MEET DEATH ON GRADE CROSSING

A car occupied by Mrs. C. E. Schuster, Mrs. J. Frank and two children was hit by the coming in Hi-Line train at a grade crossing about 8 miles north and west of Shattuck Tuesday afternoon. The women evidently did not hear the approaching train and drove on the track right in front of the train, the engine struck the car about midway and dragging it some distance down the track. The car was completely demolished. Mrs. Schuster was thrown on one side of the track and Mrs. Frank and the babies on the other. Mrs. Frank was driving the car and Mrs. Frank was sitting in the back seat with the children. Mrs. Schuster died, it is claimed in 14 minutes after the accident occurred. Mrs. Frank was unconscious for probably two hours and the children were slightly hurt. Mrs. Schuster was the wife of C. E. Schuster, the section foreman and was 22 years of age. She leaves the husband and one child. It was a sad accident and the whole community was shocked at its occurrence. The burial of Mrs. Schuster was had from the Mason undertaking rooms yesterday afternoon. The other injured ones are at the Shattuck hospital where the report is that they are improving.—Shattuck Monitor.

LUBBOCK'S LOW TAX RATE CHEAP ELECTRIC POWER

The mayor and city commission met August 25th in the city and fixed the tax rate for Lubbock, making the same rate as we had last year of \$1.25 on the hundred. The revenue from the municipal light plant will be approximately \$65,000, with fuel of \$12,000 and salaries of all city officers in all the departments of \$27,000.00, which will leave a net income, after extension of lines, etc. of approximately \$26,000.00.

The city of Lubbock has one of the best municipal light plants in the State of Texas, with a maximum rate of 10c per k. w. h., graduating to a 5c rate, according to the amount of "juice" used. They have a power rate of 2c per k. w. h. and a cooking rate of 4c. In excess of 200 of only 3c per k. w. h.

The excellent showing the municipal light plant has made shows that the financial end has been taken care of by the city commission, which shows them to be business men. With Martin S. Ruby as city manager, Lubbock is assured of not only cheap rates but excellent service.—Slaton Slatonite.

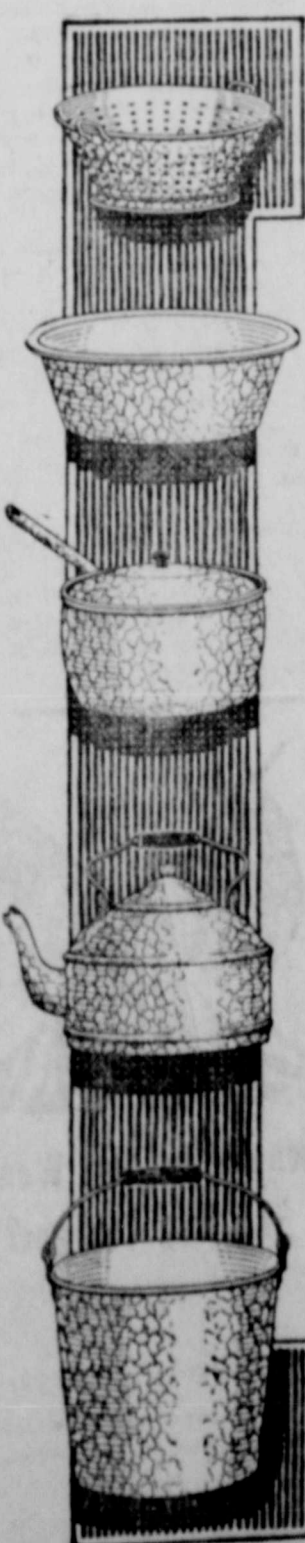

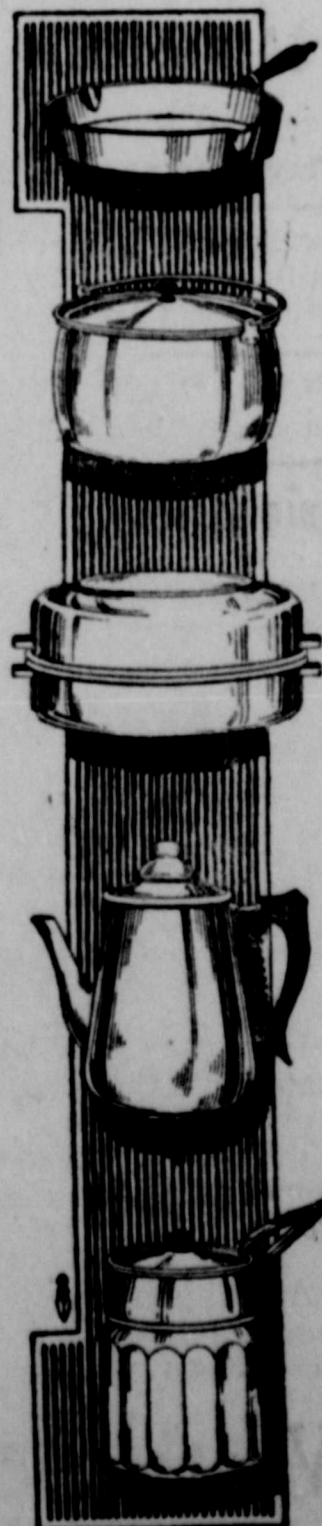

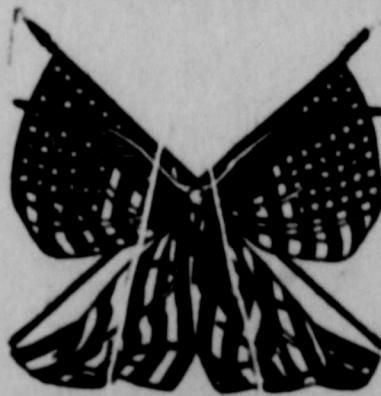
