### FARM SAFETY WEEK

July 21-27 College Station, June 26—"Inspection Plus Correction Equals Protection" is the theme for National Farm Safety Week, July 21-27. President John F. Kennedy in proclaiming the week, called upon all Americans, especially those allied with agriculture, to unite their efforts to cut down the number of farm, home and highway accidents.

The Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council, long active in the promotion of rural safety, points out the need for making farm and home safety a year-round effort. Prevention of accidents takes action by people and it must be continuous throughout every year, says the Council.

A very high percentage of all farm accidents can be traced to a specific cause, and carelessness is a major contributor, the councilmen say. A little checking close to home, they add, will likely reveal that most crippling or fatal accidents on the farm or in the home result from actions wherein people should know better.

The accident record of agriculture is not good and with the ever-increasing use of power machinery and allied equipment, the rate can be expected to move higher unless the people involved make up their minds to do something about it, warns the Council. Therefore, they add, it's up to farm families to find and remove hazards which can cause accidents and to practice safety in their daily living. The outstanding records in accident prevention by other industries of the nation haven't just happened, says the Council, but are the result of well-planned and conducted safety educational programs.

National Farm Safety Week is sponsored by the U. S. Department of Agriculture and the National Safety Council. They work in cooperation with the state Agriculture Extension Services, press, radio, television and other interested individuals and groups.

ACP Help Get Conservation Job Done, Says Chairman  
Conservation work costs money. That's why we have an ACP, Edward B. Roach, Vice Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Mitchell County Committee, said today. He pointed out that being convinced about the benefits of conservation is not enough, and expressed the belief that some farmers still may not understand that they can obtain program help in getting the needed conservation job done on their farms.

"Just drive around the country," the Chairman declared, "and you can easily spot the farms where conservation farming is being practiced. In many cases, you would also find the Agricultural Conservation Program is cooperating with the farmers in carrying out the conservation practice on the land."

For farmers who may not fully understand just how ACP works, Mr. Roach explained that the program's purpose is to encourage the establishment of soil, water, woodland, and wildlife conservation practices needed in the public interest. The program, therefore, has an incentive type of approach to the problem—it "shares the cost" of sound conservation measures which the farmer would not carry out without such assistance.

Funds for this purpose are authorized by Congress in recognition of the fact that the Nation's natural resources are vital not only to the farmers and ranchers who operate the land but also to the health and wellbeing of each citizen, both now and in the future.

Conservation practices to promote conservation measures are selected to meet local as well as national conditions. Each county has a list of the practices, specifications, and cost-share rates approved for local farmers participating in the program.

In brief, the farmer obtains ACP cooperation by filing a request with the ASC county committee for ACP cost-sharing before carrying out the practice. He receives a definite notice from the committee of the extent to which his request has been approved. After completion of the practice, the farmer certifies this by filing the necessary report form with the county office. His cost-sharing assistance, in the form of either cash or a purchase order for a conservation service or material, usually covers about half the cost of the approved practice.

ACP also helps pay for technical service where required to determine need and practicability of the plan and lay out the practice. This is accomplished through special arrangements with the Soil Conservation Service.

Farmers who wish further details about ACP are urged to call at the ASCS county office.

### MITCHELL COUNTY ASCS NEWS

Existing Wheat Program Provisions Reviewed  
In response to questions raised since the wheat quota referendum on May 21 Edward B. Roach, Vice Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Mitchell County Committee, today reviewed certain wheat program provisions still in effect under existing law.

For 1964 the Chairman explained, legislation provides that price support at 50 percent of parity—about \$1.25 per bushel, ion Reserve contracts agreed to plant within the acreage of the acreage allotment or 15 acres, and this means that the 1964 Conservation Reserve payment for the farm is dependent on planting within this acreage.

On the average will be available to producers who plant within farm acreage allotment or 15 acres, established before the referendum. There will be no quota penalties for planting in excess of 1964 acreage allotments. However, overplanting the 1964 allotments would reduce the acreage history credit for future allotments.

Farmers who have Conservation Reserve contracts agreed to plant within the acreage of the acreage allotment or 15 acres, and this means that the 1964 Conservation Reserve payment for the farm is dependent on planting within this acreage.

**FREE SPRAYING SERVICE**  
Mitchell County livestock owners are in one of the largest screwworm infested counties in Texas. In the week of June 9-15 the county had more confirmed cases than three of the hottest counties in South Texas combined.

As of June 27, Mitchell County had 26 confirmed screwworm cases according to Forrest Smith Area Eradication official.

Marvin Bridges, Executive Director of the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation, met with several livestock owners of Mitchell County along with Mitchell County Animal Health Committee which is headed by Francis A. Winn of the Spade Community.

Suggest county-wide spray Control Program  
This is the most critical time in the Mitchell County control program. According to Marvin Bridges there will be a concentrated effort to spray all livestock in the county within the next two weeks and again 14 to 21 days later.

Screwworm eradication officials will furnish a man experienced in the use of spray chemicals plus the spraying equipment beginning Tuesday, June 25, 1963. The chemical will be furnished to all livestock owners with a confirmed case. All livestock owners without confirmed cases will be asked to buy the chemical since chemical cannot be furnished to unconfirmed herds.

The chemical to be used will be Co-Kal and Korlan. It is hoped that all livestock producers will participate in this eradication effort. Co-Kal is a highly recommended insecticide and will also control lice, ticks, horn flies and grubs or heel flies. All these cause considerable loss to livestock men in the county each year. Continued cooperation from local livestockmen may mean the difference between a relatively free screwworm year and widespread infestation says Buddy C. Logsdon, local county agricultural agent.

All livestock men wishing to obtain this free spraying service are asked to contact immediately Buddy C. Logsdon at the county Extension office, telephone RA-5-1111.
