

## S-Sgt. Tom Wilkes Shown With Texas Group In England

Pictured with a group of 36 men from Lubbock and nearby cities in Sunday's issue of the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal, was S-Sgt. Thomas H. Wilkes, 22, the son of Mr. and Mrs. E. V. Wilkes of 707 South Third Street in this city.

The group is a part of the Texas Air Force now stationed in England, and are members of the 100th Bomb Group, a unit of the famed 3rd Bombardment division of the Eighth Air Force which was cited by the President for the historic England to Africa shuttle bombing of Messerschmitt aircraft at Regensburg, Germany in August 1943.

## J. T. Fowler, Gunner In England Receives Promotion To S-Sgt.

AN EIGHTH AIR FORCE BOMBARDMENT STATION, England — The promotion of John T. Fowler, 20, of Lamesa from sergeant to staff sergeant has been announced at an Eighth Air Force B-17 Flying Fortress Base in England. A member of the 95th Bombardment Group, the sergeant is a gunner on a Fort.

Sgt. Fowler is a member of the Fortress group which led the first American bombing attack on target in Berlin, and which was cited by the President for its outstanding bombing assault on railroad marshalling yards at Munster, Germany, in October, 1943. As a component of the distinguished Third Bombardment Division, the group also shared in a Presidential citation given the entire division for its historic England-Africa shuttle bombing of an important Messerschmitt fighter plane plant at Regensburg, Germany, in August of 1943.

The AAF gunner is the son of Mr. and Mrs. C. O. Fowler of Lamesa. His wife, Mrs. Bebe Fowler, lives on Star Route 1, Lamesa.

## Eagles Roll Past Lamesa By 40-7

The Abilene Eagles defeated Lamesa's Golden Tornadoes, 40-7, there Saturday, November 11, before an Armistice holiday crowd of 4,800 persons. The victory left Abilene tied for first place in the District 3AA standings with the San Angelo Bobcats.

The Abileneans made one tally in the first period, another in the second, three more in the third and one in the fourth. Lamesa tallied in the final quarter on a 65-yard sprint by Dan Boone.

Lamesa chalked up 1 first down to Abilene's 9, and gained 7 yards by rushing to Abilene's 275 yards. The Eagles gained 87 yards through passes, to 27 for the Tornadoes.

Lamesa completed 1 out of 7 attempts to pass, while Abilene completed 5 of 13.

Mr. and Mrs. A. G. Barnard of this city have received word of the promotion of their son Allen G. Barnard, Jr., to the rank of first lieutenant. He received his new rating on November 1.

A member of the service for the past 2 years, he was commissioned second lieutenant at Midland Bombardier School on December 24. He has been overseas since May, where he is a member of the 10th Army Air Force.

Lt. Barnard, who is 20 years of age, is a graduate of Lamesa High School, where he took active part in basketball, football, and band activities. He is also a graduate of Schreiner Institute at Kerrville.

## NEW SUGAR STAMP TO BE GOOD NOV. 16TH

Sugar Stamp 34 in War Ration Book Four will be good for buying five pounds of sugar beginning November 16, 1944, the District Office of Price Administration announced today.

The stamp, like other sugar stamps now being used, will be good indefinitely for buying sugar. Other stamps, validated in the past, which also are good indefinitely for use in buying sugar are Nos. 30, 31, 32, and 33.

Sugar Stamp No. 40, validated February 1, 1944 is good for buying five pounds of sugar for home canning through February 28, 1945.

## Area Completes Its Goal For The United War Chest

J. R. (Dutch) Leuenberger, chairman of the local United War Chest Drive, announced Saturday that Dawson County had gone over the top in donations. He stated that this area had successfully completed their \$11,156.00 quota, and judged that approximately \$400.00 over that amount had been turned into headquarters.

Seven hundred of this amount will be kept in the county to be used by Girl Scouts, who have had a prominent part in the drive, having set up booths around the square for the purpose of taking collections.

Chairman Leuenberger states that he is happy to make this announcement of the success of the United War Chest Campaign here. He states that the cooperation of the people here has been particularly helpful, and expresses appreciation to both workers and donors, who gave so freely of their time and funds throughout the drive.

## Draft Age Men Can Volunteer In Navy At Present

A major change in procurement whereby qualified men of selective service ages—as well as in the 17 and 38-50 groups—may volunteer for special Navy service and be assured of assignment to that branch upon induction has been announced by the Navy Department.

Lieut.-Cmdr. Dan Henry, officer in charge of North and West Texas Navy recruiting, said he had been authorized to announce that, effective immediately, men who have physically qualified for armed service through pre-induction examinations and before reporting for actual induction, may take the Eddy test for radar and radio technician training, without obligation, at any Navy recruiting station or sub-station.

Successful applicants who have not received orders to report for induction, will be given letters of directed assignment to submit at the time of induction. These letters will assure assignment to the Navy and enlistment as Seamen, first class, in the U. S. Naval Reserve, in which the men will enter a ten-month course of concentrated, technical training in radar, radio and related subjects. Need for men in these fields is the Navy's No. 1 urgency just now. Basic knowledge of mathematics, science, shop work, electricity and radio is beneficial but not required.

Only by taking—and passing—the Eddy test prior to induction are men of draft age eligible to apply for voluntary enlistment in the Navy, Commander Henry said. High school graduation is the minimum educational requirement.

## Recipe to Conserve Certain of Surplus Fruits Given

Fall offers the year's final opportunity to fill the fruit quota of the family food preservation budget, and many homemakers can take advantage of this opportunity by preserving apples from the abundant crop in this and adjoining states.

Winifred J. Leverenz, specialist in food preservation for the A. and M. College Extension Service, says apples can be stored successfully for several months in their natural state, or they can be dried, canned, or preserved in a number of ways. Doubtless, many homemakers will can apples, make jelly, applesauce, and apple butter, but there are other delicious products which can be made to delight the family.

Apple-grape butter is one of these, and pickled apples is another. Others include apple-carrot conserve, tomato-apple conserve which is good with meat, apple chutney, and dried apple conserve. Mrs. Leverenz says interested homemakers can obtain these directions and recipes from their local county home demonstration agents.

One recipe she particularly likes is that for apple-carrot conserve. It is as follows:

**Apple-Carrot Conserve**  
 2 cups chopped peeled and cored apples  
 2 cups grated or ground carrots  
 1 lemon sliced thin or ground  
 1-2 cup water  
 2-3 cup sugar  
 1-2 teaspoon salt.  
 1 orange may be substituted for lemon for variety.

Cook all together until the fruit is transparent and has a transparent sirup. It takes about 45 minutes to an hour. Pour into hot clean jars. Seal and process in water bath 10 minutes.

**Grub Control Program Now Underway**

Cattle grubs each year in Texas destroy enough leather to furnish shoes for a million soldiers and enough meat to feed nearly five thousand for a 12-month period.

In view of these and other losses, the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service is waging a strenuous control program which already is under way in South Texas and will continue to late December in the northeastern section. A leaflet describing control measures entitled "Are Your Cattle Grubby?" has just been issued by the Extension Service and is generally available from county agricultural agents.

Dr. H. G. Johnson, Extension entomologist and author of the new leaflet, says in addition to causing losses of meat and leather, grubs are known to reduce milk flow approximately 25 per cent. In addition, grubby cattle require about 15 per cent more feed. Looking at grub damage as a whole, it costs Texas farmers and ranchers about five million dollars each year. Dr. Johnson believes this can be saved by simple, inexpensive treatment.

For small numbers of animals, dusting is easy and effective, since the dust simply is rubbed into the hair with the finger tips. A fruit jar with a dozen or so holes in the metal lid can be used. A mixture of 5 per cent rotenone and sulfur is preferable, but where these ingredients are unobtainable substitutions can be made.

Cube or derris, sulfur, and water also combine to make a suitable spray mixture. Dr. Johnson recommends use of a power spray producing not less than 250 pounds pressure. The backs of the animals should be wet thoroughly. When both grubs and lice are to be controlled animals should be dipped. Two applications 17 to 21 days apart are

LONDON (AP) — A British tank commander sank a ship at Antwerp recently.

In charge of a tank squadron detailed with clearing the dock area, Capt. H. G. Stubbs heard that a ship laden with escaping Germans was headed downstream. Charging to the waterfront, he halted his tank on the edge of the dock, and his gunner went to work. The first three shells struck the ship amidships and set her afire. The second salvo hit her below the waterline, and she listed sharply as she limped to the side of the river.

Capt. Stubbs came down long enough to take 200 prisoners, then went to more orthodox targets.

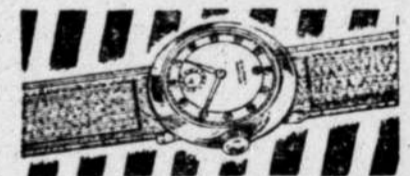
