Mrs. Shannon Dies Of Injuries

The third fatality from a two-car crash Tuesday afternoon of last week near Reno on US Hwy 82, occurred Saturday morning. Mrs. W. A. Shannon, 65, Rt. 2, Paris, died in L. P. McCushton Hospital from injuries received in the wreck.

Chapel service for Mrs. Shannon was held Monday at 10:30 a. m. at Fry & Gibbs Funeral Home.

The Rev. Stanley Shannon, Mrs. Shannon's step-grandson, officiated, interment being in Sylvan Cemetery.

The former Mrs. Myrtle Clara (Sturdivant) Riggs, Mrs. Shannon was born Jan. 31, 1900, and reared in Grayson County, being a daughter of Dee and Mollie (James) Sturdivant.

She moved to Blossom about 1921 and had lived at Sylvan since she and Mr. Shannon were married in August, 1951.

He survives, though injured severely in the crash which caused her death, and those of James Edward (Jimmy) Jones, 20, Detroit, and Jerry Wayne Melton, 18, Detroit, Rt. 2.

Mrs. Shannon leaves also three children: Mrs. Austin Lane of Blossom, Mrs. J. T. York of Amarillo, and Roy E. Riggs of Irving; 25 other descendants; a sister, Mrs. Sallie Fannin of Avery, and five brothers: Dewey and Charles Sturdivant of Dallas, Jim, Kenneth and DeRoy Sturdivant of DeKalb.

An election on consolidation of Hagansport School District with Talco District was set for Dec. 3.

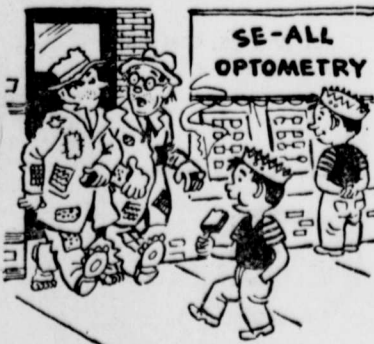

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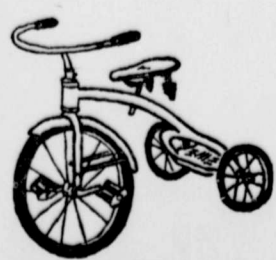
