Lava Cascades From Mauna Loa in Giant Eruption



A wave of flaming lava five miles wide spewed out of the crater of Mokuaweoweo, 14 miles up on the summit of Mauna Loa on the island of Hawaii, pouring in two streams toward Hilo and the Kona coast, in the second major eruption in three years. This air view gives a striking idea of the appearance of the 10-mile crater in action, smoke billowing up from the molten sea. Violent earth shocks preceded the eruption from the pit of the world's second largest active volcano.

pearing over the skin indicate that the bird was not properly bled after being killed. This spoils the appearance and means that the turkey will not keep as well.

You will have to singe the turkey. This means holding it over a flame, turning it from side to side so that the tiny hairs left on the skin after picking all are singed off. Look for any pinfeathers that may have escaped plucking. At the tail of the turkey is a tiny oil sack. This must be carefully cut away.

Scrape With Blunt Edge of Knife
Rub the inside of the turkey well with salt. Then thoroughly wash it with cold water until every trace of salt is gone. Scrape the outside of the turkey with the blunt edge of a case knife, keeping the bird under water and taking care not to break the skin. Drain thoroughly and keep on ice until ready to stuff and truss.

Now cross string again and draw it up and around the end of the upper skewer. Tie string securely in a knot and cut off end. The stuffing and trussing should be done the day before Thanksgiving. Then keep bird in the refrigerator until wanted for roasting.

HOW ABOUT SPECIAL SESSSION

EDITORS NOTE: This is the last story of a series discussing special sessions of the legislature.

AUSTIN, Nov. 23.—Substitution of one house for the present dual system, revision of rules, reduction of membership and annual salaries for legislators have been suggested as means of expediting the legislature's work and reducing the number of called sessions.

Restive at the growing number of special sessions and snarls in law-making, a group of your members has given the unicameral legislative plan fervent support.

A resolution by Senator G. H. Nelson of Tahoka, urging a constitutional election of the question on the question, received scant attention in the Senate.

He proposed a single House composed of two members from each of the 21 congressional districts, elected for four-year terms at salaries of \$5,000 a year. They would give all their time to the office and be subject to recall.

The legislature would stay in session until its work was completed, could recess without affecting the status of pending legislation and could meet without the call of the governor should more than 50 per cent of the members desire.

He estimated that \$5,000 annual salaries paid the 42 members of a unicameral legislature would save the state more than \$800,000 every two years on legislative expense.

Rep. A. M. Aikin, Jr. of Paris, also favoring the one-House sys-

tem said, "we are sick and tired of this log-rolling and filibustering and want a system whereby responsibility will be definitely fixed."

Influential members, however, opposed a unicameral body, stressing the importance of two Houses in preventing hasty legislation.

"The check of two Houses is needed," said Rep. Homer Leonard of McAllen, chairman of the House appropriations committee. "There are mistakes enough and there would be more if there was only one House."

Senator T. J. Holbrook of Galveston opposed the one-chamber plan for similar reasons, but thought the ration of House membership to the Senate should be reduced from the present five to one to about three to one. He said fewer members in the lower House would expedite work and give adequate representation.

"The trouble is that enough work isn't done when a session is underway," said Rep. Walter E. Jones of Jourdan, chairman of the House revenue and taxation committee. "and the fault lies not so much with the members as with the system."

He recommended a two-thirds vote requirement of over-riding committee recommendations on printing and criticized courtesy voting.

"There should be restrictions on amendments with a deadline for filling them and printing in the Journal so members can read and understand them," he said. "This would result in a 75 per cent reduction in the number and make
