CHILDRESS MEN HELD IN ROBBERY

Two Youths Confess To Attacking Kansas Women

DESERTERS
BEING HELD
IN DENVERBOYS TELL OF BEATING
AND ROBBING TWO
KANSAS WOMEN

(By Associated Press)
DENVER, Aug. 15.—Two deserters from the United States Army, Gordon Frost, 22, East Pepperell, Mass., and Wayne C. Aldrich, 18, Chicago, who confessed last night they had beaten and robbed two women motorists near Hoxie, Sunday night, were held here today for Kansas authorities.

The pair, arrested Tuesday night and returned to the Pittsbluffs hospital near here, were brought back to Denver last night when detectives learned they were in Kansas at the time Miss Leda Beauregard, 31, and Miss Beatrice Walsh, 34, of Concordia, Kansas, were attacked.

Admit Quickly
They admitted the crime almost immediately, police said, and later directed officers to the motor car where they had stolen from the two women. Three suit cases belonging to Miss Beauregard and Mrs. Walsh were found in the car.

The men told police they deserted from the hospital last Friday and hitch-hiked their way to Limon, Colo. They were picked up there by Mrs. Walsh and Miss Beauregard and the four drove to Hoxie, arriving about dusk. They continued eastward, but as night fell the women became nervous and started to

NEW HEARINGOHIO PROFESSOR GETS
DEATH VERDICT;
TO KNOW MONDAY

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Aug. 15.—Dr. James H. Snook, former Ohio state university professor, lay at ease in county jail today awaiting either a sentence of death in common pleas court Monday for the murder of his co-ed mistress, Theora Hix, or a favored ruling on a motion for a new trial.

As the pandemonium following the jury's verdict of first degree murder broke out yesterday afternoon, trial Judge Henry L. Scarlett tentatively set Monday as the date for a hearing on a motion for a new trial. If it is denied, he said he would sentence Snook immediately.

Moved in Five Days.
Within five days from date of sentence Snook must be removed to "murderers' row" in the state penitentiary to await execution.

His attorneys said they would appear in the court this morning for a new trial is denied.

The future holds no fear for Snook if his attitude is to be taken seriously.

Lubbock was diagramed in all its phases of phenomenal development to 45 examples of good will here today, when the Lubbock chamber of commerce entertained that number of realtors from widely separated cities of Texas at the weekly luncheon of the Kiwanis club in the Hotel Lubbock.

The realtors passed here for a scheduled entertainment and tour over the city, enroute to Carlsbad Cavern, N. M., following close last night of the annual convention of the state association in Amarillo.

Due to automobile trouble, which developed at Plainview, R. E. Jordan, of Houston, newly elected president of the state association, and W. A. Thomas, retiring president, arrived in the city too late for the luncheon but united with the party here for the remaining itinerary of the post-convention trip. Twenty-five other realtors were detained in Plainview with Messrs. Jordan and Thomas.

In a comprehensive speech of welcome, Mayor H. D. Woods outlined Lubbock's vast development within the last four years, and explained the carefully scheduled city planning program now proposed for this city. GIANT DIRIGIBLE OFF
ON SECOND LEG OF
WORLD TOUR

(By Associated Press)
FRIEDRICHSHAFEN, Germany, Aug. 15.—Striking north and eastward toward a vast and little known region, the Graf Zeppelin, mistress of the air, today cruised across Germany en route to Tokyo, Japan, on the second lap of its round-the-world journey.

Leaving its home port here at 4:34 a. m. (10:34 P. M. E. S. T. Wednesday), the giant dirigible headed directly for Berlin, 377 miles distant at 6:45 a. m. (12:45 A. M. E. S. T.) It circled Nuremberg (Nuremberg) Bavaria, having traversed the 150 miles in two hours and 11 minutes.

Devious Course Ahead
Ahead of the Graf lay a devious course across European Russia and over the Ural mountains and the board barren steppes of Siberia to northeastern Asia, where it must turn southward toward Tokyo.

It was expected about 6,000 miles would be covered in a journey of about 12 hours, with arrival in Tokyo on Monday afternoon, Japanese time.

Aboard the Graf Zeppelin were 60 persons, 20 passengers—19 men and one woman—40 officers and crew, and about 50,000 pieces of mail as freight. Much of the mail all of the crew and nine of the passengers, had come all the way from Lakehurst, where the world journey was begun.

Made In Moonlight
The start from Friedrichshafen was made in full moonlight, an hour before the dawn with a few hundred persons gathered near the Zeppelin's hangar who cheered loudly as its great crowd loosed their hold and it rose gracefully, circling the port before heading northward.

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TWO ESCAPE

HUNTSVILLE, Aug. 15.—After slugging a guard with a stick and tying him up to a tree with a negro trusty, two convicts, Ellery Roberts and Finis Goree, escaped from the penitentiary here early today. They were believed to have made their way to Houston after holding up a couple and commandeering an automobile.

The escape became known when the guard, W. H. Short, returned to the prison after getting himself and the negro trusty loose from the tree.

Escaped In Wagon
The convicts made their escape from the "walls" on a trash wagon. The trusty was driving and the guard sitting on the back end of the wagon. The two convicts were being taken along to unload the trash.

After getting outside the walls the convicts knocked the guard off the wagon, took his gun, tied him and placed him back on the wagon and drove a mile and a half from the prison, the guard said. Then the men tied the guard and negro trusty to a tree.

Warden Harrell said a negro reported seeing the two men hold up a couple, take their automobile and leave in the direction of Houston.

Roberts was given ten years for murder from Potter county. Goree got 25 years for murder from Jones county.

His identity was not disclosed, but police said he was wearing shoes apparently stained with blood and was unable to give a satisfactory explanation of his movements Wednesday, when the body of the girl, bound in gunny sacks, was found by two loemen in a vacant lot in the vicinity of the Milwaukee railroad yards in south Minneapolis.

A red tam o'shanter, similar to that worn by Dorothy when she disappeared, was found today in the basement of a theater. Detectives took the tam to the Aune home in an attempt to identify it as the one worn by the child.

IN MEXICO TOWNS

SAN MARCIAL, N. M., Aug. 15 (P)—San Marcial, founded 300 years ago by the priests of Spanish conquistadores, today gent to the task of reconstruction, as flood waters which swept the town away began to recede.

In a tent village thrown up by state authorities, most of the 200 residents of the town made homeless by the water from the Rio Grande watched worker splosh through the adobe mud that had been their houses and business buildings.

At San Acacia, also destroyed by the flood, similar work was under way.

Property and crop loss in the 30,000 acre area which was flooded was estimated at more than \$100,000. Hundreds of head of cattle and sheep were drowned.

AUSTIN, Aug. 15 (P).—Since the days when Texas was a republic, the name of Terrell has enjoyed extraordinary favor at the polls, a list of the state officials bearing the title reveals.

George W. Terrell, great grandfather of the present Comptroller, Sam Houston Terrell, served as attorney general from 1844-46 before the republic became a part of the United States.

His son, H. B. Terrell was elected to membership of the house of representatives in 1900, served three terms in the state senate, and was elected state comptroller in 1915. He filled the post until 1920.

Sam Houston Terrell has been comptroller since 1925. John J. Terrell was elected commissioner of the general land office in 1903 serving until 1909.

The magic of the name again was revealed when C. V. Terrell, who formerly had served in the senate was elected state treasurer in 1921. He served two terms and became successor to W. H. N. Spawm as railroad commissioner.

After serving as a member of the house, George B. Terrell, East Texas farmer, was elected commissioner of agriculture in 1920, and has successfully resisted efforts of opponents to defeat him for the post during the past 10 years. He recently announced he would retire at the end of his present term.

The late Chester H. Terrell of San Antonio was speaker of the house of representatives in its thirty-third session in 1913 and was mentioned prominently as a candidate for governor, but ill health forced his retirement from politics.

"PEST FREE" PLEA MADE

EL PASO SWEET POTATO GROWERS ASK FOR DESIGNATION

(By Associated Press)
EL PASO, Aug. 15.—El Paso valley sweet potato growers today requested the state department of agriculture to designate the region as pest free, and bar shipments of sweet potatoes from other sections of the state not enjoying such classification.

AUSTIN, Aug. 15 (P)—A pest free period from March until October during which no ripe citrus fruit will be allowed to remain on trees may be established in Webb County, Geo. B. Terrell, state commissioner of agriculture, said today, on his return from a meeting of South Texas growers at Laredo.

The step, which later may be extended to other citrus-growing counties in the Rio Grande valley district, will be taken to combat the Morales fruit fly.

DOWNTOWN DETROIT STREETS USED IN RUM RUNNING; REGULAR TRIPS MADE

(By Associated Press)

Detroit, Aug. 15.—The Detroit News today said downtown Detroit streets have been used by rum runners for the unloading of regular daily shipments of Canadian liquor for several weeks.

The docks are at the end of Third street, Wayne street, Cass avenue and Clark avenue, thoroughfares cutting through the heart of the business district are the American depots for smuggled liquor, according to rivermen and steamship officials who witnessed operations. Shipments are made daily at 7 a. m., 10:30 a. m. and noon, and gangs of armed men take possession of the docks at these times preventing workmen from venturing too near. The contraband is quickly loaded into automobiles and rushed away

by armed guards, it is said.

Disclosure of these successful attempts to break through the augmented prohibition forces patrolling the river came today after it was learned that a cargo had been landed at 10 a. m. yesterday in full view of scores of rivermen, by standers and steamship officials at the foot of Wayne street.

Yesterday's successful penetration of the blockade was due to violation of orders, according to Walter S. Petty, acting collector of customs. The crews of the customs picket boat stationed in that area left its station to take on supplies of gasoline and oil, he said.

OPENING EASY TODAY IN NEW ORLEANS REPORT AIDS

NEW ORLEANS, Aug. 15 (P)—The cotton market opened easy at a decline of 4 to 5 points. Indifferent cables and favorable weather induced further selling which carried October down to 18.01 and December to 18.28, or 2 points under yesterday's close.

The expected issuance of the government's consumption report served to hold business in check, and at the end of the first hour the market was steady and three points above the low.

The census report was about as expected and had little or no influence on prices. Values gradually eased off on the official forecast for continued favorable weather in the belt. October traded down to 17.99, December 18.17 and January 18.22, or 19 points below yesterday's close. At mid-session the market was quiet and at the low.

LOSSES SHOWN ON NEW YORK MARKET OPENING

NEW YORK, Aug. 15 (P)—Cotton opened steady at a decline of 3 to 7 points under a renewal of yesterday's selling. There may have been a little buying on fairly steady cables, and further encouraging reports as to the prospects for an early settlement of the Lancashire wage dispute. The demand was limited, however, and the market worked still lower with active months showing net losses of about 10 to 11 points by the end of the first half hour.

CENSUS REPORT SHOWS LESS COTTON USED THAN YEAR AGO

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Aug. 15.—Cotton consumption announced today by the census bureau for July was 546,457 bales of lint and 79,297 of linters compared with 570,381 of lint and 78,154 of linters in June this year, and 439,821 of lint and 65,279 of linters in July last year.

Consumption for cotton year ending July 31 totaled 7,098,946 bales of lint and 870,908 of linters, compared with 6,894,063 of lint and 799,229 of linters in the previous cotton year.

Cotton On Hand.

Cotton on hand July 31 was held as follows:
In consuming establishments 1,051,335 bales of lint and 187,208 of linters, compared with 1,289,294 and 205,432 on June 30 this year and 1,011,721 and 159,409 on July 31 last year.

In public storage and at compresses 986,439 bales of lint and of linters, compared with 1,375,728 and 211,114 on June 30 this year and 1,189,751 and 44,669 on July 31 last year.

Imports for July totaled 21,369 bales, compared with 26,113 in June this year and 18,473 in July last year, and for the cotton year 457,804 bales, compared with 536,226 in the previous cotton year.

Exports Lower

Exports for July totaled 237,606 bales of lint and 9,477 bales of linters, compared with 299,136 and 9,811 in June this year and 331,482 and 10,397 in July last year.

Exports for the cotton year totaled 8,043,587 bales of lint and 186,211 of linters, compared with 7,539,945 and 193,232 and the previous cotton year.

Cotton spindles active during July numbered 29,365,858 compared with 30,628,122 in June this year and 28,159,672 in July last year.

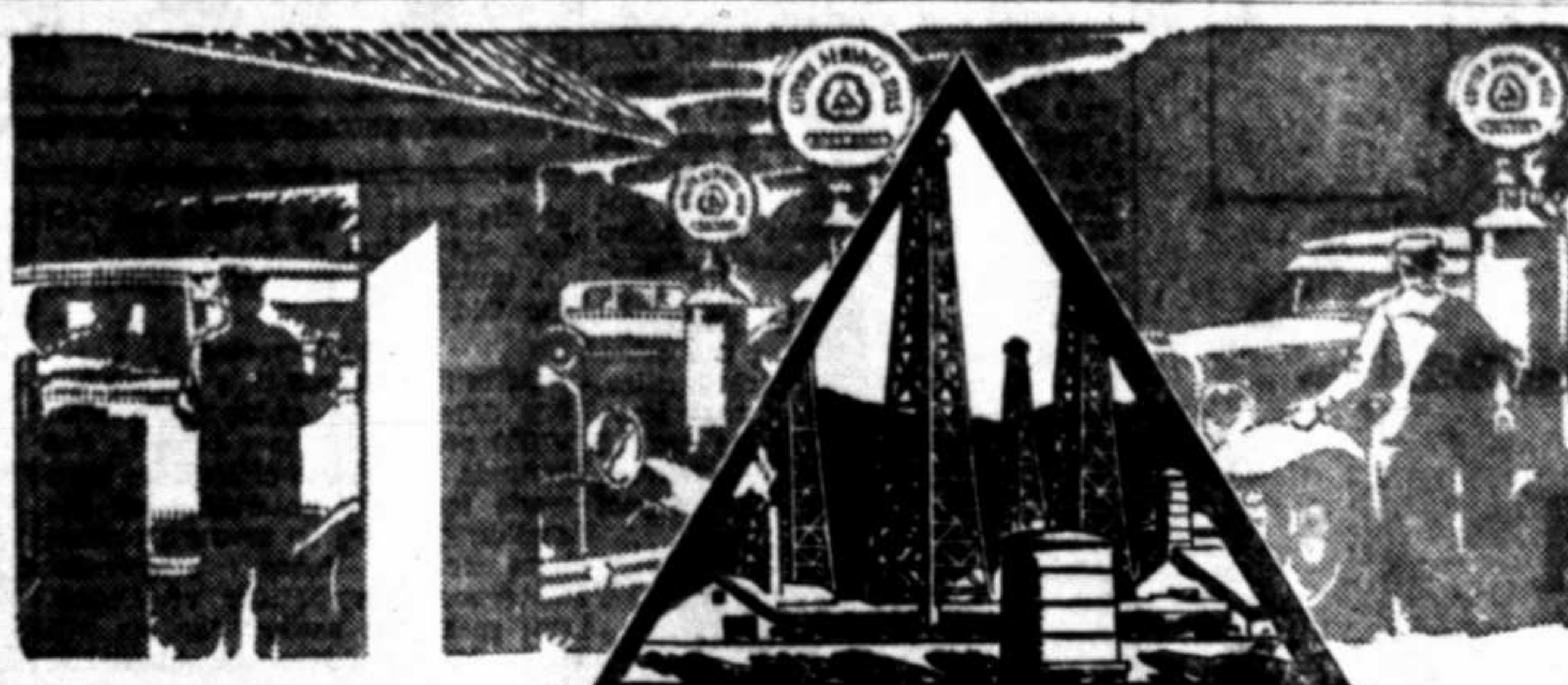
