Emergency Loans Ready in Ten Days

Emergency crop and feed loans for the year 1936, as authorized by the President's Executive Order of February 28, will be available within the next ten days, Governor W. I. Myers of the Farm Credit Administration stated. Regulations governing the loans have been issued.

Governor Myers said the loans will be made through the same channels used in previous years. Farmers eligible may obtain applications from the field supervisors or the local emergency crop loan committees already operating in most counties.

He said the loans will be limited to the minimum amount necessary to meet the immediate and actual cash needs of farmers who are unable to obtain credit from any other source, and in no instance exceed \$200 to one farmer. Applicants who can get credit from any other source, including a production credit association, will not be eligible for emergency loans, he explained.

Loans will be made for the production, planting, cultivating and harvesting of crops, for summer fallowing, for supplies where they are necessary for production of 1936 crops, or to produce necessary feed for livestock.

According to the Governor's statement, preference will be given to applications of farmers whose cash requirements are small, and no loans will be made for purchasing livestock or machinery or for payment of rents, debts or taxes.

The loans will bear interest at the rate of 5 1/2% a year and be secured by a first lien, or an agreement to give a first lien, on all crops financed in whole or part with the proceeds of the emergency loan. Where loans are made for the production of food for livestock, they will be secured by a first lien on the livestock to be fed.

Where farmers applying for emergency loans are the tenants of a private landowner or concern, the maximum amount of loans to the tenants of one landowner in one county may not exceed \$500. The maximum amount of loans to members of one household who are occupants of the same farm is \$200.

All disbursements will be made from the regional Emergency Crop and Feed Loan offices one of which is located at Dallas.

County League Contests Being Held This Week-End

The University Interscholastic League Meet for Dawson County has been under way since early fall with football, basketball and the debate round-robin the first of the events. This week end is the time set for the main meet of the year. Thirty-three school member units will send their representatives to the two Lamesa schools for contests on Friday and Saturday. The meet begins at 9:00 a. m. Friday morning with Tennis players meeting in room 104, high school building. The Declaration events will get under way at 9:15 in the high school auditorium when the rural school declamations begin. The ward school and high school classes of declaimers hold their contests in the same auditorium, but in the afternoon of Friday.

The story-telling contests for second or third grade pupils is slated for the Elementary School auditorium at 9:15 Friday morning and practically every school eligible to send a pupil to this contest has entered one pupil.

The pupils is expected to attend the declamation, story-telling, extemporaneous speech and debating contests in large numbers.

The Tennis matches for boys and girls singles and doubles, in both senior and junior divisions, will be watched with interest. The preliminaries in the dashes for track and field events are scheduled for the afternoon of Friday, beginning at two o'clock at the baseball park, south of the CCC barracks.

Member of State Board of Barber Examiners Here

J. H. Taylor, of Austin, member of the State Board of Barber Examiners, was in Lamesa several days last week. He visited all of the shops in town and highly complimented the barbers on sanitation and cleanliness of their shops. Records show that there were more communicable, contaminating diseases in Texas last year than ever before and less than 2 per cent of them were traced to barber shops, whereas in 1929, 67 per cent of all skin diseases were traced to barber shops. The barber organizations are to be commended on this remarkable step of prevention toward the spreading of skin diseases.

The Texas Barbers law was passed in 1929 for the protection of the public and it is bought and paid for by Texas barbers, no tax is paid by the customers.

Business Census For County Progressing

The Census of American Business and Manufacturing is progressing nicely in Lamesa and Dawson County, according to information received from Mr. W. E. Immons, Supervisor for the district. Contagious Diseases Should Be Reported

Austin, Texas—In speaking about epidemics, Dr. John W. Brown, State Health Officer, stated that if doctors, nurses, householders, and others would report the occurrence of any communicable disease immediately to the local health officer, that many epidemics could be prevented or greatly curtailed.

The control of preventable diseases depends upon the perfect reporting of all cases. It is necessary to secure information as to when and where cases occur before the proper steps for the control of these cases can be taken. Every epidemic starts with one case and the doctors engaged in protecting the public health are interested in locating this first case to prevent its spread to others.

Some of the contagious diseases are quarantinable. This is not done to punish the persons involved for having the disease, but to protect the well. The quarantine sign is not a disgrace but a badge of good citizenship, as it shows that household is trying to protect others from contracting a contagious disease.

State Extension Agent Discusses Farm Act

COLLEGE STATION—Farmers who want to participate in the benefits of the new Soil Conservation and Domestic Allotment Act but also want to go ahead with the planting while the season is favorable without waiting for full details might do well to be guided by their last year's plantings, putting acres which were "retired" under the old program into soil building crops for 1936, according to Jack Shelton, vice director and state agent of the Extension Service, who has just returned from the regional meeting at Memphis called by the Secretary of Agriculture to help work out ways to put the act into effect.

"It is a soil utilization and soil conservation program and crops will be classified as soil depleting crops, soil conserving crops and soil building crops," Shelton stated. Cotton, corn, wheat and grain sorghums are our principal soil depleting crops in Texas and farmers making planting plans will have to remember this fact. There will be no crop control program, but for working out the details of administering the Act, a job which has been assigned to the Agricultural Adjustment Administration, recommendations made at the four regional meetings will be assembled in Washington and from there will be developed the program which will finally be sent to the country.

"It now seems that payments will be made directly to farmers based on the productivity of the land devoted to soil conservation; and that they will be made on proof of compliance," Shelton stated.

"Farmers and agricultural workers at the Memphis meeting seemed in good spirits and determined to iron out all difficulties in the way of getting the program under way. There seemed to be a feeling that we are 50 years late on a soil conservation program right now, but there is hope in all the experimental studies that have been made. There are 17 experiment stations placed in strategic positions over Texas, many of which have worked for a long period of years.

"They have accumulated much tested information which is going to be of great value in establishing what is proper land utilization and conservation. At least we know pretty well what good practices are and what crops are responsible for the great erosion menace which is attacking our country at this time," he concluded.

H. D. CLUB WOMEN PLAN RECREATION PROGRAM

The basis of rural civilization is not organization or machinery, but folks, was told to thirty five farm men and women at the Legion Hall last Monday night in the recreational meeting. Organization is but a tool used in developing good citizenship, and recreation is a fundamental part of any organization. Recreation is fundamentally social, for when people know each other through play, they work together better. Recreation is needed to give rest and relief from family behavior, to make one forget himself and enter into play with others to balance work with a change of routine and to provide wholesome outlet.

Organized recreation as a part of home demonstration work is being started in all communities that have a home demonstration club. Representatives from seven communities meet for an hour and one half in a leadership training meeting Monday night, February 9th. These same representatives will meet again March 23. After this meeting they will conduct a community play night in their respective communities. Mrs. Ralph Ranson has been elected by the County Home Demonstration Council as county chairman of recreation.

The tender romance comes to a dramatic climax when the young surgeon restores her sight and the couple's romance, ending the tragic threat which has darkened both their lives.

The theme of the picture follows that of the novel—a theme which has deep effect on all who have come in contact with it.

The band from Texas Technological College, directed by Professor D. O. Wiley, gave a concert at Lamesa High school auditorium last Monday afternoon. The band of fifty three members presented their concert before a large audience and their numbers were well received. Mr. C. E. King, high school band director and instructor, directed the Tech band in playing 'Safari', high school band contest number. Willard McSpadden, a local high school graduate, was a member of the Tech organization playing in the trombone section.

Half Billion Dollars Soil Conservation Program Underway

College Station—The Federal Government will make grants of money to farmers, conditioned upon the actual evidence of good land use, President Roosevelt announced recently upon signing the new \$500,000,000 'Soil Conservation and Domestic Allotment Act'. The new law authorizes up to \$500,000,000 for use in any one year to pay farmers for soil conservation. Grants will be made to farmers for this work.

President Roosevelt, after signing the bill on February 29, issued the statement that the new soil conservation and domestic allotment act represents an attempt to develop, out of the AAA efforts, a long-time program for American agriculture.

Three chief aims of the legislation were listed by the President as tied up with the national welfare. Conservation of the soil itself was named as the first of the three to be attained by wise and proper land use.

The second purpose is the re-establishment and maintenance of farm income at fair levels so that the great gains made by agriculture is the last three years can be preserved and national recovery can continue. The 3rd major objective is the protection of the consumers by assuring adequate supplies of food and fiber now and in the future.

The President also strongly points out that there would be no contracts with farmers. Such contracts constituted one of the Supreme Court's objections to the AAA. While saying that such absence of production control might make impracticable the attainment of parity prices, Mr. Roosevelt said he is "confident that the farmers co-operating with the Government will work hard within the existing legal limitations to achieve the new law's goal, which is partly not of farm prices but of farm income."

The money to carry on the plans will be allotted to each State after the State agency has been set up. The Act further reads that the Secretary of Agriculture shall apportion, on or before

November 1 of each year, such funds as shall be necessary to carry out the State plans.

Farmers in preparing for the new program are planting soil improving and soil erosion prevention crops. Because planting time is so near, it is impossible for farmers to lay definite lines as to the acreage of such crops. However, Texas farmers to profit by the new law, are planting sufficient crops of such nature as to meet the demands of the new law which was enacted for the purpose of building up the Nation's land.

Following the signing of the bill by the President, plans to speed the new program were immediately taken up in discussions by officials in the Department of Agriculture.

Calls for four regional meetings of farmers and farm representatives were issued. The first two in Chicago and Memphis to study details and make suggestions for the new set-up; the other meetings were scheduled in New York and Salt Lake City.

Administration officials also announced that the program will be put into operation first in the Southern States, where planting of cotton starts soon. Texas falls into this category.

Typhoid Can Be Avoided By Care

AUSTIN, TEXAS—High up on every health officer's list of Disease Prevention Duties at this time of the year is the reminder—Typhoid Fever Immunization, stated Dr. Jno. W. Brown, state health officer.

"Through the protection of public water supplies from contamination, the pasteurization of milk supplies, vaccination against the disease, improved sanitation of homes not served by protected water supplies, sanitary supervision of sources of food supplies and other protective measures, typhoid fever can be controlled.

"Here are the facts: As somebody has aptly said 'Nobody catches typhoid—he swallows it.' Typhoid is a filthy-borne disease. It causes great suffering and many deaths. That is not all. It is like an endless chain. A certain number of the people who have the disease and recover from it, become 'carriers.' They continue to pass the typhoid-producing germs in the discharge from the bowels and kidneys. If the discharges are not disinfected

before they are disposed of, the germs may spread into the soil and pollute it, or they may be carried into an unprotected water supply and contaminate it. A carrier may also spread typhoid when he handles or prepares food and is not careful to wash his hands.

"In vaccination against typhoid we have an effective means of protection which lasts for a certain period and then must be renewed. If you have not been protected against typhoid within the last two or three years, go to your doctor and have it done now. The disease is both preventable and unnecessary."

ON TEXAS FARMS

Roses are a feature of Grimes county rural yard improvement since 228 home demonstration club women put out 4,325 rose bushes last spring.

A rose garden placed for enjoyment when in the outdoor living room is part of the landscape plan of Mrs. Sam Inglet, yard demonstrator in Montgomery county. Soil into which one-third as much well rotted manure and leaf mold was spaded was prepared for this rose bed.

In Frio county, Mrs. Ben Conover made a rose bed only five feet wide so that it can be easily worked from both sides. The roses are planted only 18 inches apart so that all the roots will be shaded—this in defiance of the South Texas sun.

Rose cuttings set out by Mrs. J. E. Manning of Dallas county last spring have developed into bushes almost equal in size to three year old plants.

Mrs. Manning attributes this to the thorough preparation given the soil before she planted the cuttings. Rotted straw and manure were plowed into the bed until the soil was very loose. It retained its moisture all summer for this season.

Pruning is something many rose fanciers argue about. Mrs. O. B. Harkey, yard demonstrator in San Saba county, prunes her radiance roses this way—she selects four to six of the very best shoots and cut out all of the rest. Then she prunes the selected canes to from six to 12 inches high.

4-H club boys and girls are busy on Texas farms and ranches these days doing almost every kind of thing that is worth doing in agriculture and homemaking.

Lawrence Novark of Montgomery county is specializing in budding and grafting fruit and nut trees. He has plums, peaches, pears and English walnuts as well as 30 pecan trees in his orchard.

In Wharton county 77 4-H club boys and girls landscaped the new Extension building and some other buildings at the county fair grounds. They put out 265 native and nursery shrubs in one day.

In Harris county there are 18 4-H boys' clubs which have an enrollment of 365 boys. These boys in their individual demonstrations are working with 35 dairy calves, 55 beef calves, 60 pigs, 10 sheep and 12,186 chickens and turkeys.

In Matagorda county, Kathlene Hen-

igen, garden demonstrator for a girls' 4-H club is trying out a new variety of tomatoes this year as well as planting some "old reliables." Kathlene has 400 cabbage plants out already, and three rows of onions grown from seed. A new girls' 4-H club in Fort Bend county has a 100 per cent record so far in attendance for every meeting and in bringing up the work assigned.

Marines Are Recruiting Men

The U. S. Marine Corps recruiting station in Los Angeles, has exhausted its waiting list and will enlist 75 young men who meet the requirements specified for accepted applicants in the marine corps. These young men will be enlisted immediately and transferred to the marine base at San Diego for their preliminary training, according to an announcement by Lieut. Colonel Tom E. Thrasher, Jr., officer in charge.

The requirements for enlistment provide that accepted applicants must be not less than 18 nor more than 25 years of age, 66 to 74 inches in height, of good habits and character, American citizens, and have had better than a common school education.

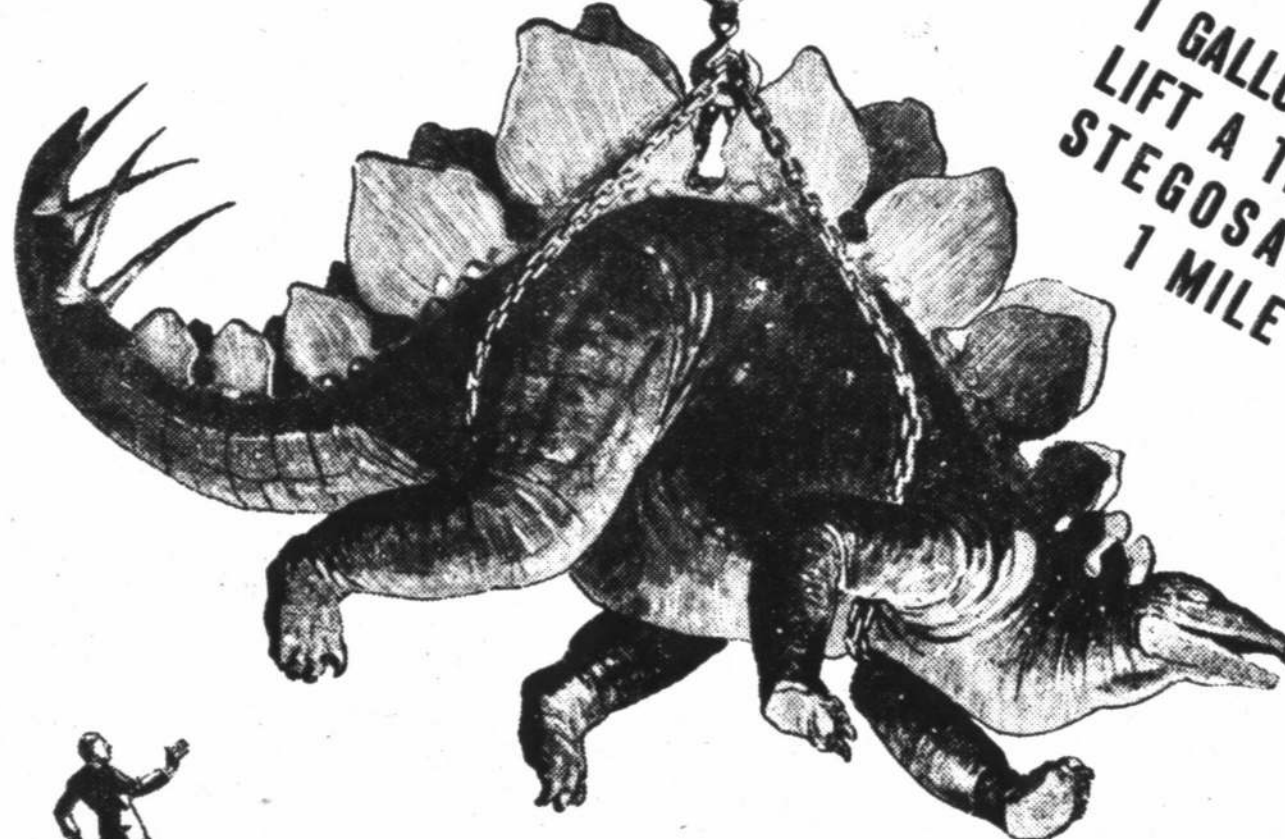

Former candidate for governor Tom Hunter has been seen in several political centers lately and appears to be a very busy man. It comes to us that he is seeking financial aid and sounding out his political standing just in case he decides to throw his hat into the ring for the governorship.

Members of the legislative hot oil investigating committee found recently that agents of the State Comptroller, in East Texas, had accepted tax payments on oil the source of which had not been determined and could not be traced. The law provides that the tax-paying oil companies must swear to the source of the oil on which they are paying taxes. The Comptroller's agents took sworn statements as to the origin of the oil which was contrary to the law. This circumstance along with other irregularities lead us to believe that State Comptroller Geo. The strong contestant for the place will be the former Senator Carl Hardin who for the past three years has been an executive with the state relief administration. Hardin will be remembered as the Senator who sponsored the "open door" policy in the Senate and who was never too busy to see anyone wishing to see him. His co-authorship in the Homestead Exemption Law will not be forgotten by the man with the small income.

Perhaps the most obnoxious racket ever to exist in Texas made its appearance lately. Salesmen popped up over the state selling application blanks for driver's licenses and old age pensions. The sale price of the applications was only twenty-five (25) cents and consequently many unsuspecting aged citizens were chiseled. Since both types of application blanks are available free of charge, authorities are doing all within their power to stamp out this evil.

With the objective of seeking final approval of Texas old age assistance plan by the Federal Government, Executive Director Orville Carpenter will leave for Washington later in the month. The Texas Law providing for old age assistance has already been approved. Next comes the final approval which depends upon the system of administration, and rules which have been made by the state pension board. There isn't a doubt in our mind but that final approval will be secured with little effort.

ON TEXAS FARMS

Roses are a feature of Grimes county rural yard improvement since 228 home demonstration club women put out 4,325 rose bushes last spring.

A rose garden placed for enjoyment when in the outdoor living room is part of the landscape plan of Mrs. Sam

Inglet, yard demonstrator in Montgomery county. Soil, into which one-third as much well rotted manure and leaf mold was spaded was prepared for this rose bed.

In Frio county, Mrs. Ben Conover made a rose bed only five feet wide so that it can be easily worked from both sides. The roses are planted only 18 inches apart so that all the roots will be shaded—this in defiance of the South Texas sun.

Rose cuttings set out by Mrs. J. E. Manning of Dallas county last spring have developed into bushes almost equal in size to three year old plants. Mrs. Manning attributes this to the thorough preparation given the soil before she planted the cuttings. Rotted straw and manure were plowed into the bed until the soil was very loose. It retained its moisture all summer for this season.

Pruning is something many rose fanciers argue about. Mrs. O. B. Harkey, yard demonstrator in San Saba county prunes her radiance roses this way—she selects four to six of the very best shoots and cut out all of the rest. Then she prunes the selected canes to from six to 12 inches high.
