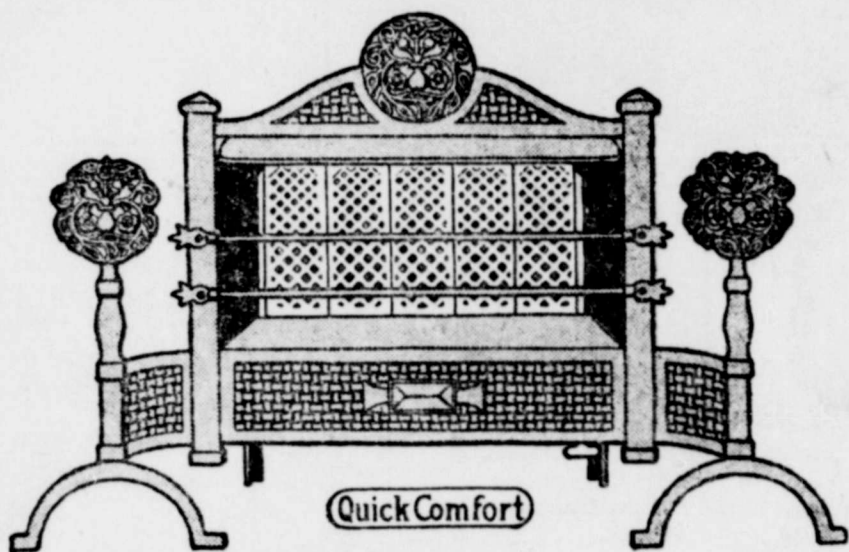

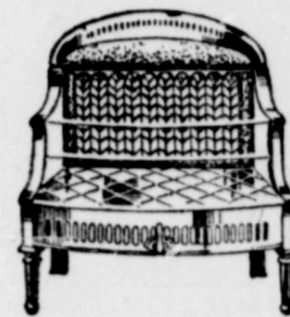

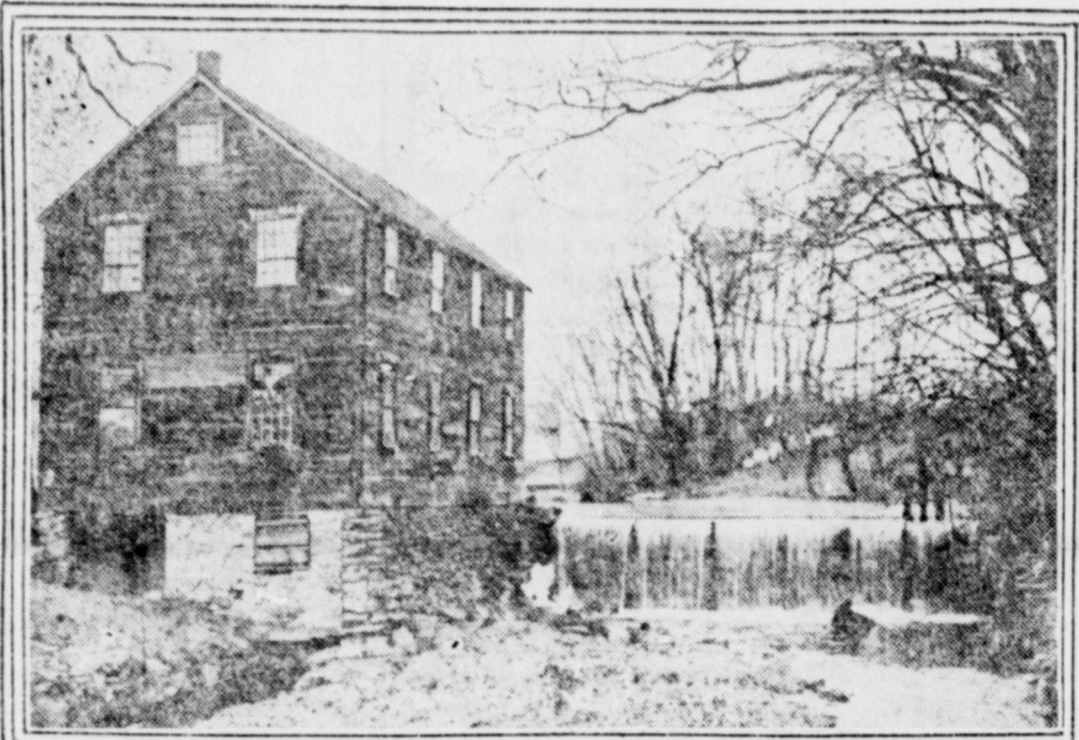

Some "Vanishing Americans"

VANISHING Americans! If you were asked to make a list of them, what would you include in it? The Indian would no doubt head your list, for the red man's name has become inseparably connected with that phrase, no matter how much the Indian bureau at Washington may issue official statements to the effect that the American Indian is not only not decreasing in numbers but increasing. Then you'd probably include the buffalo, the heath hen, the prairie hen, the pronghorn antelope, the elk and the grizzly bear, all of whom are periodically reported as "threatened with extinction" and as periodically reported as "saved" until it is difficult to know just what their status is.

But there is another group of "Vanishing Americans" whose fate seems to be more definitely sealed by the forward march of modern progress than any of the above, for being inanimate things, they cannot be provided by nature lovers with sanctuaries wherein they can propagate their kind. Belonging as they do to conditions in our national history that are gone forever, they are vanishing from the American scene and while a few specimens may be found in various places, you will search in vain for them in most localities that were their natural habitat.

Just as in the case of the first list of "Vanishing Americans," an Indian leads the list in this second list. He is the cigar store Indian, the sign, symbol and guardian angel of the cigar store. It is easy to understand why this is so, for tobacco originated in America and it was only natural that the aboriginal American, the Indian, should be adopted as an appropriate symbol and images of him put in front of places where tobacco was sold. But the origin of this "tribe" of Indians is wrapped in almost as much obscurity as in the much-discussed origin of the American Indian himself.

One theory as to how he came into being, as given in an article in the New York Times, is as follows:

The wooden Indian was first introduced to his job as guardian angel of cigar stores by a man named Chickester, about 1850. The sculptor of these earliest specimens was Tom Millard. In the first days of the faded some of the more aristocratic chiefs were made of metal cast in molds. This type, however, was soon abandoned; even from the first most of the figures were of wood. These were all made by hand, generally of white pine, and considerable skill was required in their shaping. Logs were first blocked out with an ax for the body, after which the arms were attached and the features marked out with a chisel. Finer carving tools gave the finishing touches. They were then painted and mounted on wheels for delivery.

The original sculptors were carvers of ships' figure heads. With the decay of American shipping, carvers here, finding their occupation slipping away from them, made the wooden Indian more than a part-time job. They turned to him as their mainstay.

A year or so ago press dispatches carried the following item of news:

Toronto, Ont.—There died a few days ago in Ste. Anne de Beaupre, Quebec, at the age of eighty-six, Louis Jobin, the originator of the cigar-store Indian.

Louis Jobin's family name does not rest exclusively on his bizarre production. He was described as the greatest wood carver in the world. He carved wood for seventy years, though of late his sight had failed and he had laid away his chisel. While cigar-store Indians are becoming extinct, those created by Jobin in his early days in the industry are in keen demand by collectors. One of the masterpieces of St. Nicoline stands today at the front door of a tobacconist's shop on the rue St. Jean, in Quebec city, where it was placed fifty years ago. The owner has refused \$500 for it. Jobin was a humble artist, who never talked of art for art's sake, but did whatever his hand found to do.

What was in demand sixty and seventy years ago was figureheads for ships.

Canada was a center of the wooden shipbuilding industry. So the young Jobin, although he went for a brief period to New York, found more ample scope for his talents at home.

"Forty years I carved for ships," he went on.

"Then the steamers came in and iron had no use for wood. I had long carved Indians. I also carved the figure of a notary for a notary's door in Montreal. But for years I have done mostly angels and apostles and saints."

Jobin's art will not altogether die with him. He leaves behind him a nephew, Edouard Marcotte, trained in his craft, and St. Anne, though the great master of wood carving is no more, will not be deprived of sacred iconography.

But whatever the origin of the cigar store Indian, the fact remains that he is a "Vanishing American," as proved by the fact that examples of this form of American "art" are now classed as "antiques" and as such are much in demand by collectors. Three years ago the Cleveland Plaza Dealer conducted a "wooden Indian contest," which brought to light a number of these interesting relics and only recently one of them, "Seneca John," alias "The Tiffin Tecumseh," achieved a lasting place in the annals of American antiquities when he was sold by Albinus Elebert, a farmer living near New Riegel, Ohio, for \$100 to Henry Ford, who has given the red-skin a permanent home in his museum of American antiques at Dearborn, Mich. Mr. Ford had had a "squaw" for some time, but desiring a mate for her, he instituted a search for one which resulted in his acquiring "Seneca John."

As a matter of fact it would seem that Mr. Ford got a bargain when he paid only \$100 for "Seneca John," for M. L. Blumenthal, writing in the Saturday Evening Post, reported finding "a much-battered wooden Indian of the sort without which no cigar store was considered anfalt or even de rigneur twenty-five years ago" in a junk shop and the dealer asked \$350 for it, declaring that the price was "not out of the way at all. It's a male Indian—squaws are cheaper—and it's a good example of early American carving." But his statement that squaws are cheaper is not borne out by the following item which appeared recently in the Paris (Mo.) Mercury:

It is not generally known, but cigar Indians, formerly the outdoor sign of cigar stores, have become valuable antiques, and good specimens bring as high as \$500. A firm of dealers has been negotiating with the Paris Cigar company for the very plump and handsome squaw that has graced Main street, Paris, now for more than forty years, but Frank Jones, owner and manager, is a man of sentiment, and has, it is said, turned down an offer of \$200 for her. "You see," he said, "she's been here so long and never knocked about either the conversation or the weather, never so much as taken a trip, or changed the cut of her clothes, that it would be cruel to uproot her and sell her either down the river or up. I have known her since a small boy, and am downright attached to her. Some things mean more than money. My squaw is not for sale. She knows too much about Paris, past and present, to risk out of sight, and in addition I know of no other man who can boast of that rarest of all earthly blessings, a wooden squaw who cannot talk. You have no idea how satisfactory she is at times."

And as an indication of how "bullish" the cigar store Indian market has become within the last few years, consider the case of "Chief," the Indian pictured above, who stands in front of a cigar store in Colorado Springs, Colo. Frank and Clinton Osborn, proprietors of the store, report that they have received offers ranging from \$500

to \$1,000 for this 600-pound metal warrior whom they obtained at an auction sale of unclaimed goods in a storage house in that city fifteen years ago. But they have steadily refused to part with him.

Just as this symbol of the cigar store is another "Vanishing American," so is the symbol of another business—the figure of a horse which used to stand in front of stores where harness was for sale. Mostly they were life-size figures, made of papier-mache or some similar substance, and on their sleek dapple-gray bodies the harness maker could display to best advantage the shining beauty of black leather and brass mountings of his new harness. Occasionally you would see one of the sort pictured above—a stuffed horse, although these are the rarest of all. This particular one is historic. It was originally owned by the United States Post-Office department for demonstrating the rural free delivery service when a horse and buggy carried rural mail. It was exhibited at the world's fair at St. Louis in 1904, then auctioned off and bought by the Washington harness merchant who now has it standing before his shop.

The motor age is partly responsible for the disappearance of the harness store horse, just as it is for the disappearance of another familiar part of the American scene. What has become of the iron hitching posts which used to stand along every village and city street? They're all gone, or at least they're going fast—these iron uprights surmounted by the figure of a horse's head with a ring in his mouth in which you tied old Dobbin's halter rope or "blitch rein." Or it might have been the figure of a little colored boy holding a ring in his hand for that purpose, but whichever it was, it's gone, along with the long rows of "hitchracks" which once lined Main street as well as the side streets in Homeburg or surrounded every country church and public meeting place.

Add, too, to the list of "Vanishing Americans" the old covered bridge. Of course, there still are plenty of them left in various parts of the country, but how much longer will the 75 to 100-year-old weather-beaten sides of these structures resist the ravages of time or the demand of motorists for concrete bridges over the streams? Essentially a New England product (the earliest known example was one built over the Connecticut at Windsor, Vt., in 1796), covered bridges were built in greater numbers in that part of the country than in any other. However, the New England floods last year took a heavy toll of the structures and many of them have been replaced with more modern types of bridges. This is also the case in other states, so with the steadily decreasing number in use the covered bridge can be listed among those "Americans" which are slowly but surely passing away. Another of the vanishing species is the old grist mill such as the one pictured above. This one, made of hewn logs, was erected before the Revolution and has been owned by one family since that day. Even without this distinction it would be noteworthy for it is one of the few survivors of an early American institution which played an important part in the building of this country.

So the list of relics of another day could be continued indefinitely—toll bridges, blacksmith shops, ferry boats of the old type, "one-horse shays," livery stables, old stone churns, brick ovens, rail fences, "whannots," attumans, village ponds, etc., etc. No doubt enough examples of each can still be found to be the "exceptions which prove the rule," but in general, it is safe to say that only a few more years will see most of them disappear utterly. For they are "Vanishing Americans."

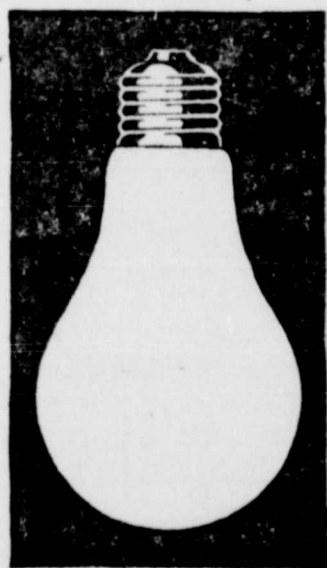

Declining to retract or modify any of her utterances, Mrs. Willibrand asserted she had asked the Methodists to oppose Smith on the ground of his views on prohibition and had made no mention of his religious beliefs. She said Smith himself was trying to "dodge behind his own church," and furthermore that the Democratic candidate was the one who had made prohibition an issue of the campaign. Congressman Walter Newton of Minnesota, chairman of the Republican speakers' bureau, stated that Mrs. Willibrand was speaking under the auspices of that bureau and that demands for her, from every part of the Middle West, were far more than she could fill.

Senator Borah of Idaho was the big gun of the Republican speaking battery during the week and his loudest explosion was in Kansas City, where in lively fashion he contrasted Smith's record and knowledge of the farm problem with that of Hoover, violently assailed the equalization fee, and blew up the charge that Hoover was responsible for the lowering of the price of wheat during the war. He also defended the Eighteenth amendment and paid his disrespects to Tammany.

WITHOUT having made much progress toward disarmament, the assembly of the League of Nations ended its full session. Almost its last act was to pass a resolution that the disarmament preparatory commission should meet again not later than January 1. No mention was made in it of any plan for a general disarmament conference, and Germany and Hungary refused to vote after Count von Bernstorff had made a bitter speech charging the league for its slowness and asserting that Germany was helpless and surrounded by heavily armed neighbors. At the final session the earl of Lytton, speaking for India, warned the league that while it was firmly established in Europe, its position in Asia was not assured. Costa Rica, which resigned from the league in 1925, gave notice that it would rejoin.

Probably 150 persons, including children, perished when the big Novedades theater in Madrid, Spain, burned. The fire started on the stage, and the tragedy closely resembled the burning of the Iroquois theater in Chicago years ago. The flames spread through the business district of the city, destroying many buildings.

Five villages in the state of Coahuila, Mexico, were swept away by floods and many lives were lost. The Chinese city of Hankow was the scene of a tremendous conflagration that destroyed thousands of buildings and an unknown number of lives. The old Spanish fort of Cabrerizas Bajos on a hill above Melilla, Morocco, was demolished by an explosion of the powder magazine and scores of lives were lost.

Senor Fortes Gil will be one of the few Presidents Mexico has ever had of exclusively civilian career, being devoid of any active military experience. Until selected by President Calles for his cabinet he had been governor of Tamaulipas, where he established partial prohibition, suppressed open gambling, and established the first state supported industrial school in Mexico for indigent children. He is known as a friend of

INLAND WATERWAYS CORPORATION, in an application filed with the Interstate commerce commission, proposes extension of the government barge lines services on the Mississippi and Warrior rivers to all parts of the country through the establishment of joint barge and rail rates and barge and rail through routes. The corporation's application first asks the commission to declare that the services of the barge lines are a public convenience and necessity for expansion of the services to the tributaries of the Mississippi, including the Illinois waterway. Virtually every railroad in the country is named in the part of the application asking the establishment of through routes and joint rates. Joint barge and rail rates 20 per cent lower than all-rail rates between specified points are sought by the corporation, that being the basis on which existing barge and rail rates are generally made.

WHEN Nicaraguans go to the polls on November 4 to elect a President every voter will be marked on the hand with a chemical stain as he casts his ballot in order to prevent repeating. To avoid misunderstandings the election board, headed by Gen. Frank L. McCoy, U. S. A., issued a statement explaining that the chemical was harmless and the stain will disappear within a day or two. An election official said malicious agents are spreading reports among the Indians that the Americans will use a chemical that will poison the voters. Other alleged threats to hinder the voting are rumors that the Americans eat children, and that the Sandinistas will attack the booths, or kill those registering or voting.

MME. GANNA WALSKA, opera singer and the wife of Harold F. McCormick of Chicago, is an American citizen, despite her residence in France, and will have to pay duty on jewelry and personal effects which are said to be valued at about \$2,500,000. This ruling was made by Philip Eiting, collector of the port of New York, who told Henry D. Bulkeley, attorney for Mademoiselle Walska, that her claim to foreign residence and consequent immunity from duty had been denied. Bulkeley immediately made plans to appeal and will, if necessary, carry the matter to the United States Customs court and the Court of Customs Appeal.

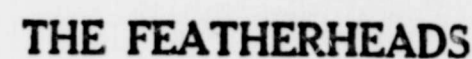

Holman of St. Paul. Arthur Goebel, flying his "Yankee Doodle" plane, won the nonstop race in 15 hours and 17 minutes.

CHINESE Nationalists in Shanghai unofficially announced that they had practically completed the reorganization of the system of government, eliminating the previous Soviet form, which was borrowed from Russia. Under the new scheme, General Chiang will head the Nationalist government council, his position being similar to that of President or premier.

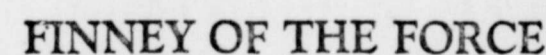

AFTER dining and dancing in flattery billowy tulle, and gorgeously bejeweled satins and velvets and like costumes of state, what a relief to turn from the formality of the festive raiment of the evening to the smartly simple sports clothes which gladden the daytime hour.

Not only are sports frocks eminently practical but when it comes to "style," well, the word is written all over this season's models, especially of Jersey, for Jersey is certainly outdoing any previous record in point of popularity.

When one thinks of Jersey nowadays one has to entirely reconstruct one's ideas from those of bygone days, for Jersey in the now and the then bears little semblance. The new Jersey is that light weight one does not mind wearing all the year round. Then, too, there is such a vast diversity in patterning, coloring and knitted stitch as interpreted by modern Jersey.

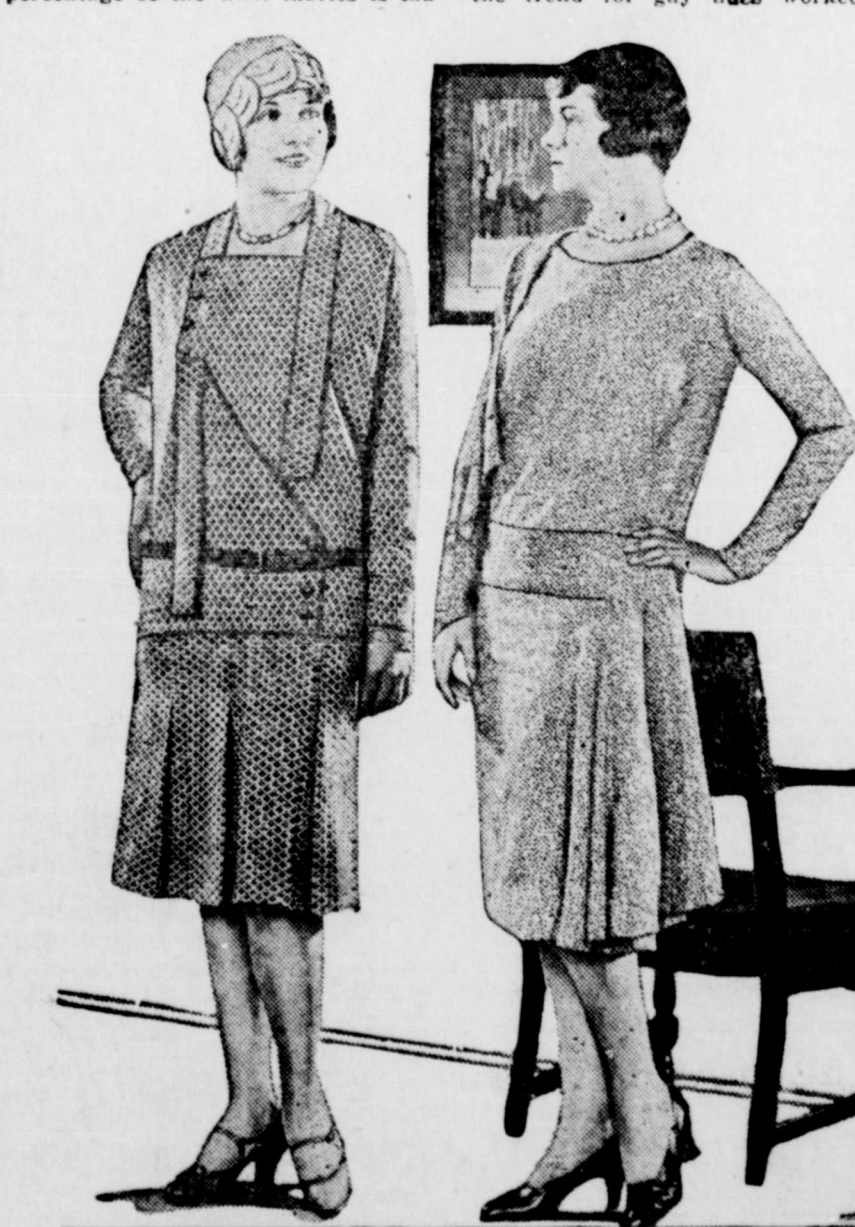
As was to be expected, the printed vogue has invaded the Jersey realm, which means new triumphs for Jersey in the autumn mode. One can buy the most fascinating Jersey fabrics this season at the counter, either printed or metal-interknitted, or that which looks like tweed and scores of other equally as intriguing types. Or one can find them made up in ensembles and suits and frocks in bewildering array.

It seems that designers consider that Jersey is presented at its best when it is made up in combination of print with plain or a dark color with a lighter shade of the same color. Each, by way of contrast, contrives to emphasize the charm of the other. Which accounts for the presence of scores of chic costumes which stress the compose of contrasting Jersey.

A typical Jersey costume for fall is here pictured. The skirt is of jungle green Jersey and it is plaited, which gives it a very interesting treatment. The pullover and cardigan of Jersey in a lighter green are trimmed with bands of the dark green. A three-cornered scarf of silk completes the costume.

In the realm of dress fabrics, lightweight wools are conspicuously in the foreground. Following the example set by sheer velvets, a large percentage of the wool fabrics is tak-

ing to prints. It makes it still more interesting that there is a sheerness, transparency and pretty fluttering suppleness about these smart new wools comparable to that of the daintiest silks, chiffons and other as equally esthetic weaves.

gether in effective blends and contrasts. The shoes are a one-strap model in taupe kid, which is a color somewhat the tone of natural blue fur. The felt hat matches the shoes in color. The hose are a shade lighter than the shoes. A vogue is developing for colored kid shoes either matching the dress or relating themselves in some way to the general effect.

There is, for instance, a sheer wool crepe called georgette which comes in all the modish colors of the season. This is given the same soft styling as one would give a delicate georgette

or silk crepe. That is, it is plaited shirred and draped with jabots featured in profusion.

For two-piece sports models the new kasha-like printed wools are quite the dernier cri, while the thinner challis and other sheer wools are being much exploited for the informal frock of the one-piece variety. There is a touch of romance in the thought that the present vogue for printed wools should have resulted in that old-time favorite, challis, coming into its own again.

In the picture two types of printed woolen informal daytime frocks are shown. Each is made of challis. The one to the right is a one-piece frock of challis printed in a floral design of soft colors on a cream ground. This frock has rather a wide belt effect, a scarf or jabot at the right side of the bodice, and fullness giving the effect of a drape at the left side of the skirt. A step-in pump of black glaze kid, collared and heeled with reptile, is worn with this costume. The kid pump, by the way, has become so great a favorite in shoe styles that it is taking unto itself many versions, chief among which is the step-in.

The challis of which the frock to the right is styled, is patterned in a geometrical design in red, white and blue softly toned to a pleasing degree. The pipings, belt and buttons are red. PUDDINGS GALORE

Those who like coffee flavor will enjoy the delicate aroma temptingly confined in:



Steamed Coffee Pudding.—Cream one-fourth cupful of butter, add one cupful of sugar, and one egg lightly beaten. Add four tablespoonfuls of finely ground coffee to one cupful of milk and scald ten minutes. Strain through a cheese-cloth, sift together two and one-fourth cupfuls of pastry flour, four teaspoonfuls of baking powder and one-half teaspoonful of salt. Add this alternately with the milk to the first mixture. Turn into a large buttered mold and steam for two hours. If steamed in smaller molds, steam one-half hour. Serve with the following sauce: Melt one-half cupful of butter, add one cupful of powdered sugar and one egg slightly beaten. Add one cupful of milk which has been scalded with three tablespoonfuls of coffee and scald. The milk and coffee may all be prepared at one time and the milk for the sauce reheated.

Emergency Pudding.—This is one of the old standbys which may be stirred up and steamed while the dinner is being eaten. Take one cupful of flour sifted with one teaspoonful of baking powder and a half teaspoonful of salt, add enough rich milk to make a drop batter. Butter cups and drop in a spoonful of the dough, then add two to three tablespoonfuls of canned cherries or any juicy fruit—the more juice the better. Top with more dough, leaving space to rise and put to cook in a pan of boiling water covered closely. If ordinary tea cups are used for molds, this recipe makes four large puddings. If smaller ones, care must be taken not to have the boiling water come up too high—set them on a trivet. Serve with cream and sugar. Cook fifteen minutes, then remove cover and serve.

Ginger Pudding.—Cream one-third of a cupful of butter with one-half cupful of sugar; add one egg well beaten. Mix and sift two and one-fourth cupfuls of flour with three and one-half teaspoonfuls of baking powder, one-fourth teaspoonful of salt, three teaspoonfuls of ginger. Add alternately with one cupful of milk to the first mixture, beat well. Turn into a buttered mold and steam two hours. Serve with a clear sauce to which two tablespoonfuls of chopped ginger has been added.

Common Foods.

An emergency shelf with a few cans of different foods, fish and fowl, will be found a most satisfactory possession in time of need.



Salmon Souffle.—Remove the skin and bones from a can of salmon, separate into flakes

and season with one teaspoonful of salt and two teaspoonfuls of lemon juice, with pepper and paprika to taste. Cook one-half cupful of bread crumbs with one-half cupful of milk five minutes. Add the salmon, the yolks of three eggs beaten thick and the whites folded in last. Turn into a buttered baking dish and set into a pan of hot water to bake. Serve with:

Spanish Sauce.—Melt three tablespoonfuls of butter, add three tablespoonfuls of flour, stir until well blended, then pour on gradually, stirring constantly, one cupful of milk and one-half cupful of cream. Bring to the boiling point and add one-half cupful of pimiento puree, one teaspoonful of salt and a few dashes of cayenne. To prepare the puree, put a can of pimientos through a sieve after draining them.

Veal Stew With Dumplings.—Frost veal cooked until tender and well seasoned makes the best of dishes, but veal from roast with dressing and some of the gravy may be used to make a most acceptable dish. Cover the meat and bones with cold water and simmer until boiling, then add:

Dumplings.—Take one cupful of flour one teaspoonful of baking powder, one-fourth of a teaspoonful of salt, and buttermilk to make a drop batter. Drop by teaspoonfuls into the boiling stew. Cover and cook eight minutes.

Potato Timbale.—Spread a pan thickly with butter, then cover with dry bread crumbs, brush beaten egg lightly over the surface, then dust with crumbs again. Fill the pan with hot mashed potato seasoned lightly with salt, pepper, butter, onion juice, cream and the yolks of two beaten eggs to each pint of potato. Bake thirty minutes in a hot oven. Invert on a hot platter and let stand ten minutes before removing the mold.

Muskmelon With Ice Cream.—Cut golden-meat muskmelons into halves then into points like a lily, removing the seeds. Serve with a ball of vanilla ice cream and dust with nuts or garnish with pieces of candied ginger to simulate seeds.
