Park Gains \$17,489.78

Efforts Underway To Increase State Park Facilities

Attendance figures at Lake Colorado City State Park have reached an all-time high during the year, according to Joe Robinette, park superintendent.

A total of 195,975 people attended the park during the year, figures complete with the year-end report September 1.

Daily permits sold during the year totaled 27,086 at \$1 each, amounting to \$27,086.

A total of 154 annual permits were sold, and at \$12 each, that amounts to \$1,848. These are for entrance to any state park.

Restricted annual permits, sold for entrance to the local park only, totaled \$1,093, for an amount of \$5,465 at \$5 each.

Total amount taken through the park sale of permits for entrance and camping amounted to \$49,398.61, said Robinette.

This is more than twice what was gained through entrance permits alone last year—\$23,437.25. Total amount collected by the local park last year was \$31,908.83, so that this year's net funds amounted to \$17,489.78 more than last year's receipts.

Robinette said that he has requested through the state park board that plans for expanding the park's recreational facilities be carried out, asking that Phase II be implemented.

Phase II would be added campsites, restrooms, screened shelters, more picnic sites, a concession stand and fishing pier. Robinette said that no action has been taken on his request because the local park is not on the state's top priority list.

He said that park planners on the state level are concentrating on developing new park properties recently acquired which have almost no recreational facilities. Another top priority item on the state board's list

is repairing old park lands and facilities which have belonged to the state system since the 1930's.

"We asked for Phase II last year, so we're going to keep accurate records and send another request the latter part of this month," Robinette said.

Already set for installation during the next few months, he said, are two large playground sets, one near the trailer sites and another near shade shelters

in the older part of the park. Shade shelters at some of the picnic sites will also be installed soon, he said.

"The increases we've had in attendance will certainly help us in our request for Phase II," Robinette pointed out.

One problem the park personnel now have is the damaged fishing pier. It was almost totally destroyed during a windstorm at the lake earlier this year when winds gained up to

50-miles per hour in velocity.

"The pier was guaranteed by the construction company, an Oklahoma firm, to last for one year and withstand winds up to 80-miles per hour," Robinette said.

The pier had been in use only 11 months since its finish and winds did not reach the 80-mile limit, he pointed out.

The pier cost \$11,000 and he said the construction firm is now in a legal hassle with the

state park administration over replacing it. He said it was a touchy legal battle being handled by engineers and architects for the park on the state level.

The 500-acre park was leased from Texas Electric Service Company and opened July 10, 1970. It is situated on the 31,970 acre foot Lake Colorado City, created in 1949 by TESCO with the damming of Morgan Creek, a Colorado River tributary.

Official dedication ceremonies of the new state park were held June 9, 1973.

Lake Levels Show Gain

Both Lake Colorado City and Lake Champion have gained runoff water from five-day rainfall in the county and drainage area, although most of the rain which fell slowly soaked into farm and pasture land.

Lake Colorado City gained most, more than a foot of elevation. From an elevation of 2,056.90 feet before rainfall started, the lake's level was at 2,058.05 Friday morning, a 1.15-foot increase.

Lake Champion's level stood at 2,035.55 before rains came and was at 2,036.1 feet Friday, a .55-foot increase.

Other area lakes showed increases from runoff water, with Lake Spence gaining more than 9,000 acre feet of water.

Kindercare Center To Open Tomorrow

The Kindercare Center, providing day care for children four years of age and under, opens in the Community Center on 10th Street tomorrow. Mrs. Jon Shamburger, supervisor of the day care program, said that 15 children will come to the center tomorrow morning which opens at 6:45 and continues until 5:30 p.m. five days a week.

Applications are still being taken for more children, and Mrs. Shamburger said that when the center's quota is filled, a waiting list will be maintained.

A weekly charge, which includes breakfast and noon meals and two snacks per day, is based on a family's income.

Personnel in charge of the Kindercare program were busy Friday afternoon making last minute arrangements for the school's opening.

Both Nathaniel Jackson and

Freddie Espinoza were kept busy during the summer making furniture and playground equipment for the center. Jackson has now gone back to McMurry University in Abilene where he is a sophomore this year. Espinoza is a junior at Colorado High School.

Other school personnel include teacher co-ordinator Sue Roberts, who heads a team of teachers and teacher assistants—Connie Orna, four-year olds teacher, assisted by Deborah Cox; Josie Espinoza, three-year olds assistant and Patricia Lenard, two-year olds assistant. Bernice Urdy is cook-housekeeper at the Kindercare center and Leroy H. Powell is custodian.

In addition to the above classrooms, a nursery for children under two years of age is provided.

The center's opening marks

the beginning of a day care program in the county, which began early this year with the county commissioners' approval of providing matching funds from

state sources. Commissioners agreed to put up \$3,000 in local money, matching \$32,000 in state and federal monies for the child development center.

Three houses were built and one has been sold. Hardegree invites all interested residents to attend the Open House inspection next week.

The party nominees were decided in a Thursday night meeting of Democrats on the county executive committee. Members of the executive committee present for the meeting were G. D. Foster, Precinct One chairman, and Truman Bodine, also in Precinct One; Ray Preston, chairman of Loraine Precinct Four; Eddie Gregory, chairman of Precinct Seven voting box.

Foster said that no other applications were made for the nomination and both candidates appeared before the committee for interviews.

Although Doss was appointed to take former Justice of the Peace Leonard Henderson's unexpired term and Barber was appointed to Joe Earnest's remaining term, laws governing appointments state that they

can only hold office until the next general election.

Three County Demos Attend Convention

Three Mitchell County Democrats attended the Democratic State Convention in Austin Monday and Tuesday—Warren Anderson, Regina Barber and Gene Blassingame.

The county elected six delegates, the maximum allowed according to party rules basing representation upon the number of people voting Democrat in the last gubernatorial election.

The three from Mitchell County caucused with other delegates from the 30th Senatorial district, which includes about 230 delegates from the eastern panhandle and northern Texas counties bordering the Red River to Mitchell and Howard Counties in the south.

Representatives are divided into elected delegates and alternates. Anderson was the only regular delegate from Mitchell County, as Mrs. Barber and Blassingame are both alternates. Anderson served as chairman of the county's delegation.

Caucus business included nomination and election of both a committeeman and committeewoman from the district to the state executive committee. After a role call vote, Marguerite Snyder of Baird and Charles Stenholm of Stamford were elected to the executive committee.

The 30th district caucus also elected Steve Sutherland and Nancy Neville to the Youth Advisory Council. Both are from Wichita County.

Elected to represent the district at a Mini-Convention to be held in Kansas City in December in order to write a new charter for the Democrat Party were Lynn Darden and Joyce Powers, both of Wichita County.

"Of the 230 delegates in our 30th district, 70 are from Wichita County, 6 from Mitchell, 10 from Scurry, 17 from Howard and 11 from Nolan, just to give an idea of how the Wichita County delegation dominates the district," said Mrs. Barber.

The only way to counteract this domination, she said, is to get more people interested in voting in our county, so we can have more delegates from Mitchell and other counties in our area.

During the 30th district caucus, held in the Driskill Hotel, one member from the district delegation was elected to Platform, Resolution, Nominating, Canvassing, Rules and Credentials committees.

Following the caucus of each district, most held during the afternoon Monday, a special dinner and reception was held Monday night called "Tops in Texas" because all delegates attended from throughout the state.

Tuesday the regular convention got underway in Austin's Memorial auditorium center, electing Calvin Guest as chairman and continuing through a marathon session into the early morning hours Wednesday when the platform and nominations were adopted.

Four Arrested, Charged With Burglary

Four Loraine men have been arrested and charged with burglary in connection with break-in of the Price Hall residence in Loraine over the Labor Day holiday.

Arrested and charged with burglary are Alex Chavez, Jesse Marentes, Silvera Guerrero and Gustavo De Loera. Mitchell County Sheriff Bill McGuire credited deputies in his department, Randy Wilkinson, Troy Walls, L. M. Newby and Ann Martin with hard work on the case.

The department is further investigating recovery of stolen property and burglary of the Dual Blair residence in Loraine which occurred during the same weekend period.

McGuire cautions county residents that FBI reports show an increase of 30 per cent in burglaries of rural and urban residences.

"Be aware of suspicious vehicles and persons in your vicinity," McGuire advises, "and jot down the license numbers of suspicious automobiles."

His department has ordered some electric stenciling markers which can be used to inscribe driver's license or Social Security numbers on personal property.

McGuire advises marking any property, such as tools, farm equipment or anything easily movable, because it reduces the resale value of such property.

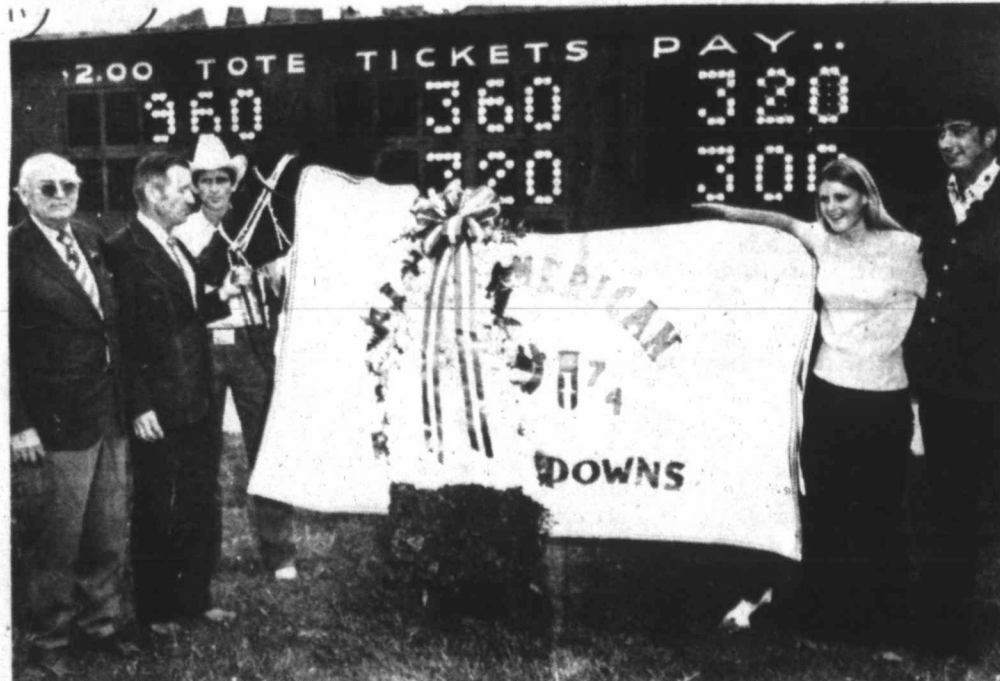
Fund Drive To Start

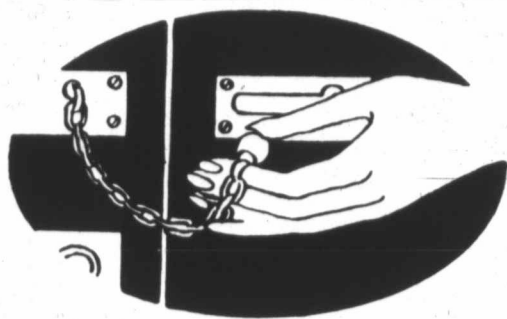

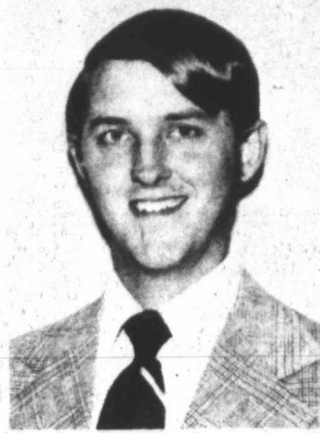

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Lake Study Starts Here

A landmark environmental project aimed at helping state and federal authorities identify and analyze potential water pollution threats to selected fresh water lakes and reservoirs will include Lake Colorado City.
The Texas National Guard has agreed to co-operate with the Texas Water Quality Board and the U. S. Environmental Protection Agency.

The agreement provides for the use of National Guard personnel and resources to collect an estimated 3,584 water samples from the tributaries flowing into the 39 Texas lakes designated for the year-long research effort.
Texas Guardsmen will conduct monthly sampling at 256 sites, both to enable assessment of the eutrophication threat endangering surveyed lakes and to assist in the identification of nutrient sources.

"Eutrophication" is one of the most serious water quality problems facing many areas. Excess chemical nutrients, notably phosphates, can overstimulate aquatic plant growth. In extreme cases, the eutrophication process so deteriorates water quality that fish die and the lake's aesthetic and recreational values are lost.

Over an extended period of continued growth and decay of plant life, the lake can slowly fill to the point where it will disappear.

The nutrients which feed plant growth variously enter lakes

from natural land runoff, effluent discharged by municipal sewage treatment plants and industries and fertilized farmland.

The presence of some quantities of nutrients, however, is desirable to serve as sources of nourishment for lower organisms in the food chain.

The National Eutrophication Survey attempts, in light of existing state information, to discover a surveyed lake's present condition, the potential of any future worsened eutrophication and the principal sources of any nutrient entering the lake. The Survey's product will be comprehensive reports on these 39 lakes, prepared in consultation with the Texas Water Quality Board.

Participating Guardsmen will operate from their local armories, 49 in all, taking samples on weekends, each month for a year.

The Texas Water Quality Board will furnish a team of specialists to assist in the technical training of Guardsmen.

The water samples will be shipped to EPA's national research center in Corvallis, Oregon, for analysis. The final report on Survey findings will be made available following the conclusion of the one-year sampling program.

Sampling at Lake Colorado City will be handled by Big Spring National Guard Unit, Detachment 1, Battery C, 3-133d FAe

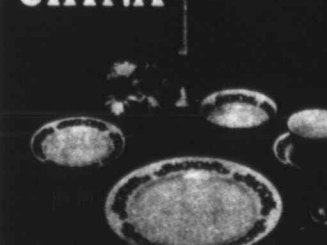
