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C-City teens steer clear of dangerous situations

Teens in the driver's seat; Ask the parent of just about any teenager and they will tell you the phrase conjures images more disturbing and frightening than anyone should ever be forced to witness.

Yet two Colorado City teens are using these same words to inspire their fellow young drivers to think before they get behind the wheel of a car. Kristee Barnett and Mandy Scott, members of Family Career & Community Leaders of America (FCCLA), are using the phrase as a calling card for their ongoing project within the organization.

"One of my friends had just received a Minor in Consumption ticket," Kristee Barnett said, speaking on the genesis of the project. "And when another friend was charged with a DWI, it hit me pretty hard."

Barnett began warning friends,

fellow students and anyone who would listen about not being alert behind the wheel of a vehicle. Discussions — perhaps more often than not, debates — on drinking and driving, texting while driving, etc. with classmates became the norm as the desire to keep her friends out of harm's way was forced to the forefront in the teenager's life.

At the suggestion of teacher Judy Merrell, Barnett, along with FCCLA member Mandy Scott, decided to use the slogan as the passion to feed their FCCLA project.

Today, a minivan which has been rolled several times, sits in front of Colorado High School to remind young drivers to pay attention when they are behind the wheel of a vehicle.

The duo, along with guest speakers are currently targeting freshman students at Colorado ISD, hoping to

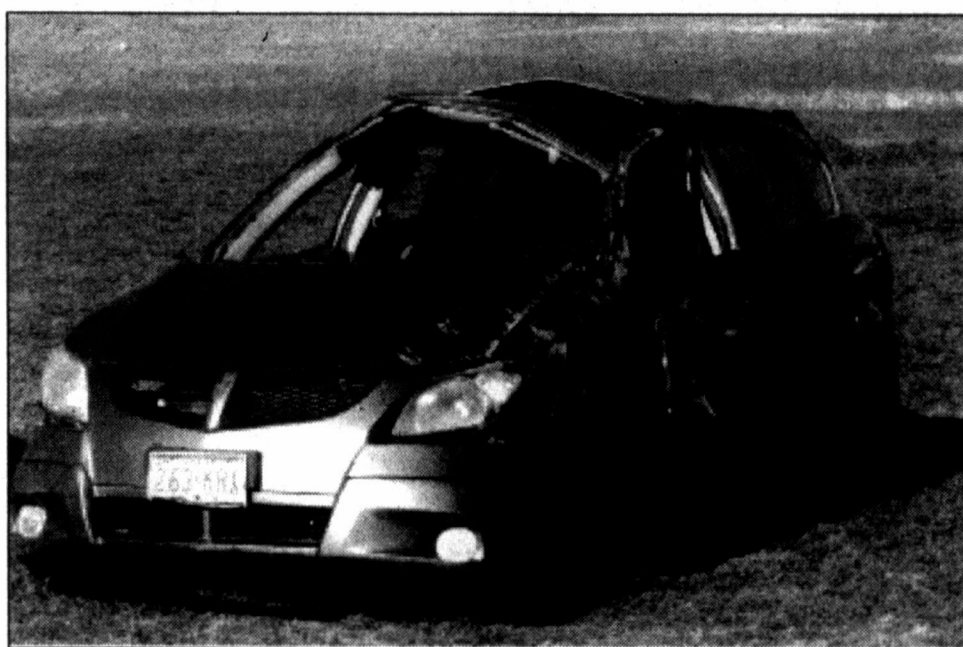
catch them before they start driving and warn them of just some of the dangers they will face if they do not keep their attention on the road.

Teens in the Driver's Seat will be heading to regional competition March 2 at Abilene Christian University, where the top two projects will earn a right to advance to state competition in Dallas.

Barnett says the competition is great and gives them a chance to get the word out to more young drivers, but her first thought will always be with those drivers she sees every day at Colorado ISD.

"There has been an increase in DUI's, MIP's, MIC's and no seatbelt tickets issued to students at Colorado ISD," Barnett said.

"We just want them to stop and think before they get behind the wheel. After all, they are in the driver's seat."

Kampfer seen in Raton, New Mexico

Colorado City Manager Pete Kampfer was in Raton, New Mexico Tuesday, expected to sign a contract to become the city's new city manager.

Kampfer was in negotiations with the city of Raton four months ago, but pulled out when certain details could not be worked out. Raton hired another man for the position, but has since relieved him of his duties and refocused their attention on Kampfer, calling him last Wednesday, Jan. 25.

In a unanimous decision, the Raton City Commissioners approved the hiring of Kampfer with a 4-0 vote, along with the changes he had originally wanted in the contract.

Kampfer has been the city manager of Colorado City since October of 2009.

Raton City Commissioner Charles Starkovich said the factors which weighed heavily in Kampfer's See **KAMPFER**, page 2

favor were his current position as a city manager, his experience with the FBI, working on "white-collar" crimes and his efforts in Tucumcari, New Mexico, where he was crucial in obtaining a horse racing license and casino.

This information was provided by the *Raton Range*. Kampfer could not be reached Tuesday night for comment.

However, Colorado City Councilman Keith Hiser was available for comment after learning of the offer from Raton.

"I am saddened to hear that Mr. Kampfer might be leaving Colorado City," Kiser said. "He has strived over the last two years to create a very productive team within our city and has worked with this council to unify the

goal and objectives of each of the individual council members."

"More importantly, he has also put them into action," Kiser added. "The city has never made such vast improvements in such a short time as what he has done with the city's finances to the beautification efforts of the entire community."

Councilman Kiser added, "It is unfortunate that he felt it better to prematurely depart from our city than to see these projects to completion. I am confident that the team that we have assembled will continue to lead our city in a positive direction until the council can find another manager to carry out our mission to continue to make Colorado City a great place to live."

More than \$6 million set aside for Texas conservation funds \$30,000 will come to help Mitchell County

Mitchell County USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) Executive Director, Keith Hiser announced that Texas was allocated an additional \$6,414,000 of Emergency Conservation Program funds. These funds are in addition to regular ECP funds previously issued across the state.

Based on the state allocation, Mitchell County will receive \$30,000 in additional ECP funds. The county allocation is based off an initial estimate and could vary depending on the number of applications received per county.

In Texas, 27 counties including Mitchell County were approved for ECP assistance because they were designated as a primary disaster county under a Presidential Disaster Declaration issued for damages from 2011 wildfires.

ECP is administered by FSA and additional funds were allocated to assist producers with the cost of recovery activity to restore the agricultural land to pre-disaster conditions. Producers who sustained damage from the 2011 wildfires are encouraged to submit their request for assistance prior to beginning reconstructive

work. Submitting a request after completing qualified reconstructive work may result in forfeiture of program eligibility.

"I realize that there are extenuating circumstances that must be addressed for public and livestock safety and health reasons, but I strongly recommend at least calling our office before any reconstructive action is taken," said Hiser.

The Mitchell County FSA Committee will complete an evaluation of submitted requests and obligate available funds based on an on-site inspection of the damaged land, taking into consideration the type and extent of the eligible damage. The use of funds obligated under ECP authority is limited to return the land to the relative pre-disaster condition. Conservation concerns that were present on the land prior to the disaster are not eligible for ECP assistance. Approved ECP applicants may receive up to 75 percent of the cost of completing the approved restoration activity.

Huff recognized by VFW

Six different dates this last year you may have seen him manning a booth, providing flags, pens or pencils and only asking for a moment of your time in exchange. His name is Jimmy Huff of Jimmy Huff Ministry and most of his time is collecting money for veterans through one of several veteran organizations.

Most recently, Huff was recognized by the Veterans of Foreign Wars. Through Huff's organizational efforts, more than \$12,000 was donated to help veterans and their families in 2011, but Huff says not to thank him for it.

"All I do is collect it," the Korean War veteran said. "There are literally hundreds of volunteers behind the scenes doing the hard work who are responsible more than I am."

Huff, over the span of 40 years he spent in prison ministry, has added many friends, friends who are looking for a way to give back to the man who helped them,

Jimmy Huff. But the VFW is not the only organization Huff works with.

"Last night, I got a call from the Disabled American Veterans," Huff said. "A man and his family were stranded in Colorado City with no food or money. I met them at the store and bought them the food they needed to make it home. The man was a member of the American Legion."

To Huff, there is nothing more sickening than seeing a veteran fall by the wayside. Though the acceptable norm of Hollywood has gotten so many of us accustomed to seeing the vets in wheelchairs, dirty and holding out their hand for something, Huff says the norm is unacceptable.

"The saddest thing about it all," he said, sitting up in his chair. "The vets are the most looked-down-upon group of people in the country. There is

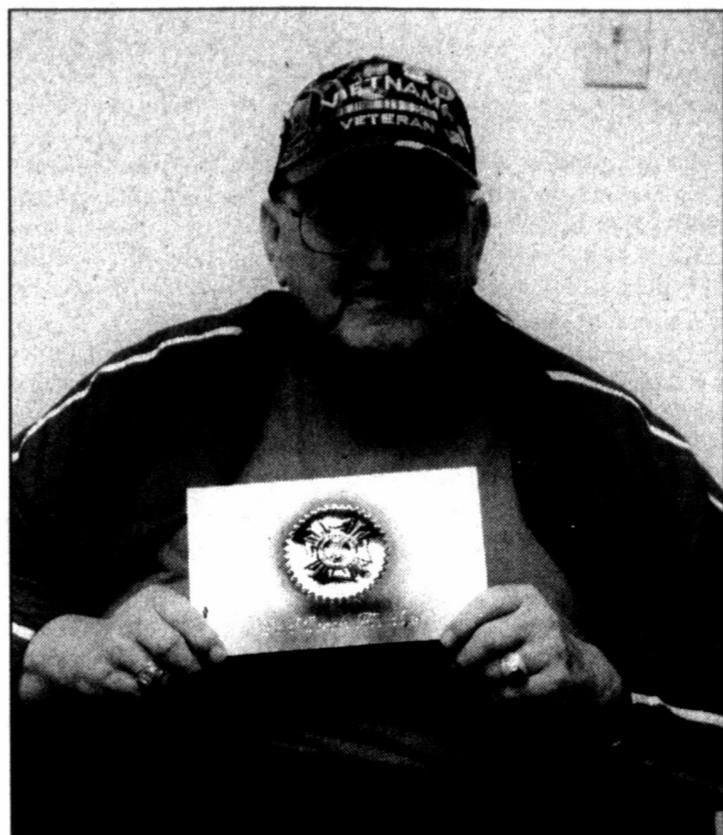
no reason for a veteran of these United States to have to ask for help to feed his or her family. They have given enough and deserve much better."

From January through April, Huff and his ministry is in an organizational phase of their calendar year, preparing dates for fundraisers to coordinate with specific holidays. In 2011, the ministry held fundraisers on Memorial Day, Independence Day, Victory in Korea Day, Veterans Day, Pearl Harbor Day and Sept. 11.

Children's Choir wows CHS

An unusual performance provided Colorado City's citizens with entertainment while supporting a good cause. A Watoto Children's Choir performed Tuesday at the Colorado High School Auditorium, raising more than \$1,500 to go directly to the orphanages in Uganda.

"Watoto" means "children" in Swahili, and the organization supports numerous orphanages in Uganda, representing more than 2,500 orphan children. In 1983, Gary and Marilyn Skinner, Canadian missionaries, moved with their family to Kampala, Uganda where they established an English-speaking church in the heart of the

city. Watoto Church is now a 13,000-member community church.

Uganda has endured the scourge of civil war and the deadly AIDS epidemic. Approximately 2 million children in Uganda have been orphaned by these calamities.

Currently, there are 880,000 Ugandan children living as orphans as a result of AIDS. In 1992, the Skinners were moved with compassion for Uganda's parentless children and started Watoto Child Care Ministries to address the Ugandan orphan crisis.

Since 1994, Watoto Children's Choirs have toured inter-

nationally, as advocates for the 15 million children in Africa, orphaned as a result of AIDS. Accompanied by a team of adults from Watoto Church they present Watoto's vision and mission through their music and dance, which is an energetic fusion of contemporary gospel and traditional African rhythm.

Each of the children in the choir has suffered the loss of one or both of their parents. They live in Watoto Children's Village homes.

Choir members are selected by an audition process and have the opportunity to travel once before returning to life in the Children's Village. Funding for the child care program is raised primarily by the children's choir tours.

Some of the children in the choir were put up in homes arranged by the United Methodist Church and Calvary Baptist Church, with sack lunches being provided by Chris and Vinson Stewart.

Paul Smith of Calvary Baptist Church said the event was a huge success.

"Everyone pitched in to make it a special night," Smith said. "Even the hospital (Mitchell County) provided services to one of the older members of the choir during the trip."

I attended a performance of the Nutcracker Ballet over the holidays and enjoyed it thoroughly. The musicians in the symphony orchestra played the familiar music to perfection and the dancers were at their absolute peak. The sets and costumes were spectacular. Hundreds of people were involved in getting the show on stage, something most of the audience knew and appreciated.

It was an interesting audience in my town's high school auditorium. Along with people dressed for the occasion in sequins and holiday wear, there were cowboy hats, baseball caps, lots of jeans and boots. I sat behind half a dozen teenagers appropriately dressed in slacks and dress shirts.

There is no narration in Nutcracker. It is a simple story of a girl falling asleep after admiring her Christmas gift of a nutcracker. In her dream, she and a prince charming go to the land of sweets and experience all sorts of wonderful, seasonal delights. The dancers were able to communicate the story without words.

The young people sitting in front of me may not have read the Nutcracker story in the program. Perhaps it was the first time they had seen a live performance of any type. They were attentive and well behaved for the most part, but on occasion they giggled and snorted and let off steam by an overabundance of applause and vocal appreciation.

Can't blame them too much. They are members of the video game generation and are accustomed to getting their entertainment by manipulating figures on a device with a small screen. They are playing a game that has no storyline, just the goal of a high score they try to reach. I salute their parents or teachers or whoever suggested they go to the ballet. They learned some things about culture and how to be respectful in a theater or auditorium. I don't know how meaningful the experience was for them, but I doubt they will forget seeing the outstanding dancers, musicians, sets, costumes, props and the audience's enthusiasm about just being there.

Video games probably have a larger audience than theatergoers. Age doesn't matter, as evidenced by Alec Baldwin getting kicked off an airplane because he refused to stop playing a game on his iPad. Passionate players are all over the place. My wife Susan is hooked on Angry Birds. She learned to play the game from our eight-year-old grandsons. It is addictive.

Video games help inspire confidence in working with any type of electronics. Players are usually excellent on computers, cameras, cell phones, recorders and everything from GPS systems in vehicles to home alarm systems. The high school and college-age kids today are staying up with technology, something prior generations find difficult to do. So many things came so fast it's practically impossible to keep up. Some adults keep buying electronics they hope to be able to use someday.

He serves our town with professionalism, and he's very dedicated to making our town something of which we can be proud! He has a vision for the future, and because of this vision, we all can see what is possible for our town. When Pete first came here, the Public Works Dept. was very deficient in equipment, vehicles and organization. Under Pete's direction and hard-working employees, the department has become more streamlined, more efficient, and better organized. New and used equipment has been purchased, including riding mowers, push mowers, trailers, two used dump trucks (repaired the one they already had), and three new pickups. In

addition to many other jobs, they have been tearing down and hauling off dilapidated houses and buildings, eventually around 60 I believe! What a wonderful difference they are making in the appearance of our town!

Then, there's the Sanitation Department. As you are well aware, we changed to the Duncan Disposal Company. Although the city crew had done a great job collecting our garbage all those years, it wasn't economically feasible. The really old garbage trucks were consistently breaking down, and costing thousands of dollars to repair! Now the money saved can be used in some other way to prove our city. Also, our alleys are much cleaner and neater, and our landfill isn't being filled by our garbage. Thanks, Pete!

Now to the Water Department - Pete hired additional specialized personnel to make sure our drinking water is safe, and that it meets required standards set by the state. New equipment was bought to clean around the tanks at the Waste Water Treatment Plant. An emergency trailer was purchased for the Water Dept. that has parts and equipment for any emergency situation. Also, we now have a diesel engine and generator to power the Lift Stations in case of an electrical blackout! These are things we did not have before to meet emergency needs. Also, Pete is making sure our city has sufficient water supply for the future. We are cleaning out old wells and drilling new ones. The city is also purchasing a new water tower. Thanks, Pete!

Next, the landfill north of town is more efficient than ever. A new, used piece of equipment has been purchased which grinds up limbs and branches to make mulch. The machine is called a Tub Grinder. The mulch can be used by the community as needed. Also, the Recycling Centers are being used more and more - another great way to clean up our community!

Thanks also to our Code Enforcement Dept. for getting our citizens to

clean up unsightly yards and lots. It seems to be "catching". Many more are taking pride in their surroundings. Of course, many homes and buildings are irreparable and are being demolished. Thank you, David, for your work!

Then, there's the Baker Hotel. We all know the state of the Baker, and how we hope that someday it can be returned to some of its beauty, but for now, I am thankful to Pete for seeing to it that it is safer than it was for our citizens. Who knows what its future might include? Also, Pete has had some renovation done to City Hall. The offices have been painted and refurbished. Glass security windows have been added to some offices.

These are just some of the improvements Pete has initiated as City Manager for Colorado City, and I am very proud of the progress being made under his direction. I love this town and the people here, and I look forward to a great future for us. Thank you Pete, members of the City Council, city employees and citizens of Colorado City!

I am keenly aware of the nuisance of feral and unrestrained animals in our City, as I personally see and deal with these same issues daily.

I would like our citizens to understand and appreciate that we are working as diligently as possible

to curtail these problems, however, it is not an overnight success story and therefore patience is beseeched. I would like to assure our citizens that the Animal Control department answers calls daily regarding these animal nuisances, including cats, skunks and other varmints, and we are striving to make headway as best as possible.

Concurrently, traps are being set on an as needed basis, except for problem areas that come to the attention of Animal Control. "As needed" obliges our citizens to contact the Police Department to report the location of nuisance animals which will prompt an absolute response from Animal Control. Records of all calls for service regarding animal nuisances are maintained by the Police Department.

Additionally, I would like to reassure our citizens that the laws and ordinances concerning the animal nuisance situation are not being overlooked or ignored by neither Animal Control nor the Police Department. If any citizen feels that this is occurring, I would urge them to contact the Senior Animal Control Officer or myself immediately.

Friends of the Library begin ink cartridge recycling campaign

Friends of the Mitchell County Library is now collecting empty inkjet cartridges for recycling as a fundraising project for the library. The non-profit organization receives up to \$4 for each cartridge recycled, which will be put to good use in the library.

All brands of inkjet cartridges are being accepted for the recycling project.

Cartridges can be deposited in the collection bin located in the Mitchell County Library, across from the Mitchell County Courthouse. Old cartridges should be placed in a plastic sandwich bag before being deposited in the bin to prevent ink from spilling out of the used cartridges.

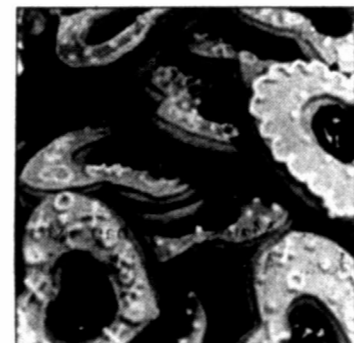
Most businesses simply throw their empty cartridges in the garbage, so check at work to see if the company would donate them to the Friends of the Library instead. Only inkjet cartridges are being accepted. No laser cartridges are accepted with this program, as they do not fit through the holes on the collection bin.

In addition to raising money for the library, recycling inkjet cartridges has a positive impact on the environment. Consider the following: Nearly one million inkjet cartridges are thrown into landfills every day. Less than 5% of the cartridges produced are recycled, and it takes 1000 years for the plastics to decompose.

Anyone can contribute to the recycling effort by purchasing recycled and refilled cartridges. They are often cheaper than new ones.

Make Valentine's Day more special with cookies



This recipe makes 17- 3 inch sandwich cookies and 17 - 1 1/2 inch heart shaped cookies. You'll need a 3-inch heart shaped cutter and a 1 1/2-inch heart shaped cutter.

EASY VALENTINE SANDWICH COOKIES
1 cup butter
1 1/2 cups confectioners' sugar
1 egg
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
1/2 teaspoon almond extract (optional)
2 1/2 cups all-purpose flour
1 teaspoon baking soda
1 teaspoon cream of tartar

1. In a large bowl, cream together butter and confectioners' sugar. Beat in egg, vanilla and almond extract. Mix well.

2. In a medium bowl, stir together flour, baking soda and cream of tartar; blend into the butter mixture. Divide dough into two equal parts and shape into balls.

3. Working with 1/3 of dough at a time, roll out dough into desired thickness on a lightly floured surface. For each heart sandwich cookie, cut out 2 3-inch hearts. Cut out the center of ONE of the 3-inch hearts with the 1 1/2-inch cutter.

4. Place each piece separately on an ungreased cookie sheet, 1-2 inches apart. Bake in a preheated, 350 degrees F (175 degrees C) oven until lightly browned (7-8 minutes for 1/4 inch thick cookies). Cool completely on wire rack. Frost bottom cookie with Pink Valentine Frosting and place an open centered cookie on top to form the sandwich. Also frost the small 1 1/2 inch hearts and serve as separate cookies.

PINK VALENTINE FROSTING
1 cup sifted confectioners' sugar
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract
1 tablespoon water
2 drops red food coloring
Blend sugar, salt and flavoring. Add just enough water to make it easy to spread. Add 2 drops red food coloring and mix well.

Wolves get tough win at The Pit

Remain the only undefeated team in district

The Colorado Wolves fought off a huge Slaton lead early in the game Friday night to get a second half win, defeating Slaton 41-32 to go 8-0 in district, making their run over the last two years an impressive 22-0 in district play. To find the team's last district loss, you have to go back to the end of the 2009-2010 season.

Slaton jumped out to an early 9-1 lead against the Wolves Friday night at The Pit, but the Wolves would not be satisfied with a lone free throw by from Bailey Spencer on the stat sheet for the quarter. C-City held Slaton scoreless for the rest of the period, while they forced a comeback to send the two teams into the second frame with Slaton only up 9-7.

A sense of desperation, which seemed to fill the gym early in the first period, disappeared when the two teams started the second quarter.

The Wolves seemed to get their feet under them, making their motions on the court appear more deliberate, not to mention effective. Derek Gaaney hit a free throw late in the period to tie the game at 12 points each, but Slaton got a buzzer-beater just in time to take a 14-12 lead into the locker rooms. The Wolves' comeback would have to wait a little longer.

What Coach Barry Kimball told the Wolves in the locker room is anybody's guess, but the results were as plain as they could possibly be.

a buzzer-beater which sent the Wolves into the game's final frame with a 24-23 advantage.

This time, the lead would stand as Gaaney started the frame the same way he ended the third, by drilling one from outside the arch.

Spencer hit a 3-pointer in the fourth and Gaaney drained another as the Wolves got a head of steam and rolled right past Slaton for the 41-32 win. Spencer, Tylor Lorenz and Rodriguez each were good for eight points in the game to follow Gaaney on the stat sheet.

Lorenz was six out of eight from the free throw line to grab most of his points. His only bucket of the night ended with him on the free throw line again, as he was fouled getting the shot away. A quick move, a slow defender and a short 2-point bucket becomes a really, really close 3-pointer.

Gaaney only shot the ball four times in the second half. All four went in and all four were from outside the 3-point line.

A large part of the reason Colorado City was able to pull away so decisively late in the game, was because of a coaching decision early. Jake Johnson and Gustavo Silva were in the game early — midway through the second quarter early — while Lorenz and Rodriguez got to catch their breath and rest. A gutsy call in a game which was tight early, it paid off with dividends for the Wolves.

The Wolves will be back on the road Friday night, Feb. 3 when they travel to Denver City.

The Wolves' next home game will be Feb. 7 at The Pit, when they host Coahoma. These two teams played one down to the wire in the Bulldogs' home court before Colorado City took the game over. Expect nothing less for this one.

Heather Merket was good for 13 points Tuesday night, but it would not be enough as the Lady

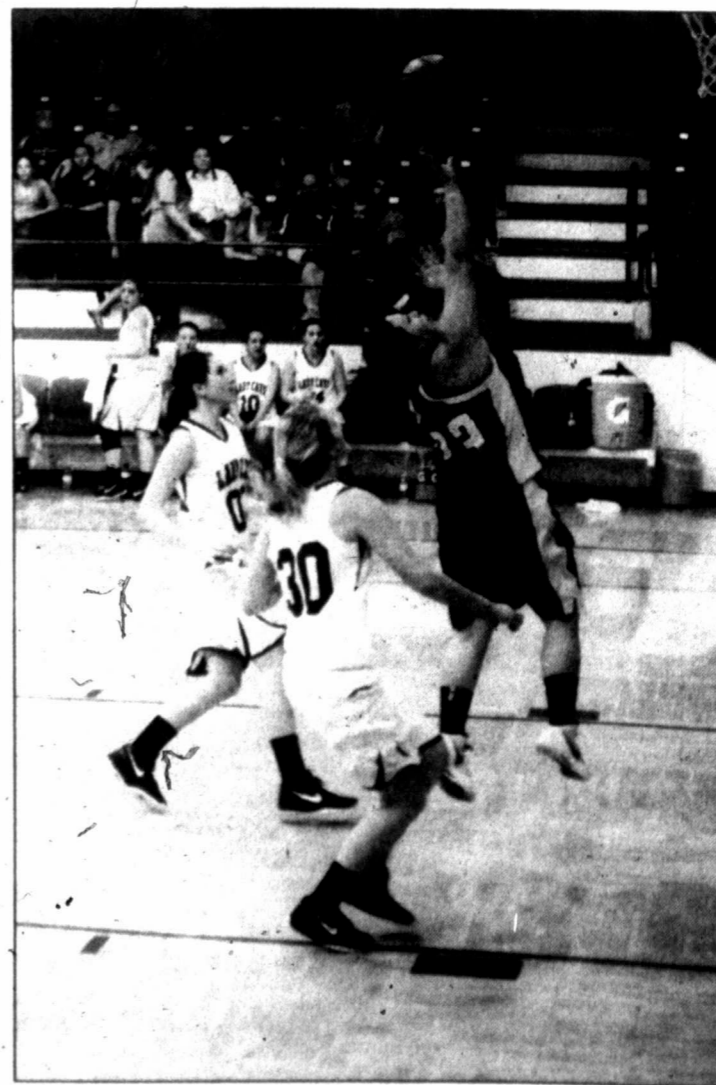
Wolves dropped a close one to the Stanton Lady Buffs.
