Business to use inmates from county jail

A new 6,000 square foot building is now under construction just south of the Red River County Jail in Clarksville. After completion a business owned by Uniglobe Destiny of Dallas will occupy the space. Inmates from Wisconsin currently being jailed in Red River County will provide the man power to operate the business.

The business is like a travel agency, taking calls from customers group such as religious groups to book various types of trips, etc. Only incoming calls can be taken by the inmates according to Red River County Judge L.D. Williamson. Information taken by the inmates will be passed on to the main office in Dallas where it will be handled.

Approximately 40 inmates will be paid minimum wage for their services. From their wages the inmates will pay the county \$8 per day per inmate.

The rest of their salaries will be used to pay for court costs, contribute

to the crime compensation fund and they can send some of the money they earn to their families.

Judge Williamson explained that inmates from Wisconsin will be used on the project because they will be serving 1 to 2 year terms which make it worthwhile for Uniglobe to train them.

The price tag for the building is estimated at approximately \$150,000. It should be completed by the end of February, ready for Uniglobe to install their equipment.

Judge Williamson project that the building can be paid for in one to one and one half years with 40 inmates working each day.

The work projects is part of the Prison Inmates Enhancement Program, better known as PIE. It is available for certified counties. Judge Williamson states he has worked to get the county certified so that it can be eligible for such projects.

Check phone bill carefully for unwanted charges

It has been reported to the newspaper that there is phone "slamming" (switching long distance services without notifying customers) taking place in this area currently. The person reporting says that nearly \$20 a month in charges were added to their business phone bill when they had not spoken with anyone on the phone about switching long distance services.

Billing from Integretel, Inc. and American Nortel Ld. appeared on a local business's phone bill last month. They report that the number to call to try and get these charges removed is 1-800-736-7500, but they had difficulty.

The best way to avoid problems with type of thing is to check the monthly phone bill very carefully and take action about anything not authorized on a bill.

Construction of reservoir seems far in future

Marvin Nichols Reservoir, if and when it is completed, will cover 100,000 acres. It will be located with Talco nestled on an island in the center of what will be the largest reservoir in this part of the state. The question locals are asking is, WHEN will it be built.

According to surface water engineer Richard Brown, the latest water plan submitted in August 1997 recommended that the reservoir be built in the years 2020-2040 to provide water for the Dallas Metroplex area. Obviously, this is far enough in the future to not concern most citizens.

If the metroplex decides to build the reservoir, it will probably be built in two parts, according to Brown. The norther part would be built first with a dam being constructed on Sulphur River north of Talco.

The second part would be constructed some years later, depending on what degree the need for water might be at that time. The second half would mean building a dam on White Oak Creek.

At some time in the future if both halves of the reservoir are completed, it would take in parts of Red River, Titus and Franklin counties.

The reservoir, if built by utility groups from Dallas, would be regulated by the builder. If the water was needed locally, the something would have to be negotiated with them at that time.

Each five to six years a new regional water plan is drafted by the Texas Water Development Board, according to Brown. Since the last one was a little late, the next one will be planned for five years from 1997.

The state doesn't build the reservoirs, but plans and recommends. It is up to some other group to fund the construction.

The Nichols reservoir has been in the planning stages since the mid 1960's and isn't that close to becoming a reality yet.

So, for now, it's best not to make plans for a bait shop or boat dock on Lake Marvin Nichols, it looks like it will be high and dry for a while longer.

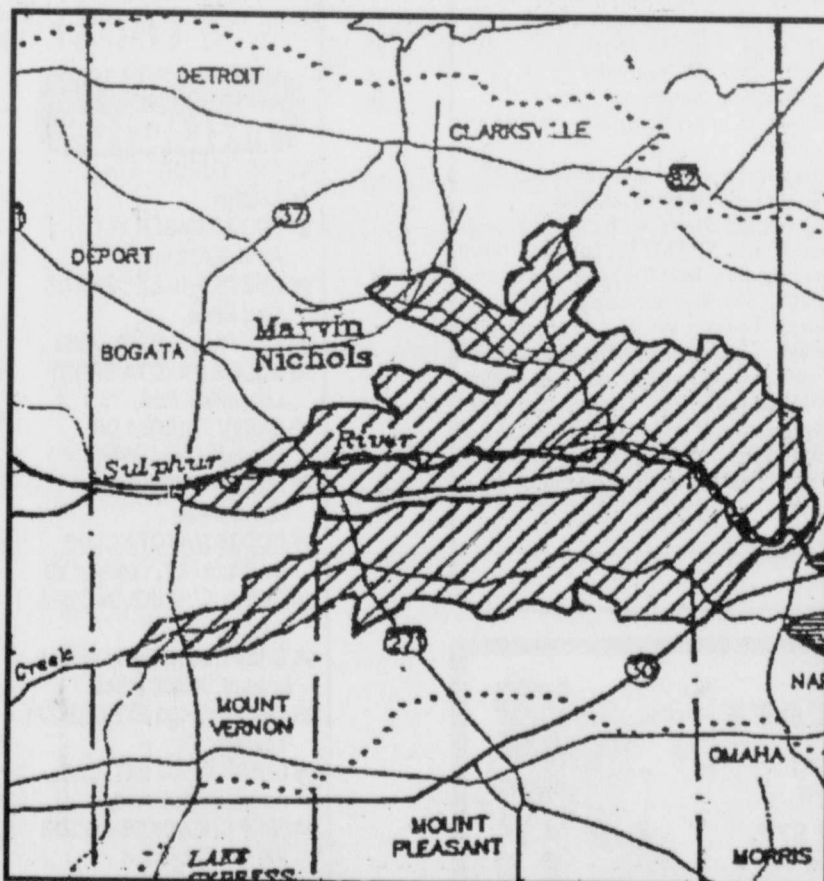


NEW BUILDING-this building near Red River County Jail will be used by company to house a business which will utilize inmates from the jail. (Staff Photo by Thomas Nichols)

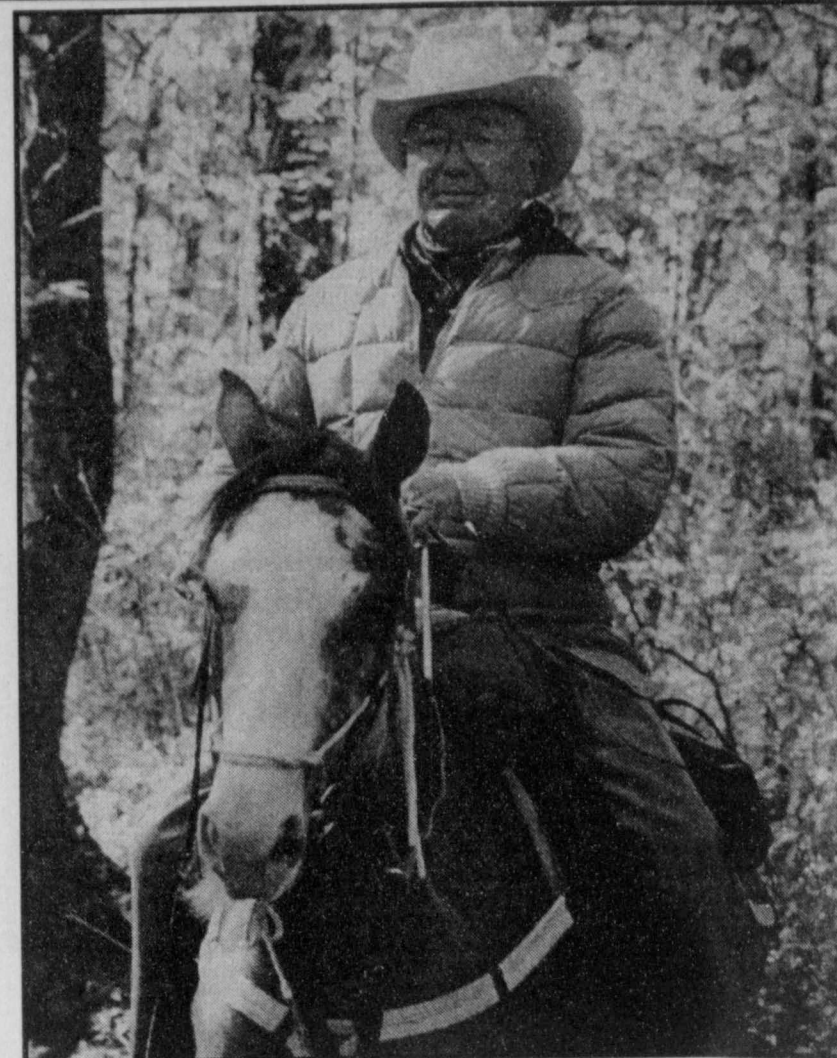

Johnny Hawks elected to board

In October 1997 a dedicated group of Equestrians met at Austin to voice the need for more additional places on which to ride and try to stop the reduction of places they already have access to.

Over the years Equestrians of all types have chafed at both the perceived need for additional places on which to ride as well as attempts made to reduce access to existing areas. At issue was access to both public and private lands. At the meeting with the Texas Parks and wildlife Department in Austin. They recognized need for a statewide group to represent equine interests with a more powerful voice.

During this meeting, Bill Miller, an ardent trail rider from East Texas, met with Dr. Doug Householder, to urge the need for more trails in state parks for equestrian use. Texas Parks and Wildlife suddenly heard from equine owners about being omitted from State Park activities.

In November representatives from across Texas met at College Station to develop a Mission, By Laws and a

name for this new organization. By the end of the second day a new organization to help Texas saddle up and ride across the Lone Star State had been born. Due to a co-operative move between the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, The Texas Equestrian Trail Riders Association is looking to cultivate this rapidly growing group.

Texas was divided into 12 regions with a director for each region.

At the first meeting in 1998 at College Station, Johnny Hawks, of Bogata, was elected to be region 5 director. Several hundred equestrians attended this meeting. On January 17, 1998 Johnny drew a 2 year term. This meeting was attended by several from this area. Attending from Bogata were Johnny and Muri Hawks and Carlton and June Stanley. Among the groups present were Endurance Riders, Competition Trail Riders, General Trail Riding People and Organized Trail Groups including Wagoneers.

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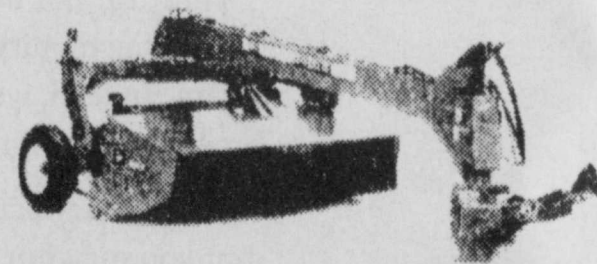
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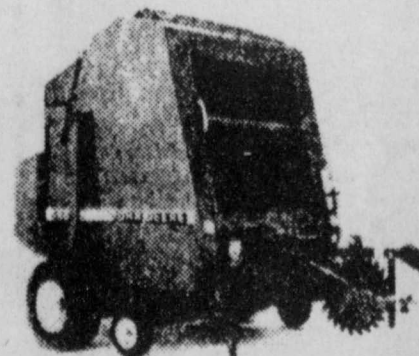
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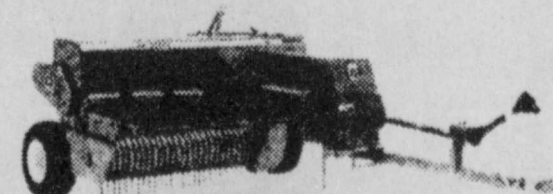
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Rivercrest teams travel to Honey Grove
