Tiny Plants Often Cause Water To Taste, Smell Bad

NEW YORK.—An unbelievably
faint amount of some odorous sub-
stance in the air or in water can
be detected by the human nose.
Experiments have demonstrated
that the presence of one twenty-
five-millionth of a drop of mer-
captan, a liquid with a pungent
garlic odor, can be perceived in a
whiff of inhaled air, reports the
American Institute of Sanitation.
A very minute amount of an
odorous substance can make the
whole water supply of a city un-
palatable. Virtually every city in
the country is bothered at some
time during the year with unpalat-
able tastes and odors caused by
tiny plants in the water, only
about one-thousandth of an inch
in size. These plants, says the in-
stitute, throw off disagreeable
odorous substances which quickly
discolor the water. Despite the
wide prevalence of such odors in
drinking water, comparatively lit-
tle is known about their nature.
The quantity of such odorous sub-
stances in a million gallons of wa-
ter is so small that it baffles ex-
amination by the chemist. But
such tastes and odors do not es-
cape the human nose.
Although science has been able
to learn little about the chemical
composition of the substances that
render public water supplies un-
palatable, it has been able to com-
bat them effectively. A remark-
able substance, activated carbon,
has been perfected which, like a
magnet, absorbs such tastes and
odors, making the water sparkling,
sweet and palatable. Hundreds of
cities throughout the country are
now using activated carbon to
keep the water supply potable and
their taxpayers happy.
Contrary to popular thought,
the sense of taste is inferior to
the sense of smell, says the in-
stitute. If we could not smell the
savory odors, most of our food
would be relatively tasteless. If
you don't believe that, try eating
a juicy steak with a cloth napkin
over your nose.

Twelve Are Killed In Salt Mine Riot

LONDON, July 27.—Twelve
convicts were killed today when
300 convicted murderers mutinied
in a 3,000-foot-deep prison salt
mine in Roumania, an Exchange
Telegraph dispatch reported.
The convicts attacked guards in
the depths of the mine with picks,
hammers and shovels. Four guards
were injured seriously and several
were hurt slightly. Grievances
over food was reported as the cause
of the riot.

WASHINGTON, July 27.—Sen.
Morris Sheppard of Texas said
today, after a conference with
White House Secretary James
Roosevelt, that the president will
make a "final decision soon" on
allotment of \$6,600,000 for con-
struction of Possum Kingdom dam
on the Brazos River near Mineral
Wells.
Sheppard said Mr. Roosevelt
would act "as soon as the budget
bureau sends him a revised report
on the project."
James Roosevelt will first study
the report.
Sheppard was accompanied to
the White House by officials of
the Brazos River Conservation
District. Their plan embraced con-
struction of 13 dams on the river,
costing \$30,000,000.

Will Start a Well North of Ranger In The Watson Lease

Bob Wickens, drilling contract-
or for Dean Brothers, announced
here today that work was expect-
ed to start on a well on the Wat-
son Lease, 16 miles north of
Ranger in Stephens County, Tues-
day afternoon.
The well is to be drilled to the
Strawn Sand, it was stated. The
well is not considered a wildcat as
this area was drilled during the
boom and good showings of oil
were encountered in the Strawn
Sand, but were passed up in an
effort to obtain greater produc-
tion.
This is the same sand from
which the Bryson wells are pro-
ducing, it was stated, and it is
anticipated that a good well can
be brought in.
Reports here today also stated
that the Gallagher and Lawson
drilling at Desdemona was drill-
ing at 2,604 feet Tuesday
morning, with the drilling going
along at scheduled speed.

Utah Salt Lake Germless Basin

LA JOLLA, Calif. — Scientists
said today the Great Salt Lake in
Utah is virtually a "germ-proof"
swimming hole.
Researchers of the Scripps In-
stitution of Oceanography of the
University of California an-
nounced that all ordinary bacteria
or "germ-carrying" microbes are
killed instantly when exposed to
the lake's concentrated salt wa-
ters. No land or fresh-water bac-
teria has yet been found which
can live in the saline concentra-
ted waters of the lake, they dis-
closed.
It was found that the lake water
was not only highly bactericidal
or "killing," but was also bacteri-
static or "retarding" to the al-
ready present saltwater-type bac-
teria.
Some types of microbes are liv-
ing in the lake, said the scientists,
but they differ from those of other
habitats in that they develop
slowly and are in smaller col-
onies. They are believed to be spe-
cies which became used to the slow-
ly increasing salt water concentra-
tion during the time the waters
of the old Lake Bonneville evo-
luted, leaving the saline residue
of Salt Lake.
The series of experiments was
made by Dr. Claude E. Zobell and
D. Quentin Anderson of the
Scripps Institution and W. Whit-
ney of the department of bacteri-
ology, University of Utah.

til you send me to the island." He
did not specify what island.

Queer Law Quirk Affects Dry Status Of Houston Heights

AUSTIN, Texas. — That pe-
culiar quirk in the law concern-
ing the prohibition situation of
Houston Heights has again begun
to tickle capital city barristers.
Notice of the situation came
about when the Supreme Court
of Texas decided to grant a writ
of error on a Galveston court of
civil appeals ruling.
Back in 1912 Houston was far
from the sprawling metropolis
that is now the largest city in the
largest state. Already, though,
symptoms of greatness were be-
ginning to pop out like pimples on
an adolescent.
Such a pimple—not at all un-
sightly but nonetheless evident—
was Houston Heights. The Heights
represented an ostentatious child
itself, and for a time threatened
to be a husky rival to Due-To-Big
Houston.
The meeting and merger was
inevitable.
In 1912, however, six years be-
fore the merger came about, citi-
zens of Houston Heights voted a
prohibition ticket, and a local op-
tion election revealed the town
very dry indeed.
Big Houston, however, felt no
quarrels about allowing a few bars
to dot its business area, so long as
the boys kept the choruses low.
When the absorption of the
Heights by Houston finally came,
Houston was still wet, the Heights
still dry. Not much later Con-
gressman Volstead evolved a plan
that put into effect the national
prohibition act. Houston, follow-
ing the Heights by nearly a de-
cade, became dry.
Little more than a dozen years
later prohibition was gone and a
local option election restored
Houston to its wet classification.
Things ran smoothly for
while. Taverns and restaurants
sold beer in the Heights and pack-
age stores sold liquor just as was
done in other sections of Houston.
But a noisy crowd in a Heights
tavern one night caused an ob-
jecting citizen to go to the City
Hall and legal authorities to see
if there wasn't something that
could be done about the situation.

the body, and how like sin that is.

pany and was in that way a com-
mon leper. He told in a very
impressive manner, how sin did the
same thing.
At this point the speaker told
how Christianity would finally
bring all churches closer together,
as we came more and more to
serve one common Lord. He show-
ed how these lepers were cleansed
while they were obeying the Mas-
ter. There is no other way that
it can be done.
The Bible brands the sinner as a
moral leper. Sin means death
unless cured by the "Great Physi-
cian." Satan whitewashes sin —
makes it appear beautiful, a thing
most to be desired, but the end
thereof is death. Leprosy is cur-
able only in its early stages — so
is sin.

UNDECLARED WAR RAGES IN NORTH CHINA

PEIPING, China, July 27.—Jan-
pan and China were in an unde-
clared state of war in North China
tonight, with fighting in progress
in scattered points between Pei-
ping, the ancient capital, and Tien-
tsin, toward the sea.
Scene reminding of the Boxer
Rebellion occurred in Peiping as
foreigners, swarmed into their le-
gations for refuge.
United States Marines were is-
sued combat ammunition to pro-
tect American citizens.
French citizens were called to
their legation. Sandbags were
stacked along the streets of the
quarter as they were in 1900 dur-
ing the Boxer Rebellion, where
foreigners were slaughtered and
besieged before the American, Jap-
anese, Russian, British and French
forces relieved the city.
The Chinese ignored two Japane-
se ultimatums to withdraw their
forces from the Peiping area and
word from Nanking, the central
capital, indicated China is ready to
fight it out in the belief Japan in-
tends to seize North China.
Japanese troops were pouring
into Tangku, port of Tientsin, in
transporta from Japan, ready to
meet China's defiance. The com-
mander of the 29th Chinese army
at Peiping was understood to have
decided to withdraw to the capital
the troops in the Nanyuan bar-
racks, five miles south of the city.
Japanese troops, after suffering
a humiliating defeat at the city's
southwest gates, attacked a Chi-
nese regiment 15 miles east of
Peiping and according to Japanese
killed or wounded 400 or 500
troops.
Peiping was cut off from the
coast by railroad, bus, telegraph
and telephone.
SHANGHAI, July 27.—A Cen-
tral Chinese News Agency dispatch
from Peiping reported tonight
Japanese war planes had dropped
poison gas in the Lukouchiao area
southwest of Peiping.
WASHINGTON, July 27.—Sec-
retary of State Cordell Hull today
instructed American ambassador
in Tokyo and Peiping to express
to the government there the hope
that hostilities can be avoided.
British and French governments
did likewise.

The First State Bank failed in
April and depositors were paid off
by the Federal Deposit Insurance

\$5,000. The new bank will have a
capital stock of \$35,000 and a
surplus of \$10,000.

National Bank; E. E. Davis, dean

Fort Worth.

Oversea Flay-Waving
Is Not in Our Line

The mouthpiece of a nation in any foreign land is its envoy to that land. And when that envoy makes a slip of the tongue, then his nation is usually held responsible for the utterance and may have to suffer all the added constructions that prejudice, favorable or unfavorable, may allow.

Sometimes these slips are harmless enough to be good for a laugh all around—and possibly a red face for the envoy. The case of Mrs. J. Borden Harriman was one such example. Five minutes after she took the oath of office as minister to Norway this spring, Mrs. Harriman inopportunely revealed that the United States and Norway were well along in negotiations for a reciprocal trade treaty.

Later, when the new minister arrived in Norway, she was unusually aloof in the presence of newspapermen, one of whom reported that "Mrs. Harriman seems to be strictly instructed not to give positive statements.

All very well, if it amounts to no more than that. But in London, a Fourth of July address by Ambassador Robert W. Bingham threatened to have more serious consequences.

He was quoted as saying that "despots have forced American and Britain to undertake rearmament, and having undertaken it, we must necessarily win the rearmament race." Also: "If dictatorships are better to prepare for war, democracies are better to finish wars." Of these statements, the U. S. State Department said it had no knowledge.

The immediate response was a flareup in a prominent German newspaper, which called the remarks "agitative" criticism of "other European peoples." Regardless of how much the truth may have hurt the editor of that German paper, there is little doubt that he was correct in adjudging the ambassador's remarks as at least unnecessary.

For one thing, waving the nationalistic flag outside the privacy of the family circle just is not in the accepted American tradition. Even the bombastic stump speaker, who used to spellbind Independence Day picnickers at county seats the country over, was not so hard put for a topic that he had to delve into foreign relations.

Then, too, dealing with Norway obviously is quite different from dealing with any of the dictatorships. In these days of touchy feelings among the nations—and especially among two or three particular nations—the United States has a splendid opportunity to strengthen its reputation for cool-headedness. When these little "slips" occur, they make it all the harder for the nation to dodge the diplomatic squeezes which are bound to come in the future as general tension increases.

But most useless of all is any attempt by the United States to growl and show its teeth. Europe has war dogs who do it so much, much better.

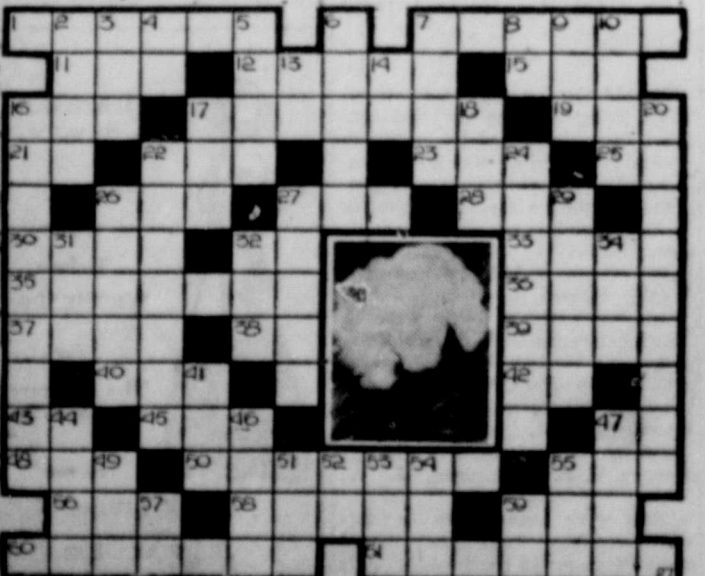

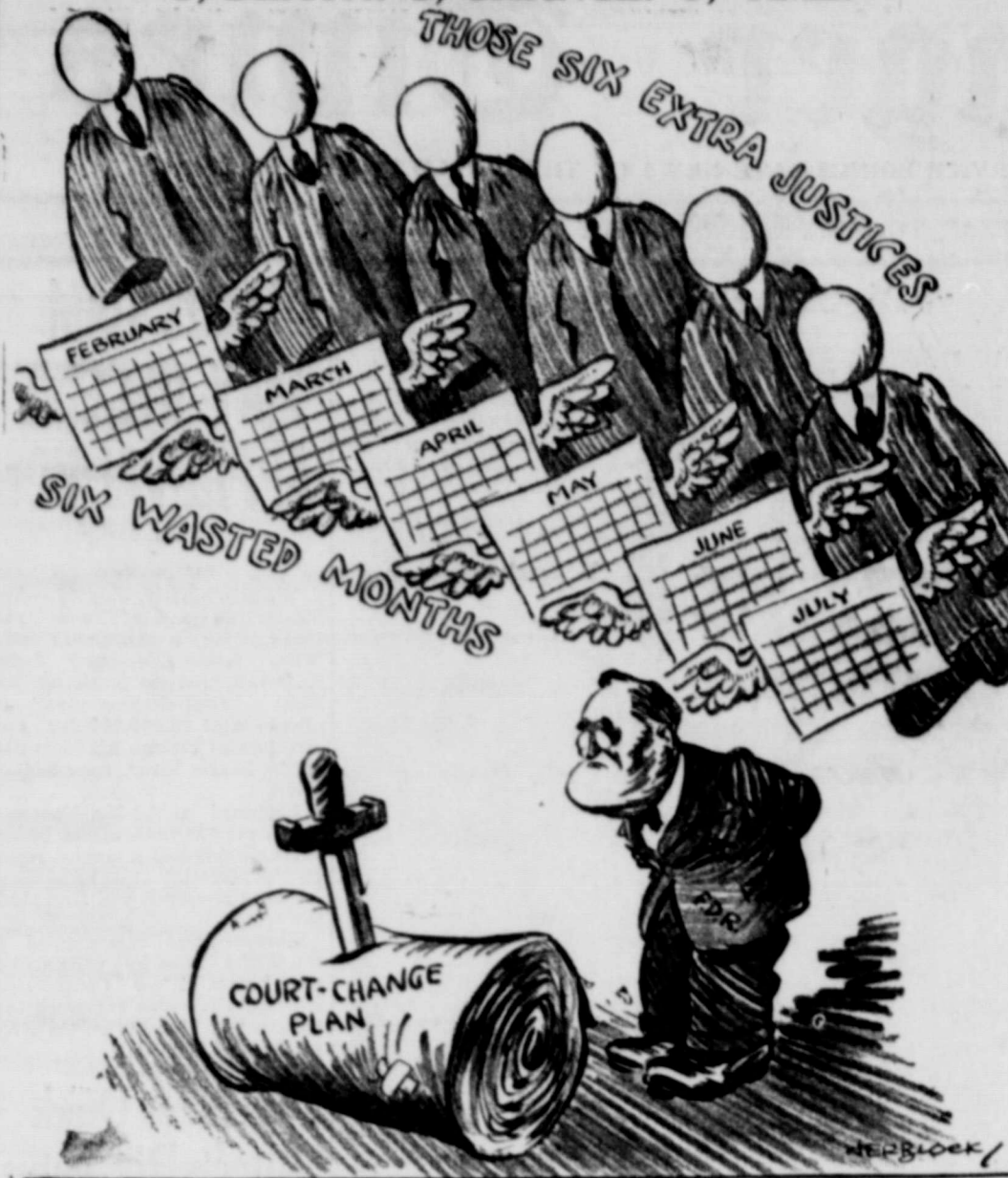

Mexican Cement to Be Studied Soon

AUSTIN, Texas.—State Representative Fred Felty of San Antonio will go to Mexico this summer to study cement manufacture and marketing. Felty is a member of the House of Representatives' committee investigating an alleged Texas cement monopoly. The committee recently completed a visit to several of the state's nine major cement factories.

Immediately before adjournment until September, the committee instructed Felty to visit the modern cement plant at Monterrey, Mexico, and bring back a report on costs of production, the labor and methods of merchandising.

The committee has been studying cement production and comparative prices of Belgian and Texas firms with a view toward possible recommendation to the highway commission that it accept foreign bids.

Blame Is Placed Upon Public For Most Forest Fires

WASHINGTON.—F. A. Silcox, chief of the U. S. Forest Service, has appealed to vacationists to be more careful of fires they build in the nation's forests.

Ninety per cent of all forest fires are man-caused, Silcox said. The nation suffers an annual billion-dollar loss from forest fires which sweep over 40,000,000 acres.

Silcox praised a painting by James Montgomery Flagg showing Uncle Sam in the uniform of a Forest Ranger pointing toward a burning forest and the words, "Your Forest—Your Fault—Your Loss."

The painting, officially accepted by President Roosevelt, will be used extensively by the Forest Service in fire prevention work. Through the aid of co-operating agencies, poster copies of the painting are to be distributed throughout the country.

"Mr. Flagg has gone straight to the essential point in his problem of fire control—the human element," Silcox said. "His title tells the whole story in rapid-fire style. 'America's forests are literally 'Your Forests.' Forests, no matter where they are, under private, state or federal ownership, influence the daily lives of millions of people directly dependent for a livelihood on forest products, and additional millions who use the forests for hunting, fishing, camping and other forms of recreation."

"Green forests protect watersheds and exert a powerful control on the sources of floods."

"The second part of Flagg's title—'Your Fault'—means just this: 90 per cent of all the forest fires in the nation are man-caused. Because they are caused by man, they are preventable."

"Due to the close interrelationship between the forests and our everyday life, the phrase, 'Your Loss' becomes equally true. It may reasonably be said that when a forest burns, everybody loses. 'Flagg has made a valuable contribution in the fight against forest fires which burn annually over an area almost as large as the entire State of Washington,'" Silcox said.
