Toby Taylor Attending NM Military School

Along with 449 classmates, Cadet Toby D. Taylor, son of Mr. and Mrs. Dwayne Taylor, Box 730, Abernathy, Texas, began his first academic year on September 8 at New Mexico Military Institute, Roswell, New Mexico. Cadet Taylor enrolled at the Institute August 31 and completed an intensive week of orientation prior to the opening of the academic year. His basic training included military customs and courtesies, cadet traditions, foot drill, and manual of arms with rifles. This strenuous military introduction was topped off with a lively dance at the Institute campus when Cadet Taylor and his classmates played host to young ladies of the Roswell area.

Hale County Budget Set

Hale County Commissioners approved a 1966 budget showing an estimated \$55,500,000 county-wide valuation and a total tax rate of \$1.28 per \$100 at a special budget hearing. The total valuation is up \$3,262,750 from that of the 1965 budget. County Auditor Larry Peckham said the total assessed valuation is based on approximately 20 per cent of true market value. The tax levy of \$1.28 per \$100 is \$1.13 plus a 15 cent ad valorem levy is unchanged from the previous year, Peckham said.

Total Amount
Based on these figures, the total amount of taxes levied for the 1966 budget, beginning on Jan. 1, will be \$627,150. It is estimated that 95 per cent of this, or \$595,792, will be collected within the tax year, and about \$31,357.50 will be delinquent on July 1, 1966. These figures are based on tax collection experience of previous years. Delinquent taxes amounted to \$31,249.08 on July 1 this year. According to the estimate, \$10,000 of that is expected to be collected during the current tax year.

On Fiscal Year
The tax department works on a fiscal year beginning July 1 to coincide with the state tax fiscal year. The county budget, however is based on the regular year beginning January 1. The budget shows total net outstanding bond and time warrant indebtedness at the first of this year was \$1,093,000, and estimated that it would be reduced to \$1,011,000 by Jan. 1, 1966.

After approving the budget, Commissioners briefly discussed a request from the city of Abernathy to consider putting a new deputy here from the sheriff's department. The city has previously had a county deputy stationed here and paid a portion of his salary, but they received word that he was being transferred to duty in Plainview.

No Action Taken
Commissioners made no decisions until they would talk to Sheriff Troy Porterfield about the situation, but indicated an opinion that another deputy would not be necessary in this area since the one here now

Peyton Fullingim, pastor of the Plains Baptist Church, Lubbock, assisted by the Rev. Leland Spurrier, pastor of Abernathy First Methodist Church.

Blacklock died of an apparent heart attack at 12:45 p.m. Thursday, Sept. 9, at his home two miles south of Abernathy. Born in Oklahoma Territory Blacklock moved to Petersburg in 1924 and then moved to Abernathy in 1938 where he worked as a mechanic and later entered the farming and dairy business. He was a member of the Church of Christ and was a past Grand Master of the of the Oddfellows.

Burial was in Petersburg Cemetery, with services under direction of Chambers Funeral Home.

Antelopes Blank Petersburg 26-0; Play Owls Here Friday

The Antelopes of AHS garnered a sweet victory over the Petersburg Buffaloes last Friday night on the Petersburg field. Lane Wade added 20 more points to his season total as the Antelopes came out on top 26-0.

Friday night's game gave the Antelopes 66 points to their opponents 0 after only two games. The defense shined again as Petersburg made only two serious scoring threats. Fud Robertson, Petersburg's main threat, never could get off the ground as the 'Lope defense line held. Robertson found the middle all stopped up by seniors Mike Franklin, Jimmy Don Franklin and Larry Crowder among others.

Spectacular running by Wade added spice to the Antelope attack and gave the 'Lopes their runaway victory. Wade's first score came on a 45-yard jaunt with 9 minutes left to play in the first quarter. Mike Tannehill's boot for extras was nullified by a penalty.

In the second quarter, Wade started around the right end on his own 28-yard line and outmaneuvered two Buffs to break into the clear for 72 yards and 6 more points. The kick for extras by Tannehill was wide.

Wade made his longest run of the night in the third period. On another rollout around the right end, the 'Lopes cleared his way downfield and Wade was gone for 79 yards and his final TD.

Tannehill, who had failed to connect on an extra point, made up for it in the fourth quarter when he raced around right end for 11 yards and the last TD of the night. Wade added the two extra points and the final score was 26-0. As the game ended, Petersburg was knocking on the door, but the Antelope defense held once again.

Halfback Roland Murray, a Junior, was forced to miss action in Friday night's contest due to a foot injury sustained in practice last week. Several other Antelopes who played were not up to par due to illnesses or injuries.

Ray Martin ginned his first bale of 1965 cotton Monday afternoon. The bale was delivered to Martin Gin & Fertilizer on FM 54 west of the draw by Otis Pope.

Pope had 2,050 pounds of seed cotton, which produced 595 pounds of lint and 950 pounds of seed. Per centage of lint yield was 29.02. Martin said, Martin paid Pope 50c per pound for lint, \$100 per ton basis for seed, and ginned the bale free of charge. The cotton was 111 Paymaster. Beds were watered once before planting, and the cotton was watered once during the growing season.

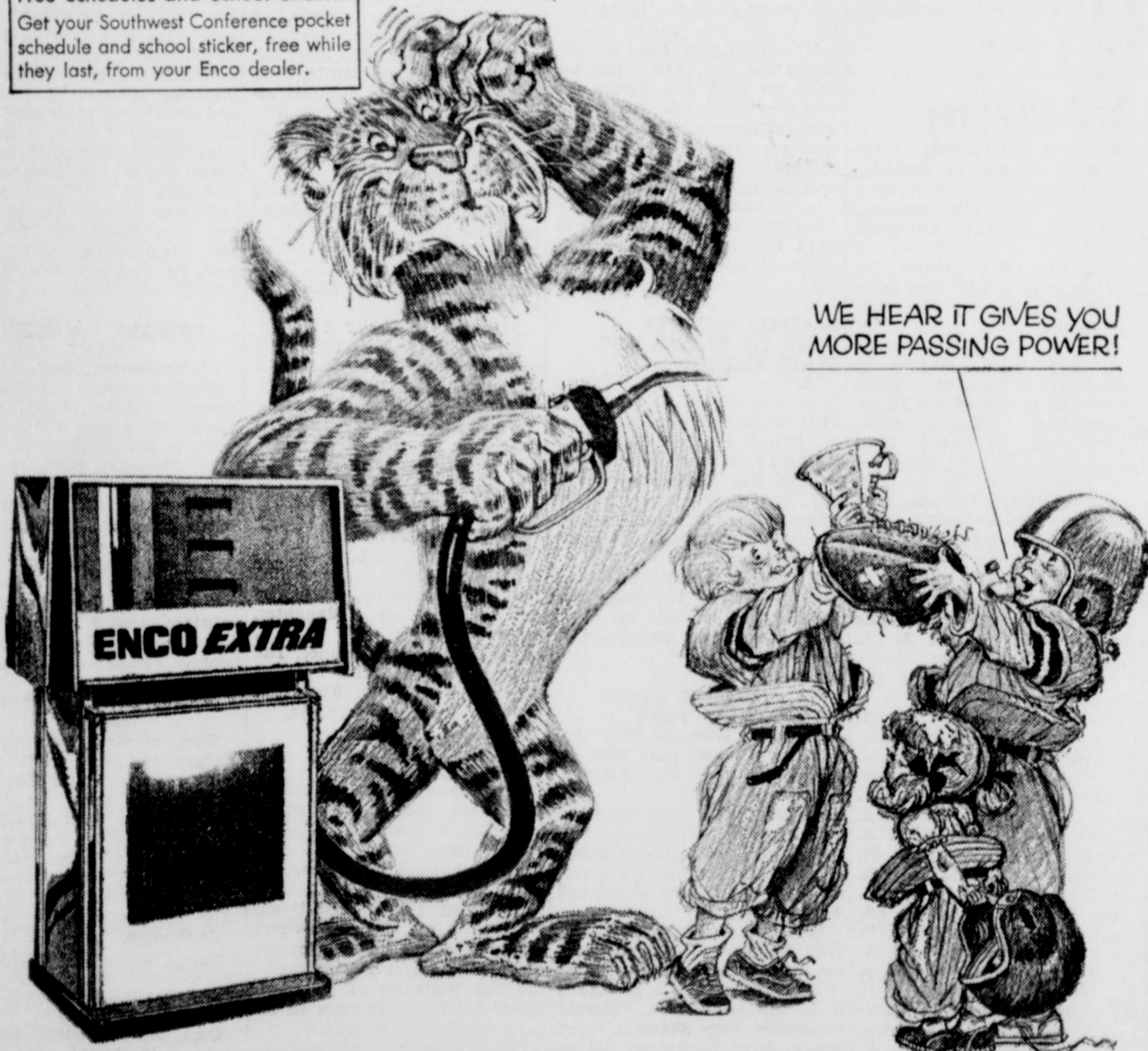

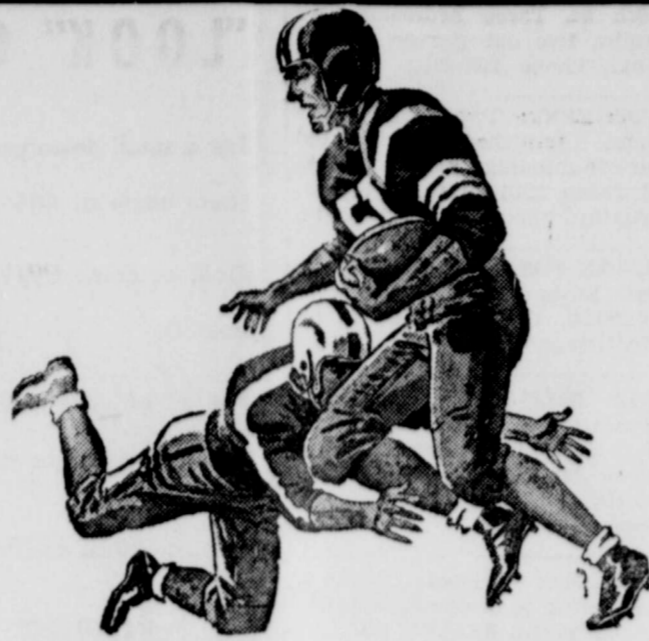

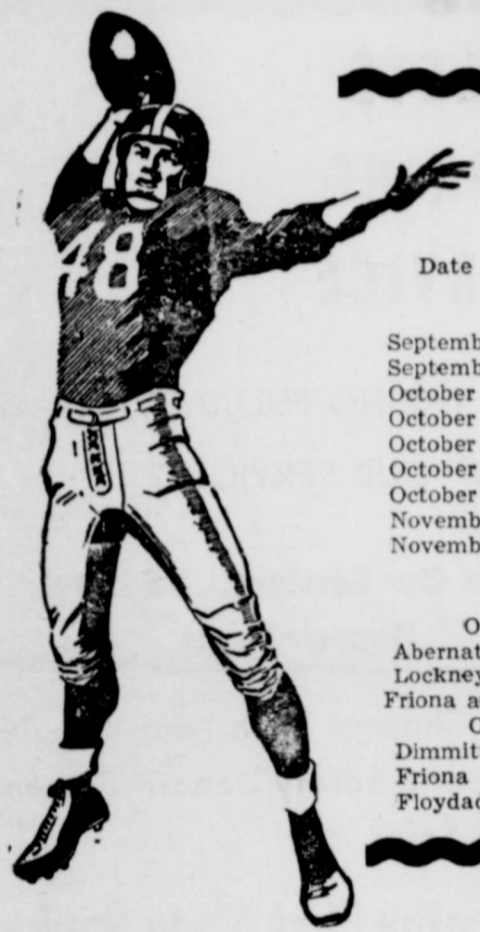
