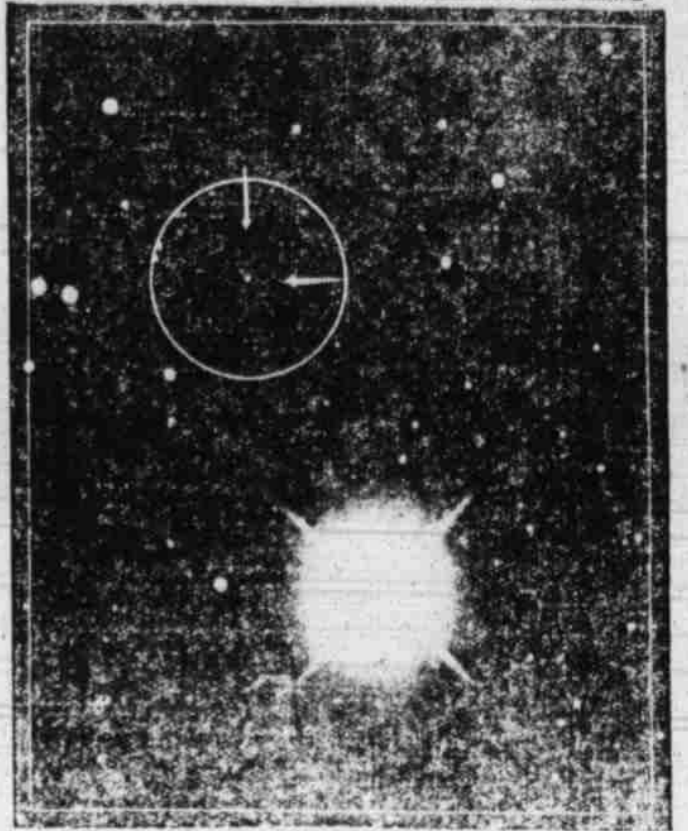

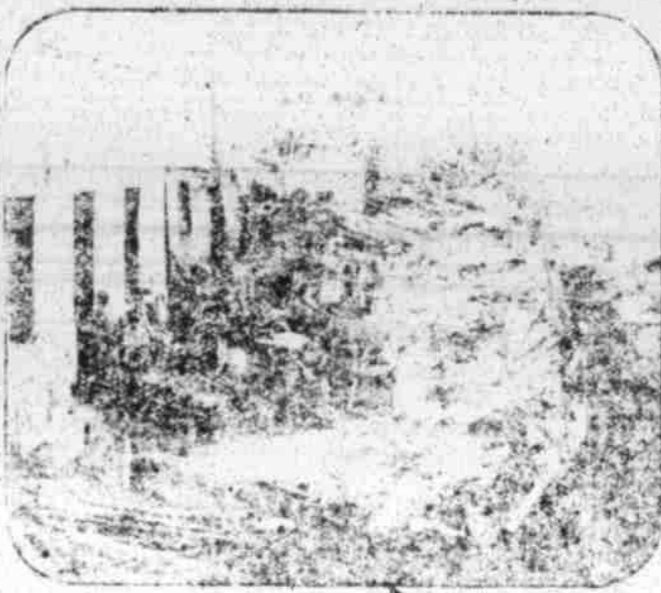

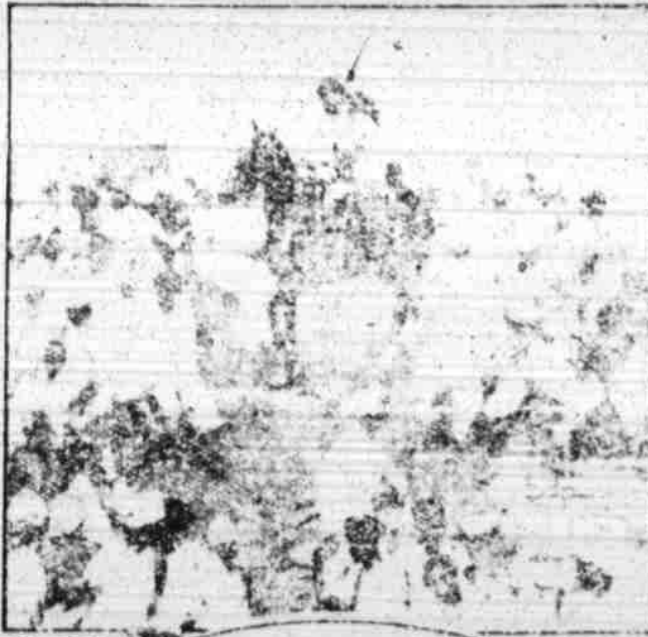

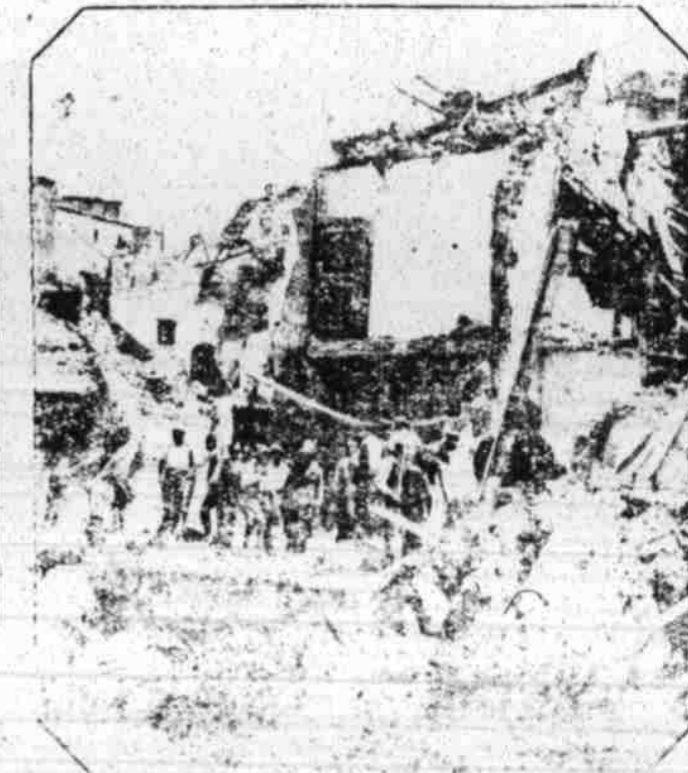
A KING RETURNS. Carol, Romania's prodigal son, returned and became monarch, depicted by his son, Prince Baudouin, who had ruled with a council of regents.
