He had an excellent Vocational Agriculture teacher. His father, grandfather and great-grandfather were farmers. They had lived well. So it was not difficult for Bobby to make up his mind to create a job for himself by going into farming. In his own words, "I decided to farm, sink or swim."

expanded from year to year. Bobby now owns 643 acres, including part of the original Latham Homestead. In addition to the 643 acres owned, he leases 1160 acres, making a total of 1803 acres. He has 1200 acres in cropland and 600 acres of rangeland.

Mr. Latham's crop operations consist of cotton, grain sorghum, small grain and some grazing crops. He runs on the average about 100 mother cows.

He is a firm believer in soil, water, and natural resources conservation. He has influenced many of his neighbors to become conservation farmers and District cooperators, including his father-in-law.

Mr. Latham has 572 acres of land he owns under agreement with the Hamilton - Coryell Soil and Water Conservation District. The planned structural practices have been completed. These practices consist of re-terracing with parallel terraces all farmland and completing waterways and parallel terraces where no terraces existed. He has made the statement, "I cannot farm land economically that is not terraced". He has encouraged

Voting Rules For New Residents Outlined

County Clerk Rebel J. Henson has reminded new residents of Coryell County that they must vote in the county clerk's office by Tuesday, April 30, if they wish to participate in the Democratic primary to be held on May 4.

Any person who has lived in the county less than six months (who became a resident after November 3, 1967) must vote in the clerk's office during the period of April 15-April 30. He must be a registered voter either in this county or in the county of his former residence and must have lived in the state for a year. He will be required to present his registration certificate or to make an affidavit of its loss when he applies for a ballot.

A voter with less than six months residence in the county will be able to vote on all statewide offices and on the referendum propositions on the primary ballot, and will also be able to vote on district offices for districts in which he has six months' residence preceding the election, but he will not be permitted to vote in local races.

Absentee votes are still being accepted. Persons wishing to vote absentee can do so at the County Clerk's office through 12:00 noon, Saturday, April 27.

Luke 6:6 thru 10

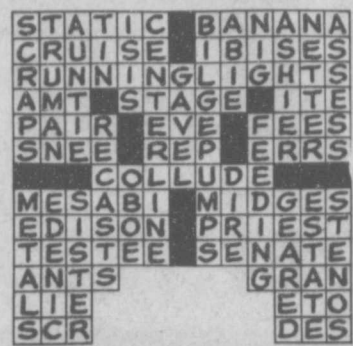

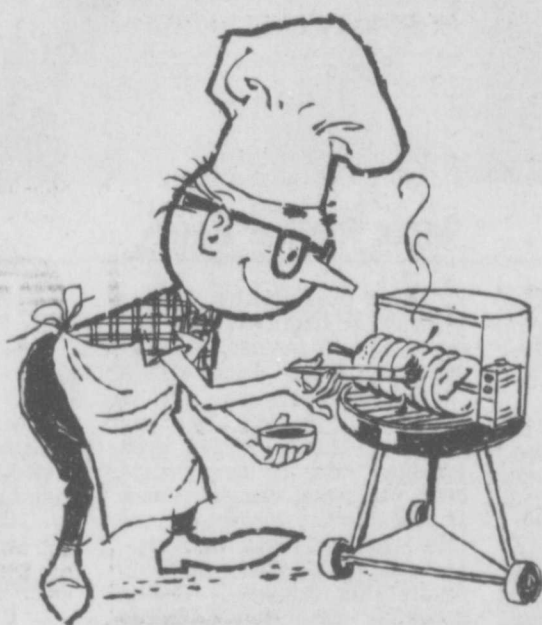

Highlights and Sidelights

Vern Sanford

Sen. Ralph Yarborough has taken himself out of contention with Governor John Connally for Texas Democratic favorite son designation. But he has drawn battle lines for party conventions.

Liberals, if they follow Yarborough's lead, will oppose the favorite son device, demand selection of an uncommitted state delegation to the Democratic national convention and oppose the traditional "unit rule." Conservative - moderate forces, rallying behind the governor, will offer resolutions backing Connally for favorite son and head of the 104-vote Texas national convention. In all probability, they too, would require all of the state's 104 votes to be cast as a package, without consideration to preferences of a minority viewpoint among the delegates.

That, in a nutshell, is the main issue to be decided in some 5,260 Democratic voting precincts May 4. In selected precincts, supporters of Sens. Robert F. Kennedy and Eugene McCarthy are expected to push resolutions seeking to commit delegates to their presidential candidacies. Neither of the senators at this point appears to have any substantial support over the state.

Some of the nation's Democratic governors at a St. Louis, Mo., conference last week gave Connally a boost by urging him to become a serious contender -- a sort of favorite son

among the governors -- for vice-president. Connally said he has no aspirations for the job, and does not expect it to be offered. Nevertheless, he is expected to play a major role in charting the course of the 24 Democratic state chief executives at the nominating convention.

Meanwhile, although they are traveling widely and speaking frequently, the 13 candidates for governor of Texas continued to find themselves overshadowed by world, national and partisan events. And the election is only a little more than a week away!

Total voter registration this year is a record 4,072,397 -- nearly a million more than the last presidential year (1964) but still shy of predictions. Figure compares with 3,014,597 in 1964 and 2,970,966 in 1966.

Five biggest counties of the state alone account for nearly 1,633,000 of the total eligible voters and if all major metropolitan areas are counted, city voters overwhelm the rural area residents. That statistical fact figures strongly in campaign plans of gubernatorial candidates who are busily scouting the big cities during the windup weeks of their vote drives.

Last county to report to Secretary of State Roy R. Barera on registration was Har-

ris (Houston) with 583,721 voters. Dallas County has 466,925, Bexar (San Antonio) 237,359, Tarrant (Ft. Worth) 242,693 and Travis (Austin) 102,264.

Railroad Commission ordered a second consecutive reduction in statewide oil production allowable, pegging it at 45.7 per cent of potential for May. This will allow maximum production of 3,476,972 barrels daily next month.

Factor now in effect is 47.6 per cent and permits average calendar day allowable of 3,531,736 barrels.

Major producers submitted nominations for 3,071,269 barrels of Texas crude oil a day for May, a decrease of 60,099 from April. Bureau of Mines' forecast of demand remained unchanged at 3,040,000.

Production allowable a year ago, May 1967, was only 33.8 per cent, or 3,022,309 barrels a day.

Texas draft quota for May is 2,131, compared with 2,378 for April, reports Selective Service Director Col. Morris S. Schwartz.

However, local draft boards actually will forward more men to the armed forces examining and entrance stations for pre-induction physical and mental exams. May call in this category is 9,000 compared with 8,500 for April and 7,200 in March.

Schwartz also announced that the state must provide 42 medical doctors and two doctors of osteopathy for the Army during July - September.

A plan for tapping the great icecap water wealth of the northwest to satisfy needs of Texas and 16 other southwestern and western states will be presented to the Texas Wa-

ter Development Board at a

hearing here Friday, April 26. Lewis G. Smith of Denver, a retired U.S. Bureau of Reclamation engineer, proposes to bring in water from Columbia, British Columbia and Yukon via the Rocky Mountain Trench to High Plains and Pecos River for diversion to West Texas and the valley area.

Smith estimates the potential yield of icecap sources of British Columbia and Yukon are roughly 650,000,000 acre - feet a year, and 38,000,000 acre - feet would meet import needs of 17 states until 2070. Smith projects re-use of water four times before it finds its way to the sea and general curtailment of per capita consumptive use from 2.16 acre feet to .5 foot after 2200.

Costs of the enormous project would be paid by cities using the water made available.

State Supreme Court rejected a breach of contract damage suit against Houston Boxing Club and K.S. (Bud) Adams brought by P.L. (Pinkie) George a Houston boxing matchmaker.

High court ordered Amarillo district court to reconsider a law-suit brought against truck-driver D.F. Thompson by Donnie Thoreson for damages to 90 acres of wheat burned after the truck drove over a field.

In a Victoria case, Supreme Court upheld an injunction against Louis W. Chennault from going into competition with O-tis Engineering Corporation within 100 miles of that city.

Court of Criminal Appeals affirmed the conviction for sale of heroin against a Tarrant

County grade school teacher who was sentenced to 19 years imprisonment. Life sentence assessed a Brownsville man for murder of his wife also was upheld.

Governor Connally named Louis R. Sarazan, Fort Worth businessman to State Board of Public Welfare. Sarazan succeeds Carl Flaxman of Dallas who resigned.

Drs. H.A. Barnett of Houston, Robert L. Daily of Wichita Falls, P.C. Funk of Dallas and Merle Wade Delmer of San Antonio were appointed by Connally to State Board of Medical Examiners. Dr. Howard R. Coats of Tyler was reappointed.

visitor statistics reported Texas Highway Department's new brochure on 15,100,000 out of state visitors who spent \$807,900,000 in Texas last year showed they stayed on an average of 5.9 days.

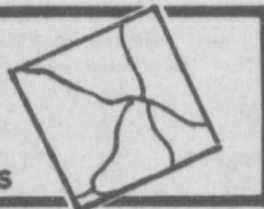

Federal Funds Threatened by War Cost

The great shortage of public money to be appropriated in this session of the Congress -- a shortage caused by the spiraling cost of the war in Vietnam -- threatens more than 200 of the federally affected school districts in Texas. Those are the districts now receiving impacted aid funds. These are known as impacted areas because when a military installation is built, after many new people move in, it has an adverse impact on the local tax base. There aren't enough dollars to run the schools properly for all the new children since they move so often. Most military families do not pay regular local taxes, so the federal government pays the local districts to educate the children of these families.

Without impacted aid, all of us would have to pay higher school taxes, or these children of our military personnel would receive inadequate education. Neither of these alternatives is acceptable. This impacted aid plan was created 18 years ago by Congress and it has worked well. It has been especially important in Texas where we have massive military installations like Fort Hood in Bell County; Fort Sam Houston, Kelly Air Force Base, Lackland Air Field and Randolph Air Force Base in Bexar County; Fort Bliss in El Paso; and many others across the state.

Eighteen years ago, the Congress pledged its continuing support to these school districts. This year, for the first time, our commitment was not upheld. The commitment of \$486 million was cut back by \$91 million to \$395 million -- a reduction of 18.8 per cent.

The Senate last month passed an emergency appropriation bill with an amendment which I co-sponsored to restore this \$91 million for our impacted schools. But when the bill got to a conference with the House, the House conferees cut that \$91 million back to \$20 million. On April 10, I spoke against this compromise on the Senate floor, and the Senate upheld my position by rejecting the conference report.

A new conference committee was appointed. I am fighting to restore the full \$91 million for our impacted area schools because this means \$4 million for Texas alone. The Texas school superintendents had no warning that these funds would be cut, so they planned their budgets expecting that the state would receive what the federal government had promised them.

If these cuts stand, it means that \$4 million would have to be raised from other sources. I have received scores of telegrams from Texas school officials pleading for a fight to keep these funds. School superintendents from all across the state have called on us for aid. I intend to continue fighting to get the full appropriation for these local school districts throughout Texas and the nation to help educate children of our military personnel.

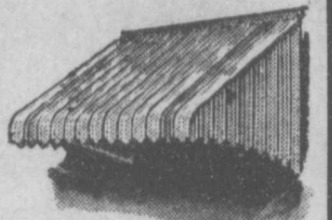

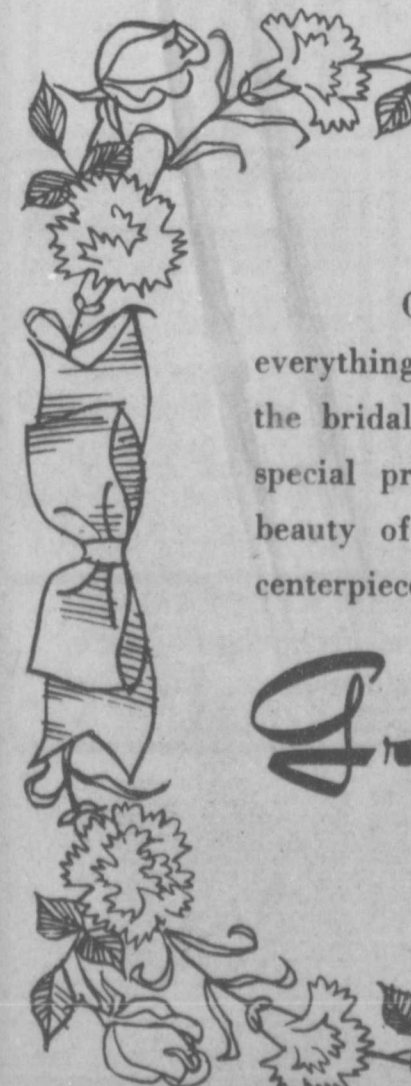

TEXAS LIVESTOCK SANITARY COMMISSION FIGHTS LIVESTOCK DISEASE

Texans are justly proud of the state's varied geographical features and, among other things, her fine seaports and international air terminals. But these same sources of pride also are areas of concern because they pose a threat to a major Texas industry.

Heavy international traffic at harbors and air terminals, coupled with activity along 889 miles of common boundary with Mexico, means that Texas is

at all times vulnerable to the introduction of exotic livestock diseases.

Standing guard to protect against losses from these hazards is the Texas Animal Health Commission, a state agency created in 1893. Known then as the Texas Livestock Sanitary Commission, its initial responsibility was the eradication of fever ticks, a job successfully accomplished.

Today, under the leadership of Dr. James B. Henderson, executive director, the Commission is responsible for control . . . and hopefully eventual eradication . . . of all infectious diseases of livestock and for protection of the industry against introduction of diseases from other areas.

The executive director is appointed by the Commission whose six members represent the swine, sheep and goat, beef, dairy and poultry industries and veterinary medicine. The state is divided into nine areas, each with a resident veterinarian who coordinates Commission activities, including work of test crews and other technicians. Many field activities are carried on in close cooperation with the Animal Health Division of the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Success of the current screw-worm eradication program is due in no small part to the support the Commission gave this cooperative effort of state and federal agencies, private organizations and individuals.

Of much concern at present is the status of several Texas counties in relation to brucellosis, a dangerous disease of both men and animal. The number of counties listed as Modified-Certified Brumond, Midland,

cellosis Free now stands at 160.

Work in other 76 counties is progressing as rapidly as availability of state and federal funds permits, but there is genuine concern for the 18 counties that have not requested help.

Proposed federal legislation has serious implications for them. For one thing, it would mean that their animals could be sold only for slaughter, thus seriously restricting operations of operators who produce breeding and replacement stock.

Counties may enter the brucellosis program only when at least 75 per cent of the producers owning at least 51 percent off the cattle request it.

Another important activity of the Commission is the inspection service maintained at marketing centers which prevents spread of disease by stopping movement of infected animals. A different inspection service is offered on farms and ranches to detect reservoirs of disease or parasites and prevent unknown exposure through purchase of replacement stock.

With rapidly increasing interest in pork production in Texas, the Commission anticipates an accelerated effort to eliminate hog cholera, a major disease of swine. Other changes in emphasis will come as dictated by needs.

Constant application of basic principles in animal disease control will result in eventual eradication of dangerous diseases, Commission officials believe. Only through eradication, they say, can the state's billion dollars livestock industry obtain the degree of protection it deserves.
