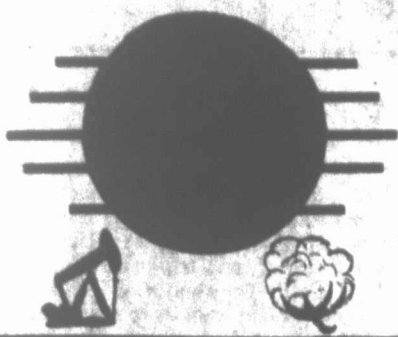

'On Golden Pond' opens Thursday night

When the curtain goes up Thursday night for "On Golden Pond," a memorable evening should be in store for Colorado City Playhouse patrons.

An all-star cast combined with an all-star play adds to an all-star evening of entertainment.

"On Golden Pond" is the story of an elderly couple returning to their beloved summer home and how a 13-year-old boy left in their care helps change their attitude on life.

The play provides sharply etched character studies for three adult principals - octogenarian Norman Thayer Jr., all too aware of his mortality; his loving and patient wife, Ethel; and his alienated daughter, Chelsea, who wants more than anything to be accepted by her father.

Tandy Curlee plays the part of Norman Thayer Jr. and Marie Jackson is cast in the part of Ethel Thayer. Elaine Kelly plays the part of Chelsea Thayer while Tom Kelly plays the part of Bill Ray, Chelsea's fiancé. Ruben Hurt is Billy Ray, Bill Ray's teenage son who spends the summer with the elderly couple. Kent Womack is

cast in the part of Charlie Martin, the postman who delivers the mail by boat on Golden Pond.

The play is directed by Walter Hearin who describes "On Golden Pond" as a "masterpiece of entertainment".

The play was written by Ernest Thompson and first appeared on Broadway in 1979. It was the winner of several awards. The play was later made into a movie of the same name and starred Henry Fonda, Katharine Hepburn and Jane Fonda. The movie went on to win three Academy Awards.

Members of the production staff include Donna Starr, rehearsal prompter; Mike Gorman, stage manager; Sue Womack, stage crew; Porter Richardson, set design; Porter Richardson, Gus Armstrong, Wylie Dakan, Terry Revis and Brian Basham, set construction; Don Hurt, lighting design; Donna and Jack Starr, sound and light operation; Donna Starr and Shirley DeLaney, costumes; Winnie Roach and George Womack, makeup; Sis Jones, properties; and George Womack, scenic backdrop.

John Mikow and Hearin share

duties as house manager while Anne Alford is in charge of the box office. Troy Smith is in charge of the shadow box while Marie Jackson was responsible for ticket preparation. Tom Kelly had charge of the programs while Ray Mayo and Jim Baum were responsible for publicity.

Other operations chairpersons include Joan Beach, house preparations; Virginia Fuller and Bobbie Staakley, Red Dog Saloon (refreshments); Elaine Kelly, membership; Karan Johns, ushers and usherettes; John T. Merritt, building maintenance; Tracy Womack, marquee; Kent Womack, grounds preparation; and Tandy Curlee, sets.

Performances are scheduled for Thursday, April 3; Friday, April 4; Saturday, April 5; Thursday, April 10; Friday, April 11; and Saturday, April 12 at 8 p.m. nightly.

The box office is open each day and on Saturdays at the historic Opera House, 337 Walnut. Tickets are \$5 each and may be reserved by calling 728-3491. Senior citizens will be admitted half price at the Thursday, April 10 performance.

Voters to cast ballots Saturday

Colorado City voters will be deciding on uncontested races in city council and hospital district elections this Saturday, but will have to make a choice in the school board election.

Polls will be open Saturday from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. at the Civic Center for city council and hospital district elections. CISD voters will vote in the curriculum room of the CISD administration building on Hickory Street.

City of Colorado City

Three candidates, including two incumbents, have filed for election to the three positions open on the Colorado City Council. Incumbents Tom Lovell and Robert Heback seek re-election to the two-year terms while Phil Anderson is the third candidate. Colorado City Mayor Pro-tem Jesse Munoz decided not to seek re-election.

Colorado ISD

Colorado Independent School District board incumbents Dwayne Harris, Ronnie Aston and Floyd Lee Ritchey along with (Sample Ballot, Page 2)

Brenda Aguillon are seeking election to three three-year terms on the board. David Lelek, Eddie Gregory and John Taylor have filed for election for a one-year unexpired term, currently held by Ritchey. Ritchey was appointed to the position to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of S. L. (Mac) Morris.

CISD board president Eddie Piland chose not to seek re-election.

Hospital District

The Mitchell County Hospital District election will see three candidates seeking three positions open this year. Incumbent Jane McCarley is joined by Walter Hearin and Linden Solomon in seeking election to the board. Incumbents Bob Reilly, one of the original members of the board, and Jack Perkins chose not to seek re-election.

City of Loraine

Loraine voters will vote on two city council positions Saturday. C. H. Hamilton, incumbent, and Gary Finley are unopposed. J. C. Hall Jr. is not seeking re-election. Voters will cast their ballots from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m. at city hall.

Loraine ISD

Voters in the Loraine Independent School District will be choosing from a field of three (Sample Ballot, Page 2) candidates to fill two positions open on that board. Incumbents Robert Dale Finley and Frank Garcia along with Richard Cooper are seeking election.

City of Westbrook

Westbrook voters will be electing two councilmen and a mayor during Saturday's election which will be held at the tax office from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m.

Incumbent Mayor A. G. Board is running unopposed while incumbent C. E. Ranne and Clyde Gregory are running unopposed for city council. Don Barrett decided not to seek re-election.

Westbrook ISD

Cleburne Rich and W. B. Inman, both incumbents, are unopposed in their re-election bids to the board of trustees of the Westbrook Independent School District.

Voters will cast their ballots from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m. in the tax office.

Prisoner walks away from county jail

Mitchell County sheriff's deputies are searching for a prisoner who walked away from county jail Sunday night.

Mike Yarbrough, 32, who was in jail facing charges of forgery and unauthorized use of a motor vehicle, walked away from the jail about 9 p.m. Sunday after using a telephone.

Local law enforcement officials combed the area searching for the Midland man, but

were unsuccessful.

Yarbrough is described as 5'10", 170 pounds with multiple tattoos on both arms.

A man fitting his description was reportedly seen at Cattleman's Restaurant, west of Colorado City, later Sunday night.

Mitchell County Sheriff Wendell Bryant said Yarbrough may have returned to the Midland area.

Driver hurt in truck wreck

An Alabama man remained hospitalized in Mitchell County Hospital Tuesday with injuries he received early Sunday when the truck he was driving overturned on Interstate 20.

Trooper Paul Hernandez of the Texas Highway Patrol said

Smith was headed east on Interstate 20 when the mishap occurred at 3 a.m.

Rain critical for farmers, ranchers

"We sure could use a rain right now."

That's how Mitchell County Extension Agent Mike Mauldin sums up the local agricultural picture.

Mauldin said Tuesday that rain is the magic ingredient needed as far as crops and livestock are concerned.

Mauldin said he hoped forecasters were accurate in their

predictions of rain this week since "we're approaching milo planting season."

"We need to get milo in the ground in April," said Mauldin. "It would be better with some moisture in the ground."

Many parts of the county haven't had measurable rainfall in several months. The south part of the county received some rain in early February.

As for wheat that's already in the ground, "wheat is just sitting there, it's not doing any-

thing," said Mauldin. "Right now the cattle are grazing on what wheat there is, but if we don't get some rain, we won't see any re-growth of the wheat."

Mauldin explained that there is more stocker cattle in the county this year, compared to past few years.

Looking toward the cotton crop, Mauldin said "we're not too many days away from cotton planting time." He said a uniform planting date hasn't been established yet, but the date

should be toward the latter part of May.

"Cotton farmers are putting chemicals down now," said Mauldin. "Some rain in April sure would help us."

Mauldin said he has noticed mesquite trees starting to really put out in the last four to five days, noting that "we should be well into spring."

This dry spring is a far cry from last year when an abundance of rain fell during both winter and spring. Mauldin said because of the unusually wet

winter last year, there were plenty of weeds for cattle to graze on. This year, producers are having to rely on the hay they put up last summer. "There was a lot of hay fed to livestock this winter," said Mauldin. "The hay helped get us through the mild winter."

Mauldin said what few sheep there are in the county are in the process of lambing and that shearing will start "pretty soon." "There's already some shearing going on south of us in Coke County," he said.

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Williams looks forward to fourth visit to state

What Sandra Williams, now a senior at Colorado High School, remembers most about a freshman appearance at the University Interscholastic League state track meet is not the blistering 11.8 she ran to be the third fastest 100 meter dasher in Texas' AAA division.

"I was real scared," said Williams.

"When I saw the stadium, I asked coach Martin and Mathis (former coaches George Martin and Linda Mathis) if Sherry Fite could go on the infield with me and they said 'no'.

Williams' biggest worry was that Martin, Mathis and Fite, who went only as a companion, would leave her there in Austin.

Since that 1983 trip, Williams has been a regular at the state meet and this year can make it

for an incredible fourth consecutive time.

After her 11.8 her freshman year, Williams ran a sophomore year best of 12.13 to win fifth at state. Last year as a junior, Williams brought her time back down to the 11's, but did not compete in the 100 at Austin after a third place finish at regional where she ran a season best 11.95.

She was at Austin, though, as part of a 400 meter relay team that ran a school record of 48.53 at the regional meet and was exactly one second behind the winner at the state meet.

This year the 12.2 she ran two weeks ago at Snyder's Canyon Reef Relays put her a good month ahead of last year at this time. And not only is she an area leader in the sprint, but she also

owns top marks in the long and triple jumps and has made it to the regional meet in those events also.

The 16'4 1/2" long jump she soared to at Snyder erased a personal best of 15'3" she jumped at regional last year and the 34'10" triple jump at Snyder was just short of her personal best of 35' also set at regional last year.

Does a return trip to Austin lack the emotion of a first time appearance?

"No, I was excited every time but not as scared because I had someone with me," said Williams, also a two year letterman in volleyball and basketball.

Last year Williams suffered from an injury throughout the season, but sees this season heading to a possible return to the state individual events.

"I hope. Last year I was worried about my leg. This year I'm going to try real hard to get my time down. I'm going for it as far as the long jump, but I don't know about the triple. My leg hurt pretty bad at this time last year. This year I'm feeling pretty good."

A possible track scholarship looms in Williams' future and she says it's something everyone asks her about, but she says she has yet to prove herself.

"I've been thinking about it but I'm not going to let it go to my head because something might happen and I won't get it."

How would she describe the feeling at competing at Austin?

"It feels great because you're just looking at and meeting people. I don't know how to explain it. I wish all the seniors in track could go and see it."

Fite describes it like "It's great. It's the best feeling I've ever had. It's neat, especially when they're singing the national anthem and you're thinking that you're really one of the top ones in the state. It's a really good feeling."

Ever since being the friendly face in the crowd for Williams as a freshman, Fite has returned to Austin as a sophomore and last year as a junior—not as a spectator, but as a competitor.

She was a leg of a state qualifying 400 meter relay team as a sophomore and was one of three returning legs for last year's record setting foursome. This season the 400 meter relay owns a best of 52.4 run in the preliminaries of Wall's Cotton Patch Relays. The Wolves also set a school record in the 800

relay at last year's regional meet which Williams anchored to a 1:46.58. This year the team owns a best of 1:55.01 run at Snyder.

Fite also competed at regional last year in the high jump and the 400 meter dash after winning second in both at the district meet. She took second in the high jump by half an inch and the girl from Coahoma that beat her in the quarter, has since graduated though Fite is not competing in the 400 this year.

"Coach (Will Gollibar) put me in the 800 relay and it is run right before the 400. I would not be able to run my best time in it (400) without a rest. I like them both and if we have a better chance at going to regional in the 800 relay that's better because more would go."

Fite set a school record 59.55 in the 400 last season and says "I've run the 200 but I don't know if I will any more. I expect the sprint relay to make it to regional. I don't know how we compare in the 800. Snyder was the first meet I high jumped at, but I'm going to start working on it real hard." She has cleared 4'11" in practice and went 5'1 1/4" last year.

The Wolves have gotten their biggest 1986 points from Williams, the relays and Jody Huff.

Huff won the discus competition at a season opening meet at Eldorado with a 117'1" throw that put among the area leaders but has yet to push the great start.

Huff, Fite, Williams and Yvette Camp make the sprint relay and double as the 800 relay team. Robin Edwards, who has scored with a 14.27 in the 100 meter dash, last season and this season has proven to be a very capable substitute for Williams in the relays.

Distance runner Sally Mendoza has scored with a 14:28.74 in the 3200 and with a 6:20.12 in the 1600.

The Wolves' boys and girls

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will be at Ballinger Saturday, next Saturday and will be at the host the Lone Wolf Relays the district meet at Crane April 18.

Now that the March winds have blown us into April, let's backtrack to the last few days of March.

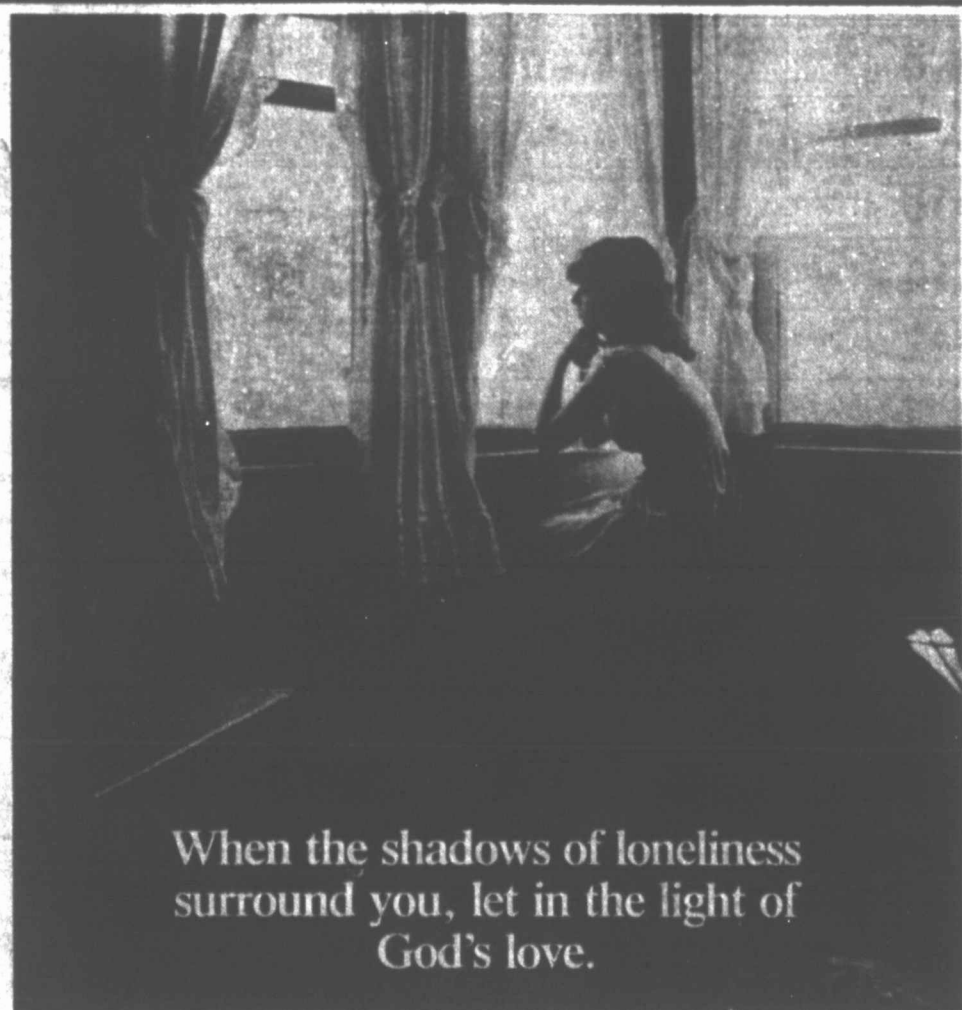

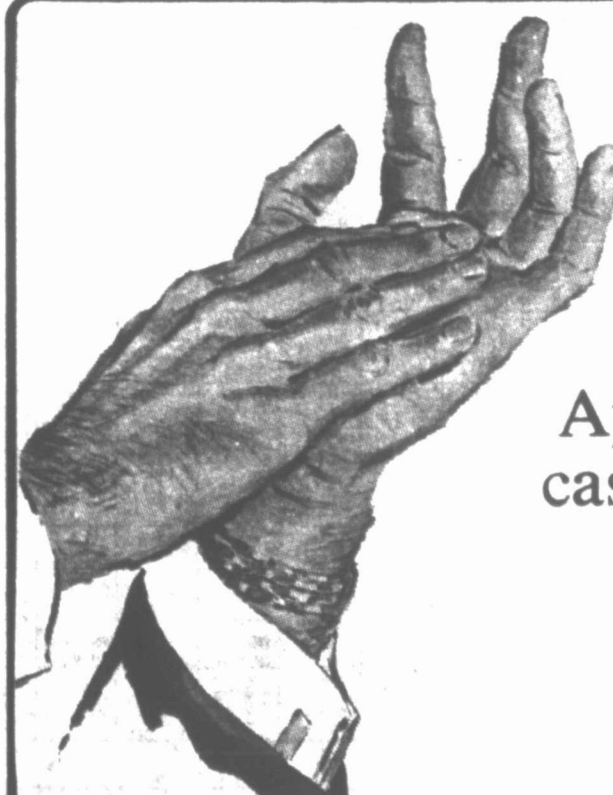

Flowing 379 barrels of 44-gravity oil daily on a 25-44 choke, the No. 1 Brennan has been completed in an unnamed Mitchell County field seven miles northwest of Westbrook.

The wildcard is an exploration venture of Edwin L. and Berry R. Cox.

Drilling got underway in mid-December and proceeded to a depth of 8,225 feet. Production will be from a set of perforations at 7,975 to 7,984 feet in the Pennsylvanian Detrital Formation.

Flow pressure came in at 210 PSI.

First production figures have been posted for a newly completed well in the East Howard Intan Field, Mitchell County, seven miles southwest of Westbrook.

Designated as the No. 4 Schumacher "A," the well pumped 35 barrels of 26-gravity crude daily on open choke along with three barrels of salt water.

Tom Rasmussen is the operator.

Rasmussen took the hole to a 3,300-ft. bottom and perforated for Clear Fork Formation pay at 3,174 to 3,183 feet into the hole.

The No. 186 Mary Foster is scheduled for spudding in the East Howard Intan Field, nine miles southwest of Westbrook. Mobil Producing of Midland is the operator. Carrying permit for 3,400-ft. maximum hole, the well is in a 3,940-acre lease block in Mitchell County's T&P Survey A-1459.

Halvey Energy Inc. has given up on its efforts to make a producer out of the No. 1 Smith.

The well was spudded on December 30 of last year and was drilled to total depth of 3,191 feet. Perforations were made in the San Andres and Middle Clear Fork Formations, but with no indicated commercial prospects. The venture has been plugged and abandoned.

Pumping 48 barrels of 28-gravity crude per day along with five barrels of waste water, the No. 1 Rasmussen has been brought on line in Mitchell County's East Westbrook Field.

Location is in the T&P Survey A-1810, three miles northeast of Westbrook with Tom Rasmussen as the operator.

Bottomed at 3,380 feet, the well will produce from Clear Fork perforations at 2,945 to 3,262 feet into the wellbore.

The No. 1 W. L. Foster "C" has been finished in the East Howard Intan Field with Foran Oil Co. as the operator.

With drills about 7.5 miles west of Westbrook, the well pumped 28 barrels of 29-gravity oil daily on an open choke. Water production totaled 47 barrels daily.

The well probed to a 3,334-ft. bottom and was plugged back to 2,800. Production will be from a set of Glorieta Formation perforations at 2,665 to 2,723 feet into the hole.
