NEW ENGLAND GETS WARNING OF FLOODS

(By International News Service)
BOSTON, Nov. 18.—While the Vermont legislature is receiving its official call for a special session to devise ways and means of providing flood relief funds, a new warning is being issued over the stricken area this morning. Continued rains were sending many of the streams out of their banks, causing much anxiety. The Winooski River, which did terrific havoc a week ago, is again rising. The New Hampshire legislature has also been called in special session to consider flood relief.

SPRINGFIELD, Mass., Nov. 18.—A mile and a half of double track on the Boston & Maine Railroad was washed out at Westminster, Vermont today, in the new flood menace to the New England states and eastern and northern New York. The track was being repaired following the disastrous floods of two weeks ago.

FIRST HUNTERS GET FOUR DEER

The first party of hunters returning from the ranging fields of the deer passed through Ballinger Thursday evening from near the Schreiner preserve in the hilly country to the south of Ballinger with four fine bucks. The hunters were out only one day and each bagged a nice buck. The party was composed of H. J. Hodge, of Abilene, who killed a 10-point buck; J. H. Hodge, Winters, 8-point buck; L. B. Wofford, Chillicothe, a 6-point buck; and W. N. Wofford, Abilene, a 9-point buck. J. H. "Shorty" Hodge once lived here, and he and H. J. Hodge are brothers of Mrs. W. D. Seales of this city. These are the first returning deer hunters and they had exceptionally good luck, according to the evidence. The deer season opened on Wednesday, November 16, and many hunters were found on the grounds ready for action. Several parties have left from Ballinger for the hunting grounds but have not yet returned. A party of hunters from near Trent passed through Ballinger Friday at noon from the Mason country. They had seven fine bucks and reported exceptionally good luck for the first two days of the season. Turkey hunters were also passing through the city Friday with good bags. The wild turkey season also opened on Nov. 16.

BAPTISTS SCORE WET CANDIDATES

WICHITA FALLS, Nov. 18.—The Baptist General Convention of Texas today unanimously adopted a resolution opposing the candidacy for state or federal office of any avowed wet when it passed a resolution sponsored by Arthur J. Barton, of Atlanta, Georgia. The resolution was embodied in the report on civic righteousness and social life. President Pat M. Neff in a lengthy address declared that the atmosphere of Texas is "saturated with lawlessness." He stated that laws were crippled by laws making it practically impossible for the apprehension of bootleggers and the seizure of stills. Neff stated that youth is taking to crime as "the easiest vocation."

WICHITA FALLS, Nov. 18.—Mineral Wells was chosen as the 1928 meeting place of the Texas Baptist General Convention. Baylor University trustees were increased from 21 to 27 members at the annual convention being held here.

COURT KNOCKS OUT OIL LAW

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18.—The decision of the Supreme Court of Mexico yesterday knocking out the allegedly confiscatory features of the Mexican petroleum law in granting the Mexican Petroleum Company's injunction "opens the way to an immediate temporary adjustment and possibly an ultimate solution of our controversy with Mexico over the petroleum law," Secretary of State Frank P. Kellogg indicated today in commenting on the ruling. Some of the officials expressed disappointment that the court did not issue a single sweeping decision declaring retroactive articles of the oil law unconstitutional.

The train's entire military escort of 32 was wiped out, eighteen passengers and the engineer and fireman were killed by the rebels.

SUICIDE STATISTICS SHOW HUNGARY LEADS IN SELF DESTRUCTION

(By International News Service)
BERLIN, Nov. 18. — Of all European nations Hungarians are most, Greeks least inclined to throw away their lives, according to the latest suicide statistics. Germany, which so far, was on top of the list, ranks second in the new statistics, right ahead of the Czechoslovak Republic.

With the exception of Ireland and Italy, statistics show that people in Northern Europe, heavy thinkers and as a rule, pessimists, figure most prominently in the list of self murderers, while the natives of the sunny South seem to cling to their lives.

In the following list the total of suicides in proportion to 10,000 of population is annually: Hungary, 2.7; Germany, 2.6; Czechoslovakia, 2.5; Switzerland, 2.4; Austria, 2.4; Freestate Dantzig, 2.3.

In proportion to 100,000 of population the annual total of suicides in other European countries is as follows: Sweden, 1.6; Denmark, 1.5; Italy, .9; Lithuania, .5; Spain, .4; Ireland, .3; Greece, .2.

The latter list proves that suicides are almost unknown in a certain number of European countries.

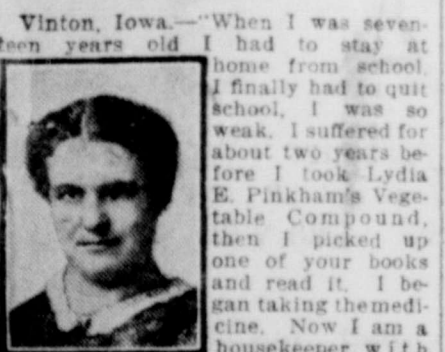

Winter War On Booze Running Will Continue

CLEVELAND, O., Nov. 18.—War against rum runners from Canada to the states will not cease with the freezing of Lake Erie, according to Robert H. Burri, head of the border patrol, established in Cleveland last spring, as an arm of the federal customs service.

When Lake Erie becomes closed to boats the border patrol of 16 men will leave their ships and man a fleet of autos, patrolling the highways instead of the lake. This announcement came as the first of a number of confiscated high-powered cars were sent to garages for overhauling and general tuning up.

Rum runners who have been using Lake Erie to bring their contraband into Ohio ports, will start trucking it through from Detroit when the lake freezes, according to Burri, who declares the Detroit River will not freeze.

Winter, in the past, has been a boon to rum runners, as they have not been watched so closely. Burri points out.

Practically all of Cleveland's supply of better grades of illicit liquor comes from Canada via Detroit by trucks in the winter, from the same combine which uses Lake Erie during the summer.

An ice trail over Lake Erie will be watched by a special detail of border patrol men, once the ice is heavy enough to support the weight of vehicles. This is known as Wagon Track, near Port Clinton, a trail over the ice from Pelee and Middle Islands. Rum runners haul liquor along this trail in wagons and sleds, it is alleged.

BRITAIN MAKES NEW BOMBING AIRPLANES

LONDON, Nov. 18. — New Hawker Rolls-Royce daylight bombing airplanes to the value of more than \$2,500,000 are now being made for the Air Ministry.

They are to form the equipment of four squadrons of the Air Home Defense Force. To allow for adequate reserves between 70 and 80 machines are required at an approximate cost of \$35,000 each.

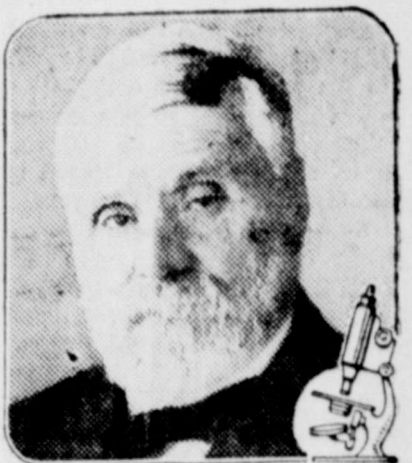

ered to be potentially one of the
richest fields in Texas, Mr. Car-
ter said. The gas business will be
greatly benefitted both for the
producer and distributor, with a
further guarantee to domestic
consumers of a plentiful supply,
he declared.

The monetary consideration in-
volved in the deal was not given
out by Mr. Carter, who has been
actively engaged in the natural
gas industry in central West
Texas for some time.

Owned Considerable Production
The Western Gas Service Com-
pany, in which Carter held ma-
jority stock control, owned con-
siderable production on the
Morris ranch in northern Cole-
man county and had contracted
with M. G. Cheney for 10,000,000
cubic feet daily from a well eight
miles south of Coleman. The deal
was consummated through Frank
Long, division superintendent for
the Oklahoma Natural Gas Com-

pany, it was reported from Cole-
man.

In addition to the ample supply
sold by Carter, the trunk line
leading from Coleman county to
San Angelo, with the distribu-
tion systems in the cities along
the line are also involved in the
deal. The Western Gas Service
Company is sole distributor of
fuel gas in Miles, Rowena and
San Angelo, while the Lone Star
Gas Company also operates in
Ballinger.

Barney Carter is one of the
most active oil and gas operators
in West Texas. His successful
career began following several

Moslem Women in Syria Shed Veils

JERUSALEM, Nov. 18.—
Moslem women of Syria, Pales-
tine and other countries in this
part of the world formerly under
the rule of the Sultans, are show-
ing a marked interest in educa-
tion.

Inspired by the example of the
women of Turkey, where with
the shedding of the veil women
are beginning to prepare for
public life in all its branches,
Mohammedan girls in fanatic-
ridden Damascus have ventured
within the last month to appear
on the street with uncovered
faces, on their way to apply for

admission in the Medical College.
The appearance of three women
unveiled and unescorted pro-
duced a sensation. On hearing
of it pious Moslems sent their
wives first to remonstrate and
then to drive back by force the
impious women.

Damascus, however, was in for
even a greater shock when it was
learned that the girls had tried to
enter the medical school.

Next to Damascus, Jerusalem
remains the center of 100 per-
cent Mohammedanism so far as
women are concerned. The fez
and the veil, symbols of Turkish
nationalism and Moslem piety,
both of which have been
scrapped in Constantinople and
throughout New Turkey, con-
tinue to be worn by Moslems in
the Holy City.

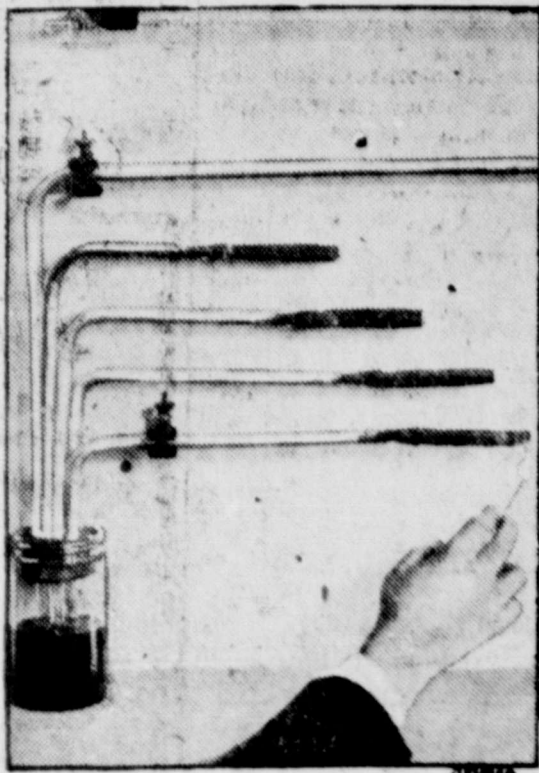

Erratic Whims of Consumers Rule U. S. Tobacco Business



WASHINGTON, Nov. 18.—It costs producers and manufacturers thousands of dollars a year to oblige the American tobacco trade with definite and fantastic fallacies, self-imposed and assiduously preserved.

Fully 99 per cent of the consumers, government investigators declare, are positive, without research or reason, that color is an index to the smoking qualities of a cigar. They associate a "light" wrapper with a clear, even ash, low nicotine content, and aromatic excellence.

In Connecticut and Florida the growers respond by shading wrapper tobacco to get a rich but light hue. They spend from \$500 to \$800 an acre to stretch cloth over acres of stout wires and tall poles. Protected from the burning heat of the sun, tobacco leaves mature with a delicate color, guaranteeing the farmer a price that may climb as high as \$4 a pound. One acre may produce 1,000 pounds, and one pound enough leaf to wrap 500 cigars.

The project is a gamble. High wind or fire, constantly a danger, may ruin the entire crop, or at least minimize the opportunity to produce the desired color if the thin tent is lost in flames or demolished by storm. Once de-

stroyed, it cannot be replaced profitably in one season.

Where successful, the equipment may stand for an indefinite period. Covering the entire field of tobacco, the cloth is stretched high enough to permit free cultivation. Its texture is as strong as is conducive to the penetration of all sunshine necessary to plant growth.

The color delusion, tobacco

specialists say, was preceded by an equally extravagant theory that "frog eye" spots on wrapper indicated fine quality. The spots, resembling the circular construction of a frog's eye, were peculiar to Florida products, and the result of a fungus disease that appeared in no other section. The trade swung to speckled cigars and New England growers, exercising the native ingenuity that

give rise to wooden nutmegs, began spraying their tobacco with caustic. The practice was prolific of freckles, but discovery that the spots were manufactured led to a disastrous market reaction.

Whims of the smoker are expressed in the sales psychology of the cigar makers. For a time their highest paid employees were put to grading and graduating cigars in the box according to color. Now intricate machinery makes selection with a truer relation to blend than it is possible for human eyes to detect, and arranges them in the box so that the buyer sees only his favorite color.

Federal specialists study every phase of manufacture by a water-siphon process that smokes cigars mechanically. Made of tubes and glass jars, the equipment produces a vacuum as water escapes at regulated intervals, and the suction has the same effect on the cigar as the natural operation. It affords opportunity to study combinations of wrapper, binder, and filler, with a view to selecting and recommending to manufacturers those which seem superior in all the recognized qualities.

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River Trac Lower P for Mi

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River Trade to Lower Prices for Mid-West

By Mauritz A. Hallgren
(International News Service Staff Correspondent)

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18.—Lower prices on the articles the Middle Western farmer buys and increased returns on the products he sells are certain to follow the expansion of the Inland Waterways Corporation's barge lines on the upper Mississippi River, Secretary of War Davis declared here after returning from an inspection trip along the St. Louis-St. Paul route.

Cities in that section are of the same opinion, he added, and are now building permanent terminals to handle commerce along the river.

Boom River Freight

When the upper Mississippi line is fully equipped, as it will be with the completion of several contracts next spring, Davis said, "and gateways are opened thru the Twin Cities of St. Paul and Minneapolis, Burlington, Rock Island and Dubuque, manufactured articles which now find their way into the west at high prices, will find their way into the cities, the towns and the homes of every city located west of the Mississippi at a greatly reduced freight rate, due to new joint rail-water rates not now in existence.

"Conversely, the farmers of the west and the northwest will find an additional means of distributing their grain and farm products for consumption east of the Mississippi.

Competition for Farmers

"When these avenues of cheaper transportation exist, these farmers may expect to compete for export of corn with South America, and for export of wheat with Canada, and in addition to those served by the existing lines, thousands will enjoy the benefits of cheaper coal and coke, cheaper steel products, linseed oil and by-products, linseed meal and cake, so essential to beef and milch cattle, cheaper furniture woods and furniture, cheaper sulphur, coffee, sugar, cotton, tobacco, sisal, hemp, jute, agricultural implements, fertilizers, potash and nitrates, phosphates, strap molasses for stock food plants, oyster shells and by-products, so essential to poultry, and eventually petroleum products.

"These represent but a brief synopsis of the practical benefits to the farmer of the operation of the Inland Waterways Corporation."

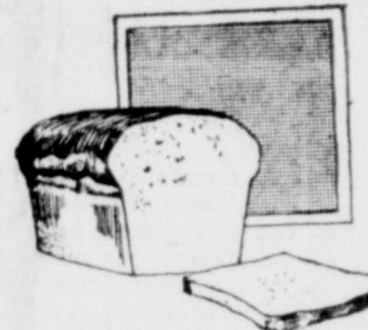

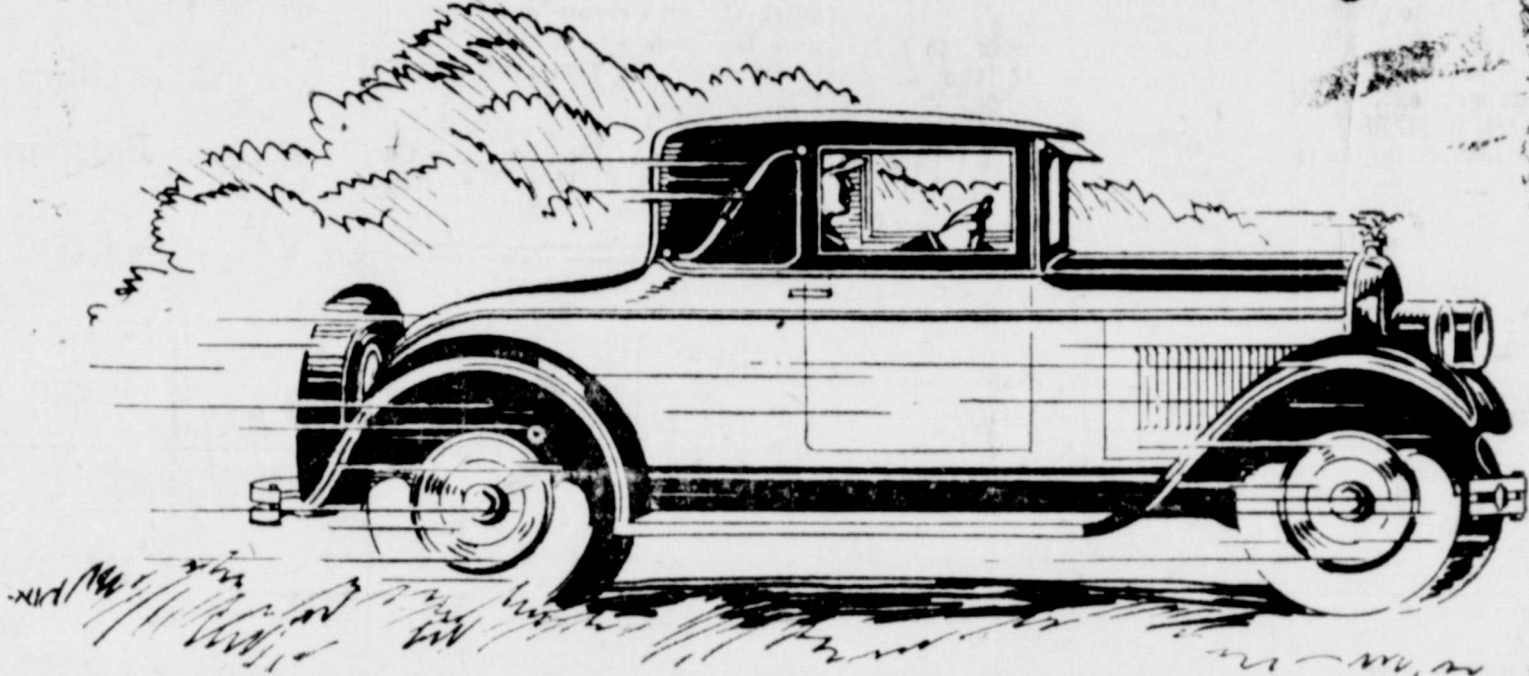

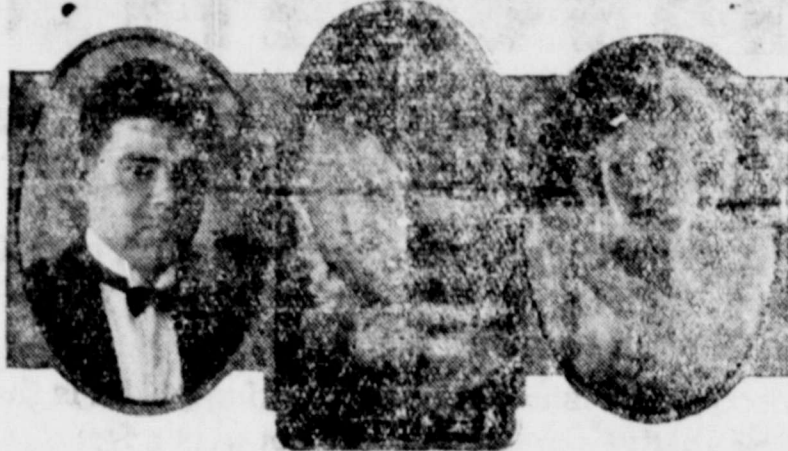
