Lavendera Leaves Col-Tex Refinery

Thirty-three years and three months ago Lee Lavendera was hired as a machinist by Col-Tex Refinery. It was July 2, 1929, the day he reported for work at the refinery here.

Friday, under company policy rules, Lavendera put in his last day of work. His retirement from the company comes formally September 30.

"Lee was a loyal, hardworking, efficient supervisor," said Charles Wakefield, Col-Tex superintendent.

As Lavendera leaves his familiar post, ranks of the old original force he joined in '29 have become visibly thinner.

Only three Col-Tex employees, still on the force, can boast longer seniority than Lavendera's. They are A. C. Benson, "Stumpy" Tiller, and "Johnny" Johnson.

"We regret to see Lee leave the company," Wakefield said in his statement concerning the maintenance foreman's retirement this week.

"He has always had the interest of the employees and the company in his mind and heart. Lee is a man of good character and is a good citizen. We hate to see him leave. However, it is the policy of the company to retire employees at 65 years."

HEARING IN JUVENILE COURT

Teenage Burglars Under Probation

Two teenaged boys caught in the act of a Sport Shop burglary here were placed under probation here today. The 15-year-old Big Spring boys were released to care of their parents after a hearing in Juvenile Court, Saturday morning.

Probation period was set to last until their 18th birthdays. Judge Elmer Martin issued the probation edict after hearing testimony of police officers. County Attorney Frank Ginzle, the boys and their fathers. Police here arrested the visiting pair shortly after midnight in the early hours of last Saturday. The two were caught inside the Sport Shop, owned by Tex Keel.

The boys admitted prizing the back door of Keel's Sport Shop open with a thin screw driver, entering the store, then relocking the alley door. A car in the alley drew attention from officers. Investigation and arrest of the Big Spring boys inside the store followed.

The court ordered the young burglars to pay for damage to the store door and to its lock. Court edict also ordered them to report once a month to a probation officer in Big Spring.

Colorado City's winless 3-anything but happy. AAA Wolves learned the hard way Friday night that you can't give a good team the breaks and stay alive.

They handed the ball to Stamford's power-potent AA Bulldogs on the Wolves 20-yard line in the opening minutes of the first quarter. And that was it.

Coach Larry Wartes Bulldogs, acclaimed by some as the top AA team in Texas, quickly took the offensive and they didn't slow down for even a second breath until they were in command, 28 to 0.

Before the final whistle, the score was 43 to 0, and Coach Sam Christy's boys—hopeful of more improvement after a pair of losses to Win- ters and Monahans—were

FOR A FULL-OF-LIFE, barely 20-year-old, Social Security old-age benefits sound far, far away. Sound beyond the horizons of adulthood and middle-age. But the words of **ERVEN FISHER**, district manager of the Big Spring office of the Social Security Administration of the U. S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare, rang a bell . . . a distant bell, maybe.

Can't help turning the clock-hands a little and imagining myself in the twilight years with no income, no means of support and no potatoes in the bin.

Many of our elder citizens are left in this situation, along with disabled citizens, widows and dependent children. To be eligible for the security these benefits provide, Mr. Fisher informed us, money must be paid in regularly over the working years to compensate for the payments when needed.

According to Mr. Fisher, a cleaning woman, cook, maid, baby sitter or handyman, who works for as much pay as \$50 every three months, should have their earnings reported and the social security taxes paid.

But employers unknowingly do a great injustice to many domestic servants by not reporting earnings and paying taxes.

And the employer doesn't get off scott-free, either! He may be the unwilling recipient of a staggering bill from our Uncle Sam, for back taxes, interest and penalties.

Often the problem isn't discovered until an employe makes a claim for social security benefits.

To be in the know on social security facts, the Internal Revenue Service is available to discuss the subject. A booklet, No. 21, can be found at the social security office in Big Spring. It contains a pre-addressed post card for this purpose.

AFTER TALKING TO FISHER, this writer will enter the golden years, in 2007 (45 years from now) with a solid social security benefit program, with records to prove what money has passed from my hands to my uncle's . . . unless I've moved to the moon . . .

ALWAYS TRY TO stick my nose up at any and all extravagances that won't fit into the pint-sized budget, but just couldn't resist taking a peek at the new autos rolling onto local dealers' showroom floors.

A slight pull at the sleek chrome door handle, and you're overwhelmed by the luxury of bright upholstery, spotless carpeting and brand-new, elegant beauty . . .

When urged by dealers to consider their model, my pride just won't let me admit that they're about \$3,000 over my allowance, so I just look bored and swear I'm waiting for a new model with gold lame seat covers . . .

Also modacrylics, including dyneel, blended with wool, nylon, acrilan, cotton and rayon."

PREPARING COTTON FOR STRIPPING

County Agent Tells Of Machine Harvest

EDITOR'S NOTE: The following information of interest to cotton growers was issued by Buddy Logsdon, Mitchell County agent.

As the Mitchell County cotton harvest gets into full swing many growers will be thinking about the use of defoliants and desiccants to prepare cotton for machine harvesting. Timing the use of these materials can make or lose money for cotton growers.

Older, mature cotton frequently can be prepared for machine stripping or picking before frost. Experience has shown that the proper use of harvest-aid chemicals permits earlier harvest of mature cotton before exposure to weather damage reduces the grade or actual field losses due to bad weather occur.

Late cotton (June planting) on the other hand still will need all the time for maturity it can get and defoliation by frost will be more profitable. Too early, trigger-happy defoliation reduces the yields and lowers the quality. This is where "waste" and low micronaire cottons can injure the reputation of a cotton producing area. Also green bolls at the gin present numerous problems. Green short fibers reduce the quality. Green wet

fiber from green bolls clogs up and sticks to ginning saws thus causing a chain reaction in reducing quality.

Plant conditions, weather conditions and other factors vary from one year to the next. Each grower will need to evaluate the situation and decide, if defoliation will pay. Here are some guidelines that will be helpful:

1. Condition of the plant: Best results are obtained with mature cotton with a heavy boll load, where the irrigation cut off date is followed, leaf moisture is normal, and growth about stopped.

2. Timing: Research at Lubbock and throughout the cotton belt has shown that 60% of the cotton bolls should be open before a true defoliant is applied and more than 60% (preferably 80%) open before a desiccant is applied. Harvest aid materials thus applied have not been observed to reduce yields or lower fiber quality. Top bolls that are expected to mature should be 30 to 35 days old, at least, at time of application, full size, firm when pressed between thumb and fore finger and can't be sliced with a knife.

3. Weather conditions: Cool weather slows up defoliation. When night temperature are

tures under 70 degrees Fahrenheit. Is maturity speeded up by defoliants? No. For all practical purposes maturity of the cotton fiber stops when defoliants or desiccants are applied. The degree depends on coverage obtained. Bolls have been observed to open sooner in treated cotton than in untreated fields, but fiber from the treated cotton was not more mature. Some growers have found that if frost has not occurred by October 20 and if plant and weather conditions are normal, that defoliation or desiccation about two weeks before the average first frost date, usually the first week in November, can be considered. This places the cotton in a dehydrated condition at time of the first frost and permits earlier stripping after frost.

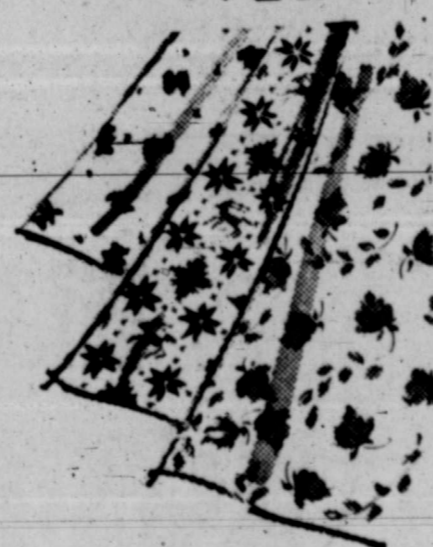

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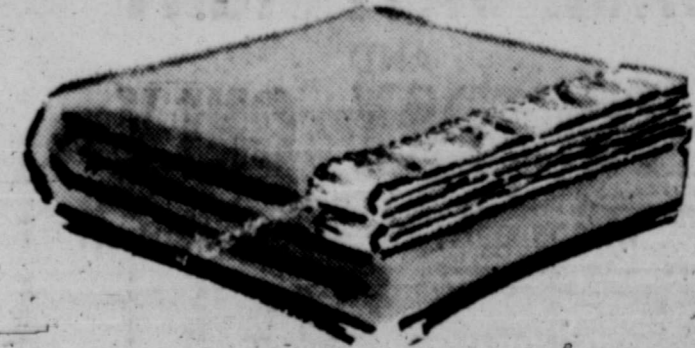

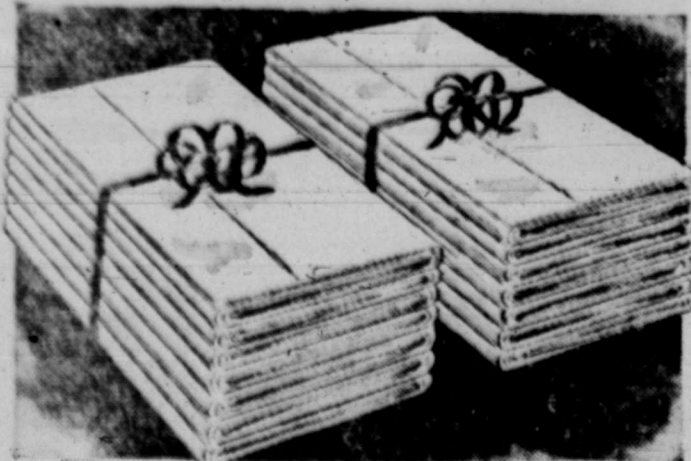
