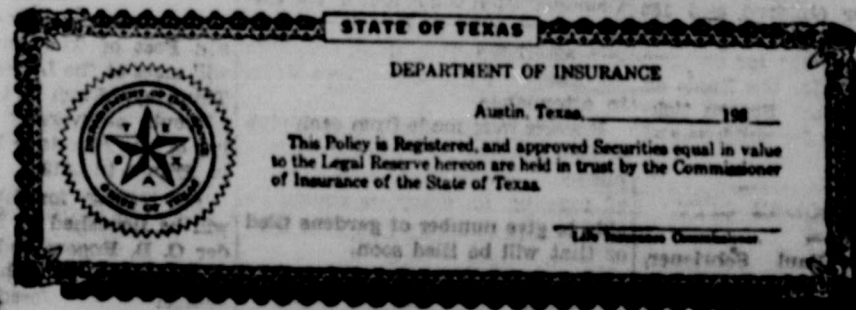

What Is Truth?

Our Savior, testifying before Pi-
 late concerning His mission upon
 earth, said: "To this end was I born,
 and for this cause came I into the
 world, that I should bear witness
 unto the truth. Every one that is
 of the truth, heareth My voice."
 Pilate's well-known reply was,
 "What is truth?"
 This query of the Roman governor
 was not the question of an earnest
 soul seeking light. His inquiry was
 not an appeal for information on an
 issue of vital importance to him and
 every human being. This expres-
 sion of his sin-darkened mind was
 not, as it might appear, a sincere de-
 sire or prayer for light and guid-
 ance. On the contrary, Pilate's
 question was the mocking, sneering,
 sarcastic reply of the agnostic or
 skeptic, who maintains that it is im-
 possible to find or know the truth.
 Everything, says the skeptic, is un-
 certain. According to the skeptic
 all those important questions per-
 taining to human life, its origin,
 its ultimate end, the condition of
 the soul after death, God, eternity,
 heaven, hell, judgment, etc. will have
 to remain unanswered. He argues:
 Man may form his opinions on such
 matters, but certainly is unattain-
 able; there is no absolute truth.
 What a hopeless philosophy! What
 a confession of blinded ignorance! Thank
 God, the blind, the absolute
 truth, can be known with certainty.
 If we, like Pilate, and yet unlike
 Pilate, ask the question: "What is
 truth?" Jesus answers: "I am the
 Way, the Truth, and the Life: no
 man cometh unto the Father, but by
 Me." Again He says, "If ye continue
 in My Word, then are ye my dis-
 ciples indeed; and ye shall know the
 Truth, and the Truth shall make

DEMONSTRATOR BUILDS HER OWN CLOTHES CLOSET

Mrs. Bess Winters, wardrobe demonstrator of the Lone Tree club is now completing the construction of a modern clothes closet, size two by five and one-half feet. The closet has one long shelf for hats, etc., about 20 inches from the top, just below the shelf is a non-flexible rod on which to hang clothes, then there are three side shelves on which to place folded clothes. In each end of the closet there is a shoe rack, which she made. Each rack will hold four pairs of shoes.

The inside of the closet is papered with scraps of light colored wall paper, thus admitting plenty of natural light.

There was only 5c (tacks) to the cost of the closet, as Mrs. Winters did all of the work and she used fruit crates and scrap lumber to make it.

Morning's Milk Best

For Cheese Making Morning Milk Is Better According To Farm Club Member

Morning's milk makes better cheese according to Mrs. W. L. Philpaw farm food supply cooperator, in Ochiltree club.

Mrs. Philpaw says that in order to have cheese entirely free from "off odors and tastes", it is necessary to use only morning's milk. Skimmed or separated milk, for processed cottage cheese, should be put in thoroughly sterilized containers and set in a moderately warm temperature to curd. It is best to not use "starters" to curd the milk as this has a tendency to develop too much acid in the cheese.

Within the last two weeks, Mrs. Philpaw has made and sold 50 pounds of processed cottage cheese, sold \$4.00 worth of cream, and supplied her family with milk, butter and cheese from three cows.

Mrs. Philpaw makes an excellent quality cheese and is planning to standardize her product, so that it may be sold under the "Texas Better 4-H Products" label.

This industrious cooperator, living 2 miles south of Perryton, invites visitors to see her make cheese. "I do not always make a success, but I feel that my failures are generally due to 'off conditions' of the milk or curd."

REOPEN WHEAT CONTRACT ROLL

WHEAT GROWERS UNABLE TO SIGN-UP IN PREVIOUS CAMPAIGN MAY NOW REDUCE ACREAGE

COLLEGE STATION, March 12, 1934—Any farmer who grew wheat in any of the years from 1930 to 1932 may sign up in the reopened wheat campaign, state O. B. Martin, director of the Extension Service of A and M College. The requirements are practically the same as they were in the former campaign except that changes have been made in the ruling on the base period to take care of the one-year producer.

A one-year man may get a contract by using his production in the one year as his base, reducing his acreage by the same percentage as other contract farmers do, and accepting an allotment of one-fifth of 54 percent of the actual production for the year his wheat was produced. He is entitled then to receive 1933, 1934 and 1935 allotment payments on this allotment.

Farmers who actually applied for contracts in the original wheat campaign but who were unable to complete them may now complete the contracts and be eligible for all payments, provided their applications were filed with the county allotment committee before January 1.

Farmers who make application under the reopened program, but who did not sign up in the original campaign, may also sign contracts, but they will be eligible only for the second 1933 payment, and for 1934 and 1935 payments. Director Martin says.

Farmers who have already planted their wheat and who wish to sign adjustment contracts under the reopened wheat program recently announced, may do so by bringing their acreage down to 85 percent of the base acreage they would have in an approved. Director Martin states.

Farmers signing contracts now will receive the final 1933 adjustment payment of eight cents on their allotments, less local administrative costs, and the 1934 and 1935 adjustment payments.

The fact that he has planted the wheat makes no difference in a man's right to sign a contract, in which he agrees to hold down his acreage, or take it out of production. Each farm under contract will be thoroughly inspected this summer to make certain that every contract is complied with.

Farmers who have already planted wheat who are interested in the new opportunity to sign contracts, should get in touch with their local community committeeman, members of the county allotment committee, or with the county agent's office.

Under the reopened program, contracts must be in the hands of the county allotment committee by April 15. But there will be no special drive to secure signatures.

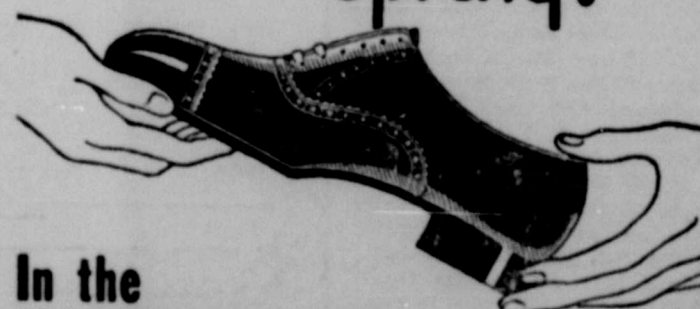
