A large number of schools were forced to close their doors last year, and some children in some communities are receiving no kind of instruction this year. The greatest reason for this problem is summed up in a very few words. Other fields of endeavor offer far greater possibilities, especially from a salary standpoint, than does the Teachers Profession and if our school standards are to be upheld, inducements must be offered so that more persons will become good teachers.

AWARDS FOR SERVICE

Women in war have distinguished themselves in bravery and bearing as well as our men. Not only are awards given fliers for combat flights, but to flying nurses as well. Wacs and Waves have been named for meritorious service and commendations given for heroism to ladies in uniform wherever war places women today. One hundred and five American women have received individual awards from the Army and Navy, for bravery and efficiency, says the Office of War Information. Ninety-seven have gone to army nurses. The highest award ever given to an American woman in uniform has reached one, the Distinguished Flying Cross. Flying nurses receive twenty-nine air medals, twenty four Purple Hearts to Army Nurses and four to Wacs. Two hospital ships have been named for nurses and an award is given one Wave for merit in recruit training school. Thirty-one of our States are represented by these war citations. Not only is valor and courage a manly virtue.

Feats rivaling those of the legendary negro giant, "John Henry," are performed by negro workers in the pulpwood industry of Montgomery County. A log weighing as much as 450 pounds and requiring five men to pick up and place in position is carried on one shoulder by a loader, who runs up the incline into the railroad car. He knows how to pace himself to get the benefit of the spring of the incline and he keeps his rhythm by singing.

These and other interesting facts were learned recently in talking to Reagan Smith of Conroe, highly active in the timber business.

Though famous for its oil fields, Montgomery County is still an important timber region. Pulpwood, shipped to Houston to be made into the finest grades of paper, will fill an average of 300 cars a month. Probably 600

men are employed at this work in the county, not including farmers who do seasonal cutting.

And machinery still plays second fiddle when it comes to making a crosstie. A hewn tie will outlast a sawed one by years. One company in Montgomery County will turn out as high as 20,000 cross-ties in a heavy month. A worker can make on a sawmill from 12 to 20 ties a day, depending of course upon the man. He receives about 50 cents per tie. Using only an ax, the worker is such an artist that, on a properly-hewn tie, you can run your hand over one without encountering a splinter.

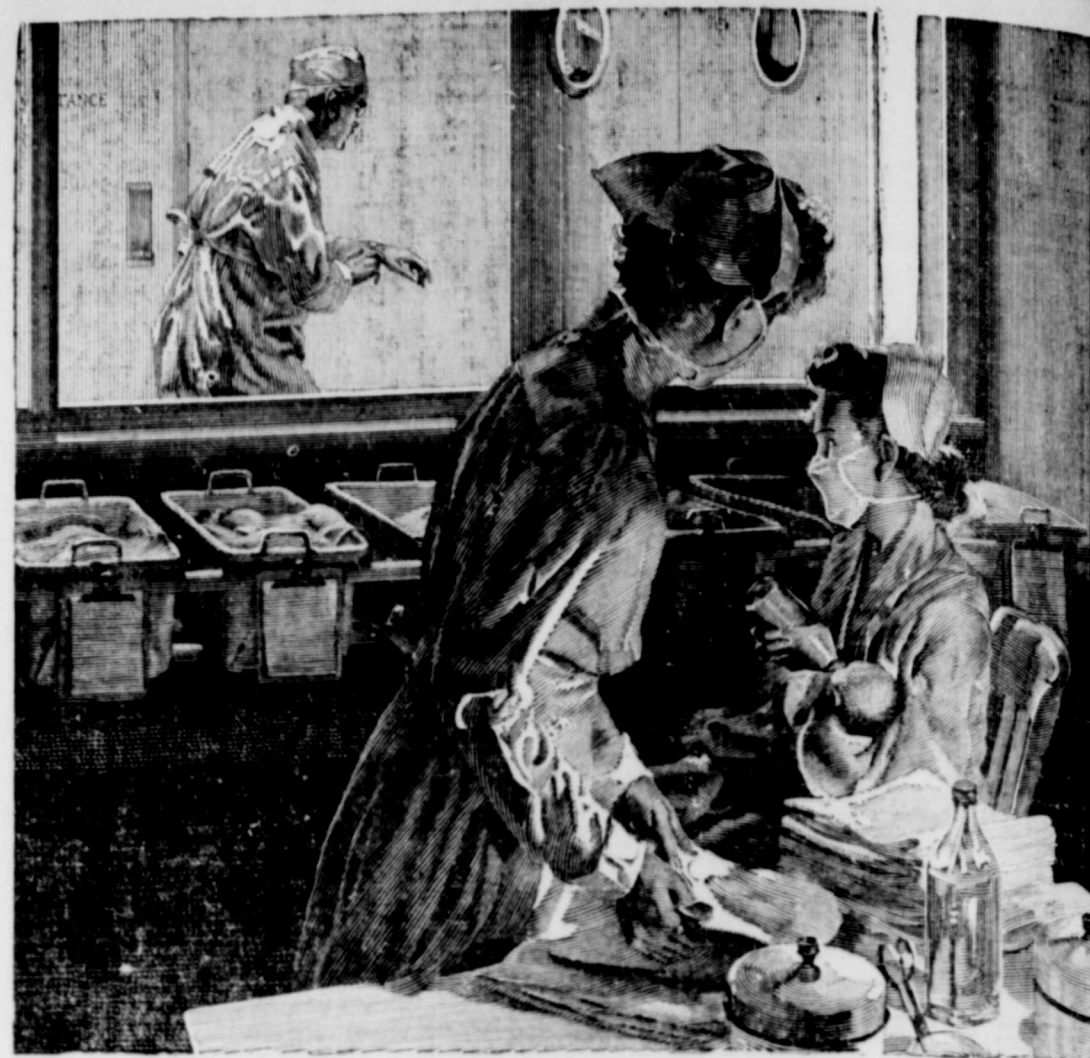

Veterans' Office To Handle Readjustment Allowances

The Texas Unemployment Compensation Commission has signed an agreement with the Administrator of Veterans' Affairs whereby the State Agency will handle for the Veterans' Administration the payment of readjustment allowances under Title V of the Servicemen's Readjustment Act of 1944.

The Commission started accepting applications for readjustment allowances from discharged veterans of World War II on September 4, 1944, the date on which the Act became effective. Claims may be filed with Commission representatives at any of the 23 offices of the Commission or the 137 itinerant service points scattered throughout the State.

The Servicemen's Readjustment Act of 1944 provides that honorably discharged veterans of World War II may be entitled to readjustment allowances provided they have had active service since September 16, 1940. Such active service must have been ninety days or longer, or the veteran must have been discharged due to service connected disability.

In order to be eligible, a veteran must be totally unemployed, partially unemployed, or self-employed and earning less than \$100 per month and must be registered for work at an unemployment service office. He must be able to work and available for work and a resident of the United States at the time of filing claims.

Depending upon a veteran's length of service, readjustment allowances may vary in duration from eight weeks minimum to a fifty-two week maximum. Readjustment allowances are payable during a period of two years after discharge or termination of the present war, whichever is the later date. Totally unemployed veterans who file claims, and are otherwise eligi-

ble, will receive \$20 per week, while those who are partially employed may receive the difference between their weekly earnings and \$23. Claims for readjustment allowances will be taken on a weekly basis and checks in payment thereof mailed weekly to eligible veterans.

Classes of instruction have been conducted for Commission employees in order to fully prepare them to answer any questions of World War II veterans. The Commission urges discharged servicemen and women who are interested in knowing more about Title V of the Servicemen's Readjustment Act of 1944 to contact a Commission representative who will be glad to thoroughly explain phases of this new legislation and assist the veterans in filing his application for any readjustment allowance to which he might be entitled.

With Ernie Pyle at the Front

Trapped 8 Days in Plane, Ace Lives and Grins

Courageous Allies See War at Its Worst and Carry On

By Ernie Pyle

ON THE WESTERN FRONT.—When you're wandering around our very far-flung front lines—the lines that in our present rapid war are known as "fluid"—you can always tell how recently the battle has swept on ahead of you.

You can sense it from the little things even more than the big things—

From the scattered green leaves and the fresh branches of trees still lying in the middle of the road.

From the wisps and coils of telephone wire, hanging brokenly from high poles and entwining across the roads.

From the gray, burned-powder rims of the shell craters in the gravel roads, their edges not yet smoothed by the pounding of military traffic.

From the little pools of blood on the roadside, blood that has only begun to congeal and turn black, and the punctured steel helmets nearby.

From the square blocks of building stone still scattered in the village streets, and from the sharp-edged rocks in the roads, still uncrushed by traffic.

From the burned-out tanks and broken carts still unmoved from the road. From the cows in the fields, lying grotesquely with their feet to the sky, so newly dead they have not begun to bloat or smell.

From the scattered heaps of personal debris around a gun. I don't know why it is, but the Germans always seem to take off their coats before they die.

From all these things you can tell that the battle has been recent—from these and from the men dead so recently that they seem to be merely asleep.

And also from the inhuman quiet. Usually battles are noisy for miles around. But in this recent fast warfare a battle sometimes leaves a complete vacuum behind it.

The Germans will stand and fight it out until they see there is no hope. Then some give up, and the rest pull and run for miles. Shooting stops. Our fighters move on after the enemy, and those who do not fight, but move in the wake of the battles, will not catch up for hours.

There is nothing left behind but the remains—the lifeless debris, the sunshine and the flowers, and utter silence.

An amateur who wanders in this vacuum at the rear of a battle has a terrible sense of loneliness. Everything is dead—the men, the machines, the animals—and you alone are left alive.

One afternoon we drove in our jeep into a country like that. The little rural villages of gray stone were demolished—heartbreaking heaps of still smoking rubble.

We drove into the tiny town of La Detinal, a sweet old stone village at the "T" of two gravel roads, a rural village in rolling country, a village of not more than 50 buildings. There was not a whole building left.

Rubble and broken wires still littered the streets. Blackish gray-stone walls with no roofs still smoldered inside. Dead men still lay in the street, helmets and broken rifles askew around them. There was not a soul nor a sound in town; the village was lifeless.

As we stood there talking in the lonely field of a soldier in coveralls, with a rifle slung over his shoulder, ran up breathlessly, and almost shouted:

"Hey, there's a man alive in one of those planes across the road! He's been trapped there for days!"

We stopped right in the middle of a sentence and began to run. We hopped the hedgerow, and ducked under the wing of the upside-down plane. And there, in the next hour, came the climax to what certainly was one of the really great demonstrations of courage in this war.

We ran to the wrecked British plane, lying there upside down, and dropped on our hands and knees and peered through a tiny hole in the side.

A man lay on his back in the small space of the upside-down cockpit. His feet disappeared somewhere in the jumble of dials and rubber pedals above him. His shirt was open and his chest was bare to the waist. He was smoking a cigaret.

The days passed. He thirsted terribly. He slept some; part of the time he was unconscious; part of the time he undoubtedly was delirious. But he never gave up hope.

After we had finally got him out, he said as he lay on the stretcher under a wing, "Is it possible that I've been out of this plane since I crashed?"

Everybody chuckled. The doctor who had arrived said, "Not the remotest possibility. You were sealed in there and it took men with tools half an hour to make an opening. And your leg was broken and your foot was pinned there. No, you haven't been out."

"I didn't think it was possible," the pilot said, "and yet it seems in my mind that I was out once and back in again."

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Improved Uniform International SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

DAVID ANOINTED KING

LESSON TEXT—1 Samuel 16:1-5, 11-13. GOLDEN TEXT—Man looketh on the outward appearance, but the Lord looketh on the heart.—1 Samuel 16:7.

Outward appearance, by which man judges, is almost always deceptive. God knows the heart and is able to evaluate a man correctly. In calling David, the ruddy shepherd boy, to be king, God cut across the ideas of men, but He was, as always, right.

I. A Man from God's Storehouse (v. 1)—"I have provided."

God's great storehouses are full of blessings, material and spiritual, but He also has a great and constantly replenished reserve of men and women from which He calls and sends them forth. The thing we must guard against is the setting of hindrances in His holy way, either in our own lives or in the lives of others.

A man power shortage is very serious, for it simply cuts off the stream of production without which action becomes impossible. There should never be any shortage of man power in the Lord's work, and there would never be any if all His creation were willingly subject to Him.

God was ready to set aside Saul, and He had David ready. Samuel the prophet was still grieving over Saul's failure. In a sense that feeling for Saul was most commendable, but it could not go on.

When men, even of our own families or circle of friends, persist in rebellion against the Lord, we must not let our grief hold us back, but move on with the man of God's choice.

II. A Man Who Had to Be Sought (vv. 2-5)—"Send and fetch him."

Usually those who are quick to offer themselves for an important place are not the ones for the place. And those who are sitting around doing nothing but waiting for some honor to come to them, are not the ones to choose.

"Let the office seek the man" is the highest ground, even in politics; surely it must be the proper procedure in spiritual activity.

David might well have wanted to be at the place of sacrifice and the feast that day, but since all his family were there, and someone had to care for the sheep, he did it. A man like that, hard at his work, is well worth seeking when something important needs to be done.

The interesting story of Samuel's effort to find one among Jesse's seven sons (vv. 6-10) is well worth reading. Samuel still had the idea that a king must be prepossessing and able to thrill men by his appearance. He should have learned better from his experience with Saul.

God put him right (v. 7), and we do well to renew our thinking on that point. The world is in a place where many leaders must be chosen in the months and years just ahead. Will we be eager and willing to have God lead us in our choice? Or will we be swayed by personal interests or political expediency?

III. A Man of Spirituality (vv. 11-13)—"The Spirit of the Lord came upon David."

The Holy Spirit, ever active in all periods of Bible history, became the abiding presence in the believer's heart after Pentecost, but during the Old Testament period He came on chosen individuals for a particular work. As David was anointed king the Spirit came upon him for that service. In spite of his failings (when he forgot the Lord) David was throughout his reign a spiritually-minded man who wanted God's will and His glory to be preeminent.

God never calls a man without enabling him for his task, and the chief and indispensable enabling is that of the Holy Spirit's power. Like David, we may enter upon a God-appointed responsibility without fear or question, simply trusting the Holy Spirit to take, transform, empower, and use us for God's glory.

IV. A Man Willing to Serve (vv. 14-18).

Upon Saul there came tremendous moods of despondency. These were "from the Lord" (v. 14) in the sense that God permitted His disobedient and rejected servant to suffer the result of his self-will and failure. How awful it is for anyone to be out of the will of God and conscious of His disapproval.

To help Saul in those dark hours David, the sweet singer of Israel, was willing to serve with his voice and his harp. How many thousands of times David has served all the generations since with his psalms. He was a man of gifts, gladly given for the Lord and for others.

Bear in mind that while David was not yet publicly crowned, he was already anointed to be king. Yet he was ready to serve the one whose place he was to take even in his hours of dejection and hateful ill-will.

Household Hints

In grinding an ax on a motor-driven emery wheel or grindstone, keep the fingers on the ax-head to test its temperature. If the metal gets uncomfortably hot in the hand, stop grinding to keep the ax from losing its temper.

For crisp bacon that is juicy within, dust lightly on both sides with flour before frying slowly.

A half teaspoon of oil of peppermint added to the filling for chocolate pie gives a new and different flavor.

When dyeing wearing apparel it is a good idea to run a few lengths of thread through an inside seam. When finished, these threads will furnish an exact match if repairs are needed.

Next time the cream won't whip try this: add the white of an egg to the cream, chill and try again.

Two common causes of failure in pastry are too much working, and the addition of too much water. Flaky pie dough requires only enough water and handling to hold it together.

To make it easy to save fat for Uncle Sam, make a strainer by putting a cloth in a 10-cent embroidery hoop. This eliminates need of washing a greasy strainer and cloth may be used to kindle a fire.

To save fuel, always measure the water before heating rather than heating a kettle full of water then measuring out what is needed. Don't forget it's patriotic to conserve everything, including fuel!

Common sandpaper is good to use in cleaning suede purses, shoes or jackets. It removes the dirt and freshens the fabric.

Cut off just enough of the corner of the soap box to allow a thin stream of soap to pass through. The larger the opening, the more likely it is that more soap will pour out than is needed.

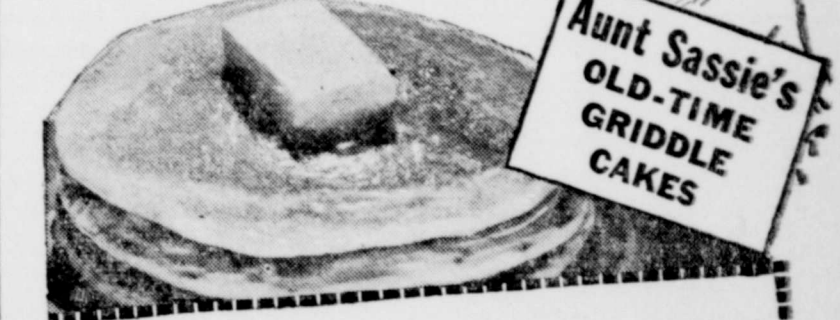

15 to Oct. 15 For Mailing Packages

Instructions for Christmas packages being sent overseas are being issued by the War Relocation Authority. The War Relocation Authority is the agency responsible for the collection, sorting, and mailing of Christmas packages for the Japanese-American evacuees in the United States. The packages must be sent to the War Relocation Authority, 1500 Broadway, New York 19, N. Y. The packages must be sent by the first of October and must not exceed 5 pounds in weight and be not larger than 15 inches in length or 10 inches in length and girth combined. They must be wrapped with heavy paper and with twine. The box must be made of heavy corrugated cardboard or solid fiber board or strong material in order to undergo extensive and rough handling on the way. Fragile articles should be cushioned on all six surfaces with efficient cushioning material.

Discharged Navy Men To Receive New Booklet

Distribution of a booklet published by the Re-training and Re-employment Administration Office of War Mobilization is being made to all discharged Navy personnel of the Eighth Naval District, according to Lieutenant Commander L. H. Rhudy, USNR, District Civil Re-adjustment Officer.

Purpose of the booklet is to give each discharged veteran a quick picture of the rights and benefits available to him and his dependents.

The booklet comprises 20 pages and is divided into three parts. Part one deals with the things he should do immediately after discharge. These include reporting to the selective service board; applying for his old job within 40 days unless he prefers a new one; how payments should be made if he desires to keep his National Service Life Insurance in force; and the keeping of all records, such as serial, service or file number, originals or legal copies of necessary papers.

Part two discusses the benefits to which he is entitled. These include mustering out pay; continuation of government insurance; getting a government job; business training; vocational training; what to do if unemployed how to procure loans for homes, farms or business; procedure for resumption or continuance of education; availability of hospital care and medical aid; disability pensions; care in national soldiers' homes; legal protection; adjustments of income tax payments; claims for back pay; review of discharge; review of retirement; and assistance with special problems.

Part three deals with benefits for dependents under such headings as jobs, pensions, social security benefits, government insurance, vocational training, disabled dependents, death, gratuity, back pay allotments and allowances, prisoners of war and missing in action, and other special problems.

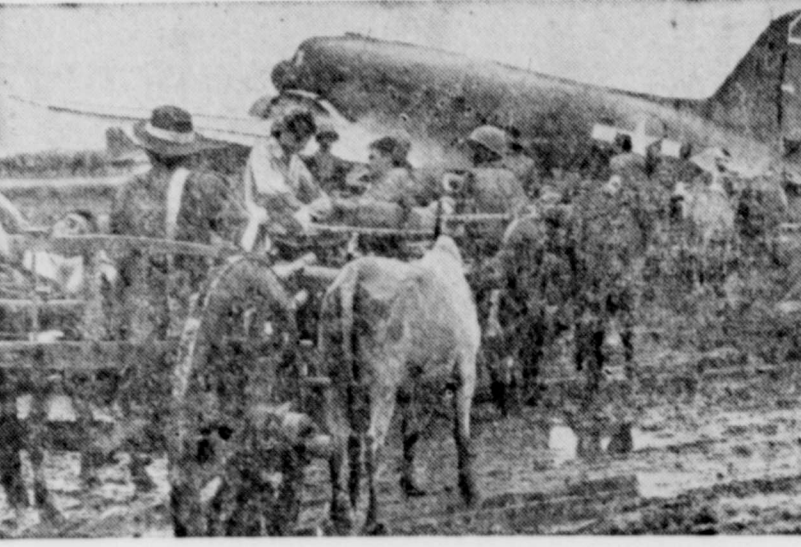

Nazi Armies Fall Back in France; Hitler's Hold on Balkans Shaken; Lend-Lease Totals 28 Billion

EUROPE: Nazis Pull Back

As fast-moving Allied forces pushed the Nazis back throughout all of France, German spokesmen hinted that Hitler's high command planned a withdrawal to the Reich frontier so as to concentrate the greatest number of men on a short line.

But even as the Nazis fell back, swift armored thrusts by the U. S., British and French continued to slash at the harassed enemy's flanks and threaten his encirclement from the rear, and clouds of Allied planes roared over the battle-lines to dip low and gun the retreating German columns.

With the bulk of their forces crowded in the area immediately north and south of Paris, the Germans put up their stiffest rearward resistance in this region. In southern France, Lieut. Gen. Alexander M. Patch's Seventh army fanned out quickly in all directions, with only scattered bands of enemy troops standing up briefly to slow the Allied drive.

After capture of the great French Mediterranean port of Marseille, American engineers went to work quickly to restore facilities damaged by the Germans and enable the Allies to funnel supplies quickly to their armies in the south. Use of Marseille's installations would relieve the troublesome practice of landing supplies on the sandy beaches in shallow-draft craft.

Armistice arrangements for the German evacuation of Paris having fallen through, Free French armored columns were compelled to fight through a screen of Nazi defenders to liberate the city, with heavy U. S. howitzers backing up Gen. Charles de Gaulle's troops, and helping to break enemy resistance. Occupation of Paris with its 3,000,000 people in need of food and fuel for utilities, posed a supply problem for the Allies.

Turbulent Balkans

With formation of a peace government in Rumania, Adolf Hitler's unsteady grip on the turbulent Balkans grew unsteady, with Rumania's defection threatening to topple Germany's whole southeastern front.

As young King Michael announced his country's willingness to accept Allied peace terms, Russia called for Rumania's expulsion of German troops from her homeland, or a war against Hungary to clear the latter from Transylvania, as the price of armistice terms.

Even as Rumania acted to quit Germany, Bulgarian peace proposals reportedly were forwarded to the Allies, who were said to have insisted upon the Bulgars' withdrawal from all occupied Grecian and Yugoslav territory as one of the armistice terms.

To prevent any peace factions from obtaining a grip in Hungary, the Nazi-inspired regime dissolved all political parties, including the conservative elements.

Russ Pressure

Figuring in the Balkan countries' swing toward the Allied camp was the Russians' power-house drive bearing down from northern Rumania.

As the Reds hurled their might at the enemy lines, they bored down on the Galati Gap between the Transylvanian Alps and Black sea, barring the way to the heart of Rumania and the Ploesti oil fields. From this region, there was short going before the Reds would reach the Bulgarian frontier.

POSTWAR PEACE: Powers Confer

Meeting in the quaint, old Dumbarton Oaks estate in Washington, D. C., representatives of the U. S., Britain and Russia began momentous conferences on preserving postwar peace, with emphasis on the need of force as an ultimate resource. China was to join the conference after the Reds had finished their talks, since Russia is not at war with the Japanese and is unwilling to discuss repressive measures against them.

Accepting the invitation of Secretary of State Cordell Hull to discuss postwar peace plans, Gov. Thomas E. Dewey sent John Foster Dulles, his advisor on foreign affairs, to the capital to consult on the conferences. Hull issued his invitation after Dewey expressed concern that the major powers might overlook the interests of the smaller nations.

Although the conferees were said to agree on the principle of employing force to suppress future aggression, plans under discussion called for the use of force only after measures for peaceful settlement had failed.

Charging maintenance of non-competitive rates, prevention of improvements and facilities of western lines, and suppressing development of other forms of transportation, the government filed an anti-trust suit against the Association of American railroads; the Western Association of Railway Executives; 47 railroads; and the investment houses of J. P. Morgan and Company and Kuhn, Loeb and Company.

Focusing its attention on western rail operations, the government declared that establishment of higher rates in that territory than in the east placed it at a competitive disadvantage, retarding its economic growth. The government also claimed that movement of perishable commodities has been delayed by unwillingness to speed up schedules, and efforts have been made to stunt the development of truck and water transport.

In naming J. P. Morgan and Company and Kuhn, Loeb and Company in the suit, the government charged that they controlled major railroad financing and possessed substantial industrial interests in the East.

Declaring that continuation of lend-lease was essential for speedy victory until both Germany and Japan were brought to their knees, President Roosevelt revealed that the U. S. share of such assistance approximated 28 billion dollars up to July 1, while other countries contributed in excess of 3 billion.

Of the 28 billion dollars, Britain received over 9 billion; Australia and New Zealand, 1 billion; Africa, the Middle East and Mediterranean, 3 billion; Russia, almost 6 billion; China and India, 1½ billion, and Latin America, 172 million.

As an indication of the gigantic contribution U. S. industry has made to the war, figures showed that this country lent-leased 11,000 planes and 300,000 trucks and other vehicles to Russia; 6,000 planes and 9,900 tanks to Great Britain, and 4,800 planes, 51,100 tanks and 73,000 trucks and other vehicles to the Mediterranean area.

LEND-LEASE: Aid Mounts

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HIGHLIGHTS . . . in the week's news

USE OF AUTOS: A recent survey discloses that 74 per cent of car owners are driving their autos less than half the peacetime mileage. This reduction has come about through shorter and fewer trips rather than the laying up of cars for the duration. Gasoline and tire rationing have combined with patriotic motives to lessen car use, the survey continued.

TRAP SHOOTING: Capt. Joseph Hiestand of Hillsboro, Ohio, has once again won the North American clay target championship in the 45th Grand American Trapshooting tournament held at Vandalia, Ohio. This is the fourth time he has captured the award, the previous occasions being in 1935, '36, and '38. He broke 200 straight targets to lead the field of entrants.

AGRICULTURE: Seek to Avoid Glut

Looking forward into the postwar world with all of its economic problems, the War Food Administration has sought to develop a procedure designed to avoid the accumulation of vast stores of surplus foods which might constitute a market threat when hostilities cease.

Under WFA plans, the agency now buys food only for foreseeable demands, and declares that any commodities required for relief in liberated countries will first be withdrawn from surplus army and lend-lease stocks before purchases are made in the domestic market.

In establishing a surplus sales division, which is to sell current food stocks when demand is high to make room for fresh supplies, the WFA has set up machinery for future disposals.

World Plans

Drawn up with the avowed ambition of improving the efficiency of farm production and distribution, and bettering the economic conditions of rural populations, plans for a permanent international agricultural organization have been submitted for approval to the 44 United Nations by their food conference committee.

To act in an advisory capacity only, the proposed organization would consist of a governing body in which each nation would be represented, with efforts directed toward promoting research, spreading information and offering recommendations.

Other objectives of the plan include the elevation of nutritional standards throughout the world, and the development of agriculture as a contribution to an overall economic expansion.

PACIFIC: Bombers Active

With thousands of Japanese troops stranded on the enemy's string of outer defense islands from the Solomons down to New Guinea, Gen. Douglas MacArthur's air command concentrated on the bombardment of shipping lanes through which supplies might seep to bolster the sagging garrisons.

At the same time, Adm. Chester Nimitz revealed that navy planes continued their attack upon the strategic Bonin islands, which lie approximately 600 miles from the Japanese mainland and just above the U. S. occupied Marianas, in an effort to soften up these stepping stones to Tokyo.

In pressing their bombardments, General MacArthur's airmen ranged over Mindanao, important basing point for enemy shipping in the southern Philippines.

Fatherly Marines



Having been removed from hillside dugout on Tinian island in the Pacific, these native children were scrubbed clean by battle-hardened but fatherly U. S. Marines, then outfitted with new clothes and sent to rear areas.

WAGES: AFL Wants Boost

Declaring that the President possessed the power to raise wages, and that the stabilization act calling for a balance in the nation's economy afforded him the grounds for such a move, the executive council of the American Federation of Labor asked for abandonment of the "Little Steel" formula, limiting pay increases to 15 per cent of the January, 1941, level.

At the same time, the council chartered the International Office Workers union, which would embrace a vast number of white-collar employees, who, as a class, have felt the squeeze of rising living costs more than any other group, since most wage increases have been enjoyed in the heavier war-boomed industries.

In appealing for higher wages, AFL President William Green declared: "The working men and women of this nation have been made to suffer from a maladjustment that exists between wages and cost of living. This maladjustment has broken and depressed their peacetime standards of living. . ."

U. S. LAND

More than 34 million acres have been acquired by the federal government for war purposes, exclusive of land taken over by the Defense plant corporation, according to Senator O'Mahoney of Wyoming.

The war and navy departments have stated that 6,750,000 acres of their holdings are surplus for postwar purposes. Of this, 1,576,000 acres are tentatively classified as good agricultural land, 2,197,000 acres as grazing land, and 2,107,000 as forest tracts.

Lady, Learn to Cook or Your GI Will Go Home To the Army!

"Sitting by the roadside on a Summer day
"Chatting with my mess-mates, passing time away—
"Singing in the shadows underneath the trees;
"Goodness—how de-li-ci-ous—eating GOOBER PEAS!"

That's an old Civil war song. And it goes to show that in all wars upmost in the soldier's mind is food. I should spell that word with capitals—FOOD.

Zora Layman, the radio and recording artist, sang "Eating Goobers" the other night at a cocktail party. I don't know whether it was her singing or what, but Zora Layman's song practically started a riot. I was the center of it all.

The women at the party began asking me questions. They wanted to know all about Army food. And believe me, I told 'em! I told them both as an ex-Air Corps captain and as the founder of the Society of Amateur Chefs, an exclusive New York club composed of famous men who make a hobby of cooking.

First of all, I explained about this business of KP.

The movies and fiction have painted kaypee mostly as a business of peeling potatoes and cleaning garbage cans. But that's a lot of nonsense. Many soldiers try to get on KP. And why not—the kitchen is one of the warmest spots around the camp in the winter time. The duties are easy enough. And there's always the pick of a well-stocked larder from which to select one's food. I'm not kidding. Instead of being a punishment job handed out by the army to recalcitrants, kaypee is one detail GI Joe doesn't mind.

According to Bill Rhode, who is one of the editors of Gourmet, many of their fan letters come from soldiers and sailors. I had lunch with Bill the other day and he told me how many requests for epicurean recipes there had been from men in the various services. That very day, he'd received a letter from an Admiral asking how to smoke herring.

The slogan, "the best fed Army in the world," has been tossed around a great deal. People don't any longer grasp entirely what it means.

The Army kitchen is no humdrum affair. In many instances it is an electrical job, spic and span, offering an open invitation to good cookery. It has everything in the way of equipment and, believe me, the medical officers see to it that it is as sanitary as a kitchen can possibly be made. No foolin'—you can just about see your face in the bottom of an Army garbage can.

Thousands of Army lads have been carefully trained in cooking, butchering and baking and most of them have become good cooks. Some, at least, have become efficient cooks, although perhaps uninspired. And then, of course, some will never learn. Hence the discrepancy between reports from various camps and units. Some men will rave about the food they enjoyed in their outfit. Others will keep on yearning for Mother's beef stew and apple pie. But, take it from me, very few are telling their pals what a wonderful cook the girl is they left behind.

And there's something else I told the ladies at the cocktail party to ponder over.

Though the Army food wins no squawks, the GIs occasionally yearn for the finer things of life. For instance, a nephew of mine, John Piper, who is an Army pilot somewhere in the South Pacific, upon learning that I was back in New York, wrote to me for a recipe for Wild Duck a la Press. My old mess sergeant, now stationed in a southern climate, inquired as to how to make a tart lime marmalade.

Another inquiry came to me from a service man far away—I'll let you guess—asking how to make "Tulles." These are thin wafers that accompany curry when the latter is served in the elegant manner.

An officer connected with the Army's dietary service told me that he'd had an inquiry from a mess sergeant asking how to make wine out of berries—a reasonable enough request—only the Army doesn't give out with answers to such questions.

They Know Now All Food Doesn't Come Out of Cans!

With repeal came the renaissance of American gastronomy. Slowly, an interest in good food returned. But with the War, millions of boys are learning and discovering that all food does not come out of tin cans. And this interest is growing by leaps and bounds. In camps, soldiers have eaten freshly baked bread and the old "cotton wadding" type of bread from the corner grocery store won't have much appeal to these boys in the future.

Back home for a rest after 22 months service in the Asiatic theatre, is Pfc. Joe Pyles of Mansfield.

And fighting the Japs in the Jungles of Assam are two Texas generals—Maj. Gen. Howard Davidson, commanding the Tenth Air Force, and Brig. Gen. Aubrey Moore, the Tenth's chief of staff. General Davidson's home is Wharton. Both generals are graduates of Texas A & M.

And on the Texas home front, plans are swiftly taking shape for the state-wide drive on behalf of the National War Fund. Wayland D. The campaign will open on October 10th.

Breakfast Is Important Meal

"Breakfast should supply everyone young and old alike, with one-fourth to one-third of the day's food needs," says Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. "In order for a growing child to get this much of his day's requirements, he needs a hot substantial breakfast consisting of cereals or whole grain bread, fruit juices, egg or meat, and milk drink."

Dr. Cox discussing the dietary needs of school children says further, "In many homes the line of least resistance is followed. The children when offered food at breakfast time may reply that they are not hungry, they do not have time, or in some instances will even say that breakfast makes them sick. Older children, especially girls of high school age, sometimes deliberately go without breakfast in order to keep from increasing their weight. This is both foolish and dangerous. They deprive themselves of body building materials when they fail to eat nourishing food. Faulty nutrition with its health hazards often results. In the young child this means that resistance to disease is lowered and the process for developing and maintaining health definitely are handicapped.

"Whether young, middle aged, or older, a good health practice is to break your fast with a good breakfast. The day's first meal is an important one. Parents cannot escape the obligation to see that their children are fed properly at the day's beginning."

Opportunity Offered 17 Year Old Boys

Seventeen year-old boys who enlist in the Navy at the present time are offered a splendid opportunity to receive valuable training as Navy radio technicians. It was pointed out today by Lt. Comdr. L. H. Ridout, Jr., Officer in charge of the Dallas Navy Recruiting District.

Under a comparatively new plan, each applicant is given the opportunity to take the "Eddy" test—an examination covering basic mathematics, fundamental electricity, elementary physics, practical shopwork and simple radio.

If successful in passing the "Eddy" test, the applicant is entitled in the Navy as Seaman 1st class, Radio Technician, and given a number of months of training in radio. The Seaman First Class rating and pay corresponds to those of a corporal in the army, which is an excellent beginning for a youngster 17 years old.

Radio technicians have many important duties in the Navy, such as installing and repairing radio communication equipment, and other extraordinary electronic devices.

Upon release from the Navy after the war, the radio technician will find countless new opportunities open to him. He will have a thorough groundwork in radio and electronics. He will be qualified for many positions in such fields as television, industrial electronics, and other scientific occupations.

Seventeen-year-old boys inter-

ested in the field of radio and electronics are urged to visit the nearest Navy Recruiting Station at once. Men 18 to 38 years of age can be given the Eddy test at the Navy Recruiting Station only after induction and assignment to the Navy.

Trees In Our Eyes And Hair - If Any

Anyone over four feet tall who tried to walk down one of our sidewalks in the residential section of town will know what we are talking about—Trees.

A tall man going down most any of our walks takes on the appearance of an ape escaped from a zoo as he gropes through the maze of limbs which always seem eager to snatch one's hat and glasses off and then for good measure swat one's face and box one's ears.

We are not advocating revengeful use of saw or ax. We have had time to cool off since our last encounter with said low-hanging limbs. But—some careful pruning here and there, or anywhere, so far as that is concerned, would do much to soothe the wounds of those who have many times come out second best in an argument over right-of-way with a tree.

A number of beautiful trees grace the homes and walks of this city. Wouldn't some planned pruning be better than the reckless acts of an enraged, impulsive limb-dodger?

Rats Are Carriers Of Many Diseases

Because of the economic losses they cause to industry and commerce and the annoyance they create in homes, rats have been considered a serious menace to mankind since long before their role as vectors of disease was understood. Today at least six diseases which are transmitted to man from the rat are known to medical science, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. These diseases include the dread plague, typhus, trichinosis, a form of jaundice, tapeworm, and food poisoning. The whole history of the role rats play in the transmission of disease remains as yet unknown.

"It is necessary to public health Dr. Cox said that a continuous rat control program be maintained in every urban and rural area throughout Texas. This is of especial importance on farms where rats may flourish by feeding on grain and other farm products."

The doctor points out that rats, like other living things, require food and shelter if they are to propagate and increase in number. Destroying their shelter and breeding places include the employing of ratproof design in buildings, the use of ratproof materials in construction, employing ratproof methods of construction and installation, and providing for periodic inspection of buildings insure permanent safety. This program will force the rat into the open where its destruction may be accomplished.

Of equal importance as a control measure is the elimination of all food supplies. This consists of storing all foods in ratproof buildings or in ratproof containers, the proper storage and disposal of garbage, and careful feeding of stock to prevent waste feed from being picked up by the rats.

By observing these control measures, the community will benefit not only in the eradication of a nuisance and economic menace but in improved health conditions and the prevention of rat-borne diseases.

THE UNITED STATES is winning a war for humanity in 1944 as a direct result of what our pioneer ancestors did in 1776. This nation has had 168 years of freedom. Its citizens (its fighters abroad and its workers at home) have, to their certain advantage, 168 years of experience at minding their own business and taking care of themselves under a system of free enterprise. It's a great asset.

Bragging about ancestors was never a habit of mine but this year, along with millions of other citizens of the United States, I am glad my grandfather's great-grandfather was a free man. Do you wonder what he ever did for me that did me any good? Just this: He taught my grandfather's grandfather to love liberty. He taught his son the responsibilities of freedom. These ideas gained strength until I picked it up from my dad.

Used to OF COURSE this freedom would have but little value if it were exclusive to the Bensons, but it's not. There were 16 young men, back in 1776, who could qualify as my grandfather's great-grandfather and they have a lot of posterity by now. Besides, they all had liberty-loving friends that memorable year of independence, comrades in arms perhaps. Together they laid the foundation of the world's greatest nation.

Getting used to civil liberty takes time, perhaps as much time as getting used to slavery. Usually it takes a liberated nation longer than one man's life-span to

become adjusted to freedom. But our freedom came six generations ago and it's certainly being useful now. The U. S., currently making half the world's war material, has done more in three years than our enemies did in 23 years.

Staying PAISING, training and Prepared equipping a huge army for a fast-moving war has been Germany's everyday task since World War I officially ended. The Japs have been prowling around civilized countries marking the soft spots longer than that. Meanwhile America all but forgot the other war and went ahead learning and building, buying and selling with malice toward none.

Hitler figured the sturdy and warlike people, could conquer the world if they all had his objective. As a ruler he disciplined them to obey him, but he is making them fail. Obedience is important but Hitler knows now that it's no substitute for wit. This is a war of iron-rod discipline against personal liberty and the personal ability that grows out of liberty. Who's winning?

Free enterprise is military preparedness. In the "dictator countries" people forget how to think because their centralized governments think for them. Thinkers get scarce while the masses grow torpid from being bullied. In America, free minds whetted daily in open competition get brighter and more competent. The American system qualifies people to live in peace and plenty; in safety, too, because alert people can meet emergencies.
