Bogata Men Fined \$205 In Justice Court

Two Bogata men, Barney Nixon (Trey) Gayler and Richard Puckett pled guilty and were fined \$102.50 each for interfering with an official control sign. Pleas were made and fines assessed in the Justice of the Peace Court of Bill McDonough Monday and Tuesday, Feb. 21 and 22. The offense was related to the removal of highway signs at the intersection of Highway 271 and 37 in Bogata.

Highway Department officials advised Judge McDonough the cost of re-installing the signs will be approximately \$170. One juvenile connected with the incident was turned over to the juvenile authorities.

Rebelettes Lose To Red Oak In Finals

The Rivercrest Rebelettes defeated the Brownsboro Bearettes 36-35 in the first round of Regional Basketball competition in Denton Friday night, then fell to the Red Oak Mojo Hawks in the finals, 60 to 41.

The Rebelettes were not even

hitting 50 per cent of their shots from the floor against Red Oak, and did not play the same ball game they played against Brownsboro.

The Mojo Hawks had the advantage of height against the Rebelettes, but were not as talented. The Hawks were well

rested, whereas the Rebelettes looked weary.

The game to watch for the Rebelettes was against Brownsboro, when the Bearettes jumped to a quick lead in the first quarter, and led at the bottom of the period eight to six.

The Rebelettes tied it up early in the second quarter when Annette Harris was fouled and sank two free throws. Gloria Savage made two more free throws to give the Rebelettes a four point lead. Elishia Dugger wasn't

missing any rebounds under the basket against Brownsboro, and Terri Savage displayed a deftness for intercepting passes.

Annette Harris was the forward with the fancy dribble, but had trouble with palming the ball and passing across the

lane through taller players. She constantly outjumped taller girls in the circle, both against Red Oak and Brownsboro.

The Rebelettes let a six point lead shrink to two points, but closed the third quarter with a five point lead.

The Bearettes tied the game in the fourth quarter, and led the Rebelettes by one point with

30 seconds to go in the game. Velma Savage made the two points that won the game for the Rebelettes with the jump shot that won games all year for Rivercrest.

Rivercrest hit six of 11 free throws against Brownsboro and 13 of 25 against Red Oak. Terri Savage and Elishia Dugger fouled out against Brownsboro.

FmHA To Guarantee Home Loans

Clarksville, Texas: The Farmers Home Administration has begun a program through which it will guarantee rural housing loans made by commercial banks, savings and loan associations, and other private lenders, Frank B. Stroud, FmHA County Supervisor for Red River County, announces.

FmHA, the rural credit agency of the U. S. Department of Agriculture (USDA), will guarantee up to 90 per cent of the principal and interest of these loans.

Guaranteed housing loans will be available for moderate income borrowers who cannot get housing mortgage credit without a guarantee. Applicants who cannot qualify for guaranteed loans may apply for loans made by FmHA.

At present, the USDA agency will offer loan guarantees only under its single-family housing loan program. FmHA will continue to make single-family housing loans with its own funds. It will also continue to make, but not guarantee, loans for rural rental housing, farm labor housing, housing site development, and other purposes.

Single family housing loans are made in open country, towns of up to 10,000 population, and certain designated towns of between 10,000 and 20,000 population. They finance modest but adequate housing and related facilities, Stroud explains.

Loans may be used to buy, build, improve, repair, or rehabilitate houses and related facilities, and to provide adequate water and waste disposal systems.

Guaranteed loans will be made only to applicants with moderate income, defined by FmHA as adjusted gross income of less than \$15,600 per year for residents of Texas, and not eligible for FmHA subsidized rural housing loans.

Loans to be guaranteed are limited to 97 per cent of the market value of homes and sites for the first \$25,000 and 95 percent of the loan in excess of

\$25,000. The borrower must have equity from his own resources, in the form of cash or land for the down payment, notes Stroud.

The top limit for a guaranteed rural housing loan to a resident of Texas is \$33,000. The maximum repayment period is 33 years.

Stroud also reports that FmHA regulations provide lenders who obtain guarantees for rural housing loans options for selling, assigning, or selling participants in the guaranteed parts of these loans.

FmHA regulations require that the lender making a guaranteed rural housing loan be a local lender-located in or doing business in the area where the house is located.

To apply for an FmHA-guaranteed rural housing loan, contact your local lender.

Trash Burning Causes Many Fires

For many rural residents and vacationers, burning trash is the only feasible method of disposing of it. But careless trash burning is a major cause of forest and range fires in Texas, especially during the winter and early spring, before the vegetation has greened up. Fire fighting organizations across the state are alerting rural people to use caution in burning their garbage and other trash.

In the Pineywoods of East Texas, Texas Forest Service records show that about 55 percent of the forest and grass fires are started by careless burning of fields, brush, and household trash.

According to Ken Burton, assistant head of the Texas Forest Service Fire Control Department, a third of the debris fires that escape are improperly conducted trash fires. The Texas Forest Service is responsible for natural cover fire protection on 18.2 million acres in 52 counties in East Texas. During 1976, 2,481 fires burned 35,296 acres of this region.

To more accurately determine the causes of rural fires across the state, the Texas Forest Service developed a cooperative reporting program

with volunteer fire departments. Results from 1976, the first year of the pilot project, show that escaped trash fires are just as great a problem in West and Central Texas.

"Trash burning is also more likely to result in damage to houses, outbuildings and other improvements, since it is done near the residence," says Burton.

Trash burning itself is not illegal in most unincorporated areas, but the repercussions of letting a trash fire escape are traumatic. According to the revised Texas Penal Code, a person who lets a trash fire escape onto and cause damage to another person's property can be charged with a misdemeanor with a maximum fine of \$200. In addition, the burner can be sued in civil court by the landowner who suffered the damages.

"Most of the trash fires we have problems with are unintentional," says Burton. "Many people are just not aware of safe burning practices. They burn at the wrong time with too few precautions." Burton offered several suggestions for helping insure that your trash fire doesn't result in a wild forest or range fire.

1. Burn only in the morning or the early evening. Usually the humidity is higher and the wind is lower during those times, so conditions are less conducive to a fire gaining momentum if sparks from your trash fire do escape.

2. Do not burn on dry, windy days, especially in the winter or early spring. These are the times of highest fire danger. Many radio and TV stations and newspapers carry an advisory called the outdoor burning guide as part of the daily agricultural weather forecast from the National Weather Service. This burning guide was developed by the Texas Forest Service to advise people when it is unsafe to burn trash or do other outdoor burning. Check with your local radio or TV station, or newspaper. If they're not receiving the guide, check with your local fire department, if you're wondering if it's safe to burn.

3. Burn trash in fire safe containers. Commercial models made from metal are available, but an equally effective container can be constructed at home from cinder blocks or an old oil drum. The important features of any fire-safe container are a screened

lid to prevent burning pieces of trash from escaping out through the top, and holes in sides to allow for ventilation. Most are also raised off the ground for extra ventilation and to dissipate heat before it is transferred to any flammable material on the ground. Plans for fire safe containers are available from the Texas Forest Service, College Station, Texas 77843.

4. Before you burn, clear an area down to bare soil five feet around the container. Also, after vegetation dies in the winter, cut all dead grass and remove other leaf litter from around houses and outbuildings.

6. You can't get rid of everything by burning it. Some trash is even dangerous to burn. Do not burn aerosol cans or unknown chemicals. Don't burn glass containers, either since they can explode in in-

Texans Paying More For Natural Gas

AUSTIN—Comptroller Bob Bullock said Tuesday that a study of natural gas prices by his office showed that, to nobody's surprise, Texans are paying more on the average for their natural gas than residents of other states.

Bullock said his Division of Planning and Research found that 68 per cent of the natural gas produced in Texas during fiscal 1976 was sold on the intrastate market, while 32 per cent was sold on the interstate market.

Nearly three-fourths of the interstate sales were for 40 cents per MCF (thousand cubic feet) or less, while only about 40 percent of the intrastate sales were at these lower prices, the Comptroller said.

Bullock said the analysis also showed that while Texas is the major gas producing state, it is also the largest user—consuming more than two and one-half times as much gas as the number two user, California.

The analysis is included in the Comptroller's February financial statement.

The monthly statement shows that state spent \$556.2 million in December, bringing total expenditures during the first four months of the fiscal year to \$2.3 billion.

Total state revenues for December were \$497.3 million,

Decorating Ideas From SHELTON'S

THOSE few warm days last week started me off on the spring cleaning bug. I dug into nooks and crannies I hadn't looked at all winter, moved furniture around and thought of fresh paint, a new couch and ideas for redecorating. THAT'S where the problem began, what kind of couch will go with the rest of my furniture.

ROOM SIZE: too small
This is a common problem for people who live in small apartments or houses, or who are beginning to outgrow their home. Follow these suggestions to make the most of your space.

Repaint
Use a pale tint of the same color as the draperies. Remember cool colors (blues and greens) recede, and create an illusion of space.

Wallpaper
Choose a texture, such as grasscloth, or an overall

pattern in pale colors. Floral and leaf patterns can bring outdoor spaciousness into even a tiny room. But be careful—they can also be "too much of a good thing" and create an eyesore.

Redo Window Treatment
Again, avoid dark colors. Keep draperies close to the color of the wall to create unbroken space. Use a simple valance, or a bit of ruffle or braid ornament, but stay away from too elaborate a treatment that would over-power the room.

Use Color
In deciding color, remember a room all in one color or in related colors seems more spacious than a room with a lot of different colors.

Decorate Walls
Besides paint or wallpaper, we mean. You can hang any number of things on walls to decorate them. Paintings; photos; prints; paper-toile; embroidery, and other crafts; tapestries and other textile wall hangings are some possibilities. One large pic-

ture—maybe a landscape or other spacious scene—could create space in a small room. If you put up a grouping of many small pictures, unify the grouping by using similar frames, and hang so the whole group together makes a pleasing shape. Fit all the pictures within a large imaginary oval, for example.

Use Mirrors
Mirrors can create a dramatic effect. Smoked gold-veined mirror tiles on one wall visually double the space of a room. Even though you can't walk around in it, seeing the extra space makes a room feel more spacious. A large wall mirror in a dramatic frame can have a similar effect.

Plan a furniture purchase
Measure the space you have, and choose a piece that fits the space with room to spare. Try for scaled-down furniture when you can. For example, a 72" couch instead of 84", or a small table lamp rather than a larger floor lamp.

Representative's Report

Serving in the Legislature is quite an experience for me. There are a lot of controversial issues and many times we hear only the bad or undesirable news about legislators. For example, in the first week or so after the session convened I picked up an Austin paper and read an article on the front page with the heading The Circus Comes to Town.

Without holding up any one person or any group, I would like to make you aware of a group that you probably don't know about in the House of Representatives. This is a prayer group that meets every Tuesday morning and is sponsored by Speaker Bill Clayton in his committee room.

This particular group has made quite an impression on me and it has been brought out in this session that there is more interest and more participation in this group than in past sessions. The unique thing about this group is not that it consists only of men and women but is represented within by Blacks, Anglos, and Mexican-Americans. Even over-riding this is the fact that there are Methodist, Baptist, Church of Christ, Catholic and others. Each week one of our group brings the devotional after which there is discussion by the members. I think it is good to know that we have many people of this type serving as representatives in our state legislature.

There has been much floor action this week in the House of Representatives.

One of the most controversial issues coming before us was HB 22. I was privileged to have served on the agricultural subcommittee which inserted several amendments. We passed this bill out of subcommittee, I thought, in good shape. However, it was amended on the floor changing the bill from its original concept. Of course I supported and voted for the bill in its final analysis. The bill will now go to the Senate. I am hopeful that it will be a better bill when the Senate returns it to the House

for final action.

Another action that I am watching closely in the House is legislation dealing with automobile liability insurance. From your response and my own concern, I know this is a very important issue. Hopefully we can come up with legislation that will deal with this problem that will be enforceable.

Another area of great importance is public education. There have been a number of bills introduced dealing with financing of public education. I feel confident we will have a favorable bill passed out of committee that I can support that will answer the needs of school districts, teachers, and children alike.

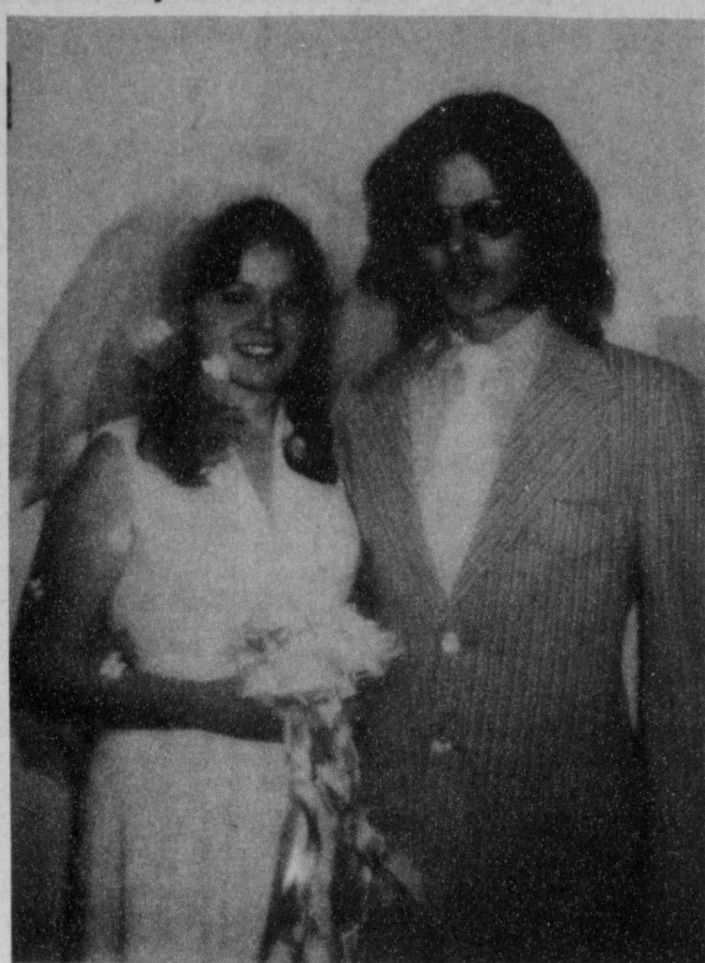
The serving table was covered with white linen cloth adorned with silver wedding bells. The cake was decorated with white roses and tipped with tiny green leaves.

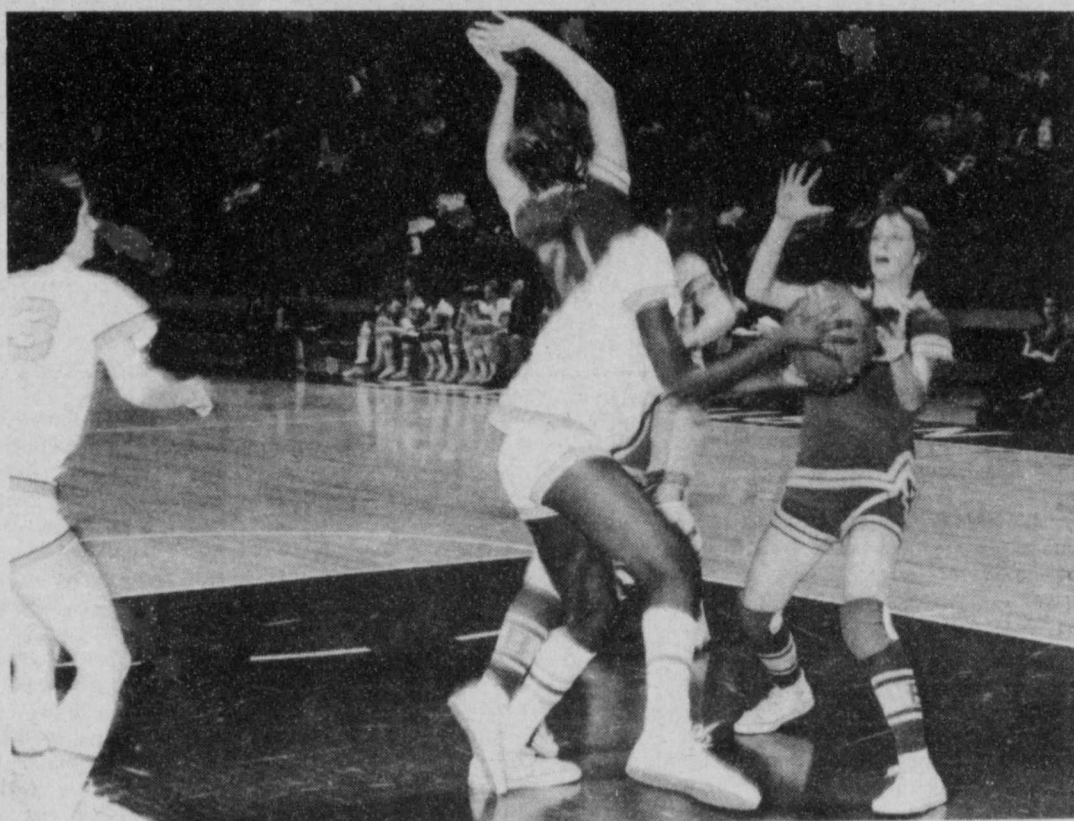

CB's Form Nationwide Organization

WASHINGTON—Some of the people who are serious about expanding the uses of Citizens Band radio have formed a nationwide organization with headquarters in Austin, Texas, it was announced here today.

The National Association of Legal Citizens Band Radio Operators, Inc., 4000 Medical Parkway in Austin, is a privately funded association designed to funnel research information to the Federal Communications Commission. Association Director Tom

Felton announced formation of the "Legal CBers" at a meeting of the CB advisory committee to the Federal Communications Commission. The Committee is called the Personal Use Radio Advisory Committee (PURAC) and was established in April 1976. The purpose of the committee is to advise the FCC on problems created by the expanded use of Citizens Band radio.

"We expect our first year membership drive to generate 500,000 applicants for mem-

bership," said Felton. "We plan to open more than 300 Legal CBER offices nationwide. The first area office will be in San Antonio, Texas."

The new association has asked members of the Texas House of Representatives to nominate constituents from all the Legislative Districts to serve on a statewide Citizens Band radio study committee. A similar procedure is planned in each state.

Felton told the PURAC meeting here that the Legal CBers will publish a definitive handbook on CB radio and keep the contents current with events and technology on a monthly basis. He said publication is scheduled in February.

Felton said Legal CBers will endeavor to bridge the gap in information between the FCC, the individual operator, and the public.

Legal CBers will help sort out any conflicts between CB radio users and non-users—such as interference with television and AM-FM radio reception. Felton said Legal CBers will be a self-policing organization and will present valid recommendations to the FCC for changes and modifications in rules and regulations.
