

Registration Set At Olton Schools

Registration schedules for the coming school year have been released by Supt. Ray Schultz.

All students will register Aug. 26 and 27. High school seniors will register at 9 a.m. Aug. 26, with juniors scheduled to start at 1:30 p.m. the same day.

Sophomores and freshmen register the next day, with sophomores scheduled to begin at 9 a.m. and freshmen at 1:30 p.m.

Students at Olton Junior, High, H. P. Webb Elementary and Bohner School will register between 9 a.m. and 3 p.m. on the same two days.

New high school students are asked to come by the principal's office before Aug. 26 with their transcripts.

New junior high students are asked to have one parent accompany them.

First grade students will attend classes on both Aug. 26 and 27 from 9-11 a.m. These students will be required to have a birth certificate and evidence of a smallpox vaccination.

All buses will run and lunch will be served for the first time on Aug. 30, the first day of regular classes. School will be dismissed at 3:50 p.m.

Trustees Name Coach, OK \$668,879 Budget

Bryan Gets Post At AA Grapevine

The surprise resignation of head coach and athletic director Walter (Jo-Jo) Bryan last Friday night was followed quickly this week with the employment of his successor—Otis Holliday, a 17-year veteran of the profession.

Olton school trustees put their stamp of approval on Supt. Ray Schultz' choice for the post at a special board meeting Tuesday night.

And, almost routinely, the board flashed the green light on a \$668,870 school budget for 1965-66 at a public hearing which, as usual, attracted no one other than the board, administration and a representative of the Enterprise.

Holliday, who coached at Pampa the past three years, was given a two-year contract as head coach at an annual salary of approximately \$8,700.

In other activity at the meeting, the board employed Mrs. Otis Holliday, wife of the new coach, to teach social studies, and Mrs. Maretha Baumgardner, Halfway, to teach third grade.

Trustees accepted the resignation of Coach Bryan and his wife, Shirley, who taught third grade.

They also awarded the 1965-66 school milk contract to the Borden Co., Lubbock, the same firm which furnished milk here last year. Borden was one of two low bidders at five cents per half-pint of homogenized or chocolate milk, the other being Kelly of Elk City, Okla. Other bids were from Plains Creamery and Cloverlake, 5 1/2 cents each; Bell, 5.76 cents; and Foremost, 5.81 cents.

Bryan resigned to take a similar post at Class AA Grapevine near Fort Worth.

He told school officials of his plans Friday night, shortly after his return from coaching school.

With football's opening sessions only a few days away, Supt. Schultz began a whirlwind weekend which resulted in the job being filled almost as quickly as it opened.

He met with Holliday Saturday and by Tuesday, Holliday was back in the coaching field, after having resigned at Pampa with the full intention of entering the insurance business.

Through the years, Holliday compiled a fine coaching record, winning 60 per cent of his games despite three losing seasons at basketball-rich, football-poor Pampa.

He met with his best results at White Deer, where he won the Class A state championship in 1958, and at Gainesville, where his team advanced to the State Class AAA semi-finals in 1961 before losing to the eventual champion, Dumas.

At White Deer, the record for five seasons was 37-18-2, including a 14-0-1 season in 1958. At Gainesville, Holliday won 18 of 23 games in two years.

The past three years at Pampa, his teams were 4-6 in each campaign.

The \$668,870 budget approved by the board for the next school year is about \$57,000 higher than the budget of last year.

But almost all of the increase is in one category—teachers' salaries.

The pay increase approved by the state will account for about \$35,000 more expenditure in the Olton district, and the qualification by the district for three additional teachers will mean about \$15,000 more.

In all, about \$404,000 will go for teachers' salaries, accounting for the biggest single expenditure by the district.

A total of \$82,000 will go to retire bonded indebtedness and approximately \$43,500 will be spent on transportation.

Among other larger expenditures are \$11,000 for teaching supplies, \$18,000 for custodians' salaries, \$16,000 lights, telephone and water, \$8,000 for insurance, \$9,000 for replacement of equipment, and \$8,000 for capital outlay.

Total revenue for the year is expected to be about \$652,000, with \$255,000 coming from local taxes and about \$397,000 from the state.

Although expected revenue at \$652,000 is about \$17,000 lower than anticipated expenditures, it was pointed out that the school district will end this fiscal year on Aug. 31 with healthy balances in all funds.

The beauty pageant will begin promptly at 8:30 p.m. Friday at the Elks Lodge, and nominees will be formally crowned the individual introduction.

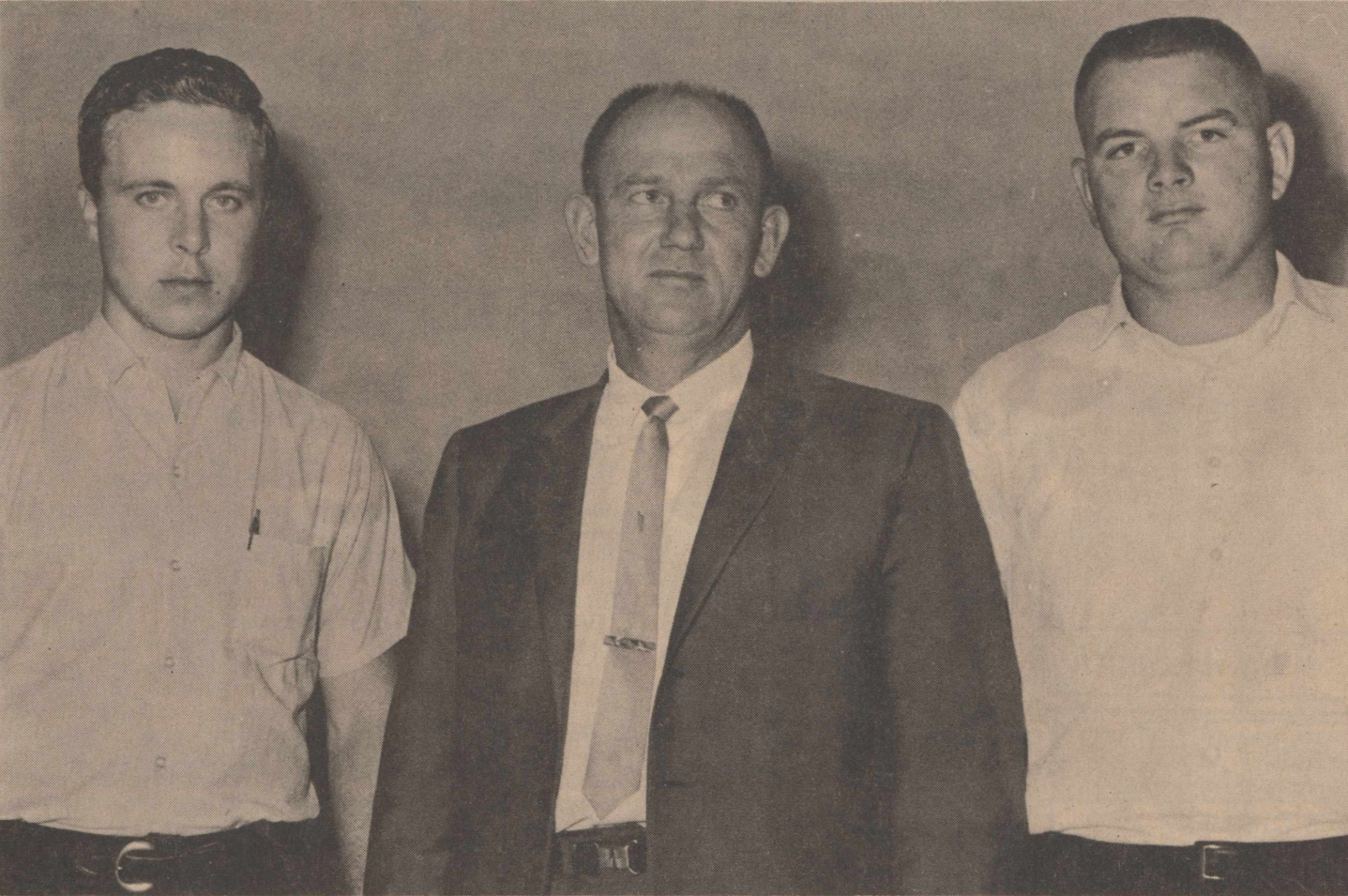
An informal party will follow the pageant in honor of the players, queen nominees and their parents.

Routine Business Approved At City Council Meeting

City council members raised the salary of a city water department employee, decided to take bids on a new pickup truck for the water department and voted to send city secretaries Billie Hall and Berniece Smith to a tax collectors and assessors seminar in Amarillo during a brief council meeting Tuesday night.

On a suggestion by water supt. W. F. Williamson, members of the council voted unanimously to raise the salary of Orlean Hacker from his present \$300 a month salary to \$325 per month.

The decision to accept bids on a new water truck was made after Williamson said only one of the three city pickup trucks was in running order.

Members decided to take bids on a 1965 model, 1/2 ton pickup, equipped with a standard transmission, heater, leatherette seatcover and six cylinder motor.

Mrs. Hall and Mrs. Smith will attend the Amarillo meeting Aug. 27. At the meeting, the pair will hear discussions and suggestions for improving tax assessment and collection.

New Grid Mentor To Go With Winged-T Offense

Olton football fans may see a different brand of football this season, as head coach Otis Holliday takes the Mustangs' reins for his first race around the track.

Holliday takes Coach Walter Bryan's place as top mentor in the Olton system, after the latter left to assume headcoaching duties at class AA Grapevine.

The new coach said he planned to use the "Warren Woodson" type of winged T offense, similar to a single wing. Although still unfamiliar with Olton offensive and defensive systems used previously, Holliday said he plans to use a balanced style of play, which some persons have termed a wide-open offensive attack.

Holliday played his own high school football at Winters, then was an end on the McMurry College football team.

His first coaching experience was at his old high school, where he was an assistant for three years. He then went to the head coaching position at Happy, where his team took the bi-district championship.

His next assignment was a five-year stay at White Deer. While coaching at the Panhandle school, he won a bi-district championship and in 1958 took the state championship, rolling up a fine 14-0-1 record.

Holliday then went to Colorado City for a year, before going to Gainesville, where his 1962 team went at far as semi-finals, before bowing to a powerful Dumas team.

He resigned after football season last year to enter the insurance business, after coaching at Pampa for three years.

His wife, Ruth will be another addition to the high school staff as a social studies teacher.

Mr. and Mrs. Holliday have four children, but not a potential football player among them, because all four are girls.

Leslie Ann, 13, will be in the eighth grade this fall; Glenda, 11, will be in the sixth; Royce Jan, 9, will be in the fourth, and the other daughter, Joe, has a few more years to wait before entering school, because she is two.

The Hollidays are Methodists and Mrs. Holliday's father is a former Methodist minister of Olton, the Rev. R.H. Campbell.

Coach Bryan leaves the Olton team after compiling a record of 31 wins and 21 losses. His first year he coached the Mustangs to bi-district and an 11-1 record.

The ponies finished second in the district in 1963 and third last year.

He and Mrs. Cottrell have four children, two sons and two daughters.

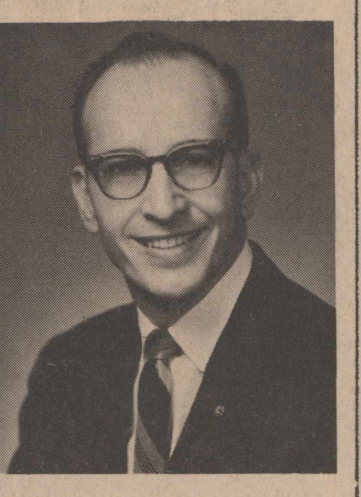

Lions Meet Coaches, Hear Spain

Olton's Lions Club met three new Olton football coaches and heard Dr. Jim Spain explain a new farming method at the regular noon luncheon Tuesday.

New head coach Otis Holliday, line coach Jacky Moss and junior high coach Tommy Lester were introduced to the group.

Dr. Spain, son of Mr. and Mrs. E. R. Spain, is visiting with relatives before traveling to Bogota, Colombia to teach more advanced farming methods.

Spain, a rolling cutting blade slits the sod, and seeds are dropped into the slit.

After the summer crop is harvested, the winter grass then comes out of its dormant stage, all without replanting or cultivation.

Dr. Spain said in experiments with corn as a summer crop, yields had been comparable or better than yields from crops tilled in the normal method.

Some experiments have been done in the area with cotton and soybeans, but he said results were not as impressive as with other crops.

Other advantages of the method according to Dr. Spain were that land normally allowed to face natural erosion, was covered with some form of protection.

This is even more vital in the area in which the experiments were carried out than in this part of the country, he explained because of generally greater slope to the land, and higher rainfall, generally in the neighborhood of 40 inches a year.

He said in some cases grasses which had died because of too heavy application of herbicide were not plowed up. Instead, seed was merely broadcast over the land and pressed into the soil with a roller, and the replanting method seemed to be as good as regular replanting.

The major drawback with the method in planting cotton and soybeans was the lack of an effective poison for perennial weeds, but Dr. Spain said this obstacle would probably be overcome in a few years.

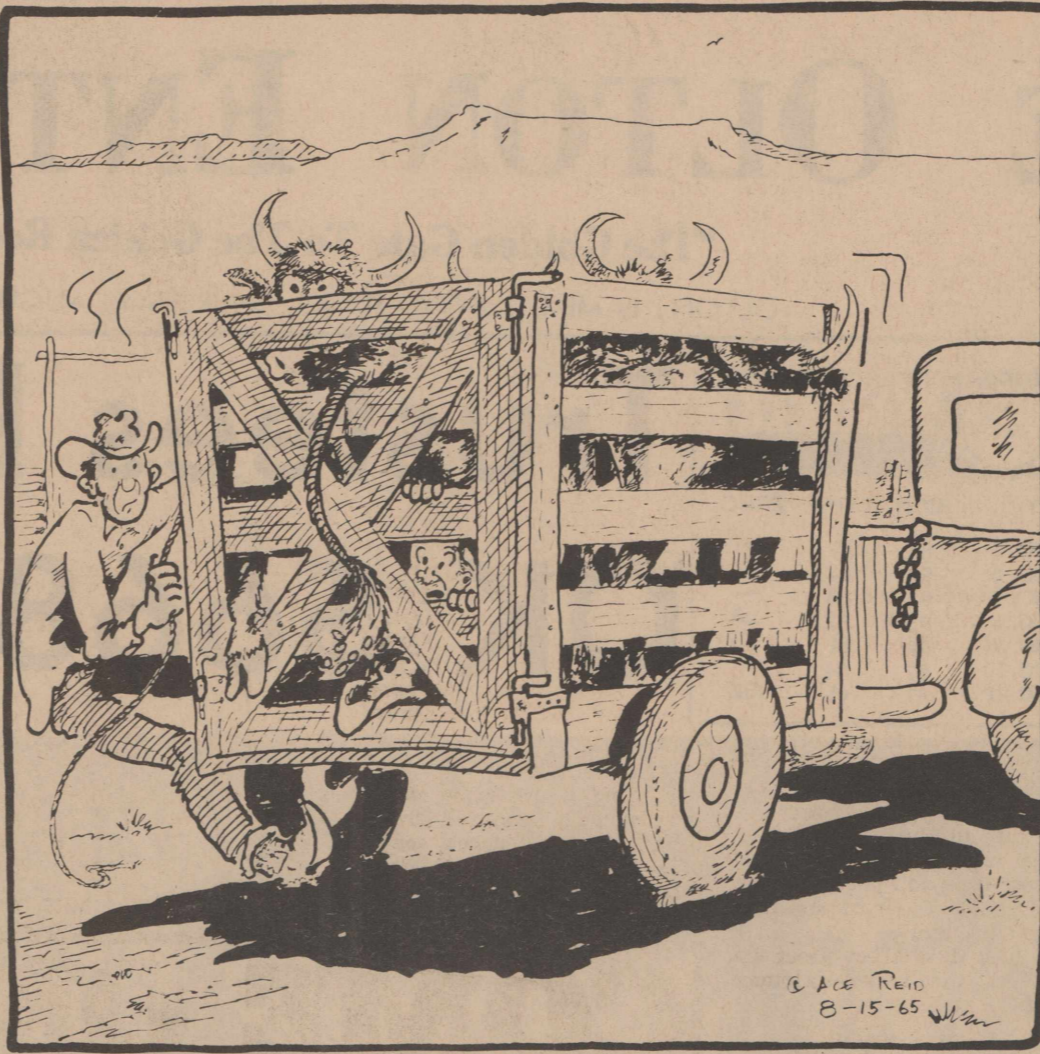

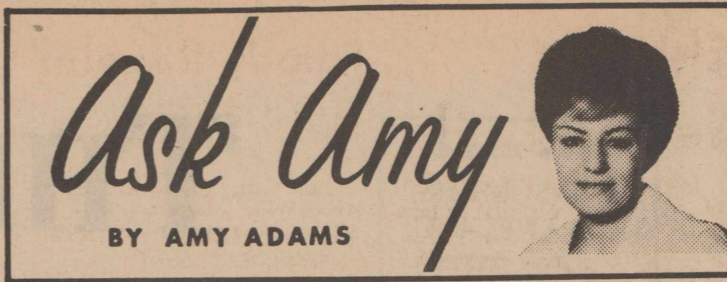
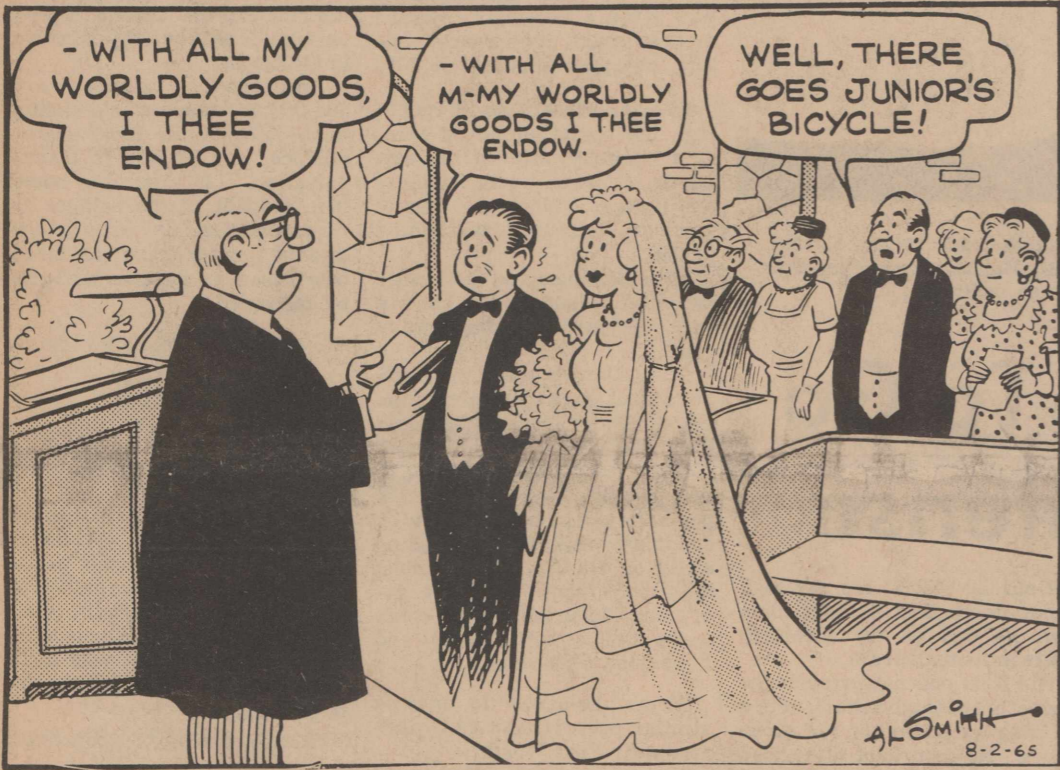

Drain berries, reserve syrup. Bring blueberry syrup and pineapple juice to boil, add jello, stir til dissolved. Cool. Add berries. Chill until partly congealed, whip cream and add with bananas to blueberry mixture. Pour into mold or molds. Refrigerate until ready to serve. Serves 20. Keeps several days in refrigerator. (I make in a sheet about 9 X 13 1/2 X 2 and serve on a lettuce leaf.)

UNCOOKED CHOW CHOW
20 large tomatoes
8 large onions
4 large green peppers (sweet)
4 large red peppers
5 lbs. cabbage
2/3 c. salt
Set 24 hours.
Mix all together:
1/3 gal. vinegar
1/2 lbs. sugar
2/3 c. mustard seed
4 T. celery seed
Four over the tomato mixture and set 24 hours again.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965. HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 5 proposing an Amendment to Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, be amended so as to authorize an increase in the total amount of bonds or obligations that may be issued by the Veterans' Land Board to Four Hundred Million Dollars (\$400,000,000); providing for the issuance of said bonds or obligations and the conditions relating thereto and the use of the Veterans' Land Fund; and providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, be amended so that the same will hereafter read as follows:

"Section 49-b. By virtue of prior Amendments to this Constitution, there has been created a governmental agency of the State of Texas performing governmental duties which has been designated the Veterans' Land Board. Said Board shall continue to function for the purposes specified in all of the prior Constitutional Amendments except as modified herein. Said Board shall be composed of the Commissioner of the General Land Board and two (2) citizens of the State of Texas, one (1) of whom shall be well versed in veterans' affairs and one (1) of whom shall be well versed in finances. One (1) such citizen member shall, with the advice and consent of the Senate, be appointed biennially by the Governor to serve for a term of four (4) years; but the members serving on said Board on the date of adoption hereof shall complete the terms to which they were appointed. In the event of the resignation or death of any such citizen member, the Governor shall appoint a replacement to serve for the unexpired portion of the term to which the deceased or resigning member had been appointed. The compensation for said citizen members shall be as is now or may hereafter be fixed by the Legislature; and each shall make bond in such amount as is now or may hereafter be prescribed by the Legislature.

"The Commissioner of the General Land Office shall act as Chairman of said Board and shall be the administrator of the Veterans' Land Program under such terms and restrictions as are now or may hereafter be provided by law. In the absence or illness of said Commissioner, the Chief Clerk of the General Land Office shall be the Acting Chairman of said Board with the same duties and powers that said Commissioner would have if present.

"The Veterans' Land Board may provide for, issue and sell not to exceed Four Hundred Million Dollars (\$400,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veterans' Land Fund, Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) of which have heretofore been issued and sold. Such bonds or obligations shall be sold for

not less than par value and accrued interest; shall be issued in such forms, denominations, and upon such terms as are now or may hereafter be provided by law; shall be issued and sold at such times, at such places, and in such installments as may be determined by said Board; and shall bear a rate or rates of interest as may be fixed by said Board but the weighted average annual interest rate, as that phrase is commonly and ordinarily used and understood in the municipal bond market, of all the bonds issued and sold in any installment of any bonds may not exceed four and one-half per cent (4½%). All bonds or obligations issued and sold hereunder shall, after execution by the Board, approval by the Attorney General of Texas, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchaser or purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas; and all bonds heretofore issued and sold by said Board are hereby in all respects validated and declared to be general obligations of the State of Texas. In order to prevent default in the payment of principal or interest on any such bonds, the Legislature shall appropriate a sufficient amount to pay the same.

"In the sale of any such bonds or obligations, a preferential right of purchase shall be given to the administrators of the various Teacher Retirement Funds, the Permanent University Funds, and the Permanent School Funds.

"Said Veterans' Land Fund shall consist of any lands heretofore or hereafter purchased by said Board, until the sale price therefor, together with any interest and penalties due, have been received by said Board (although nothing herein shall be construed to prevent said Board from accepting full payment for a portion of any tract); and of the moneys attributable to any bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board which moneys so attributable shall include but shall not be limited to the proceeds from the issuance and sale of such bonds; the moneys received from the sale or resale of any lands, or rights therein, purchased with other moneys attributable to such bonds; the interest and penalties received from the sale or resale of any lands, or rights therein, the bonuses, income, rents, royalties, and any other pecuniary benefit received by said Board from any such lands; sums received by way of indemnity or forfeiture for the failure of any bidder for the purchase of any such bonds to comply with his bid and accept and pay for such bonds or for the failure of any bidder for the purchase of any lands comprising a part of said Fund to comply with his bid and accept and pay for any such lands; and interest received from investments of any such moneys. The principal and interest on the bonds heretofore and hereafter issued by said Board shall be paid out of the

moneys of said Fund in conformance with the Constitutional provisions authorizing such bonds; but the moneys of said Fund which are not immediately committed to the payment of principal and interest on such bonds, the purchase of lands as herein provided, or the payment of expenses as herein provided may be invested in bonds or obligations of the United States until such funds are needed for such purposes.

"All moneys comprising a part of said Fund not expended for the purposes herein provided shall be a part of said Fund until there are sufficient moneys therein to retire fully all of the bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board, at which time all such moneys remaining in said Fund, except such portion thereof as may be necessary to retire all such bonds which portion shall be set aside and retained in said Fund for the purpose of retiring all such bonds, shall be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund to be appropriated to such purposes as may be prescribed by law. All moneys becoming a part of said Fund thereafter shall likewise be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund.

"When a Division of said Fund (each Division consisting of the moneys attributable to the bonds issued and sold pursuant to a single Constitutional authorization and the lands purchased therewith) contains sufficient moneys to retire all of the bonds secured by such Division, the moneys thereof, except such portion as may be needed to retire all of the bonds secured by such Division which portion shall be set aside and remain a part of such Division for the purpose of retiring all of the bonds, may be used for the purpose of paying the principal and the interest thereon, together with the expenses herein authorized, of any other bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board. Such use shall be a matter for the discretion and direction of said Board; but there may be no such use of any such moneys contrary to the rights of any holder of any of the bonds issued and sold by said Board or violative of any contract to which said Board is a party.

"The Veterans' Land Fund shall be used by said Board for the purpose of purchasing lands situated in the State of Texas owned by the United States or any governmental agency thereof, owned by the Texas Prison System or any other governmental agency of the State of Texas, or owned by any person, firm, or corporation. All lands thus purchased shall be acquired at the lowest price obtainable, to be paid for in cash, and shall be a part of said Fund. Such lands heretofore or hereafter purchased and comprising a part of said Fund are hereby declared to be held for a governmental purpose, although the individual purchasers thereof shall be subject to taxation to the same extent and in the same manner as are purchasers of lands dedicated to the Permanent Free Public School Fund.

"The lands of the Veterans' Land Fund shall be sold by said Board in such quantities, on such terms, at such prices, at such rates of interest and under such rules and regulations as are now or may hereafter be provided by law to

shall be set aside for that purpose in accordance with the resolution adopted by said Board authorizing the issuance and sale of such series of bonds. After such eight (8) year period, all of such moneys shall be set aside for the retirement of any bonds hereafter issued and sold and to pay interest thereon, together with any expenses as provided herein, in accordance with the resolution or resolutions authorizing the issuance and sale of such additional bonds, until there are sufficient moneys to retire all of the bonds hereafter issued and sold, at which time all such moneys then remaining a part of said Veterans' Land Fund and thereafter becoming a part of said Fund shall be governed as elsewhere provided herein.

"This Amendment being intended only to establish a basic framework and not to be a comprehensive treatment of the Veterans' Land Program, there is hereby reposed in the Legislature full power to implement and effectuate the design and objects of this Amendment, including the power to delegate such duties, responsibilities, functions, and authority to the Veterans' Land Board as it believes necessary.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 7 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing for the exemption from local ad valorem taxes of the property of certain charitable organizations, provided such organizations meet certain conditions and requirements and expend at least One and One-half Million Dollars (\$1,500,000.00) annually on free medical and hospital care for the indigent within the State of Texas; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation and publications.

PREAMBLE WHEREAS, The Legislature finds and declares that there is a need for the operation of hospitals by private charitable enterprises which will furnish free medical and/or hospital care for the indigent in Texas; and

WHEREAS, The operation of such hospitals and the furnishing of such free medical care and hospitalization for the indigent in Texas will add to the welfare and well-being of the State of Texas and its residents and citizens; and

WHEREAS, The need for the operation of such hospitals and the furnishing of such free medical care and hospitalization for the indigent is especially great in counties having a population in excess of one million two hundred forty thousand (1,240,000); and

WHEREAS, It is found and declared to be the Public Policy of the State to foster and encourage such operation of hospitals as aforesaid; now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. The Constitution of the State of Texas is amended hereby, by the addition of a new Section to Article VIII thereof, to be numbered Section 2-A, and reading as follows:

"2-A. The properties of any charitable trust or organization, if such trust or organization is dedicated to, and operates a hospital furnishing free hospital and/or medical care for the indigent within the State of Texas, shall be exempt from all ad valorem taxes levied by any taxing entity, except by the State of Texas itself, provided:

"(1) such trust or organization has expended for free hospital and/or medical care within the State of Texas, during the calendar year next preceding, a sum of not less than

One and One-half Million Dollars (\$1,500,000.00); and, further provided,

"(2) after such exemption has been in force and effect for one full calendar year, the amount expended for free hospital and/or medical care, within the State of Texas, amounts to not less than One Million Eight Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$1,800,000.00) for the calendar year next preceding; and, further provided,

"(3) such trust or organization is exempt from United States income taxes;

"(4) such charitable trust or organization maintains its domicile and operates a hospital or hospitals in a county having a population of more than one million two hundred forty thousand (1,240,000) according to the last preceding Federal Census, and such exemption shall apply only to the properties of such charitable trust or organization located within the county of its domicile.

"Proof of compliance with all applicable conditions stated above, shall constitute a complete defense to any suit for ad valorem taxes levied or attempted to be levied by any taxing entity other than the State of Texas itself.

"This Amendment shall be self-enacting."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Monday in November, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Amendment exempting the property of certain charitable organizations from local ad valorem taxes provided any such organization meets certain conditions, and expends at least One and One-half Million Dollars (\$1,500,000.00) annually for free hospital and medical care for the indigent within the State of Texas. AGAINST the Amendment exempting the property of certain charitable organizations from local ad valorem taxes provided any such organization meets certain conditions, and expends at least One and One-half Million Dollars (\$1,500,000.00) annually for free hospital and medical care for the indigent within the State of Texas."

Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.
