FIVE AMENDMENTS AND NEW DEAL STILL HOLDING BIG LEADS IN THE STATE

DALLAS, Nov. 4.—President Roosevelt held a majority of more than 7 to 1 over Gov. Landon in the presidential race as the Texas Election Bureau accounted, today, for 420,448 votes of a possible 1,000,000 in Texas.

The 11 a. m. tabulation, including returns from 194 of 254 Texas counties, 13 complete, showed:

For president: Roosevelt 368,405; Landon 50,339; Lemke 1,260; Thomas, 444.

Liquor monopoly: For 120,432; against 161,500.

Teacher retirement: for 151,497; against 130,288.

Workmen's compensation for state employees: for 167,007; against 104,850.

Pardon restriction: for 200,958; against 75,718.

State officials salary increases: for 155,432; against 120,670.

House membership limitation: for 165,069; against 100,927.

UVALDE, Nov. 4.—Vice President John Garner beamed today over a stack of congratulatory telegrams over election returns showing his victory over his republican rival, Frank Knox, Chicago publisher.

He had made plans to leave today for a fishing trip, but cancelled the trip because of cold weather.

"I'll stay right here until Christmas unless the president needs me in Washington," he said.

TEN JURORS CHOSEN TO TRY DELLA HENRY

At 3 o'clock, A. L. Farley, Cisco water department employee, was selected as the 11th juror in the Della Henry murder trial.

The tenth juror for the trial of Mrs. Della Henry on a charge of slaying her former husband, H. L. McBea, at Rising Star, over three years ago, was selected Wednesday morning in 88th district court at Eastland.

The defense was granted an extra peremptory challenge shortly before noon when its fifteenth was exhausted. J. Frank Sparks, chief defense attorney, had asked 15 more from the court, which was refused. The state had exercised 12 of its peremptory challenges.

The tenth juror was R. V. Burns, Ranger gas plant repairman. A total of 80 veniremen had been questioned up to the noon recess.

Those of the special venire of 80 talesmen who were questioned Wednesday morning were John Tibbels, Ranger; J. H. Greer, Ranger; A. H. Williams, Ranger; Burns; Frank Penn, Ranger; E. C. Only three jurors were lacking after Tuesday afternoon's session, which resulted in the agreement of counsel on selection of three veniremen.

Eighty-five talesmen summoned Tuesday morning returned that afternoon when the original venire of 140 was exhausted. Only six of the 85 were examined, however, Tuesday afternoon. The remainder were instructed to return Wednesday morning. Before that time the state and defense had each exercised 11 of its peremptory challenges.

The jurors selected Tuesday afternoon were M. A. Clatt of Eastland, dairyman; S. H. Brock, Eastland ice station manager, and T. L. Amis, Eastland electric plant employee.

A total of 62 had been questioned in the selection of jurors up to Wednesday morning.

VOTING TREND IN RANGER IS LIKE IN STATE

A total of 1,108 votes was cast in the general election in Ranger Tuesday, with the Roosevelt-Garner ticket receiving a total of 871 votes, and the Landon-Knox ticket polling 101, a total of more than eight to one for the Administration and the New Deal. The remainder of the votes, totalling 126, were scattering for the minor candidates.

The entire Democratic ticket, from President down to Constable, went over with a big majority, while the state ticket for U. S. Senator down to Constable went Democratic by an even greater majority than did the Presidential ticket.

The trend of the six proposed constitutional amendments went the same in Ranger as it did over the state as a whole, with the liquor monopoly amendment losing by a vote of 410 against to 373 for.

Totals of the two Ranger boxes on the other proposed constitutional amendments were as follows:

Teacher retirement, for 420, against 362; payment of compensation to state employees, for 502, against 283; pardon board, for 569, against 223; state officers' salaries, for 402, against 385; limitation of representation, for 359, against 258.

Ethiopia Opened To Colonization

ADDIS ABABA.—The vast plateaus and plains of Ethiopia, now under Italian rule, will be thrown open to colonization about Nov. 1, the United Press has been advised by government officials.

At Dessye, Asmara and back in Italy tens of thousands of Italians are eagerly awaiting the completion of the road to Addis Ababa, expected about Nov. 1 to begin what may be the greatest immigration movement of the 20th century, certainly the greatest since the United States restricted immigration.

When the road is opened a steady stream of colonists will push toward Addis Ababa in a fleet of trucks to obtain the choicest bits of the fertile and well watered plateaus.

The youth of Italy is being given the opportunity that was offered the adventurous minded of other countries during the last century. Young people will have the opportunity to pioneer in these vast expanses, ideal for machine farming or cattle ranching.

The timbered regions of the south and west will be opened as well as the rolling prairie-like ranges of the central provinces. Nor will danger be completely lacking. The smoldering resentment of a conquered people will not be extinguished for some years and the young pioneers, with guns ready will have to pacify their sections as did the American pioneers of a century ago.

Those who wish plantations will be sent to the blistering lowlands where white men find it difficult to work. Those who wish machine farming will go to sections more appropriate. Fruit growers will be granted land in portions suitable for fruit growing, and ranchers will get the hilly ranges where native cattle have fattened for centuries.

The government control of the colonization movement will be paternalistic. Care will be taken that fruit growers do not go to territories where fruit cannot be raised. The government does not want to have disgruntled pioneers who have been settled in the wrong parts of the empire.

DEMOCRATIC LANDSLIDE IS CONTINUED AS 46 STATES ARE CARRIED BY PARTY

President Roosevelt was returned to power for four more years by the largest vote ever given a presidential candidate. Incomplete returns on the United Press indicated today.

Gov. Landon appeared to be the worst defeated candidate since 1912 when Theodore Roosevelt led "Bull Moosers" out of the republican party and William Howard Taft, the GOP nominee, received only eight electoral votes. Roosevelt has won or is leading in 46 states, whose electoral vote totals 523. As the ballots piled in it seemed certain he would exceed the 22,000,000 votes he received in 1932 when he defeated Herbert Hoover.

The vote with returns still straggling in was Roosevelt 20,307,336; Landon 12,538,100; Lemke 366,845; Thomas 9,501.

Only two states in New England, once rock ribbed republican territory, appeared to be in the Landon column. They were Maine and Vermont, giving the Kansas governor an apparent electoral vote of 8.

Pledging President Roosevelt that all Americans will work with the administration "for the good of the country" Gov. Landon, in Topeka, today, posed jovially with

newspaper correspondents and answered requests for comments with "not this morning."

He was perhaps the most cheerful person in his office as reporters who have covered his campaign gathered at his desk, many of them to say good bye.

Although Landon declined to discuss immediate plans, beyond saying he was going duck hunting, friends understood the governor and Mrs. Landon plan to buy a farm near Topeka.

Territory that republicans had counted on certain, such states as Mass., R. I. and Conn., put the president in the lead. Dixie went heavily for the democrats, as was expected, and Roosevelt invaded Landon's home territory and held a lead in Kansas.

The president enters his next term with a fair prospect of having an increased majority in the house, already overwhelmingly democratic. It appeared possible the democrats, now holding 322 of the 435 seats, might increase their majority by 10 to 20 members.

Although some senate seats were in doubt, it appeared the lineup would be democrats, 73, republicans 19, farmer-laborites 2, progressives 1 and independent 1.

TRAINMEN IS SHOT AT BAIRD BY CAFE COOK

BAIRD, Nov. 4.—Fred Brackeen, 32, cafe cook, was held in jail today awaiting action by the Callahan county grand jury in connection with the fatal shooting of M. B. Jones, 54, Fort Worth railroad engineer.

Sheriff R. L. Edwards said Brackeen asserted he fired in self-defense yesterday when the two men met at the street entrance to the office of a Baird attorney. The sheriff said he found a pistol on the wounded engineer, but the weapon had not been fired. Jones died last night in a hospital.

Brackeen was charged with assault to murder before Jones died. Jones, Sheriff Edwards said, owned a house here in which Brackeen and his wife, estranged, lived for several months last spring.

Jones is survived by a wife and two children, in Fort Worth.

SNIPERS KILL TRAINMAN IN L. & A. STRIKE

NEW ORLEANS, Nov. 4.—Sniper's bullets killed a guard, felled an engine crew and temporarily left an express train of the strike ridden Louisiana and Arkansas Railway, running wild today.

The attack occurred near Calvin, La., six miles north of Winnfield.

Max Osborne, 30, of Rodessa, La., was killed by bullets that splintered the cabin glass. E. J. Waskom, fireman, was shot through the left jaw and engineer F. R. Bason was stunned as a slug grazed his neck.

Bacon regained his pilot seat and stopped the engine.

It was the third death in the seven-week-old strike in which 500 trainmen are participating.

Jo Anne said Wayland set fire to a bed quilt. Frightened by the flames the children crawled under the bed.

Negro Loves Dog So He Surrenders

HOUSTON, Tex.—Arthur Lewis, 46, Negro, loves his dog enough to go to jail for him.

Officers, seeking to arrest the negro for creating a disturbance, were attacked by the dog when they entered Lewis' yard. The Negro was hiding in his home.

The dog bit Officer M. H. McCoy, who fired two shots at the irate animal, but missed. Lewis ran from the house.

"Don't do that," the Negro shouted. "I'll give up and go to jail peacefully." He was charged with being drunk.

Planting On Roads Part of Road Job

WASHINGTON.—Improvement on roadsides by landscape grading, seeding, sodding, and planting has become increasingly popular in recent years. Since 1933 it has been required that each state include roadside improvement projects in its program of work to be done with Federal funds administered by the Bureau of Public Roads. The total program—completed, under improvement, and planned—includes 1,391 sections of road improved according to plans prepared by landscape specialists. Roadside have been, or are being improved on approximately 5,000 miles of highway at a cost of more than \$7,000,000, of which the Federal government is contributing more than \$6,000,000.

Most of these improvements are on main arteries of travel at the approaches to the more important centers of population, and much of the work has been done along existing surfaced highways.

Several features of roadside improvement work that have come to the attention of highway engineers as a result of the objectionable demonstrations, have been adopted in regular highway construction practice in several of the states. Among the practices adopted are flatter grading of slopes and slope rounding, reduction in the depth of ditches, elimination of "borrow" pits, a better "cleanup" of the roadsides after construction is completed, the gaving of trees and other volunteer growth, the conservation of topsoil humus where feasible for later use in ground cover protection, the planting of natural snow barriers, and the construction of small parking areas at scenic outlooks. Several states, in building new roads, are doing as much of this work as right-of-way widths permit.

State highway department organizations are providing for an improved technical approach to the various roadside problems, and as experience is accumulated, they are developing more effective methods of handling the work. Only a few years ago highways were completed with little thought to the appearance of the finished roadside and attempts were made at so-called "beautification" under conditions already bad and often with over-emphasis on some particular kind of planting. Results have been much better since roadside improvement has been regarded as an integral part of highway improvement to be provided for in planning rather than as an afterthought following construction.

The report of the Ranger 4-H club chosen by assistant County Agent Hugh F. Barnhart as most outstanding in Eastland County in the National 4-H Social Progress Contest is now being judged in the State Club Leader's office in competition with other winning counties of the state, and local people are eagerly awaiting the results.

The report, which was worked up by the club with the aid of its leader, Morris Jefferies, and others, lists its many activities in promoting better social, recreational and self-improvement opportunities.

The club which numbers ten members was one of ten competing in the county. It will receive a handsome history and year book and its leader a beautiful gold medal.

The county club winning state honors is automatically entered in a contest in the one of four sectional divisions of the United States to which it belongs, and the winner in this contest receives an all-expense trip for its members up to ten to the 15th National 4-H Club Congress to be held in Chicago starting the week of November 28.

The highest scoring of the four sectional winning clubs will be awarded a combination radio-photograph and a library of 461 selected records valued at \$1,550, for use of its county extension organization.

Marlin Sneed, named most typical member in the winning club in this county, is a contestant for individual state honors. From all of the state champions in the U. S., one boy and one girl will be chosen, each to receive a \$500 college scholarship and a trip to New York with chaperone in June, 1937, where the awards will be made personally.

REBELS AWAIT ORDER TO TAKE MADRID TODAY

Spanish nationalist artillery blasted the southern suburbs of Madrid today and shock troops, confident of victory, awaited the order to storm the city.

A rebel communiqué asserted the Getase airbase and artillery barracks, six miles from the city, were destroyed by artillery fire.

Infantry, lead by whipet tanks, moved forward and the nationalists joined their lines on a wide front, extending from south to west of the city. Airplanes, flying high over the sleeping city, dropped new demands for peaceable surrender.

Dispatches from Madrid asserted a key map had deserted to the rebels and given information of vital importance as to the city's defenses.

November Cold Records Broken In State Tuesday

Winter set new records for November cold in Texas Wednesday as a chill blast advanced as far south as the Gulf of Mexico.

Galveston shivered with a temperature of 38, the lowest ever recorded there in November. San Antonio, also proud of its record as a winter resort, had a November minimum of 32.

The cold wave caused a sub-freezing reading of 24 at Amarillo, 26 at Abilene, Dallas 28.9, Palestine 28, Austin 32, Houston 32, Port Arthur 34, Corpus Christi 38, Brownsville 42, Del Rio 36 and El Paso 30.

Former Ranger Boy Is Buried In Paris

Dr. and Mrs. L. E. Gray returned yesterday afternoon from Paris, Texas, where they attended the funeral of Pylon White. They went to Greenville Sunday afternoon, and on to Paris next day to conduct the funeral.

Young Pylon White will be remembered by many Ranger friends as the only son of Mr. and Mrs. T. E. White, so long in the employ of the Gulf company in Ranger. After a residence in the Gulf camp of six or more years and a brief stay in Burk Burnett, they were transferred to Sour Lake.

The son was thirteen years old when he was taken away by a long continued malady. He died in a Beaumont hospital last Sunday morning, and was buried in Paris cemetery.

His mother is a sister of Col. Walter Pylon, the senior vice president of the Gulf company. Mrs. H. R. Thorpe of Ranger, went with Dr. and Mrs. Gray to the funeral.

Ranger Gas Being Odorized to Help Find Any Leaks

Natural gas in Ranger's distributing system is being odorized to assist customers in locating leaks.

That announcement was made today by R. B. Canfield, local manager of the Community Public Service Co. The equipment for mixing the odorizing agent with the gas has been made ready and the first of the odorized gas was turned into the mains Monday, Nov. 2.

The odorant being used is called "calodorant." It is a volatile oil somewhat heavier than gasoline, and is mixed with the gas through an atomizer which vaporizes the oil as it enters the gas. Approximately two gallons of the odorant are used to each million cubic feet of gas. This quantity is sufficient to make escaping gas or an unlighted open burner detectable, yet it does not affect the proper operation of the meters or appliances.

According to Mr. Canfield, the odor of calodorant is penetrating, although not unpleasant or nauseating. It is absolutely harmless and does not affect the heating value of the gas when burned. Calodorant in the gas burns completely.

These leaks will be marked so that a local plumber can be called in to repair the leak and prevent any further loss of gas. Warning is issued against looking for leaks with matches or other fire.

No charge will be made by the gas company for inspections on customers' premises, according to Mr. Canfield. It offers this inspection service free of charge for the benefit of its customers and will answer calls as promptly as possible for the purpose of locating leaks and adjusting appliances.

DALLAS, Nov. 4.—President Roosevelt held a majority of more than 7 to 1 over Gov. Landon in the presidential race as the Texas Election Bureau accounted today for 420,448 votes of a possible 1,000,000 in Texas.

The 11 a. m. tabulation, including returns from 194 of 254 Texas counties, 13 complete, showed:

For president: Roosevelt 368,405; Landon 56,339; Lemke 1,260; Thomas, 444.

Liquor monopoly: For 120,432; against 161,500.

Teacher retirement: for 151,497; against 130,288.

Workmen's compensation for state employees: for 167,007; against 104,850.

Pardon restriction: for 200,958; against 75,718.

State officials salary increases: for 155,432; against 120,670.

House membership limitation: for 165,069; against 100,927.

UVALDE, Nov. 4.—Vice President John Garner beamed today over a stack of congratulatory telegrams over election returns showing his victory over his republican rival, Frank Knox, Chicago publisher.

He had made plans to leave today for a fishing trip, but cancelled the trip because of cold weather.

VOTING TREND IN RANGER IS LIKE IN STATE

A total of 1,108 votes was cast in the general election in Ranger Tuesday, with the Roosevelt-Garner ticket receiving a total of 871 votes, and the Landon-Knox ticket polling 101, a total of more than eight to one for the Administration and the New Deal.

The remainder of the votes, totalling 126, were scattering for the minor candidates.

The entire Democratic ticket, from President down to Constable, went over with a big majority, while the state ticket for U. S. Senator down to Constable went Democratic by an even greater majority than did the Presidential ticket.

The trend of the six proposed constitutional amendments went the same in Ranger as it did over the state as a whole, with the liquor monopoly amendment losing by a vote of 410 against to 373 for.

Ethiopia Opened To Colonization

ADDIS ABABA.—The vast plateaus and plains of Ethiopia, now under Italian rule, will be thrown open to colonization about Nov. 1, the United Press has been advised by government officials.

At Dessay, Asmara and back in Italy tens of thousands of Italians are eagerly awaiting the completion of the road to Addis Ababa, expected about Nov. 1 to begin what may be the greatest immigration movement of the 20th century, certainly the greatest since the United States restricted immigration.

When the road is opened a steady stream of colonists will push toward Addis Ababa in a fleet of trucks to obtain the choicest bits of the fertile and well watered plateaus.

The youth of Italy is being given the opportunity that was offered the adventurous minded of other countries during the last century. Young people will have the opportunity to pioneer in these vast expanses, ideal for machine farming or cattle ranching.

The timbered regions of the south and west will be opened as well as the rolling prairie-like ranges of the central provinces. Now will danger be completely lacking. The smouldering resentment of a conquered people will not be extinguished for some years and the young pioneers, with guns ready will have to pacify their sections as did the American pioneers of a century ago.

Those who wish plantations will be sent to the blistering lowlands where white men find it difficult to work. Those who wish machine farming will go to sections more appropriate. Fruit growers will be granted land in portions suitable for fruit growing, and ranchers will get the hilly ranges where native cattle have fattened for centuries.

The government control of the colonization movement will be paternalistic. Care will be taken that fruit growers do not go to territories where fruit cannot be raised. The government does not want to have disgruntled pioneers who have been settled in the wrong parts of the empire.

Planting On Roads Part of Road Job

WASHINGTON.—Improvement on roadsides by landscape grading, seeding, sodding, and planting has become increasingly popular in recent years. Since 1933 it has been required that each state include roadside improvement projects in its program of work to be done with Federal funds administered by the Bureau of Public Roads.

The total program, completed, under improvement, and planned, includes 1,391 sections of road improved according to plans prepared by landscape specialists. Roadside have been, or are being improved on, approximately 5,000 miles of highway at a cost of more than \$7,000,000, of which the Federal government is contributing more than \$6,000,000.

Most of these improvements are on main arteries of travel at the approaches to the more important centers of population, and much of the work has been done along existing surfaced highways.

Several features of roadside improvement work that have come to the attention of highway engineers as a result of the objectionable demonstrations, have been adopted in regular highway construction practice in several of the states. Among the practices adopted are flatter grading of slopes and slope reduction, reduction in depth of ditches, elimination of "borrow" pits, a better "cleanup" of the roadways after construction is completed, the saving of trees and other volunteer growth, the conservation of topsoil humus where feasible for later use in ground cover protection, the planting of natural snow barriers, and the construction of small parking areas at scenic outlooks. Several states, in building new roads, are doing as much of this work as a right-of-way widths permit.

State highway department organizations are providing for an improved technical approach to the various roadside problems, and as experience is accumulated, they are developing more effective methods of handling the work.

Only a few years ago highways were completed with little thought to the appearance of the finished roadside and attempts were made at so-called "beautification" under conditions already bad and often with over-emphasis on some particular kind of planting. Results have been much better since roadside improvement has been regarded as an integral part of highway improvement to be provided for in planning rather than as an afterthought following construction.

DEMOCRATIC LANDSLIDE IS CONTINUED AS 46 STATES ARE CARRIED BY PARTY

President Roosevelt was returned to power for four more years by the largest vote ever given a presidential candidate. Incomplete returns on the United Press indicated today.

Gov. Landon appeared to be the worst defeated candidate since 1912 when Theodore Roosevelt led "Bull Moosers" out of the republican party and William Howard Taft, the GOP nominee, received only eight electoral votes.

Roosevelt has won or is leading in 46 states, whose electoral vote totals 523. As the ballots piled in it seemed certain he would exceed the 22,000,000 votes he received in 1932 when he defeated Herbert Hoover.

The vote with returns still straggling in was Roosevelt 20,307,356; Landon 12,538,190; Lemke 366,845; Thomas 9,501.

Only two states in New England, once rock ribbed republican territory, appeared to be in the Landon column. They were Maine and Vermont, giving the Kansas governor an apparent electoral vote of 8.

Pledging President Roosevelt that all Americans will work with the administration "for the good of the country" Gov. Landon, in Topeka, today, posed jovially with newspaper correspondents and answered requests for comments with "not this morning."

He was perhaps the most cheerful person in his office as reporters who have covered his campaign gathered at his desk, many of them to say good bye.

Although Landon declined to discuss immediate plans, beyond saying he was going duck hunting, friends understood the governor and Mrs. Landon plan to buy a farm near Topeka.

Territory that republicans had counted as certain, such states as Mass., R. I. and Conn., put the president in the lead. Dixie went heavily for the democrats, as was expected, and Roosevelt invaded Landon's home territory and held a lead in Kansas.

The president enters his next term with a fair prospect of having an increased majority in the house, already overwhelmingly democratic. It appeared possible the democrats, now holding 322 of the 435 seats, might increase their majority by 10 to 20 members.

Although some senate seats were in doubt, it appeared the lineup would be democrats, 73, republicans 19, farmer-laborites 2, progressives 1 and independent 1.

Marlin Sneed, named most typical member in the winning club in this county, is a contestant for individual state honors. From all of the state champions in the U. S., one boy and one girl will be chosen, each to receive a \$500 college scholarship and a trip to New York with chaperone in June, 1937, where the awards will be made personally.

Cartoonists' Uncle Sam Still Symbolizes U. S.

Uncle Sam was a grand old character in his day, but he is out of date now and it is time for the cartoonists to find a new symbol for America.

So says David Low, famous British cartoonist, who has come to this country for a visit and who has discovered that the lanky (chin-whiskered) Yankee of a thousand sketches no longer represents modern America.

Certain it is that the typical American of today—if there is such a person—is no longer a down east farmer. The country has grown civilized and sophisticated since Thomas Nast popularized the lean countryman in the tail coat. A brisk business man in horn-rimmed specs might fill the bill a little better.

But national character is a hard thing to assay. It changes more slowly than surface indications might make you think. Uncle Sam may have moved to the city, togged himself out in up-to-date clothes, and shaved his chin, but there is life in the old gentleman yet.

For the distinguishing thing about the American character is precisely the fact that away down underneath it is symbolized by this familiar Uncle Sam, in spite of everything.

What is Uncle Sam like, anyway? What qualities does he stand for, when we see him on the printed page?

First of all, he is earthly and elemental. He has the tang of the frontier on him; he is tough and sinewy, gifted with a dry humor and a native shrewdness, easy-going and slow to anger, but terrible in his wrath when something does get under his hide.

He is Lincoln and Andrew Jackson, and he has a touch of Mark Twain's gaudy inventiveness, his fondness for a tall tale. He tends to be cannily skeptical, and he is not impressed very much by outward show.

He gets fooled now and then, but never twice in the same way. He has a continent to walk in, and it has given him wiry muscles and made him just a little bit restless.

That, or something like it, is the character that Uncle Sam stands for. It would be foolish, of course, to say that every individual American partakes of those characteristics; but somehow that picture does express the reality which underlies the nation as a whole, and the man who forgets it is due to have an abrupt awakening some day.

For America is not half so urbane so sophisticated, and so streamlined as the outward surface sometimes makes us think. Down underneath there is this elemental and earthly toughness, this saving and irreverent humor, this raw-boned strength; times of crisis bring out these qualities in all their old freshness.

Uncle Sam will do until a better figure comes along. He stands for the best of what we mean by the word "American."

DALLAS, Texas.—Three of five leading positions in the six-month egg laying racing in progress at the Texas Centennial Exposition were held by the Enterprise Hatchery of Mt. Calm, Texas, at the end of the fourth month.

Walter Burton, exposition poultry director, in announcing the 25 most prolific hens, all White Leghorns, said the Enterprise topped the list with a bird that laid 94 eggs since the race began and has scored a total of 102.45 points.

Radley's Hatchery, of Houston, was second with a hen that had produced 92 eggs and a score of 100.60. Enterprise ranked third and fourth with hens each producing 91 eggs but scoring 100 and 99.60 point, respectively.
