## Martin's Our Man Let's Vote For Him Saturday

Elmer Martin doesn't have a glib tongue or a polished, sophisticated appearance. He doesn't have a slick political machine backing him nor a Madison Avenue type advertising firm helping him in his reelection campaign.

He's a plain-talking country boy running his re-election campaign on a shoe string budget. He's a frugal minded farmer. There are no frills, no extras on the election trail with Elmer. This is the same way he operated as a farmer, as county judge and in the legislature this past term—pay as you go, cut out the fat.

During a time when prices on everything are going up, when taxes are on the increase, it is reassuring to have someone like Elmer representing us in Austin, helping to hold down costs in running the massive state government.

And while he was holding down the costs, Elmer gave us service, fighting for the farmers, the electric co-ops, the average individual, to get bills passed and to exert influence in the right place to get governmental agencies, both state and federal, to do the right thing. He proved to be an extremely effective legislator, passing more bills than two-

thirds of the other members of the legislature.

During the constitutional convention, he has helped stop many anti-rural bills that big city legislators have tried to pass, and has had written into the partly finished new constitution provisions that will be of great benefit to Texans including a provision that land be taxed on the basis of its productivity.

Martin's hard work and honesty has impressed many a legislator as well as many residents of the 61st legislative district.

Honesty and hard work. Now there are two qualifications that are hard to beat. A glib tongue isn't important nor is a polished and sophisticated appearance.

Elmer is pure country. But isn't that what we want? District 61 is almost completely rural and who knows the needs of the rural areas better than someone who lives there.

Elmer's two opponents, Alton Stags and Mike Young, both live in Abilene, a metropolitan city. Both have family in rural areas and both lived in the country during their early childhood. But having lived there at one time and visiting there occasionally now just isn't the same as having lived and wor-

ked all your life in a rural area, with people who share your joys and sorrows.

Both of Elmer's opponents have said they will serve all of the district. They both seem to be good men, based on the time I have spent talking to them, and I like both of them, personally. They are sincere in what they say. But could they be just a little naive? How can a man living in Abilene depending on Abilene for a living represent the best interests of Colorado City, Loraine, Westbrook, Sweetwater, Rotan, Stamford, Hamlin and Anson? I just don't believe it is possible.

Elmer shares the same interests of a vast majority of residents of the district. Abilene has shown in the past that it wants to take everything away from every other city and county in this area. The metropolitan areas already have too much say so in the legislature.

Martin has done a good job for us. We know that he can do the job and that he will do the job. Let's all go to the polls Saturday and re-elect Elmer Martin. I believe he is honestly good for a second term.

# Bank Deposits Up

## Healthy Economy Indicated

Deposits at both City National Bank of Colorado City and First State Bank of Loraine are up over last year's figures, according to audits completed for the last call date, April 24.

City National's deposits were \$15,874,654.69, up over the same quarter's figures last year of \$13,867,811.18.

Loans at the Colorado City Bank were \$5,848,943.39, also an increase over the last year's figure of \$4,973,122.53.

First State's amounts were \$3,317,150.60 on deposit and \$867,602.36 in loans. Last year's figures at First State Bank were \$2,676,272.43 in deposits and \$880,350.62 in loans.

Although the increase in deposits at both banks is substantial, the call period and statement of condition comes later in the quarter than usual and is after the withdrawal of substantial amounts for income tax payments.

Call periods fall at the end of the first quarter of banking although on no set date, but usually fall somewhere around the end of March. April 24 is later than usual for the period of examination.

Each examining period has seen an increase in deposits for both banks in the past few years, due to good crops for farmers and good prices for livestock for ranchers.

# 2,000 Expected To Vote Saturday

## No Spring Turkeys

Game Warden Ronnie Aston reminds all Mitchell County residents that this county is not included in the area open for spring turkey hunting.

Aston pointed out that he had a number of persons to ask him about the spring turkey season and added that the nearest county to Mitchell included in the spring hunting is Callahan County in Possum Kingdom Regulatory District.

More than 2,000 persons are expected to turn out to vote in Saturday's Democratic Party primary in Mitchell County, Mitchell County Clerk Marie Basmah predicted Wednesday.

Her prediction was based on previous elections and the number of absentees which were cast by Tuesday which were the deadline for voting absentee. Absentee votes totalled 101 votes.

Voters in three Mitchell County precincts are faced with contested local races.

Perhaps one of the most hotly contested races is in Precinct 4 (Loraine) where seven men are running for county commissioner to succeed Moody Richardson who is retiring once his term is up Jan. 1. Candidates in Precinct 4 are Robert Bruce, Weldon McCollum, S. A. (Sid) Compton, Price Hall, Edgar Hallmark, Lynn Hamilton and Billy Preston.

Precinct 2, three men are running for county commissioner to succeed Drue Cawthron who also is retiring. The three candidates in Precinct 2 are Johnny Shackelford, T. A. Whitesides and James D. Rich.

In Precinct 1, M. O. (Odie) Wise is challenging incumbent Leonard Henderson for the office of justice of the peace.

Other races which have drawn considerable interest in Mitchell County include the race for State Representative of District 61 which includes Mitchell, Nolan, Fisher, Jones and part of Taylor Counties. Incumbent Elmer Martin of Colorado City is being challenged by two Abilene men, Mike Young and Alton Stags.

The incumbent state senator from this district, Jack Hightower of Vernon, is now seeking the office of U. S. representative for the panhandle area.

Polls will open at 8 a.m. and close at 7 p.m. Saturday. Complete results of the election will be in Sunday's Record. Here is a list of polling places in Mitchell County:

# Demo. Precinct Conventions Set For 1 p.m. Saturday

The Democratic Party's precinct conventions will be held at 1 p.m. Saturday in six different locations in the county, said Democratic chairman T. L. Rees, local attorney.

## May 6 Opening

Little League opening ceremonies will be held at Little League Park Monday, May 6 at 5 p.m. All Little League players for the coming year will be in their team uniforms.

The conventions are set for the six polling precincts in the county and are as follows:

--Precinct 1 at Mitchell County courthouse with G. D. Foster, chairman.

--Precinct 2 at Westbrock Rural High School, Gwan Strange, chairman.

--Precinct 3 in the City National Bank, Wright Hock, chairman.

--Precinct 4 at City Hall in Loraine, Ray Preston, chairman.

--Precinct 5 at Buford Co-Op Gin offices, Truman Bodine, chairman.

Baptist Church, Edde Gregory, chairman.

The principal item of business will be the election of delegates to the county Democratic Convention set for 1 p.m., May 11 in the district courtroom of the courthouse, Rees explained.

A total of 68 delegates will meet in the courthouse for the Democratic convention. The following numbers of delegates will be elected this Saturday from each precinct: 24 from Precinct #1; 7 for Precinct #2; 21 from Precinct #3; 12 for Precinct #4; two for Precinct #5 and two for Precinct #7.

The Republican Party will not have an election in Mitchell County this year nor hold a convention, said Bob Reilly, Republican Party Chairman.

The number of delegates elected from each voting precinct is based upon the numbers of voters voting in the Democratic Primary election.

# Almost \$40,000 To Industrial Fund

The Colorado City Industrial Team Fund Drive has now reached almost the \$40,000 mark in less than two months that the drive has been underway.

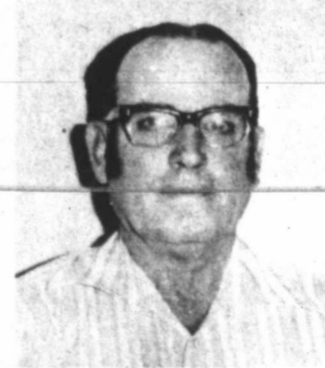



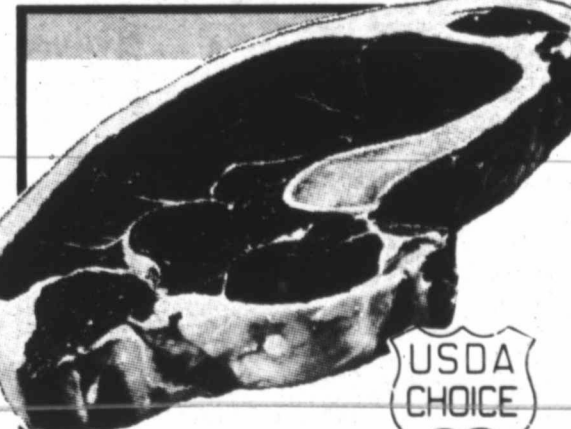

After cleaning up and washing the dishes the tired campers returned to town.

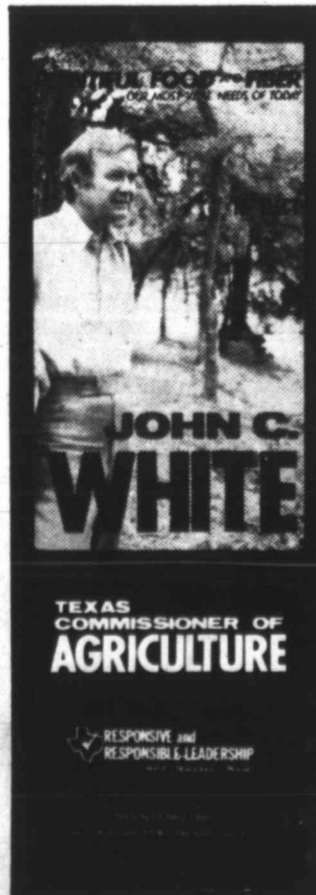

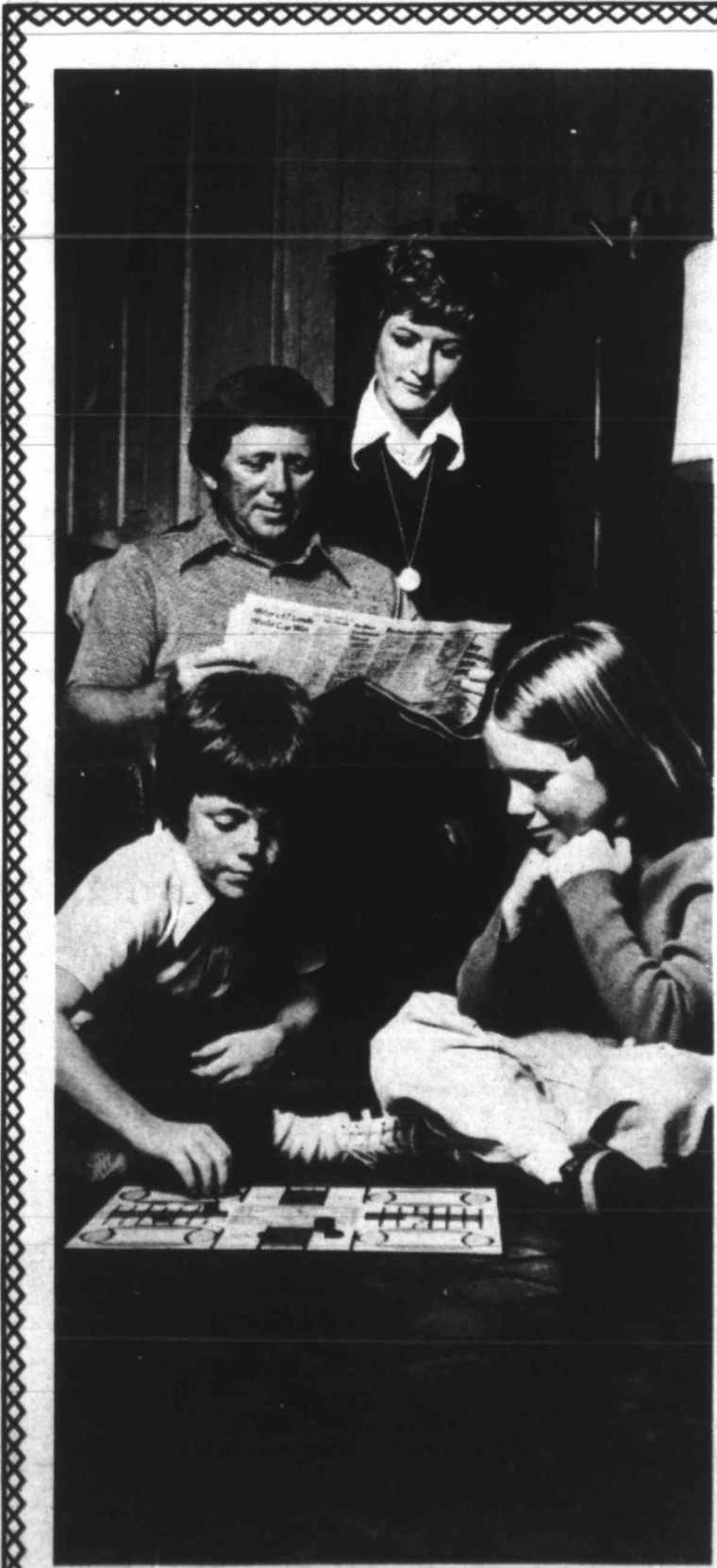

The local Kiwanis also have donated \$300 to be used for transportation for the new Woodland School which has been started through the efforts of the Northside Church of Christ and First Baptist Church as well as other organizations.  
The state provides funds for the teacher and facilities and transportation is being financed through local contributions.  
Guest speaker for the meeting was Charles Finnell, state representative from Holliday and candidate for the state senate for the 30th district which includes Mitchell County.  
Finnell told the Club about the new constitution being formulated by the legislature and said he is concerned that legislators from metropolitan areas are putting in too many liberal items that will subordinate the interests of rural areas to urban areas.  
Finnell said that the more he looks at the new constitution as it is being written, the better the existing constitution looks.  
Items now in the old constitution he said he would like to see retained include the bill of rights, the right to work law, highway taxes for use in building highways and not mass transit for urban areas, the separate court system for civil and criminal cases, the election rather than the appointment of judges.  
In response to a question, Finnell said he would like to see an intermediate court formed to take care of and prevent the backlog of cases on appeal, which is a source of frustration to many a prosecutor and defense attorney alike.
